

IMES WELL BEING DEEPENED, BANKLINE IS NEAR PAY ZONE

The Chester Imes Drilling Co. had begun deepening operations in their No. 1 B. W. Patterson, just east of Cisco, seeking pay in the prolific Ranger lime uncovered recently in a nearby hole, as a feature of weekend oil developments in this area.

Bigging up was completed Friday and the Imes company was drilling ahead. Some difficulty was experienced, but it appeared cleared up. The well had been pumping from the Lake sand and decision to deepen was reached after the nearby Johnston No. 1 Mahan-Edwards completed as an outstanding Ranger well.

Gilchrist Drilling Company has obtained a permit to deepen their No. 1 Tm Choate, but elected to await the outcome of the Patterson operation.

Meanwhile, the Johnston well was scheduled to go on regular production Saturday. Oil and gas line connections were being completed. It was rated as an excellent well with strong flowing pressure.

In the new Lake pool area five miles northeast of town, Bankline Oil Company's No. 3 Mrs. Briggs Owens was drilling at 3-225 feet Saturday morning. It was due to begin coring the Lake sand late in the day.

Bankline has made three additional locations and Choate Drilling Company was due to move to one of them — all on the Owens lease — after the No. 3 is completed.

J. J. Lynn Company's No. 1 Keys et al, in the same vicinity, cemented on top of the Lake sand at about 3,300 feet. Cable tools were to be moved in to drill the plug and complete the well. It is an outpost location and would extend the field if successful.

Lone Star Drilling Company has announced location for a new well — their No. 4 Elam — in the Caddo pool some 12 miles northwest of Cisco. It will be drilled in the near future.

Some five miles northwest of Cisco, the Hickok Producing Company's No. 2 Childers had salt water troubles. A stray sand at 2,504 feet was yielding considerable water to bother cable tool drilling operations. An under-reaming project was under way Saturday to permit drilling ahead in the near future.

Establishing boat quotas and license fees for the Gulf Coast fishing industry, Setting seasons and dates for mule deer and quail in the regulatory area West of the Pecos.

Dates and other provisions of the general big game season in the remainder of the state are set by law.

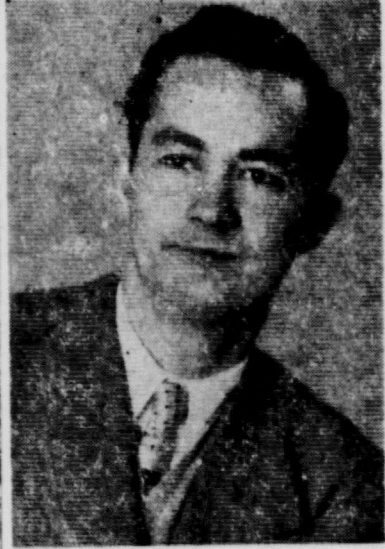
The dove and migratory waterfowl season dates, shooting hours and bag limits are set jointly by Federal authorities and the state.

FIRST NATIONAL'S RESOURCES REACH ALL-TIME HIGH IN JUNE Total resources of the First National Bank in Cisco reached an all-time high at the close of business Friday, the 30, President Charles A. Spears reported.

According to figures prepared in answer to a national bank call, resources of the bank were \$3,729,311.59 — some 2,000 more than the previous record high of \$3,707,236.20 on Dec. 31, 1945. The June 30 figure reflected an increase of nearly \$2,000 over figures for April 24, 1950, date of the last bank call.

Deposits increased nearly \$200,000 to \$3,458,264.23 during the second quarter of 1950, last ended. Loans and discounts stood at \$758,285.68 — an increase of over \$20,000 in the quarter.

The gains in resources and deposits were attributed largely to an ever-increasing number of customers by Mr. Spears. Spring crops had little effect on bank deposits due to a comparatively poor crop.

The month of June was a record month for the bank in the matter of handling their own customers' checks, Mr. Spears said. During the month, 27,030 checks were written by bank customers on First National checks.

"Our steady increases in resources may well be interpreted as an indication of a very healthy community," Mr. Spears said.

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The Day We Celebrate

The current discussion of freedom and liberties shows widespread concern as to how secure is our famed independence.

Independence, according to the dictionary, is exemption from reliance on others, with the attendant control by others; direction of one's own affairs without interference.

In our celebration of Independence Day, there has been something missing. Statesman orators have overemphasized political freedom at the expense of economic freedom. There is abundant evidence that our valiant forefathers at Lexington and Yorktown were more concerned with freedom to work and enjoy the fruits of their labors unmolested, than in elections. The elections

were a necessary evil to protect this freedom — individual reward for individual merit.

The Declaration of Independence was a ringing protest against political interference, taxation, bureaucracy. It was a revolt against being pushed around. The Magna Carta and our own Bill of Rights were directed against the encroachment of government upon the rights of the individual, upon his independence.

Sober reflection raises the question: While guarding the front door against the open tyranny of government, are we letting tyranny in disguise slip in the back door with its sugared proposals of something for nothing? "Abject dependence upon government," said President Eliot of Harvard, "is an accursed inheritance of the days of the divine rights of kings."

Abject dependence on government is also the accursed prescrip-

tion of a communistic order. Much of the praise of communism springs from the ignoble desire for a slavish security without the rigors of struggle. This soul-sickness includes all classes, high and low. Even nations. Many businesses are eager for a government handout if it seems to insure continuance of the enterprise with less annoying competition; the working man wants someone else to secure his job and take care of him in his old age. The farmer is loath to give up a subsidy; the middle class are tempted to accept a Government plan to build their homes for them. Each is ready to sign a blank check in payment. Yet adventuring and chance-taking on the part of the individual

are as necessary to progress and well-being as when Shakespeare declared: "And you may know security is mortal's chiefest enemy." The responsibility and enthusiasm of the single human is the "indispensable" of the United States of America. Independence Day, 1950, gives us the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to eternal vigilance against dependence on the State, which always carries with it a corresponding loss of independent action and self-respect. We do not want to see July Fourth become Dependence Day.

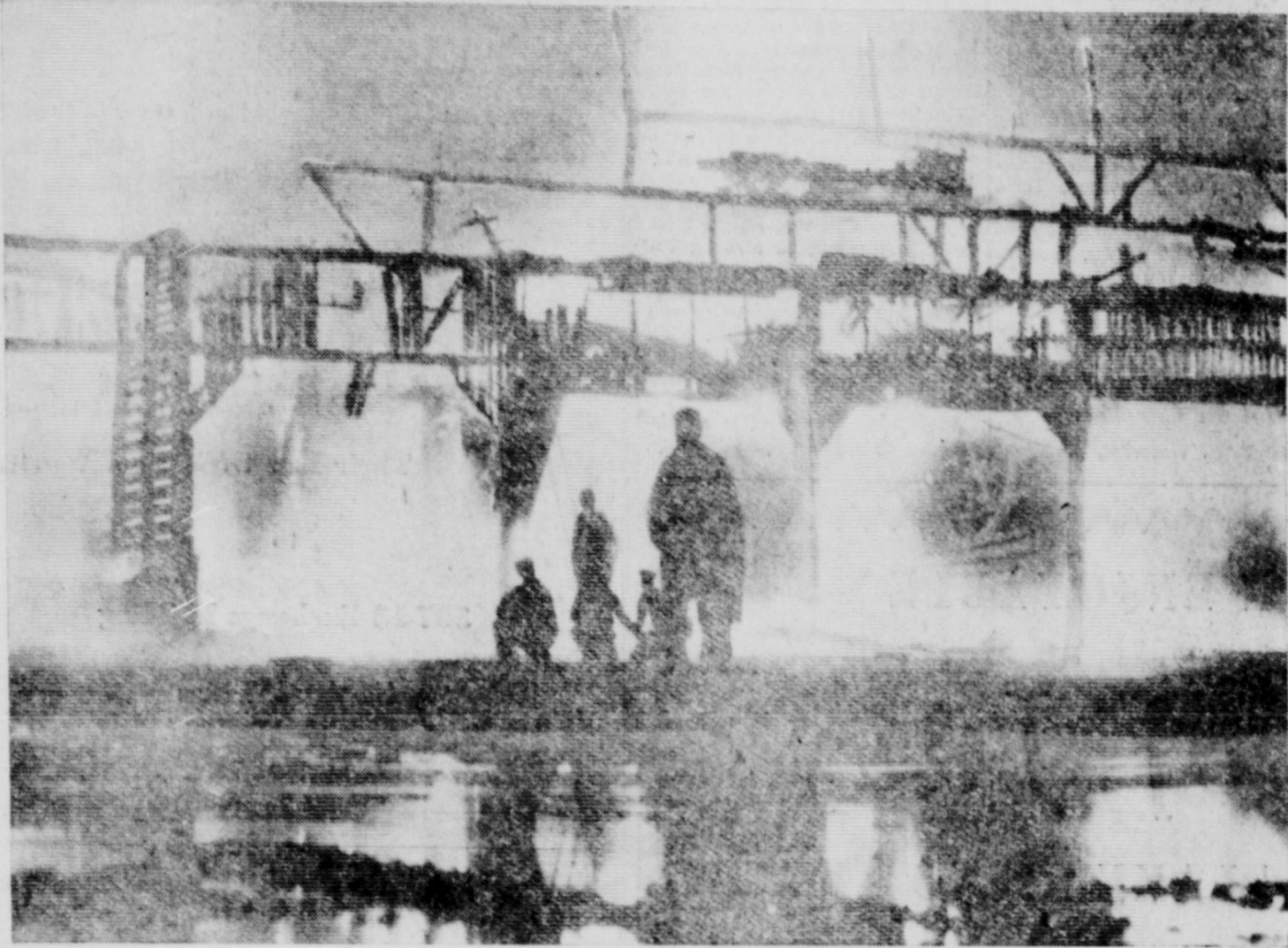

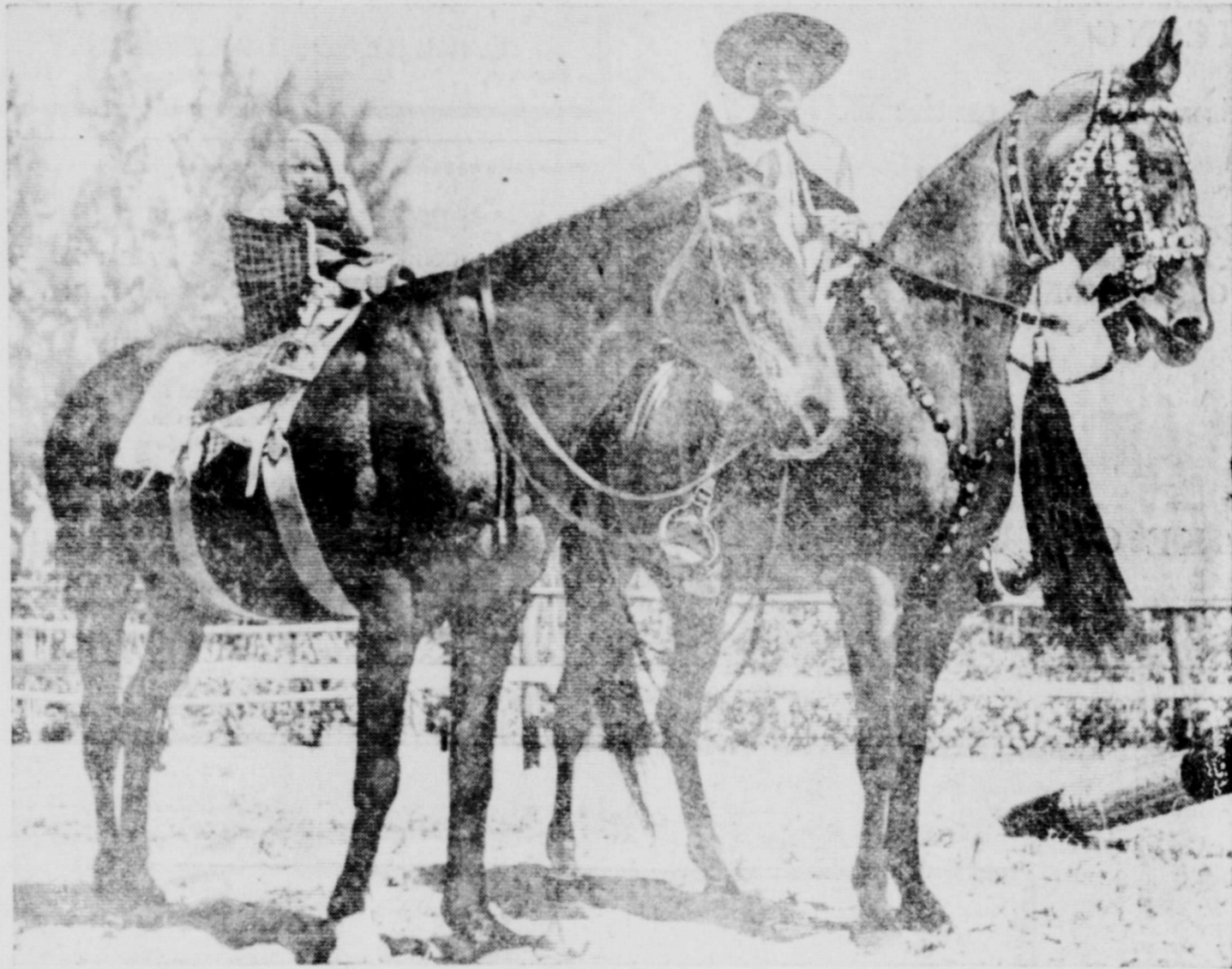
1. **The right to personal initiative;** to choose freely; to lead but not to dictate; to follow but not to be driven.

A NEW THREAT -

Texas mayors, county judges and school board members have been alerted to the threat of their "home rule" powers being turned over to labor groups and the diversion of more than \$30,000,000 of public tax monies from the State Highway Department building program.

General Ike Ashburn, executive director of the Texas Good Roads' Association, in a statement released from the Association's headquarters in Austin compared the threat to Texas in the El Paso Wage Rate Case to be on a parity with the Tidelands Case.

The Texas Supreme Court is scheduled early in July to receive the El Paso Wage Rate Case. The issue is whether organizations like the American Federation of Labor in the El Paso case, will dictate the policy of wage contracts for the state highway department or whether that department will do so.

Many years ago, General Ashburn cited, the state legislature delegated to the highway department, with its many specialists and engineers, the right and responsibility to determine the prevailing wage rate in the areas where state highway contracts are to be let. Each succeeding legislature has left this right inviolate. The responsibility to determine the prevailing rates by this same law was placed upon various agencies who are responsible for the administration of many state, city and county functions.

"If the thinking of the labor group in El Paso is correct,"

Gen. Ashburn's statement said, "it will mean that the legislature all these years has been in error and that the state highway department and the county judges and commissioners of Texas are no longer capable of determining what the proper wage scale is in Texas counties. It will mean that some other group of business agents like the union labor group at El Paso will be allocated this authority and the legislature, the state highway department, the county judges and the county commissioners' in Texas will be by-passed."

The Roads executive warned that if "the present group or any other group of our present home rule of municipal, county and school board units. We don't believe our Texas mayors, county judges, commissioners and school boards want, or need, any outside group to pass on their prerogatives and hand these rights over to labor or any 'other groups,' he concluded.

HEALTH TALKS

SOAP IS SOMETHING LITTLE BOYS DON'T WANT MUCH OF

Prepared by State Medical Ass.

"Aw, I wish soap was never invented." Through the years little boy voices, occasionally joined by little girl voices, have been casting aspersions at the fate that brought soap to light.

How was soap "invented?" Who thought up the combination of fats, oils and alkali which would dissolve in water and lather to make removal of dirt easier?

It was all an accident, according to legend. Roman women of ancient times found one spot in the river below Mount Sapo where their clothes required less rubbing to make them clean. Upon checking to see what made that spot different they found that the river at that place caught the drain from animal sacrifices or top of the mountain; the fats, mixed with the ashes of the fire for the sacrifice, swept down the hill into the river and made a lather. From the mountain came the name saponis, which we call soap.

Soap, as you normally use it, is not a true antiseptic, because the warm lather of soap would probably have to remain in contact with bacteria for 15 minutes or more to actually kill them. But soap and water do remove many germs from the skin by trapping them in the lather which surges down the drain.

There are soaps now to which antiseptics have been added and were found in medical studies to be effective in cutting down the number of skin disorders.

Personal cleanliness, washing regularly with soap will lessen the number of skin diseases caused by exterior factors but such antiseptic soaps as those containing chemicals called G-11 and the like will, ordinarily be even more effective. Some of these soaps may be more irritating than others, so be sure to get married to one that seems to be irritating your skin, ask your doctor about it.

Soap, the badge of cleanliness which youngsters may regret

having ever heard of, even more "invented" time.

1 tablespoon shortening

4 teaspoons flour
1/2 cup liquid
1/2 cup milk
2 cans deviled ham

Peel onions; cook covered in boiling water and salt 20 min., or until tender. Drain; save 1/2 cup liquid. Melt shortening in saucepan; blend in flour and pepper. Stir in liquid. Boil and stir 2 min. Add onions, milk and deviled ham. Heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Makes 4 servings.
