ADAMANT CLUB OFF FOR PIKE'S PEAK

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Dec. 31. (AP)—Fourteen men who spent last night in a wind swept cabin on Barr trail, seven miles from the summit of Pike's Peak, expect to leave this morning on the hazardous climb to the top of the famous mountain, where they will welcome the New Year.

Each year since 1922 a hardy band of men composing the Adamant Club, have scaled the frozen slopes of Pike's Peak to herald the New Year with a flare of rockets and brilliant fireworks display. Five men made the ascent in 1922, and each year one new member has been added to the group. From the latter custom the unusual organization derives its name.

This year's climb started here Monday morning.

IOWAN CALLS FOR MOVE IN ENFORCEMENT

IOWA SENATOR WANTS OTHERS IN WORK OUSTED ALSO

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (By Associated Press)—The second demand for the resignation of Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, during the current prohibition controversy, came today from Senator Brookhart, of Iowa, a republican dry, who said he wanted not only Mellon removed but others in the treasury department identified with enforcement.

Senator Norris of Nebraska, republican independent, had previously said Mellon should quit his place as the chief prohibition enforcement officer.

Second Time Attacked—Brookhart's assertion that Mellon should lose his official head was the second time within recent months he has attacked the secretary of the treasury. In a speech on the senate floor made on the famous "Wall Street Boogie Party" he said Mellon should be removed.

The Iowa Senator indicated he would carry the prohibition controversy to the senate floor next week.

Texas-Pacific Lets Contract On Hobbs Line

GIFFORD-GILL COMPANY GETS WORK; OTHER CONTRACT COMING

(By Associated Press)—DALLAS, 31.—The Texas and Pacific railway, parent line, today announced a contract had been awarded the Gifford-Gill construction company of Dallas for construction of an extension of the Texas-New Mexico railway company from its present terminus near the state line to Hobbs, New Mexico. The stretch is about fifty miles long.

Contract price was not announced. Construction will be started at once, and it is expected rail will be laid into Hobbs by May.

To Let Other Work—New bids will be advertised for construction of the line from Hobbs to Lovington.

The construction will give North Texas connection with oil fields in the vicinity of Hobbs, via the T. & P. main line.

CAUSE OF AIR CRASH PROBED IN AMARILLO

LT. ROBERT GRAY, WIFE AND THREE OTHERS ARE KILLED

(By Associated Press)—AMARILLO, Dec. 31.—R. O. Dulaney of Dallas, district inspector with the U. S. Department of Commerce, arrived here today to investigate an airplane crash at the Hillcrest country club in which five persons were killed.

VICTIMS ARE AMARILLO PEOPLE

(By Associated Press)—AMARILLO, Dec. 31.—Aviation inspectors here today sought the cause of an airplane accident. The Hillcrest golf and country club of Amarillo that resulted in the death of five persons, including a woman.

The dead were: Lieut. Robert H. Gray, 37, of the English Air Corps during the World War; his 20-year-old wife, Evelyn; Robert M. (Son) Moore; C. M. Dillon and Ray Allison. The last three were Amarillo business men.

Gray, who was piloting the plane, Moore and Allison were killed instantly. Mrs. Gray died shortly after the wreckage had dragged her from the wreckage. Dillon died en route to a hospital.

A broken elevator control or a motor stalling were advanced as plausible reasons for the accident by Amarillo aviators. The craft righted itself after it went into the spin, but too late to gain altitude before it struck the ground.

The monoplane, christened "Miss Amarillo," was comparatively new having the latest type of motor and equipment. So far as could be learned at the airport, it had no defective parts and had not been repaired lately.

Gray and his wife had flown thousands of miles together. Their 14-month-old son, Robert H., Jr., who had accompanied his parents on numerous of their flights, had been left at home with Gray's mother and sister, who lived in Wellington, New Zealand. The aviator was considered a very careful flier, and had never had a serious accident.

RAIL PLEAS TO BE HEARD

ICC HEARING WILL BE HELD IN AMARILLO, JANUARY 22

(By Associated Press)—WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Hearing on the application of three railroads to construct lines in the south-west was set today by the Interstate Commerce Commission for January 22, 1930, at Amarillo.

Examiner T. F. Sullivan will preside.

The Panhandle and Santa Fe has asked authority to construct a line from Amarillo to a point on the north line of Dallas county, Texas, and from Dumas to Spearman, The Elkhart, and Santa Fe wishes to construct its line across Cimarron county, Oklahoma, and from Felt, Okla., to Colmar, N. M. In the third application the Dodge City and Cimarron Valley asked authority to build from a point on the south line of Baker county, Colorado, to Las Animas.

OUSTED PROFESSOR SAYS BELIEF IN BIBLE MIRACLES NOT NECESSARY TO FAITH IN GOD; EXPLAINS HIS VIEWS

STICKS BY GUNS



(By Associated Press)—BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 31.—Dr. Horace Calvin Day, 27-year-old professor of biology, who got separated from his job at Howard University because he expressed doubts about the truth of Biblical tales of miracles, is something of an unreconstructed rebel.

Quitting Birmingham to take a position in Leland Stanford University in California where a professor can doubt anything he chooses, Dr. Day is sticking by his guns.

Indeed, before leaving he fired one or two extra rounds.

The trouble began when Dr. Day, addressing a chapel meeting at Birmingham's 88-year-old fundamentalist Baptist university, told the students not to take some portions of the Bible too literally. The uproar that followed led to the loss of his job.

Busy packing his household goods at his home here, Dr. Day elaborated on his views.

"The God I worship is a logical God," he said. "To believe in any miracle would not be in keeping with the manifestations in nature of a logical-minded Creator."

"Everything in nature and science points to God. The very seasons themselves and the way animals are prepared for them by nature point to some divine plan."

"But nothing points to the myths recorded in the Bible."

"To believe in God, it is necessary to believe in a lot of stories that came from good men's knowledge and for goodness knows what reason?"

Dr. Day insists that his remarks on that fatal day in chapel were not particularly incendiary.

"Don't Be Too Literal"—"I just told them that some portions of the Bible must not be taken too literally," he said. "I said that it was impossible for a whale to swallow a man, and that it had been possible poor Jonah would either have been smothered or killed by the whale's digestive juices."

"I also pointed out that there are 600,000 species of animal life. With what limited knowledge of engineering he had, Noah could never have built a boat big enough to house 1,200,000 animals—to say nothing of a boat big enough to hold hay for the

BUILDING PERMITS ARE \$200,066 OVER 1928; PAVING COMING

PANIC BREAKS OUT KILLING MANY KIDDIES

MANY OF VICTIMS IN SCOTLAND TOWN ARE SMALL CHILDREN

(By Associated Press)—PAISLEY, Scotland, Dec. 31.—At least 72 persons, most of them children, between the ages of five and 14 perished today in a panic started by fire which swept through a motion picture theatre here sending the crowded house in a wild panic for the exits.

Most of the victims were children, who were suffocated or trampled to death in a mad rush to safety, and many died at the foot of two main staircases leading from a balcony where the bodies of boys and girls were piled six deep.

150 Are Injured—At the hospital to which the dead and dying were rushed as speedily as they could be dragged from the structure it was staged the number of dead had reached 60 and the number of children treated for minor burns or injuries 150.

So great was the crush of struggling boys and girls who only a short time before had been watching a program which featured "The Crowd," to gain safety from the holocaust that firemen had the greatest difficulty in dragging them through doorways.

Parents Horror Stricken—Outside stood many parents, horror-stricken and helpless as firemen, constables and civilians repeatedly braved the flames to bring the children to safety.

necessary to use gas masks, some of them improvised.

The fire started in the operator's box and spread with terrifying rapidity through the crowded auditorium.

Many of the deaths occurred at the hospital where victims of the crash and panic were taken. Most of those who succumbed at the infirmary died from injuries, chiefly internal, rather than from burns.

The theater seats 150 persons. As today's performance was billed as a special holiday matinee for children, the house was fully occupied by youngsters of from five to 14 years of age.

Where Four Children

Virtually all of these children came from working class homes where parents and elder brothers and sisters provide a somewhat precarious living from wages earned during intermittent operation of the mills and factories of Paisley.

Despite the size of the disaster and the grief which seized bereaved households, relief work was quickly organized and carried out in an orderly manner. But the best efforts of firemen and police could not assuage the tragedy of the scenes at the theater and the hospital.

Mothers crowded around the amusement place and cried in agony for news of the fate of their little ones. At the infirmary where the dead were laid out, brokenhearted parents stumbled blindly past the still forms identifying the victims.

Occasionally sounds of grief in the street were relieved by wild cries of joy as a missing child who had escaped injury was found by relatives. But these instances were comparatively few, and the expressions of thankfulness were quickly dashed as the joyous parents turned to comfort a neighbor who had suffered a loss or was still uncertain as to the fate of a loved one.

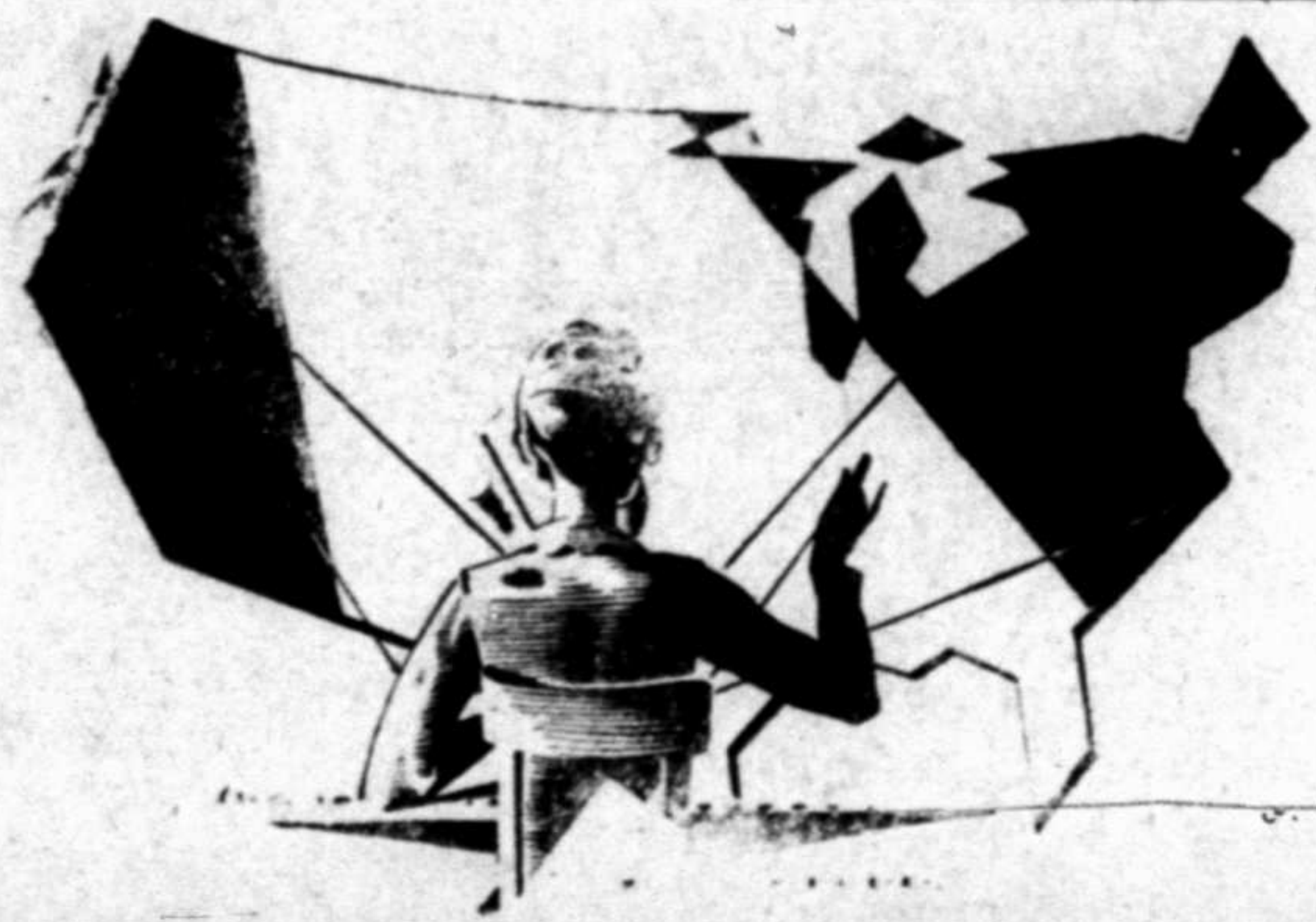
President Williams pointed out that the purpose of the association is to foster, promote, and encourage the poultry industry on the South Plains. "Its members will seek to promote high business ethics among those engaged in the poultry industry, to raise the standard of poultry in general," he said. "We will conduct educational campaigns, both for the care and production of baby chicks, as well as all phases of the industry."

Hatcheries of the area are taking one and one-quarter million eggs off the local produce markets every month, during their operating season, Mr. Newman pointed out.

Fords Ask Dismissal Of \$6,000,000 Suit

PONTIAC, Mich., Dec. 31. (AP)—Counsel for Henry and Edsel Ford appeared before Judge Frank L. Covert in Oakland county circuit court today with arguments for the dismissal of an amended bill of complaint filed last February by Henry M. and Wilfred C. Leland asking that the Fords be compelled to pay approximately \$6,000,000 to former stockholders of the Lincoln Motor Car company.

Last February the Michigan supreme court handed down a decision to the effect that Judge Covert erred in denying the motion of the Fords to dismiss the suit at the trial in October, 1928, adding that an amended bill of complaint could be filed. This was done. The litigation is an outgrowth of the purchase of the Lincoln plant by the Fords at a receiver's sale, February 4, 1922.
