TWENTY ARE DEAD IN FLOODED REGION

FEAR RECEDING TIDE WILL LEAVE EVEN MORE BODIES

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., March 18.—
Known deaths from floods that have
overrun portions of Alabama, Georgia
and Florida reached 20 today,
with fear expressed that additional
fatalities would be disclosed by re-
ceding waters.
Sixteen of the known deaths were
in Alabama, three were dead in
Georgia and one in Florida. Elba
had the greatest toll with ten deaths
listed. Two were dead in Geneva,
two at Flemington and two at Polk.
All three of those drowned in
Georgia were swept from a high-
way bridge, while the Florida casu-
ality was an aged man who died of
exposure.

Relief Army Busy
Meanwhile, an army of relief
workers, made up of the Red Cross,
Alabama National Guardsmen, and
many private citizens, concentrated
their efforts on holding down dis-
ease in the refugee camps established
when residents of Elba, Geneva and
other Alabama communities fled
from their homes.

The food situation also was
acute. Army airmen from Maxwell
field at Montgomery, have dropped
tons of food, clothing and other
supplies to thousands of marooned
persons.
Reports of looting at Elba and
Geneva brought a declaration of
martial law by Colonel W. E. Per-
sons of the Alabama National
Guard. The governor has been ask-

REBELS FLEEING BEFORE CALLES ARMY

INSURGENTS VICTORIOUS IN SKIRMISH

FEDERALS BEATEN IN BATTLE WITH PART OF MAIN ARMY

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Mar. 18.—
The government announced
today the rebels are
panic stricken and have
evacuated Torreon in full
flight.
The rebels were fleeing apparent-
ly toward Chihuahua City. It was
said at Chapultepec Castle Federal
cavalry under General Benigno Ser-
rato expected to occupy Torreon at
5 p. m.
General Almazan, leader of the
federal armies advancing against
Torreon from Monterey, telegraphed
the Presidential Palace from San
Pedro de las Colonias that the re-
bels began their flight from Tor-
reon at sunrise. They were com-
pletely evacuating the city, Almazan
said.

(By Associated Press)
Stiff rebel opposition and heavy
fighting was in prospect today as
powerful federal armies converged
from four directions on the in-
surgent stronghold of Torreon.
General Calles, federal command-
er-in-chief, notified the government
he was moving to attack Torreon in
force and expected to occupy the
city by Tuesday night.
General Escobar, insurgent leader,
was showing no disposition to re-
treat, however, and instead reported
a victory in the first skirmish
with the advancing federals.

Rebels Take Initiative
Taking the initiative, the rebels
attacked two federal columns at San
Pedro on Sunday and claimed to
have inflicted heavy casualties and
taken numerous prisoners. Several
thousand men took part in the en-
gagement in which more than 200
men were reported killed. The re-
bels claimed the capture of 1,200
federals.

Saturday and Sunday in Torreon
were marked by the federal air raids
which left four known dead and
many wounded in their wake. The

CAPTURE TWO WISE COUNTY GUN RAIDERS

POSSE HEMS IN PAIR OF DESPERADOES NEAR NEWARK

FORT WORTH, March 18 (AP)—
Two men were captured, and two
others were believed surrounded in
the Indian Creek bottoms near New-
ark, at noon following the burglary
of the postoffice and two business
establishments at Boyd earlier in
the day.
The two men were captured by
Sheriff George Gage of Wise county
and Constable J. A. Scroggins of
Boyd, about three miles south of
Newark. The officers were walking
when they encountered the bandits.
Both men were armed with 32 cal-
iber revolvers. They were disarmed
and taken to Decatur.
A posse consisting of officers from
Fort Worth and Wise county, about
50 citizens and two airplanes of the
Texas Air Transport, Inc., took part
in the man hunt, and it was reported
that the two remaining bandits
were hemmed in.

NITRO BLAST, PISTOL SHOTS WAKE TOWN

FORT WORTH, Mar. 18.—The
roar of nitroglycerine blasts and the
rapid firing of small guns awoke
the inhabitants of the little town of
Boyd, Wise county, early today.
They heralded the attempts of
four heavily armed men to blast

Goodspeed Given 20 Year Penalty

HENRIETTA, March 18 (AP)—Carl
Goodspeed was sentenced to 20
years in the penitentiary last yes-
terday on charges of murdering A.

with a liquor search warrant. When
found in the house, he was shot
from behind with a shotgun and
was clutching a pistol in his hand.

FOURTEEN DIE WHEN BIG AIR LINER FALLS

HUGE TRI-MOTORED CRAFT PLUNGES INTO CAR ON SIDING IN NEWARK, N. J. TRAGEDY

NEWARK, N. J., Mar. 18 (AP)—
Fourteen sight-seers were killed in-
stantly yesterday in the worst air-
plane wreck there has been in the
United States. The pilot, only per-
son aboard to escape death,
was severely injured.
A huge tri-motored monoplane by
the Colonial Airways crashed into
a freight car loaded with sand while
attempting a forced landing a mile
from the Newark airport after its
motors had stopped.
Lou Foote, the pilot, was hurled
50 feet from the plane by the im-
pact. Those in the cabin were
flung into a heap in the forward
end of the fuselage. Many were
impaled on pieces of torn metal.
Witnesses said the plane appear-
ed to be in trouble from the time it
took off from the airport with its
load of passengers for a trip over
New York city. It rose slightly.
Persons who saw the ship just be-
fore the crash said the propellers
were turning over slowly as
though the motors were dead. The
plane was not more than 200 feet
above the ground.
Engaged Couple Killed
The victims included an engaged
couple, Miss Gertrude Steever of
Bloomfield, N. J., and Reginald
Woodward, a law student who lived
in Brooklyn. The girl's brother also
was killed, as were two brothers, An-
drew and Stephen Magmasi of
Stamford, Conn.

was at a "total loss" to explain the
disaster.

success bright.

'WITCH' POISONER BLAMED IN DEATH

ALLENTOWN, Pa., March 18 (AP)—
Believing that a powerful poison
caused the death Friday of Miss
Verna Octavia Delp, 22, county au-
thorities today ordered a complete
examination of her vital organs.
Miss Delp was the adopted daugh-
ter of August Derhammer, well-to-
do farmer of Green Point. Investi-
gators have established that her
body was carried a quarter of a
mile from the Salsburg Pike to the
spot where it was found in a
field late Saturday near the emer-
gency landing of the Transconti-
ental Air mail. The girl had been
dead about 24 hours.
Again the cry of witchcraft has
been raised in connection with a
Pennsylvania slaying, and in some
sections of Lehigh and Monroe
counties persons are trying to trans-
late the cryptic missives found in
the bosom of the dead girl's dress.

ORDER TROOPS TO COLUMBUS, N. M.

SPIRIT NEGRO AWAY IN FEAR OF VIOLENCE

ATTEMPTED ASSAULT ON WHITE GIRL BRINGS MOB

(By Associated Press)
BRYAN, Tex., Mar. 18.—Fearing
mob vengeance on Matthew Sand-
ers, 40 year old negro charged with
attempted criminal assault on an 18
year old girl at Mexican, Brazos
county, Sheriff J. H. Reed, last
night spirited Sanders away from
the Brazos county jail here.
A mob, drawing its membership
from as far away as Navasota,
formed after hearing of the negro's
arrest. Reed learned of its forma-
tion and drove in an automobile
with his son at top speed to Bryan.
When the mob arrived at the jail,

yesterday. The negro forced en-

knife, and he fled.

Firemen pulled him from the wreck
and worked over his body
for 35 minutes but were unable to
restore respiration. An abrasion on
the head indicated Campbell was
knocked unconscious.

CONTRACTOR, WIDOW DIE OF BULLET WOUNDS

FORT WORTH, Mar. 18.—
Herod Freeman, 54, and

are dead as the result of a
shooting which took place
in front of Freeman's resi-
dence today.
Freeman, a contractor, owned sev-
eral houses in the block and Mrs.
Williams, a widow, rented one of
them.
A controversy over rent, assistant

by Mrs. Freeman, preceded the
shooting. Mrs. Freeman told Hooper
that Mrs. Williams came to the
Freeman home shortly before the
shooting and had a brief conver-
sation with her husband on the front
porch.
John Riley, a neighbor, said he
ran to his front porch after hear-
ing the first two shots fired.
He stated that he saw Mrs. Wil-
liams, mortally wounded, lying in
the street near the curb and that
he then heard another shot and
saw Freeman fall mortally wound-
ed.

Heflin Is Stoned Prior To Speaking

BROCKTON, Mass., March 18 (AP)—
A stone which hurtled harmlessly
through a window and a rain of
pebbles which rattled off the sides
of his limousine greeted Senator
Heflin, of Alabama, on his appear-
ance as a St. Patrick's Day speaker
before the Mayflower Klan No. 2,
Brockton, Massachusetts, in Vasa
Hall here yesterday.
The stone did not interrupt the
senator's speech on the Roman
Catholic church, Mussolini and other
subjects.
The pebbles were thrown by small
boys in a crowd of men and youths
who awaited the senator's departure
outside the hall. There were cries
of "Disgrace to the Senate" and
other similar characterizations as
Heflin climbed into the automobile
on which Klansmen mounted the
running boards as guards.

SLATON TO VOTE ON NEW CHARTER

SLATON, March 18.—Slaton citi-
zens will go to the polls Tuesday to
vote on a new city charter. If adop-
ted, it will give home rule govern-
ment in place of the commission
form that has been in effect for
several years. Under the present
charter, a mayor and four commis-
sioners would serve instead of a
mayor and two commissioners as re-
present. Each of the four commis-
sioners would be elected by a sepa-
rate ward. A city manager is not
provided for.

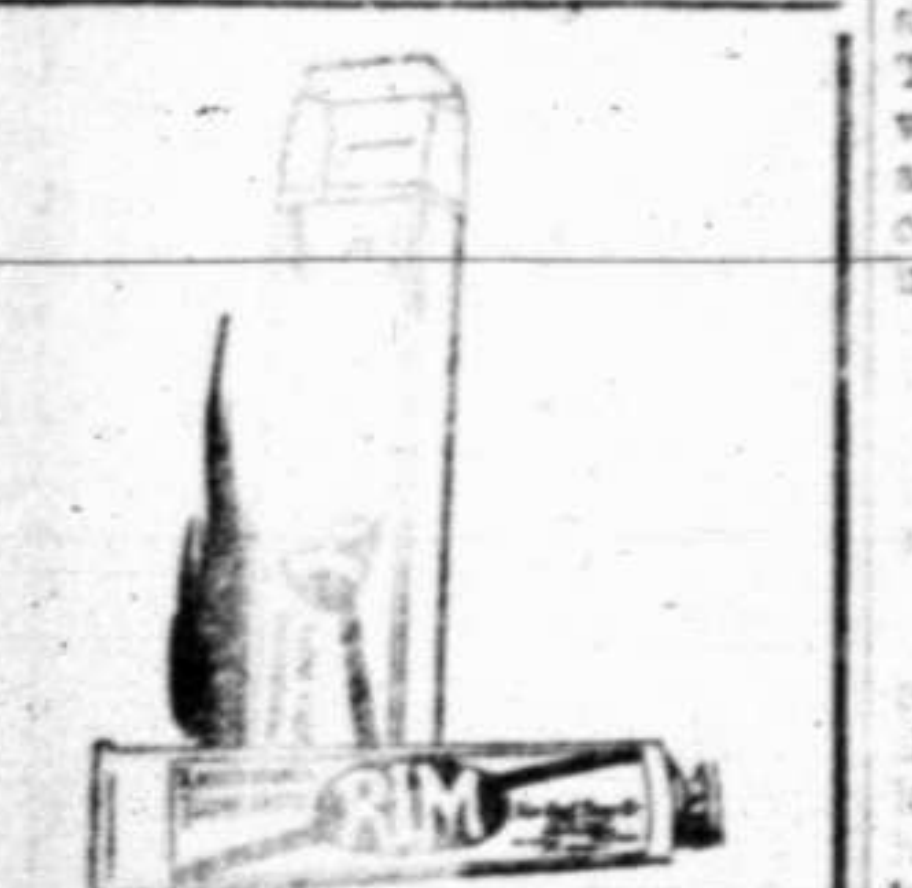

The word "modern" scarcely expresses our art of today as art, because tomorrow it will be no longer modern, but it will still be art. Art is long and time is fleeting. Every period has its modern art. The art of the Egyptians in the dark ages was modern art at that time, as was the art of the French empire in the reign of the Louis, now designated as "antiques." So our modern, or modernistic, as it is sometimes called, will probably be reckoned as American antiques a hundred or two hundred years hence. Modern art is art of the day in which we are living, just as it was the art of the days in which the Louis and the early Egyptians lived. The art of the Venus de Milo would never win a beauty prize today in competition with our modern girls, so the furniture of a hundred years ago does not fit in with our modern life because it represents the comfort of bygone times rather than the speed of the modern world in which we live. Informality is one of its characteristics. There is no pretense about the modern furniture. Steel is steel, copper is copper, wood is wood and paint is paint, with no attempt to make it appear like ivory or marble or anything else. An easy and less expensive way to furnish in the modern trend is to purchase one expensive or so-called expensive piece which is to dominate the room, such as either of the sideboards illustrated, and then have the smaller pieces fashioned by a cabinet maker to suit the character of the dominating piece. The expense, if managed this way, is at least a third less than though one bought the furniture in sets. Or, after securing the dominating piece, one can pick up a chair, a table, or other small piece that will tone in.

Chairs need not have the same tight lines as the sideboard for the dining room, but they should be without ornamentation, and have straight legs. At the left of the illustration are shown two chairs of upholstered wood suitable to the lines of either of the sideboards shown. The third chair at the upper right is upholstered in two contrasting colors, and still in keeping with modern lines, though the back is slightly curved. The chair at the left is more a type for the living room.

The sideboard at the top is very modern, indeed, and is done in white crystal and silver. The shelves between the cupboards are of glass. The flowers add the necessary color spot. Quite different in character, yet much the same in lines, is the sideboard at the lower right. The extremely simple lines accentuate the beauty of the natural wood. This piece really looks best in a room with decorative wall treatment, and the upholstered chairs repeating the colors in the wall paper. A square table with solid base and glass top should be used with either sideboard.

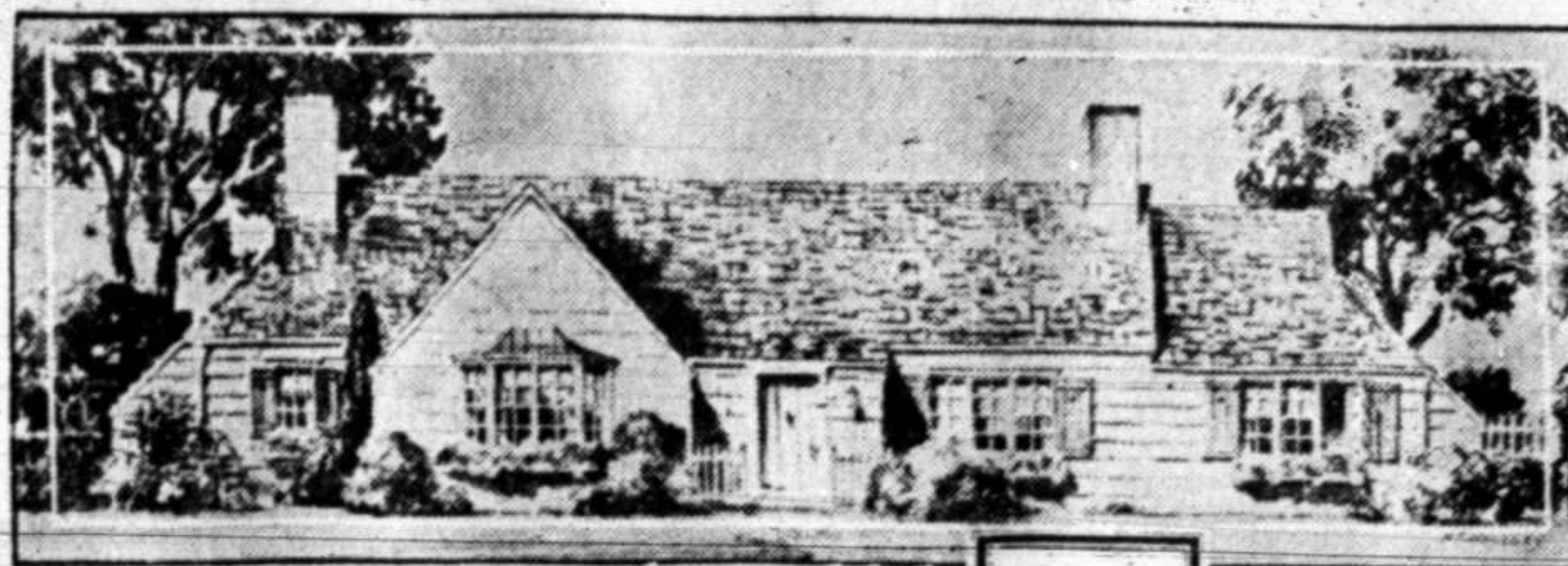

MODERN architecture can't oppose history. Colonial houses must be lumber built. Too many notable of the early days of the republic are recorded as having passed through old Colonial doorways of oak into large wood-paneled living rooms to allow this style of house to be of anything but wood construction today.

The Colonial house shown here is copied from those early days. The millwork is of pine, shingles of redwood painted white, roof of wood shingles painted blue-green, doors and shutters.

The house is long and low, having all the rooms on the main floor—a convenience any woman will appreciate.

One enters a friendly little porch and proceeds into a good-sized vestibule with a coat closet, then through glass doors into a well designed living room. Here one is greeted by a real old-fashioned fireplace with open book shelves; doors lead one to the enclosed porch on the right.

In back of this living room is a bath, modern in every respect, with two large bedrooms leading off a long hall. Each room has a large cedar closet and a linen closet is provided in the hall.

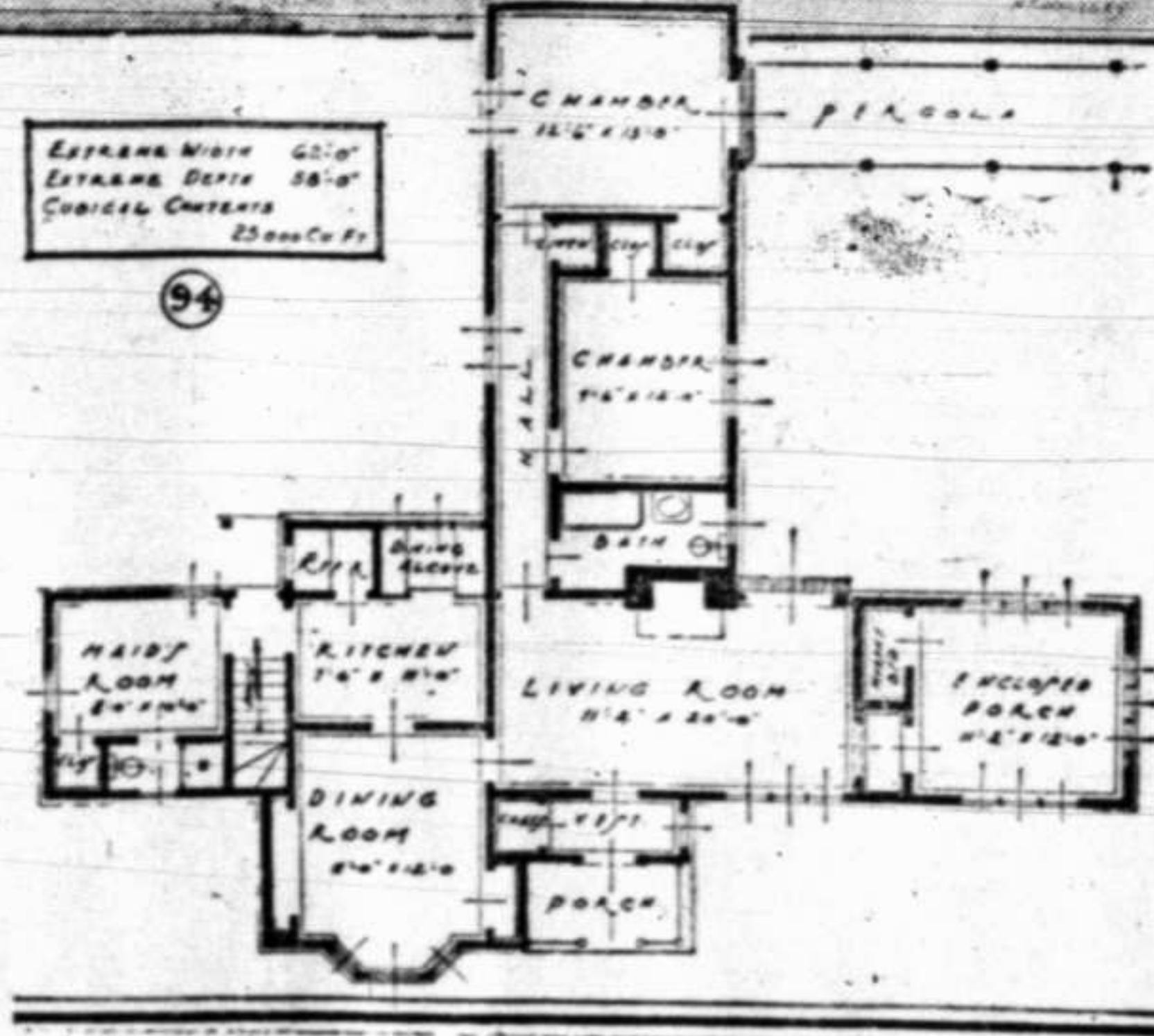
On the left of the living room is a charming dining room with bay

window where one can grow a lovely window box of roses. From here one wanders into an ideal, glossy white tiled kitchen, with every convenience installed for the housewife. A hallway separates the kitchen from the maid's room and bath.

The house should be built on a lot not less than 75 feet in width.

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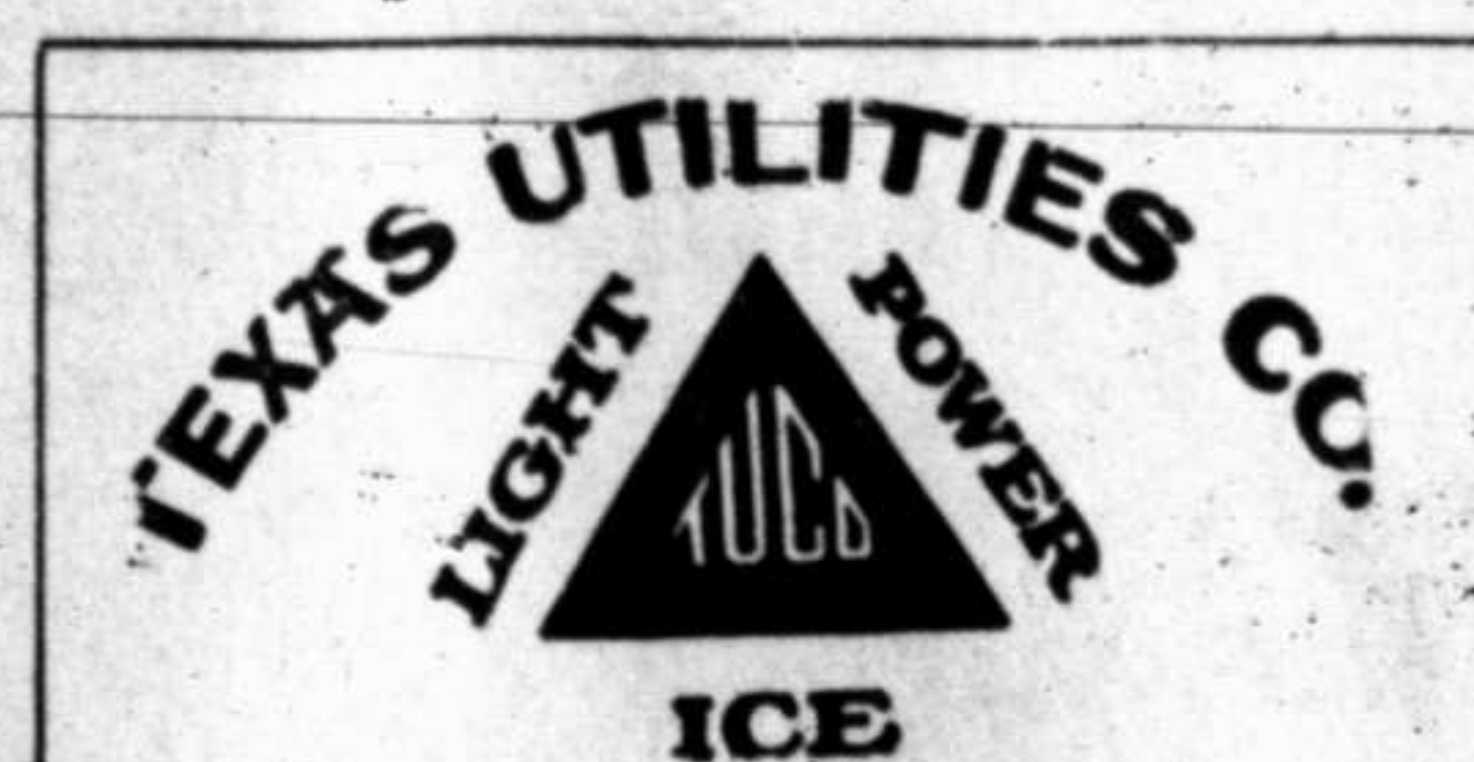
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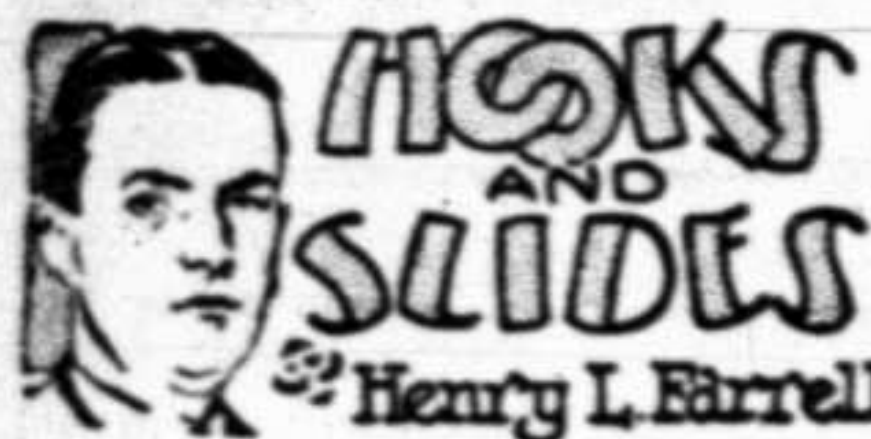

We know that Dempsey, if he has to come back, would have preferred Stripling to any opponent in the class. And well he might; after the display that Stripling gave against Sharkey.

Mr. Carey's Plans

Sharkey is now the big draw fighter. Schmeling went away and left a hot trail to cool. He can't be used while he is in Germany fighting managers.

LONDON, Mar. 18. (AP)—Phil Scott, British heavyweight champion, emulating Jack Dempsey, is to go on the stage, playing the role of "Eddie Chick Cowan" in the comedy, "Is Zat So?" Scott will tour the British provinces, preparatory to a London debut.

Scott is a mild-mannered giant, with a quiet voice. His part calls for considerable conversation and two rounds of boxing. The English champion's new venture will not in any way interfere with his regular light training, he says, and if his proposed match with Tom Heeney, the New Zealander, is arranged the stage will have to do without Scott's talent until the two British fighters settle their dispute.

HEILMANN SHIFTED TO FIRST; SCHUBLE GETS BERTH

He has Francis Sigafos, drafted from Portland of the Pacific Coast League, as a rival while Manager Harris also can play second, but does not plan to do so unless an emergency arises.

Schuble Works Hard

Heinie Schuble, once with the St. Louis Cardinals and last year with the Houston club of the Texas League, has been working his head off to make the shortest spring. He had a .300 average in 1928, a veteran of two years, is a certainty at third.

If Roy Johnson, \$75,000 fly chaser from the St. Louis Browns of the Coast League, fits into the place Harris has opened for him, the Tigers will have an outfielder who possesses of speed and speed.

Harry Rice, who was secured in a trade with the St. Louis Browns last spring involving Manush and Blue, and John Stone, youngster who was brought up from Evansville last fall and proved a sensation, are ideal outfielders. All are better than 300 hitters. Robert Fothergill, whose connections with the club dates back six or seven years is yet to be reckoned with however.

Harris on the Title

George Uhle might have been relinquishing to Cleveland because he had lost his pitching cunning but Manager Harris is not sorry for having the great hurler on his staff. In fact, Harris is counting on the veteran to be a mainstay of the Tiger corps.

Emil Yde, Earl Whitehill, Frank Barnes (from Houston), and Phil Page, portlander from Springfield, are others from whom Harris is expecting much. Owen Carroll, George Smith, Lil Stoner and Sam Gibson are the veteran holdovers from last season.

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YEAR CATTLE MEET TO OPEN SOON

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE IN SESSION AT HOUSTON

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, March 18.—The executive committee of the Texas and Southern Cattle Raisers' Association met today as a prelude to the annual convention here tomorrow, Wednesday and Thursday.

Several hundred ranchers were in the city and more in sombreroes were entering the hotels every hour.

Among the arrivals yesterday were E. B. Spiller, Fort Worth, secretary and general manager of the association for the past 19 years; T. A. D. Moses, Fort Worth, assistant secretary; and Joe D. Jackson, Alpine, former president.

Mr. Jackson said that he and W. W. Turner of El Paso, another past president, were supporting San Angelo's claim for the 1930 convention. Both San Angelo and Dallas were reported to be sending large delegations to capture next year's conclave.

The Hotel of Pampa, will be named president of the association if it follows its custom of elevating the first vice-president to the presidency after a vice-president has served two terms. R. M. Kleberg of Kingsville is ending his second year as head of the organization.

Although all the conventions have been held in Texas and all the presidents have been Texans the association embraces also Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, Kansas, Mexico and Louisiana.

Subsequent delegations from Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas are expected here.

REVISE PLAN FOR U. S. LEAGUE PART

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The stipulation that the League of Nations would notify some person to request an advisory opinion was changed, presumably to avoid any idea that the United States has a permanent representative with the league. Under the present arrangement the league is authorized to notify the United States through diplomatic channels.

Arnold Rastad, Norwegian jurist, presented a memorandum calling attention to the great importance which the smaller countries attach to advisory opinions. If the acceptance of a special protocol for American admission is to be effect of crippling this valued attribute of the court, it would be undesirable, he said. He was convinced however, that the United States had no intention of crippling it, but merely wanted the right to safeguard its interests in connection with political disputes and certainly would not interfere when the council submitted questions touching the internal organization of the league.

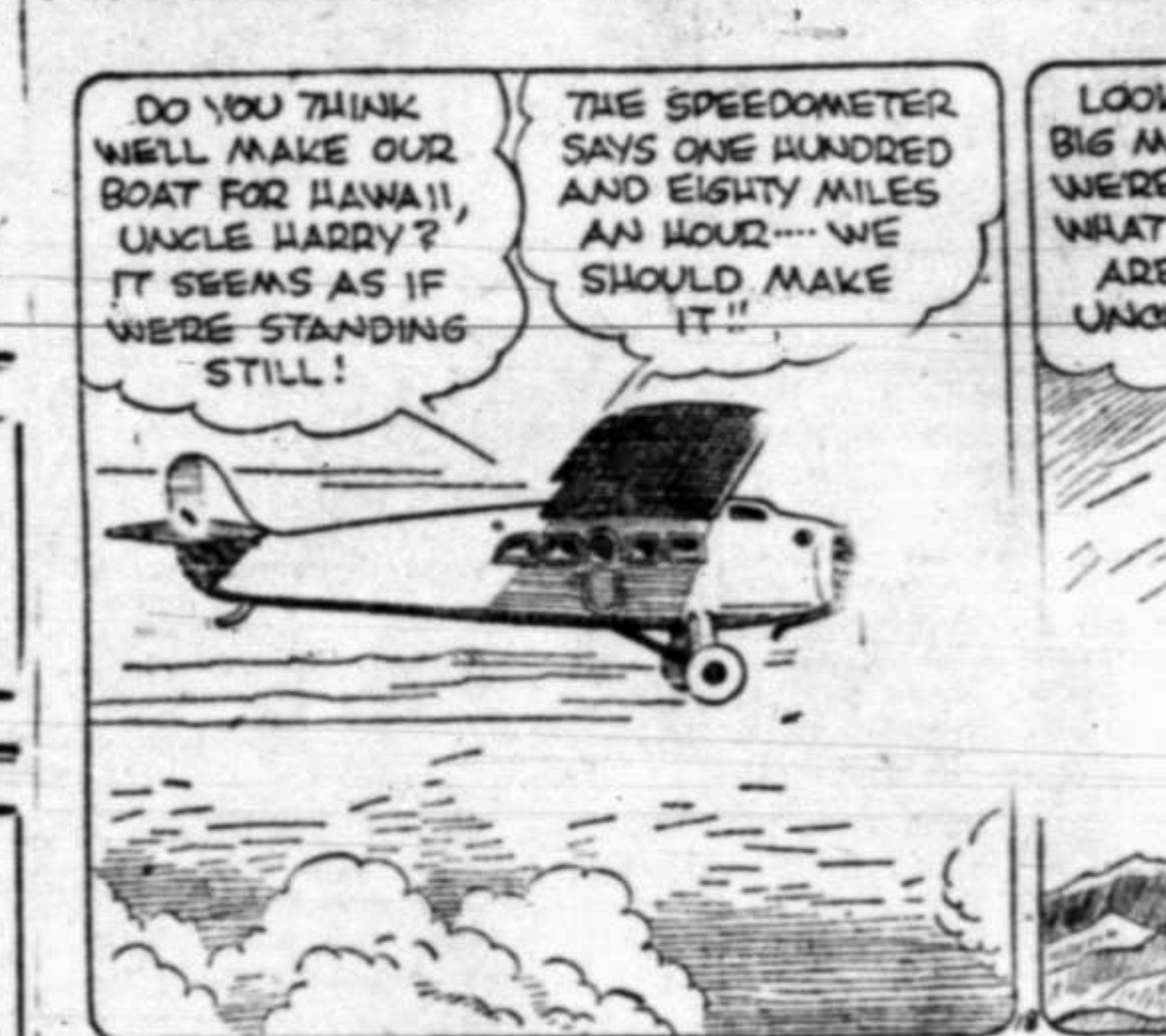

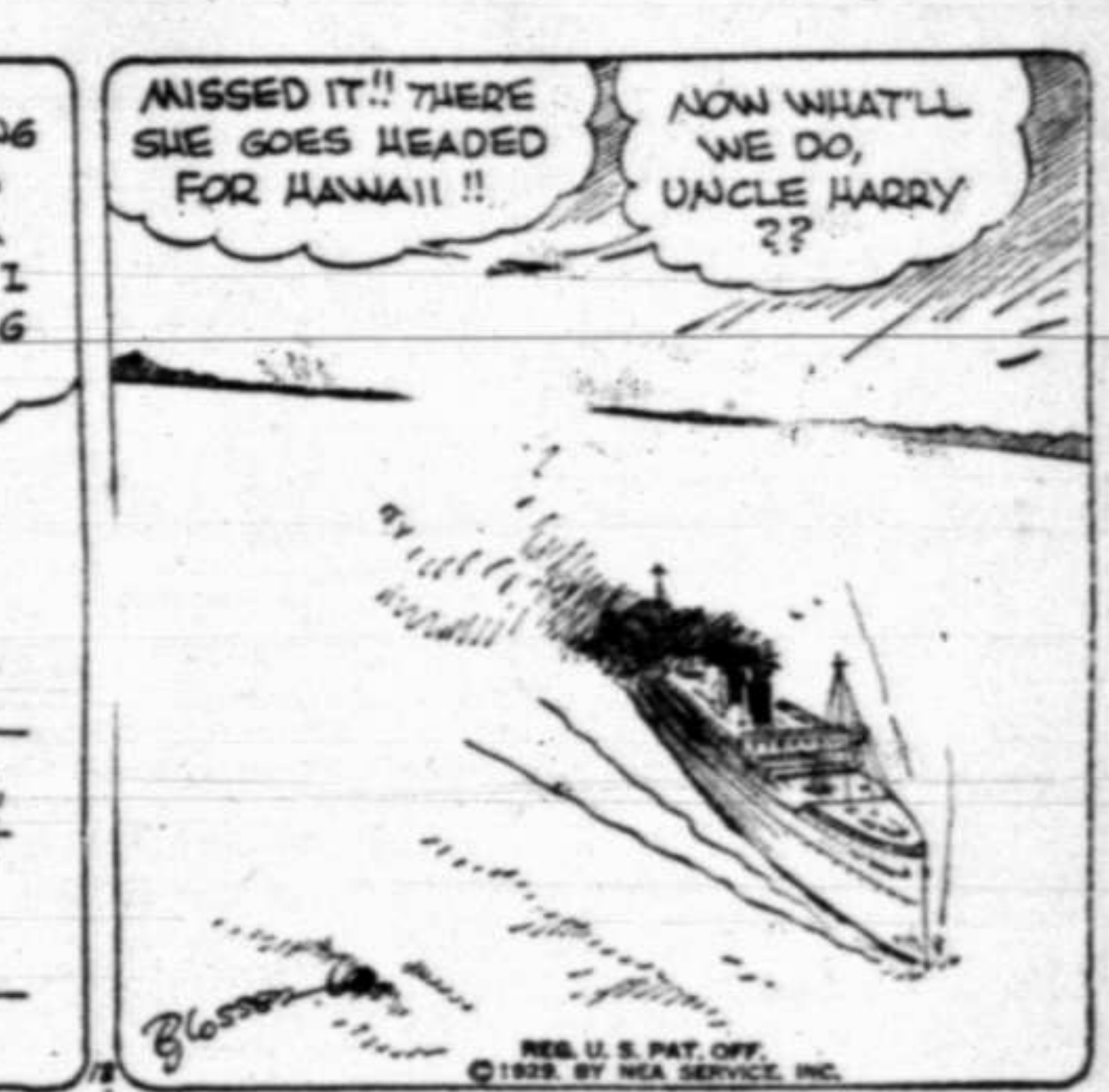

COPPER SALES OPEN BRISKLY

HEAVY BUYING OF THIS ISSUE FEATURES STOCK TRADE

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, March 18.—Heavy buying of the copper shares featured the opening of today's stock market. Nevada Copper opened with a block of 10,000 shares at 61 7-8 and Anaconda with a block of 5,000 shares at 164 1-2, both up fractionally and at new high records. Radio (new), opened with a block of 15,000 shares at 109, off 1-4. Dupont advanced 1 3-4 points and Packard Motors and American Sugar Refining a point each on opening sales. American Foreign Power dropped 3 points, Union Pacific 1 3-4 and General Electric and Union Carbide a point each.

With the possibility of another stringency in call money this week, many traders showed a disposition to take profits in some of the recently strong pool specialties, such as Radio (new), National Cash Register, Montgomery Ward and International Combustion.

Coppers continued in the vanguard of the advance as a result of the optimistic predictions of earnings of the leading producers with the Red Metal selling at 21 cents a pound, and expected to go higher. Greene Cananea quickly moved up nearly 4 points to a new high at 191 1-2 and Miami moved up fractionally to a new high at 355 1-2 and Baldwin Locomotive moved up 9 points.

A better demand also was noted for the Public Utilities. Detroit Edison, Commonwealth Power and Western Union all selling 2 or more points higher in the early trading.

Foreign exchanges opened steady, with cables unchanged at \$185 13-32.

first aerial combat in the history of Mexican revolutions followed the raids, an insurgent plane taking the air against the invaders, but finally being driven off.

One federal flier was brought down by rebel guns. Insurgent troop movement indicated the long expected battle probably would not be in Torreon itself, but in the suburb of Gomez Palacio, three miles out, which provides an even better natural defense than Torreon.

A decisive clash was expected by the government as a federal detachment reported the destruction of an important bridge on the railroad from Torreon north to Chihuahua, cutting off the only avenue of escape by rail for the rebels should they meet defeat.

Troop activity in Northern Sonora indicated that the rebels are taking precautions against an anticipated federal attack from Baa California which is loyal to the government.

EXPECT TO CAPTURE TORREON TOMORROW
MEXICO CITY, March 18 (AP).—General Plutarco Elias Calles, federal generalissimo, notified President Emilio Portes Gil today he was moving to attack Torreon in force and expected to capture the city by tomorrow night.

The general's message to the president said the rebels must either fight or surrender now since a small force operating north of Torreon yesterday succeeded in burning bridges and tearing up rails for a distance of ten miles near Escalon.

His army—estimated here to contain 30,000 men—would be divided into four columns for the attack. General Calles said. He added aeroplanes flying over Torreon had seen further evidences of evacuation of the city. These troops movements, however, now are taken to mean withdrawal from the city proper to Gomez Palacio, where the railroad stops and a soap factory are located, three miles from Torreon. It provides even a better natural defense than Torreon.

Should the rebel forces seek to withdraw to Chihuahua, damage done in two places to the rail line between the two cities probably could delay them until repairs could be made. This damage to the rail line was inflicted by General Carlos Terrazas with a band of twenty men, and Lieutenant Colonel Roberto Pizarro, aviator who alighted near a bridge near Peronal, north of Torreon and burned it. General Terrazas reported a minor encounter with rebels at Asunzola, who retreated north to Escalon, between Jimenez and Torreon, where he burned bridges and pulled up some rails over a distance of about ten miles.

REBELS VICTORIOUS IN FIRST SKIRMISH
TORREON, Coahuila, Mex., Mar. 18 (AP).—Victorious in the first skirmish with federal troops, but fearing air raids which already have taken their toll, revolutionary forces prepared today to defend the city on all sides.

Troops which rebels claimed routed two federal columns at San Pedro, less than fifty miles east of here, yesterday, were massed on two railroad lines to stop the government forces. One line was from Canillas in the south and the other from Torreon on the southwest.

The San Pedro battle followed week-end air raids on Torreon by a government squadron that resulted in injury and death to several persons. One aviator was brought down by rebel guns.

General Raul Madero led the rebels in their victory at San Pedro. The rebels said they attacked the federal columns under General Juan Andreu Almazan and Eulogio Ortiz as they approached the city on two railroad lines. The main body of rebels attacked from the front while 1,800 cavalrymen and 600 infantrymen who had been stationed in the woods several miles away

swept down and engaged federal troops from the rear. Federalists said more than 200 men were killed.

Revolutionists reported they captured seven trains, 1,200 prisoners and "several" airplanes. Last night and early today rebel soldiers began arriving in Torreon with prisoners taken in the engagement. General Jose Gonzalo Escobar, rebel commander-in-chief, ordered that they be disarmed, quartered in temporary barracks and shown "every consideration possible." No executions were reported.

MEXICAN BORDER TO BE CLOSELY WATCHED

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP).—As the center of the Mexican revolutionary activity progresses northward toward the United States boundary, American officials are giving close attention to policies with respect to rebels who may strike for safety this country.

While no formal announcement has been made of the American policy, there was a suggestion that an addition to detaining any rebels who may cross the boundary, steps might be taken to keep them out of this country.

Some movements of American troops in Arizona and New Mexico have been noted and it was presumed this was intended to back up American immigration officials in scrutinizing the rights of any one attempting to come into the United States, and also to support local authorities in preventing the return of any rebels who might succeed in getting through.

TO SPONSOR GOLF MATCH AT CLUB

In an effort to arouse the interest of golfers in Lubbock and secure scores to award handicaps in the coming spring tournaments at the Lubbock Country Club, J. W. Byrne, newly elected professional at the local club, will sponsor a three week match of medal play between club members beginning next Sunday, March 24 and lasting through April 14.

To further increase interest, a pair of golf knickers will be given by McWhorter-Roberts to the one turning in the best scores in the course of the three weeks.

Straight medal play must be adhered to, Mr. Byrne explained. No match scores will be counted.

Florida Conditions Critical
Conditions in Northwest Florida were critical today, with Caryville and Milligan bearing the brunt of the waters. Damage at Caryville alone was estimated at more than \$300,000. Most of the 1200 residents were safe in refuge camps. Citizens of Milligan moved to high ground before the water entered their village.

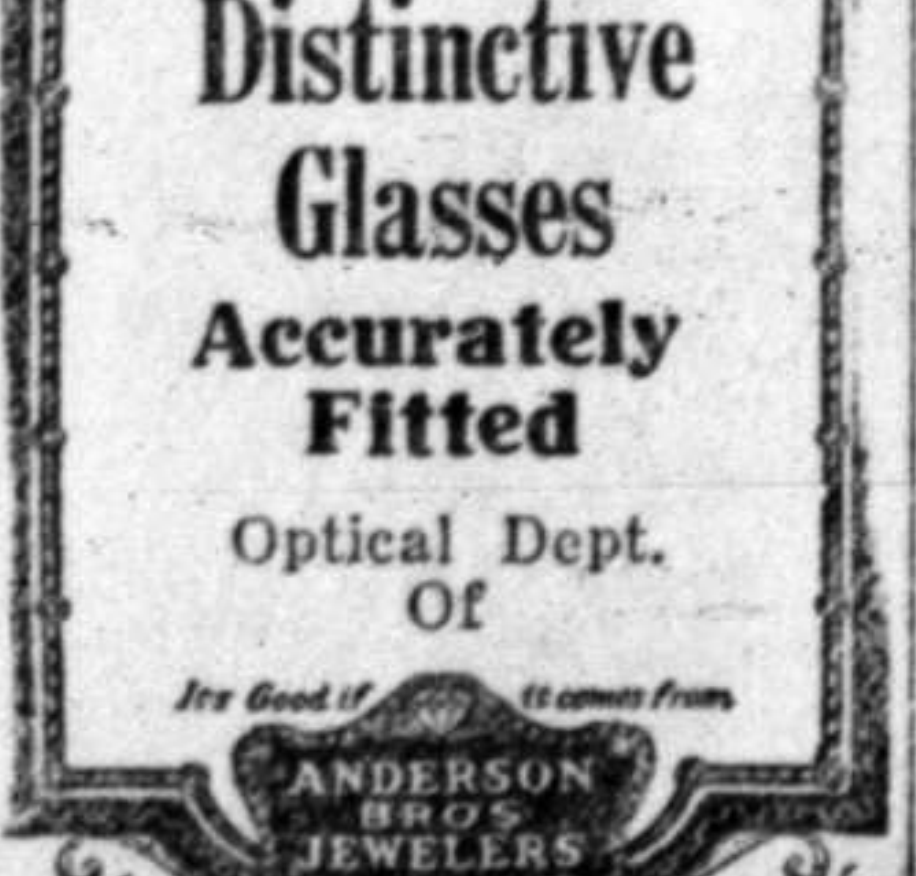

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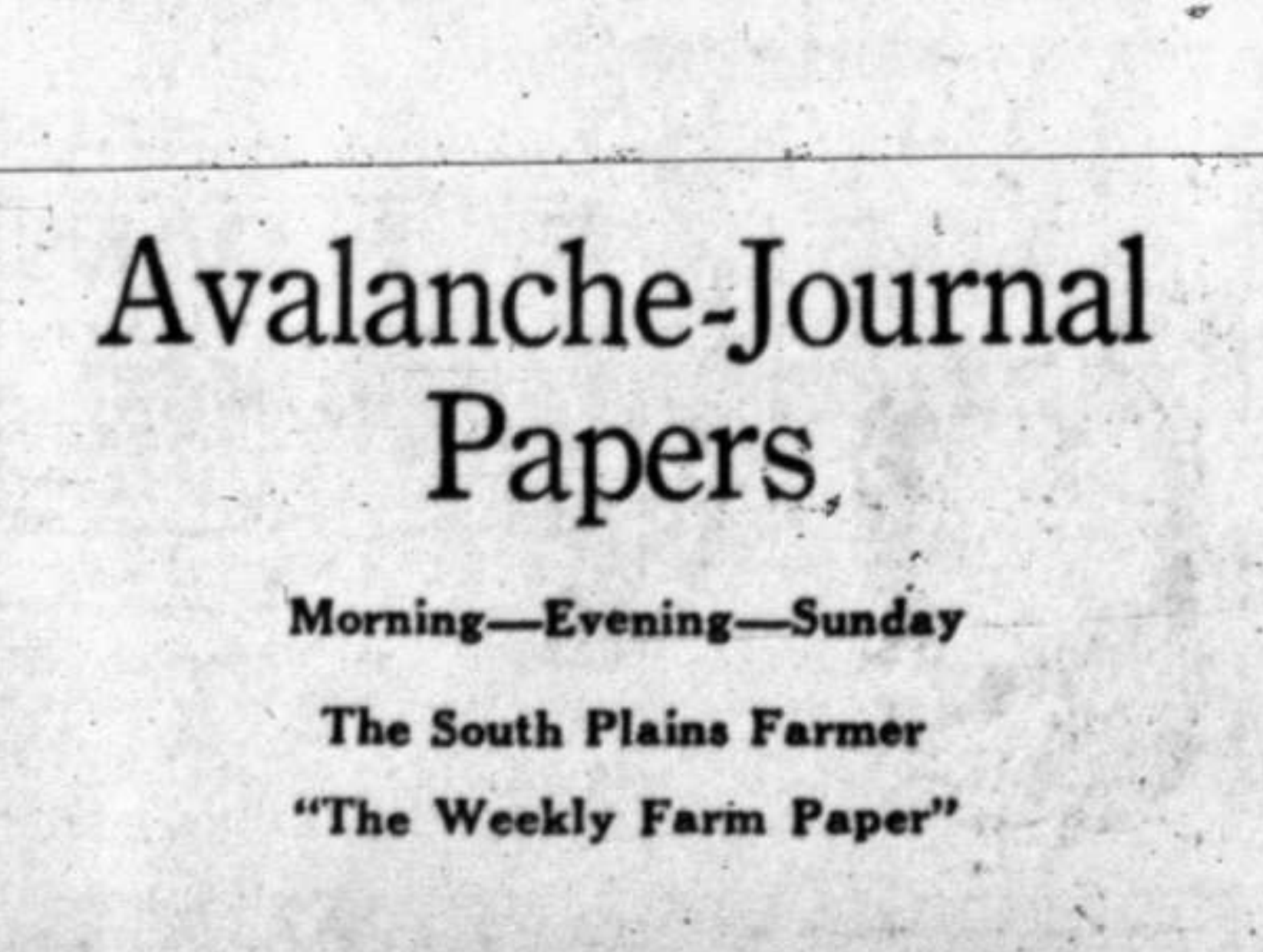
