American Warships "Call" In Australia

Assistance To Russia May Go Across Pacific

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The United States disclosed the movement of two heavy cruisers into Australian waters today in a move closely following a formal pledge of all-out economic assistance to Soviet Russia, which may be borne across the Pacific in American ships.

The Navy announced that the two cruisers already had arrived at Brisbane, Australia, on what was described as a training cruise.

This followed the dispatch of a formidable squadron of warships to Australia and New Zealand last March during earlier tension in American-Japanese relations.

That also was called a training cruise but the Navy said the ships might be kept in South Pacific waters indefinitely. The squadron which visited Australia in March consisted of two cruisers and five destroyers and a smaller force of destroyers called at New Zealand.

The new announcement by the Navy followed reports that Britain also was strengthening its naval forces in the Pacific as an apparent consequence of Japan's move into French Indo-China and indications that similar action might be aimed against bordering Thailand.

The American decision to supply "all economic assistance practicable" to Soviet Russia also held fresh potential complications with Japan, whose relations with Russia were subjected to new uncertainty today.

Despite the Russo-Japanese "neutrality" agreement, Lieut. Col. Kunio Akiyama, official spokesman for the Japanese forces in China, said at Shanghai that a minor clash of Japanese and Soviet border troops occurred near Manchuli about two weeks ago.

British Reinforce Far Eastern Garrison

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 5 (AP)—Britain's state of military preparedness in and about Malaya reached a new high today and the belief grew in informed circles that the British are making preparations for swift moves to control the key points of Thailand, possibly in advance of open Japanese encroachment.

Large reinforcements of British Imperial and Indian troops reached Singapore, with RAF personnel, even while dispatches from Bangkok itself acknowledged that Thailand was facing a momentous decision in her relations with Japan, Britain and the United States.

That officials would not deny that Japan is applying pressure for the granting of certain demands; indeed, Tokyo already was broadcasting a Bangkok dispatch to the effect that the Thais had recognized Manchukuo, Japan's puppet empire, thus according to Japan on what had been regarded as a test issue.

All Japanese Ships Clear U.S. Ports

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5 (AP)—Japanese ships had gotten out of U.S. Pacific coast ports today and reports from Tokyo indicated no more ships flying the Rising Sun flag would be seen in American ports for some time.

Rising Living Cost Examined By Henderson

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Leon Henderson, head of the office of price administration, told congress today that the nation faced the "strongest and most pronounced increase in the cost of living," even if the administration's price-control bill became law immediately.

Testifying before the house banking committee as the first witness on the measure, Henderson declared that even with the powers which the bill would confer, the government would have an "enormous load" in trying to prevent the country's "dynamic volatile economy" from entering an inflationary stage.

Using a series of towering charts to illustrate his remarks, Henderson said the nation's price structure was "knocking at the door" of 1929 levels and heading toward the 1919 peak.

The bill would give the president power to establish ceilings over prices for virtually all commodities and for rents in defense areas.

It would not permit him to regulate wages or utility rates and farm prices could not be fixed below 110 percent of parity, or below the market price of July 29, 1941.

Maine To Montreal Pipeline Urged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Intent on expediting delivery of oil to Canada "and the flow of munitions from there to Britain," Defense Petroleum Coordinator Ickes announced today plans to complete before winter a 260-mile petroleum pipeline from Portland, Me., to Montreal, Canada.

Oil Men To Donate Flow Of August 17 To Britain

AUSTIN, Aug. 5 (AP)—The crude oil Texas operators produce Aug. 17—estimated to be worth about \$5,000,000—will be given to Great Britain as a token of this state's faith in the cause of democracy.

Federal clearance through the land-lease act having been received, the Texas railroad commission, state oil regulatory agency, yesterday designated the date for voluntary donation of a day's yield, possibly 1,300,000 barrels, to England.

The plan originated with John F. Camp, San Antonio oil man, and has received the approval of Federal Oil Coordinator Harold Ickes, the procurement division of the U. S. treasury department which will handle the donation and the division of defense and reports of the federal emergency management.

Teachers Elected To Fill Vacancies In City Staff

Eight units of the Big Spring public school system will open the 1941-42 school session on Sept. 8, trustees voted at a meeting held Monday afternoon.

The opening date was set one week after Labor Day and is no later than normal. Several rural schools, which send high school students to Big Spring, likely will follow suit by observing identical opening dates.

Trustees also set Aug. 14 at 8 p. m. for the opening of bids for improvements to the Kate Morrison Americanization school and the negro school. Approval of the sale of \$12,000 in bonds, to finance the work, was approved by the board at the Monday meeting.

Compromise In Road Bond Matter Asked

AUSTIN, Aug. 5 (AP)—Governor Coke R. Stevenson today urged a compromise which would terminate the controversy over disposal of a surplus in the county road bond fund, asserted he believed he knew of one and invited discussion with persons closely interested.

His statement was interpreted by observers as a trial balloon to obtain reaction and determine whether a special session of the legislature this fall would obtain results to justify the expense.

The recent record-breaking long session ended with the house and senate in a deadlock over re-enactment and revision of the law under which income from one-cent of the state gasoline tax has been applied to service certain county road bonds. The appropriation of this revenue for the purpose expires August 31.

Stevenson said county officials had informed him that unless the condition was remedied and the state enabled to continue paying principal and interest on the bonds, a chaotic situation would ensue in a vast majority of the counties and county tax rates would have to be raised.

In his first formal statement since he took over the governorship yesterday, he reviewed the history of the controversy, said he was aware of both the plight of the counties and many ad valorem taxpayers and advocated permanent settlement of the problem.

As a member of the house of representatives some ten years ago, Stevenson drew and presented the original bond serving bill.

"The purpose of the original bill was to set aside one cent of the state gasoline tax from the state highway fund to pay maturing principal and interest on outstanding county and road district bonds, the proceeds of which had been used in the construction of state highways," Stevenson said.

"During the first years the bond servicing plan was in effect, the income from the one cent of the gasoline tax was not large enough to provide payment in full by the state of all maturing principal and interest."

"The original law, and subsequent re-enactments, made counties primarily responsible for payment of these obligations and it was necessary for the counties dur-

En Route to Maneuvers—3,000 Soldiers Take Over Town For A Night

Soldiers of the 63rd and 202nd coast artillery peacefully invaded Big Spring Monday evening as the two regiments pitched camp at Morita, 10 miles west here.

Senate Rejects Draft Compromise

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The senate rejected today a proposal to limit the service period of army selectees to a maximum of six months beyond the originally set one-year term. Rejection was on a vote announced as 50 to 27.

The proposal was offered by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) as a substitute for pending administration legislation which would permit draftees to be held in service for a maximum of one and a half years after completing the one-year training period.

When they were inducted last year, selectees and national guardsmen were scheduled to serve only one year. The army high command recently urged indefinite extension of that period.

Taft's proposal, which gave a clear test of opposition strength for modification of the pending administration plan, would have permitted the army to retain national guardsmen and reservists for not more than one extra year. Regularly enlisted men could not have been retained beyond the termination of their enlistments.

Taft's plan also would have authorized a regular standing army of 800,000 men. He said these, plus selectees, national guardsmen and reservists, would provide for a total force of 2,000,000.

The house agreed, meanwhile, to compromise legislation to defer from military training any selectees who were 28 years or older July 1, or who became 28 years or older by any subsequent July 1 without having been inducted.

All men now in training who are 28 or older would be released as soon as possible and transferred to a reserve component of the army.

The compromise must yet be approved by the senate. It contained no reference to labor or industry, though the original senate proposal provided for seizure of plants where stoppages interrupted defense production.

Aluminum Baled Up For Easy Shipment

The aluminum will be shipped to Lubbock, concentration point for the metal over a wide West Texas area, said County Judge Walton Morrison.

Nazis Claim Annihilation Of Russians

Ukraine Threatened By Veering German Onslaughts On Reds

German panzer forces have driven a new 70-mile-deep salient into the heart of the soviet defense system between Moscow and Leningrad, the Russians acknowledged today, and Berlin reported that the 45-day-old conflict now had developed into two vast battles of annihilation.

Nazi military dispatches said the encirclement and destruction of large red army forces south of Kiev, the Ukraine capital, was well under way and indicated that a clean-up in the bloody Smolensk sector, 230 miles west of Moscow, was in its final stages.

Adolf Hitler's field headquarters reported that red army units attempting to smash their way out of a trap in the Ukraine had been "annihilated."

The new German thrust knifed to the vicinity of Kholm, in the marshlands 70 miles east of last week's battlefield at Novorozh, a red army bulletin admitted. Kholm lies 130 miles south of Leningrad and 250 miles northwest of Moscow.

Authoritative quarters in London asserted that fierce soviet resistance had compelled the Germans to abandon frontal attacks in the Smolensk sector and to direct their fury in drives south of Leningrad and on the grain-ripening fields of the Ukraine.

Nazi reports from the front indicated the Germans might be planning to by-pass Kiev and drive on to the Russian industrial center of Dnepropetrovsk, 185 miles south-east of Kiev on the Dnieper river. Dnepropetrovsk is the site of heavy armament works and the center of a huge coal, iron and manganese producing region.

A Soviet communique again spoke of heavy all-night fighting in the Bel Tserkov sector, 50 miles south of Kiev, in the Korosten sector, 80 miles northwest of Kiev; and in the Smolensk sector.

The United States, meanwhile, cast the weight of "all economic assistance practicable" in support of Russia's life-and-death struggle against the Nazi.

The assistance pledged by the United States would be in military supplies and implements of defense on a cash rather than a lend-lease basis. Russia has the money to pay.

Russian Ambassador Constantine Gumeny was informed last night at Washington that the United States also was exploring the possibility of using American ships to transport some of the supplies.

Such supplies would go by way of the Siberian port of Vladivostok, Japan, however, has hinted broadly she might not look with favor on any war supply shipping to that port.

Important Britisher May Visit U.S.

LONDON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The Daily Mail in a dispatch datelined Washington said today that "there are reports in Washington official circles that in addition to the Duke of Kent 'another very high British personage' may be expected to fly to see Mr. Roosevelt."

"It is stated," the paper continued, "that the visitor might be Mr. Churchill or Lord Beaverbrook. The object would be to discuss closer Anglo-American collaboration."

(In Washington no substantiation for the report could be found.)

Tare Reduction On Bagging Of Cotton Sought

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 5.—The marketing division of the Surplus Marketing Administration is asking approximately 5,500 buyers of cotton to sign an agreement to make an allowance of seven pounds for lighter tare on cotton wrapped cotton bales. According to George E. Adams, vice director and state agent of the Texas Extension Service, county agricultural agent and county AAA committeemen will cooperate in obtaining the signatures.

The Surplus Marketing Administration estimates that approximately 2,000,000 bales of the 1941 cotton crop will carry cotton wrapping. A cotton pattern weighs 4 1/2 pounds compared with about 12 pounds for a pattern jute. Due to gross weight trading this difference in tare penalizes farmers who use cotton bagging about seven pounds a bale unless merchants make an allowance differential.

The SMA points out that mills having 60 percent of the spindles in the United States now are cooperating in making the allowance.

M. L. Wilson, director of extension work, and I. W. Duggan, director, Southern Division, AAA, in a joint statement said: "We are advised that other mills will cooperate if the allowance is made by the cotton buyers to farmers. For cotton buyers not to make the allowance will deprive farmers at present price levels of about \$1 a bale and unjustly enrich themselves of a possible total of \$2,000,000."

The objective of the plan is to obtain for cotton farmers improved marketing practices and to encourage the use of cotton for bagging as a means of increasing domestic consumption.

The War Today—Course of Russian-German Battle Depends On Reserves

"The struggle of the Red army with the fascist hordes," says the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia, "is entering a new phase of violent and decisive battles."

That seems to describe the position rather accurately. The Germans have increased their pressure on the Russian right wing at Leningrad, are continuing their fierce attack on the center of the line, and at the weekend developed a heavy pincer thrust at the strategic city of Kiev in the south.

These battles will be decisive in so far as determining whether the Bolsheviks can hold their present front between the Baltic and the Black sea. They aren't at all likely to end the war.

The time has arrived when we also can agree with Izvestia's claim that "it is already obvious that Hitler's blitzkrieg trump, on which he staked everything, is beaten." This is to say that the element of extreme speed has been eliminated by the remarkable resistance of the Reds, threatening to saddle Hitler with a long war, and that might easily mean a disastrous one.

A vital element in the present grim and bloody stage of the conflict lies in the number and quality of the reserves available to both sides. The millions of men who first were thrown into this

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great battle, which in its early stages did involve all the speed and ceaseless struggle of the blitzkrieg, are worn down to the ragged edge of exhaustion.

The Russians have reported the capture of German soldiers and officers who had become deranged because of the terrific strain of the protracted fighting. There is no reason to doubt this claim, especially since the Nazi communications are so extended that the bringing up of food and reinforcements is increasingly difficult.

The World war produced similar positions. I recall one occasion when a British division fought a retraining action foot by foot for seven days and nights against an attacking force ten times their size. The men became so exhausted that when there was a slackening in the onslaught they would drop in their tracks and fall sound asleep. Hardtack was about the only food they got.

That's the type of fighting which has been proceeding in some sectors of the Russo-German front, and both sides undoubtedly have been severely affected. Many units must have been in the conflict with few breathing spells during the six weeks since Hitler made one of the greatest gambles of military history.

The question now arises as to which side has the most reserves

of first-line caliber for replacements as the crisis swells up. The Muscovites have by far the greater reservoir of man-power, but whether these fresh troops are well trained isn't apparent as yet.

The Nazis themselves announced some time ago that the Bolsheviks were bringing up 8,000,000 reserves.

Temperature Here Hits Season High

Record temperature for the season prevailed in Big Spring Monday afternoon, with the thermometer rising to 88.3 degrees.

Previously, the maximum reading this year had been 97. Little change in temperature is predicted for the next few days, but scattered thunderstorms may relieve the heat.

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Tea Imports To U.S. To Continue

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—Tea has been labeled a civilian necessity and given a priority classification high enough to insure its continued import, Director Benjamin Wood of the Tea Bureau, announced.

Wood said the office of price administration and civilian supply had notified him of the rating after the tea association had started to worry about rubber and tin imports taking all available cargo space. He said about 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 pounds would be imported in the six months beginning Sept. 1.

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New Amarillo Diocese Bishop Is Selected

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The Very Reverend Laurence Julius FitzSimmon has been named bishop of the diocese of Amarillo, Texas, by Pope Pius XII, the Apostolic delegate, Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, announced today.

The bishop-elect was born in San Antonio in 1895 and attended parochial schools in Texas, later going to the North American college in Rome.

The Amarillo diocese has been vacant since the first of the year when the Most Reverend Robert J. Lucy was transferred to San Antonio.

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 5 (EP)—Daily crude oil production in the United States declined 174,485 barrels to 3,890,870 in the week ended Aug. 2, the Oil and Gas Journal reported today.

Illinois production increased 17,688 barrels a day to 350,195; Louisiana, 6,550 to 319,905; Oklahoma, 1,710 to 17,230; Michigan, 950 to 45,400; the Rocky Mountains area, 67,000 to 107,640; California, 250 to 638,500; and eastern fields, 200 to 132,300.

Texas production declined 196,110 to 1,232,500; East Texas, 69,415 to 268,500; and Kansas, 6,430 to 235,000.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8 (AP)—Domestic livestock, American agriculture's richest source of income, are producing at full emergency rates to meet wartime demand and are yielding farmers prices 17 to 75 per cent greater than a year ago, market statistics showed today.

Not only are milk cows and hens breaking all records for output, but prices farmers receive for their produce, once classed as a source for the farm wife's pin money, have spiraled upward. Furthermore, the value of all livestock on farms has risen.

Prices of all principal livestock and livestock products are now above parity and well above the minimums the government sought to maintain when it began its lend-lease and domestic relief buying program in April. In fact, at mid-July butterfat, chickens, beef cattle, veal calves, lambs and wool were above 110 per cent of parity, the minimum ceiling provided under price control legislation now pending.

(Administration economists define parity as a price level which would give farm products a purchasing power in terms of non-farm products and services equivalent to that of a base period, set at 1909-1914.)

This steep rise in output and prices is expected to contribute much more than half of agriculture's 1941 income, which

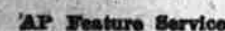

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Here is a region of superlatives. It has the deepest ocean of the Philippines, the most colorful coral reefs of the world in the form of the beautiful reefs of Angkor, the largest island of the greatest wealth (of Burmese, Siamese, princes) some of the greatest natural resources (Dutch and British East Indies, Australia), some of the most picturesque scenery (Japan), the strangest animals (the panda in China, 10-foot lizards in the East Indies), the most populated nation (China) on earth. The very vastness of the Far East sets it apart.

War—in the sense of actual fighting—has not yet spread to much of this area. Actual battles have taken place only in the Sino-Japanese war (this one started in 1937) and in border skirmishes between

Russia and Japan, and between Indo-China and Thailand. But Japan's occupation of Indo-China and her calling up a million fresh soldiers was taken as such a threat by Australia, the United States, and the Dutch East Indies that they immediately retaliated by freezing Japanese credits. Every nation in, or with interests in, the Orient, has long been strengthening its defenses.

Will expanding Japan—aligned by treaty with Germany and Italy (and, ironically with Russia)—be satisfied with her present position and sit tight? Will she attack Singapore? Will she attack the Dutch East Indies? Or will she march on Russia? And how will other nations answer Japan's next move?

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The huge \$3,266,200,000 defense tax bill, which would give the government its biggest cut of the national income, went to the senate today bearing a thumping house approval, but almost immediately there was talk that it might yet undergo major revisions.

It passed the house by the lopsided vote of 369 to 20 late yester-

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day after it had first been stripped of a provision for requiring all married persons to file joint income tax returns. This provision had been counted on to raise about \$323,000,000 in additional revenue by compelling many married persons to pay higher surtaxes.

At the other end of the Capitol, Chairman George (D-Ga) of the senate finance committee, expressed belief the senate would not seek to reinstate the controversial provision, but would try to make up the deficiency elsewhere, possibly by revision of the income tax brackets to broaden the base. He said his committee would hear an explanation of the bill by treasury experts tomorrow and begin a two-weeks public hearing on Friday.

The tax-broadening mentioned by George would be in line with President Roosevelt's views, for the chief executive told the ways and means committee he thought the exemptions for single persons should be reduced from \$800 to \$750 and those for married persons from \$2,000 to \$1,800.

As it passed the house yesterday, the bill would virtually triple the taxes of persons in the lower and middle income groups by converting a graduated system of surtaxes starting at 10 per cent on the first dollar of taxable income and ranging up to 75 per cent (the present maximum) on incomes of \$5,000,000 and over.

These surtaxes would be in addition to the present normal income tax rates of 10 to 35 per cent, which was continued. But even so, that a married man earning \$2,800 and having no dependents would pay \$38.50 under the new plan compared with his present tax of

The new yield from individual income taxes were expected to be in the neighborhood of \$829,000,000.

Approximately \$1,532,500,000 would be raised from corporations through surtaxes, stiffer excess profits taxes and a drastically revised method of computing them.

bill would impose almost 40 new or higher excise taxes on commodities and services to raise about \$800-100,000. These levels included a \$5 annual use tax on all passenger automobiles, a five per cent tax on everyone's monthly telephone bill and 10 per cent excises on a host of things such as luggage, jewelry, furs, cosmetics, business machines and musical instruments.

"The zenith for an amateur golfer," he said, "is to be named on the Walker cup team. I had a good chance to make it in 1940. I had won the western and two matches in the national the season before. Then it was decided there would be no Walker cup team because England wouldn't have one."

"The Walker cup team wouldn't have had to play. My idea was that deserving golfers might be rewarded by being named on it. Now there's nothing to work for. Why should I try to be a good golfer? You'll find the entry list in this year's amateur reflecting that sentiment."

Todd will go to Denver Aug. 11 to post a qualifying score in the sectional round for the national amateur but he indicated his heart wasn't in it. However, his medal score this season is pretty good for a guy who has lost interest. He boasts an average of 68.6 for 18 holes.

Todd has been in golf nine years although but 24 years old, playing in three national amateurs, but he'd turn pro in a minute if he could get a job.

Locals Win 8th In Row; Meet Hubbers Tonight

Charlie Wheelchel chalked up his fifteenth victory of the season and Big Spring extended its winning streak to eight and moved into the WT-NM league's top spot by a small margin as the Bombers took a 5 to 1 decision over the Wichita Falls Spudders here last night.

The engagement wound up the Spuds' two-day visit to Roberts Field. Borger's 5 to 0 loss to Clovis during Monday's roundelays gave the Big Springers their lead.

Big Spring opens a two-day engagement at Lubbock tonight, when it will clash with that city's Hubbers. Thursday, August 7, the Bombers return to Big Spring for a three-day stand with the Clovis Pioneers, beginning a hometown series that will last eight days. The Tatemen's initial conflict with the Pioneers will be Appreciation Night so far as Big Spring fans are concerned.

Except for a weakening in the third inning, when Big Spring's Larry Drake, rightfielder, and Eddie Stevens, first baseman, homered to account for a total of four runs, last night's affair featured tight pitching by Charles Wheelchel and Wichita Falls' C. Hill. Wheelchel allowed the Spudders six hits over the course of four innings.

Heaving a low curve with deadly effect, Hill kept the Big Springers guessing most of the route. Wheelchel did his part toward baffling the evening's batters by chucking a tricky combination of curving, plus speed.

Drake and Stevens furnished the steam for Big Spring's decisive third inning spree. To start the stanza, J. L. Haney, leftfielder, flied out to right field. Jack Lindsey, second baseman, landed on base by virtue of Evans' error and Hayden Greer was fanned.

Following a walk by Mel Reeves, centerfielder, Drake blasted the homers over the leftfield fence to drive in Lindsey and Reeves. Then, the heart-breaking thing happened to Hill. Stevens, following Drake at bat, proceeded to hammer the ball over the same route picked by Drake's homer, making it four runs for the frame. Next man at the plate, Hank Poltras, third baseman, was thrown out at first to retire the side.

During the remainder of the evening the Bombers picked up five hits—the visitors 20.

Haney gave another one of his strong arm exhibitions for the customers when he took an assist on putting out Hernandez at second.

Buck Schulse, Big Spring's steady and crafty hurler, reached his majority last night, with the help of Big Spring fan Virgil Smith and a money gift from the customers. Added Values Of Defense Classes

Defense classes being conducted in the high school building now are beneficial from a local and national standpoint, and more than that we believe they contain a lesson in education.

From the community's view, the classes are of immediate benefit because they entail a monthly instrumental payroll of \$1,000 and additional \$2,000 monthly in materials and supplies, all of it purchased or handled through local businesses. Over and above this, there is something like \$5,000 tied up in equipment—much of it purchased through local concerns and individuals. Around \$1,000 went into repairs and maintenance.

Pursuing this idea further, we find that it is not only teaching men of Big Spring and immediate area, but is drawing heavily from a wide territory. Several come from 50 to 100 miles to attend the classes and some have even established residence here because of it.

Certainly the nation is being helped, for workers skilled in specific job training are being turned out. Many of these have gone directly into defense industries and the others constitute a vital labor reservoir.

Finally, we see in the classes an object lesson in education. Here are men getting training in skilled fields, getting training in how to use their hands and heads, getting training that will help them to get jobs or to do better on the ones they have.

Now this concerns defense primarily, but we are agreed that defense will not always be as pressing as it is now. Our world would be intolerable if we had to continuously live in preparation for destruction such as now. The world cannot forever stand it and there is bound to be a change toward normalcy sometime in the future.

When this happens, we see no reason for discontinuing this field of training. Men are literally going to school 17 hours a day. In other words, they are getting nearly three times as much use out of our school plant investment than school children.

Hence, we believe it would be wise to readjust our educational system when things again become normal, perhaps shift some of our higher education appropriations to local schools for training of adults in special fields of work. It would not affect the program for our children, and it certainly would be of vastly more service to those who support it.

Manhattan Singers From Mexico Come To The City

NEW YORK—The nicest thing I can report today is the arrival of two slim-legged youngsters whose names are Margarita and Maria, who come from Morelia, Mexico, to sing south-of-the-border ballads to the citizens who find Benito Collada's Greenwich Village restaurant, El Chico, a gratifying rendezvous these high-strung, long, hot nights.

Margarita and Maria are sisters and their last name is Padilla. They are part Indian. They have a repertoire of 3,700 ballads, laments, and romantic songs, and when I interrupted to ask, "Did you say three thousand and seven hundred?" they nodded and answered "Si."

That's a lot of songs, you think. An "agita" agrees with you. "That's also a mighty good brand of English you speak for a girl who was reared in the central sector of Mexico," you say to this girl, who is three years the senior of her 20-year-old sister.

"We went to night school three years," she explained. "But even now I do not arrange my words properly. In English you put the adjective before the noun, which is difficult for me to remember, as when I tried to send a night letter the other night and told the telegraph operator I wanted to send a 'letter night'."

You sit in El Chico in little alcoves under the imperial seals of the provinces of old Spain, and suddenly the Padilla sisters, in wide, hooped and braided Mexican Indian skirts come out.

These dresses weigh so much their shoulders ache just from the weight. "Cost me 450 pesos," Margarita confessed, indicating the black, blue, white, green and silver of her costume. The sombrero, or Mexican hat that dangled from each of their small, olive necks cost 150 pesos.

They had guitars and they strummed as they sang "La Borra," which is a song about a girl who has had "one drink too many." Their singing, always in Spanish, never in English, is riotous, gay, sometimes undisciplined but always noisily appreciated.

A number they do on singing is "Casta Y Varas," which means "Get Married and You'll See," and another is "Prisionero del Mar," a bolero which means "Prisoner of the Ocean."

Maria, who is the quieter of the two, shyly confessed she was hog wild over Bette Davis and wishes she could be like that distinguished film actress.

Though this is their first glimpse of New York their names are not entirely unknown in the record shops and juke-box casinos of the metropolis. Margarita and Maria have been recording their softly romantic tunes for Columbia the last four years.

In private life Margarita loves above all else the rhythms of the tango, and after that the bolero. Surprisingly, she cares little about dancing. She is single and so is Maria, "but the ring which I have changed to this finger used to be an engagement ring," admits Margarita. This is a condition that may soon be altered. In the last year El Chico has had three of its most fetching people forsake professional life for matrimony.

HOLLYWOOD—Time was when a movie audience had some privacy.

You could slip into a cinema emporium, slide into a seat, and sink back for a couple of hours of comparative freedom from outside disturbance.

You could look at the picture and maybe you liked it and maybe you didn't, but at least you were in command and the picture never came down off the screen and got personal with you.

It didn't make personal remarks at you, it never took you slyly into its confidence, and it certainly never started you by coming down the aisle and sitting in your lap.

Now I'm not saying this is happening now, nor that maybe it wouldn't be a nice boost to business if it did happen—the lap-sitting, I mean, especially if done by the right parties. Miss Betty Grable, say.

All I'm saying is that it's on the way, and if you're again it, now's the time to speak up.

Like many another evil, this potential lap-sitting is difficult to trace to its source. The stage obviously started it with the old "aisle," and it has been creeping into the movies, in more or less innocent guise, for years. "That's all, folks," the little fellow in the Marrie Melodies always said. Then there were the fade-out clinches, even in the silent, in which the hero coyly turned to the audience and pulled down a curtain before copping a kiss.

A movie called "The Villain Still Pursued Her" got bolder, glorified the "aisle" and invited the audience to hiss the villain. Then somewhere along the line the Marx Brothers—Groucho in particular—got in one of those confidential remarks to us innocent by-standers when he turned point-blank and said, "The Hays office won't let us get by with this."

The other night "My Life With Caroline" was unreeling smoothly when pop Ronald Colman and, after a little preliminary acting, steps up front and talks right at us.

Now there's "Hellzapoppin." Olsen and Johnson, having panicked Broadway by talking to, at, and around their audiences, are working up similar stunts for the picture. They're going to talk over our heads, bawling out the movie projectionist when the film goes haywire, and they're cooking up as-

sorted forms of conversation with the audience.

This may be all well and good if done in the right picture, but suppose you're drowsing through a movie and suddenly an actor on the screen asks you a question. You can't ignore it, for Emily would think you rude. You can't say, "Beg pardon?" for your neighbors would stare. You're in a spot, a social misfit, the death of the party.

So don't say I didn't warn you. And don't look to me for help when it's too late and Betty Grable is already tripping down the aisle.

Dorothy Thompson Says— R. A. F. Is A New and Knightly Order

LONDON (Via Press Wireless)—The Royal Air Force is not an army. It is an order, a knightly order, representing something new not only as a fighting force but as a social phenomenon. It is impossible to come into contact with groups of its men without believing that the RAF will play a great role in the Britain that emerges from the war.

These young men saved England a year ago. How few they were who saved England is not yet realized by the many. Their names as individuals are hardly known. This air war is without precedent. Individual exploits have been as sensational as any performed by the Bishops, the Guytoners or the Richthofens of the last war. But it is a breach of form in the RAF to publicize any single personality. Congrat-

ulate a pilot on his personal exploits and he will stiffen immediately.

The RAF is a voluntary force. He who presents himself and is accepted finds a code imposed upon him by his comrades. There are RAF manners. Retenues, poses and easiness mark them. "Shooting a line" makes one an outcast.

In fighting stations, military forms and rigidities are kept at a minimum. The salute is casual, the air is spoken as a well-brought up youth might address an older man. Nicknames are as universal as at a boys' school. The intelligence of a pilot at one station is always called "spy." The atmosphere of the fighting station is rather that of a young man's club.

The spirit of the squadron is not the spirit of a company or a brigade but a team. The men rated among their comrades not only for their exploits in bringing down Germans but for their social leadership and for team work.

The playing fields of Eton are in the sky and this peculiar nobility of Britain ride to hounds in the heavens. Whose particular gun brought down a particular plane is of less consequence than how each member of a squadron behaved in relation to the whole operation. This self-selected service of the RAF, almost entirely from the middle classes, their families are rarely titled, rarely rich, very seldom very poor. They have had advantages but few luxuries. The probability is that at home they live in a small detached villa with one or two servants. Nine out of ten come from such homes.

Although enormous emphasis is placed upon the discipline of tactics and the integrated teamwork of the whole operation, very little emphasis is placed upon bodily training in the rigid physical sense.

For instance, one of the greatest airmen in England told me: "A good airman must be constitutionally sound; completely healthy; but he must never be too fit. The sort of training that an infantryman gets, or the sort given to a boxer or football player, would spoil an airman."

The fighter of the air is employed in short swift engagements, requiring terrific concentration of nervous energy, rather than prolonged endurance. Ever so slight an edge on the nerves seems to produce tension. Nerves are necessary to perfect his performance. The fighter of the air has the nerves of an acrobat not a soldier or mariner. It is all

done with nerves, not muscles and among airmen there are highly artistic types.

There are three commands in the RAF. Each produces a different type of airman. The fighters for the most part are a slender wiry breed of finely-spun nerves. The bombers are physically thicker set, slower, more deliberate perhaps, a more responsible type. They are handling more power, more costly craft. Their skippers are responsible for more people's lives. The men of the coastal command are the fat boys of the RAF.

In trying to find the reason, I concluded it was because they follow the changes of the navy and eat more, often. These are the men who conduct reconnaissance over the oceans, bomb enemy surface craft and submarines and act as cover for the convoys, helping to bring in food and the sinews of war for Britain's people.

Their wives are, I must add, a special kind of new young women. They too have a code. That code demands that they be happy and keep their husbands happy all the time. The girls are great cocktail drinkers. They are always casual. It is against the code ever to show the slightest appreciation, ever to telephone the airframe to see whether their husbands have come back from some dangerous operation. They must wait for his call. When possible they live near the squadron stations to be with their husbands at the earliest moment of their free time.

In the last war there was considerable free masonry among the airmen of all nationalities. A mutual admiration that transcended the animosity of war. There is much less of that in this war in which the air force plays an infinitely greater role.

Most airmen with whom I talked despite the Nazis as an inferior enemy. They admire the strategy and tactics of the Luftwaffe but no individual pilots. They are a very unboastful lot themselves but they say as a quite simple statement of fact that the Nazis haven't got guts. They say they are too rigid. They are enormously effective whenever no chance or accident crosses their prescribed tactics but relatively helpless in an unforeseen emergency. Some thoughtful ones advance reasons for this but that is another story.

About 850 air pilots will be trained in Argentina during the next 18 months, according to the department of commerce.

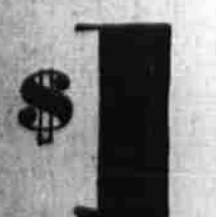

ing these years to pay the difference between the amount the state is able to pay and the amount the state would have paid had the income from the gasoline tax been sufficient to meet in full the obligations serviced by the state.

"In later years, the income from the one cent was more than enough to meet the maturing principal and interest on all obligations serviced by the state, and the board of county and district road indebtedness made arrangements, by increasing the participation on eligible issues or by cash reimbursement, to repay the counties in full for the payments made by the counties during the lean years when the state could not fully satisfy the obligations.

"At the regular session of the 46th legislature, a controversy developed over the disposition to be made of the surplus income from the one cent of the gasoline tax after the state had fully met all principal and interest maturities on the serviced bonds. A surplus of some \$9,000,000, over and above the amount necessary to service the eligible obligations, had been accumulated over a period of a few years."

Stevenson then pointed out that the 46th legislature gave the surplus to the counties, and controversy over the surplus, now amounting to about \$2,000,000, was renewed in the 47th legislature, the current one.

Members of the Howard County Board of School Trustees will convene Thursday to consider transfers lodged with the county superintendent's office prior to Aug. 1.

The board will consider protests filed by local boards on individual transfers and will seek to adjust difficulties arising out of converted ones.

O'Daniel later voted against the Taft amendment. It was his first vote as a senator.

"In state after state, wherever newspaper men meet, tribute is being paid The AP staff men abroad who daily overcome tremendous difficulties to give American readers FACTS."

Typical of resolutions adopted unanimously by many meetings of AP member publishers and editors is that from the minutes of a meeting attended by newspaper men from Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia. It follows in part:

"At a time when the exciting nature of events has offered every temptation to exaggeration, sensation and hasty conclusions, a time when propaganda has polluted many news streams at their source, the care and vigilance of The Associated Press have maintained, unquestioned, the truthfulness of its report."

"At a time when their daily work involved hardship and danger, the members of The Associated Press staff abroad have told the story of war in graphic detail that has set new standards of vivid factual reporting."
