L. B. Ranson Killed In Car Wreck Wednesday County Voting On Cancellation Of \$370,000 Highway Bonds Federal Government To Buy 1,000 Head Cattle Next Week

FINAL BUYING UNDER DROUTH RELIEF SET-UP

Preference To Be Given To Ranchmen In Final Allotment To Ochiltree County

Buy 368 Head Last Week

Many of Cattle Purchased Last Week Condemned and Killed By Federal Officials

County agent, J. T. Stovall received word Wednesday that the Federal government will purchase 1,000 head of cattle in Ochiltree county next week. This includes live and condemned cattle. This is the final allotment under the drouth program and the cattle must be purchased on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week. No cattle will be purchased after these dates. Mr. Stovall insists that cattlemen wishing to take advantage of this ruling, to list their cattle at his office at once.

Preference in buying will be given to ranchmen with larger herds as a greater part of the purchases in the past have been from the smaller stockmen. Purchases will be made only from those producers who have fully demonstrated to the satisfaction of the county drouth committee, Calvin Flowers, C. B. Baker, and Val McLanahan, that their feed supplies are not sufficient to maintain their animals and that such inability is due entirely to drouth conditions. Purchases from individual producers shall not be in excess of the number which it is necessary to remove in order to make reasonably certain that the cattle remaining on the farm or ranch can be maintained.

The instructions to Mr. Stovall also state that the cattle purchased should be carefully distributed to meet the need, so far as possible, of stockmen where necessity for reduction is imperative and to make purchases from individuals least able to make provision for carrying cattle through the winter. Funds available for cattle purchases are nearing exhaustion.

Cattle purchased from 33 owners in this county last Saturday totaled 368. Of these purchases 125 head were condemned, the remainder being shipped.

LEASE GRAZING LAND FOR DROUTH CATTLE

Austin, Sept. 25—Nearly 100,000 acres of grazing land for drouth stricken cattle have been leased by R. L. Montgomery, Texas Relief commission representative of the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation, as announced today.

The land will graze 10,600 head of cattle and was leased at the rate of 50 cents per head, Montgomery said. Government leases are now in effect in Brazoria, Matagorda, Bexar, Jackson, Calhoun and Hidalgo counties and cattle from nearby counties will be moved to these ranges to remain there for approximately eight months.

A federal grant for \$50,000 for land leasing was made to Texas.

PROCLAMATION

Fire Prevention Week is again at hand. RANGERS LOSE UNDER LIGHTS

BREAKS AGAINST LOCALS IN TILT WITH BORGER CLASS A GRIDSTERS; LOST 18 TO 6

Dazzled by the bright lights in their first night football game and with all the breaks going against them, the Rangers dropped their second game of the season to the Borger Bulldogs, powerful class A gridsters, last Friday night by an 18 to 6 score.

Although outplayed from a standpoint of first downs and yardage, the locals were not entitled to lose the game. Borger scoring twice on blocked punts, earning only one of their three touchdowns. The Ranger touchdown, made by Butler late in the second period was the result of an offensive drive from midfield.

Both teams showed brilliant offensive strength, Borger starting a drive after receiving the kickoff, advancing from their own 33 yard marker to the Ranger 4 yard stripe where they were held for downs. Punting out of danger the Rangers were trying to stop another advance when they gained possession of the pigskin on a Borger fumble, recovering on their own 17 yard marker. The Ranger campaign was halted on the Borger 41 yard line where they were held for downs, trying a line-back on the final play instead of punting. Borger booted the ball to the 32, Tucker making a fine runback to the 46. The Rangers advanced to the Bulldog 49 where they fumbled. Borger made a first down but were forced to punt on the next series, the ball going outside on the Ranger 16 yard line. The locals gained 4 but were set back on the next play for being off-side as the quarter closed.

Resuming play, the Rangers took another 5 yard off-side penalty and with the ball on their 4 yard line an attempt to punt was blocked and Trotter fell on the ball for a touchdown. An attempt to convert from placement failed. The Rangers selected to kickoff, Borger taking a 15 yard penalty for clipping on the return and then punted. The Rangers worked back to the Borger 25 yard line where they punted to the 8 where the ball was downed without return. The locals took a 15 yard penalty for roughness when Jones crashed through before the ball was snapped, giving Borger a

Have Sold Only \$30,000 of Four Hundred Thousand Issue Voted Two Years Ago

Buy Land And Fence

Cancellation Election Must Carry by Two-thirds Majority of Voters of County

At the regular September session of the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree county, held on Monday, September 10, an order was passed calling an election for the purpose of cancelling \$70,000.00 worth of bonds voted for highway improvements, and remaining either unsold or unsold from the issue of \$400,000.00 authorized by the voters in a special election held on April 16, 1932. The bond election will be held on November 6, 1934, in connection with the general election.

Authority for the Commissioners to cancel and burn the unsold \$370,000 worth of bonds must be given by two-thirds of the voters in the election. Only \$30,000 worth of the bonds were ever issued and sold, and of this amount \$5,000 has already been redeemed by the county. Funds received from the sale of bonds was used by the county for the purchase of right-of-way and fencing same on Highway No. 117 and No. 4. Approximately \$50,000 has been expended by the county for this purpose, the remainder of this expenditure coming out of regular tax funds.

Fred Tarbox Is Third Perryton Victim In Fatal Wreck Near Laverne, Okla.

Enroute To World Series

Ranson's Neck Is Broken; Lives For An Hour; Laverne Man Is In Hospital

L. B. Ranson, age 36, prominent local business man, was fatally injured in a car accident that occurred at 6:00 o'clock Wednesday evening, 11 miles southwest of Laverne, Oklahoma, and Wm. Massey and Fred Tarbox were seriously injured when they collided with a car driven by J. M. Pigg, Spearmore, Okla., who was also badly injured.

The accident happened on Oklahoma Highway 35, six miles south and five west of Laverne. The Ranson car had just passed a truck when it met the Pigg car, coming in from a side road, the cars meeting and locking without turning over. The driver of the truck took all of the injured men into Laverne for medical attention. Ranson who suffered a broken neck, dying on the operating table.

The Perryton party left here late in the afternoon and were enroute to St. Louis where they had secured tickets to attend the World Series ball games when tragedy overtook them. Ranson's body was brought back to Perryton late Wednesday night in a Wilson ambulance. Tarbox was also able to return home Wednesday night but Massey's condition was thought to be too serious for him to be moved.

Ranson, familiarly known to all his friends as "Banks", was very active in Lions club and Chamber of Commerce work and was considered one of Perryton's leading citizens. With his family he has lived in Perryton for the past six years, when he took over the wholesale agency of the Texas Company, coming here from his family home at Waxahatchie.

Funeral arrangements will not be completed until arrival of close relatives but will be held in Perryton and burial will be made at Ochiltree cemetery.

The deceased was born at Waxahatchie on March 7, 1898. He is survived by his wife and two young daughters, Sibyl, age 14, and Janette, nearly 3, his mother who lives at Waxahatchie, two brothers, R. B. Ranson, Lipscomb, and Charlie Ranson, Dallas, and three sisters, Mrs. Frank Noel and Mrs. Bussey Thompson, Waxahatchie, and Mrs. G. S. Rothrock, Marlow, Okla.

FREE FUEL IN "TEXAS"

With interest we read the announcement from the Texas Relief Commission that wood yards are to be established down in the state where wood is available and that labor will be used for clearing timber lands, the owner paying for clearing by allowing the relief authorities to distribute the wood to people on the relief rolls. Particular interest to the people of this Panhandle country is the statement that this wood will be charged against the budget of that relief client. Panhandle relief administrators have been very insistent in their demands to the Relief Commission that the budget for this area be raised above the \$20.00 in effect over the state, the grounds that in this country of hard, severe winters, our people require more fuel, heavier clothing, and are unable to raise their fall and early spring gardens. These conditions are not true "down this state", but in many of these down-state communities, by the above ruling, the budgets will be automatically raised by reason of being provided with free wood for fuel. Is the Relief Commission going to turn a deaf ear to the plea of the 100 percent American citizenship of the Panhandle for the opportunity to exist on an equal footing with the negro, the Mexican, and the illiterate "poor white trash", who compose a greater part of those on the relief rolls in other parts of the state, which has just suffered from a four year drought as we have here in the Panhandle.

AFTER YOU'RE GONE

TEXAS CENTENNIAL

The administration is tearing its shirt now about another called session. Let's have another session, the present legislature has been in session the longest and has been the most expensive in the history of the state. Just as well have another session and fill out the remainder of their present terms. The people by popular vote authorized the Texas legislature to appropriate money for the holding of the Texas Centennial. They have failed to take any action to date. People in every community throughout the state are clamoring for the legislature to take action in this matter. Some legislators are asking their constituents what they think about the matter. The people have already expressed their selves by their vote at the polls. They have also elected their legislators, believing them to be men of sufficient intelligence to represent them in the Legislature. What else do they need to go down to Austin and vote sufficient bonds to carry on the Centennial program. The average voter has no conception as to the proper amount needed. It is the legislators duty to inform himself and then vote accordingly and not try and "pass the buck" to his constituency.

REMISSION OF TAXES

Tax remission and remission of tax penalties should be called to a halt in Texas. The question of remission of tax penalties is now before the legislature or will be if another special session is called. A continuance of the remission of tax penalties is just the same as adding a penalty on the person who pays taxes when they are due. In all fairness to those who pay their taxes before they become delinquent, remissions should either be discontinued or the former given a discount for paying when payment is due. The remission of tax penalties is getting to be a habit, just as letting taxes go delinquent is getting to be a habit, for many feel that the penalties will be remitted and they just as well have the use of the tax money as the government. We are against tax remissions, first, last and all the time and will do everything in our power to defeat any legislator who votes for remitting taxes to any county or group of counties.

A DANGEROUS AMENDMENT

It appears to us that the Senate Joint Resolution No. 13, to be voted on as an amendment to the Texas constitution at the general election in November is very dangerous and should be defeated by the votes of this state. Under its provisions, the state cannot receive from taxes, licenses, permits and fees an amount in excess of \$22.50 per capita for each two year period, and the Legislature is prohibited from appropriating an amount in excess of \$22.50 per capita for any two year period. We are surprised that any body of men, supposed to be intelligent and looking after the interests of their communities, would submit such a measure to the voters. But you can never tell what a legislature will do, especially when under the pressure of the lobbyists of the larger interests. If this amendment is adopted, it means less support from the state for schools and roads, and if the present high standard of our schools are to be maintained, it means higher local taxes. It means shifting the burden of taxation from the state to local communities, and from the large to the small taxpayer. Resolutions opposing the amendment were passed at the Galveston Convention of the Democratic party. The Texas State Teachers Association and other educational bodies are very active in their opposition to this amendment. Vote against Senate Joint Resolution No. 13.

PLENTY OF ROOM FOR CENTENNIAL VISITORS

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 28 (Special)—That there is plenty of room for them in Texas will be one of the many things that will impress visitors to the Texas Centennial in 1936 while they are sight-seeing in San Antonio, Houston, Goliad, Brenham, Nacodoches, Huntsville, Dallas and other points where celebrations are designed to be staged. Texas' geographic area comprises 265,596

square miles with a land area of 167,934,000 acres. It is interesting to note that of this vast acreage, only about 44,000,000, or roughly one-fourth, now is classed as improved farm land.

Recent population figures gives the State credit for a little more than 6,000,000 residents, but this means a density of only 22.2 persons per square mile in his far-flung commonwealth.

FREE TREATMENT AVAILABLE TO TUBERCULARS

Austin, Sept. 25.—Hospitalization of tuberculars on relief rolls, provided for to the extent of more than \$100,000 by act of the legislature, has progressed at such a slow rate that county administrators have been instructed to advise the state office why more applications for hospitalization have not been received throughout the state.

Mrs. Val M. Keating, social service consultant, declared she was sure there are many in need of this care. She emphasized, however, that only relief roll clients afflicted with incipient tuberculosis are eligible to apply for this care.

Although state sanatoriums are crowded, arrangements have been made to care for indigent tuberculars in private sanatoriums, Mrs. Keating said.

COUNTY QUOTA CCC IS THREE

THREE OCHILTREE COUNTY YOUNG MEN TO BE SENT TO CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORP

Young men throughout Texas are being selected this week to make up the quota of 2938 allowed the entire state for the Junior Civilian Conservation corps. County Administrator H. Shindler has charge of the enrollment for Ochiltree county.

Mr. Shindler states that this county has been allowed a quota of three, and that they must be acceptable on or before Monday, October 8, and sent into Amarillo before October 10. Young men who wish to avail themselves of this great opportunity for gainful employment and assistance to their dependents should see Mr. Shindler at once.

Of the nearly 3,000 selected, it is expected that about half of them will go to camps outside the state in Oklahoma, New Mexico or Colorado. The remainder likely will be absorbed by camps in Texas.

As in past enrollments, unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 25 who are American citizens and who have dependents to whom they are willing to allot a substantial amount of their monthly allowance, are eligible to be selected. They are to be taken from relief rolls or from families on relief rolls.

No two boys from the same family are eligible.

Men with criminal records are not eligible and neither are those with any history of mental derangement. A person previously discharged for any reason is not eligible to reenter a camp.

Each man will receive \$30 per month, between \$22 and \$25 of which must be allotted to his dependents. Although the applicant agrees to enroll in the government service for six months, if unusual circumstances arise, he may be released from his contract and discharged.

Administrators were urged particularly to "select men able to perform ordinary labor without injury to themselves." Strict observance of the minimum age limit also was advised.

International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church of Christ

Lesson 1 Oct. 7, 1934
THE TRUE VINE
Lesson Text: Jno. 15: 1-16.
Memory Verse: Jno. 15: 12, 14

I. The Vine
Night with its solemn shades settled down. Jesus had eaten the last Passover with his disciples and had instituted the Lord's Supper. Judas had gone out to complete the final arrangements for betraying his Lord. With the fruit of the vine partaken of, it was an easy transition to turn the conversation to the Vine itself.

The Old Testament was one of type and shadow (Heb. 10: 1). Israel had been a vine (Jer. 2: 21), but was only a "figure of the true" (Heb. 9: 24). Now the True Vine showed itself in the person of Jesus. He was the rising Sun of Righteousness which was to put to flight the shadows of starlight (Patriarchal) and moonlight (Jewish) ages. With his rising would come the true light which would warm and guide the feet of pilgrims to the everlasting home. So Jesus was the True Vine itself and not a type of it.

What a beautiful picture we get of Christ in this chapter of John. Humble, tender, and fruit-bearing, the Vine occupies a place of honor in the vineyard. God, the husbandman, watches with loving gaze, the unfolding beauty of his choice plant. Soon its tendrils will become food for millions. Soon men would come from the east and the west to drink of its life-giving juices.

II. The Branches
"Ye are the branches." This statement has been much misunderstood. It has been taken to mean that Jesus is the church universal and the branches are denominations. But the passage will not warrant that conclusion. Jesus is the head of the church (Col. 1: 18) and Christians are individual members of that body (1 Cor. 12: 27). The relationship is similar in the vine and branches. You will note that the branches are individuals, not institutions. "If a man abide not in me" (15: 6). Surely neither rhetoric nor reason will justify the conclusion that the branches are other than individuals.

III. Abiding And Fruit Bearing
A barren tree or life is worse than useless. It is a menace to others who would bear fruit. It is altogether possible for a branch to fall in fruitfulness. Hence the Bible teaches that it is possible for a child of God to so conduct himself as to be finally lost. Warning after warning comes from heaven to tell neglectful church members the consequence of fruitless living. Though Judas was a disciple of the Lord, he fell by transgression. (Acts 1: 25) was condemned (Matt. 27: 3) and lost (Jno. 17: 12). His life and tragic death are grim reminders of what it means to take the backward trail.

It is necessary for the branch to abide in Christ if it would bear fruit. We know that a limb cut from a tree soon dies. So it is necessary to remain in the Christ vine.

III. OBEDIENCE THE TEST OF FRIENDSHIP

And how shall we abide in Christ? By permitting his words to abide in us and to produce fruit. It is impossible to abide in the favor of Jesus unless we permit his words to dwell within our souls. The test of love is that we keep his commandments. Jesus tells us we are his friends if we obey the things he has commanded us to do.

PRE-CENTENNIAL MEET AT PAMPA

ADVISORY BOARDS OF PANHANDLE COUNTIES INVITED TO ATTEND BANQUET AT PAMPA

Pampa, Sept. 26.—The opening gun of the Pre-Centennial celebration here in 1935 will be fired on Tuesday, October 9, when members of the Centennial Advisory Board of the 25 counties in the 31st senatorial district will be guests of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Gray County Advisory Board, and Prominent Pampa citizens.

The banquet will be held at 7:30 o'clock in the banquet hall of the First Methodist Church.

The occasion will celebrate the 98th anniversary of the return of Stephen F. Austin, founder of Texas, from Mexico City where he was imprisoned from 1833 to 1835, and also the 98th anniversary of the battle of Gonzales where the first shot was fired during the Texas Revolution.

Letters containing invitations to 158 Advisory Board members in the Panhandle were mailed last week. The banquet will be held for the purpose of adding to the interest and enthusiasm already created in the Panhandle for the Pre-Centennial movement and the Centennial. 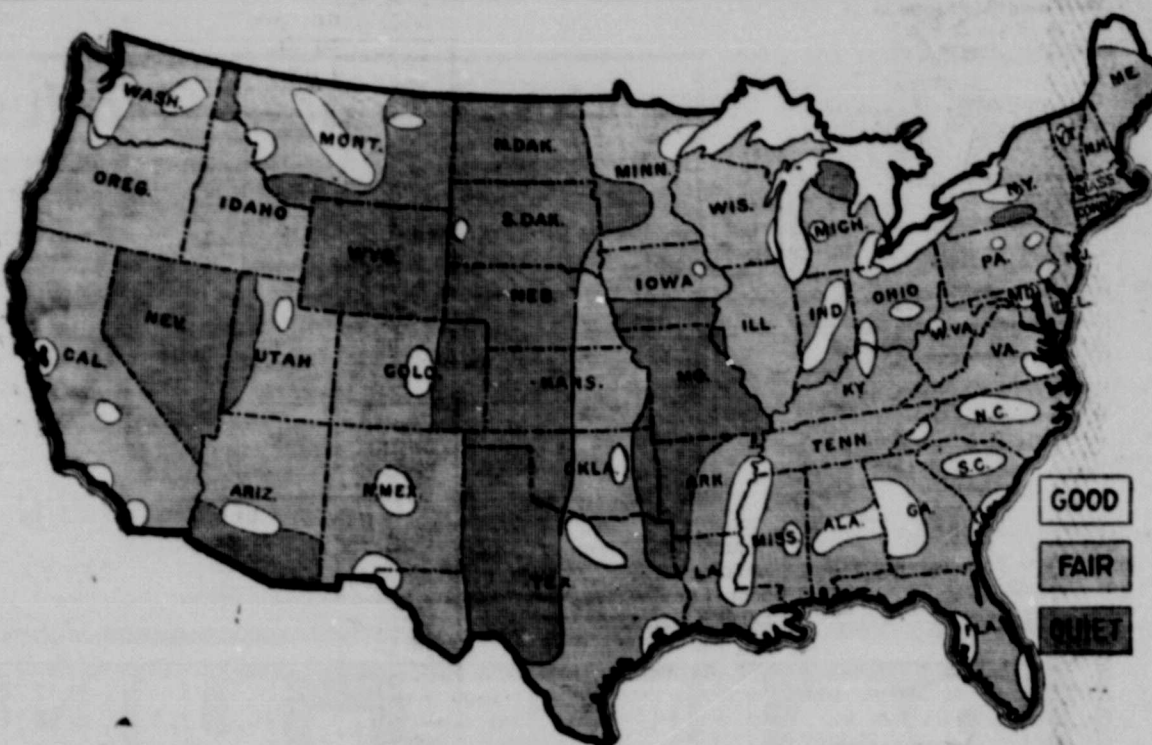

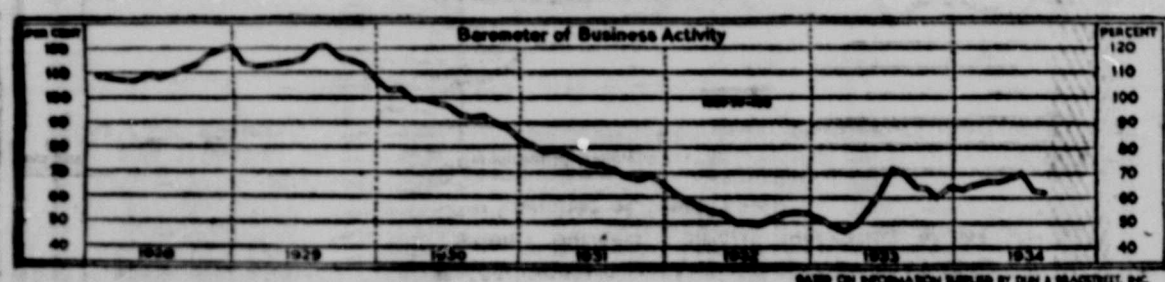

first down. The penalty was reversed on the next down, Borger getting a 15 yard penalty for roughness and then punted, the Rangers fumbling and Borger recovering on their 32 yard stripe. After advancing to the 47, the Bulldogs fumbled and Perryton recovered.

Tucker snatched a pass for 8 yards and went around end for 4 and a first down. Butler slipped through right tackle for 7. The next play lost a yard. Butler and Tucker gained 3 each for a first down. Butler gained 55 off right tackle and Tucker 5 off left tackle for a first down. McWilliams plunged for 3. Tucker raced around left end for 4. Butler lost 3 around right end and on the final down, 8 yards from the goal line, raced around left end behind perfect interference for the only Ranger counter. A try from placement failed as the ball struck the cross bar and bounded back.

The Rangers kicked off with Borger returning to the 39. A two yard plunge and a 9 yard pass gave them a first down on the center stripe as the half closed. Score, Rangers 6, Borger 6.

Play was resumed in the third quarter, a Bulldog drive being stopped when Butler intercepted a long pass. Both teams were unable to make consistent gains and reverted to a punting battle, the Rangers gaining a slight advantage until Borger kicked out of bounds on the Ranger 18 yard line. Two running plays gained 5 and the Rangers tried to punt, Borger again blocking. Trotter recovering and running to the 2 yard line. Zumalt plunged for the counter. A bad pass made the kick impossible and the receiver was downed.

Borger kicked off, Perryton fumbling but recovering on the 5 yard line and returning to the 24. A pass was good for 7 yards and another incomplete as the quarter closed. Score, Rangers 6, Borger 12.

The final period opened with the Rangers punting. Borger was held until they were forced to kick, the Rangers returning the boot. Borger started a fine powerhouse drive pushing campaign with Zumalt carrying the oval that resulted in two first downs, 31 yards, before they were finally penalized 15 yards for the illegal pushing tactics. A kick was blocked but Borger recovered

however they lost the ball on the final down. The Rangers opened an effective aerial attack but lost the ball on the Borger 41 yard line on a fumble. Borger started another series of pushing drives and added a 15 yard penalty on the Rangers for slugging, resulted in Zumalt driving over for the third touchdown, the only earned touchdown made by Borger. The try from placement was wide.

Borger kicked off, intercepting a long Ranger pass. They fumbled. Perryton recovering and as the game ended a long Ranger pass was incomplete.
