Wolves Downed At Lubbock 42-0

Colorado High Wolves were on the losing end of a 42-0 victory for Lubbock's Estacado High Matadors Saturday night in a District 3-AAA game played on Lowrey Field at Lubbock.

It was the ninth straight win for Estacado's title-minded Matadors who have held all contenders to exactly two touchdowns against them this season. The stubborn victors now boast a 7-0 record.

Wolves, pitted against 3-AAA teams this year, now hold a 5-4 record. Sweetwater Mustangs are still in there eyeing the championship with a 7 win, 0 loss, 1 tie record.

Colorado High has no game scheduled this weekend. Game of the week will be in Mustang Stadium at Sweetwater between Mustangs and Matadors. Winner of that battle will move into bi-district contests.

Plucky Wolves, fighting against the odds, managed to pick up only 85 yards rushing with Dan Steakley accounting for 37 yards of that total on Colorado City's final possession of the ball.

the air they completed 5 passes out of 16 tries for a total of 58 yards, one interception. Estacado completed two of five attempts for 67 yards, two interceptions.

Dan Steakley was high Wolf on rushing with 72 yards on 13 carries, topped by his final 37 yard dash.

Randy Parker caught four passes to gain the 48 yards in the air.

Kenny Key caught one pass to make 10 yards for the Wolves.

Estacado turned in a strong offense of 433 yards, made up of 366 yards rushing, 67 yards in the air.

Things got rough for the Wolves early in the game. After making a first down in three plays, one of 6 first downs they chalked up all evening, Wolf Quarterback Keaton Grubbs tossed a pass aimed at Randy Parker.

Estacado's Marvin Turner turned up in the right place at the wrong time and intercepted on the Wolf 24, then raced over the goal line to make the score

6-0 with 10:35 left in first quarter. Kick for the extra point was good to bring it up to 7-0.

Estacado scored again after a march from their own 38 to the Wolf 17 in seven plays and an end run from a pitch out to Larry Miller. With 2:06 minutes to go, first stanza, the score was 14-0, still Estacado.

Matador tailback 138 lb. Jesse Lethridge skipped over from the Wolf 15 early in second quarter and C-City Wolves trailed by 21-0 with 10:38 remaining in first half. Seven minutes later Estacado's James Mosley high-tailed down the field for 48 yards and another TD, leaving the score 28-0 with 3:49 before half.

Determined Wolves played a neat third quarter and the Colorado High's tight defense held Estacado to that 28-0 lead.

Then, in the fourth and last verse, Estacado rubbed it in with 2 more touchdowns, 2 more extra points, within exactly 4 minutes. Mosley grabbed a 52-yard pass for the first. Lethridge went right on a sweep then cut back to cross the goal for the second, with 3:49 left on the clock. Final score 42-0.

Last game for the Wolves will be played in Wolf Stadium against Littlefield Friday night Nov. 22.

Lacy Boles is board member representing the Jaycees, the Rev. Weems Dykes, the Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance.

Board of directors for Community Action Program is made up of one third elected public officials, one third from civic organizations, and one third to speak for the people eligible for help under the program.

Speaker for the Town Hall meeting was John Stripling of Abilene a community developer under the CAP there.

Introduced by the Rev. Billy Wilkinson, member of the original study committee for the Community Action Program, Stripling discussed the possibilities under the program, which is designed to help a community help itself and operates under the (federal) Office of Economic Opportunity.

Three employees will be hired to supervise the CAP in Mitchell County. Salaries of the three, one man and two other persons who can be women, will be paid from federal funds under the CAP division of Office of Economic Opportunity.

Coordinator for the Neighborhood Center is to be a man (over 18) of "good moral character," and at least a graduate

of high school. He will serve as liaison between CAP and the population it serves. He is to plan and supervise activities of the two Neighborhood Aides, keep records of services provided, and have knowledge of the locations and services furnished, the board chairman said.

Much of the coordinator's time will be spent in interviewing and counseling. Salary for the coordinator is \$350 per month, said Piland.

Application blanks for the position are available at the office of Judge Martin, Mitchell County Courthouse.

Aides must also be over 18 years old. They will assist residents in identifying neighborhood needs. They will receive assignments from the Center Director's office and report their progress. They will be expected to work a minimum of 40 hours a week at \$1.60 per hour, to total \$278 a month. Application for position as Neighborhood Aide may be made at Judge Martin's office.

Plans are that the community will furnish a building for the operation of a Neighborhood Center, as that 10 percent share, said Piland.

Piland and the board of directors began "scouting" for a proper building early Wednesday.

From the Neighborhood Center building will be operated a variety of CAP projects "to help the community help itself," said Piland.

High on the list is the Child Development program which includes the Head Start program and a Day Care Center for children with working mothers.

Upward Bound, Adult Basic Education, Summer Recreation, and Safety Education are possible under the Education and Recreation program.

Health program includes family planning, comprehensive health, problems of the aged.

Housing program can feature neighborhood clean-up campaigns, housing rehabilitation, low cost mortgages.

Manpower program will offer on the job training, neighborhood youth corps, the teaching of manual skills.

Neighborhood Center will be the hub of all programs initiated under Community Action Program.

Several of the education programs are already in operation here including Adult Basic Education, the Head Start program, and on-job training for high-school students.

Steering Committee members who set up the Town Hall meeting are Dr. Bill Rhode, Rev. Wilkinson, J. A. Sadler, Jr., James G. McMath, and Judge Martin.

Next Town Hall meeting will be at 7:30 Thursday evening, Nov. 21, in Civic House with all citizens invited and in county invited by the board of directors to be present.

Protest Group Meets Confronts School Board

Colorado Independent School Board members were confronted at their Monday night meeting by a group of about 50 parents who lodged a protest against the resignation of Bob Payne, physical education teacher for elementary grade boys.

Dell Barber, local attorney, was spokesman for the group in their request that Payne be given a public hearing.

Payne submitted his resignation last week after an incident involving discipline of a fifth grade boy. The resignation was accepted, effective immediately, by the school administration.

Barber, speaking for the protest group said at the board meeting that James G. McMath, superintendent, had "suggested" Payne's resignation. The attorney in turn suggested, as a group spokesman, that McMath be replaced as superintendent.

Strong backing for Superintendent McMath was voiced by Curtis Latimer, chairman of

the board, who called McMath "the best qualified school superintendent I know of."

After the 20 minute hearing the board members present were unanimous in supporting the superintendent's stand. The board voted to accept the resignation of Payne. Present and voting were Latimer, Jeff Taylor, Mrs. W. K. Cowan, Du Waldrip, A. K. McCarley, Jr., and Tom Rees. Seventh member of the board, D.B. Trulock, Jr., was absent.

Protestors were organized, several sources told the Colorado City Record, largely by telephoned invitations Monday.

Resignation of Payne, effective last Tuesday, was called "Purely a personnel matter," by McMath when he was asked by the Record for a statement, last Wednesday.

It was, the superintendent noted, the culmination of a full review of Payne's "professional ethics."

Other sources informed the

Record that Payne allegedly slapped a fifth grade boy after the boy was said to have called him "a name" and destroyed school PE equipment.

Payne was not present at the hearing.

According to a woman who was present, the board called an official closed meeting when the 50 men and women appeared for an informal hearing. The board requested that the group reassemble and elect a spokesman.

Barber called for a copy of Payne's resignation and one was provided by the board. The copy was read to the group by Barber, she stated.

"Mr. Barber was not employed by me," said the woman who asked that she not be named. "He was there and the group chose him as speaker."

Several other men and several women asked questions of the board as the discussion proceeded.

Another citizen who attended as an observer said that the group of protestors was made up by about half men, half women, with several rural areas represented.

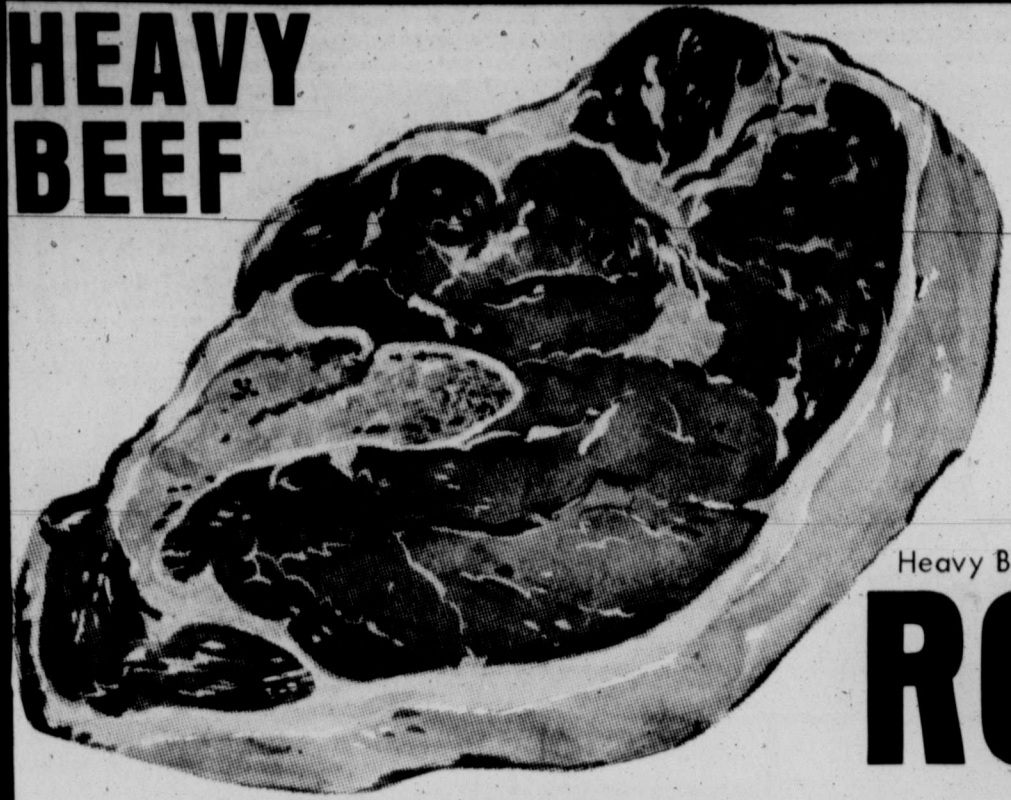
A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows:

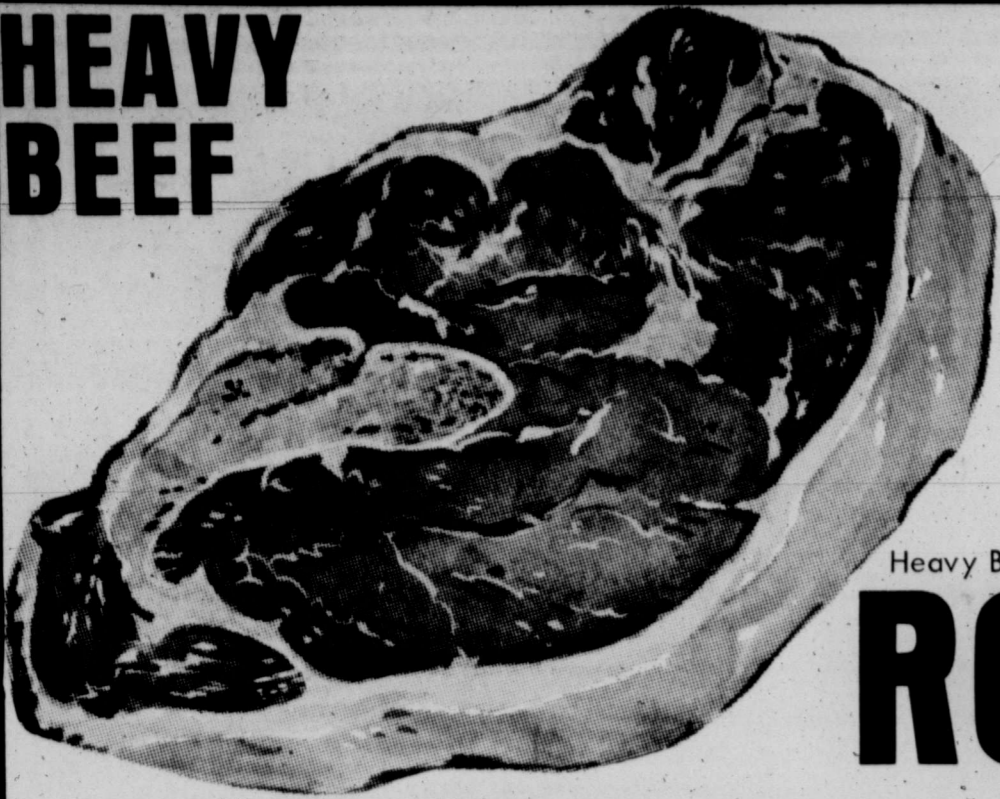
