It would also be contrary to the traditional policy of the United States, declared Mr. Coolidge, to adopt any measures looking to the re-establishment of a monarchy in Germany.

from the plane at a height of
3,000 feet—over a half mile.

DEATHS

Bob Taylor

J. R. Taylor, familiarly known as "Bob" Taylor, died at his home in the Norton country Monday afternoon at 1:20 o'clock, death resulting from an illness of several days. His son-in-law, J. A. Patterson, and neighbors were in the city Tuesday morning arranging for the funeral which was held Tuesday afternoon.

Deceased was almost eighty years old, being 79 years, 10 months and 14 days of age. He enjoyed fairly good health up to a short time ago, and was active in looking after his work and business.

Mr. Taylor came to Runnels county in 1889, and has been a citizen of this county for almost a quarter of a century. He moved here from Ball county, where he had lived since a little boy, coming to that county with his parents from an Eastern state when he was a child.

Deceased had been married three times, and he is survived by a wife, seven children, and three step-children, one step-child, Mrs. J. A. Patterson, having died a few years ago. The children were all notified of their father's serious illness several days before the end came and all were at his bedside when his soul took its flight into the world beyond the grave.

The children are: John Taylor, of Bronte; Mrs. Nancy Jones, of Collin county; Mrs. Vina Goff, of Temple; Mrs. Ollie Wilson, of Galveston; Miss Maggie Taylor, of Waco; Mrs. Laura Crockett and Ben Taylor, of Norton.

The funeral services were held at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon and interment made in the Norton cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Hester, Methodist pastor of Norton, and a large crowd of sorrowing friends were present to pay a last tribute of respect to one who was frequently referred to as "Uncle Bob Taylor."

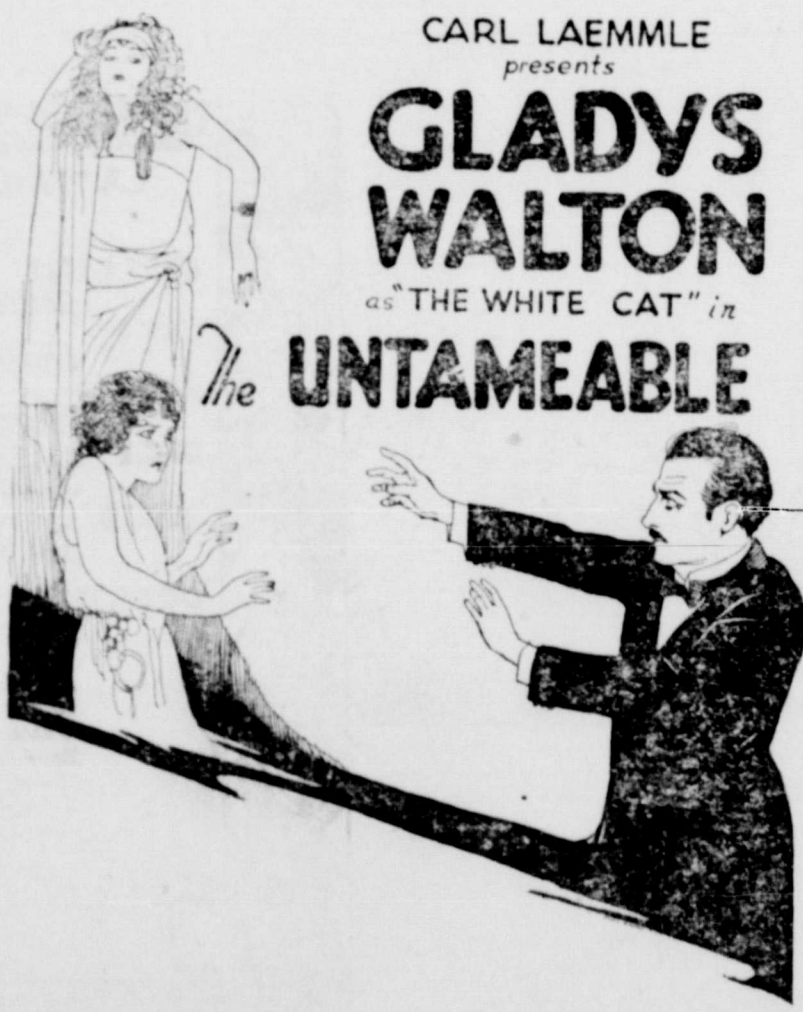

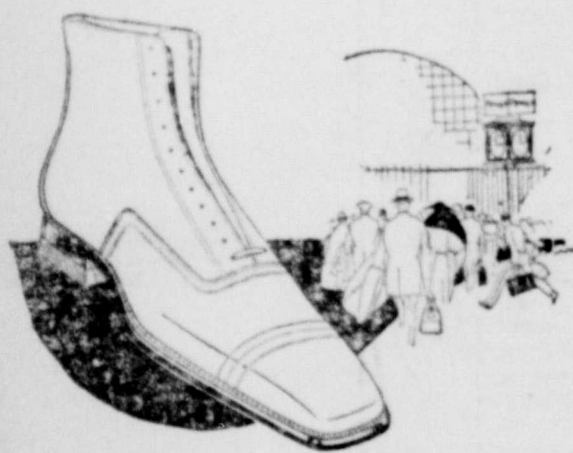
