City, County File Suit In Damsite Removal

Monday In Austin

Colorado City and Mitchell County filed suit Monday to stop construction of a dam on the Colorado River in Coke County that was originally slated to be built in Mitchell County.

The suit was filed in District Court in Austin Monday. The Texas Water Rights Commission originally granted a permit for the reservoir to be built in 1960 on a Mitchell County site.

However, on Sept. 1, a permit was granted to begin construction on the Coke County land.

The site was moved some 70 miles downstream when the Colorado River Municipal Water District said that salt water pollution problems at the original location were insurmountable.

The suit argued that the construction in Coke County would hurt development of a public source of water supply in Mitchell County and have a drastic effect on the economic welfare of the county.

Forrest Smith Fund Totals \$405 Wednesday

Funds to aid Forrest Smith, critically wounded Mitchell County Deputy Sheriff, reached a total of \$405 as of early Wednesday.

Smith is reported improving in the intensive care unit of Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene where he was transferred following initial treatment in Colorado City.

Total hospital bills to date for the deputy have went over the \$2,500 mark as of Wednesday. This figure does not include surgeon and doctor fees.

Smith was shot in the lower back and over his right eye in the Sept. 21 fracas as he and other law enforcement of-

ficers sought Carlos Perez in connection with a Sept. 20 shooting incident.

To date the deputy has undergone three operations, one for the removal of his right eye.

He is expected to be hospitalized for several weeks.

Donations to the fund are being accepted at City National Bank in Colorado City, First State Bank in Loraine and at the Planters' Gin in Westbrook.

District Attorney Weldon Kirk said Wednesday that the county could offer no financial assistance. Kirk contacted the Attorney General's office in Austin Wednesday in

regard to aiding Smith and was told that no county funds could be expended in such matters.

Friends began the fund Friday to aid the Smith family with the growing list of expenses arising from the deputy's wounding.

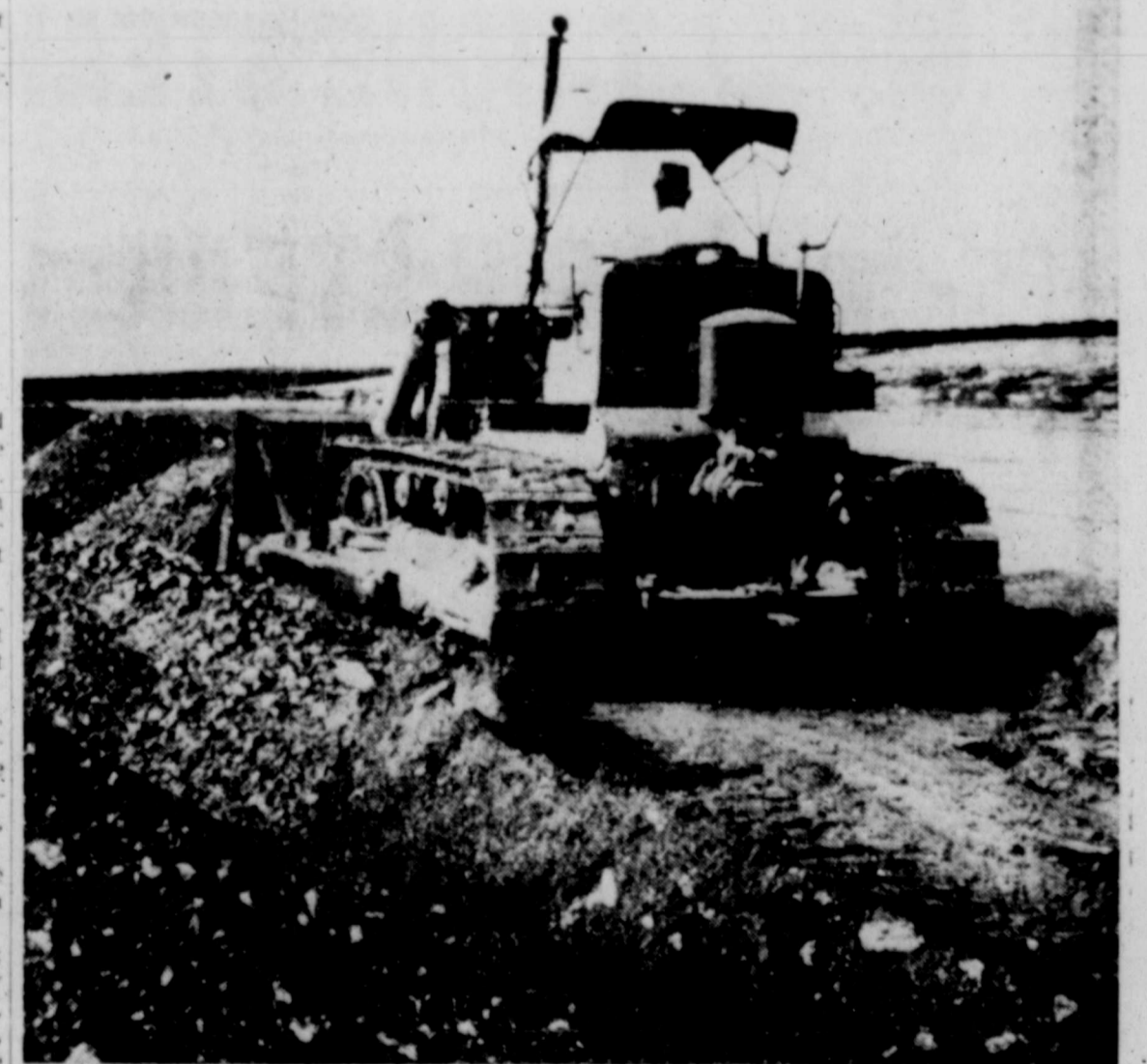

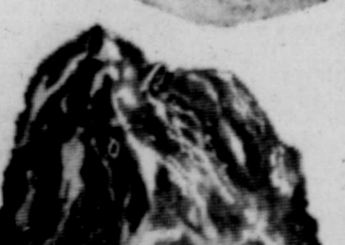

CHS Opens District With Haskell Friday

Colorado High Wolves open District 5-AA warfare with the Haskell Indians in Wolf Stadium at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

The Wolves, fresh from a homecoming victory over Merkel, should provide tough opposition for the speedy Haskell eleven that has lost only one contest this season.

Colorado City is "fit as a fiddle" except for halfback Donnie Higginbotham who is still slowed by an ankle injury. Haskell will be in top shape physically for the contest.

The two clubs have just opposite records, but the opponents have been of somewhat opposite strengths.

All of the Haskell wins have come over Class A schools including Clyde 21-6, Electra 14-6 and Munday 21-6. Their lone loss was at the hands of AA power Seymour 22-6.

A pair of the Wolves' losses came from AAA powers Monahan and Ector.

Despite their poor pre-district record, the tough schedule may turn out to be in the Wolves' favor in district battles.

In an interview with the COLORADO RECORD, Haskell Head Coach Sonny Everett made mention that the Wolves past games would be a "big factor" in Friday night's contest.

"Colorado City has real fine personnel and more experience than us," Everett said. "They play the toughest pre-district schedule in 5-AA."

Thinking back to last year's game with the Wolves, Everett said his players thought Colorado City hit harder than anybody in the district including Fallinger and Winters.

Everett is expecting to formulate a game plan staying mostly on the ground with little passing.

The Haskell coach said his experience was his greatest problem and he only has three seniors in the starting lineup.

Coach Nix described the Haskell squad as young, but having enough veterans to be tough. He added their tremendous speed had hurt all previous opponents.

Regarding the top Haskell players, Nix said that Indian halfback Thornton Gilmore was their "head" along with quarterback Bobby Watson. In the Haskell Monday tilt Gilmore romped for a total of 222 yards rushing.

In the Haskell line Nix added that 187-pound tackle Bill Perry was the real leader of the forward wall. Paul Hie-

bert, 197-pound center, is another stalwart in the line.

Nix noted that Haskell had not thrown the ball much in their previous contests, but that their ends Ray Herren and Jack Melton were both dangerous receivers.

Haskell operates offensively from a "Spread T" with a widely split line and the backs up close to the line of scrimmage. This type formation, when fast backs are present, is very quick-hitting and the defense must move fast to contain it.

Defensively, Haskell has done well all season except for the Seymour contest.

Nix said the Wolves had "real good workouts" all week and would be in top shape except for Higginbotham. Larry Currie, who nursed a pinched shoulder nerve, against Merkel, should be ready to go full speed.

Commenting on fullback David Way in workout Tuesday, the Wolf mentor said, "He ran over people like a

franchise should in Tuesday's drills."

The Wolves are expected to hit the airways against the Indians Friday night. Haskell scouting was hurt somewhat by the fact that they did only a minimal amount against Merkel.

In earlier games Haskell's opponents have been able to get considerable success against the Indian pass defense.

Nix said he was "very pleased" with the Wolf safeties Larry Paul and Randy Phillips performances against Merkel.

He added that halfback Artie Butler also turned in a good job in the Wolf backfield along with the two quarterbacks Glen Nix and Wayne Snowden.

After grading the Merkel film Nix said that Marvin Iglehart turned in a top job from his offensive tackle post. Defensive standouts were corner-

back David Aycock and interior lineman Robert Stewart.

It was a long walk back to the garten after enduring three quarters of seeing the UT Longhorns shove the Red Raiders noses, among a few things, into the mud of Memorial Stadium Saturday night.

After playing a decent game the first half (13-0) the Raiders fell down, up, over, backwards, frontwards and apart before the relentless onslaught of the 'Horns who surprised many of the fans jammed into the stands.

I was on the very south edge in a sea of black umbrellas and one blue polka dot one (ours), but when the crowd cleared some at the half, we trudged for some 15 minutes and managed to get a "better" seat — even with the goal line.

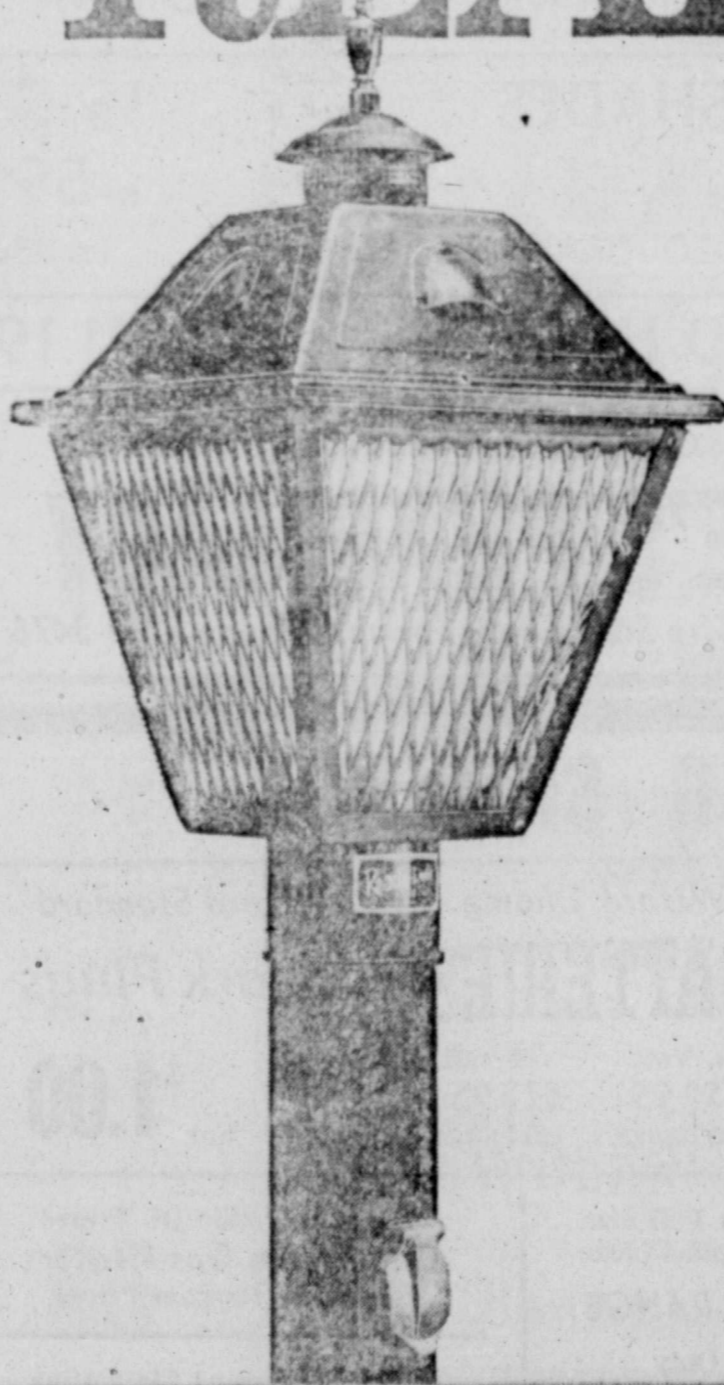

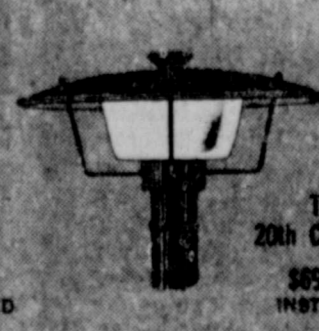

Performance Testing Shows Gaining Ability

Performance of beef cattle means ability to gain weight, and gain ability is one of the most heritable characteristics in cattle.

Knowing this, beef producers and Red River County Agent Bob Moody are upgrading the quality and gain ability of area cattle by conducting the 140-day Red River Valley Beef Performance Test for bulls. The test is held each year at Clarksville.

Rate of gain in the feed lot test indicates the efficiency of the conversion of feed to animal weights, since rapid gaining cattle require less feed per pound of gain.

Moody says Texas A&M University genetic specialists estimate gain ability in cattle is over 65 percent heritable. This means if a producer's calves are gaining an average of 2.2 pounds per day, and he can breed a bull that will gain 3 pounds per day, the progeny from that bull will gain 65 percent of the difference.

The beef performance test works like this:

Only bulls are tested, and they must weigh 475 pounds at 205 days and grade no lower than choice. The bulls must be seven to thirteen months old on the official weigh-in day.

A \$25 pen fee is paid for each bull entered. A charge of ten cents per day for each head is charged for care of the animal while on feed. This includes feed care, water and electricity. The owner is billed for the feed cost of his animals at the end of each month.

Reports are made to the breeder on weigh-in date, the 84th day, 112th day and on final weight. The final report also includes daily gain.

The 6th beef performance test begins with the official weigh-in September 17 this year. County Agent Moody said there are nearly 75 bulls entered. At the end of the 140-

day feeding period, a bull day is held and daily gain and weight of each bull made public, said Moody. Most of the bulls are sold at the feed day by private treaty to local and out-of-state breeders.

The bulls are kept in facilities near Clarksville, built by local cattlemen with \$11,000 borrowed money. The \$25 entrance fee goes toward repaying the loan. The beef testing barn is 36 feet wide and 84 feet long and divided into two pens. In each pen there are six automatic waterers.

The bulls are fed a ration developed by the board of directors of the performance unit and a nutritionist from Texas A&M University.

In the 140-day test last year, a Brangus bull topped the list with a net day gain of 4.21 pounds. He weighed in at 648 pounds for a final weight of 1,208 pounds. Most of the bulls tested gained over 3 pounds per day, said Moody.

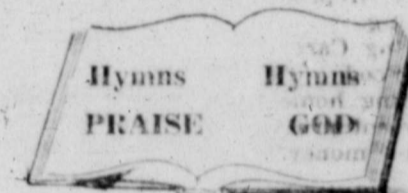

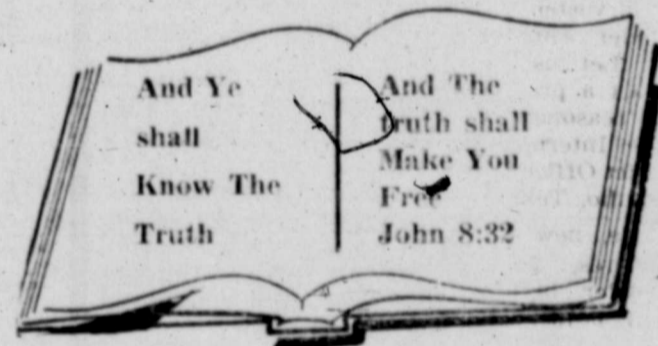

Clearing Costs Varied

"What does it cost to clear an acre of brushland and establish a good pasture cover?" In Franklin County, on the H. J. Andrews farm near Mount Vernon, 26 acres have been cleared and accurate cost records kept, says County Agent Charlie Brown. Pushing and burning costs were \$52 per acre, fertilizer cost was \$11 an acre and seed \$2.50 per acre. Total cost: \$65.50 an acre. The Andrews land was thick with brush and trees, and Brown points out that clearing costs will always vary according to density of brush and locality. It may run as high as \$100 an acre. The Andrews land was seeded with 5 pounds of common Bermudagrass an acre and has a good cover now. Cattle are stocked on the pasture at the rate of a cow to every two acres. The trees and brush were pushed off by a bulldozer with an A-type blade which works after cutting, slides flat along the ground, and cuts the tree trunks and brush. Brown says a large bulldozer with this type blade can cut trees up to 42 inches across. The brush on the Andrews farm was pushed into wind rows and aligned with the prevailing winds (southeast to northwest) and burned two Baptist Church
