Cotton Harvest Making Progress

The Bogata Gin had weighed in Clyde Mitchell reports the bulk of the crop will be out in a few days if the good weather holds.

Harvest was becoming general again as several days of favorable weather allowed fields to dry out. Samples classed at the USDA Cotton Division Classing Office in Dallas, totaled 27,477 for the week ending October 8, about 6,000 more than the previous week. This brought the seasonal total to 82,582, according to Roy W. Gilreath, Officer in Charge.

For the week, samples from 933 bales ginned in Lamar County were classed, bringing the season's total to 2846 from that county.

A summary of Consumer and Marketing Service records, compared to the previous week, showed grades averaging lower, staple slightly longer, mike continuing to improve and Pressley barely lower.

Low Middling Light Spotted replaced Strict Low Middling Light Spotted as the predominant grade. They respectively accounted for 44 to and per cent of the cotton. There was a wide spread down to third place where Low Middling Spotted accounted for six per cent of the samples. Early or grass caused a grade reduction for 34 per cent of the samples, up from 23 per cent the previous week.

The predominant staple length continued to be 15 1/16" at 43 per cent. In second place was 31/32" at 27 per cent and third place was held by one inch at 13 per cent.

An even 56 per cent of the cotton was in the 3.5-4.9 premium mike range. The 5.0-5.2 range accounted for 23 per cent and 5.3 and higher 27 per cent.

Pressley strength readings averaged 77,000 pounds per square inch the same as a week earlier. Th range low 80,000 PSI accounted for 77 per cent; 80-84,000, 17 per cent and 85,000 or higher six per cent.

Austin. — A new year-round voter registration law went into effect for Texans on October 1.

Predictions are that it will make significant changes in the political structure of the state. New rules governing the operation of political party conventions also will begin operating next year.

These major provisions in the new voter registration act are noted:

- Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary cutoff 31 days before each election). Registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period, one of the shortest in the nation, was October 1 - January 31.

- Eighteen-to-21-year-olds may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new U. S. constitutional amendment.

- Roving or resident registrar deputies may sign up voters anywhere — apartment, union halls, club rooms, dormitories, industrial plants, office buildings, supermarkets or private residences. The law provides that "no voter registrar shall refuse to deputize a person." This is expected to increase sharply the use of deputies to round up voters.

Predictions range upwards of five million total eligible voters in 1972, an increase of a million over 1970.

Voters must have resided in the state a year and in a county for six months to qualify for local election participation. Those who have lived in Texas more than 30 days but less than a year before the November 1972 general election can vote for presidential and vice presidential candidates under special residency registration with county clerks.

STATE TO FIGHT FOR TREASURE — The state is prepared to go to the U. S. Supreme Court to get title to all artifacts recovered from Spanish galleons which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Texas Antiquities Committee was told a decision is near by Brownsville federal court in a long legal dispute over the treasure. Platono Ltd., a Gary, Ind., salvage firm, recovered the valuables in 1967 and proposed a 50-50 split with the state which demands the entire treasure.

Meanwhile, Committee learned an underwater archaeologist has agreed to help set up a program to recover artifacts from another ancient Spanish galleon near Padre Island next year.

COURTS SPEAK — The Supreme Court dismissed the appeal of relatives of Clyde Barrow who lost a suit against Warner Brothers Studio claiming character defamation in the movie "Bonnie and Clyde."

In a pile of other decisions released after a summer recess, the High Court:

- Set a November 17 review of a San Antonio district court ruling which the Alcoholic Beverage Commission maintains would rob it of its power to suspend dealer's license for violations.

- Upheld an injunction against a Tarrant County dentist who allegedly claimed he could diagnose and treat cancer.

- Said the Texas Railroad Commission has power to change

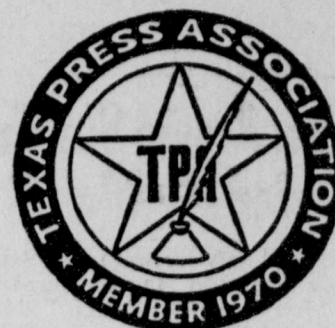

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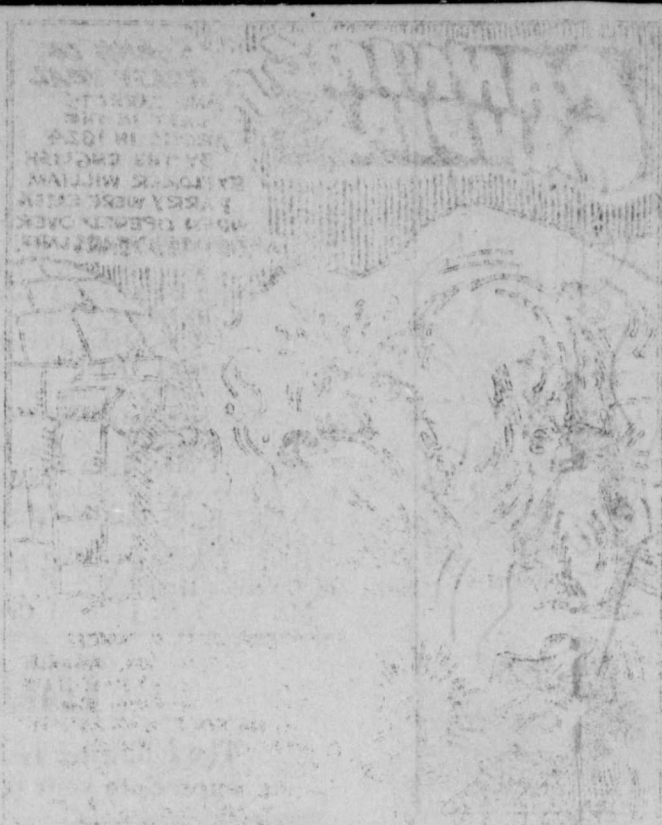
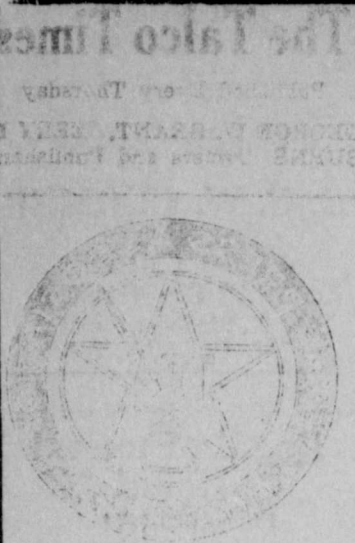

Deport Creek Watershed Plan 85% Complete

The work plan development on the Deport Creek Watershed is approximately 85 per cent complete.

Beade Northcut, civil engineer, and James G. Hill, field construction engineer for the Soil Conservation Service, made a field construction feasibility check on the proposed floodwater retarding structure for the Deport Creek Watershed on October 6. Marshall H. Nichols, District Conservationist, accompanied the engineers. The group met with the Deport City Council, sponsors of the project, after the field review.

Estimated construction and installation costs have been prepared. The land rights map for the structure has been drafted. The project and problem local

map has been prepared and forwarded to the Soil Conservation Service Cartographic Office for processing.

The preparation of the preliminary draft for the work plan will be completed in October.

The Soil Conservation Service work plan staff to date has not received the Wildlife Report from the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife Department. Field work for this report was completed in September by Gary Spencer of the State Parks and Wildlife Dept., Joe Camp, Planning Party Leader, and a representative from the Bureau of Sports, Fisheries and Wildlife Department. Their favorable report is anticipated shortly.

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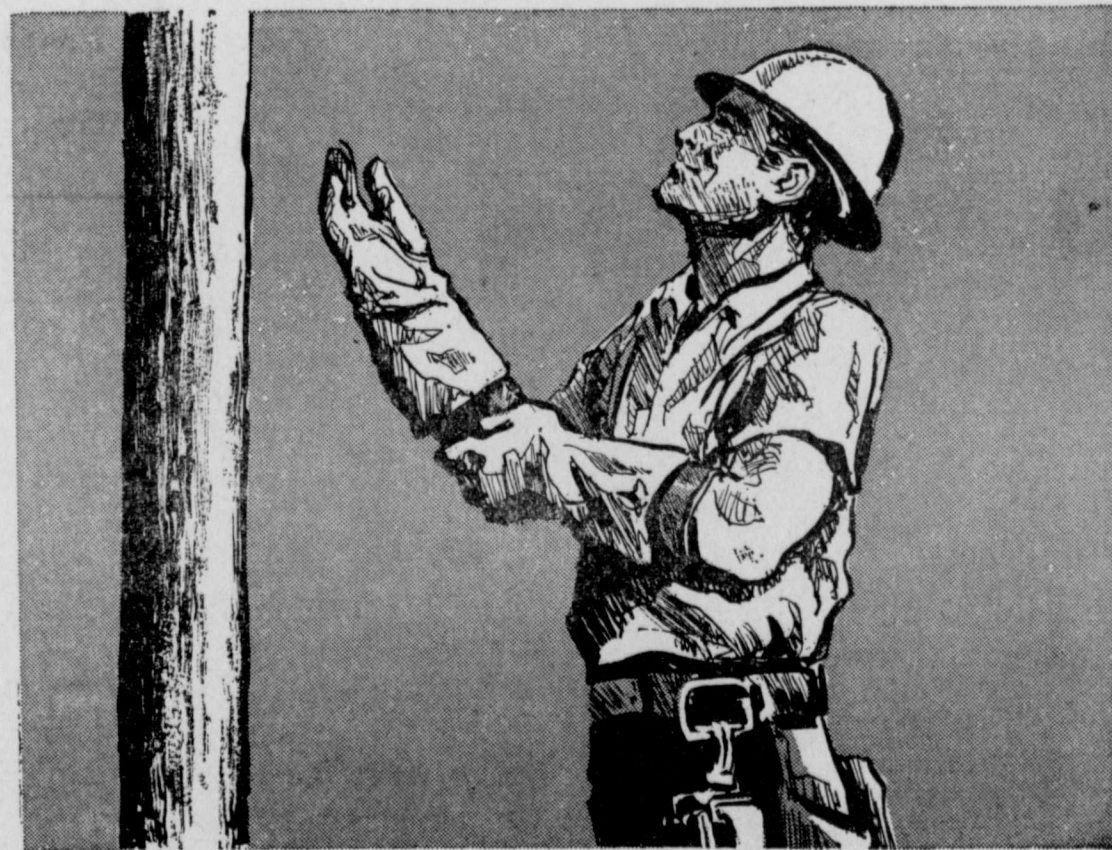
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
