Grand Jury Returns Nineteen Bills Indictment Perryton School Enrollment Shows Increase Over Last Year

EIGHT HUNDRED ENROLL FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

Light Thursday Evening Approximately 830 According To Supt. W. B. Irvin

Seventy Seniors In Class

Agriculture, Commercial, Home Economics And Manual Training Popular

Over eight hundred pupils were enrolled in the Perryton schools on the opening day of school, Wednesday, according to Supt. W. B. Irvin, and the total by Thursday evening was thought to be approximately 830.

The enrollment for the opening day was as follows: senior high 213, junior high 229, grades 366. This makes a total of 808 pupils enrolled, while a positive check had not been made at the close of school Thursday evening it was estimated that the increases during the day would bring the senior high enrollment to 240, and the junior high 240, and grades 366.

This enrollment is a slight increase over last year, the opening enrollment being 793, with 208 in the senior high, 210 in the junior high and 375 in the five lower grades. Many of the grade rooms are crowded, some with forty-five and fifty pupils. The district has employed three less teachers than were last year which accounts for this condition, but was done in an effort to reduce expenses.

A few changes have been made in the district. The high school pupils are now numbered about fifteen or twenty, have been transferred to Perryton. The New Hope school has been discontinued for this term. The seniors from Ochiltree school have been transferred to Perryton also. The Lone Tree school is being operated without change. Miss Nora Stump, Farnsworth teacher, has been transferred to Perryton and is teaching one of the third grade sections.

J. R. Hewitt has a full class in vocational agriculture, the manual training class is full, the commercial training class is full, the commercial courses are overcrowded and the economics courses are full, according to Supt. Irvin, it will be most impossible to take care of very many post graduates. There are seventy seniors enrolled so far this term.

The transportation system is working out nicely. A few minor changes may be made but as a whole it is functioning very efficiently. There are thirty-six teachers employed in the district, eleven in senior high, seven in junior high, eleven in the grades and seven in the rural schools.

TURN OFF CITY STREET LIGHTS

COUNCIL ORDERS LIGHTS OUT UNLESS FIFTY PER CENT RATE CUT IS GIVEN

Perryton streets have been darkened since the first of the month, following an order by the city council when their request for a fifty per cent rate cut in lighting was denied by the Texas-Louisiana Power company.

The order became effective on September 1 and the only light left burning is the one on top of the water tower. All of the residential, alley and whiteway lights were affected by the order.

According to Chas. E. Whippo, district manager for the power company, a reduction of twelve per cent was offered to the city but as yet no further action has been taken by the council.

According to Mayor Dave Shanks, the action was taken by the council in an effort to economize, following a suggestion from the Tax Payers League.

LET CONTRACT NORTH SEPT. 20

BIDS ASKED FOR 6.747 MILES GRADE, DRAINAGE STRUCTURES AND CALICHE BASE COURSE

The State Highway department are advertising for bids for the construction of 6.747 miles of grading, drainage structures, caliche and limestone base courses from the Oklahoma state line to Perryton on Highway 4, to be opened on September 20, according to A. E. Dyatt, resident engineer.

A number of special labor provisions will be put into effect on this project, according to Mr. Dyatt. Hand labor instead of machinery will be used wherever expedient, the labor to be local men. The minimum wage will be thirty cents per hour and a preference will be given to ex-service men and dependents.

Plans are in for the grading and drainage structures east on Highway 117 to the Lipscomb county line and this project will probably be included in the October letting. Plans are also ready for the first nine miles of Highway 4 south of Perryton to Wolf Creek, which will also be let in October.

The contract on No. 4 from Hemp-hill county to the Ochiltree county line will be made in the September letting it is understood.

HOLD TEACHERS INSTITUTE HERE

FIFTY-FIVE TEACHERS ATTEND INSTITUTE MONDAY AND TUESDAY MORNINGS

Fifty-five instructors in the public schools of the county were in attendance at the annual teachers institute, held in Perryton on Monday and Tuesday mornings of this week.

A good practical institute was held and should prove of value to those present. Rev. J. W. Hendrix spoke on the opening morning, his subject being "And He Appointed Some Teachers". Rev. J. Wm. Hart was the principal speaker for the second morning choosing as his subject, "Home, School and Citizenship".

Supt. W. B. Irvin was in charge of the teachers of the Perryton Independent School district while Judge Oscar C. Flowers presided over the conferences for the teachers of the county schools.

Each teacher brought a short statement giving some new idea on school work. This plan proved of great value in the introduction of new methods of conducting schools and class rooms.

The general theme of the institute was the stressing of "Citizenship". Courses in this subject will be given in all of the schools of the county, the teachers being very enthusiastic on this subject.

Buys Jewelry Shop

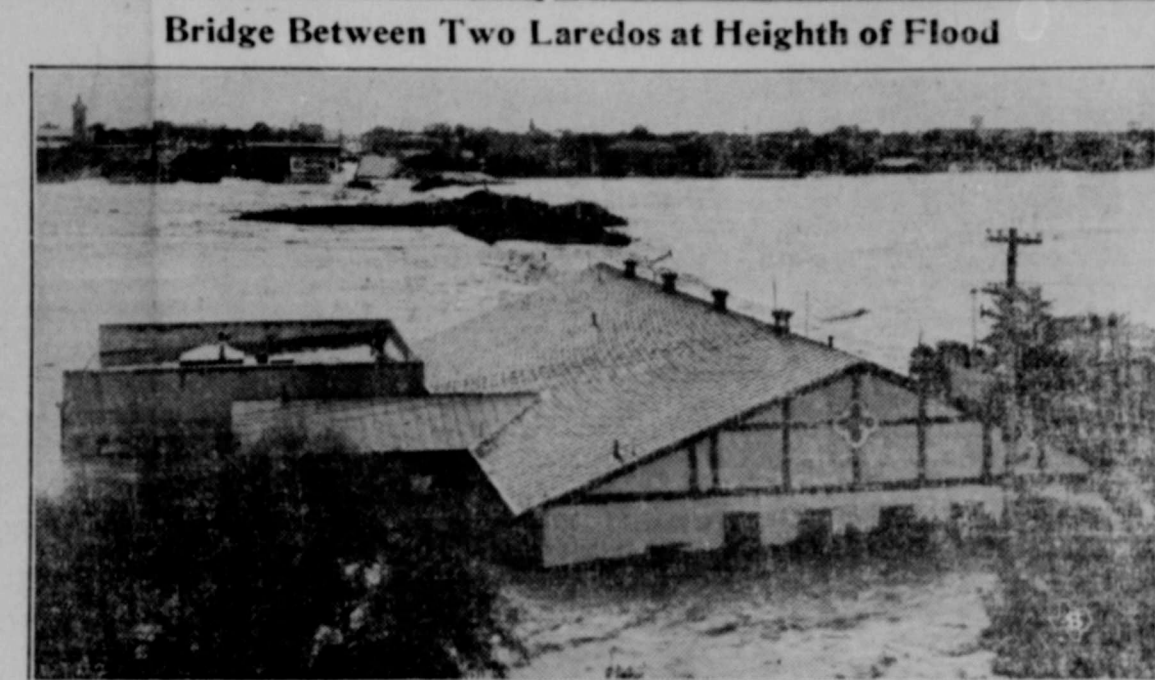
Perryton Drug Company Buys Interest Of Earl N. Davis In Jewelry Repair Shop

Declamation and oratory are also taught. She is a pupil of Margaret Ehrman of Chicago in this branch and pupils entered in contests from her classes have been accorded high places.

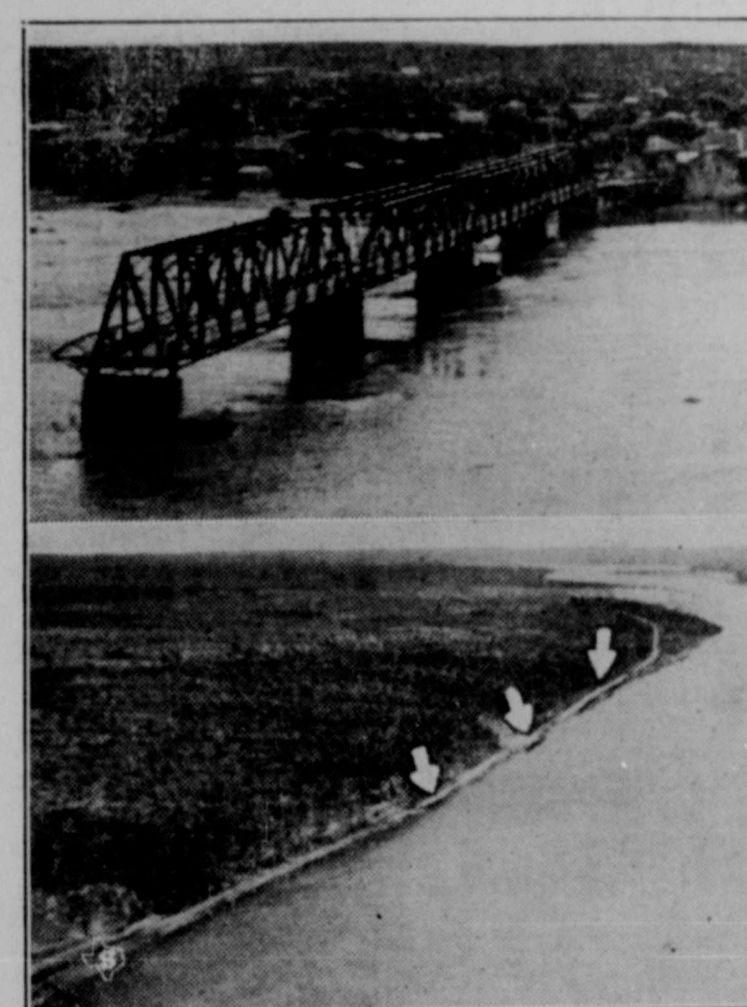
Effective public recitals are given at regular intervals and pupils are given many opportunities throughout the year to exhibit their work.

ARRESTS MADE ON 7 LIQUOR INDICTMENTS

Deputy Sheriff Obtains Evidence On All Seventeen Cases Of Sale Of Intoxicants

Civil Court This Week

Many Cases Disposed Of Following Dismissal Of Jury Panel; Criminal Next

Nineteen bills of indictments were returned by the Grand Jury on Monday and Tuesday of this week before they petitioned District Judge E. J. Pickens for a recess, seventeen of them for the sale of intoxicants, one on a transportation charge and one for unlawful driving of an automobile while intoxicated.

Seven arrests have been made on the indictments, five of them being released on bond and the other two being held in jail. The arrests made are Claud Tennison, charged with transportation, held in jail; Clyde Jones, operating an automobile while intoxicated, released on \$1,000 bond; Wesley Payne, sale of intoxicating liquor, released on \$1,500 bond; Leroy Barker, sale of intoxicating liquor, held in jail; Elmer Dillingham, sale of intoxicating liquor, released on \$1,500 bond; George Trosper, sale of intoxicating liquor, released on \$1,500 bond; Joe Bunn, sale of intoxicating liquor, released on \$1,500 bond.

Of the seventeen sale of intoxicating liquor indictments returned, ten were for the sale of whisky and seven for the sale of beer. All of the evidence in the cases was obtained by Deputy Sheriff Wilbert Gibbins. Gibbins was sworn in as a deputy over a month ago, according to Sheriff J. S. Talley, and has been working since on obtaining evidence. The cases will come up in district court next week, according to County Attorney Max Boyer, who has been assisting Sheriff Talley in the work, in the criminal docket.

The petit jury called for the first week of district court was dismissed Monday, but a number of non-jury cases were heard before Judge Pickens, before court was recessed Wednesday evening.

SCHOOL COSTS & THE PUBLIC

How inexpensive good schools are!—It is one of the tricks of the retrenchment propagandists to set for increases in school costs without taking into account the large expansion in other phases of our life. School costs have increased remarkably, but not so rapidly as have the demands which the public has

made upon the schools. The standard of living has gone up and education is an essential element of that standard. How inexpensive schools are! According to Bureau of Education figures the total expenditure per capita of population for education was only \$16.25 in 1924; \$17.15 in 1925; and \$17.50 in 1926. Divide \$17.50 by 365 and the quotient is less than five cents a day per capita for the cost of educating the nation's children—the most important single activity of organized society.

The United States is saving about fifteen per cent of its income. Certainly a nation which can show such a record need have no fears over the expenditure of 2.68 per cent of its income for education. The health, skill, and purpose of the people constitute the wealth of the nation. To deny youth the adjustment which schools can give is virtually to deny life itself and to destroy the security of this basic human wealth.

Efficiency counts. We need not delude ourselves into thinking that the nation can afford to do less than its best by all its youth. People move about easily and depend much upon each other. We are one in the end and our children will be more intimately dependent upon the intelligence and good spirit of their fellows than we are today. The slow and sure process of education is the only way out. Our people have started upon that way and they dare not turn back, for it is the way of freedom and achievement. All that we put into the schools comes back manifold; we build technical schools and found new industries; we draw four million of our young people into high schools and lay the foundation for a new civilization. We cannot afford to starve education—fundamental alike to individual success and national security. Let us rather insist that money wisely spent for good schools is an intelligent investment which every community should make according to its resources, its needs, and its ambitions for its children.—Prepared by B. B. Lawson, Texarkana.

SCHOOL COSTS & THE PUBLIC

How inexpensive good schools are!—It is one of the tricks of the retrenchment propagandists to set for increases in school costs without taking into account the large expansion in other phases of our life. School costs have increased remarkably, but not so rapidly as have the demands which the public has

made upon the schools. The standard of living has gone up and education is an essential element of that standard. How inexpensive schools are! According to Bureau of Education figures the total expenditure per capita of population for education was only \$16.25 in 1924; \$17.15 in 1925; and \$17.50 in 1926. Divide \$17.50 by 365 and the quotient is less than five cents a day per capita for the cost of educating the nation's children—the most important single activity of organized society.

The United States is saving about fifteen per cent of its income. Certainly a nation which can show such a record need have no fears over the expenditure of 2.68 per cent of its income for education. The health, skill, and purpose of the people constitute the wealth of the nation. To deny youth the adjustment which schools can give is virtually to deny life itself and to destroy the security of this basic human wealth.

Efficiency counts. We need not delude ourselves into thinking that the nation can afford to do less than its best by all its youth. People move about easily and depend much upon each other. We are one in the end and our children will be more intimately dependent upon the intelligence and good spirit of their fellows than we are today. The slow and sure process of education is the only way out. Our people have started upon that way and they dare not turn back, for it is the way of freedom and achievement.

All that we put into the schools comes back manifold; we build technical schools and found new industries; we draw four million of our young people into high schools and lay the foundation for a new civilization. We cannot afford to starve education—fundamental alike to individual success and national security. Let us rather insist that money wisely spent for good schools is an intelligent investment which every community should make according to its resources, its needs, and its ambitions for its children.—Prepared by B. B. Lawson, Texarkana.

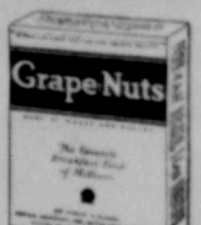

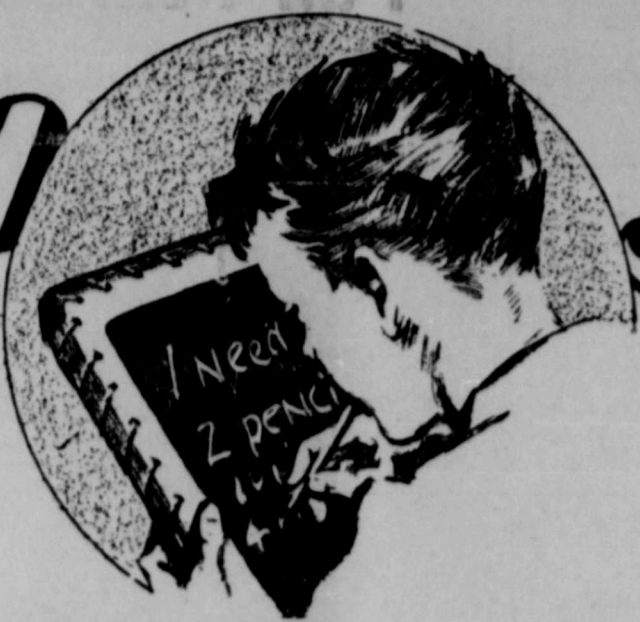

Annual Farm Outlook Meeting Emphasizes Livestock Raising

The increasing importance of livestock in any program of sound farm management and some hope for better conditions next year were among the points emphasized at the annual farm outlook meeting at Beaver, Okla., on August 31.

The increase in the price index for all farm products from 52 in June to 57 in mid-July was given as one of the favorable factors by Peter Nelson, Extension Economist. This is a good gain for this season and under depression conditions. The index for cash crops is the lowest, as is usual when they are plentiful. At mid-July grain stood at 42 and cotton and cottonseed at 41.

For fruits and vegetables, of which there is a shortage, the index stood at 83. Meat animals were next highest at 72, poultry and eggs were 65 and dairy products 63. Among meat animals, beef cattle stood highest with an index of 87, veal calves and lambs were both at 74, hogs 58 and sheep 52.

The price index is the relation of present prices to the average price for the five year period, 1910-1914, counted as 100, Nelson explains. A net reduction in the total amount of wheat in the United States but world crop about the same as last year is indicated by the last reports. Larger corn and oats crops may mean cheaper feed this fall.

While the number of beef cattle is still increasing, slaughter supplies and stock-feeder shipments are still low and storage holdings are below the five year average. It appears that finished beef should occupy a favorable price position for some time, Nelson believes.

Hog prospects are better than a year ago, with a smaller spring pig crop, light storage stocks and fewer hogs in Germany and Denmark.

A small spring lamb crop and good pastures which will mean many lambs will go direct to slaughter, may mean better lamb feeder prices later. Wool prices are low but strengthened recently.

Dairy production per cow is lower in Oklahoma and in the United States, probably because cows are being milked now which normally run with the calves. Dairy storage stocks and consumption are both off compared with last year.

There are a few less hens, but a few more chicks than last year, Nelson stated. Storage stocks of both poultry and eggs are lower which is favorable.

Nelson urged better organization of the farm business and accounts to show how the farm business may be strengthened. His analysis of accounts kept in northwest Oklahoma during the past few years brought out that the more successful farms have higher crop yields, and greater returns per 100 invested in cattle, hogs and poultry than did the operators of the less successful farms. The dairy and egg sales were greater in volume, the man labor expense per acre was lower and other important items including crop sales were better on the profitable farms.

Farmers will find it profitable especially to watch and improve wherever possible the following factors, Nelson urges: crop yields, livestock efficiency, man labor efficiency, power and equipment efficiency, thrift in keeping cash expenses down, volume of business, and number of sources of income.

Sam Durham, Extension Dairy Specialist, reported on the success of attempts to establish test plots of permanent pastures in western

counties. A pasture is very essential to a livestock or dairy program he stated and the establishment of permanent pastures is one step toward economical production. Dallis grass, yellow hop clover and the lespedezas are being tried as the basis for permanent pastures. Reports so far indicate that permanent pastures can be built from these legumes and grasses in the western counties at least as far west as Blaine.

Annual pastures to supplement the permanent are needed, Durham emphasizes. He recommends heavy seeding of a mixture of rye, wheat, oats and barley for winter use. Sudan grass and sweet clover are promising for summer pastures. The clover will furnish pasture after being sown. Sudan planted in the spring offers the most promise of any crop for summer pastures.

Production record, according to A. W. Glasgow, manager of the Oklahoma Wheat Growers, for the past five years show gradual increase in wheat which amounts at the present time to 669,000,000 bushels. This is an increase of 392,000,000 bushels since 1925. The production this year in U. S. amounts to 736,000,000 while it is estimated by U. S. Department of Agriculture our domestic consumption last year amounts to 747,000,000 bushels. This would place us on a domestic basis, if we did not have a United States carry-over of 369,000,000 bushels.

During this crop season wheat prices have been from 5 to 6 cents or more, above a world parity, with a result that a tremendous amount of wheat is piling up in the Kansas City territory. Storage houses in Kansas City report that they now have about 50,000,000 bushels of grain stored in that city.

That many farmers are using the outlook reports and the discussion of the situation in regard to the various farm enterprises in planning their work for the coming year was emphasized by Fred Merrifield, District Agent of the Oklahoma Agricultural Extension Service. While this information is not final, as conditions change during the year, the discussion and facts are the best guides available.

That a system of farming which includes livestock is growing in favor and is most promising under the present outlook, was another point

Merrifield stressed. Such a system requires more legumes and pastures, he said, and a number of crops are proving promising for this purpose. Mung beans and some varieties of cowpeas are showing up well in most localities.

Smut treatment of seed wheat is not expensive and is profitable, he pointed out, calling attention to the heavy dockings in most counties this season due to smut. This loss is easily avoided and may make the difference between profit and loss.
