

BIGAMIST IS SENTENCED

He Trades Happiest Days For 2 Years

Happiest 26 days of his life have cost James C. Prince two years of freedom.

He was sentenced here Thursday to two years in prison after pleading guilty in 32nd District Court to bigamy.

Those 26 days he said, were when he was with Rosa Pineda Prince, whom he married here May 6 in a civil ceremony.

However, he had not bothered to obtain a divorce from Jo Ann Miller Prince, to whom he was wed in Kansas in 1953.

Prince, 29, was taken into custody early in June in Los Angeles, where he had gone with his second bride. He was traced there after Rosa's father, Jesus Pineda, filed a bigamy complaint with District Attorney Eldon Mahon.

When sentence was pronounced Thursday in court the bigamist couldn't quite understand what all the trouble was about. He couldn't see any crime in "marrying the girl you love."

Earlier, from his cell in Mitchell County Jail, Prince had written the Colorado City Record that he would kill himself rather than be separated from his second wife.

"The 26 days we were together were the happiest days of my 29 years of life," he wrote.

"I had no intention of doing wrong," he continued. "But if what we have is so big a crime, I am ready to die for there is no freedom left in this country as far as I am concerned."

"If a person can't live and be happy in a world of trouble and with a wife that has told you she never loved you and don't love you now... I will die."

However, by the time he appeared in court to plead guilty, Prince had decided a term in the penitentiary was much better than suicide, love or no love.

"I was just real low the other day when I wrote that letter," he told authorities, "but I'm all right now."

Mrs. Palmer was born Aug. 23, 1892, in Collin County. She and S. K. Palmer were married in Grayson County Sept. 1, 1911. The couple moved to Mitchell County 29 years ago. Palmer is engaged in farming in the Payne-Seven Wells community.

Mrs. Palmer is survived by her husband; her step-mother, Mrs. Effie Boswell of Quanah; two daughters, Miss Kathleen Palmer of Colorado City and Mrs. Zelma Brintle of Pittsburg, Calif.; three sons, Melborn Palmer of the home, S. K. Palmer Jr., of Los Angeles, Calif., and Hubert Palmer of Borger; nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Also, four sisters, Mrs. Tessie Pegans of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Jewel Barkley of Panhandle, Mrs. Olean Cummings of Quanah and Mrs. Neoma McAfee of Amarillo; three step-brothers, A. B. Kyle of Childress, L. B. Boswell and Coyet Boswell, both of Quanah.

C-City Pair Due FFA Scholarship, Degree

A couple of Colorado City Future Farmers are in line for top awards when the State FFA convention convenes July 15-17 in Austin.

They are Clyde Feaster, who was graduated from Colorado High last spring, and Robert Holman, who will be a senior at Colorado High next fall.

Feaster will receive the Anderson-Clayton cotton scholarship award which will furnish him \$200 each year in the college agricultural studies.

The coveted Lone Star farmer degree, highest award within the State FFA organization, will go to Holman.

Proud tutor and sponsor of the award winning pair is

James Trammel, vocational agriculture instructor at the high school.

Feaster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Feaster, who live on Star Route in Buford community, will enroll in the fall at John Tarleton State College in Stephenville.

Notification of his earning the Anderson-Clayton scholarship was received this week.

Trammel from E.C. Weekley, executive secretary of the State FFA.

The scholarship winner last year won the Lone Star Farmer degree at the state convention.

To gain the Anderson-Clayton award, Feaster had to complete an outstanding record in cotton production over a three-year period.

He has projects in cotton, milo, pigs for pork, cows for calf production, calves for beef—all carried on while studying vocational ag at Colorado High.

Earnings from his program of projects have added up to approximately \$700 for the year.

Holman will become the 59th Colorado City youth to receive the Lone Star degree. No more than two per cent of the state FFA can receive this award.

Eligibility for the degree requires a boy to be an active member of FFA for at least one year.

City Featured In Dowell's Magazine

Colorado City is featured in the current issue of Dowell's Extra, monthly publication reporting activities of Dowell, Division of Dow Chemical Company.

Front cover of the magazine, plus three pages of photos and data are included in the Colorado City coverage.

The article relates a brief history of the city, points to the Permian Basin discovery well at Westbrook, reports the industrial diversification with Texas Electric Service Company's Morgan Creek Plant, Col-Tex, and its pipe line terminus.

Emphasis also is on the city's ideal location for water—sports and industry—as it is in the heart of West Texas' lake area between Champlain Creek, Lake Colorado City and Lake J. B. Thomas reservoirs.

County's Bond Sales Climb To \$132,962

Savings Bond sales in Mitchell County for the first five months of 1959 totaled \$132,962.

The total is 45.8 per cent of the county's entire 1959 goal, according to J. C. Pritchett, executive vice president of City National Bank and bond committee chairman for the county.

Sales for the county in May were \$16,284. Goal for the entire year is \$290,000, third highest in the eight-county District 14.

With highest percentage of sales is Dawson County with 92.2 per cent already. However, Dawson's goal for 1959 is only \$114,000—less than half of Mitchell.

Gaines, with \$70,433 of a \$140,000 goal, has sales amounting to 50.3 per cent of its '59 goal. Other percentages are Andrews, 34.3 per cent of \$66,000; Howard, 29.9 per cent of \$852,000; Martin, 24.3 per cent of \$51,000; Scurry, 32.4 per cent of \$429,000.

Average for all of District 14 is 37.6 per cent, less than one per cent of the 38 per cent state average.

Cooperating with the Tech agricultural engineering department in presenting the workshop were National Cotton Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, representatives of the cotton industry and other Tech schools.

Museum Project Gains 51 Charter Members

Fifty-one persons signed Friday night as charter members of Colorado City Museum Association.

Their memberships were turned in at a citizens meeting in Civic House that mapped plans for immediate activation of the museum project.

The more than 30 persons attending the meeting voted to continue the charter membership drive until Aug. 1, with all persons joining the association within this period to become charter members.

Purpose of the membership drive will be to enlist interest and support for a three-point program to:

1. Provide funds for renting American Legion Hut, corner of Chestnut and E. Third, to provide two floors for museum displays.
2. Hiring of a curator to prepare and catalogue all museum articles for display.
3. Carry out a search for items of historical significance to be given or loaned to the museum.

4. Prepare the museum site and obtain adequate display containers so that all items in the museum may be kept safely under lock and key.

Importance of the membership drive to obtain support for the museum was emphasized by R. H. (Harry) Ratliff, temporary chairman, who reported:
