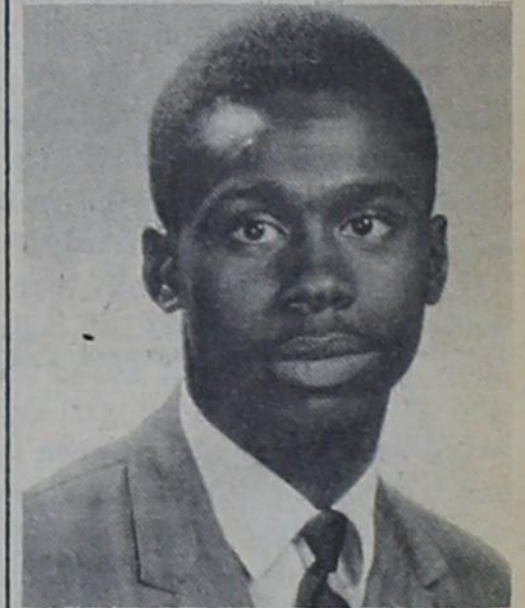

Deadline For School Switch Near

Only three days remain for parents or guardians to file applications for transfer of pupils from one school district to another in Lubbock County.

Applications must be filed by 5:00 p.m. June 2nd at the office of the county school superintendent in the courthouse if state per capita funds are to be transferred with the pupil.

The county school superintendent's office handles only transfers from one district to another. It does not process applications from one school to another within the same district.

Through Friday of last week, applications had been filed for transfer of more than 150 pupils from one district to another within the county, according to Roy Boyd, county school superintendent.

Application by teenagers who want to participate in a Summer Youth Program and Job Fair will be accepted this week at the Texas Employment Commission Office, 1602 16th Street.

The "Job Fair" will be held June 2nd from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. in Municipal Coliseum. Participating in the program will be the City of Lubbock, the Chamber of Commerce and the Lubbock Independent School District.

At present, there are some 202 positions open which the City of Lubbock has announced for youths. The Chamber of Commerce is encouraging its members to provide part time jobs also. Youths who have completed applications at the Texas Employment Commission office will meet with prospective employers at the Job Fair. For further information concerning this program, anyone concerned may contact the TEC office. Junior and high school students will be expected to participate in this special effort.

I Never Saw Another Butterfly

"Butterflies don't live in here, in the ghetto," is the last line of a poem written in 1942 by a young Jewish inmate of the Theresienstadt concentration camp in Czechoslovakia. The poem is the only record of Pavel Friedman's life. Of the 15,000 children who passed through Theresienstadt on their way to Nazi extermination camps, only about 100 survived.

But the children left behind poems and drawings of what they saw around them. Subsequently, some of these were printed in a book titled *I Never Saw Another Butterfly*, which was published by McGraw Hill Book Co. (\$3.95). Several of the poems have been set to music by Charles Davidson and were presented at Congregation Beth Shalom, Long Beach, N.Y.

One anonymous poem written by children in Barracks L318 and L417, ages 10-11 years, poignantly concludes:

The sun has made a veil of gold
So lovely that my body aches.
Above, the heavens shriek with blue
Convinced I've smiled by some mistake.
The world's bloom and seems to smile,
I want to fly but where, how high?
If in barbed wire, things can bloom
Why couldn't I? I will not die!

Beyond the Burning

Some months ago I wrote about Sterling Tucker's excellent book, *Beyond the Burning—Life and Death in the Ghetto* (Association Press, \$4.95). While praising the basic thrust of the book, I noted that Tucker seemed to accept the concept of group guilt, an approach harmful to every minority—black as well as Jewish.

Mr. Tucker, director of the National Urban League's Field Services in Washington, D.C. and Vice-Chairman of D.C.'s City Council, generously has written saying that "the point I was trying to make in the first edition of the book did not come across as it was intended," and that "the changes prompted by your critique clarify my position and strengthen the book." The revised text in the book's second edition reads as follows:

By perpetuating a stereotype that brands all Jews because of the sins of a few, black militants may well destroy the strongest group support the Negro has in white America. This would undoubtedly be self-defeating.

While it is unfair for blacks to judge the leadership of the Jewish community or to damn Jews in general for the actions of the individual Jew who milks the ghetto, the leaders of the Jewish community should not be distracted by angry cries from a few isolated corners. Rather, they should continue to attack all exploiters of the black man, all who continue to starve the ghetto, for that is the surest way to help blacks fight exploitation and to quite irrational, embittered voices.

That's the Way The Ball Bounces

South Bend, Indiana, is one of the many cities sporting an amateur basketball league. An all-Negro team, reports Don McEvoy of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, wears the motto, "Black is Beautiful," emblazoned on its jerseys. Recently they played the Police Department's team. That quintet came on the court with its own insignia, "Blue Ain't Bad."

Victims and Criminals

Are you afraid of crime in the streets? Most Americans are and with pretty good reason. In 1967, there was a 28 per cent increase in armed robberies, which included muggings, stick-ups and thefts involving bodily harm.

Many have responded to such statistics by calling for "tougher law enforcement," by which they usually mean "containing" black slum areas, and suppressing black militants, student protesters, hippies and anyone wearing long hair and a beard.

But who are the chief victims of crime? "The hard fact," Thomas R. Brooks writes in *Commonweal*, "is that as incomes go up, the odds in favor of becoming a victim of crime go down. In New York City, 33 per cent of the crimes of violence occur in slum districts constituting seven per cent of the city's 80-odd precincts. A Los Angeles study found that the chances of being a victim of violent crime were six in a thousand for those living in a neighborhood where the median income is below \$5,500, but less than one in a thousand in neighborhoods where the median income is over \$8,000 a year. For all the complaints about police brutality, the major complaint in poor neighborhoods is inadequate police protection."

Who is likely to give a youngster his first whiff of marijuana or a pep pill? A dope peddler? Hardly. It usually turns out to be friends, who withhold "popularity" unless

Austin-Filibusters began to slow the tide of legislation passed by the Senate as the June 2 adjournment deadline closed in. However, bills continued to roll through both houses in staggering volume on the local and uncontested bills calendar.

A minimum-wage proposal landed in conference committee. Budget conferees brought out a one-year appropriations bill without knowing whether Governor Preston Smith will veto it.

While bills to create a University of Texas at San Antonio, a UT of Permian Basin in the Midland-Odessa area and a University of South Texas at Corpus Christi ran into senate filibusters, other new school measures went to the governor. Among them were UT at Dallas, medical schools at Houston and Lubbock, and a future site left to UT regents, a UT dental branch (probably in San Antonio) and nursing schools at San Antonio and El Paso.

An amended version of the implied consent bill to require breath tests of suspected drunk drivers found its way to the governor's desk. UT regents were given authority to curtail enrollments. A proposed new constitutional amendment (SJR 15) would allow the legislature to establish a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands.

Club Rules Firmed-Liquor Control Board announced its final version of new rules to clamp down on private bottle clubs, effective September 1.

Club "guests" cannot pay cash or share in club services unless in the company of a member or present on his personal invitation. Clubs also would have to maintain written records showing when members were admitted or removed, have a membership committee or governing board to pass on memberships and operate with at least 25 members.

Other new rules include keeping permanent records of all transactions involving the pool system or maintaining separate storage lockers for each member if operating under the locker system, filing quarterly reports to Texas LCB on pool transactions and requirement that regular food service be provided.

The Eyes Have It-A battle that has raged for almost 20 years between the chain store and independent optometrists has been tentatively resolved by the final passage of a "compromise" bill worked out by Sens. Jack Strong and Tom Creighton. Bill sent to the governor spells out a stiff code of ethics and advertising for the industry—something the non-advertising operators have wanted for years.

Big feature provides that there will be no more "one price" ads.

In the future, ads will have to carry the lowest and highest prices of lenses in stock.

On another health front, the legislature has sent to the governor a bill to license and regulate the hearing aid industry. It was passed with the full approval of the industry which worked closely with the lawmakers on perfecting the bill.

AG Opinions-Texans not registered as voters cannot serve as school district trustees, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin ruled in a new opinion requested for Honey Grove (Fannin County) schools.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: A legislator can run for office where pay was increased by legislative session when he was a lawmaker if the term doesn't overlap.

Employment of adult probation officers is not subject to county commissioners' court approval.

A school board of trustees does not have the authority to suspend a student for any act, such as possession or use of dangerous drugs, unless the board has adopted a rule, regulation or general policy covering such conduct or unless the act violated state statutes covering "incorrigible conduct."

National Guard Armory Board may act independent of the State Building Commission on development of armory construction and related projects and awarding of bids.

A state department head may decide whether to allow payroll deductions of state employees' contributions for group insurance premiums.

Industrial Accident Board cannot award an attorney a fee for fatal injury cases but can allow reasonable expenses for preparing and presentation of claim.

Vocational Education-State Advisory Council for Vocational Education has unveiled its new master plan for new directions in educating students for industry. The three-part program calls for spending the states' \$16 million federal allocation for vocation education. A formal public hearing on the plan will be held June 7 at the regular meeting of the State Board of Education.

What will the new plan do for the students? John Guemple, assistant commissioner for vocational and adult education, explained it this way:

disease, but it would be nice for some of us to be exposed. We must learn to cooperate.

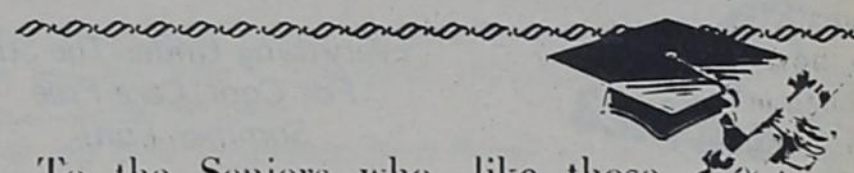

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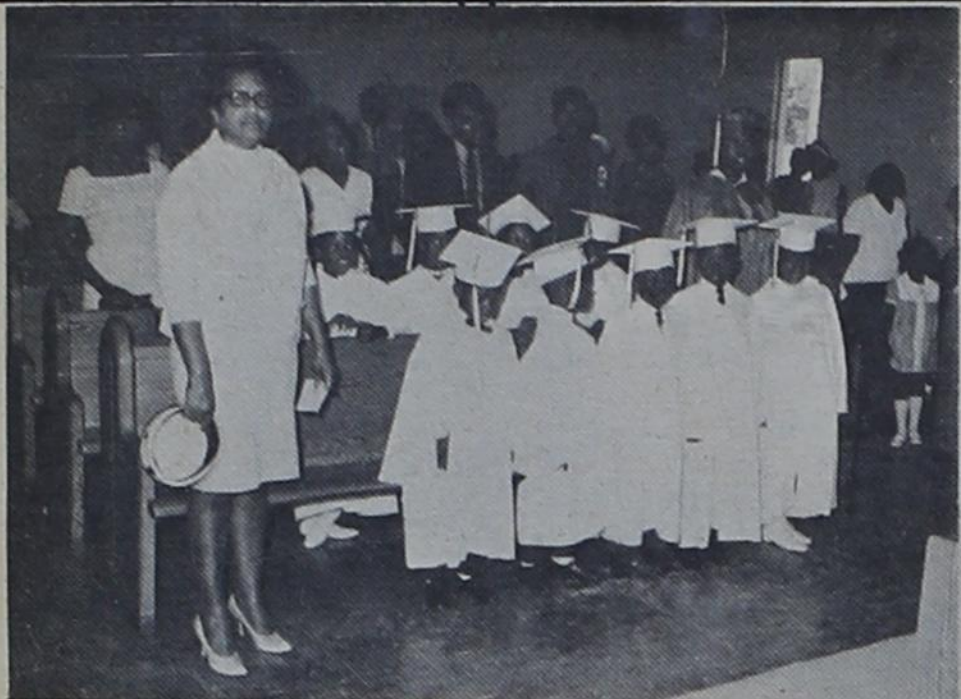


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Pictured above are some of the kindergarten graduates who worshipped together last Sunday morning at New Light Baptist Church, Rev. J. H. Jefferson, minister.

Let us not forget our sick; Sister Patten and Brother Jones. Include them in your prayers and also others if there be any.

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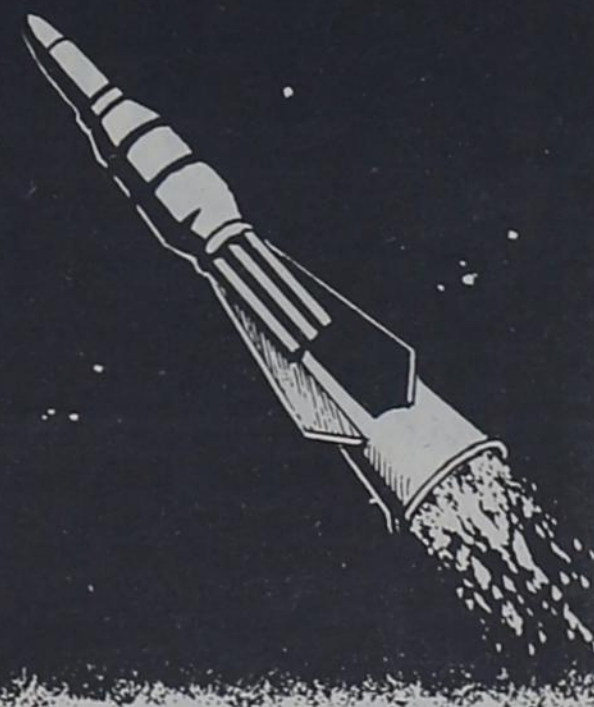
