City water supply good

The City of Colorado City is in the grip of a long dry spell, when even the "careless" weeds in the vacant lots are dead. Seventy-seven one hundredths of an inch of rain has fallen in the city in 1984 and that

counts snow.

Yet, many Colorado City people are still watering lawns and washing cars, while the city of Ballinger is faced with trying to run water from Lake Spence down a dry Colorado River bed to a catch basin at Ballinger in order to

have drinking water.

Colorado City is using three million gallons of city water per day, according to Buzz Rich, Director of city services, "and would probably be using five million if we had the pipe to run it through." Rich says three million is all we can

get through the distribution system.

"Our water situation is 'Real good,'" says Colorado City mayor Elmer Martin. "No problem at all."

The difference is, according to Rich is that Colorado City lakes are in "good shape."

Lake Colorado City, source of water for Colorado City, is 13 feet from the spillway and is holding its own. Lake Champion is 10 feet from the spillway and dropping. Fifteen million, five hundred fifty-two thousand gallons of water per day are

pumped from Lake Champion to Lake Colorado City.

Both lakes belong to the Texas Electric Service Company and water from Lake Colorado City is used to cool the massive generators in the plant at the lake-shore.

CISD test scores show advancement

The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) is an annual assessment of student achievement in reading, writing and math. The TABS tests, given annually, show a favorable trend in Colorado City schools.

Overall, according to Dr. Walter Bingham, administrative supervisor for Colorado City schools, grades are better than last year. This is primarily due, he says, to a pre-assessment test given earlier in the school year, which gave teachers an idea in what skills students were weak. Teachers concentrated on these weak areas to improve student performance.

Dr. Bingham gave a pat on the back to his teachers. "Certainly, the improved scores are a tribute to their hard work."

The TAB tests are given in the third, fifth and ninth grades and after the ninth grade to students who missed that test.

At the third grade level in math, for example, on part of the test in ranking whole numbers, improved from last year's 37 to a 74 this year.

Third graders are weak in selecting units of measure (probably due to the transition from standard to metric) and scored 47 last year—this year 59.

In reading, third graders scored a below passing 51 in "identifying the main idea," in 1983 but improved to a 79 this year.

The emphasis on the improvement of basic skills is due to a State Board of Education priority in the betterment of student achievement in these areas.

Appraisal board hears complaints

The Appraisal Review Board met two days this week to consider complaints from persons who thought their property or other taxable item was overvalued.

Mike Burt, chief appraiser, said that "fifteen signed up to talk to

the board, eight actually did and six got some relief."

Four oil companies talked to the board.

The Review Board also read and discussed protests that had been mailed in to them.

Insurance change due for county

Mitchell County Commissioners met Wednesday morning at 9 a.m. to discuss insurance presentations heard previously. The county is planning to change its hospitalization insurance because Blue Cross has had a tremendous increase in premiums. They chose the coverage offered by Texas Association of Counties, whose insuring company is Prudential Insurance Co.

Judge Carter explained that several employees dropped their families from the insurance because of the increase. If an employee

had wanted to put his wife on the insurance, he would have to have paid \$155.72 per month with the Blue Cross policy. The new premium per month is \$88.65. This amount is paid by the employee.

The new premium for the addition of children is \$59.80, whereas the Blue Cross would be \$107.44 per month. The amount paid for the addition of the wife and children would have been \$199.42 and the new amount will be a total of \$148.54 per month.

The county will now pay \$91.39 a month for See Insurance, Page 2

Cook's Corner

Rees finds recipes come in handy

If you can read a recipe you can cook anything. Margaret Rees found this out when she got married. "I didn't cook when I was growing up, so when I married, I went by a recipe and everything turned out all right," Mrs. Rees said. She does experiment a little bit with recipes but not much. Her favorite things to fix are desserts. "We really do like sweets, so I like to prepare them. The kids especially like homemade cookies." Mrs. Rees has been lucky in that her family will eat nearly anything. "We all have pretty big appetites, so we usu-

ally have a pretty big meal." On the weekends, the Rees' enjoy brunch. "We are all home, so we make pancakes, omelets—things like that. We enjoy doing that a lot." Mrs. Rees recalls an incident that happened when she was fixing fish for supper. She takes up the story. "We were given some Pompano fish that came from the Coast. I found a recipe called Pompano in a Bag. "I worked all afternoon preparing everything. After the fish was done, we sat down to eat. We took a bite and everyone spit the fish out. Come to find out the fish hadn't been cleaned

or scaled and I went ahead and fixed the fish not knowing about it. After that, I never tried Pompano in a Bag again. "My daughter also helps me out in the kitchen. She cooks a lot of different things, but she cooks quite a few sweets." Even though Mrs. Rees stays busy during the school year with everyone going in different directions, she finds time to fix a balanced meal at night. Mrs. Rees is a teacher at Hutchinson with the reading program. She is married to Tom, an attorney and they have three children—Tom, Jr., Melanie and Beau.

Today she is sharing three of her recipes with RECORD readers.

SUPER-DUPER POTATOES
1½ lb. pkg. frozen hash browns
½ cup butter
¼-½ lb. American cheese
1-8 oz. carton sour cream
2 cups Half and Half
Crisp crumbled bacon
Heat butter, Half and Half, salt and cheese. Stir until melted. Mix in potatoes. Pour into two-quart dish. Bake one hour at 350 degrees. The last 15 minutes of cooking time, add sour cream and bacon.

GUADALUPE RIVER PUDDING
Bottom layer:
1 stick oleo
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup flour
Combine ingredients and press into bottom of three-quart Pyrex dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes, cool.
Middle layer:
1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar

½ of 12 oz. Cool Whip
Soften cream cheese and blend with sugar, then add Cool Whip, spread over the cooled crust.
Top layer:
2 large pkgs. vanilla instant pudding
5 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Two-third can Baker's Angel Flake coconut
Spread this on cream cheese and finish with Cool Whip. Sprinkle with remaining one-third can of coconut and chill.

BUTTERMILK PANCAKES
1¼ cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
1¼ cup buttermilk
3 tablespoons cooking oil or melted shortening
Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt and sugar in one bowl. In another bowl, beat egg and add buttermilk and shortening. Add liquid ingredients to dry and stir until blended.

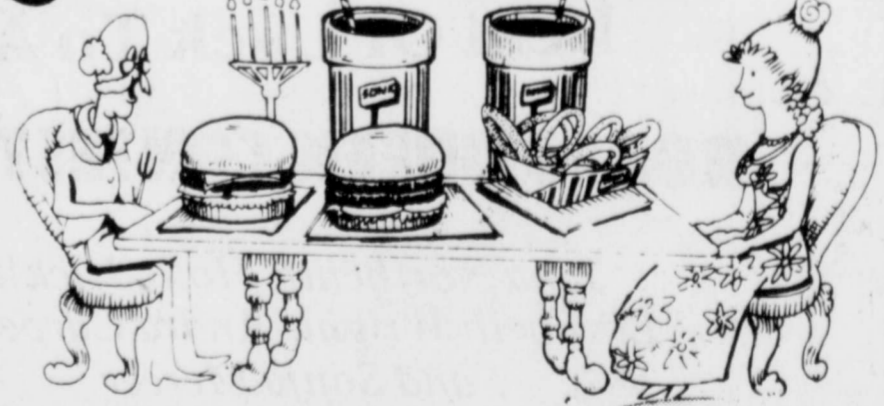

STRETCHING FOOD

by Vivienne Bodeau

The key is to plan ways to use or preserve the number of servings in a can or a recipe. A large quantity of soup can be made and the unneeded portion frozen. Cornbread or pancakes can be made and the unused portions also frozen. We were pleasantly surprised how good frozen pancakes taste when heated in a toaster. Store your foods in meal-sized portions.

Cutting into meal-sized portions and freezing what you don't use also works when buying meats, poultry and fish. According to an extension office worker, you can get one or two servings from a pound of poultry or meat with a lot of gristle or bone, and three servings from a pound of fish or meat with some bone, and four or five servings from a pound of boneless meat.

When freezing foods be sure to use airtight freezer containers or plastic bags and label the food with the name and the date that it was frozen. This is very important.

Keeping refrigerator and freezer temperatures low will help maintain the quality of foods. Refrigerators, we are told, should be maintained at 35 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit and freezers at 0

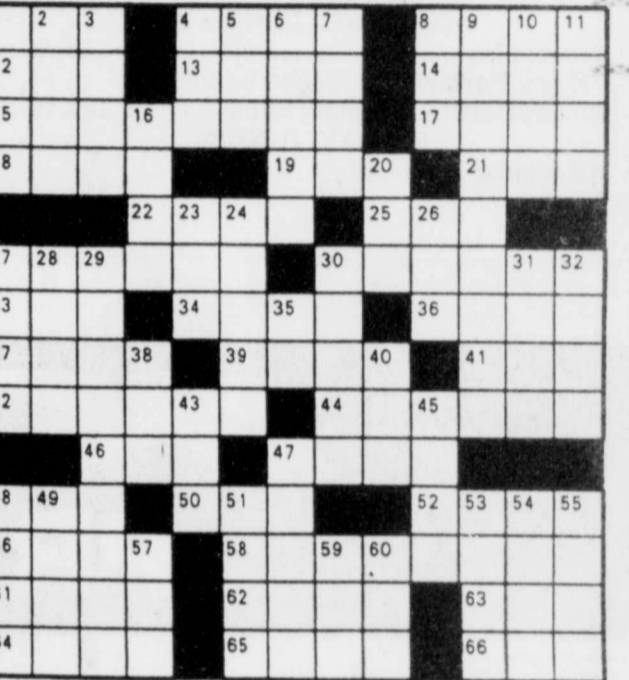

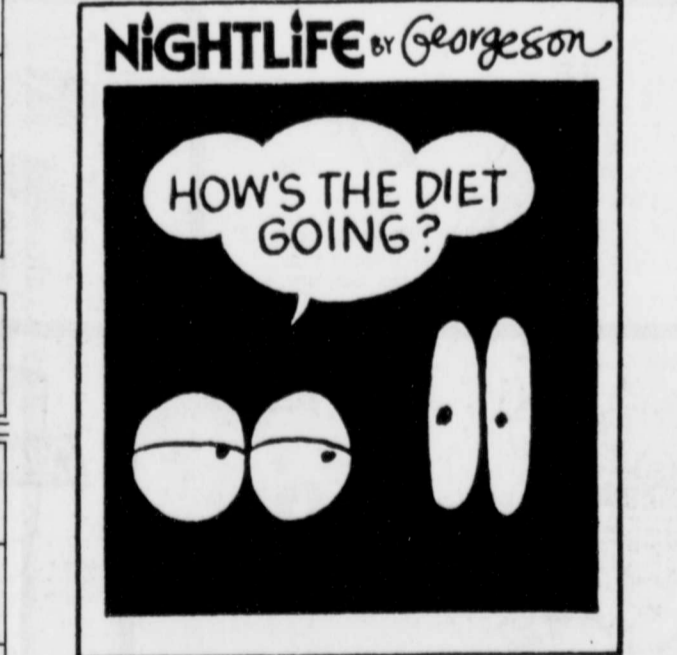
