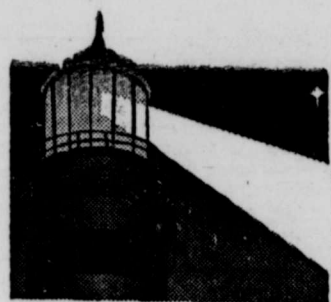




On The BEAM

Prominent Citizen Buried Sunday

August Bernard Hackfeld, prominent farmer, stockman, and a civic and business leader here, died at 11 a. m. Friday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene after a brief illness.

He had been in poor health for some time and had major surgery in Abilene more than a year ago but had been able to carry on many of his activities.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Sunday in the Salem Lutheran Church about 4 miles East of Loraine. The Rev. Clarence Ehlers of Abilene officiated. Burial was in the Roscoe Cemetery under the direction of Wells Funeral Home in Roscoe.

The Loraine Masonic Lodge had charge of graveside rites. Born December 23, 1898 at Runge, he came to the Loraine area December 1, 1908. He was married December 7, 1920 at Winters to Hulda Vogler.

Survivors are his wife and three sons, Bernard, Alfred and Raymond, all of Loraine; three brothers, Otto and C. H. of Loraine, and Adolph of Sweetwater; one sister, Mrs. Willie Backhaus of Loraine; and three grandchildren.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church, Sons of Herman Lodge and Loraine Masonic Lodge. He was past president of the Loraine Lions Club, a director of the First State Bank and former member of the Loraine school board.

He had served several years as manager of the Loraine Co-op Gin and the Loraine Cooperative Association and recently was elected President of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau. Pallbearers were nephews, Robert, Willie and Marvin Hackfeld, Bill Ernst, Ellis Vogler, Dr. Eldon Seibie, Walter Onken and Oscar Vogler.

Farmers Invited To See Harbers Farm

Farmers of Mitchell County are invited to take a tour of the Clinton Harbers farm near West Point, 51 miles Southeast of Austin, on August 16-17.

The trip is being sponsored by the Colorado City Jaycees who will pay gasoline and oil expenses for all cars making the trip from Mitchell County. Harbers is the World War 2 veteran who has gained national acclaim for purchasing 235 acres of worn-out land seven years ago and rebuilding it into a \$100,000 operation.

His outstanding job in conservation, soil building and profit making won him the Save the Soil and Save Texas award of the state's outstanding comeback farmer in 1954, the \$5,000 Hoblitzelle Award for Advancement of Texas Rural Life in 1955 and U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce acclaim as one of the four outstanding young farmers in America for 1955.

The tour of the Harbers farm is scheduled for August 17, according to Elmer Martin, chairman of Jaycee agriculture committee planning the field trip. Departure from Colorado City is scheduled for 1 p. m. Tuesday so that the group will be in West Point the night before the farm inspection.

Twenty farmers have already indicated they will make the trip. Farmers who desire to join the caravan, in addition to those persons who can provide cars for the gas and oil free trip, are urged to contact Martin and his Jaycees committee.

Farmers of this area who are interested in maximum production from their land might learn something by inspecting the Harber dry land farm that is producing one and a half to two bales of cotton per acre, five to six thousand pounds of maize and 80 bushels of corn—all without irrigation and with normal and sub-normal rainfall.

The secret of Harbers' success is in the rebuilding of the soil.

Birth Certificate Needed To Enter School First Time

Children who will attend the Loraine school for the first time this fall should have a birth certificate to present the teacher at the opening of school and should also be vaccinated for smallpox.

Supt. Robbins announced this week that the Board of Trustees had voted some years ago to require a birth certificate and vaccination before a child can enter the Loraine school. "These things should be attended to before the opening of school," Mr. Robbins said.

Rev. Hartley Resigns As Baptist Pastor

The Rev. Lenard Hartley, who has been pastor of the First Baptist Church in Loraine the past two years and eight months, tendered his resignation to the church in conference Sunday. The church reluctantly accepted the resignation and immediately asked that Rev. Hartley do the preaching for the revival meeting, which starts on Friday night, August 12, and continues through Sunday, August 21.

In telling of his resignation as pastor here, Rev. Hartley made the following statement: "The past two years and eight months have been the most glorious of our lives and Mrs. Hartley and I are thankful for the many sweet memories we have of the people here. For the cooperation of the people we thank God. We would like to extend a special invitation to all to attend the revival."

Rev. Hartley's resignation will be effective at the close of the revival on August 21.

Joe Airtene, choir and youth director of the church, also resigned his position Sunday, effective that day.

In announcing the revival, Rev. Hartley said prayer services will be held for various groups each evening at 7:40. Song service will begin at 8:05. Morning services will begin at 10 o'clock each morning, starting Monday, August 15.

The song leader for the revival has not been announced.

Social Security



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: How will a farm operator report his self employment income for social security purposes, if he has a gross income of \$1800 or less?

Answer: A farm operator who has net earnings of at least \$400 in a year will file his social security tax returned at the end of the year when he files his income tax return. This is required although the amount of his income would not require payment of income tax. The amount on which social security tax is paid is the net earnings - or profit - from farm operations after all farming expenses have been deducted from the gross or total income. If the gross income is \$1800 or less, a farm operator may figure his actual net earnings, or he may report one-half of his gross income as his net income. The amount of the tax will be 3 percent of the net income. The farm operator must keep a record of his total or gross income from all farming expenses. From these records, he will be able to determine the amount of his net income for the year.

Stunting Insect Growth
Still another new weapon is
being perfected in man's con-
tinual war against harmful in-
sects.

Texas and U. S. D. A. ento-
mologists are studying effects of
chemicals which inhibit the
normal development of insects
by slowing down their growing
processes. This is a new and
unique approach which shows
early chances of success.

These chemicals, which are
proving effective in many in-
stances where insecticides have
failed, work in various ways.
Some, such as colchicine and
aminopterin, prevent cell divi-
sion and growth. Another, sul-
famandole—one of the wonder
drugs—slows down an insect's
metabolism.

None of the experimental
chemicals act as insecticides,
which are almost immediately
deadly to insects. But in some
instances, the larvae-to-adult
development period is being ex-
tended so as to prevent maturity.
One of the most interesting of

Strict Tests Through Every Process Assure Safety of Salk Polio Vaccine

For the first time in history, a vaccine is protecting millions of human beings from paralytic polio. While the Salk vaccine will not work in every case, American children are being safeguarded against the dread disease, with no more risk than they would take in a vaccination against smallpox or a typhoid shot. The Salk vaccine must pass elaborate tests under the watchful eye of a government inspector at every stage of production. Then the final packaged vaccine is approved by the U.S. Public Health Service for distribution. Here are shown a few of the steps that assure American parents their children are being given a safe vaccine.



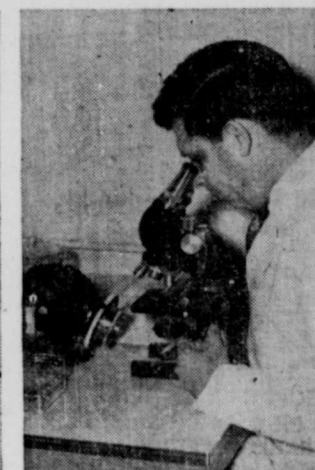
This technician is filtering dead cells and all other foreign matter from polio virus after it has grown on animal tissue in glass containers.



Virus is "cooked" in tank with formaldehyde (from bottle) until it is rendered harmless, after which it must pass exacting safety tests.



Animal tissue in tubes is inoculated with vaccine and let stand. If any live virus remains, it will multiply here, hence can be detected.



This expert is examining tissue after contact with vaccine, to determine absence of live virus.
