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Cotton Pickers Assured Gasoline

Important Farm Matters Discussed At Meeting Of Officials Here Wednesday

Fifty-three County Agents, AAA-Administrative officers, County Committeemen, FSA, Emergency Crop Loan Officers, Seed Breeders, from sixteen surrounding counties, also Extension Service men from A. & M., held a meeting in Lamesa on Wednesday and discussed the Cotton Seed Subsidy Plan.

The morning meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was led by C. H. Mosley, State Compliance Supervisor with the Triple-A from A. & M. College. Also talking to the group was F. E. Lichte, Cotton Gin Specialist from the Extension Service, College Station. The morning meeting was presided over by K. J. Edwards, District Agent Extension Service of A. & M.

E. A. Warnert of Colorado City, and a member of the State Cotton Improvement Board also spoke before the group.

The meeting was divided for the afternoon session with the Triple-A Officials meeting in the Methodist Church where a discussion was held on the Compliance for 1943. The County Agents held their meeting in Mr. Baskin's office in the basement of the Post Office. The topic of their discussion was on the 1942 Annual Reports, 1943 Plan of Work, 4-H Club Work for 1942-1943, and General Administrative matters.

Counties represented at the Wednesday meet are Nolan, Mitchell, Howard, Martin, Midland, Andrews, Ector, Gaines, Borden, Fisher, Lynn, Kent, Concho, Tom Green, Glasscock, and Dawson.

School Teachers From Nine Counties Here For Meeting

Miss Edgar Ellen Wilson, Elementary Education Supervisor from the State Department of Education; E. H. Boulter, Deputy State Superintendent, and Miss Madge Stanford, assistant Director of Equalization, Division of State Department of Education, are in Lamesa today, Thursday, for a meeting with County Superintendents and elementary school teachers, of Dawson County and surrounding counties.

The meeting has been called for 3 o'clock, p. m., in the District Court room and approximately 300 teachers and school officials will be in attendance, from Dawson, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Borden, Howard, Martin, Andrews, and Gaines Counties. Among these will be Dean Robertson, County Superintendent of Garza County; Lenore Tunnell, County Superintendent of Lynn County; Lee Fulton Terry, County Superintendent; I. A. Pearce, County Judge Borden County; Ann Howard, Superintendent, Howard County; B. F. White, County Judge, Martin County; A. J. Roach, County Judge, Gaines County; and Thomas D. Hamilton, Superintendent of Andrews schools.

Miss Wilson will be the principal speaker and will discuss the developing of a criteria for the evaluation of the elementary schools of the state. She states that to date no standard has been worked out for the evaluation of the elementary school which is satisfactory. High schools have long had a basis of comparison which is fairly satisfactory. She has asked that the teachers of each county organize the elementary teachers so that something definite can be accomplished this year.

Ginnings Ahead Of Last Year

Due to continued fair weather and ideal harvesting conditions in Dawson County the number of bales of cotton ginned this year is thought to be many times that of last year up to the present time.

While no actual survey of each gin in the county has been made, it is estimated that the total ginning for the county will reach a figure of approximately 15,000 bales by the end of the week.

Cotton is reported as opening at a rapid rate and the demand for pickers exceeds the supply in some instances.

The fear expressed by some farmers that gasoline rationing would result in pickers leaving the country has been relieved by a telegram received this week by Lamesa Chamber of Commerce from J. H. Bond, Regional Director of War Manpower Commission of Dallas, stating that gasoline would be made available to all workers, which includes cotton pickers, going to and from essential occupations.

Estimates on 1942 cotton yield continue to be made by informed sources and vary from 60,000 to 75,000 bales. If the weather continues favorable the larger estimates are expected to materialize.

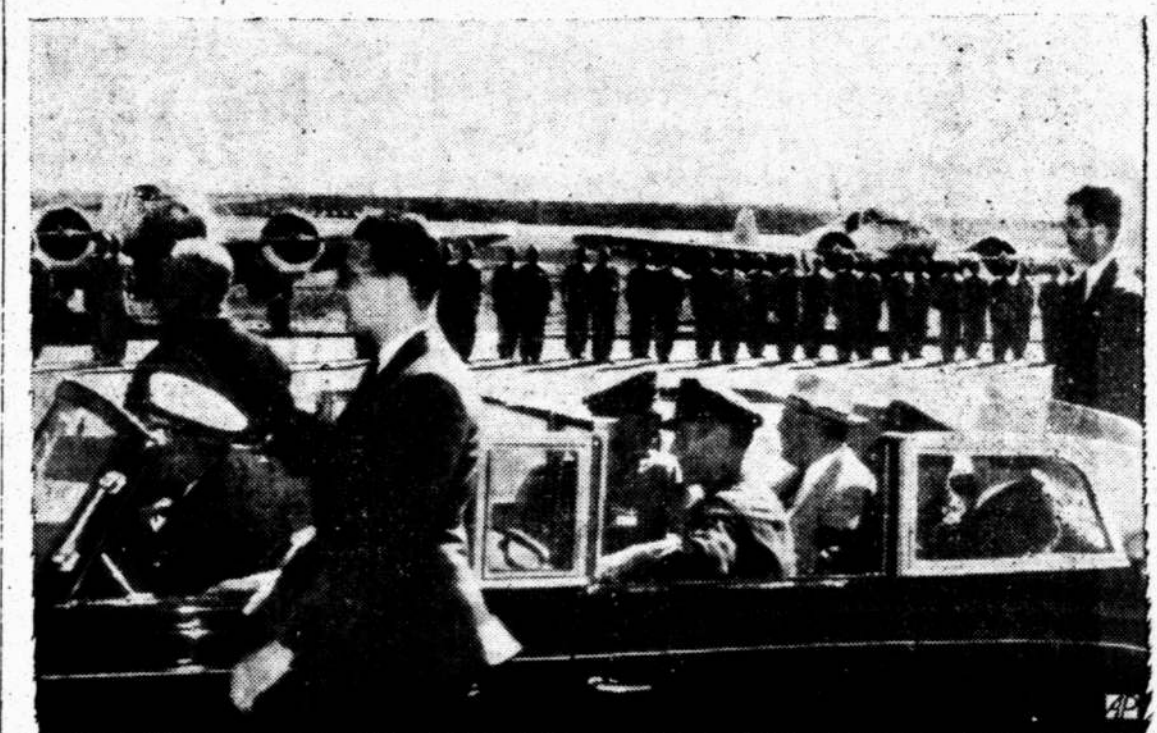
SAM FOSTER, SEMINOLE INDIAN EMPLOYED AT DEWEY'S BARGAIN CENTER

Lamesa School Children Busy Gathering Scrap

The "Junior Ranger" Scrap Campaign, staged by the school children throughout the nation got underway on Monday morning, with Dawson County children hard at work bringing in the scrap.

No reports are now available on the amount the county schools have collected, but Lamesa High School and Elementary Schools units report a splendid gathering of 75,138 pounds through Tuesday afternoon. This amounts to approximately 50

pounds per pupil in all the Lamesa School for an average collection. The divisions among the two schools are as follows: Elementary School 56,655 pounds, High School 18,483 pounds.

The Sophomore class has accounted for 245 pounds of the scrap rubber. The pupils are bringing their sales tickets to the schools to establish their records for sales of disposal of

To The Citizens Of Dawson County

Friends: it has just been brought to my attention that an article signed by Lieutenant James E. Garrison, of the Lamesa Glider School, has caused some consternation and even resentment. A subsequent article, signed by A. M. Bennett, reflects the misunderstanding which I would like to clear up.

First I would like to apologize for any slight insinuation against the efficiency of the Lamesa law enforcement department. I am told that it is the proud boast of this department that few crimes go unpunished. This is an enviable and admirable record to which I offer my sincere congratulations.

Lieutenant Garrison is not a Catholic and does not speak for the Catholic Church. He is looking at the question from the important position of student Commandant and in the light of morale and unity. No attack whatever has been made by the Catholic Church, not even a charge of inefficiency. The "long time members of the Catholic Church" referred to by Mr. Bennett, assure me of his impartial and unbiased interest in the prosecution of justice. It is a point of justice to know that no charge has been made by the Catholic Church.

Some property belonging to the Catholic Church of St. Mar-

garet-Mary has been stolen and acts of vandalism, such as window breaking, have been committed, but the same have not been reported because of our inability to name any suspects. We take it for granted that our property is protected but we realize that the sheriff is not able to be at all places at all times. Hence we decided to let the matter drop and hope for better things in the future.

Democracy, a form of government of which we are proud and for which we fight, is based not on the strong arm of the law but on the good will of the people. It demands self restraint, generous thoughts as well as acts and a broad understanding and sympathy for beliefs and motives. If these traits are present our democracy is strong, if they are absent it is weak. The Catholic Church, as many of you know, was born in the pains of intolerance and hatred yet at no time has it countenanced much less taught hatred of any person. At present the Catholic Church in Lamesa enjoys the respect and charity of the citizens. For that evidence of democracy we are grateful and in that spirit we hope to do our best for God and country.

Grocers Asked To Watch Sugar Expiration Date

Retail grocers of Lamesa are requested by the Dawson County War Price and Rationing Board to watch the expiration date on all canning sugar purchase certificates. If a certificate has been issued for 60 days, it is no longer valid, Miss Peggy Robertson, clerk of the board's sugar panel, announced Thursday.

"Merchants are also advised they should not accept sugar which is being returned by homemakers who have not used all their sugar in canning. If there is any sugar in excess of the amount used by the canner Sugar Ration Book One should be brought to the rationing board office and adjustments will be made accordingly," Miss Robertson said.

Telegram Monday From Director Clears Matter

Gasoline rationing will not effect Mexican cotton pickers in this county, when it does go into effect in November. This information was received at the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce this week.

The following telegram was received at the Chamber of Commerce Monday, October 5, from J. H. Bond, Regional Director of the War Manpower Commission of Dallas, Texas:

"Gasoline rationing will not be applied to workers going to and from work in essential occupations. Cotton Pickers in your area are protected under this clause," signed J. H. Bond, Regional Director War Manpower Commission.

Further information on this comes from William M. Jeffers, War Production Board Rubber Director, that migratory workers who move with the harvest from one section of the country to the other are entitled to supplementary gasoline rations to move about as their work requires.

Under the gasoline rationing already in operation in the East and under plans being prepared for national tire conservation, workers engaged on farms rank as essential workers in the war effort, and need have no fear of being stranded away from home.

Workers now in this county who are miles from home, will be entitled to gasoline rations necessary to carry on their work and to get them back to their homes when their work has been completed.

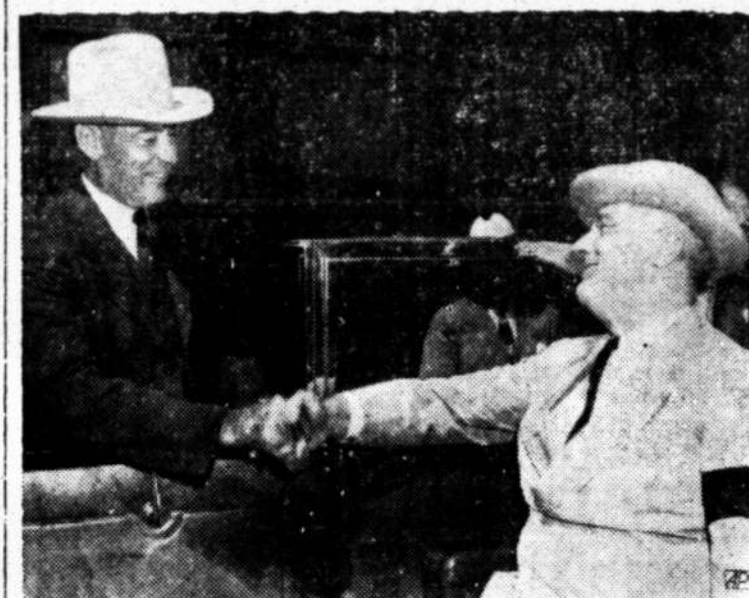

To All To Whom These Presents Shall Come:

WHEREAS, the prevention of fires is of vital im-
portance to the success of the nation's war effort; andWHEREAS, the production of materials essential to
the prosecution of the war by our nation is taxing the
capacity of industrial plants, and curtailment of produc-
tion because of fire becomes a menace to our own safety;
andWHEREAS, war production has made it necessary to
stop the manufacture of many lines of civilian goods, in-
cluding buildings materials; andWHEREAS, throughout its history the State of Texas
has suffered loss of lives and property due to fire; andWHEREAS, statistics on fire losses reveal that the
cause of fires, to a large extent, can be controlled by in-
tensive education and intelligent law enforcement; andWHEREAS, due to the national emergency during
time of war, the safety of human lives, and in the interest
of sound economy, it is the patriotic duty of every citizen
in Texas to aid in the prevention of fires;NOW, THEREFORE, I, Coke Stevenson, Governor of
the State of Texas, hereby proclaim the week of October
4 to 10, 1942, as

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

in Texas. Citizens of Texas, particularly civic, school,
Civilian Defense, and municipal organizations, are called
upon to emphasize the danger of fire and to encourage

County Judges' and Commissioners'
On Resolution To Aid Needy PersonsCommenting on agitation of the
East Texas Chamber of Commerce,
which is seeking to persuade the
various county commissioners' courts
to withdraw support of relief ac-
tivities, J. S. Murchison, executive
director of the State Department
of Public Welfare has issued the
following statement:"The East Texas Chamber of
Commerce speaks for its board of
directors. It does not speak for the
people. The resolution passed by the
West Texas County Judges' and
Commissioners' Association sounds
more like the voice of the people to
me. This resolution pledged the West
Texas commissioners' courts to eco-
nomize on one hand but to accept
essential relief functions as an in-
escapable responsibility of govern-
ment in time of war as well as in
time of peace.Those who have always subscrib-
ed to the 'let 'em starve' philosophy
are now making a zealous attempt
to pin the farm labor shortage on
the assistance programs. The West
Texas courts see the problem in its
true light. These public officials
have not been misled by the rep-
resentations of the East Texas Cham-
ber of Commerce which, although
there is not a farmer on its board,
has suddenly become alarmed over
the dangers of the imaginary prob-
lems of able-bodied persons sub-
sisting on relief instead of on farm
labor. Special privilege groups are
trying to capitalize on the serious
farm labor shortage which has been
created by the attractive wages of
war industries and military man-
power needs. It is silly to charge
that this shortage has been caused
by food stamps, surplus commodi-
ties, old age assistance, aid to the
blind, or aid to dependent children."I hold no brief for any recipient
who turns down work that he is able
to perform. If there be such a per-
son in the state, he will not be per-
mitted to receive government aid.
No employable persons are receiving aid
in any form from these organiza-

Rationing Plan
UnderwayNew farm machinery which was
ordered prior to September 17 will
be delivered to producers, the Texas
USDA War Board has announced.
Producers whose orders were not
filled before the "freeze" date auto-
matically will be given rationing
certificates by county rationing com-
mittees, provided the applicant can
satisfy the committee that the order
was placed prior to September 17.
Orders placed after the effective
date, however, will be subject to
rationing through local boards.County rationing committees have
been established in each of the 254
Texas counties and are now oper-
ating. B. F. Vance, chairman of the
board, said.New farm machinery was frozen
in the hands of dealers September
17 pending organization of local ra-
tioning committees.According to the rationing pro-
gram, farm machinery will be classi-
fied in three groups. Class A ma-
chinery, including items which are
scarce and vitally needed in 1942
production, may be sold only upon
approval of local county rationing
committees. Class B, machinery,
which includes items somewhat less
scarce, may be sold upon certifica-
tion by the farmer to the dealer
that the equipment is required for
current agricultural production.Other less essential items are in-
cluded in Class C and may be sold
without restrictions.Purpose of the farm machinery
rationing program is to insure a fair
distribution of available machinery
in channels where it will do the
most good in wartime agricultural
production.Explaining the wide-sweeping
plans to Texas farmers, B. F. Vance,
chairman, Texas USDA War Board,
said that all farm trucks and traile-
rs, along with virtually all other
trucks, busses, taxicabs and similar
commercial vehicles, would require
Certificates of War Necessity effec-
tive November 15.Vance added that these Certifi-
cates would govern the maximum
mileage that may be operated by
all vehicles to which they are is-
sued.Operators subject to the order
will not be able to obtain gasoline,
tires, or parts without a certificate
of War Necessity, the war board
chairman explained.Already, the certificates are be-
ing printed and will be mailed to all
vehicle owners shortly. After the
certificates are filled out, they
should be returned to one of ODT's
offices established in Texas.Offices now are located in Dallas,
El Paso, Houston and San Antonio
with other new offices expected to
be announced later.Under terms of the new order,
enforcement officers will report to
ODT any instance in which a vehicle
is operated without a valid Certifi-
cate of War Necessity or in viola-
tion of any ODT order.At least 8,000,000 working days
can be saved this year if war work-
ers keep fit. That means 14,000
more bombers, 10 dreadnaughts, 33,
000 tanks to help us win the war.

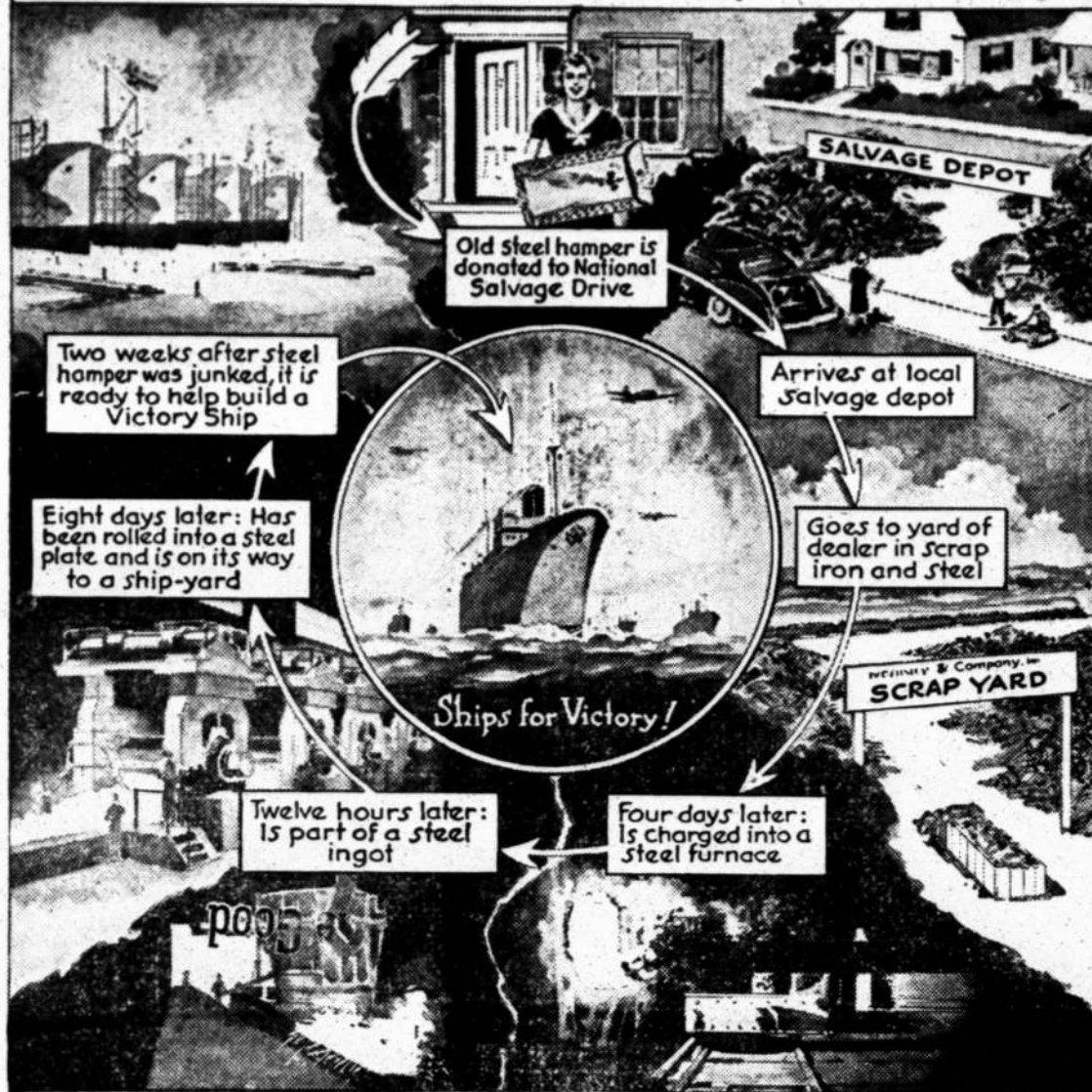

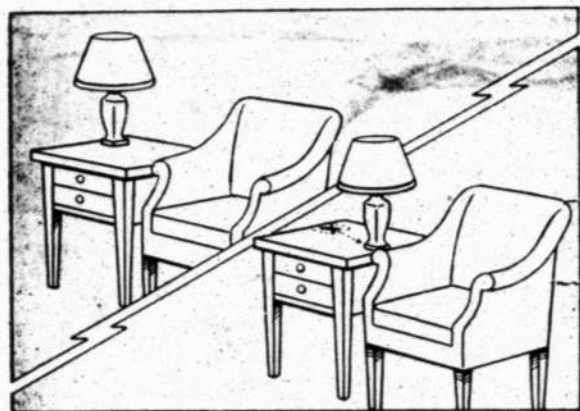

Teamwork Is The Answer To Farm Problems

With so much more work to be done on Texas farms and fewer hands to do it, family teamwork offers about the only solution to a tough problem.

Dosca Hale, specialist in parent education and child development for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says teamwork will not only help get necessary chores done, but it will give every member of the family a feeling of importance and usefulness. Even the tiny tots should be given some assignment within their abilities, she says.

Farm women and girls are taking over the regular farm work and outside chores which enlisted men and other war workers used to do. They are adding this work to the jobs they have always done—gardening, poultry care, cooking, canning, laundry, cleaning, and sewing.

If every member of the family assumes some extra duties, the load will not be so heavy on any one. To help "organize" the family, Miss Hale suggests making a list of all the work which must be done from day to day on the farm. Then an equitable division of work can be made and the plan changed to meet new circumstances and needs.

Planning for family teamwork should include some time for recreation, church, and educational activities, the specialist advises. This is necessary to mental health, especially in war-time. To families kept on the farm by war-time travel difficulties, Miss Hale offers copies of her new leaflet, "Have Good Times at Home." They are available from county agricultural and home demonstration agents.

But the battle was just beginning for the spunky little fellow from Abilene. There were four senior centers on the squad. They all made letters and Dub didn't.

But the 1941 season was something else. Dub stepped in and gained immediate not for his defensive ability — he tied the national record in pass interceptions for a season with nine. He was an all-conference selection.

Broken Fingers
Dub had four fingers broken playing football last season but didn't miss a game. One finger that was broken twice.

He also lost a tooth. But that's nothing new. He's lost a tooth every year since coming to A. and M.—three times in football and once in boxing (he was runner-up for the heavyweight championship in 1941).

1905 Strikeout Record Stands

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — "Strike three 'n' you're out."

Those words went rolling over the baseball park for the nineteenth time against Portland batters that day, July 8, 1905, and a minor league record — nineteen strikeouts by one pitcher in nine innings — was firmly established. Firmly established for the simple reason that it has never been broken.

Charlie Shields, the chunky sandy haired little Scotsman who pitched that record game, is an interesting character — for Charlie is an individualist, and rugged.

Elevator Operator
The ex-pitcher, an elevator operator in the courthouse here, has his own ideas about health and physical culture, and practices them. He never wears underwear nor an overcoat and sleeps in the raw even in the coldest winter. His remedy for rarely-contracted colds is a long, brisk walk in the fresh air.

He never had trouble with his teeth until a few years ago, when several of them got to aching. He yanked them out with pliers.

Charlie set his pitching record while playing for Seattle in the Pacific Coast League. He entered baseball in 1897 with the Memphis Chickasaws, then a semi-pro team; from there he went to John McGraw's Baltimore Orioles in 1902; then to the Pacific Coast for several years before retiring in Memphis in 1914.

Shields is a modest, reserved gent except on two subjects — his strikeout record and marriage. He'll readily tell you he's positive his record will stand because:

"When you send nineteen of 'em back to the bench, that's doing something."

Doesn't Intend To Marry
Just as readily and more emphatically he'll also tell you that he isn't married and never intends to be.

At 61, he's a picture of health. His friends call him "the best salad maker in this part of the country," and hide him about being a strict vegetarian. Charlie admits, though, that now he attacks juicy steaks fairly frequently.

The veteran recently went to his first baseball game in 28 years and exited with quite a few comparisons between the modern game and the game of his day.

Homemade Sauer Kraut Aids Diet

Variety and interest may be added to the diet with homemade sauer kraut, says Mattie Phenix, the county home demonstration agent for Extension Service, Texas A. and M. College. "Not only interest and variety are to be considered, but the nutritive value of sauer kraut is to be considered," she continues to say. The lactic acid fiber content aids digestion and regulates the removal of waste materials from the body. The normal action of the intestines is stimulated and growth of auto-intoxicating bacteria is prevented. Kraut because of its vitamin C content is a preventative of scurvy.

During the month of October, the home demonstration club members will see kraut made at the club meetings. The method is as simple as this: Prepare the cabbage by removing the damaged leaves; quarter the heads and remove the core portion; and shred directly into a stone, keg or jar or into an enameled container. (Remember that exposure to the air will increase the loss of vitamin C.) To five pounds of cabbage, add two ounces of salt, and toss thoroughly. Repeat this process, until enough cabbage has been shredded into the jar. Press it firmly (do not bruise by packing with a weight) and cover with uneven pieces of cabbage or leaves. Place cheese cloth on top and then a plate or wooden board; then place a weight on top of the cover. A jar of water is usually a good one.

The fermentation period will last from 10 to 20 days, depending on the temperature. The temperature most suitable for fermentation is 75 to 85 degrees F. One should care for kraut by examining it daily and carefully removing the scum that forms. The cloth may be removed, washed and replaced. The cabbage should at all times be below the brine.

When the fermentation period is over, the kraut should be a very light yellow in color, clear, crisp, and tart. Then it may be canned. Fill the cans or jars and before sealing tightly, exhaust for ten minutes or until the center of the container reaches a temperature of 180 degrees F. Then seal, and process in hot water bath, pint jars and No. 2 tin cans for 10 minutes and quart jars and number three tin cans, 15 minutes.

One may use kraut as lettuce is used or in combination with meat and vegetables to make one-dish meals. A tasty salad may be made by combining chilled kraut, apples, and a small amount of grated carrots and salad dressing. Another salad may be made by using chilled chopped kraut, grated carrots, chop-

ped green peppers and dressing. For a very good one-dish meal, use the left-over meat, and mashed potatoes. Put the chopped meat in the bottom of a baking dish, then a layer of kraut, then a layer of mashed potatoes and bake until the potatoes are brown.

Instructors In Nutrition Phases Available

Texas has nearly 10,000 Red Cross nutrition instructors, Frances MacKinnon, director of the Red Cross Nutrition Service in the Midwestern area has notified Mildred Horton, chairman of the Texas State Nutrition Committee.

Reports compiled recently showed 474 classes had been taught by 964 instructors with an aggregate enrollment of 10,934. Red Cross nutrition certificates have been issued to 8,473, the report shows.

More recently the number of qualified instructors has been increased through a series of nutrition refresher courses in the state arranged by the Red Cross and the State Nutrition Committee. The courses were taught by Hazel Bratley, San Antonio, regional representative in nutrition for the Office of Defense Health and Welfare Services.

Ninety-nine persons, most of them graduate home economists, completed the refresher courses. Classes

Control Of Colds Urged By Dr. Cox

With the advent of fall, and colds becoming prevalent, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, makes the following suggestions as to ways to control colds.

With a shortage of fuel facing all of us, our houses are likely to be chillier than usual during the early fall months. Look up your supply of sweaters and have them ready for use on these first chilly days. Get out some other heavy clothing and warm bed coverings at the same time.

Eat plenty of simple nourishing food. Have your meals at regular hours. Drink plenty of water. Take some exercise out of door, every day. Get the necessary amount of rest.

If you are caught in the clutches of a cold, unawares, don't treat it lightly. It may turn into something very serious, if neglected. The quickest way to get over a cold, or to bring it under control, is to go to bed, keep warm, eat lightly,

by which these seasonal illnesses may be ward off, or at least may be gotten under control before they do any serious damage.

Keep as fit as possible. Dress according to the weather, indoors and out-of-doors. Put on a heavier suit when a cold snap comes. Use a raincoat, overshoes and umbrella on rainy days. Change as quickly as possible, into dry clothes if you are caught in a drenching downpour.

Emergency Meat Plan Announced

Texas poultry producers can help cover up the bare spot of the civilian meat supply by producing poultry during the off season, the Texas USDA war board announced this week.

Production of extra chickens will be in addition to the record production of eggs, laying hens and meat chickens which farmers are supplying to meet all wartime requirements for 1942, B. F. Vance, chairman of the board, explained.

Aim of the recently announced program, in which Secretary of Agriculture Wickard called for 200,000,000 extra chickens, is to supplement the supplies of beef, pork, veal and lamb available for domestic consumers after sufficient quantities of the so-called red meats are reserved for all military and Lend-Lease requirements.

Efficient operation of the emergency program will be necessary so that the extra chickens produced will be marketed during the coming fall and winter months and out of the way before full attention is given to 1943 production, Vance said.

"If one million producers raise 200 chickens each, we would reach the goal which has been set, and Texas, as a large poultry state, can help put the program over," the chairman said.

Despite a record production of all livestock which is expected to yield 24 billion pounds in 1943, total demand in prospect adds up to 27 billion pounds, or 3 billion pounds more than the supply. Roughly, 6 billion pounds or more, or 25 percent of the total meat production will be required for the armed forces and Allies during this fiscal year. This leaves roughly 18 billion pounds of meat available for civilian use, or about 3 billion pounds short of the demand in prospect.

"ARE YOU INTERESTED?"

By V. Van Bolden, Principal of Negro High School.

I know as I sit at my desk this morning, thinking of words to express the gratitude of myself and the Negro people of our community for the consideration that Mayor Jobe has shown in having our streets improved and the school campus graded; that the walls of my classroom shut out a horrible vision of human suffering.

All over the world, with every tick of the clock, hundreds of people are dying. Everywhere as I write, men are maiming, mutilating, burning each other in to all eternity. Women are being buried with their babies in their arms under the ruins of their bombed homes. Whole peoples grow sunken-eyed, bareboned, rickety—easy preys to pestilence after famine, and with every breath we take in, some starved child breathes out its last.

It is in the face of this awful reality that I ask of you white friends, Are You Interested? Are you interested in what is going on in Lamesa? Are you interested in the conditions of your Negro citizens?

White Friends:

1. Have you visited the Negro community in your city recently?

2. Did you know that your loyal Negro workers live in deplorable slum districts that could do nothing but perpetuate gangsterism?

3. Are you content to let your Negro citizens inhabit the most deplorable section of the city?

4. Are you content to let your Negro children run the risk of discrepancy, petty outlawry, poor housing conditions and poor health?

5. Did you know, dear white friends, that some of our Negro families live five families to a home, and that the home is in the rear of a cafe, thus exposing our youths to scumery and all kinds of evil?

Are you interested? If you are, help us with these problems. There is so much that you can do. Please take time out and visit our colored community. Help us move the City Limit sign so that we may be incorporated as part of the city.

Hoarding Gasoline Will Void Your Insurance and Endanger Lives

Civic leaders in the promotion of fire prevention are facing a heavy handicap of increased hazards to overcome during Fire Prevention Week, October 4 to 10, declares Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

Innumerable fire hazards were created in a number of Texas cities last week when unfounded rumors, spreading at an almost unbelievable rate, told of proposals to impose gasoline rationing without notice. Citizens rushed to filling stations to buy gasoline and take it home in any type of container available.

The buying raid on gasoline dealers took place several days before official announcements said nationwide rationing of motor fuel would probably be made effective in November.

"Every person in Texas who is hoarding gasoline has automatically voided fire insurance on his property," Commissioner Hall announced. "Persons foolishly trying to hoard a few gallons of gasoline have done three things:

"First, they have jeopardized their insurance. When gasoline comes into your home, YOUR FIRE INSURANCE POLICY GOES OUT. Unless you have a special permit from your company, the policy simply says that gasoline is a more powerful explosive than dynamite and that it will not stand guard over a house where gasoline is stored—even a small amount. Your policy literally says this in different words, but that is what it means.

"Second, they endanger the present low insurance rates of Texas—the lowest of all time. Losses effect all insurance rates, and if excessive dwelling fires are caused by careless hoarding of gasoline, then the recent 25 per cent reduction on residence rates could easily be wiped out.

"Third, they also jeopardize their lives and the lives of all members of their families when gasoline is stored on the premises. Gasoline

fires are already responsible for the loss of too many lives in this state. During August gasoline caused seven of the 16 fire deaths in Texas."

"Too few people realize that just pouring gasoline from one container to another very frequently generates static electricity that will cause an explosion of gasoline vapor. Gasoline has more explosive power by volume than dynamite. None of us would think of keeping 100 pounds of dynamite in the home—that would be too dangerous. Yet, a gallon of gasoline has about the same explosive power as is contained in 100 pounds of dynamite.

"We need at this time to use a lot of common sense and reasoning. History has never recorded a time when fire prevention was of greater importance than it is today. Fire prevention is needed, not for just a few days or a week, but every day in the year. It is foolish to throw safety and protection aside by taking undue risks with gasoline."

Texas standard fire policies, the Commissioner points out, clearly state that insurance is void if gasoline is stored on the premises unless a permit is obtained from the insurance company. The company doesn't have to serve the policy holder with any kind of notice.

"Should a fire result from stored gasoline," Hall said, "the property owner could not collect any insurance."

Examination For Typist Positions Announced

A new examination for all stenographer and typist positions in federal service in Louisiana and Texas, as well as Washington, D. C., was announced today by Owen C. Taylor, Postmaster.

The positions to be filled are junior stenographer, \$1440 a year; senior stenographer, \$1620; junior typist, \$1280; and senior typist (Washington only), \$1440. Applicants for the Washington, D. C., positions must be at least 17 1/2 years old. Dictation must be taken at the rate of 80 words per minute to qualify for the junior stenographer positions, and typists must be able to type at least 35 to 40 correct words per minute.

The field examination for Louisiana and Texas is open to both men and women, with 16 years as the minimum.

Applications are not desired from any person engaged in war work, unless the position for which they are applying will employ higher skills than their former position.

Full information and application forms for the examination may be obtained from local Post Office.

Mechanical Men To Be Interviewed Here Monday

Men in the Lamesa area with mechanical or technical experience or ability will be given an opportunity to enlist directly into the Air Forces Saturday and Monday morning, October 10 and 12.

A representative from the Lubbock Army Flying School will be in the Chamber of Commerce office to interview all persons in this area interested in enlisting to become skilled aviation mechanics and technicians.

Men 18 to 50 physically able to pursue any kind of mechanical or technical trade in civilian life likely will be eligible for enlistment under the nationwide campaign conducted by the Air Forces.

All kinds of mechanics, including farmers who operate tractors and make the minor repairs required by them, are needed by the air arm of the army to help maintain and repair the bomber training planes used in the instruction of the future flying officers of the Air Corps.

Information will be available for applicants or possible applicants who might wish it.

Married men with no children will be paid \$78 monthly, including government aid for dependents and the men will be furnished food, clothing, quarters and medical treatment. Promotions usually come rapidly in the Air Forces.

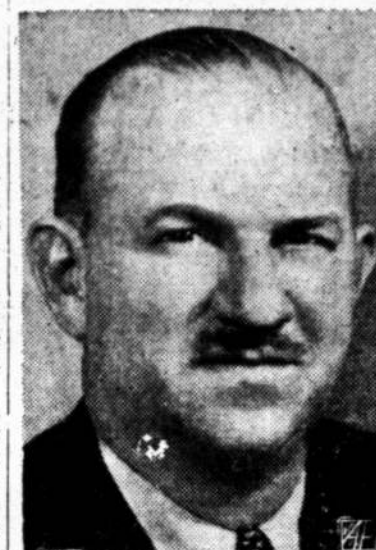

Know Your Hens; Cull Flock Of All The Loafers

There's no place for loafers in the poultry flock in these days, says George P. McCarthy, poultry husbandman of the A. and M. College Extension Service. The loafer can't conceal herself from an owner who knows the signs. Before finishing the laying year, she looks slick, with glossy, oily feathers. On the other hand the dry and frayed laying clothes of the hard-working, well-fed hen are easily identified. The oil and fats from her feed went into egg yolks. The loafer stopped laying and made feathers. Her place is in the stew pot.

Another way to test is to examine the beak and shanks. If the hen belongs to one of the common yellow skin varieties and is a layer, the color will be faded or bleached out, and the comb will be full of blood, red and waxy. If she's a loafer it will be pale and shiveled.

The skin of a layer is soft textured like a kid glove. A nonlayer has a hard, dry skin which is relatively tight. Cull the loafers and save the best layers for breeding stock, McCarthy says. Next year their daughters will help you produce more Food-for-Victory.
