A tragic accident occurred southwest of Lamesa Monday when H. N. Oneil, 44, was killed by the accidental discharge of his shotgun as he attempted to go through a barbed wire fence on his farm 8 miles south and 1-2 mile west of town. The lifeless body of the deceased was found by Mexican cotton pickers as they went to the house for the noon meal. His right leg was still hanging across the lower wire of the fence, indicating that he had attempted to crawl through the fence and was killed instantly as he pulled his gun after him, the trigger probably catching on the fence and causing the gun to discharge.

Upon receipt of the information of the death, Sheriff Gus White, County Attorney Louis B. Reed, and Justice D. M. Campbell went to the scene and held an inquest which resulted in a verdict of accidental death.

The gun which Mr. Oneil carried was a pump gun and was loaded with three shells, only one of which had been discharged. The entire charge of shot entered the neck just below the right jaw and came out of the left side of the face.

The body was brought to the Higginbotham funeral home where it was prepared for burial and funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 8, at 2:30 at the Five Mile cemetery, where interment was made.

Mr. Oneil was a familiar figure in this section, having lived here for many years. He is survived by his widow and four sons, Truman, Thruston, Alvin and Lee Oneil. Also four brothers, J. W., of Winters, Dug of Pecos and R. L. and Pat Oneil of Lamesa.

The animal measured four and one half feet in length and weighed 42 pounds. Those who saw it say it is the largest to be seen in these parts in recent times.

During the holiday time the volume of mail increases approximately 200 per cent, according to Postmaster Owen Taylor. It is a physical impossibility to handle this great mass of mail efficiently and promptly with a few days.

Therefore, to assure delivery of their Christmas presents, cards and letters by Christmas Day, the public should shop and MAIL EARLY. Do your Christmas shopping so that you can mail your gifts, greetings and letters to relatives, friends and loved ones at least a week or ten days before Christmas, according to the distance.

This will not only make it certain that they are received before Christmas day but it will be a great aid to your postal service and to postal employees and enable them to spend the Christmas holidays with their families.

All parcels must be securely packed and wrapped. Use strong paper and heavy twine.

Luncheon Club Has Good Program

Postmaster Owen Taylor was program chairman of the Tuesday meeting of the Lamesa Luncheon club and brought one of the most enjoyable programs of the year to the members of the club.

Following the luncheon, guests were entertained by two lovely vocal numbers rendered by the Delphian Club sextet.

The program proper was centered around the theme of the postal service and was instructive and very timely coming at this Christmas mailing season. Those who assisted in the program were Mrs. John Cason, who is in charge of the general delivery window of the local post office; Wright Boyd, dispatcher of the mails; Cleve Austin, assistant postmaster and superintendent of the mail; Mr. Gilbert Brooks, construction engineer for the Federal government.

Mr. Taylor summed up the discussions by emphasizing the help everyone could be to themselves as well as the postal department in mailing their Christmas parcels as soon as possible. He also gave a comparison of the business enjoyed by the local office this year with previous years.

Hog Cholera Appears In East Part of County

Dr. F. D. Porter of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture is here this week helping Dr. L. B. Hodges, local veterinarian, fight to prevent the spread of hog cholera which has made its appearance in the eastern part of the county in the Key and O. K. communities.

Dr. Porter states that the cholera has as yet not reached the epidemic stage and that it is of a slightly different form from the usual cholera, and that while death for the hogs is not quite so sudden, it is almost as inevitable.

The doctors warn farmers to stay away from the infected areas and to vaccinate their hogs immediately to prevent the spread of the cholera. This disease can be spread by the farmers carrying the germs on their feet and clothing and shoes, as well as by dogs and birds.

Every possible precaution should be taken to prevent the hog cholera from spreading over the entire territory.

Library Drive Is Still Under Way

The Lion's Club has made the largest single contribution to the Dawson County Library Fund in the campaign which is now being conducted. The goal of \$250 in money and 500 new books for the library has not been reached, but interest still continues in the drive and it is the hope of those in charge that this goal will be reached and passed before the drive is over.

The cataloguing and indexing of the books and the banking of money has been a daily routine throughout the campaign. Fifteen good books in excellent condition and a substantial sum of money was received Wednesday.

If you have some good books you can spare, why not give them to this worthy institution. They will render an unestimable service to our community.

One of the projects in connection with the drive for Library funds is the review of the recent book "Gone with the Wind" which will be given Friday night under the sponsorship of the Woman's Study Club.

Traffic Lights Being Installed This Week

With work going forward on the installation of the traffic lights in Lamesa, it would not be amiss for us to begin to get accustomed to observing the regulations made necessary for their successful operation. One of the most important things to remember is the fact that they are to be observed by pedestrians as well as motorists. There would be no point to having the motor traffic stop and allowing the pedestrian to run helter-skelter across in front of the automobiles. These lights were bought as a precaution against traffic accidents and are solely for the benefit of the public who are to be governed by their regulations, so their observation becomes in fact a matter of self-preservation.

Lights are being installed at each corner of the Square, on Highway 8, at the City Hall and one block north, and on Bryan street at the two intersections across from the High School, and at the intersection of the Seminole and Brownfield highways.

It is expected to have the lights in operation on Saturday, December 19, so everybody govern yourself accordingly.

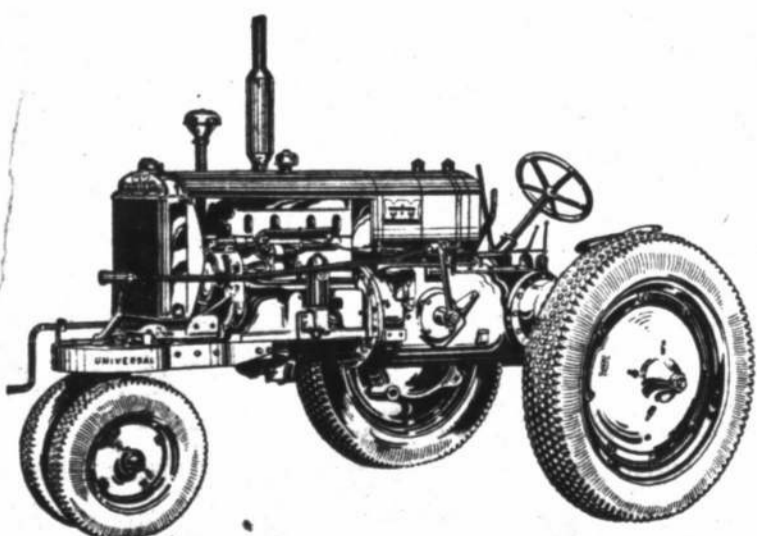

the above statements are due to the fact that producers continually come in and ask if they may graze or cut the sudan grass after a certain date. Milo or cane that is used as a soil building crop must be left on the land and not grazed or harvested, because if such is done the entire payment is forfeited.

Approving Work Sheets
The work sheets are practically all ready to be sent to State headquarters and all who have not been in to the agent's office are requested to come in some time during the coming week and approve them as we are anxious to clear all work sheets out of the office as soon as possible to do so. There are only approximately one hundred producers who have not been into the office and approved the maps. In case you do not come in and approve your map the individual work sheet will be held in this office until you do come in and approve same.

Milk Cow Ration
Several farmers who have cows and plan to sell milk to the new Kraft-Phenix Cheese plant, have made inquiry about a good dairy ration to feed the cows. A good milk producing feed is a mixture of 300 pounds ground milo or hegar heads, 100 pounds of cotton seed meal. Feed the mixture at the rate of one pound of feed to four pounds of milk daily. This of course will need to be supplemented with bundle feed or wheat pasture or any green pasture is very good.

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

Terracing Demonstration
There will be the first of a series of terracing demonstrations at the Lee Hanson farm three miles south of Sparsberg, Monday, December 14th. This is for the benefit of all those who are interested in learning how to run lines for terracing and contouring. The demonstration will begin at nine o'clock in the morning and last until approximately five in the afternoon. All who are present for the demonstration will be given instructions on: regulation of the level; how to determine how far a part to run the lines for the best advantage of the particular farm in question. Actual practice in running the lines as well as taking the farm level a part and putting it back together again.

Those who live near the Hanson farm are invited to attend the demonstration and learn how to run the lines.

Mr. O. K. Shilburg states that the contour lines have kept his farm from blowing and he believes that the use of the rows on the contour for prevention of blowing is well worth the extra time required for farming and prevention of the land from blowing, and of course the increase in yield is an im-

portant factor in his farming operations.

These demonstrations will be given one to the community in which there are at least five who want to learn how to run the lines.

Harvesting Crops On Retired Land
I quote a part of a letter received from C. A. Cobb, director of Southern Region, Washington, D. C.:
"It appears that some of the producers and the committeemen have the idea that if sorghum and millet have been left on the land until October 31 and performance has been certified that the producers may dispose of the crops as they see fit. In all such cases where the bulletins call for crops to be left on the land, these crops are to be left on the land and not to be used in any manner either before or after October 31st. Also sudan grass when used as a soil building practice is not to be harvested."

In other words if the crops are harvested as in the case of millet that automatically forfeits all rental payments. Sudan may be harvested or pastured and this will forfeit the one dollar per acre soil building practice. This is also true in case sudan is grazed. If sudan is harvested or grazed it does not forfeit the entire contract, only the soil building practice payment of one dollar per acre. The reason for



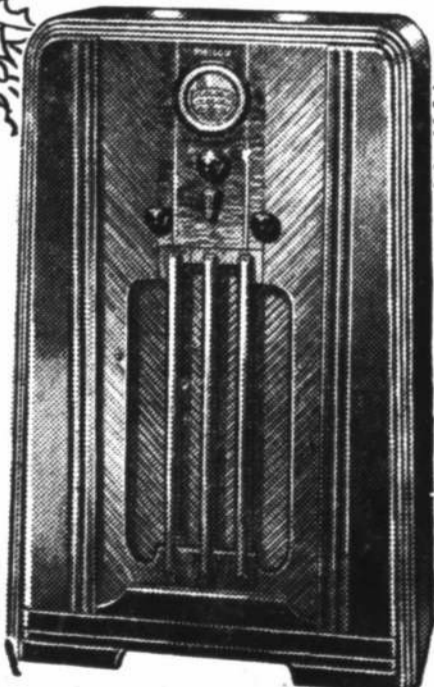
