The picture drawn for the night was "Life's Railway to Heaven," illustrating the true Christian route to heaven. Although life's path may run through all manners of dangers, the person who keeps his hand on the throttle, and his eye upon the rail, with the cross of Jesus as his goal, will surely reach the Union Depot, which is heaven.

Evangelist Paul Campbell took for his text 1st. Cor. 13-18. Some high lights of the message, "The Greatest Sin in the World," are as follows:

"Ever since the fall of Adam the world has been reeking in sin and crime. Many of the atrocious deeds are too horrible to print. David believed he had committed the greatest sin in the world after becoming convicted of his sin of taking Uriah's wife, and having the husband slain in battle. King Saul had all of the high priests butchered through a fit of anger. How could a crime be more horrible than this? There are husbands who are murdering their wives—no, not with weapons, but by their conduct, mistreatment, and the wicked lives they are living. There are wives who are placing husbands in early graves, and doing so through their extravagance and lack of love. If they loved their mate, they would sacrifice, work, and help him to reach higher goals.

"At one time during Jesus' ministry ten lepers came before Him, crying and pleading to be cleansed of their disease. Jesus heals their afflictions, the ten go their way rejoicing, and only one returns to give thanks unto the Master for the great service He had rendered. Where were the other nine? How could anyone commit a greater sin than to show such ingratitude?"

"Now abide in thee, faith, hope, and love, but the greatest of these is love." We learn in mathematics that things equal to the same thing are equal to each other, and if love is the greatest, then to leave love out of your life is to commit the greatest sin. Therefore, when you omit love from your life, you are guilty of the greatest sin in the world.

"Absalem was a boy who had everything his heart could desire, yet, he had no love for his old father who made the sacrifices that created him a great and beautiful prince. He knew not the meaning of love, for we see him as he causes a revolt in the kingdom, and then as he tries to capture his dad with the purpose of killing him. How can anything be more horrible than this? Absalem left love out of his heart, and is guilty of the greatest sin.

"You commit the greatest sin in existence when you fail to return the love Jesus has given you. For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes on Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life." Locals Return Home After 13 to 2 Victory

After going for five innings at Coleman Friday with only one run, Ballinger hopped on the offerings of Meyers and ran in 12 in the remainder of the game. They slammed the ball to all corners of the lot and local fans in the stands were getting their money's worth and then some and Vaughn got tighter and Ballinger hit them harder.

Vaughn allowed six hits during the encounter and five of them were for extra bases. Two fell in the last inning which put Coleman's last marker across the rubber. The big fellow had perfect control and never had much to worry about during the game. Practically all the hits came after men were out and nobody on base. Best, left fielder for Coleman, was the only man able to hit the ball consistently. He slammed out a triple and two doubles in four trips to the plate.

Another reason for the easy victory was that the Bearcats had a perfect day in the field and nothing that resembled an error was seen on the defense. In fact some that looked like hits were turned into perfect plays.

A slight change has been made in the infield at Coleman and one in the outfield. Scalings has been placed in center field and Bales placed back in left. On the infield Lynch has been playing third and Kittrell moved to second. The boys all look good where they are playing and Lynch grabbed a fast one in the close of the game Friday that was gone for a hit and easily threw the runner out.

The biggest thrill of the day came in the ninth where Scalings, Bean and Dockery filled the bases and Mueller drove a line drive between left and center fields to clear the bases and finish a rally that netted six runs in the ninth. Vaughn closed the game in one-two-three order.

LONDON'S POLICE FORCE NOW SELF SUPPORTING

 LONDON, June 15.—The police force of London pays for itself—and more.
 Last year the cost of the London policeman was \$40,690,000. But receipts, from grants, fines at police courts, licenses and other sources exceeded \$40,800,000. Out of the latter amount a staff numbering 19,180 were paid. One item of revenue was \$1,135,000 paid by the Admiralty for the guarding of naval establishments.
 Women police last year cost only \$48,000.

Maloney Meets Risko Again in Boston June 17

BOSTON, June 15.—Inaugurating one of the biggest outdoor boxing shows in the history of Boston, Jimmy Maloney, of South Boston, and Johnny Risko, of Cleveland, meet in a return engagement at Braves Field on the night of June 17. First announcement was that the match would close the indoor season in the Hub and would be held at the Boston Garden.

Arrangements were completed to make available the first base and third base sections at the Wigwam, and indications pointed to a record attendance on the night of the observance of the battle of Bunker Hill.



FORTY-YEAR OLD CLAIM IS MADE AGAINST TEXAS

AUSTIN, June 15.—A forty-year old claim against the state for \$2,900 principal and \$5,000 interest, was recently laid before the House claims and accounts committee from Falls county. Cabinet Poses For Pictures by Famous Painter

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, June 14.—The members of the cabinet are being painted by Douglas Chandor, the famous British portrait artist, who has come to Washington and established a studio.

The secretary of the treasury, Andrew W. Mellon, was the first of this group to pose for his portrait. He is sitting with one slim hand on one slender knee.

Others whose portraits have been done include Secretary of War James W. Good, Secretary of the Interior Ray Lyman Wilbur, and Secretary of Commerce Robert P. Lamont.

The postmaster general, Walter F. Brown, and the secretary of agriculture, Arthur M. Hyde, are next.

The artist usually takes them three at a time—that is, he has three canvases to work on intermittently. This provides for unhurried posing.

Mr. Chandor works very swiftly, often completing a portrait in a week. He has won high distinction, although he is now only 30 years old. He has been in the United States on other occasions and has painted many of the nation's outstanding personalities. He has exhibited in New York and other cities.

Special recognition from the British Court had come to him before. His first painting of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, in 1921, drew "half of London" to the Gieves Gallery, according to the London newspapers.

A remarkable piece of work by this artist is his painting of the prime ministers of the British Empire during the Imperial Conference in London in 1923. The scene is the conference room—one sim-

ilar to the cabinet room at the White House — at 10 Downing Street.
