Wm. Redding Dead

Dies in California Home; Was a
Former Resident; Honorary
Life Member Masons

Wm. Redding, former citizen of
Ochiltree county, died July 12 at
his home in Glendale, Calif. Mr.
Redding was an honorary life mem-
ber of the Perryton Masonic lodge.
The following account of his de-
mise is from the Burbank Review.
William Redding passed away at
his home at 1311 Alameda avenue,
Glendale, Sunday morning at seven
o'clock having reached the advanc-
ed age of 90 years, 2 months and 27
days. He had been in failing health
for several years and bedfast since
April.

Mr. Reddings was a native of
Keytesville, Missouri, having been
born at that place April 15, 1841.
He had lived in California for the
past ten years, living for a time on
a ranch on South Alameda avenue
this city for some time.

The deceased is survived by his
wife, Mary Ellen Redding, the cou-
ple having celebrated their 67 wed-
ding anniversary last November.
The wife was formerly Mary Ellen
Wood, the marriage having taken
place at Keytesville, November 19,
1863.

Other surviving relatives include
four sons and three daughters, L.
B. Redding of Bloom, Kansas;
Frank Redding, Oklahoma City;
Benjamin Redding, 928 North San-
ta Anita avenue, this city, J. James
Redding, 1751 Lake street, Glen-
dale; Mrs. Eugenia Bronson, of Okla-
homa City; Miss Ora L. Redding
and Mary E. Goodson, 1311 Ala-
ameda avenue, Glendale. Two chil-
dren, Annie and Felix Redding are
deceased. There are 10 grandchildren
and 9 great grandchildren.

Funeral Wednesday
The funeral will be held at the
Powell Mortuary Wednesday morn-
ing at 10 o'clock. The services will
be conducted by Rev. C. M. North-
rup, of the Baptist church. The in-
terment will be at the Forest Lawn
cemetery.

In his active life Mr. Redding fol-
lowed the vocation of farming and
stock raising. For more than 70
years he was a member of the Ma-
sonic lodge having been honored
with a life membership in the or-
ganization a number of years ago.
He lived in Missouri until 1909,
when he moved to Ochiltree coun-
ty, Texas, coming to Burbank in
1921 and to Burbank in 1922. He
had been a member of the Baptist
church and had always lived an ex-
emplary Christian life.

PAVING HEARING HERE WEDNESDAY

JUDGE PICKENS WILL RENDER
DECISION NEXT WEEK ON
INJUNCTION AGAINST
CITY COUNCIL

Judge E. J. Pickens held a special
session of the District Court in this
city Wednesday to hear the plead-
ings for the dismissal of an injunc-
tion which he recently granted to
J. W. Payne et al. in joining the City
of Perryton from proceeding with a
re-assessment of property in this
city for paving purposes. This in-
junction pertains to paving in the
residential district which is already
installed and not to any additional
paving.

The Judge heard the testimony
and pleadings of the attorneys, then
announced that both sides would
submit briefs to him not later than
Saturday, and that he would make
his decision next week. City offi-
cials are very anxious to get this
matter decided as they now have a
plan for refunding the indebtedness
of the city, at a lower rate of inter-
est than is now being paid, but are
unable to proceed until this matter
is cleared up, as some of the paving
warrants involved in this injunc-
tion are involved. Under the new
funding plan, the payment of
heavy principal payments will be
deferred for several years, thus giv-
ing the city time to recover from
the present general financial de-
pression.

FARM TERRACING INCREASES YIELD

SIX YEAR EXPERIMENT FARM
TERRACING AT GOODWELL
SHOWS 35% INCREASE
IN PRODUCTION

GOODWELL, Okla.—Two adjoining
counties of Oklahoma lead all
others in the High Plains region of
the Southwest in regard to the
amount of farm land terraced, it was
brought out by the recent Panhan-
dle District Soil and Moisture Con-
ference held at Goodwell.

Five counties in Texas and Okla-
homa were represented by their
county agents, Hyer, Texas County,
McMurtry, Beaver County; Terpen-
ing, Woodward County; in Okla-
homa, and Went, Hansford County;
and Sheets, Ochiltree County, in
Texas. All of these counties re-
ported interest in terracing projects
and an enlarged program of soil
and moisture conservation in im-
mediate prospect. According to the
principal speakers at this confer-
ence terracing comes nearer to be-
ing "good for what ails you" than
any other farm practice capable of
wide application. If there is too
much rain, terracing is the most
practical way of protecting the soil
from erosion, according to J. W.
Carpenter Jr., of Oklahoma A. & M.
College; and if there is not enough
rain, terracing is one of the most
effective ways of saving water for
increased crop production, accord-
ing to H. H. Funnell, of the Pan-
handle Experiment Station.

Dean C. P. Blackwell of Stillwa-
ter emphasized the tremendous in-
crease in costs of crop production
due to decline in soil fertility, which
could have been prevented by main-
taining terraces, and pointed out
the possibilities which remain, not
only of increasing productivity by
their use, but also of saving the Fed-
eral Government millions of dollars
annually spent in maintaining levee
systems of flood control in all the
major drainage basins of the Cen-
tral United States.

W. C. Sale, representing the State
Highway Dept., stated a definite
policy of cooperation between the
State Highway Commission and
farmers in handling the drainage
water, which comes from terraced
fields at points along the highways
above the natural drainage course.
The results of 1931 experiments
with terracing at Goodwell were
made public at this meeting, show-
ing that terraced land produced
seven and a half bushels more
wheat per acre during the present
season than until terraced. The aver-
age of six years experimenting at
Goodwell showed an increase yield
of thirty-five per cent as a result
of terracing.

BOY RECOVERS FROM ACCIDENT

HIT BY 33,000 VOLT CHARGE
AS KITE FALLS OVER
HIGH TENSION
WIRES

Junior Croft, 8 year old son of
Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Croft who live
in the northwest edge of the city,
is recovering from a 33,000 volt elec-
trical charge received Thursday af-
ternoon at 4:30 o'clock when his
kite fell over a high tension line.
Junior was using a twenty gauge
copper wire on his kite instead of a
string. It is thought that he was
running with the kite to keep it up
when it fell against the line. The
shock from the 33,000 volt charge
evidently knocked him loose from
the wire or burned the wire in two
breaking the circuit.

The burn resulting from the
charge ran down his entire right
side from his extended hand to his
foot except for a gap of six or eight
inches where the current evidently
jumped. He is recovering nicely.

The kite wire was left dangling
from the line with the sparks jump-
ing three or four feet, setting fire
to a stubble field directly under-
neath, however, no damage resulted
from the fire which was quickly ex-
tinguished when employees of the
Texas-Louisiana Power company ar-
rived and removed the kite wire.

It has only been a few weeks ago
that the Herald and other Pan-
handle newspapers carried a story
by the Texas-Louisiana Power com-
pany regarding the danger of flying
kites near and over electrical lines.
Such warnings evidently go un-
heeded until an accident of this
nature occurs. Every precaution
should be taken to prevent another
accident of this kind.

My Experiences in the World War

By General John J. Pershing

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CHAPTER XXXII—Continued
The military representation had become so large that it was necessary to think of some way of disposing of the American troops. General Foch will explain his difficulties.
General Foch then set forth briefly his situation, as follows:
"The powers conferred by the Doullens conference were limited to the co-operation of action between the allies. They were conferred while the action was on. The power to co-ordinate has been entrusted to be limited to the time the allies were in action. That was March 26 at Doullens. Now we are at April 3.

"Now that the two opposing armies are no longer in action but have stopped and are facing each other, there is nothing to co-ordinate. There should be authority to prepare for action and direct it. So we are right back where we were, and nothing can be done until an action starts again."

Lloyd George Pleads for Unity
Mr. Lloyd George then entered the discussion, saying substantially:
"We have had more than three years of this war and we have not had unity of action during that time. During the last year we have had two kinds of strategy, one by Haig and another by Petain, both different, and nothing has been gained. The only thing that was accomplished, was by General Nivelle, when he was in supreme command."

"General Foch is now empowered to co-ordinate the action of the allied armies, but this does not go far enough, as he has no authority to control except by conferring with the respective commanders in chief. He wants authority to prepare for action. I think the resolution made at Doullens should be modified so that we may have a better understanding. I should like to hear what General Bliss and General Pershing have to say."

Pershing Gives His Views
I then gave my view, which was set forth in a brief memorandum prepared in pencil after the discussion began, as follows:
"The principal of unity of command is undoubtedly the correct one for the allies to follow. I do not believe it is possible to have unity of action without a supreme commander. We have already had experience enough in trying to co-ordinate the operations of the allied armies, without success. There has never been real unity of action."

"Such co-ordination between two or three armies is impossible no matter who the commander in chief may be. Each commander in chief is interested in his own army and

cannot get the other commander's point of view nor grasp the problem as a whole. I am in favor of a supreme commander and believe that the success of the allied cause depends upon it."

"I think the necessary action should be taken by this council at once. I am in favor of conferring the supreme command upon General Foch."

When I had finished Mr. Lloyd George came over to where I sat, took me by the hand and said:
"I agree fully with General Pershing. This is well put."

After some further informal discussion, a draft of the resolution was submitted which omitted reference to the American army. Whereupon I called attention to the oversight, saying:
"I think this resolution should include the American army. The arrangement is to be in force, as I understand it, from now on, and the American army will soon be ready to function as such and should be included as an entity like the British and French armies."

"There is no American army yet as such," General Petain interjected, "as units are either in training or are amalgamated with the British and French."

Pershing as U. S. Included
"There may not be an American army in force functioning now," I replied, "but there soon will be, and I want this resolution to apply to it when it becomes a fact. The American government is represented

in the direction of military operations. The commanders in chief of the British, French and American armies will exercise to the fullest extent the tactical direction of their armies. Each commander in chief will have the right to appeal to his government if in his opinion his army is placed in danger by the instructions received from General Foch."

Allied Commander in Chief
The idea of an allied commander in chief had been suggested and discussed many times unofficially, but for various reasons, political and otherwise, it had never been definitely adopted by the supreme war council. With the distrust that existed among the allies, it was not easy to bring about the decision in favor of a supreme commander, and it was made possible only by the extreme emergency of the situation.

The designation of General Foch as commander in chief of the allied armies in France, was proposed by the French. April 15 I received a letter from M. Clemenceau advising me that Mr. Lloyd George had approved the suggestion and asked if I agreed. I replied in a personal note expressing my agreement subject to the confirmation of President Wilson, which came April 17.

Once the question of supreme command was settled the co-ordinated energies of the allied armies could be directed with maximum effect toward a common end. While dark days were still ahead, we were spared the chagrin of inefficiency through lack of teamwork.

CHAPTER XXXIV
Now that the supreme effort must be made on our part and when units were sorely needed for immediate action service it was found, much to my surprise, that, although the divisions then coming to France had been under training for six months or even more, they still contained a large percentage of untrained men.

As already pointed out, the general staff, when called upon to provide men for special services, had relied upon taking them from combat divisions instead of anticipating such requirements and segregating these specialists from the start and training them as such.

This was a most vicious application in time of war of a very objectionable practice that had grown up in our army in time of peace. It appears that during the preparation of our armies in the World War no other plan was followed and the practice was carried to such an extent that divisions with, say 25,000 men, which should have been held intact and each one perfected as an organized team, were constantly called upon to send large groups of their trained soldiers to other duties.

Inspect Available Divisions
In view of their possible early employment I wanted especially to look into the general state of efficiency of our available divisions and give some personal instructions about training. Going the rounds, I met General Hirschauer, who was one of the able French generals, and

found him very enthusiastic about the Second, which had been in line at Sommedieu under his command, confirming my own opinion formed from observation and reports. He said that without doubt it was then as efficient as any of his French divisions. The First was further advanced than any of the others and its morale was high at the prospect of going into the battle line.

Recent developments had brought the question of the employment of American troops into immediate consideration. The President's qualified approval of the recommendation of the supreme war council, as embodied in joint note No. 18, was seized upon by the allies and construed as a concession for the unlimited absorption of our troops in their armies.

No doubt my offer to General Foch lent encouragement to the allied view.
Mr. Baker's visit to our armies during this critical period was fortuitous, as the problems that confronted us could then be seen in their true perspective. He had an opportunity to meet the allied leaders, both civil and military, and get in touch with conditions in the different countries.

Of still greater importance, he saw with his own eyes the building of our organization. He was a keen observer, with clear understanding and a logical mind, and obtained in a short time an accurate conception of our task and its difficulties.

In the next installment General Pershing tells of the First division moving up to the front.
