COLLECTING FEDERAL FARM LOANS

A recent summary of a list of Federal and Joint Stock banks discloses the fact that foreclosures and losses are rapidly increasing. In the first seven years of their existence, the banks began foreclosure proceedings on 2,910 farms and acquired 852 farms of which they sold 128, making net gain on farm sold of \$27,065.38.

In the single year of 1924, the banks began foreclosure proceedings on 2,226 and acquired 423. They sold 118 farms at a net loss of \$28,731.54, thus consuming profits made on foreclosing farms during first seven years and creating additional loss of 1,666.16.

It takes more than cheap Federal loans to make good farmers.

NO REASON FOR LOW PRICES SAYS THURMOND

San Angelo, Texas—Closer co-operation in marketing their products especially in view of present low prices on wool and mohair, was urged upon producers by George Thurmond of Del Rio, in addressing the executive committee of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association of Texas in quarterly session Thursday at Ozona.

Thurmond's attorney for the association and also a sheep man. He declared present low wool and mohair prices are unwarranted by market conditions and without apparent reason. Contrasting steadily improving range conditions now with costly feeding of live stock, which was general before recent rains fell, Thurmond advised that if ranchmen would store flood waters for irrigation and raise more feeds, drought would not affect them so seriously.

Outlining the work of the associations legislative committee of which he was chairman, Thurmond charged that the Fergusons vetoed the predatory animal bill without knowing its provisions. The measure would

have enabled Texas to co-operate with the Federal Government in exterminating animals that cause stockmen thousands of dollars in losses annually, he said.

The executive committee took steps intended to induce South African goat raisers to offer 130 registered Angoras now in this country for sale at Brady June 28-30 during the annual convention of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. The bucks at present are in quarantine in New Jersey. Their sale was originally planned at Camp Wood, Real County.

T. Albert Kincaid of Ozona, president of the association, was host to the twenty members of the executive committee at lunch and dinner Thursday. The Spur and Women's clubs of Ozona provided the entertainment.

County Judge Charles E. Davidson of Crickett County, welcoming the sheep and goatmen, praised their traditional honesty and the manner in which they overcome hardships.

MORE GOOD RAINS

Another fine rain fell at Junction and over most of the county east and outeast of here last Thursday. One and three-fourths of an inch fell in town and extended up South Llano about ten mile and up North Llano about four, while along the Kerrville and London roads and on head of Cedar Creek the precipitation was much greater. Cedar Creek had a rise of some six or eight feet. Farmers are all very busy now and the weather is favorable for planting.

During the past few weeks, since the drouth was broken, more than six inches of rain has fallen at Junction with varying amounts over the county. A few ranches have not yet had enough rain to put the range in first class condition, but most of the ranchmen state that grass is growing rapidly and sheep are doing well, but the grass is not high enough for cattle. Weeds and brush are supplying this deficiency, however and feeding of all kinds is now practically a thing of the past in the county.

LEE B. MILLER IS DEAD

After a career which included making his territory through Indian infested hills with a four-mule team, Lee B. Miller, veteran traveling salesman, died suddenly at his home at 401 North San Saba Street Wednesday morning. The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon with a host of his friends as pallbearers.

Miller was born in Montgomery, Ala., on October 29, 1856, and came to San Antonio as a small boy. After first working at the Schram store, he then joined M. Halff & Bro., where he was connected 45 years. For many years he made overland trips through West Texas, making them at first with a four-mule team and a wagon, accompanied most of the time by a negro servant and at many times by riders. Although Indians inhabited the hills about San Antonio he was never molested. One time he was held up by bandits on the Fredericksburg Road not far from San Antonio. In later years he made his territory by automobile and was always a successful salesman, gifted particularly with the knack of making friends.

His territory through all the years included Fredericksburg, Kerrville, Junction and other places in the hills, then southward to Campbellton, Jourdanton, Pleasanton, Stockdale and others.

He had been ill for several weeks, but was thought to be convalescing. On Tuesday he visited his friends at the store and called on his daughter that night.—San Antonio Express.

After our forms had been locked last Wednesday evening, we heard the sad news of the death of this veteran salesman of the Hill Country, as J. N. Hodges of Schreiner-Hodges Co., was notified soon after he had passed away, but it was too late to get an account of the death in last week's paper.

Mr. Miller was a subscriber of this paper and a valued friend of The Eagle and its Editor. He had made a wide acquaintance throughout the section of the state and was doubtless the most popular salesman who ever made this territory. For more than a third of a century he and Mr. Hodges have been close personal friends.

J. N. Hodges and G. T. May of this county were listed as honorary pallbearers. Mr. Hodges attended the funeral Thursday, which he says was one of the most impressive he has ever attended. Men from all over southwest Texas as well as thousands from the Alamo City attended and the floral offering in itself was a mute evidence of the high regards of an almost unlimited friendship over this entire section of Texas.

SAYS HEAD OFF

BIG BOND ISSUE

A \$75,000,000 state bond issue soon is to be proposed for Texas unless it is "nipped in the bud," Representative John T. Smith of Austin warns.

Sounding a "note of warning" in the current issue of his Texas Tax Journal, Rep. Smith, who instigated an investigation of the highway department in the recent legislature, declares that bond buyers and road contractors "are beginning to evolve in their minds the matter of springing a \$75,000,000 bond issue on the people within the next few years."

The excuse for the bond issue, he believes, will be that the counties will have reached their limit in bonding. "It is a well recognized fact," he said, "that the tick eradication law of the last few years, and the voting of the county and district bonds have practically exhausted the credit of a great number of counties. In fact, these expenditures have gone to such an extent that the question of selling bonds has been one that has kept the is-

suance of new bonds down, except in counties whose credit still is good.

"There are portions of Texas in which fairly good roads have been built, but they are in a disconnected form and scattered here and there. Now then, the bond buyer, the road contractor and the material men are beginning to evolve in their minds the matter of springing about a \$75,000,000 bond issue on the people of Texas within the next few years.

"They know how many counties can not issue new bonds for several years, hence they are coming with the proposition of bonding the state to an enormous amount, and then when that is used up, if no roads are built, the tax payers can comfort themselves in the knowledge that they have made a lot of people rich, even if they never have the roads for their own use.

"The bond proposition is just in the formative stage at present and if the people do not begin to frown on it, it is going to be a live issue. As long as we can raise about \$15,000,000 to \$20,-

000,000 a year to put on roads, we had better think about the economical expenditure of this amount rather than attempt to get more money."

Texas at present is one of the few states having no bonded indebtedness.

ROAD PROGRAM IN DANGER

Former Governor Ferguson of Texas, urges a halt on road bonds and favors building roads only as they can be paid for.

The Texas situation is going to be paralleled in many other states, not because the people want fewer good roads, but because of the mania which has developed among road officials for building types of road that absorb more money than the taxpayers can produce.

An example of this tendency is seen in two recent road paving contracts awarded by a western state for paving an aggregate of 13.1 miles of highway. Instead of accepting the low bids for a type of asphaltic concrete pavement which has been time tested and proved its worth on the majority of the state's highways, contracts were awarded for other types of pavement which have not yet proved themselves as good by the test of long usage, but which costs an aggregate of over \$20,000 more for the jobs in question. This additional \$20,000 would have paved approximately another mile of highway of the type that has proved satisfactory in the state in question.

Further exorbitant costs in highway construction will bring the downfall of our national good roads program which is now underway.—The Manufacturer.

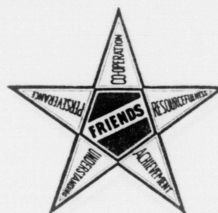
