Few Negative Votes Cast, Is Report

Heavy Balloting Seen As Demonstration Of Community Spirit

Big Spring voters were flocking to the polls today to give the \$50,000 West Texas hospital site bond issue what promised to be the most positive approval ever accorded a bond proposal in the history of the city.

Of more than 300 votes cast at 1:45 p. m., reports around the city hall were that less than a score had been tallied against the issue. There were indications that the 25-1 radio established on early balloting was not only holding steady, but growing stronger. However, there were no accurate reports to be had.

Unified Spirit

Rumors of the overwhelming majority only stirred the electorate to hurry to the polls to join in the parade of approval, demonstrating the most unified spirit of community confidence ever shown in Big Spring.

At 1:45 p. m. 312 votes had been cast in the election, more than half of the total vote estimated on the eve of balloting. No other reports appear to be any slack in the voting. Since the polls opened at 8 a. m., an average of almost one voter a minute had been maintained.

A ruling from the attorney general, received here after voting got under way Thursday, permitted holders of real property to render and vote provided they hold poll taxes or exemptions and reside within the corporate limits.

Voting will continue until 7 p. m. with W. R. Purser, election judge, in charge. He indicated that the total vote could be given minutes after the polls close.

Meanwhile, proponents of the issue worked to get out a big "con-ence" vote for the issue. They seized upon the election as a means of showing the state board of control, which designated Big Spring as the location for the new West Texas hospital for the insane, that Big Spring was almost unanimous in its willingness to cooperate.

Nominee Talk Widens Demo Party Rift

Statement Made That No New Dealer Should Be Selected

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—A proposal from Senator King (D-Utah) that the 1940 democratic presidential candidate be a man from outside the new deal's inner circle emphasized today the fundamental split within the party.

Opposed To McNutt

King said the nominee should be someone like Senator Byrd of Virginia, Clark of Missouri, or Bailey of North Carolina. He asserted he could not "second the nomination" by Senator Minton (D-Ind) of Paul V. McNutt.

King was one of the leading opponents of the Roosevelt court bill and the three senators he named also were opposed to the measure as well as many other new deal proposals.

McNutt, former Indiana governor and now American high commissioner to the Philippines, is described by his friends as seeing eye-to-eye with the new deal.

At the same time, King discounted the possibility of a permanent split within the democratic party, forecasting that it would "continue as the progressive and liberal party of our country."

Barkeley's View

King's statement came on top of an assertion by Democratic Leader Barkeley of Kentucky that the democratic party had beaten off "attempts to divide or weaken it," and a "no reprisal" edict from Democratic Chairman Farley.

The postmaster general suggested, however, in a press conference yesterday the possibility of reprisals from the voters against senators and congressmen who had failed to support the president.

So far as the administration is concerned, Farley said, "there will be no reprisals."

Farley refused to get into the discussion of possible 1940 candidates. He said he did not know whether the president would run for a third term.

Farley said he had recently been through most of the states and there was no doubt that "President Roosevelt is just as popular as when he was elected last November."

WOMAN FOUND DEAD ON THE HIGHWAY

TYLER, Tex., Aug. 26 (AP)—Mrs. Minnie Pearl Gerard, 22, of Tyler, was found dead on the Tyler highway near Arp last night, after officers said, at least two automobiles had passed over the body.

City Marshal Jim Bradford of Arp, who was investigating the case with the Smith county sheriff's department, said an arrest was expected soon. Officers were working on the theory that she had been riding with someone.

Her mother, Mrs. A. C. George, told authorities the victim had been in poor health since her fifth operation two years ago.

18 ARE EXECUTED FOR ESPIONAGE

NANKING, Aug. 26 (AP)—The Chinese government announced tonight that 18 persons, including three women, had been convicted of "espionage on behalf of the enemy" and executed. All were Chinese.

Four of the 18 were physicians who had been trained in Japan. One was a newspaperman, serving an obscure news agency.

All but one were accused of furnishing military information to the Japanese. That one was said to have been divided the Chinese government's decision to block the lower Yangtze river.

SURVEYING THE COUNTY BUDGET—

Economies Planned In Road-Bridge Fund; Courthouse To Be Repaired

This is the second of a series of three articles on the proposed county budget, public hearing on which will be held Monday at 1 p. m.

Salient points of the proposed county budget for 1938, calling for expenditures of \$129,767, are planned economies in the road and bridge fund, an extensive remodeling program for the courthouse, further savings in the officers' salary fund, and a normal reduction of the outstanding indebtedness to bring it below the \$200,000 mark.

In preparing the budget, the county judge foresaw no great difference in anticipated road and bridge revenues in pegging the figure at \$72,225. It amounts to about a thousand dollars less than the

probable figure for this year, and \$2,000 more than for 1936. His estimated \$65,000 from registration of motor vehicles is probably conservative inasmuch as it is three thousand and under this year's safe estimate, and \$1,500 under 1936 receipts.

Suggested expenditures for principal items from the fund are interesting. Commissioners will garner their usual salaries amounting to \$7,200 a year. There will be no \$10,000 borrowed money to repay as was necessary this year.

Maintenance of the county's system of dirt roads is estimated at \$31,500, about \$500 less than allotted for this year, but far under the 1936 total of \$74,701.46. Of the maintenance appropriation, \$5,500 is for wages, \$4,000 for material and supplies, and \$2,000 for equipment operation.

A big saving is anticipated in capital outlay with only \$1,000 set aside for purchase of new equipment and \$500 for purchase of right-of-way. This year the outlay is supposed to be \$35,375, of which \$16,000 is for new construction and \$18,375 for equipment purchase.

Thus, expenditures from the trouble-making fund are estimated at \$68,086.19 for 1938 against \$85,655 for the current year, and \$89,962 for 1936.

As for the interest and sinking fund, the county will retire \$16,500 during next year from the outstanding debt of \$202,000. Of the \$27,145 requirement of the interest and sinking fund, the state will care for \$10,758.15 as its share of the good roads bond and viaduct warrant issues. The \$24,628.40 resources, including a \$13,000 balance, is far more than ample under the needs.

No Cash Carry-Over
General fund revenues are placed at \$33,046 for next year, under the \$37,315 for this year, and the \$58,619 for 1936. The difference flows principally in the lack of a cash carry-over.

Wage Demand Is Rejected

Brotherhoods Call For Walkout Of 250,000 Men

CLEVELAND, Aug. 26 (AP)—A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, announced today that committees representing five railway brotherhoods had authorized a strike for Sept. 6 to support demands for a general 20 per cent wage increase.

Whitney said the committees, carrying on negotiations at Chicago, set 6 a. m. of Sept. 6 as the time for members of the brotherhoods to begin leaving their jobs.

The organization involved, he added, are the Trainmen, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and the Switchmen's Union of North America and the Order of Railway Conductors.

The membership of the groups totals approximately 250,000 men, Whitney said.

The nation is to be divided into four zones, Whitney added, with walking out on a different day—the strike to become entirely effective by Sept. 9.

Details as to the zone boundaries, he said, are to be worked out today. Broadly, they would be the eastern, southwestern, southwestern and southern sections.

Federal mediation, which may be requested by either side in the dispute, would automatically postpone the strike for 30 days. The national mediation board, failing to arbitrate the dispute, may request the president to create an emergency arbitration committee which must report within 30 days. Neither side may take action until a 30-day period has elapsed after its decision.

In Agreement
"I received word of the hour and date for the start of the strike from my Chicago office," Whitney explained. "All our representatives there are in agreement."

"We are now taking care of the details of the strike here and instructions will be sent out in circular form later today."

Concerning possible federal mediation, Whitney said the committees would have to take such a step under consideration and that there would be no "automatic" 30-day delay as a result of such intervention.

Three weeks of conferences between brotherhood representatives and a committee of 15 acting for the railroad industry ended yesterday in Chicago, in a flat rejection of the unions' petition for a 20 per cent pay hike.

Union spokesmen said a strike call had been sanctioned by 97 per cent of the workers in the event a satisfactory adjustment was not obtained.

Petitions Denied In Move For Damage Suits In School Blast

ENDERSON, Aug. 26 (AP)—W. E. Youngblood, county judge of Bask county, said today he had denied two applications by Oklahoma attorneys for the appointment of Robert A. Moosman of Wilmington, Del., as administrator for victims of the New London explosion.

Howard A. Berry, an Oklahoma City attorney, was quoted there yesterday as saying 200 suits for damages on behalf of parents of the victims had been prepared for filing next week.

Berry said the suits would be filed after the Bask county court acted on his petition to have Moosman appointed as administrator. Berry said the suits would name a Delaware gasoline company.

He said he sought the foreign administrator because the company is a Delaware company. Should the petition be denied, he said, he would bring suits in state district court for \$5,000 or less in each case, and in federal district court at Tyler for higher damages in each case.

No damage suits in connection with the case were on file in the office of District Clerk M. G. Wright at Henderson.

INCIDENT MAY LEAD TO INTERNATIONAL COMPLICATIONS

London Ambassador To China Shot From Plane As He Travels In Car Displaying Empire's Flag

SHANGHAI, Aug. 26 (AP)—International complications of the undeclared Chinese-Japanese war increased ominously today as a Japanese warplane shot and seriously wounded the British ambassador to China and the Japanese navy threatened to include foreign shipping in its blockade of China's coasts.

Sir Hugh Knatchbull-Hugessen, the British envoy, was shot while motoring from Nanking to Shanghai. The ambassador's party was traveling in two motorcars, both flying large Union Jacks.

Fifty miles from Shanghai two Japanese planes swooped down. The first sprayed the two cars with machine gun bullets. The second dropped bombs after the cars had stopped.

Rushed To Hospital

Lieut. Col. W. A. Lovat-Fraser, military attaché, was knocked unconscious by a bomb explosion when he alighted from his car, but was not wounded.

The ambassador was hit at least twice, in the left side and stomach. An official British statement said there was no doubt the planes that attacked him were Japanese.

He was rushed to the country hospital in Shanghai's international settlement, where surgeons found one bullet had lodged near the spine without fracturing it. They expressed hope for his recovery, although he was greatly weakened by loss of blood.

Chinese and foreign diplomatic circles in Nanking received news of the affair with expressions of horror and dismay. They understood Sir Hugh was on his way to Shanghai to discuss with Shigeru Kawagoe, the Japanese ambassador, the possibilities of ending the Shanghai hostilities by diplomatic agreement.

Expressions Of Regret
British embassy attaches said the ambassador also was anxious to survey arrangements for evacuating British nationals from Shanghai to Hongkong.

High Japanese officials were quick to express their sorrow. Japanese ambassador, secretary of the Japanese embassy, called at the hospital on behalf of the ambassador, Shigeru Kawagoe; Vice Admiral Tadao Honda, naval attaché of the embassy, called to express the navy's regrets.

Messages of condolence also came from Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, head of the Chinese government, and other Chinese officials. A spokesman for the Japanese embassy deplored the attack on Sir Hugh and said the airman evidently had mistaken the red and blue British flag on his automobile for a Chinese emblem of the same colors.

He declared the ambassador should have had a flag large enough to drape over the whole roof of his car.

On the battlefronts around Shanghai, Chinese defenders meanwhile had fallen back on a broad front, while the Japanese army had established a firm foothold on the Yangtze coast north of Shanghai for the landing of divisions from the homeland for extended operations to drive the Chinese from the vicinity of Shanghai.

A spokesman for the Japanese navy declared that "foreign shipping along the China coast may be harassed by Japanese warships patrolling the area."

This would be an extension of the blockade against Chinese shipping.

Britain Will Deal With Japanese

'Appropriate Action' Promised In Wounding Of Envoy

LONDON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The British government announced tonight it was preparing to deal "appropriately" with the Japanese government on the wounding of Sir Hugh Knatchbull-Hugessen near Shanghai.

This "appropriate action" will be taken as soon as his majesty's government obtains "further information" on the grave international incident.

That was the gist of a foreign office communique issued after Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden had returned to his desk from holiday to take charge of the situation.

Eden was described authoritatively as having taken the air raid incident under "very grave consideration."

Blockade May Affect Neutrality Action

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The possibility became apparent today that any extensive Japanese blockade of the China coast may influence vitally President Roosevelt's decision on whether to apply the neutrality act to the undeclared war of the Far East.

Informed persons said blockade interference with foreign shipping to China could be recognized by neutral governments as legal evidence that war existed.

Thus far the American government has taken no action toward invocation of the neutrality act apparently holding the official position that despite all the fighting war is not legally underway.

Secretary Hull was receiving hourly dispatches on the blockade threat.

Should the threatened extensive blockade result in a change in the official American attitude and possibly in invocation of the neutrality act, shipments of arms, ammunition and other materials of war from this country to either belligerent would be stopped.

Commercial relations with the two countries would be put on a cash and carry basis.

SIGNS MEASURE TO TIGHTEN TAX LAW

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—President Roosevelt signed today the measure to close loopholes in the income tax law.

The measure, requested by the president to curb what he termed tax evasion and avoidance, is expected by experts to increase tax revenues by from \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000 a year.

The White House made public a letter from Acting Secretary Taylor of the treasury saying his department was "happy to recommend prompt approval of this bill which will operate to close a number of serious loopholes in the revenue laws through which large amounts of revenue have been lost and still larger amounts would have escaped in the future."

Boy Killed In Grade Crash

Three Others Hurt As Train Strikes A Milk Truck

MINERAL WELLS, Aug. 26 (AP)—A 13-year-old boy was killed and three other persons were hurt when a train hit a milk truck at a crossing here today.

John Houston "Jack" Baugh, riding on the rear of the pickup truck, was killed.

J. W. Ellington, 15, was in serious condition at Nazareth hospital here. He was on the rear of the truck.

Curtis Ellington, his father and another son, Billy Ellington, 8, who were in the front seat, suffered injuries. Ellington, driver, had a fractured elbow and shoulder and the boy was severely bruised.

The accident occurred at the eastern city limits of Mineral Wells. An empty freight car struck the truck as a string of cars was being backed to a brick plant on the tracks of the Weatherford, Mineral Wells & Northwestern railroad.

DEFICIENCY MEASURE SIGNED BY FDR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—President Roosevelt signed today the third deficiency bill, appropriating \$87,662,000 for various government departments and agencies.

The measure also authorizes the use of \$68,000,000 of tariff receipts for subsidies to cotton farmers in connection with a government effort to stabilize the price at 12 cents a pound.

The bill also carries \$10,000,000 to start the farm tenancy aid program and another \$10,000,000 for retirement of submarginal lands.

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Many Advantages Claimed For New Style Truck, With Cab Over Engine; Models To Be Displayed Here



The swing to cab-over-engine trucks and the growing popularity of that type of vehicle among truck operators is another example of history repeating itself, according to A. H. Shroyer, GMC truck dealer in Big Spring. He points out that in the early days of the truck industry, the first motor trucks had the driver's seat installed in a commanding position right out in front, with engine underneath. Today's trucks follow similar lines. Although the pleasing appearance built into the front end and construction of the modern GMC cab-over-engine trucks is a spur towards its increasing popularity, the real reason for its increased use is because the basic advantages of this design have become highly important in meeting the requirements of today's legislation as applied to overall length. Less overall length for a given loading space makes for ease of handling in congested traffic, particularly in narrow streets and where limited "turn-around" space is available at loading docks. Fund To Make Farm Tenure More Secure

Economist Warns Peasantry Tendency Must Be Checked

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (UP)—Education in land-use will be stressed in the farm tenant aid program approved by congress and the president, department of agriculture officials said.

Officials said the appropriation authorized in the bill — a maximum of \$70,000,000 after three years—can hardly begin to purchase farms for the nearly 3,000,000 tenant farmers.

"Our real goal is security of farm tenure, whether by tenants or owners," A. G. Black, chief of the bureau of agricultural economics, said.

"Tenancy in itself is not to be deplored so much as the things which have gone with tenancy in the past," he said. "Insecurity of tenure makes for depletion of soil through over-cropping, excessive depreciation of buildings and other equipment, and 'erosion' of the farm family itself."

No Immediate Cure

"Despite everything the nation can do, we might as well make up our minds that we are going to have a considerable amount of tenancy in this country for many years to come," Black said.

He listed four proposals which he said "seem to have the most promise as workable tools for bettering land tenure conditions."

Working out of greatly improved relationships between landlords particularly through leases which recognize a third party, the public at large.

Public assistance to farm owner-operators, present and prospective through better credit arrangements and fair interest rates.

Encouragement of plans for variable payments, such as crop payments, which would tend to diffuse the risk of crop production and shifting price levels between buyer and seller.

A continuous program of education to discourage land speculation, excessive land valuation and over-capitalization of land."

Reward for Good Works

Improved relationships between tenants and landlords should provide compensation to the tenant for unexhausted improvements, set up minimum requirements with respect to soil management and reward stewardship of the land, Black said.

Long-time and recent trends in the direction of fewer farm owner-operators, more absentee ownership, more tenants and a decline in the equity in farm lands held by land occupiers are "alarming in many instances," he said.

During the past 55 years — the period for which statistics are available — the proportion of tenant farmers has increased steadily. In 1890, one out of every four farmers was a tenant. Now 45 out of every 100 do not own the land they operate.

"Even these figures," Black said "do not present the true picture, because of debt the actual equity of operating farmers is far less than the figures indicate. In some states the equity of operating farmers is little more than one-fifth."

Each year 40,000 farm-owners lose all equity in their land and become tenants, or wage earners. The United States is no longer a country of predominantly owner-operators, Black said. Millions of farmers are slipping rapidly toward conditions worse than the peasantry of Europe, he said.

Cotton Consumption Rated

RALEIGH, N. C. (UP)—A report released here today showed North Carolina led all states in consumption of cotton during May, 1937 with a total of 388,764 bales. Near rival was Georgia with 122,217.

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Sees Budget Balanced By Next Year

Cannon Thinks Emer- gency Spending Can Be Stopped

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Anting Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) of the house appropriations committee predicted today a balanced budget next year through reduction of all appropriations.

"By 1939," he asserted, "we shall begin making payments on the na-

tional debt." The debt now stands just under \$37,000,000,000, the largest figure in history.

"For the first time, the condition of the country is back to where we expect, to discontinue or drastically curtail emergency activities," Cannon said.

While Cannon looked to next year, treasury officials said a probable revision of budget estimates for this fiscal year might show federal finances in better shape.

They said enactment of the law to close tax loopholes and the "freezing" of a part of appropriations already made to departments would make possible a substantial reduction in the prospective 1938 deficit.

Increased revenue, bigger repayments of loans and larger returns from self-liquidating construction projects should be important fac-

tors, Cannon said, in spurring income and outgo.

Some appropriation bills, Cannon said, may be cut as much as 30 per cent under those of similar bills for this year. He said it ought to be possible to slash the relief appropriation 25 per cent.

SAFE IS ROBBED

DALLAS, Aug. 26 (AP)—Safe blowers escaped with between \$400 and \$500 in cash and \$500 in checks early today after a safe in the office of the Continental Oil company refinery had been blasted. Residents three or four blocks away said they felt the explosion. Officials said the safe top was blown through the galvanized roof of the office and was found in the yard.

"40,000 AGAINST THE ARCTIC,"

by H. P. Smolka; (Morrow: \$3.50)

H. P. Smolka is a Viennese, correspondent in London for a Vienna paper. He is reasonably portly, and looks well fed. He is also very much interested in Russia.

This accounts for the fact that one day he was asked to tea at the Russian embassy where Prof. Otto Schmidt was to speak. Schmidt told at length about Russia's achievement in Siberia, about the new empire aborning in that frigid land—cities forming where only a few scattered natives lived; railroads building, gardens growing, mines being sunk.

Smolka was a little skeptical. This sounded to him like another of those wild tales out of a wild land. Schmidt suggested that Smolka go see for himself, and in the summer of 1936 that is what he did. "40,000 Against the Arctic" is the book he (inevitably) produced. Its basis is a set of articles written for the London Times.

He found it true that Russia was developing this once waste land. He found there the foundation of great cities; in the less northerly parts of Siberia there already are cities with true skyscrapers—one of those inexplicable faults of Soviet judgment, since in Siberia there is space for 30 times the population, probably much more.

Gardens are being grown along the arctic shores, and mines plunge their shafts through permanent ice. The northeast passage is open for navigation (with reasonable luck) for three months a year, and a remarkable system of air transport supplements the small boats on certain rivers. Convicts are used extensively—the GPU camps are not as bad as sometimes they are painted, it appears to Smolka.

Sonachously or otherwise, however, Smolka has made a picture of a capitalist society in the making. There are wide differences in pay and opportunity; saving, inheriting and so forth is possible; the objectives are those of a capitalist country; one may have servants; a life of idle luxury is possible and actually is had by certain members of society such as the airplane pilots' wives.

Primarily, all this Arctic development is for military defense, according to Smolka. And the Soviets have given the development concession to a company modeled after the East India company.

Tasty Smoked Pork Cuts Make Delicious Meal

By MARTHA LOGAN

Here's a conundrum: "When's a ham not a ham?" And the answer is: "When it's a picnic."

The point is that shoulder cuts of pork are cured and smoked in much the same way as the hind leg (ham), but these forequarter cuts may not be called ham, according to a ruling of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

There are several different sizes of smoked cured shoulder cuts. The whole shoulder is called a "picnic" and may be purchased with the hock on or hockless. This is a fine, flavorful piece of meat and reasonably priced. It varies in size from four to 14 pounds. A picnic may be cooked like a ham. It may be simmered in water until tender, then skinned, glazed and browned. Or the picnic may be baked in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.), allowing about 30 minutes to the pound. Then skinned and glazed.

Other economical cuts of cured smoked shoulder pork are the boneless cuts from the shoulder end of the loin. These are sold under various brand names and differ in tenderness and desirability, according to the original quality of the meat. As to size—these cuts vary from about one pound up to seven pounds so that they are suitable for the small or large family. These boneless cuts are best prepared by long, slow cooking in moist heat. We have found that it requires 30 or 40 minutes per pound to produce tender meat.

Green string beans cooked with one of these pork cuts make a delicious dinner dish. The savory, smoky flavor of the meat blends with the fresh bean flavor in a natural unobtainable combination.

Another vegetable and pork dish is made by cutting a head of cabbage into eighths, then boiling it in the liquid in which the smoked shoulder pork was cooked for 15 or 20 minutes. To serve, slice the meat and lay on top of the mound of cooked cabbage.

There are so many ways of using these cuts of pork that taste like ham. Here are a few that we think are especially good:

Ham Loaf
3 cups uncooked ham (ground),
1 small onion (chopped),
1 egg,
1-2 teaspoon sage,
1 cup chili sauce,
1-2 teaspoon salt,
1-8 teaspoon pepper,
1 cup cracker crumbs.

1 teaspoon mustard.
Combine ground ham, onion, beaten egg, and seasonings. Then add cracker crumbs and chili sauce and mix thoroughly. Place in a well-greased loaf pan and bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Serve hot or cold. Serves 6.

Ham a la King
2 cups diced cooked ham,
2 cups milk,
2 tablespoons flour,
2 tablespoons butter,
3 tablespoons diced green pepper,
1-2 teaspoon salt,
1-2 teaspoon mustard,
1-8 teaspoon pepper,
1-1-2 cups sautéed mushrooms.
Melt butter in sauce pan, add flour and mix until smooth. Then add milk and cook slowly, stirring constantly for 5 minutes. Add seasonings, mushrooms, green pepper and diced ham. Continue cooking for 5 minutes. Remove from fire and serve over slices of well buttered toast. Serves 6.

Ham Salad
2 cups cooked, smoked shoulder pork,
1 cup celery, cut in small pieces,
1 green pepper,
3-4 cup finely chopped sweet pickle.
Salt to taste,
Mayonnaise, lettuce, radish roses for garnishing.

Combine diced ham, celery, and sweet pickle with one-half of the green pepper, finely chopped. Season to taste with salt. Add mayonnaise to moisten. Place in a mound in the center of a lettuce cup. Cut the remaining half of the green pepper into shreds. Decorate salad with the shreds and radish roses. End pieces, left over, and small pieces of ham are ideally suited for use in this salad. This salad is also very good served in a tomato cup.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The veterans administration notified sides of Representative W. R. Poage of Waco, Tex., today it plans a complete reorganization of the administration in Texas, with new headquarters at Waco.

Under the present setup, the administration has regional offices at Dallas and San Antonio. Plans announced by Administrator Frank T. Hines call for retention of offices in those two cities for contact purposes, and the establishment of a new office in Houston, also for contact purposes.

Read Johnson, now manager of the San Antonio and Dallas regional offices, will be assigned to Waco as director of all veterans affairs in Texas, the announcement added.

General Hines' letter to Poage read, in part:

"A thorough study has been made, having in view the establishment of a permanent centralized facility for the future handling of services to the veterans of your state. As you know, the veterans administration has recently completed a large addition to its facility at Waco, which increases the bed capacity of that institution from 308 to 837 and provides a modern administration building from which all matters affecting veterans in Texas may be directed. Through the utilization of the extensive equipment of this facility, it is believed the highest possible standard of service may be rendered to veterans of your state."

"It is contemplated that the veterans' administration's administrative activities will be centralized and operated from the new administration building at our facility at Waco, and consequently regional office activities at Dallas and San Antonio will be directed from this point."

Regarding the offices to be maintained in Dallas and San Antonio and the new office to be set up in Houston, he said there would be retained "sufficient personnel would be necessary to render contact and suitable medical and legal services to the veterans residing in those cities and their environs."

He said the establishment of such centralized facilities has been shown by experience to greatly improve service to veterans, and added:

"While our plans for Texas do not contemplate a complete combination of the hospital facility at Waco with the centralized administrative activities, it will permit the elimination of duplicate activity and effort and at the same time make available to the veterans of Texas coming to Waco a complete medical staff and will also permit a coordination of medical activities throughout the state."

Improvements For agricultural and livestock purposes, \$2,500 is set aside, all but \$100 going to agent's salaries.

In the matter of permanent improvements, \$1,000 is set aside for additional landscaping of the courthouse lawn since the commissioners court's successful experiment on the northeast corner of the property. For extensive repairs and changes to the 30-year-old courthouse, \$10,000 is appropriated. A tax calculated to bring in \$9,600 will virtually care for these expenditures.

Fugitives From Bahama Isle Must Face Trial For Possessing Guns

SANTIAGO, Cuba, Aug. 26 (AP)—A tattered band of fugitives from Great Inagua's uprising waited in jail here today for trial for possession of arms, despite the intercession of the United States consul.

The 14, five white United States citizens and nine negroes, British subjects, were in rags, having used their clothing for sails on the disabled motor launch that brought them to the Cuban coast Tuesday morning.

They had spent five drifting, terrifying days in the open boat without food or water, after fleeing for their lives from Great Inagua, an island of the Bahamas. Natives rioted there over the attempted arrest of one of them accused of mistreating a child. One person was killed.

The small arsenal the refugees carried brought their prompt arrest by Cuban rural police, who suspected them of being a revolutionary expedition to Cuba.

The United States consul had informed Cuban authorities that the fugitives were known to him as peaceful persons. He visited the prisoners last night.

The leader of the refugees was Dr. Dudley Arthur Fields, port health officer at Great Inagua.

Charles E. Kaddy of Fort Worth, Tex., was among the Americans in the group.

Authorities said they probably would be brought to trial tomorrow.

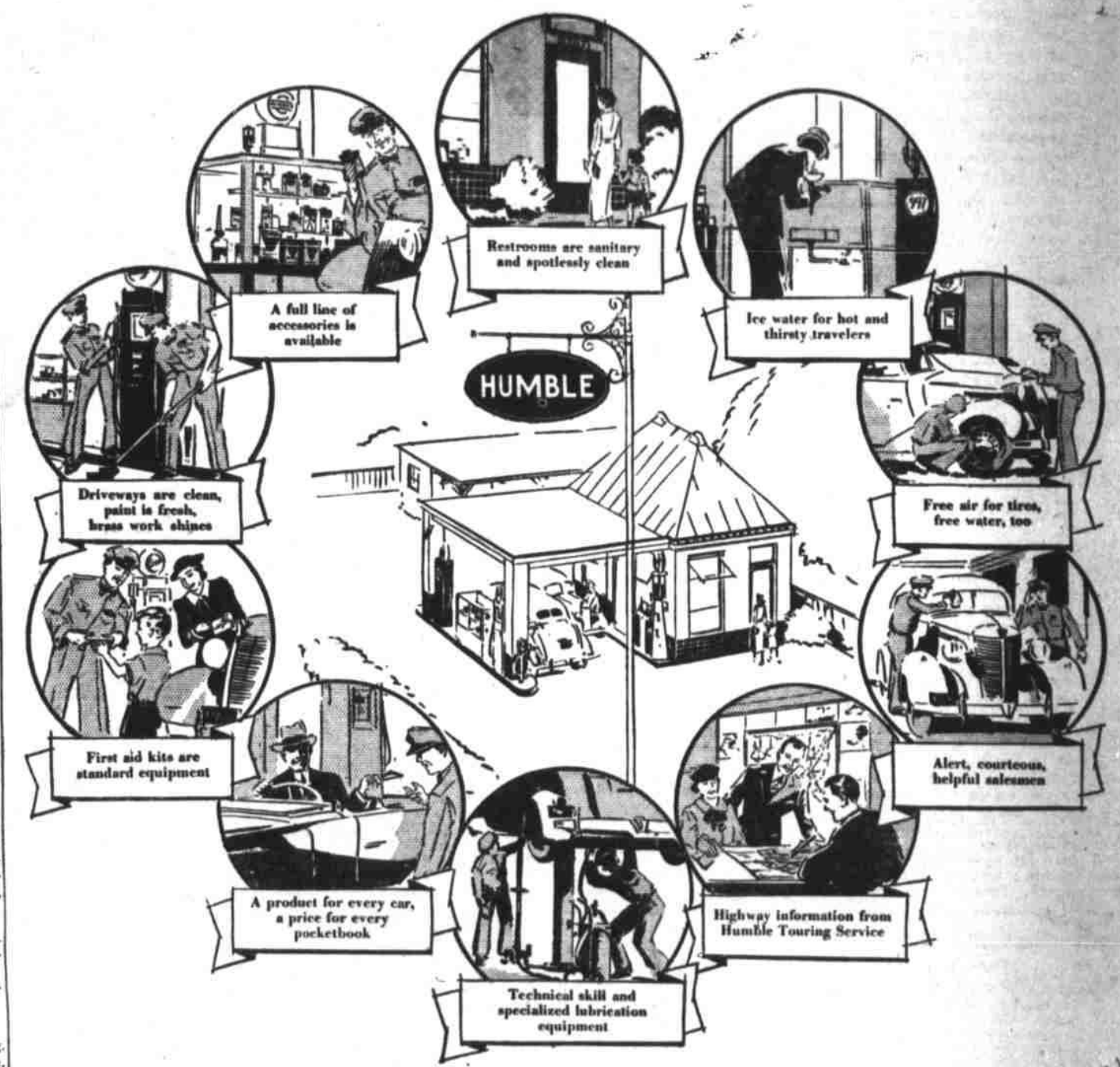

Rebels Occupy Santander

Govt. Loses Last Important City On Northern Coast

HENDAYE, Franco - Spanish Border, Aug. 26 (AP)—Insurgent columns rode proudly into Santander today in formal occupation of the government's last important city on the northwest Spanish coastal ledge.

The city was hung with the red and gold flags of Spain's insurgency. The streets were jammed with cheering Santanderese.

Formal occupation came at 11:45 a. m.

Detachments numbering several thousand already had penetrated the city to quell vengeful terrorists.

Insurgent sources estimated that about half of the Spanish government's defeated army of some 50,000 was caught in a 15-mile square trap in the rolling country south-east of Santander, still unaware that "the city of perpetual spring" had capitulated.

The defense of the Biscayan seaport had been shattered by 12 days of swift thrusts by Generalissimo Franco's far superior war machine—a defeat that may decide Spain's 13-month-old civil conflict.

Fleeing men, women and children streamed into France on any craft that could carry them over the water.

While Franco's advance guard waited today for the command to occupy Santander, supporting columns occupied Ramales and Ampuero to complete encirclement of those parts of the government army that had not already surrendered or fled to the west before the insurgents plugged the route to Oviedo province.

Miss A. R. Caton, a British child welfare worker, picked up at sea from a small boat in which she was fleeing with 13 Spanish children, was brought to Bayonne, France, by the British destroyer Keith, along with other refugees.

She said many had been shot by anarchist terrorists before Santander fell.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 26 (AP)—American Pilot Jimmie Mattern prepared to return to the United States today while two planes cruised the Arctic in search of six Soviet transpolar fliers.

Mattern, the only American in the search, withdrew because his plane was not equipped for Arctic flying. He had joined the hunt in hopes of repaying Sigismund Levaneffsky of the missing crew for saving his life in Siberia four years ago.

Canadian Pilot Bob Randall left Barrow, northernmost Alaska settlement, yesterday to overtake Soviet Pilot Zadkoff with a message, contents of which were not revealed.

Randall then planned to cruise about 30 miles inland eastward to Barter island.

COPPERMINE, N.W.T., Aug. 26 (Canadian Press)—Sir Hubert Wilkins and his flying boat returned to Coppermine late last night after an unsuccessful search over Beaufort sea for Sigismund Levaneffsky and his missing transpolar comrades.

Another flight will be made over the polar area after the flying boat has been refueled and when there is more favorable flying weather.

M'GRADY SILENT ON REPORTS HE'LL QUIT FEDERAL POST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Edward F. McGrady refused comment today on published reports he would resign as assistant secretary of labor in the next few days and enter private industry.

The report, published in a New York newspaper, said, McGrady would leave the labor department September 1 and become labor relations adviser for the Radio Corporation of America.

The labor department said he had not submitted a resignation. He arranged, however, for a conference today with Secretary Perkins.

McGrady's resignation would be effective September 1.

Suit Types For Fall And Winter Include All-Occasion Styles

Wardrobe And Costume Ensembles Are More Versatile This Season Than Ever Before; Practical Note

Suits offer so much interest this season, that it is hard to imagine anyone assembling a fall and winter wardrobe, without getting at least one suit. There are types that serve double purposes, making them quite as practical as they are handsome.

Collar Versatility

Among the versatile features of the new suits are their collars which are smartly styled to often be convertible; many coats can be worn over other dresses and jacket suits because they're so similar to the regular casual coats; fur topcoats accompany many wardrobe suits, which of course can be worn with all other fashions; there are center closings to jackets, which are refreshingly new; pockets de the dramatic ranging from one to sets of four on jackets, and sometimes on topcoats too; the collarless jacket, in cardigan silhouette is excitingly youthful; there is so much that is effective done with stitching treatments, belts, buttons and buckles, and shoulders put up a smart front.

Three-Piece

First in attractiveness, is the three piece wardrobe suit which may be fur trimmed, self trimmed or with an accompanying fur topcoat. In these suits the coats are completely tailored just as separate coats are, with the addition of de-

tailing repeated from the suit jacket itself.

In all suits skirts take on new character, with center kick pleats, panel seaming, or gored panels or box pleated sections. In line with the straight-and-slim silhouette, dressier suits have straighter skirts, with one occasionally showing the youthful slight flare at front.

Hip-Length

Youthful, indeed, and this season, decidedly wearable, are the hip length suits which appear in softly man tailored styles, or even more casual styles. Ideal under fur coats these little suits are also smart under casual cloth coats, and can be enjoyed throughout the winter as well as all fall. The man-tailored type comes in grand men's wear wools, while the casual suit is in the softer, monotone wools such as Shetlands and tweeds. The latter are particularly characterized by attractively new center button closings or extreme side closings, unbuttoned. Pockets are tricky, and the trend is as feminine in detail as possible.

Dressy suits considerably offer a choice of two distinct types. The most youthful being the hip length suit, the jacket definitely fitted and trimmed with fur in a spare-

but dramatic fashion. Little collars proving more attractively new than larger ones. The box coat suit is the second smart type, although the jacket may vary from brief to seven-eighths length. Flat fur seem preferred in these suit types too, and are used amusingly though with restraint.

The Cape Again

Those women who took to the cape suit last spring and wish for it again, will have no trouble finding it interpreted for dressy wear, with fabric or fur cape, although for cool weather it is more practical with a dress than a blouse and skirt.

Costume Suits

Speaking of dressy clothes, we should consider the costume suit which, this season offers all that is elegant, opulent, and femininely alluring. Grandeur is expressed in the fabrics and in the fur trimmings; and it is emphasized by the new silhouette which plays up the feminine figure admirably.

The dress of the costume suit may be any of the season's afternoon fashions, or it may combine fabric with a metal or velvet or embroidered top. Most effective of all sleeves are those made entirely of fur, preferably the bulkier types such as squirrel, kolinsky, and mink.

The jacket may be in boxy silhouette, in fitted hip length silhouette, or for true distinctiveness, it may be a cape or a long fitted coat. More costly—but practical, because the jacket can be used for formal evening wear as well, is the costume suit with a jacket entirely of fur and usually fingertip length.

Sport Suits

We haven't forgotten the sport suit—but it is the simplest of the season's style variations. Without fur, but to be worn under casual fur coats, the distinguishing thing about these little sports suits lies in the colorful fabrics of which they are tailored, the precision with which they are made, and the simplicity of the topcoats in the three piece version.

Knitted Togs For Children Favored

Littlest girls will be wearing three piece ensembles, consisting of sweater, bolero and skirt. Another favorite is the two piece jumper dress with embroidered top and suspender-skirt, usually gored or pleated for swing fullness. Another type popular with tots is that of plaid-front cardigan with plain back, worn over plain pullover or blouse, and slightly flared skirt.

For Sub-Dolls

Older sisters seem to prefer blouse-styled sweaters with contrasting skirts; the three piece suit of cardigan, pullover and contrasting skirt, the pullover being plaided, checked, striped, or most novel of all, treated in smoked effect. Another junior favorite, is the plaid skirt that is high-waisted, worn with a solid color pull-over sweater that has a little knitted belt tied around its waist.

Because knitted clothes can be worn many times without requiring cleaning they're an economy; and because they are so neat on the young figure, they're gratifying. Girls love knits—and the more they have, the better.

Jackets of silver fox are the newest of designs for afternoon and evening wear, and the loveliest of evening wraps are floor-length coats of luxurious skins. Single or double pelts encircle the arms of the new fox evening coats, harmonizing with the graceful sweep of floor-length skirts which spread to fullness from fitted waistlines.

Fox capes of various lengths from brief shoulder designs to more elaborate knee-length types are distinctive, and ermine forms exquisite evening wraps of brief or long cape design. Ermine is used effectively in a tailored knee-length evening coat fashioned simply with long sleeves and loose-cut skirt.

Black furs are favored for afternoon, but brown is being shown for wear with bright colors and for sports wear for the coming season.

COTTON FABRIC IS TESTED ON ROAD

PENNSBORO, N. J. (UP)—Cotton fabric is being tested as a highway surface on an experimental strip of road near here.

New Season's Waistline Lower

Draped Effect With Belt, Or Models Worn Beltless

Fashion is riding on a merry-go-round, now to the tune of 1930 inspiration, then to the slow rhythm of sculptural influence, still again to the mingling daintiness of the Directoire era, on to the exoticisms of East Indian suggestion, and yet again to the ladylike loveliness of the Gown with the Wind epoch of fashion history.

Each influence is but subtly felt, and taken all in all, we find they slender down to two opposites in dress silhouette—the one pencil slim and straight, the other with slightly flared hemline occasionally even going to the extreme of an all-around pleated version.

Bodice Treatment
Outstandingly important, whether the skirt be straight or flared, is the treatment of the bodice, which offers enough variety for every woman to want to own half a dozen dresses at once, rather than be content with one new frock.

Who can forget the introduction of the corset line in the Duchess of Windsor's wedding gown? It introduced a new feeling in the soft draped treatment gathered down to a girdled, slender waistline.

A little easier to wear, however, is the dress without the girdled silhouette, which nevertheless retains draping through the bodice, tapers to a softly draped waistline, usually belted and continuing to a pencil-narrow skirt. For the woman who likes front fullness, a draped effect is sometimes gained by cascading treatment released to a young, center-front fullness.

Fascinations
There's so much to talk about in the new dresses that we just can't tell you everything here—you'll have to visit the shops and see for yourself. A book could be written about necklines alone—which are softly treated, whether high or low, and lots of jeweled clips—some of them very massive—are used to emphasize the soft gathers or drapes.

Sleeves are fascinating, too, not only because they have shoulder interest, in darted, padded, folded, softly draped and wide lines, but because lengths vary widely. There'll be any number of full-length sleeves, but the push-up bracelet sleeve will be the youthful favorite, making way for stunning gloves and handsome bracelets. And even the really short sleeve—elbow and slightly longer, will continue, for afternoon and sport dresses.

It is to be understood that the dress type of which we have been speaking is the regular daytime dress, which forms the greater percentage of most wardrobes. The outstanding thing about it, is that it has taken on great dressiness, by means of dressmaker ingenuity.

Trimming Detail
We have already spoken about drapery, in sculptured effect, with cording, or shirring, or "smocked" manipulations; but there will also be a great deal of tucking, zippers in matching or contrasting color not only to secure the sculptured silhouette, but for ornamental detail as well.

In more elaborate types, jewelry is used as clips, pins and belt buckles, some with mirror and metal as well as synthetic gems. Embroidery too, occurs again and again, in sequins for belts, sashes and borders, as well as metal, braid, soutache, and other types of colorful embroidery.

Another influence via the Duchess of Windsor, is applique, in gold kid, in satin and velvet, and for winter, there will be a great deal of fur applied to these costume-like daytime fashions.

And so we might go on, and on, describing the treatments, the silhouettes, the fabrics and colors, which will make this the most capricious season of fashion woman has enjoyed for over two decades! But it is so much more fascinating for you to see and try on these clothes, than to merely read about them!

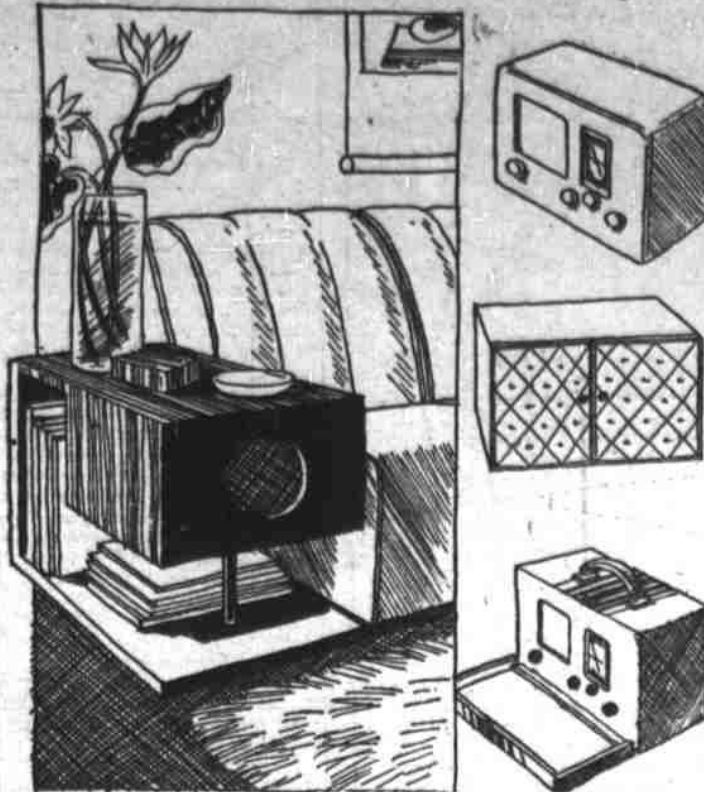

MORE STUDENTS DUE IN PRIVATE SCHOOLS

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Private educational institutions throughout the country expect a large increase in enrollment this fall, a survey made by the educational department of N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., reveals.

The survey shows that 98 per cent of the private schools expect to have as many or more pupils

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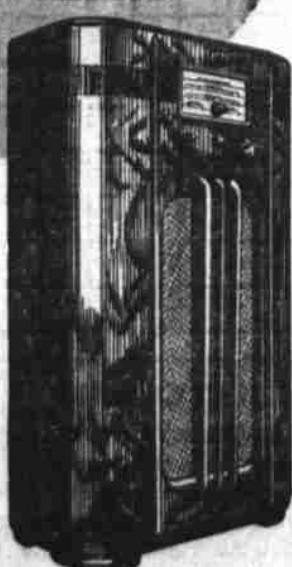

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System Now To Be Perfected

Rejection by the voters of the proposed amendment to withdraw the straight salary system of compensating district, county and precinct officers means that the counties of Texas will have to go through further processes of straightening out the situation they are confronted with at present. Admittedly, the salary system has some defects, but we think many of these can be removed.

There are two major responsibilities in the matter. The legislature has one, in that it should discharge its obligations to some of the counties by appropriating funds to reimburse them for salary payments due for work performed by county officers for the state.

Commissioners' courts have the other. They can hold down the size of staffs and can hold down salary totals, if they will.

Inherently, there is nothing wrong with either the straight salary system or the old fee system. If faults develop, they are the faults of public officials. If some officers profiteered by indiscriminate arrests and prosecutions under the old fee system, their greed alone was the cause. If straight salaries were set too high or out of line with previous actual income records, only the commissioners' courts and the officials who lobbied for such salaries can be blamed if the officers' salary funds go into the red and transfers are required from the general fund. If such deficits are permitted to continue, it will be because officials have not taken proper steps toward readjustments.

If straight salaries are to be retained, let them be set up and maintained on an equitable, sensible basis. The people will not approve of salaries out of line with work done, the service rendered, and the fee or other actual value of the office.

The commissioners' courts have the moral right to set salaries at levels commensurate with the officials' work and the county's ability to meet the payroll. That is the right they will have to exercise.

If these things are done, and they doubtless will be; and if the legislature does its part toward perfecting the present arrangement, we shall, no doubt, in the future reach a more satisfactory basis.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON—That old relief headache has bobbed up again on Capitol Hill and seems to be digging in to welcome the congress back in January.

Congress and the relief problem are a little like the cranky mountaineer who peered out his cabin door at the mob of youngsters in the yard and shouted:

"Those o' you belong t' me, gel in the house. And those o' you don't, get on home."

Congress is just that confused a father to the unemployed.

Though it has shoved billions down the chute to them in the last four years.

Actually, the "unemployed" have never been defined. They were such a hungry lot in 1933 there was no time to do it, and it hasn't been done yet.

Is a widow who makes \$4 a week embroidering dollies at home unemployed if she can't feed her brood on that \$4? Is a youngster who was graduated in 1935 and never found a job unemployed? How unemployed is a man who gets \$200 a year from a canning factory but can't make it stretch the whole 12 months, and can't find another job?

It's Nothing New

In the year ending June 30 WPA spent \$1,899,069,166 on jobs for 1,656,533 people. More millions poured through the social security sieve to poverty-stricken blind, aged and children. Still more millions are keeping the CCC boys off the ratifiers.

Yet every congressman's mail has pleas from people who can't find any government cash-register open to them, and can't find a job.

To make matters more complicated Senator Harry Byrd of Virginia keeps loudly demanding a balanced budget.

There's a faint hope on the Hill that maybe relief bills could be cut if the relief problem could be reduced to a simple system. In the last few weeks several efforts in that direction have bobbed up to remind congress that "the poor, ye have always with you."

Census Proposed

Just a few weeks ago the newly named Associate Justice Hugo L. Black pushed through the senate a bill to take a census of the unemployed. He wants it "on or before" April 1, 1938. It is estimated the census would cost \$5,000,000.

Immediately Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, who engineered the war draft, denounced the plan as clumsy and needlessly expensive. He wants all relief cases to register on a given day.

Then Johnson's argument was popped by trained relief workers. They say some people would register at four or five different places just to be sure they got relief.

There have been other congressional eruptions of the problem. In the house, Rep. Maury Maverick of Texas rounded up 28 others to sponsor a bill asking for an unemployment commission to investigate the whole subject of destitution and to report back when congress meets again.

In the senate an unemployment investigating committee is planning hearings in the fall. They will report when congress convenes again.

As a result the congressional bill-of-fare for 1938 bids fair to dish up relief. And with the 1938 elections around the corner that may look to congressmen like a sensible diet.

"MISS A—in some scene for a current production. Unfortunately

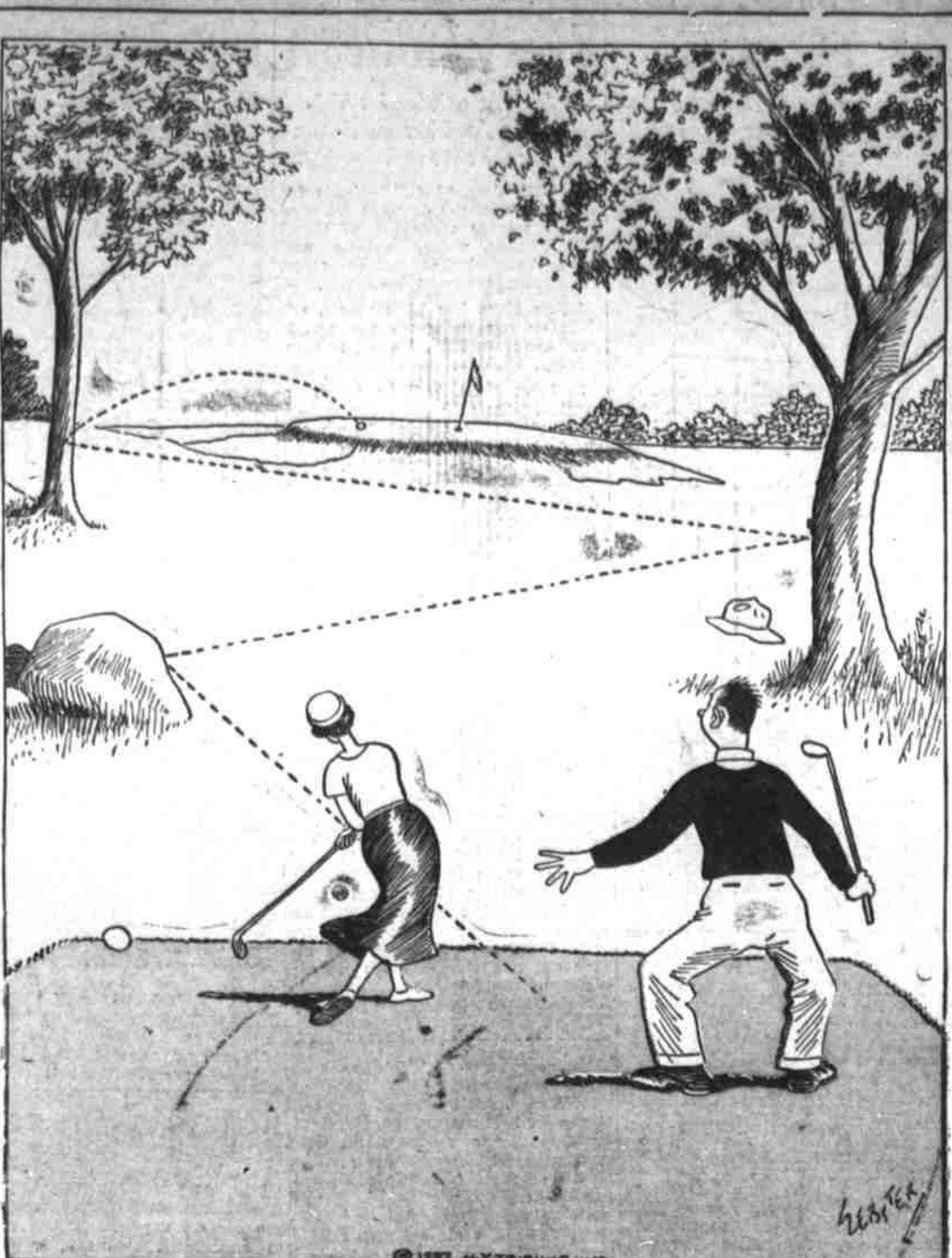

PARIS, Aug. 26 (UP)—Eskimo hoods on fur and cloth coats are a novelty note in the new winter collection of Heim. Fitting snugly about the head to ward off icy winter winds, the hoods are designed so that they may be removed without spoiling the effect of the coat. Contrasting fur edges the hoods of cloth coats in the group and in baby seal and beaver hooded designs, linings of hood and coat are of the same material.

A note of luxury is evident in all of the dresses and coats in the Heim collection which depends on richness of fabric, intensity of color and detail for its distinction. Lavish in the use of fur, it appears in panels on the fronts of coats, is swirled about sleeves and makes immense collars for cloth coats. Silver, red and blue fox are placed vertically in panel design to form handsome evening coats.

Simple sports dresses in unusual colors are made in soft wools and on dark frocks, braid and contrasting wools in scallop design are of Yugoslavian origin. Paris Exposition Gives Models Blank Faces, But What Gowns!

PARIS, (AP) — Tomorrow's modernism is on view in the forms and the frocks that fill the Pavillon de l'Elegance where top-notch dress-makers of the French capital are staging their own big show, in the midst of the Exposition.

The forms are made of plaster in bluish pink. They are elongated mannequins that strike unusual attitudes, some reclining, others standing with raised arms. They have no features, just rough plaster faces. Coiffures, however, are coiled and curled to the last plaster hair.

Nudism Enters
Only two or three mannequins are allotted each exhibitor. All are costumed for evening.

The reclining forms have wide-skirted frocks spread over the floor like Gargantuan fans.

The slim upright figures are wrapped around and around with sculptured draperies that are finished in scarf-like ends that sweep the ground.

Nudism, too, plays its part.

Schlaparelli's plaster model wears a corset of flowers — and leaves her printed frock, straw hat and red sandals on a plaster chair nearby.

The bluish-pink limbs of Lanvin's reclining mannequin are plainly visible through a petticoatless skirt of champagne-colored chiffon that is weighted with embroidery of gold and silver nails.

One of Vionnet's mannequins is dusted with gold from top to toe and is robed magnificently in a stiff white gown Queen Elizabeth would have been delighted to wear. The skirt, which stands out in Elizabethan style, is cut into an open pattern like lace. Its bodices is twisted and draped. The entire garment is fashioned of a heavy fabric washed over with thin white plaster flaked with gold.

Three Blue Goddesses
Worth's three goddesses are specialists in blue. One wears a sculptured gown of blue crepe. Another is dressed in a white gown draped with a lovely shawl of blue transparent velvet. The third which holds a mass of blue flowers in her arms reclines in a dress of blue lace over white chiffon, the wide skirt spread flat over the ground.

Alix takes the palm for skirt width. Her dress of rainbows-colored chiffon is fifty to sixty yards around the hem. Its layers and layers of different-colored flounces billow over the Exposition floor.

Big lacquered white plumes are mounted flat and stiff over white mousseline in a glamorous gown designed by Patou.

Daytime Coats Are Longer

Shorter Skirt Of The Dress Revealed By Open Front

PARIS, Aug. 26 (P) — Daytime coats with straight skirts nearly ankle-length and several inches longer than the dresses with which they are worn, are a novelty interpretation of the uneven hemline in Molyneux's winter collection. Simple in line, the coats are opened at the front to reveal the shorter skirt of the dress.

Evening gowns at Molyneux have draped, slit skirts, full-hooped skirts in deep-hued velvets, or calf length flared skirts. Handsome restaurant costumes, worn with immense turned-up hats are shown ankle-length, some with slit skirts and often deep-cut backs, are revealed under fitted, long-sleeved jackets.

Voluminous floor-length capes plain or with broad collars of mini-nearly to the waistline, are among the luxurious evening wraps in the collection. Others are draped, scarf-like, in fabrics matching the gown with which they are worn. Full-length tailored evening wraps follow the princess silhouette and

long chiffon scarfs are looped about the neckline and hang to the hem of the gown.

Tailored suits in magentas, grayish greens and Molyneux's new "désain green" repeat the suit tone in soft wool for the blouse, while black suits and jacket dresses employ a contrasting deep color for relief.

Braid trim is used extensively for daytime frocks in black wool and crepe, set in horizontal stripes on the skirt. Dark dresses are set off too by short, loose, bright-colored jackets which follow a color note on the dress.

Mantilla Head-Dresses

PARIS, (AP) — Mantilla head-dresses are being worn here with an evening frock having foundations of a contrasting color. At a recent gala dinner at the Ambassadeurs a bright blue lace frock of the same color made over white and a black one accompanied a black lace dress designed over a pink foundation.

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — The strip tease presumably is not necessarily confined to burlesque artists. A member of a local woman's club reported to the latter that correct male wear for an afternoon wedding consists of morning coat and "strip" trousers.

Smart Colors, Slender Lines Add Touch Of Youth To New Modes

PARIS, Aug. 26 (UP) — Youth and the mode are gracefully blended in the winter collection of Heim Jeunes Filles which combines smart colors, rich materials and long, slender lines to make dresses and coats which are neither too young nor too mature, but just right for the fashionable young girl.

Two-piece sports dresses in wool Jersey are favored for daytime wear in wine, deep green and rust shades with bottoms from the waistline to pet round collars. Blouses are belted or nipped in at the waist. Skirts are flared in a tailored way or hang straight with inverted plaits.

Tweedy sports coats are well-tailored with a hint of fitting at the waistline and slightly flared skirts. Dressy coats in smooth materials are simple in line and are shown with flat fur collars their only trim.

A black sports coat lined with rust is worn over a matching black skirt and rust, round-necked blouse. Plaid is employed for blouses and ascots with plain-colored suits, and a brick shade is used to line and trim an iron-gray wool coat with a removable astrakhan bolero.

Velvet is popular for trim on afternoon dresses frequently in the collection, being used for collars, yokes and cuffs on "pushed-up" sleeves that just cover the elbow. 'Two-In-One' Hat Offered

Head Styles Of Eskimo Land And Greenland Followed

PARIS, Aug. 26 (UP) — The "cassette universelle"—a two-in-one hat—is the hit of Erik's new collection of autumn and winter styles, which have their inspiration in the Far North where Eskimo headgear and peasant styles of Greenland have contributed to novel designs in felt, fur and velvet.

A cap of felt, draped velvet or fur fits well down on the back of the head, while a second, more elaborate hat is perched forward on top. The over-hat may be worn alone—or the cap (which is suitable to wear with any hat for a touch of color contrast) may be worn separately for afternoon or evening occasions. The snug caps are designed to be effective with any type hairdress, and fur ones completely cover the hair at the back.

A second version of the two-in-one hat is seen in "double-duty" designs, which are simple when worn at one angle, but extremely dressy when reversed.

"Ocean Blue"—the greenish blue of the northern seas—runs through Erik's collection and is used alone, with black or with a deep mulberry shade. It is effective in an Eskimo hat with tiered crown which gives the appearance of three muffins of declining sizes set one on top of the other—ocean blue velvet separates the black layers.

Fur is used for trim where flowers would ordinarily be. A fox tail pops out of the top of a modified "stove-pipe" crown. Persian lamb forms the top of a pill-box turban, and Russian ermine is combined with felt and velvet.

Seashells At Shore Not Same At The Door

WALTHAM, Mass. (UP) — It's all right to sell seashells at the seashore. But you can't sell seashells from door to door—at least not in Waltham.
