Sugar Stamp 11 Expires Monday

Monday will be the last day for use of stamp 11 in war ration book No. 1 for purchase of three pounds of sugar, the district office of the Office of Price Administration reminded Saturday.

Stamp 12 will become valid Tuesday for five pounds of sugar and will remain valid through May 31. Stamp 25 in the book, good for one pound of coffee, will expire at midnight March 21.

RATION CALENDAR

Meats, fats, cheese — New program starts March 29 with red stamps in Book No. 2 to be used.

Sugar — Coupon No. 12 (5 lbs.) Valid March 16. Must last through end of May, or 11 weeks.

Coffee — Stamp No. 25 (1 lb.) expires March 21.

Tires — Class 'A'. First inspection deadline March 31.

Crop Insurance On Cotton Extended

WASHINGTON, March 13. —The Agriculture department today extended federal crop insurance protection on cotton to include all of the staple planted within 110 per cent of the 1943 acreage allotments.

A similar extension of insurance protection for wheat planted in excess of 1943 acreage allotments was announced last week.

Dawson County 4-H Club Boy Wins At Amarillo Show

Leon Archer, Dawson County 4-H Club Boy residing on the Fred Henderson farm, 12 miles north of Lamesa on the Grandview Road, showed his milk-fed calf, Dan 2nd, to 11th place at the Fat Stock Show at Amarillo on Tuesday, March 9th, 1943.

Dan 2nd was bred by Fred Henderson. This steer was put on feed late in May, 1942 by Leon Archer. When weighed out at Amarillo this steer weighed 900 pounds and sold for 20c per pound to Richardson Store, Lamesa, Texas.

The Calf Shaw at Amarillo was judged by John C. Burns of Fort Worth, Texas. Mr. Burns stated after judging the 1943 Amarillo Show that the type, conformation, quality and finish of the steers shown was the best of any show he had judged this year.

Leon Archer fed this steer under the supervision of B. J. Baskin, County Agent of Dawson County, Texas.

'A' Book Holders Must Have Tires Inspected By 31st

All "A" book holders must have first official tire inspections by March 31. Subsequent inspections for "A" book holders will be once every six months. "B" book holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, "C" book holders must have second official tire inspection by May 31. "T" book holders must be made 60 days from February 28, or every 5,000 miles, which ever comes first.

WASHINGTON, March 12. (AP) —The new meat-cheese-butter oils rationing will start March 29, the government announced today, and there will be no sales "freeze" before hand as there was on other rationing programs.

Price Administrator Brown followed up with details today the order of Secretary of Agriculture Wickard for rationing meat, cheese, edible fats and oils including butter, and canned fish with the red coupons of the number two ration book.

16 Points A Week

Each person, regardless of age, will be allowed 16 points a week for the whole group of new items to be rationed. There will be no exact meat ration, although Wickard estimated that the amount of meat available will average two pounds per week per person for home consumption. Actually the public will be able to buy more or less meat, depending on how many of the same coupons are used for the other rationed foods. The amount of meat also will depend on what kind of meat is purchased.

Just what the 16-point allowance will buy cannot be determined until the OPA distributes in about two weeks the chart of point values — similar to the recent chart on canned goods — giving the coupon values for the rationed items.

Restaurants will continue to be coupon-free to the customers, although OPA will ration the supplies used by restaurants.

Other details:

Bullion cubes and beef extracts, not rationed now with canned soup, will be rationed with meat.

Not all cheese will be rationed. Hard cheeses like Swiss and American will be rationed; soft or perishable cheese like cream cheese, cottage cheese, camembert and brie will not be rationed.

Canned fish will be rationed but fresh fish, frozen, smoked, and pickled fish will not be rationed.

No poultry or game will be rationed, where fresh or canned.

Weekly coupons will be good for a month. If any coupons are left over from the first week, they may be used with the second week's coupons. The same is true of the third and fourth weeks, until on April 30 all the first month's coupons will expire together.

Coupon Change

Because meat cutting is inexact, point costs of meat will be figured to the nearest full point. Thus, a steak which figured 10 1-4 points could be had for 10 points. But if it figures 10 1-2 or larger fraction, it will cost 11 points.

Butchers will be allowed to give change coupons to customers not having the exact coupon price in their books.

Butchers will be required technically to trim fat and bone according to normal practices but this rule will be so difficult to enforce on a legal basis that officials are looking to the customer to get himself fair treatment or take his patronage elsewhere.

VICTORY PATTERNS



... — IN THE AIR ... — ON THE LAND

Victory pattern on Texas farmlands in the 1943 Food-for-Freedom drive will be the contour lines of soil and water conservation farming practices which aid in getting bigger yields from each acre worked.

This Texas scene, with Army airplanes superimposed, shows how conservation farming appears from the air. The farm home and the victory garden are surrounded by fields contour-tilled, strip-cropped, and terraced.

While they are mobilizing all their resources to grow food for the battle fronts and the home front, and for American Allies, Texas farmers should not overlook soil and water conservation, members of the Texas USDA War Board reminded.

Many simple conservation practices, the War Board said, can be put on the land with little or no extra labor and will boost 1943 yields without damage to the land as occurred during the first World War.

County USDA War Boards in Texas are prepared to advise farmers about easily established soil conservation practices during Farm Mobilization and then to give assistance in establishing the measures. Farmers residing within soil conservation districts also may obtain aid through the districts.

Emergency Seed Loans Available To Local Farmers

Emergency Crop Loans, known generally as "the seed loans," offered for many years in this County by Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration, are now available to farmers in need of financial assistance for the production of vitally important food crops and normal crops for 1943, according to announcement of W. E. Farwell, Manager of the Dallas Office.

Applications for the loans are being taken in this County at the Court House in Lamesa on each Monday and Saturday, under direction of Field Supervisor R. Kendrick Green.

Funds obtained under these loans may be used to cover the cost of preparing the land and to purchase seed, fertilizer and supplies incident to the production of the crop. A first mortgage on the crops to be grown is the security required on the crop loans.

As in the past, borrowers will be required to agree to plant a large garden for home use and a balanced crop program will be encouraged. This year, however, particular emphasis will be laid upon the patriotic duty of all growers to produce food crops and oil bearing crops outlined by the Department of Agriculture as all important goals in meeting the urgent war needs.

Loans are also available from this Agency to purchase or produce feed for livestock. A first mortgage on the livestock to be fed is the security for that type of loan.

Applicants who can obtain loans from banks, Production Credit Associations, or on reasonable terms from other sources, are not eligible for Emergency Crop Loans.

Certificates Will Be Necessary To Buy Cultivator

Certificates from county farm machinery rationing committees will be necessary for purchase of one-row, horse-drawn riding cultivators, B. F. Vance, chairman, Texas USDA War Board, announced this week.

County quotas now are being established and this type of machinery will be handled similarly to other quota items.

Texas farmers also were advised that the Department of Agriculture no longer will control distribution by manufacturers of garden planters and of two-row or larger horse-drawn riding cultivators.

Purchase certificates, needed to buy rationed machinery and equipment, are issued by county farm rationing committees on approximately 75 types of farm machinery.

DOUBLE TROUBLE IN SHERIFF'S CORNER

Dysentery And Other Diseases Are On Increase

Reporting on health conditions over the State of Texas, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said today that epidemic dysentery, meningitis, and typhus fever have shown a sharp increase for the first two months of 1943. Reported cases of epidemic dysentery and diarrhea total eleven times the number shown for the corresponding period in a seven-year average. Outbreaks of dysentery in several communities scattered over the State point to local failure to solve certain sanitation problems which could endanger the downward trend of typhoid fever. Typhus fever has been reported as being three times the seven-year median and the State Health Officer emphasized the fact that rigid rodent control measures will require the wholehearted cooperation of every individual in the State, since this control is absolutely necessary to bring the trend of typhus down to a satisfactory level.

Considerable increase has been reported in the incidence in pneumonia, whooping cough, and malaria, while poliomyelitis has been slightly more prevalent since last fall, but has shown a very satisfactory decrease in recent weeks. Diphtheria has failed to show any significant decrease for the state as a whole although it has been controlled satisfactorily in certain communities.

Dr. Cox asked the cooperation of

all parents in immunizing children against diphtheria, whooping cough, typhoid fever, and smallpox. These diseases are preventable by the use of safe and effective immunization methods. While the first two diseases mentioned are more especially recognized as childhood diseases, typhoid fever and smallpox can take a heavy toll among adults as well and every individual should be made immune to their debilitating effects.

Cotton Farmers Urged To Insure Crops Under AAA

Cotton on Dawson County farms can promise more and make less, and promise less and make more than any other crop, Joe M. Peterson declared Tuesday.

For the reason given above Peterson urges farmers to take advantage of the 1943 Crop Insurance. Applications for which are being taken at the Dawson County AAA Office. The deadline for obtaining 1943 Cotton Crop Insurance has been set at April 1, 1943. According to Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, farmers must sign application before cotton is planted or before the closing date, whichever is earlier.

Dawson County has had several good crops in succession, according to past history, however it is getting about time for a short crop, Peterson declared. Protection is assured cotton farmers against loss from all unavoidable hazards such as drought, boll weevil, frost, flood, plant disease, storm, wind and hail.

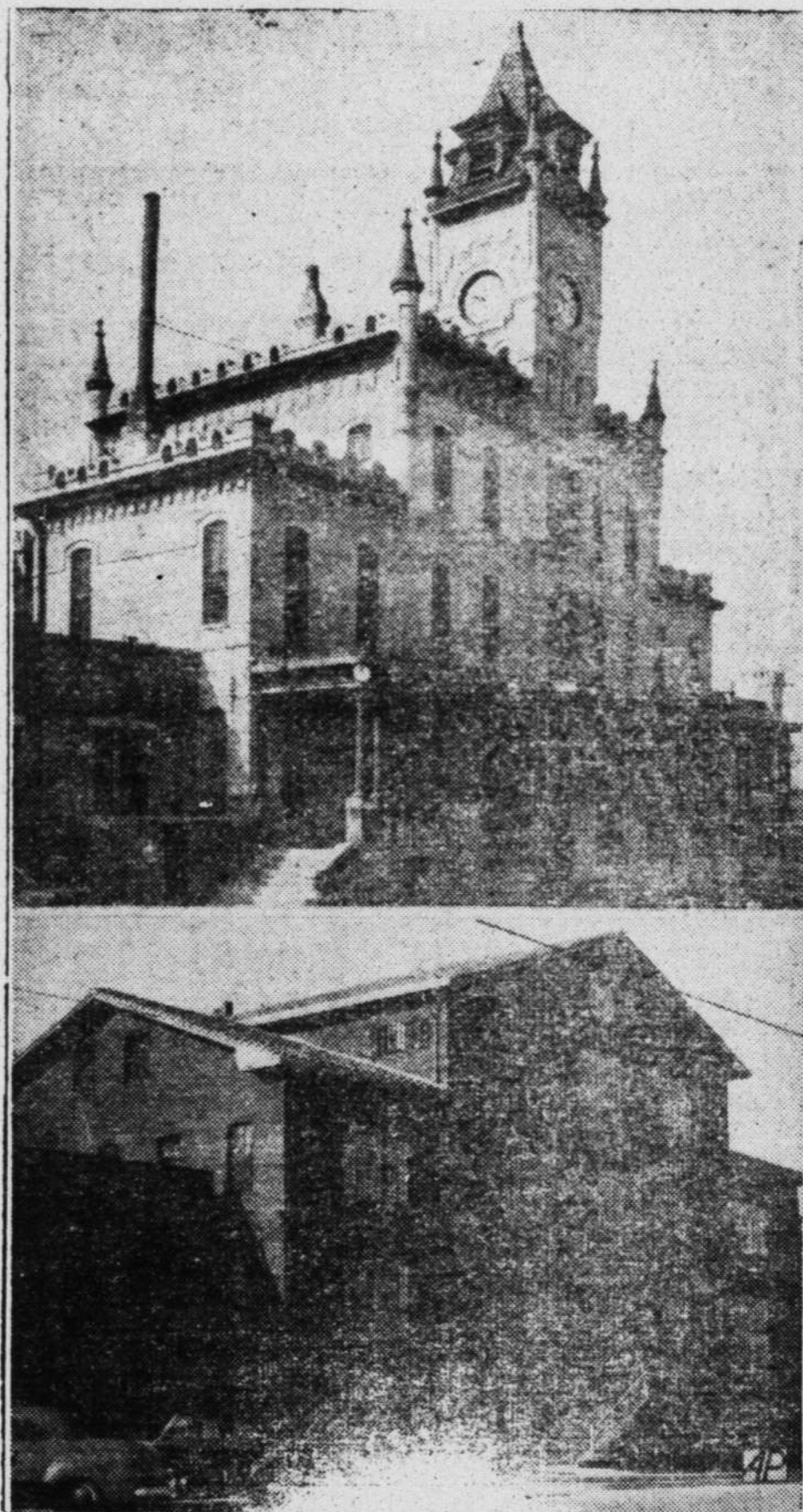

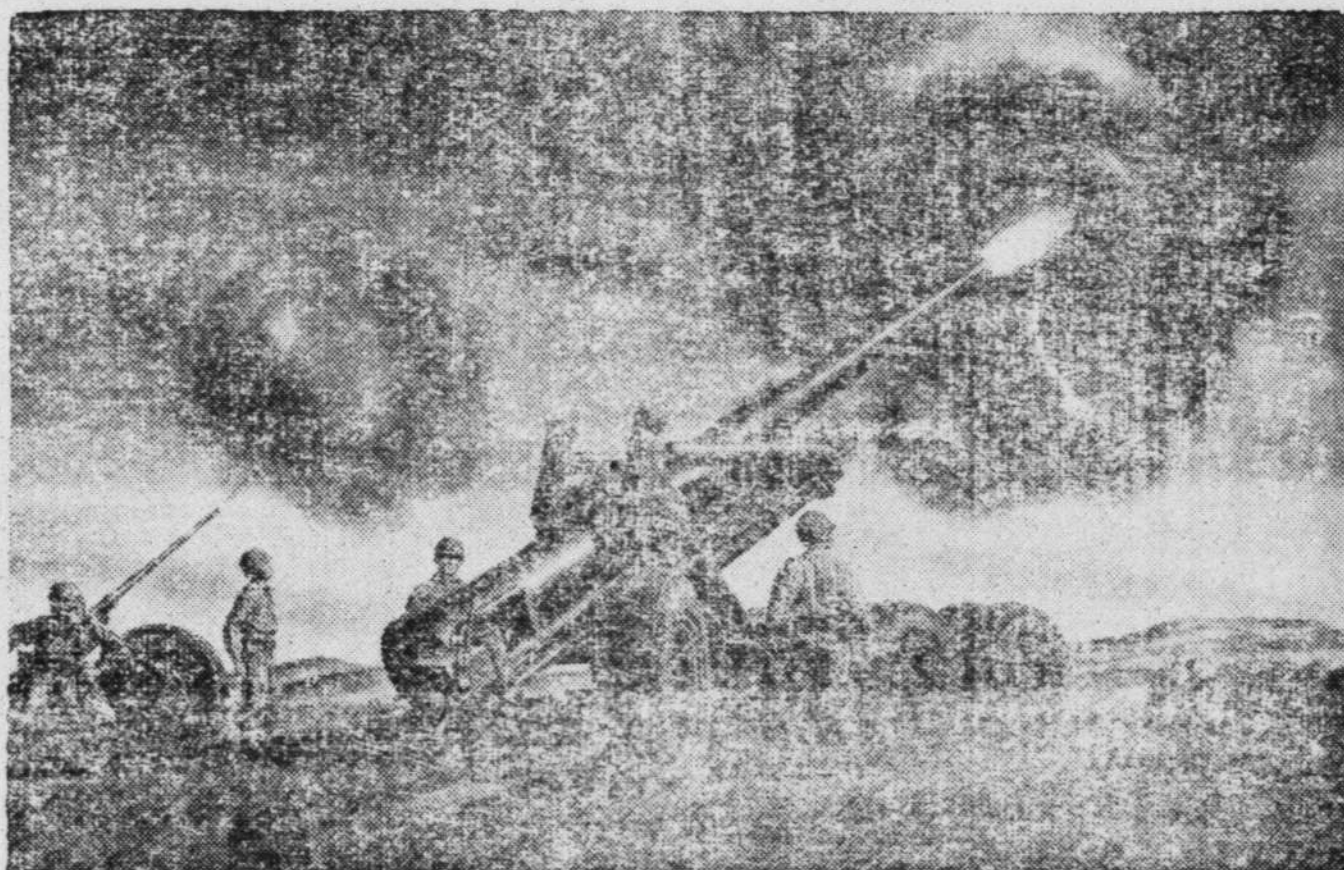

Navy V-12 Plan Tests To Be Held At High School

Qualifying test for applicants for the Navy College Training Program V-12, will be conducted throughout the country on Friday, April 2. All schools and colleges are being requested to cooperate by administering the test to their students.

From those who take the test the Navy will eventually select students for the Navy Training Program. Those accepted will take their college training while on active duty, in uniform, receiving pay and under general military discipline. Upon completion of their college training they will receive further training leading to commissions. Fifty per cent of those selected will start their college work in July, and the remainder in November.

The United States Navy has arranged for qualifying tests for the new Navy College Training Program, V-12. The announcement has

been received that the United States Army has joined the Navy in this qualifying testing program. Tests will be given to certified applicants at Lamesa High School on April 2, 1943. Application forms are available at the office of Lamesa High School and men or boys who meet the requirements are invited to look over the forms and to file for the tests if they choose. Messrs. Rogers and Norris will conduct the examinations under the direction of Dr. H. T. Manuel, of the University of Texas.

Applicants who qualify through the test will report at their own expense to District Offices of Naval Procurement, where they will undergo a physical examination and an interview to determine potential of officer-like qualities. Special committees consisting of a representative civilian, an educator and a Naval officer will make the final selection of students for the Navy College Training Program.

According to information we have received from the Director of the test program, "the candidate is under no obligation whatsoever in taking this test."

Meat In Lockers Not Restricted

WASHINGTON, March 13—Owners of meat stocks in "frozen lockers" will not be called on to make any declaration of their supplies or to surrender any meat coupons for them under the new meat rationing program, price administration officials said today.

Any purchase for food lockers after March 29, however, will be on exactly the same basis as those by small consumers.

Bulk Purchases Authorized

For the benefit of ranchers, farmers, prospectors and other who customary buy meat, cheese, lard and other items in bulk for use over long periods of time, the rationing regulations permit forward validation of coupons.

In these cases, the consumer must apply to his local board and surrender as many red stamps as his contemplated purchases involve, even though some series may not become valid for weeks or months ahead. In exchange for these, he will receive a bulk point certificate which will enable him to make his quantity purchase.

Farmers Not Restricted

The regulations place no official restrictions on any of the rationed foods raised by farmers for their own tables, and farmers and their families are entitled to a full quota of points. However, the government is requesting that farm families retain red stamps from their family books equal to the point value of any of the rationed foods, including meat, produced on the farm and eaten at home.

When a farmer sells any of his home-produced meat or butter or other rationed food, he automatically becomes a distributor and must collect ration stamps, checks or certificates and surrender the collected points to OPA.

Planting Seeds Not Rationed

Contrary to rumors that have been circulated, causing some coning of gardens, and other planting of gardens, and other planting purposes. The OPA clarifies this in the following released:

Peas, beans and lentils when labeled as such and bought exclusively for use as seed are exempt from the processed foods rationing program and do not require the surrender of either point stamps or ration certificates, according to OPA.

Eligibility for each of the three grades of tires is governed by mileage allowed under the mileage rationing program. Motorists must obtain a certificate from their War Price and Rationing Board before they may purchase a tire.

Be Careful With Brooders Warns Fire Department

Fire, says Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, can defeat the purpose of the program to supplement our meat supply with poultry unless adequate safeguards are adopted to prevent fires from chicken brooders.

Hall noted an increase in the number of fires reported as a result of carelessness in operating baby chick brooders. Not only the loss of chicks and brooder equipment has been reported, but in most cases additional property loss has occurred.

Because they must be operated continuously, the very nature of chicken brooders make them a special hazard. Therefore, he cautioned, special care should be used in their operation.

"Whatever type of brooder equipment may be used," said Hall, "it is wise for use to observe the fundamental principle of cleanliness as an aid to fire prevention. Trash and combustible litter around any brooder, whether it is an oil or kerosene burner, electric, gas, or other type, invites the outbreak of fire."

The Commissioner suggests a frequent check of heat regulating devices, as well as careful handling and storing of all liquid fuels used for heating brooders.

More Reductions Of Tire Quotas Announced

Further reductions in tire and tube quotas for March were announced at Lubbock district offices of the OPA Monday.

Quotas for the 71-county district are:

Passenger car and motorcycle—Grade 1 tires, 2,995; grade 2, 1,788; grade 3, 4,081; tubes, 5,350.

Truck and bus — Tires, 4,453; recaps, 5,948; tubes, 4,807.

Farm tractor and implement — 1,473.

"As these figures indicate, the county boards are severely limited in number of tires and tubes they can grant to motorists," district officials said in urging that car and truck drivers consider the rubber shortage before applying to county boards for certificates.

Garden Tools And Other Materials Said Sufficient

Of paramount interest to the novice as well as the veteran gardener is the recently announced news that garden tools, seed and insecticides will be sufficient for the coming season, which is expected to exceed an all-time high. The USDA has this information for the gardener:

Supplies of essential garden tools, seed, and insecticides are reported to be sufficient to meet the needs of the expanded Victory Garden program, but there are none to waste, the USDA announced. Wasting seeds, tools, fertilizers, or insecticides is never desirable and in wartime is to be condemned.

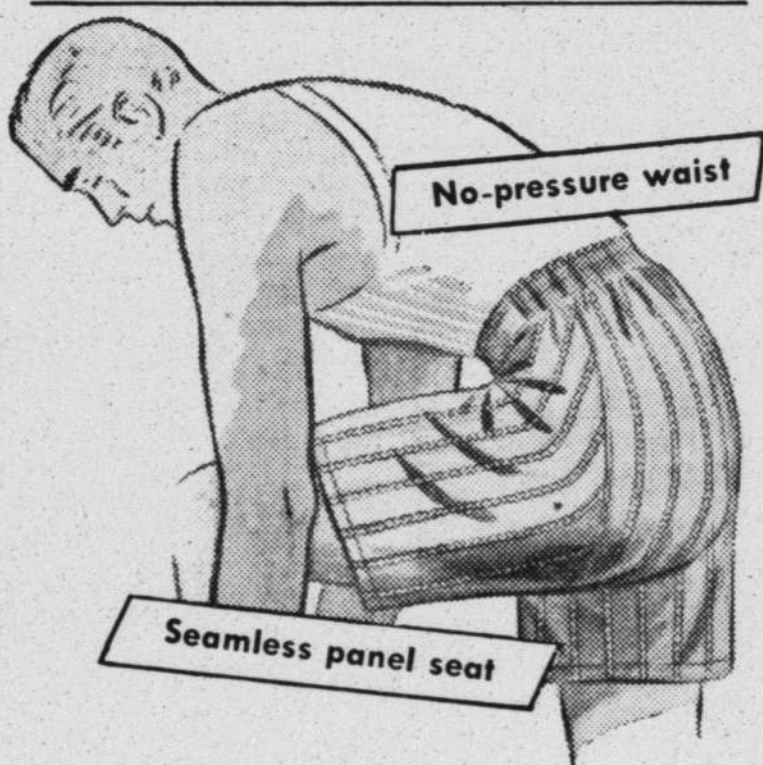

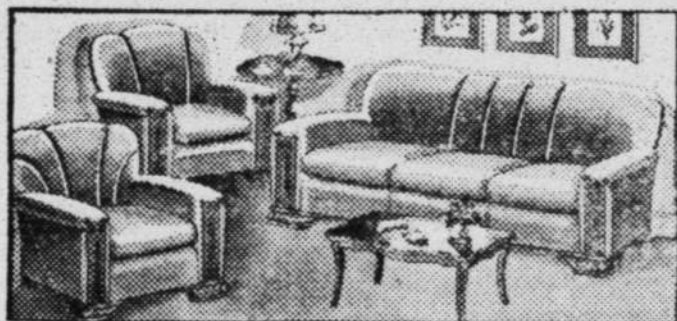

Point Value Cut On Prunes, Raisins Beans And Peas

The housewife gets a break in the increased value of her point ration book. This is brought about by the cutting of points, announced by the OPA. Listed below are the items effected by the order:

Effective Saturday, March 13, point values of dried and dehydrated prunes and raisins, and of all edible dry beans, peas and lentils were reduced by OPA. Point value of prunes and raisins were lowered from 20 to 12 points per pound. Point value of edible dry beans, peas and lentils were reduced from eight to four points per pound. In addition, dates and figs not hermetically-sealed were removed from the current list of rationed foods and the basis for computing point values for other dried fruits adjusted to place these fruits on the same basis as dried prunes and raisins.
