The principal speaker for the occasion was Pierce Allman, director of the Southern Methodist Alumni Assn. of Dallas. An excellent Friday night program, F. H. A. Talent '68, was presented by Areas I through V. Katie Laine, exchange student from the Hereford chapter, told the group about her native Finland.

Thel Daniel of Spearman was elected to serve as state president for the year 68-69. She has served as Area I parliamentarian the past year. Jane Floyd represented the Hedley chapter as voting delegate at the Saturday morning business session. The Hedley group visited the state capitol building and saw the exterior and grounds of the governor's mansion. The mansion was closed to visitors at the time the group was there.

FHA Loans

Rural residents in Armstrong, Gray and Donley Counties benefited from a record \$627,000 in loan funds advanced by the Farmer's Home Administration in the 1967 Calendar year. This represents an increase of \$36,840 over the previous year.

The greatest rise was in the Emergency Loan Program. 52 loans being made for \$223,320 against 31 loans for \$140,370 in 1966. This type loan provides a standby source of credit for eligible farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain credit elsewhere because of drought conditions and untimely freezes.

Also, 1967 saw the first rural recreation loan made in the three-county unit. A loan of \$48,000 was made to a group of 60 farm and rural families in Gray County to develop the McLean Country Club and build a club house and swimming pool. This facility is being widely used by area resi-

Cotton Allotment Transfer

Cotton farmers will vote again this year on whether to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county but within the state. The vote will be held by mail. The voting period is tentatively set for May 13 through May 17. If approved by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote, it will permit such transfers for 1969.

Tornado Season

Texans are reminded that the tornado season is with us again. Statistics from the United States Weather Bureau show that Texas led the nation again last year in total number of tornadoes, with a total of 232, which was an all time record. Only two months of last year were free from tornadoes in Texas, January and November. More than half of them, 124 came in September, 115 of them in connection with Hurricane Beulah.

Weather alerts may give that extra margin of time which might mean the difference between life and death, but it is still up to each individual to take the safety measures necessary to protect himself in case of a tornado. The safest place to be is still a storm cellar.

Remember that acreage to be designated as diverted may not be grazed during the period between April 30 and October 1, 1968. Cover on these diverted acreages cannot be harvested in any manner, other than grazed during the approved period.

Dates To Remember

April 30, Last day to graze diverted acres

Last day to place 1967 cotton in CCC loan

Wheat loans mature

May 1, Last day to report wheat acreage

May 31, Last day to place 1967 grain sorghum in CCC loan

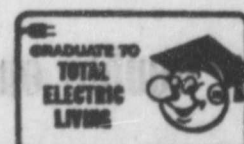

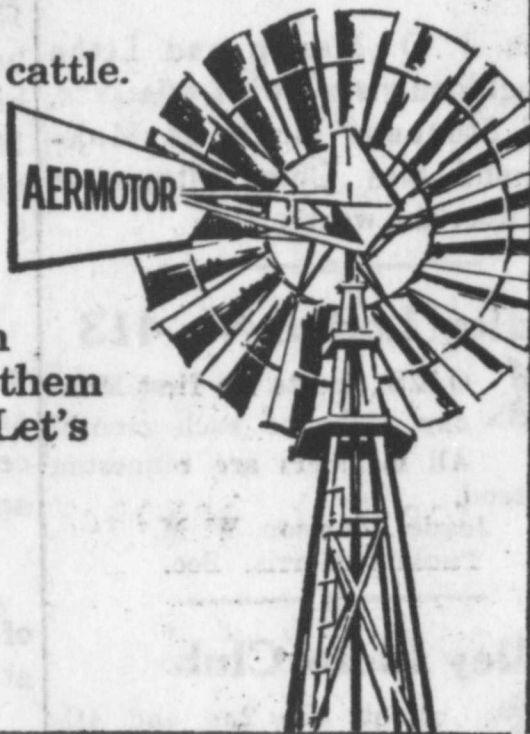
