All 1940 Taxes Become Delinquent February 1

Moisture Reaches .67 Inch Locally From Rain-Snow

Month's Total Near One Inch Is The Report

Moisture For '40 Was Below Average With 15.02 Inches

Conditions are looking very favorable for the local 1941 grain crops with the addition of .67 inch of moisture this week up to Thursday morning with the storm showing some signs of abating. The moisture was resultant of mist and drizzle rains accompanied by periodic snow flurries in a wet spell that started Monday. Varying amounts of moisture are reported to have fallen generally over the entire Panhandle area.

According to Jack Allen, keeper of the government weather gauge, moisture was received on Monday from a light rain totaling .09 of an inch. Drizzling rainfall early Tuesday night and Wednesday at five p. m. 31 of an inch had been recorded with an additional .27 of an inch Wednesday night and Thursday morning from snow that melted as it fell.

All county roads are said to be in bad condition although some traffic has been able to get through.

A year ago the county was receiving a second heavy snowfall on to of one that had fallen in the latter part of December and remained on the ground until the last of February with continuous freezing temperatures.

Total moisture received during January, 1941, has been reported as .71 of an inch.

Local Pair In Car Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Monuts narrowly escaped death early Sunday morning when control of their automobile was lost as a tire blew out and turned over several times. The accident occurred about five miles north of Perryton and the couple were rushed to the Perryton Hospital for treatment by motorists.

Mrs. Monuts suffered the most severe injuries and is still receiving treatment at the hospital although it was reported that her condition was improving. She received severe lacerations about the body and face and has a possible skull fracture.

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Voters Repeat Veto Wednesday on Proposal to Legalize Beer Sales by A 357 to 658 Count

Ochiltree County voters went to the polls for the fourth consecutive year Wednesday and turned thumbs down on a proposal of returning the legal sale of beer within the borders of this county. With a total ballot of 1,015 votes cast in an election that aroused more interest than any thus far, the measure was turned down 357 to 658 with all boxes without exception voting "dry".

In the 1939 election only a total of 627 votes were cast on the question, indicating the arousing interest of the public on the issue.

County Receives 132 AAA Checks

The County Agent's office reported that a total of 132 checks in payment to Ochiltree farmers in the Farm Program were received Wednesday totaling \$26,212.16 on the Soil Conservation payment.

The shipment makes a total of 904 checks received to date on the 1940 payments with \$172,817.17 having been paid, or two-thirds of the \$265,000 to be received for last year. The balance is expected to be received soon.

Poll Taxes Must Be Paid By Jan. 31

The deadline for the payment of poll taxes is only 15 days away. J. S. Talley, county tax assessor and collector, reminded citizens of Ochiltree County to pay poll taxes now, and not wait until the last day, January 31.

Citizens between 21 and 60 years of age are required to have poll tax receipts in order to vote. Persons entitled to exemption must obtain an exemption certificate from Talley's office.

Citizens, who have reached their twenty-first birthday since January 1, 1940, or who will reach the age of 21 during 1941, are entitled and required to secure exemption certificates from the tax office during January.

If a person is blind, deaf or dumb or permanently disabled or has lost one hand or foot, he is entitled to an exemption certificate because of physical disability.

4-H Calves Are Gaining Weight

It is reported that the 4-H Club calves in the county are making good gains and some are showing considerable flesh. Many members are feeding out calves at the present time.

Paul Hale, on Gibson Creek, weighed his calf on November 4, the date of the club show and again on January 4, 60 days later, and found that 190 pounds had been gained by the animal. The calf now weighs 720 pounds.

A ration will be mixed for distribution to the boys feeding calves in a few days as follows: 120 lbs. yellow corn chops; 140 lbs. sweet feed; 90 lbs. cottonseed meal; 80 lbs. oats; 55 lbs. milo chops; 80 lbs. ground oats; 10 lbs. limestone; five lbs. salt.

The preparation will be mixed at home by the boys with an equal weight of ground grain such as barley, wheat and milo.

Poll Taxes Must Be Paid Or Residents Cannot Vote in the Elections of 1941; Some Paid

J. S. Talley, collector of county and state taxes; Mrs. Luther Wade, Perryton Independent School District tax collector; and M. M. Cudd, city tax collector, are urging taxpayers to make payment on 1940 taxes before February 1, to avoid penalties which will be attached on all accounts effective that date.

JUST HERE and THERE

Ochiltree County has again turned thumbs down on the legal sale of beer. In Wednesday's election 658 voted "dry" while only 357 voted for legal sale of beer. Every precinct in the entire county voted "dry".

This is almost a two to one vote against beer, the heaviest majority ever returned by the "drys" and proves conclusively that Ochiltree County folks do not want legalized beer joints.

We'll grant that a few of the "dry" votes were cast by persons associated directly or indirectly with the illegal sale of beer and who stood to lose if the sale was legalized and bootlegging joints outlawed. But these few votes can be deducted from the "dry" column and there will remain an overwhelming majority against beer sales.

Now since the people of Ochiltree County have in no uncertain terms given this "dry" mandate, it is up to the officials of the City of Perryton and the County of Ochiltree to enforce the prohibition laws.

We're going to be frank when we say that there's a lot of things about our prohibition laws that we think are all wrong but we are equally frank when we say that we think the laws as they now stand should be enforced.

Lax enforcement of any law tends to break down respect for all laws and breeds in man and especially youth the idea that "they can do anything they're big enough to do," regardless of laws to the contrary.

Ochiltree County folks gave a "pat on the shoulder" and God-speed to six young men Tuesday afternoon when they answered the call of their country and left to join the colors for one year's military training.

Some of the "goodbyers" were happy and some were weeping. The boys had their chins up for they well knew that they were doing their duty. It's not like the gloomy days of 1917 and 1918 when the "Heinies" were at the doors of Paris and our allies were backed to the wall.

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Poll taxes must be paid on or before January 31 or residents will have no vote in county or state elections during 1941 unless they become 21 years of age during the year or have passed 60 years of age. Delinquent penalties are added at the rate of one per cent per month until July, 1941, when the penalty will be raised to eight per cent and interest charges at the rate of one-half per cent per month will be made.

Fred Huston, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections in Sheriff Talley's office reports that \$15,307.32 has been collected on \$35,672.24 on state taxes with \$326.50 received on \$1,980.00 state poll tax account. A check of the county tax rolls disclosed \$23,594.05 paid on \$44,972.64; \$5,462.74 received on \$10,010.21 county school taxes; \$54.75 paid on \$330.00 county poll taxes.

Mrs. Luther Wade stated that for the Perryton Independent School District \$23,579.32 had been collected on an assessment of \$55,115.66. Collections were slightly better at this time than for the corresponding date last year. Although valuations were five per cent lower, the rate was up 10 cents making an assessment this year of 80 cents on the \$100.

M. M. Cudd, city clerk, reported that his office had received approximately 31 per cent of tax collections at the present time with \$7,631.90 paid on an assessment of \$24,275.61. Valuation of the city rolls was \$1,618,573. During the past year \$7,295.27 was collected on delinquent rolls.

Automobile license fees cannot be paid in this county until February 1, but must be paid between February 1 and April 1, 1941.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Many Men Miss Opportunities

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 19
Text: Luke 14:15-24

HOW many persons are inclined to long for the opportunity to do great things, or to have privileges which are not theirs? Yet many live in the presence of great opportunity without being aware of it, and through their slackness and lack of regard for duty they constantly miss out on the means of high attainments.

Jesus put this into the form of a story which we call "The Parable of the Great Supper." A fellow guest where Jesus had been entertained, in his enthusiasm, had said, "Blessed is he that shall eat bread in the Kingdom of God." Yet all the privileges and the glories of the Kingdom of Heaven were offered to those who sat at meat with Jesus, and it was this that inspired His story.

THE narrative is simple and effective. A certain man made a great supper and invited many guests, but when he sent his servants to tell them to come, that everything was ready, they all with one consent began to make excuses. The excuses were as flimsy as all excuses to grasp opportunity usually are.

One man had bought a field which he said he must go and see. Common sense would have dictated that he should have gone to see the field before he bought it. Another, who had

bought five yoke of oxen, said that he ought to go and prove them, although he ought to have known a little more about the quality of the oxen before he bought them. Another man had married a wife so he could not come, but someone has made the remark that a newly married wife is always interested in attending feasts. Perhaps Jesus in the story wanted to stress the foolishness of excuses and of those who make them.

But the man who had provided the supper found a way of having guests. He sent out in the highways and the lanes and brought in the poor and the maimed, the halt and the blind.

THE meaning of the parable seems very clear. While those who seem to be the called and the chosen reject the mercy and the grace of God, He bestows that grace upon the needy and the sinful, and all who will may come to the feast of grace.

There is something of a parallel in the play by Barrie, entitled "Dear Brutus," where, taking the saying of a Shakespearean character, "The fault, dear Brutus, lies not in our stars but in ourselves," Barrie gives all the characters in the play who have failed in life a second chance, which they must as badly as they muffed the first. It takes something more than opportunity to create character and attain salvation.

God spread the feast, but upon man depends the response to the invitation.

Chevrolet Reports Big Gain in 1940

DETROIT, Jan. 14.—The second greatest sales year in the history of Chevrolet was announced here last week by W. E. Holler, general sales manager, with the report that a total of 1,046,069 new Chevrolet passenger and commercial cars were retailed by dealers during the calendar year 1940. This figure represents a gain of 32 per cent over 1939, he said, when dealers sold at retail a total of 791,886 new cars and trucks.

Chevrolet sales topped the preceding year in all departments and were second only to 1936 in company history, Mr. Holler said. Used car sales totalled 1,909,972, an increase of 21.7 per cent over 1939, when dealers sold 1,569,201 units. New and used car sales combined were 2,956,041.

Truck sales, likewise, showed a substantial gain during the year, the report shows, totalling 197,202, an advance of 11.9 per cent over the 176,090 sold during 1939.

During the final month of the year, dealers retailed 95,119 new cars and trucks, a gain of 6,395 units over December 1939. They sold 138,581 used cars, an increase of 12,356 over December 1939, and 18,896 trucks, a gain of 33.7 per cent.

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Early Day Pioneer Dies in Higgins

Mrs. Mary McClure, pioneer resident of Beaver County, Okla., and Lipcomb County, died Saturday afternoon, January 4 at her apartment in the Higgins Hotel in Higgins, having been confined to her bed for a week suffering from a broken hip. Funeral services and burial were held at Higgins, January 5.

Grandma McClure, as she was so well known, was born at Crawfordsville, Indiana, March 27, 1842, and was 98 years, nine months and six days of age when she died. In 1864, when she was 22 years old, she united in marriage with Mr. Tip W. McClure, who was a Union soldier and who served throughout the Civil War, being twice wounded.

At the close of the war, he came to claim his bride and they decided to go west in search of a home and their fortune. They settled at Medicine Lodge, Kansas, in 1865, where they lived until Mr. McClure's death in 1879. To this union six children were born, two of whom died in infancy.

After Mr. McClure's death at Medicine Lodge, Grandma McClure and her children came to Beaver County, Oklahoma, or "No Man's Land," as it was better known at that time, and located on Coon Creek near old Sod Town. They lived there until 1887 when Lipscomb County was organized. In Lipscomb County she became the first school teacher in the county. She taught until 1891, after which she again moved to Beaver County to teach. After retiring from teaching, she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Jim Black, with whom she was living at the time of her death.

The Average Family Budget Lists \$1236 Spent Annually



Food and the family car are two biggest items in budget of the average American home.

MYSTERY of the family budget is on its way toward a solution by the U. S. Census Bureau, which is arriving at some conclusions after studying figures on 34,000,000 families quizzed in the 1940 census.

What American homemakers do with their money is summed up in the fact that the average U. S. family spends about \$1236 annually in retail purchases of one kind or another.

Biggest item in the budget is food, on which the average family spends \$310.16. Running a fairly close second is maintenance of the family car, averaging \$249 a year.

This latter figure is positive evidence that most Americans have a car of some sort. With the largest number of automobiles per capita in the world, the U. S., unlike most countries, is a nation where people consider a car a necessity rather than a luxury.

Purchases in department stores and for general merchandise, totaling \$176, come third on the list of family budget items. In bars and eating places, the average American family spends \$104.

A surprise is the fact that the cost of clothes and shoes ranks as low as fifth in the budget.

The average expenditure is \$96. Building materials and hardware come next, with \$80. Furniture, radio and household supplies account for \$51.

The average family spends \$46 annually at the corner drug store for drugs, cosmetics, sundry merchandise, magazines, books and, above all, for the seductive soda and ice cream sundae.

All other expenditures are lumped together as miscellaneous and the total is \$124. Cigars, cigarettes and pipe tobacco play an important part here.

Of course these figures can give in some ways an incorrect picture. They are based upon the expenditures of all grades of society from the people with incomes that run into seven figures to the poor who are earning a bare subsistence.

In between these extremes are, of course, many income classes. Those with the same income—say \$1000 or \$2000 per year—tend to have the same rate of expenditure and for pretty much the same things.

The Census Bureau estimates that the 34,000,000 American families in 1939 spent a total of \$42,000,000,000 in retail shops.

Oil for U. S. Tractors

Oil for the American farm tractor—that seems to be the real nub of a recent letter sent by President Roosevelt to the chairman of the sub-committee of the House Inter-state and Foreign Commerce Committee, once more urging legislation that will assure protection of America's oil supply.

Main reason for this message is oil's big share as an adjunct to the nation's defense efforts. The President said there was no shortage, but it was necessary to do everything possible to prevent waste.

By executive order he has already fairly well stopped the shipment of high grade oil to Japan. If Congress takes the action the Chief Executive has recommended, Japan's war efforts in China may be seriously crippled, despite the fact that it expects to get increased oil supplies from the Dutch East Indies.

Common sense dictates that it is ten thousand times more important that an American farmer shall be well supplied with American oil for his tractor than that a Japanese bombing plane shall load up with it.

The farm tractor is working in the blessed peace of the United States. The Japanese bomber is employed in the accursed job of blasting Chinese cities to bits and bombing helpless Chinese civilians.

The American tractor means bread for the hungry. The Japanese bomber means coffins for the untimely dead.

The tractor, employed in agriculture, is a phase of civilization at its best—a modern application to one of man's most ancient efforts.

The bomber means the negation of civilization, the perversion of what was meant to be a beneficent invention to speed man on his peaceful travels.

The tractor might well be called an instrument of creation, whereas the bomber is an instrument of destruction.

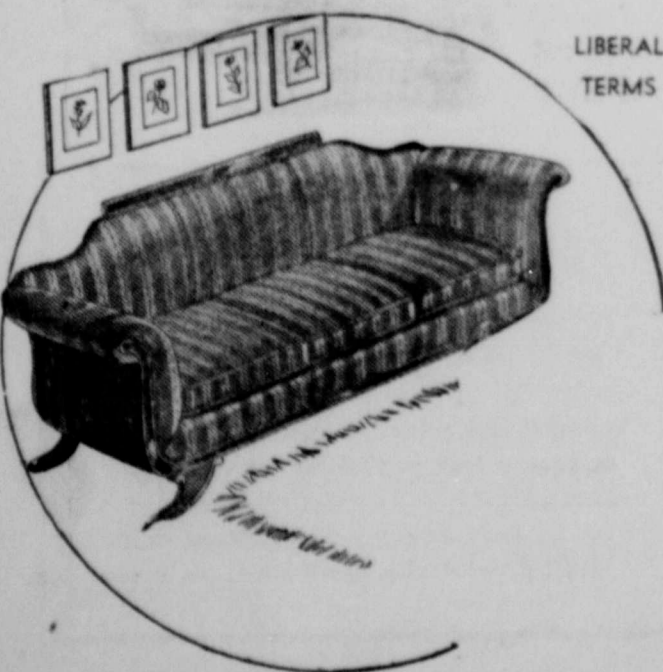

Legion Works For Permanent Nat'l Defense

National defense, Americanism, government protection for World War widows and orphans, and improved employment opportunities for war veterans—these will be major objectives of The American Legion and its Auxiliary in their legislative work during 1941. Mrs. W. B. Reid, legislative chairman of Perryton Unit of the Auxiliary, has announced.

The Auxiliary will give the support of its half million members to The American Legion's demand that present emergency measures being taken for the nation's defense be amended to provide a permanent defense program. This would include the training of all young men as they come of military age; provisions for continuous production of ordnance, planes and ships to keep the national defense strong at all times; continuous production of the means for defense at a sufficient rate to obviate costly production under the pressure of emergency; and improvement of war material through steady attention to its development.

"We cannot have national security without a continuing program of defense," said Mrs. Reid. "We must keep our defenses strong at all times. Instead of suddenly trying to build up defenses when emergencies come."

Laws which will enable the United States to combat more effectively "fifth column" activities in this country, which will help check sabotage, espionage and foreign propaganda, will be sought by the Legion and Auxiliary during the coming session of Congress.

Extension of government protection to widows and orphans of World War veterans on the same basis as it is given to these veterans of other wars also will be sought. Real preference for veterans under civil service and in all other forms of government employment will be another major objective.

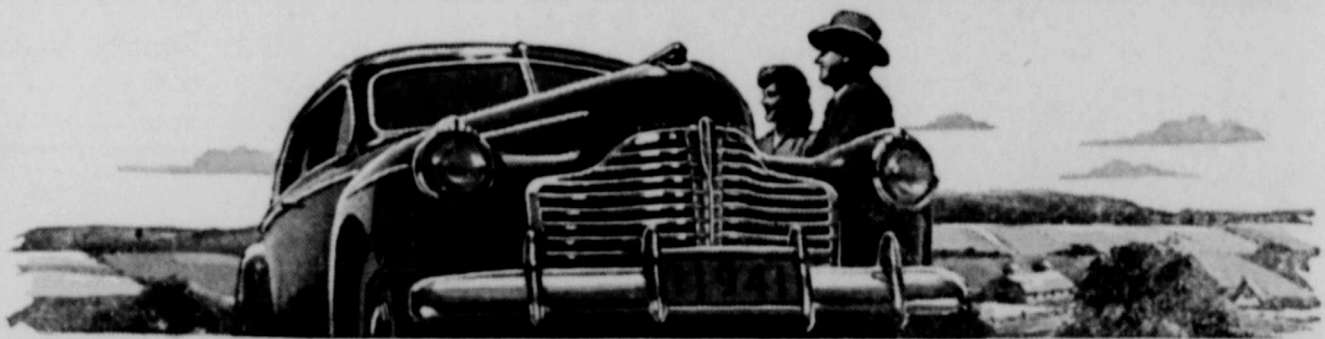

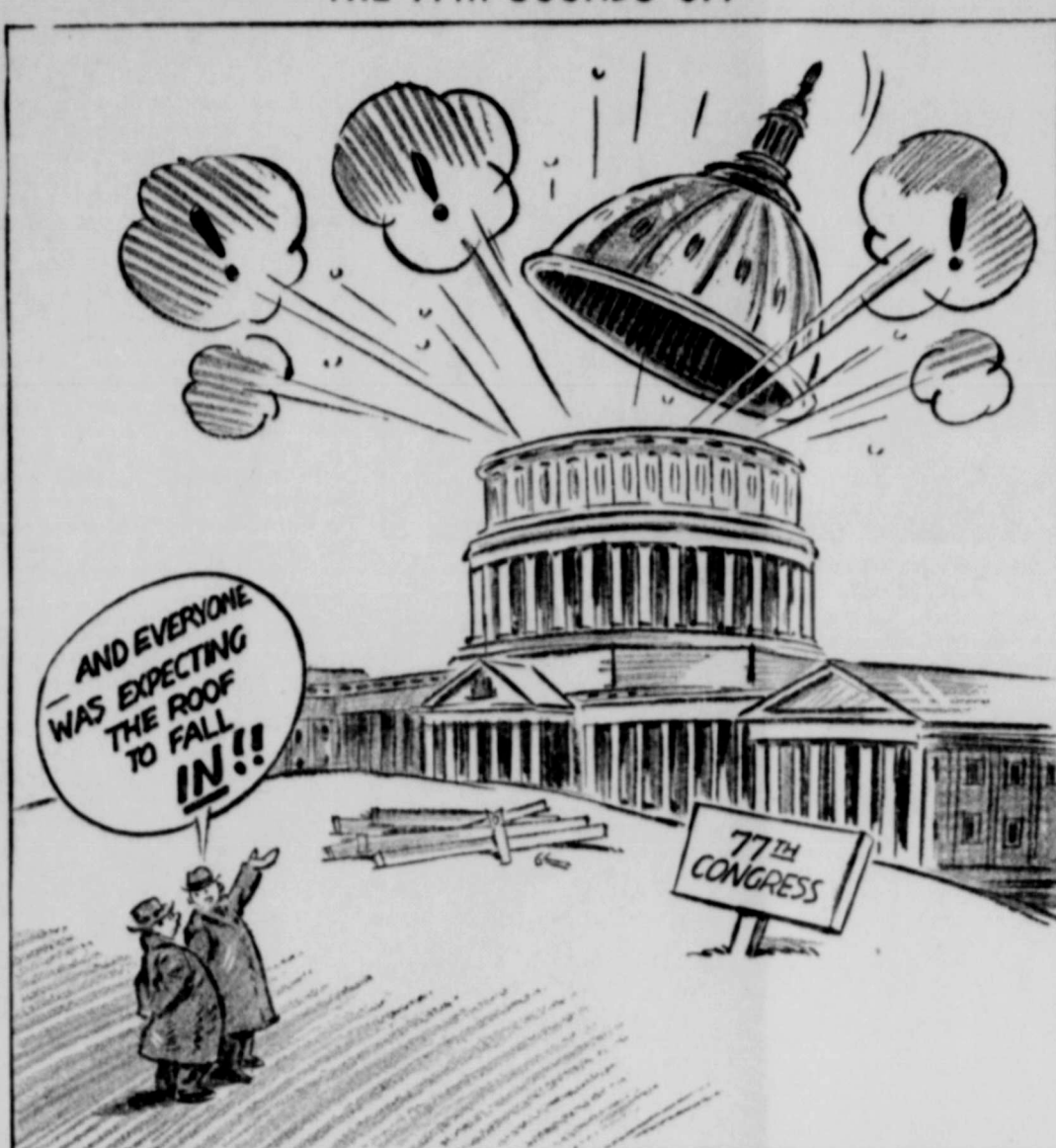

Marriage Does Not Necessarily Exempt Men from Military Service

In response to inquiries regarding classification of married men under the Selective Service Law, a ruling was sent recently to all Local Boards, Appeal Boards, Advisory Boards and Government Appeal Agents. This question is answered by the following ruling, issued for the Director by Fred Upchurch, Capt., Judge Advocate Gen's Dept., Legal Division, at Austin:

"Numerous inquiries from Local Boards throughout Texas have reached this office concerning the classification of married men and especially bridegrooms whose undying love did not lead them to the matrimonial altar until after the time they began receiving questionnaires, and, in many instances, after they received formal notice that they had been placed in Class 1-A. Some young men even waited until they had been classified and received notice to appear for induction before that peculiar feeling fully manifested itself.

"Some Board members, from their inquiries, seem to have the impression that all married men should automatically be placed in Class 3-A. This is neither the letter nor the spirit of the Selective Service Law and/or the regulations promulgated thereto.

"On September 16, 1940, at 3:08 p. m., Eastern Standard Time, which was the moment the Selective Service Law was approved, and most certainly on October 16, 1940 (Registration Day), every male person between the ages of 21 and 35 who was subject to registration, had actual notice of his obligation to render military service to his country. The purpose of the Selective Service Law was not to suspend the institution of marriage among registrants, but most certainly the Local Boards, clothed with such broad discretion and wide latitude in such matters, have the right to scrutinize marriages since those dates, and especially those hastily effected about the time the registrants, began receiving their questionnaires and notice of classification, to determine whether the marriage relation was entered into with the primary view of evading military service.

"Of course, in deciding whether a married man, and especially one of these '11th hour' bridegrooms, should be placed in Class 1-A or be deferred because of his marital status, you should keep in mind all of the Selective Service Regulations heretofore furnished you and with which I am sure you are familiar, but bear in mind that after all is said and done, YOU—the various Board members—are the ones, and only ones, who can say whether a certain individual registrant should serve his country NOW or be deferred. Naturally no classification is permanent or perpetual. When a change in status of a registrant is brought to the attention of the Local Board, whether it be by a marriage, birth, death, accident or what not, his classification should be reviewed but it does not necessarily follow that it should be changed. It is needless to reiterate that no harsh rules should be adopted, but that every case should stand upon its own bottom and be decided fairly and squarely so that the Government as well as the registrant shall receive a fair deal. When the Local Boards have thus acted, the Selective Service Law would indeed be shown of all to be assumed that the appellate boards and courts would undertake to upset the classification made by such Boards in cases where it did not appear that they had grossly abused the broad powers conferred upon them.

"It is true that in the beginning of the enforcement of this Act, the induction stations refused to accept married men, and that fact is perhaps largely responsible for the impression gained by so many Board members. It may not be amiss to reiterate just here that all induction stations have now been instructed to accept for induction, providing they are physically fit, all inductees, married or single, sent to them by Local Boards without raising any question as to their marital or dependency status as determined by the Local Boards, because after all with but few exceptions, they are both the 'judge and jury' as to whether a registrant should be answerable to the call of his country."

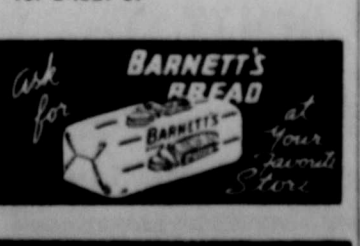

Pioneer Cattleman Dies in Wichita

Carson Wright, 68, died Thursday morning, January 9, at 5 o'clock following a stroke at the Masonic home in Wichita. He entered the home April 1938. He had suffered the third stroke, the first having occurred in 1937.

Mr. Wright was known by hundreds of cattlemen and old time residents in the panhandle of Oklahoma and southwestern Kansas for many years. He was employed as cowboy by Lee Howard, an early settler in Oklahoma having a ranch at the headwaters of the Beaver river, and who killed the last buffalo that was grazing the prairies in the 1880s. Wright also rode the range for the CCC ranch, and for Chas. Summers ranch which was located on the Chiquita creek, a feeder for the Palo Duro river. During his work he has made long cattle drives rounding up cattle for the market. He was an expert horseman, clever with the lariat, and was considered a good cowboy.

Carson Wright was born in Lineville, Iowa January 11, 1873, the son of Charles Wright, known in the early days of this southwestern country as county attorney in Stevens and Seward county.

He is survived by two brothers, Chas. Wright of Cananea, Mexico Burris Wright of this city; two sisters, Mrs. Dolly Nichols of Herington and Mrs. Lilly Smith of Pasadena, Calif.

Funeral services were held at the Miller Chapel Sunday afternoon January 12, at 2:30 o'clock. The A. F. & A. M. lodge No. 300 had charge of the body at the cemetery. —Southwest Daily Times, Liberal, Kansas.

Indians' Hopes Are Running High, But Will Walker Fill the Bill?

BY ART BRONSON

LAST September you couldn't have said the Cleveland Indians to their most rabid rooter for much more than a canceled two-cent stamp.

And little wonder. After apparently clinching the town's first pennant in 20 years, the Indians flopped miserably in the stretch.

But time wipes clean even the dirtiest slate, and with baseball still weeks away, the Cleveland rumble is starting anew. Two factors account for the Indian fans' premature pennant rush:

First Oscar Vitt, who weathered an abortive player putsch in June, has been fired. Roger Peckinpaugh has returned as manager. The fans figure that means harmony and peace on the Indian bench.

Second, Gerald Walker was obtained from Washington in a three-way deal this winter which also brought Jim Bagby from Boston. That, the Cleveland fan tells you, insured needed outfield power for Cleveland.

WALKER, a clown by reputation, joins his fourth major league club in nine years, which should give rise to considerable conjecture. When a player drifts as Walker has, there is usually a good reason for it.

Gerald's longest stretch was at Detroit from 1932 to 1937. In 1934 and 1935 Detroit won the pennant, but Walker was not a regular. In 1937 he enjoyed his biggest year . . . drove in 113 runs on 213 hits for a splendid .353 average.

Then came an amazing move. Walker was traded to Chicago. Despite his hefty batting average, Detroit gave him the gate. Tiger fans were furious at Mickey Cochrane, but the great loss was purely imaginary.

JIMMY DYKES was overjoyed when he landed Walker, but after watching his general indifference to two years, he panned him off to Washington for outfielder Taft Wright. Cleveland's excitables may

find that Gerald's fielding looks a lot different in 154 games than it does in only a few. He has trouble backing up for fly balls. He likes to turn over the more difficult chances to his teammate in center field, especially if the latter can cover ground. He is not a hustler . . . has never been noted for his bursting energy.

All of this—combined with the fact that the Cleveland clubhouse lawyers have won a striking victory in ousting Vitt and will be riding high—may combine to make Peckinpaugh and Walker a couple of unhappy Indian ventures in 1941.

Income Tax On Gross Income

The Revenue Act of 1940 has made important changes with respect to the liability of individuals for the filing of income tax returns. The Revenue Act of 1940 provides, among other things, that, effective with returns for the calendar year of 1940 the personal exemption for income tax purposes in the cases of single persons shall be \$800 instead of \$1,000 as heretofore, and in the case of married persons living together, \$2,000 instead of \$2,500 as heretofore. The act further provides that the gross and not the net income shall be the determining factor with respect to the liability for the filing of income tax returns.

The liability of a citizen or resident of the United States to file a return depends upon his status as a married or single person, and the amount of his gross income. Therefore, every citizen or resident of the United States will be required to file a return for the taxable year of 1940 if his gross income in 1940, regardless of the amount of his net income, comes within the amount specified above for his particular status. A return must be filed even though, by reason of allowable deductions from gross income and of allowable credit against net income, it develops that no tax is due.

While the bureau of Internal Revenue is giving all possible publicity to these changes in the law, it is possible that some citizen or resident, because of a lack of knowledge of the requirements would fail to file returns for the calendar year of 1940 and thereby become liable to the penalty provided by law for such failure. We ask that you get in touch immediately with a person that is qualified to advise you in this matter. If in doubt as to your liability for the filing of a return and if you have no blank return forms available, make request of any deputy collector stationed in your vicinity for the 1940 individual income tax return, or qualified person that has all required forms for your convenience.

Failure of individuals, under the circumstances outlined above, to file returns will subject them to the impositions of the penalty prescribed by law.

Income Tax returns must be filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue before March 15, 1941.

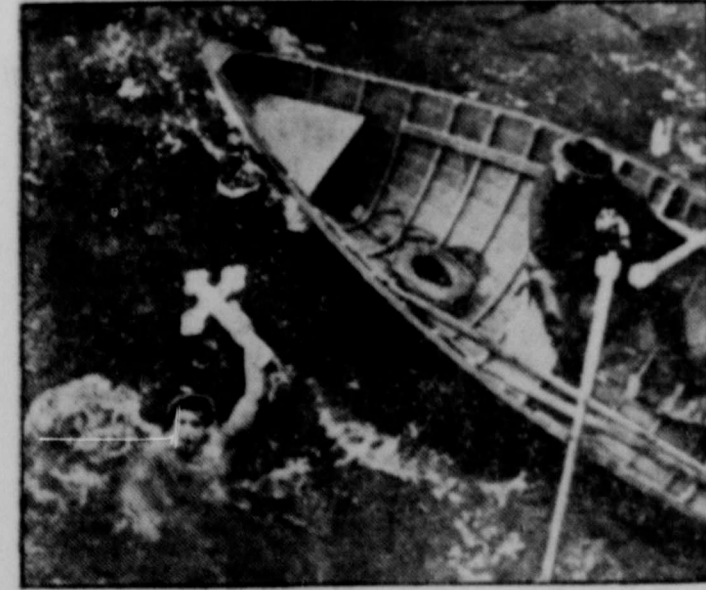

before it is over.

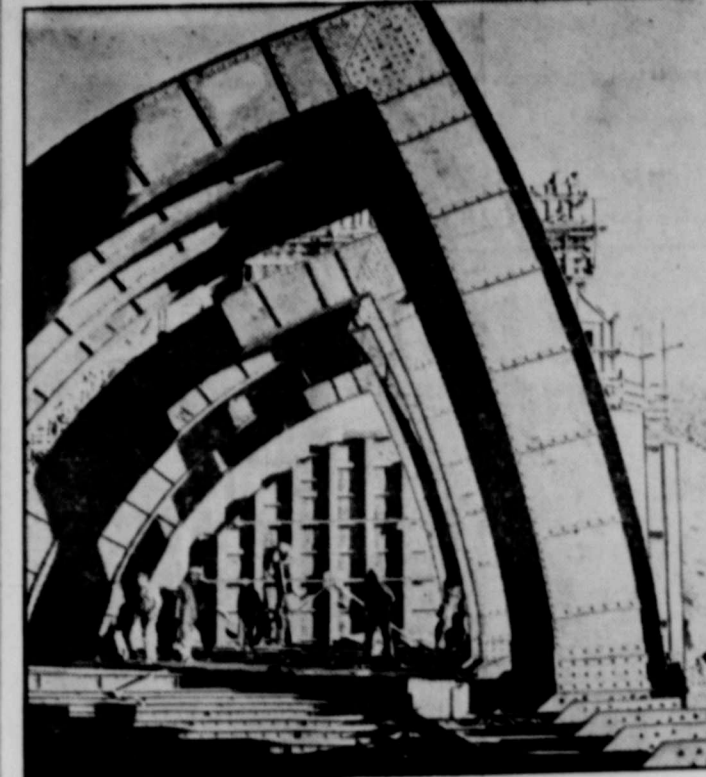
Just such scenes of joy and heartbreak as we saw Wednesday when our boys rolled away makes us stronger than ever for compulsory military service.

Windbreaks Are Urged by Agent

County Agent E. W. Thomas is urging Ochiltree County farmers to make use of the various type of windbreaks adaptable to this part of the country. All farmers who have put out windbreaks report that they are a practical and effective means of beautifying the home as well as being of value as a windbreak.

Last year a total of eight new windbreaks were planted bringing the total for the county to 15.

A practical plan is to put out four rows of trees, starting with a row of evergreens on the South, then a row of Chinese elms, then a row of Russian mulberry on the north.

Under the 1941 Farm Program plan, \$7.50 per acre may be earned by planting trees.

It has been found that snow piles into the three rows to store up moisture nearly every winter. With clean cultivation the trees may be expected to live for several years.

Mr. Thomas points out that there is a variety of cherry that has been found to bear fruit every year, regardless of a late spring frost. This type is known as the Wragg Cherry. R. S. Roberts of the Lone Tree Community has had two trees that have never failed and even bore a heavy crop last year when most of the county experienced a 100 per cent failure on all other varieties of cherries, plums and other fruit.

The county agent's office is locating a source of supply of this type of tree and is hoping that farmers will plant a few of the trees.

Old Well Causes Street to Sink

Shades of the days when Wellington was a new town came back abruptly Tuesday morning when a heavily loaded Walker-Smith Wholesale Grocery Truck broke through the pavement in front of the Mish Dukeminier Feed Store and one wheel dropped into the well which 50 years ago served the O'Neill Hotel.

Although the well was filled up more than 30 years ago, after which the present street was laid, and later paved, the earth which filled the well had sunk approximately 25 feet. City officials were unaware of this and only a few people here knew of the existence of the old well.

The truck broke through about 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, and in order to get the wheel out, it was necessary to jack up the back end of the truck with house jacks. The truck was heavily loaded at the time, as deliveries were being made to local stores.

Lee O'Neill, son of the owners of the O'Neill Hotel, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. O'Neill, recalls that the well was dug by hand about 50 years ago.

"That well was around 70 or 80 feet deep. I know, for I used to have to draw water out of it by hand," he said.

Later a windmill was put up over the well, then about 1908 or 1909 it was filled up.

The O'Neill Hotel was located west of the well, on the lots now occupied by the Hatch Dry Goods Co. and Harrell's — The Wellington Leader.
