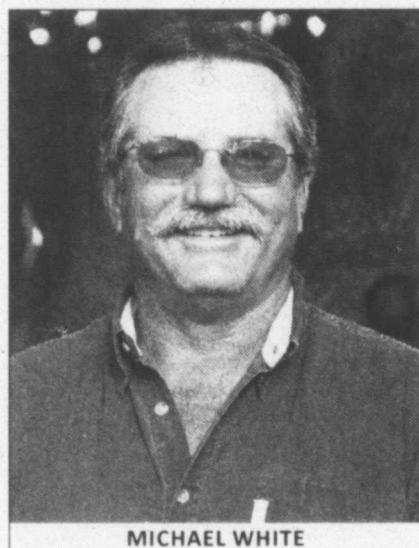
Grand Champion winners at this year's show included Jake Tabor, who

Michael White, from New Home, announces this week that he is seeking election for Lynn County Commissioner of Precinct 4.

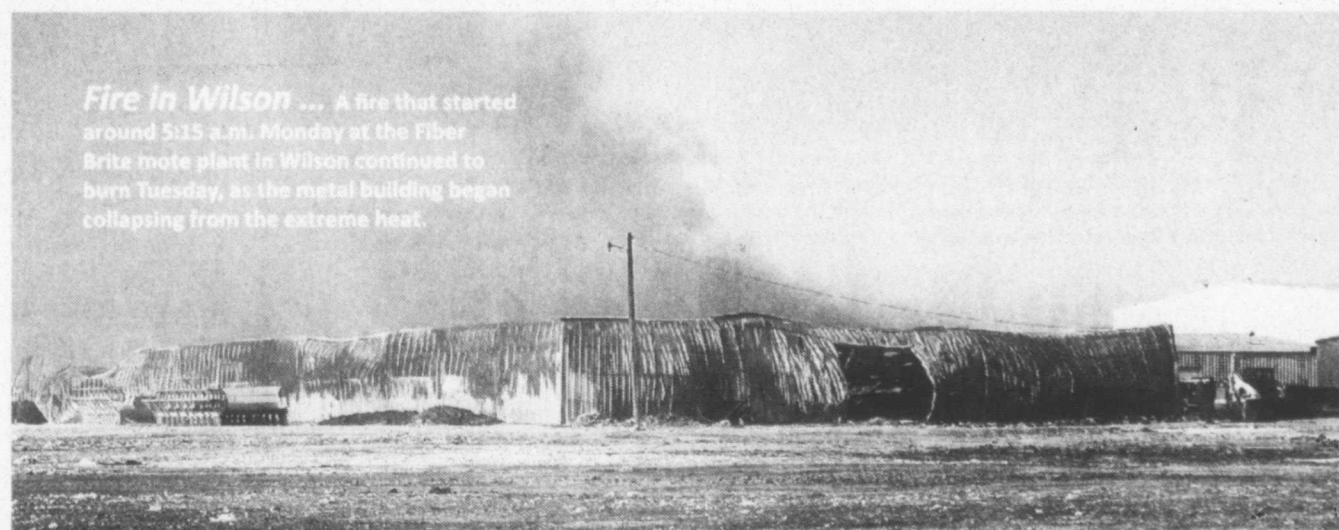

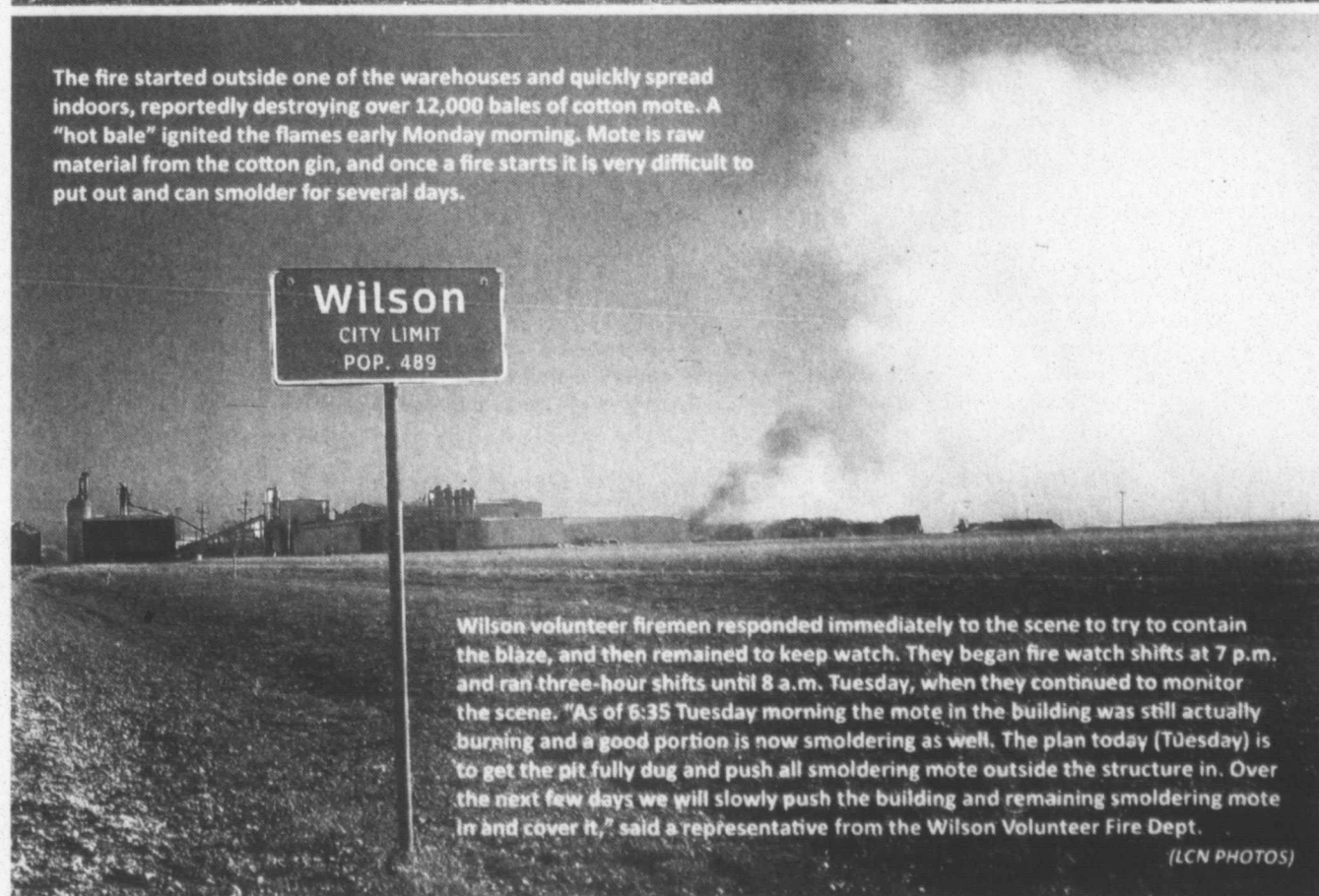

Fire in Wilson ... A fire that started around 5:15 a.m. Monday at the Fiber Brite mote plant in Wilson continued to burn Tuesday, as the metal building began collapsing from the extreme heat.



The fire started outside one of the warehouses and quickly spread indoors, reportedly destroying over 12,000 bales of cotton mote. A "hot bale" ignited the flames early Monday morning. Mote is raw material from the cotton gin, and once a fire starts it is very difficult to put out and can smolder for several days.

Wilson volunteer firemen responded immediately to the scene to try to contain the blaze, and then remained to keep watch. They began fire watch shifts at 7 p.m. and ran three-hour shifts until 8 a.m. Tuesday, when they continued to monitor the scene. "As of 6:35 Tuesday morning the mote in the building was still actually burning and a good portion is now smoldering as well. The plan today (Tuesday) is to get the pit fully dug and push all smoldering mote outside the structure in. Over the next few days we will slowly push the building and remaining smoldering mote in and cover it," said a representative from the Wilson Volunteer Fire Dept.

Tahoka Council sets city election for May 10

Tahoka City Council met in regular session Tuesday night, Jan. 14, ordering a General Election on Saturday, May 10, for the purpose of electing three council members whose terms are expiring. Ronny Jolly (District 2), Jeff Martin (District 4), and Ray Box (District 5 At-Large) all have terms expiring this year. All are two-year terms. The filing period opens Jan. 29 for candidates seeking a place on the ballot, and ends on Feb. 28. Candidates may file at City Hall.

The council appointed Lynn County Clerk Susan Tipton as the early voting judge, and the Lynn County Clerk's office as the early voting location. Early voting will be conducted April 28-May 6.

In other business, council members approved the city audit presented by a representative from the auditing firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss, and approved a resolution suspending a rate increase submitted by Xcel Energy as recommended by a steering committee.

The city's building permit fees were amended, leaving in place the current building fees as the rate for all residential rates, and adding a fee schedule for commercial rates. Monthly bills for the city were also approved.

DRINKING COFFEE every day might help your memory, according to a recent study by researchers from Johns Hopkins University, a study that goes against the trend of most studies of coffee drinking. Most studies conclude that coffee is bad for you, all caffeine is dangerous, and you'd be better off drinking water or beer.

No, wait. That beer comment came from a non-scientific survey conducted in a Lubbock bar by a college guy.

Anyway, noting that lots of people headed for jobs in the morning clutch cups of coffee to kick-start the workday, the Johns Hopkins people concluded that coffee might do more for the brain than boost alertness—it may help memory too.

The study showed that caffeine enhances memory for as much as 24 hours after it is swigged down.

Researchers tested about 100 people who drank very little coffee, tea or colas, then showed everybody pictures of mundane things like chairs, shoes and a rubber duck.

Five minutes after showing everybody the pictures, they gave half of the group coffee. A day later they showed everyone similar pictures to see if they remembered seeing the objects before, and the coffee drinkers could recall a lot more than the other group.

It usually took about two cups to supply enough caffeine to help the memory, said the researchers.

I usually drink one cup of coffee each morning at home, or about two if I eat out at breakfast. Just last Saturday I was drinking a second cup at a restaurant, and I thought of the Hopkins study and its conclusion that coffee helps your memory.

"It's not working," I said. I couldn't even remember where I got the coffee.

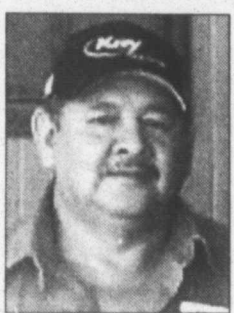

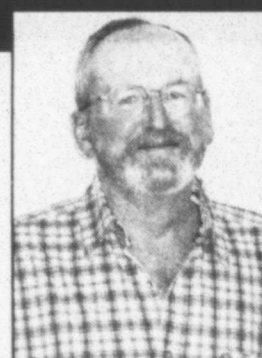

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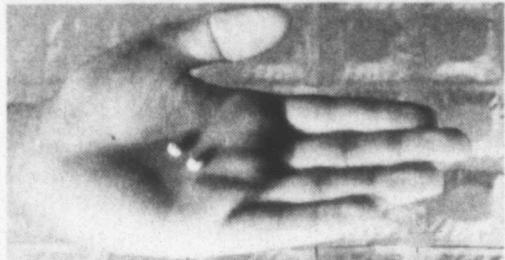

2014 Tax season to open Jan. 31; e-file and free file can speed refunds

The Internal Revenue Service plans to open the 2014 filing season Jan. 31 and encourage taxpayers to use e-file or Free File as the fastest way to receive refunds.

The IRS noted that several options are available to help taxpayers prepare for the 2014 tax season and get their refunds as easily as possible. New year-end tax planning information has been added to IRS.gov.

The IRS cautioned that it will not process any tax returns before Jan. 31, so there is no advantage to filing on paper before the opening date. Taxpayers will receive their tax refunds faster by using e-file or Free File with the direct deposit option.

The April 15 tax deadline is set by statute and will remain

in place. However, the IRS reminds taxpayers that anyone can request an automatic six-month extension to file their tax return. The request is easily done with Form 4868, which can be filed electronically or on paper.

IRS systems, applications and databases must be updated annually to reflect tax law updates, business process changes and programming updates in time for the start of the filing season.

The October closure came during the peak period for preparing IRS systems for the 2014 filing season. Programming, testing and deployment of IRS systems is needed to handle the nearly 150 million tax returns. Updating these core systems is a complex, year-round process.

HPWD explains one-crop certification option

Presentations at recent grower conferences and stories in the media have referenced a proposed "one crop rule" being discussed by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) Board of Directors.

"We want everyone to know that this is not a rule—but rather a proposed certification," said HPWD Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo. "This is one of several options being considered by the Board of Directors as we look at possible revisions to HPWD Rule 5. It's important

that we have good locally-determined water conservation policies. It's for this reason that the Board is actively seeking input from County Advisory Committees and residents within the district," Tate said.

Possible revisions to Rule 5 include adoption of an 18-inch-per acre (1.5 acre-feet) annual production rate as well as several options to allow producers a choice in reporting groundwater use. This includes the proposed "One Crop Certification" and alternative methods such as meters, nozzle packages, and

energy consumption.

The proposed certification would allow agricultural water users to certify their compliance with the allowable production rate by verifying the production of a single crop per irrigated acre.

Based on existing usage data, producers of a single irrigated crop traditionally apply no more water than the proposed 1.5 acre-feet per acre limit. Because of this, the proposed "One Crop Certification" may be a viable option for producers. For those who practice double cropping, the rules would provide for alternate methods of reporting, such as nozzle packages and run times, utility bills, water meters, or other acceptable methods.

"Producers would voluntarily agree not to double crop under the proposed 'One Crop Certification.' They would plant and harvest only one crop per acre per year. Crop rotation will certainly be allowed as would cover crops for conservation purposes. We are working to develop the logistics of the certification process and will be visiting with commodity groups, area bankers, area industries, and other interest groups before any final decisions are made," Tate said.

Confined animal feeding operations (CAFOs) may be able to report their water use by animal inventory or head count.

He added that the Board is also reviewing the contiguous acres definition and water banking provisions.

"Our County Advisory Committees will meet and work

through the proposed rules. HPWD will have additional meetings to seek input from the public and other interested groups. We encourage everyone to contact their respective District Director or County Advisory Committee members to give them your input. It is our desire as a Board to take the necessary time and seek input from all parties to establish rules within the district," Tate said.

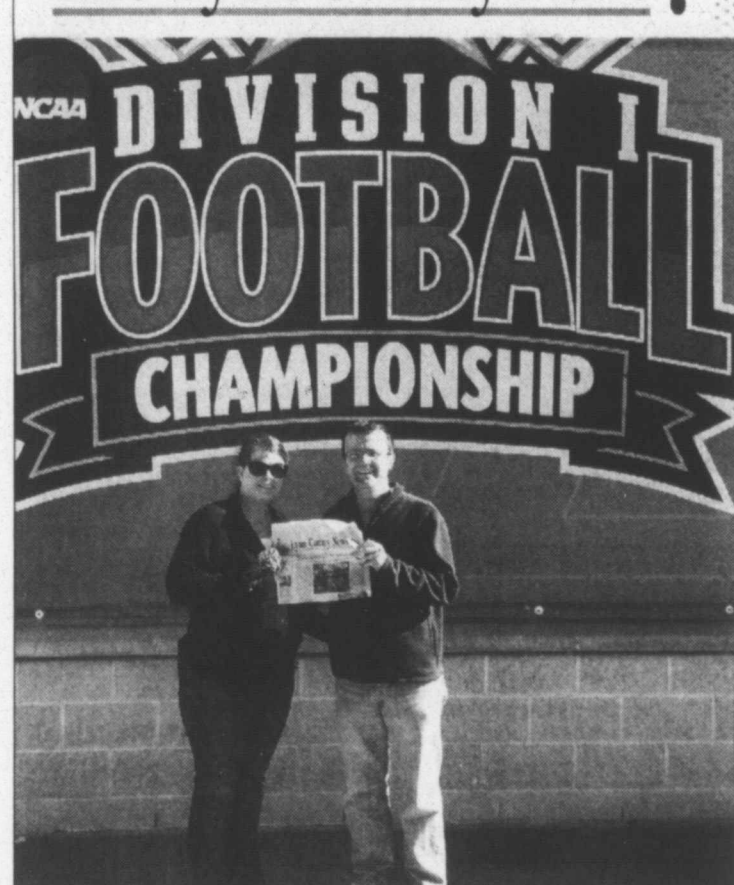
