"Because the Panhandle's worth fighting for," is the motto of his campaign Phillips said. He also pledged his support for the best interests of the farmer.

"We've got to have the laws that concern us written so that we can understand them," he said.

Phillips said that he would be guided by four questions: 1. What is the effect, not the intent, of the law? 2. Is it fair? 3. Do we need it? 4. Is it worth raising your taxes?"

Pet projects which Phillips pledges to work for are the removal of state sales tax on utility bills and an increase in inheritance tax exemptions so

that farms and businesses can be left to families and not sold to pay the taxes.

Phillips also promises to support the creation of a West Texas Water District that could deal directly with other states having an excess of water.

Lion Gene Huntsinger spoke briefly to the club stating, "A man gets something out of Lionism only in proportion to that which he gives."

Doug Higgins, Lion Boss, reported that the club had been asked for an indication of support for the Meals on Wheels program, requesting that Lions pledge themselves to service for one week, delivering meals each day of that week.

Tucker Takes Lead In Grid Guessing Game

Football predictors found last week easy sailing after two particularly difficult weeks in the Hart Beat football guessing game.

Six contestants missed just one game each. Ted Averitt and W.G. Rountree of Dimmitt came closest with their 7-21 tie-breaker guesses to the actual score of the Longhorns-Longhorns game. They will equally divide first and second place winnings, receiving four dollars each.

Cotton Harvest Now Underway

Old man weather has cooperated in great style with South Plains farmers for the 1977 crops.

Corn harvest, this week, is almost complete. Grain Handling, whose first load arrived Aug. 25 as compared to Sept. 22 of last year, said there is still some being brought in but that the season is about wrapped up.

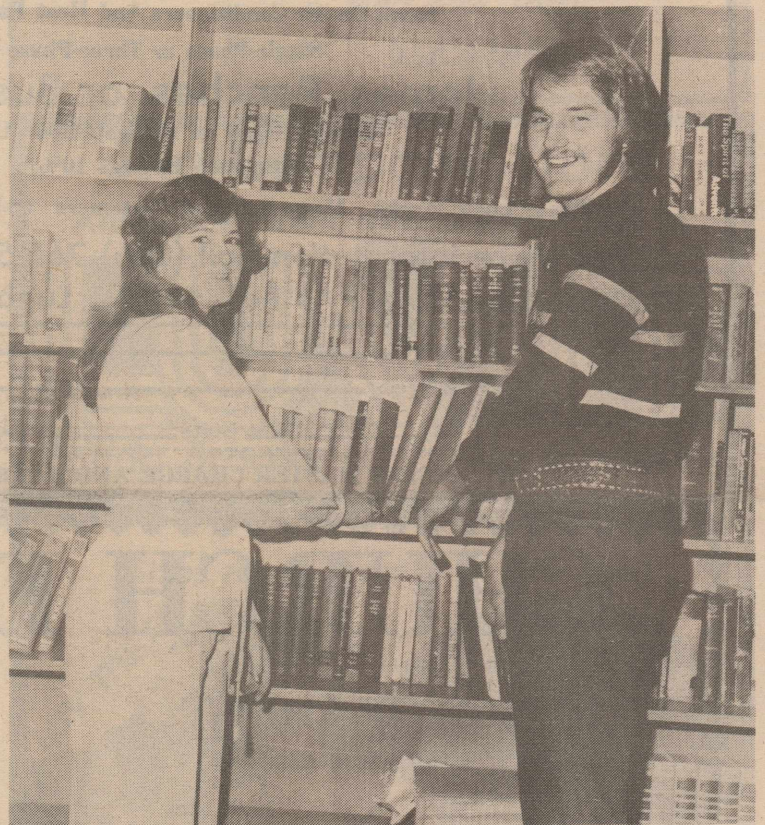
Farmers Grain spokesmen said "We were just getting started this time last year. There's a little milo left and some soybeans but everything

is about all in."

Cotton harvest was going good until the shower of last weekend. Ginners expected the gathering to resume by midweek or the latter part of the week.

This year's cotton is "better than we'd expected," one gin spokesman said, reporting that the early arrivals were representing about a bale and three-quarters per acre.

The first cotton was brought in Oct. 14 and 15.

James Campbell Named Yieldmaster Member

James Campbell of Hart was recently named a member of the DeKalb Yieldmasters Club for producing 249.32 bushels of corn per acre in 1977 from a selected area.

His yield, based on 15½% moisture was mechanically harvested from a solid block measuring 5.239 acres. A reliable third party verified the high yield which was recorded from a field of DeKalb XL-72aa.

Campbell planted the crop of April 6 in 40 inch rows and harvested an estimated stand of 27,000 plants per acre. Grain test weight was 54 lbs. per bushel.

Planting, fertilizer and chemical application rates vary with conditions. However, his fertilizer program included 214 lbs. of nitrogen, 60 lbs. of phosphate, 14 lbs. of potash and 14 lbs. of sulphur. Campbell controlled weeds with Eradicane at ½ gallon per acre and Atrazine at 2 lbs. per acre. Miticide and Furadan were used for insect control. An estimated 3½ inches of rain fell on the crop from planting to harvest. Another 21 inches of water was applied through irrigation.

Concerning the hybrid's performance, Campbell says, "I like the way my XL-72aa was sized which resulted in accurate planting. It had good seedling vigor. The 70-acre field averaged 12,600 lbs. of dry corn per acre at 15.5% moisture -- the best I have ever made. The standability and threshability was good. I will definitely be planting XL-72aa in 1978."

"He is an outstanding young

farmer with tremendous potential in the corn industry," Michael Heath, district manager for DeKalb AgResearch, Inc., said. He noted that Campbell had a very high corn yield on other acreage as well. "It was really unbelievable. This year, 150 bushels is really good," Heath added. According to Department of Agriculture estimates, the national average is 90 bushels of corn per acre.

The purpose of the DeKalb Yieldmasters Club is to promote an exchange of ideas and information among the nation's leading grain producers and to recognize them for their outstanding accomplishments as well as their important role in helping feed the world. Through the sharing of information, the program also encourages farmers to adopt management and cultural practices that will aid them in obtaining maximum profit from each acre.

Currently, farmers throughout the country submit more than 1,500 corn, sorghum and silage yields a year to the club, which is sponsored by DeKalb AgResearch, Inc.

Final Quarter Makes Difference

Hart Almost Holds Vega

Rumor has it that there will be a UIL investigation of Hart because the team that played 8th ranked Vega to a standstill Friday night surely did not look like the same one that played Kress last week.

Hart's Nathan Ingram set the standard of the game on the opening kickoff when he really blasted Vega's Joe Rodriguez. Vega then moved to a first down but defensive end Kent Hill threw Vega for a two yard loss and they had to punt.

Hart's first series sputtered but the punt to Vega was bobbled by Rodriguez and Michael Finch recovered it for Hart on the Vega 34. Hart moved to the 23 but an expensive holding penalty stalled the Maroon Horns. On a fourth and one attempt, Hart came up inches short.

Vega moved from its 29 to Hart's 13 as Hart's defense stretched but would not break. Vega ran out of room and Hart took over at that point. Hart got a first down but finally had to punt. On this series, Vega earned 2 first downs before QB Randall Galbraith hit HB Leonel Ramos with a screen pass that went 33 yards for the score with 7:07 of the second period left. Randy Roark added the point after on a kick.

On the next possession Hart was forced to punt and Vega overcame a loss of two when Glen Black and Scott Jones blasted Marvin Mode. Vega had a drive into Hart territory going when Galbraith fumbled and nose guard Rodolfo Gonzales scooped it in to give Hart the ball on its own 43.

On the next play QB Eliazar Castillo faded back under pressure and hit Black on a screen that went 57 yards for the TD on excellent running and good blocking by Luther Isaguirre and Finch. Castillo then hit flanker Johnny Newsom in the endzone to give Hart the lead at 8-7 with 53 seconds in the half.

Ingram again did a number on the kickoff return man and time ran out on the second play when Jackie Ethridge sacked Galbraith for a two yard loss.

Following intermission, Vega's kickoff turned out to be on-side and Randy Gonzales missed it, allowing Vega to fall on it at the Hart 43. Hart's defense stretched again but used a Vega penalty to stall the drive and Vega attempted a field goal that was short and wide.

On its only possession of the third quarter, Hart moved to the 38 before having to punt. The ball rolled to the Vega 20 and Vega tried to establish a drive that stammered a bit when Scott Jones forced Vega's Gary Fangman to turn back inside where Ethridge and Hill sacked him for a yard loss. Galbraith then got a 28 yard pass completion to give Vega a first down but Larry Marble broke through from his defensive tackle position to bowl over Mode for a 6 yard loss to end the quarter with Hart still ahead.

As the final stanza opened Vega completed a pass for 7 yards but, on a 3rd and nine situation, Kelly King blew through the line to sack Galbraith again for 10 yards. Now having a fourth and 19, Vega was forced to punt. The ball went to Castillo at about the ten but the ball got loose and Castillo circled back to get it. Picking it up, he was forced deep in an attempt to make yardage but was tackled by Jesse Rodriguez on the goal line giving Vega a safety and the go ahead 2 points with 10:35 left.

Vega then got the ball on the free kick but on its first play, Castillo came in to knock the ball out of Fangman's hands and J. Newsom recovered it at the 38. Hart battled to the Vega 31 but on fourth down, Finch came up inches short.

Vega then used running plays and a Hart 15 yarder to move to the Hart 31 before

having to give up the ball. Hart got a first down and Castillo hit Isaguirre for ten yards but the ball came out and Vega again had it on the Hart 36.

Hart had not quit yet and stopped Vega in four plays when Clay Hanes threw Galbraith back for a minus 2 yards. However, Hart only had the ball two plays before a Vega passrusher knocked the ball out of Castillo's hands and Fangman covered it on the 32. With just seconds left Vega ran out the clock to preserve its perfect record by one point in one of the hardest hitting games a fan would want to see.

Coach Bill Taylor had high praise for the entire defensive effort. Nine times Hart threw Vega back for a loss and held them to barely 3 yards per carry average while suffering no losses in the game and averaging 4 yards per carry. Special kudos go to Johnny Newsom in on 21 tackles, his third week in a row with over 20 tackles. Also Larry Marble was praised for stacking up the line so well. Black had 16 tackles from his linebacker position and both defensive ends. Hill and Scott Jones, were in on 13 apiece. Leading rusher was Finch with 85 yards.

Hart takes on Springlake-Earth Friday, winners this week over Bovina.

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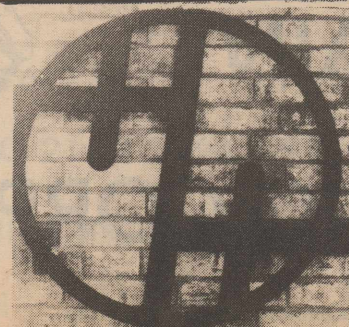

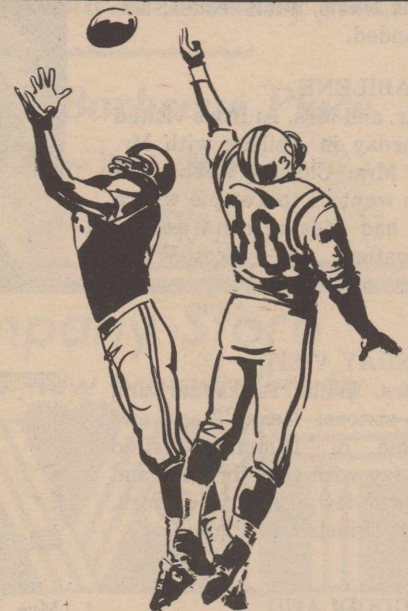

"I cook fattening stuff," says Mrs. Danny Ladd with a ready smile. The recipe she shares for a yummy dessert made with pistachio instant pudding might fit that category. She also shares a quick and easy main dish recipe for pork chops and rice.

LAYERED PISTACHIO DESSERT

First layer - Melt 1 stick butter or margarine and add one cup flour. Mix well and spread on the bottom of 9x13 inch pan. Bake at 375° for 15 minutes. Cool.

Second layer - Mix together 8 oz softened cream cheese, one cup powdered sugar, and one cup whipped cream. Spread on top of first layer.

Third layer - Mix 2 packages of Royal Instant Pistachio Pudding with 3 cups milk for 2 minutes. Pour immediately over second layer and chill.

Fourth layer - Cover with whipped cream and decorate with cherries. Chill over night.

Cool Whip may be substituted for whipped cream.

BAKED PORK CHOPS

Brown 4 pork chops. Mix one can of Cream of Mushroom soup with one can of Beef Consomme soup.

Place one cup uncooked rice in baking dish; lay pork chops

on top of this and pour soup mixture over pork chops and rice. Bake approximately one hour at 350°.

BROCCOLI & RICE

1/2 c chopped celery
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 8 oz jar Cheez Whiz
1/2 c chopped onion
salt & pepper
Paprika
1 pkg frozen chopped broccoli, cooked and drained
1 c steamed rice

Saute celery. Add soups, cheese, onion, seasonings and broccoli. Pour mixture over rice. Bake 10 minutes at 350°. This dish can be stretched by adding another package of broccoli and more rice. One can of mushrooms may also be added.

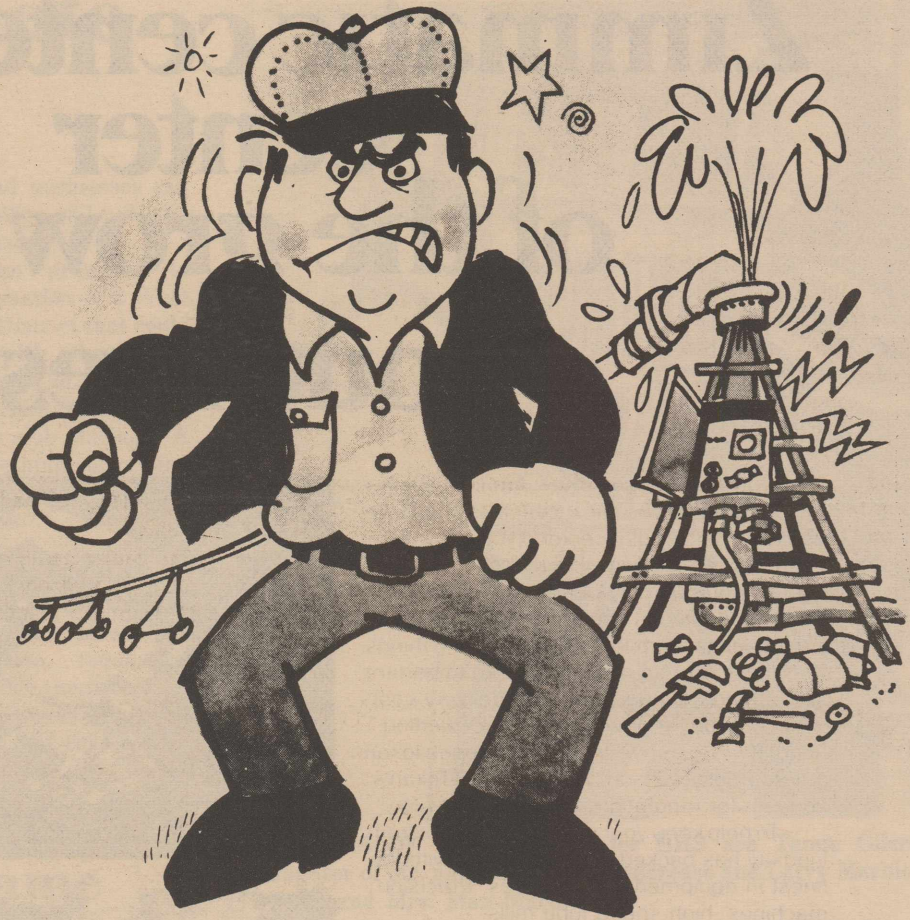

Hart's record now stands at 4-2.

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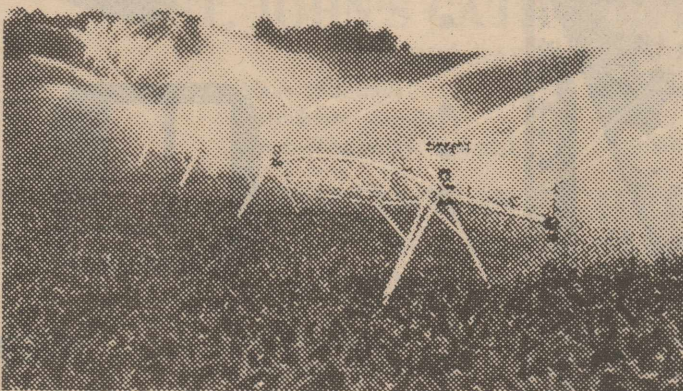
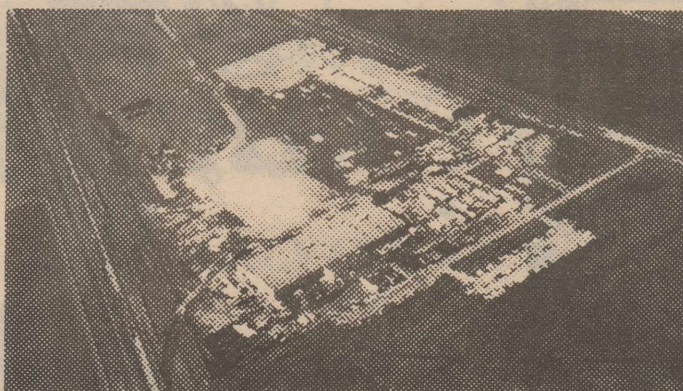
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
