Slaton Invades City Friday Night To Discuss Landing Field Need At Breakfast

Government Now Ready To Help Secure Port Here

Directors of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, members of the County and City Commission, the Chamber of Commerce Committee on Aviation, as well as many citizens who are interested in aviation, will hold a breakfast at the Plaza Hotel Thursday morning September 19 beginning at 7 o'clock, according to an announcement made this week.

The purpose of the gathering will be to discuss plans and ways whereby Lamesa can take its place along side of the better towns of West Texas with a landing field and adequate hangars.

In this respect, it is pointed out that, though Lamesa is first in many things of which she may be proud, she bears the distinction of being the largest town in West Texas without a landing field. This is a distinction that her citizens would not like to boast of.

It has been pointed out that during the National Emergency, the Federal Government, is not only willing, but anxious to aid every town and city in securing airport facilities. Aside from the land, which must be furnished locally, the government will stand up to seventy-five percent of the improvement cost.

It has been suggested that Lamesa could have a hangar with a housing capacity of some fifteen or sixteen planes, at a cost that would not be prohibitive.

It is further suggested by some local enthusiasts, that eventually many new lines will be established, with one from Amarillo to San Antonio, among the first major lines to be inaugurated. If Lamesa had a proper field, it would give the town air connections with the balance of the United States.

It is also stated that the C. A. A. will assign an instructor here when a port has been made available and as many as fifteen student pilots have signed for training.

A campaign is being waged to get the citizens of the town and county who are interested in securing a field now while aid may be secured, to urge your County and City Commission, as well as the Mayor and County Judge to get behind the proposition.

Every citizen who is interested in this project is invited to attend the breakfast Thursday morning and engage in the discussion of this vital question.

Part Of Money Is Raised When Fans Met Tuesday

At a meeting of the baseball fans of Lamesa and surrounding territory Tuesday night at the Courthouse, a report as to the financial status of the local club was given.

When the baseball club was organized in Lamesa some two years ago, a stock company was formed and stock was issued in the amount of \$4,000. Of this amount, \$3,000 was sold. This money was used for the construction of the grandstand, park fence, lighting, etc. The board of directors at the end of the season had a large deficit facing them, and rather than ask other to shoulder the load, they undertook the task of pulling the club out of the red.

Due to the fact that attendance fell off to the extent that seven thousand fewer tickets were sold in the season of 1940, than in 1939, and the fact that the grandstand was enlarged during this season, the directors, instead of finding the club clear of indebtedness, the deficit was even greater.

The present plant cost \$6,500 as it now stands. Three thousand dollars worth of stock was sold and the club now owes three thousand dollars. When it is taken into consideration that this amount represents a permanent investment and not in the actual operation of the club, it is found that the ball club has paid its way, if the plant had (Continued on Back Page)

Opening Game Of New Season Will See Tough Fight

Coach Hamilton will bring the Slaton Tigers to Lamesa on Friday afternoon to engage the Golden Tornadoes in a football game that night. This is the first meeting of the two rivals since 1937. Conflicts in schedules prevented the teams meeting since Lamesa has been in the Double A Conference until this year.

It is expected that a large following of Slaton fans will accompany the team. The east section of the new grand stand has been set apart for Slaton spectators.

Lamesa fans are to take the middle section and the west section. The Lamesa Pep Squad and band have decided to occupy the north stands this year so as to face the crowd and to be close to the Golden Tornado team which will occupy the north bench.

A list of the Slaton players is not at hand but advance reports are to the effect that they have several veterans on the squad and that their age and weight are somewhat above that of the Lamesa lads. Coach Hamilton is noted in football circles for developing a fast charging and deceptive team and it is expected that the team he will bring along this year will be among the best he has developed.

Lamesa, on the other hand, suffered many losses from last year's squad, there being only three from the starting eleven who will be on this year's team. These are Morgan, White and Oswald. However, these are joined by Aslin, Barnard, Blair, Cates, Colburn, Fullert, Harris, McBride, Reeves, Roberts, and Smith from the Junior and B Squads last year, so that the squad is not wholly without experience, but the boys are young. There are only three seventeen year old boys on the entire squad and all others being sixteen or younger.

The boys have had bad luck in getting their feet blistered from playing in new shoes. These blisters have been obstinate to cure with the result that several sore heels are still to be found among the team candidates.

The Golden Tornadoes have been working diligently to be in physical condition, to have a knowledge of plays to run against Slaton, and to acquire the ability to stop Slaton plays. They seem to have a spirit of determination which has been a marked characteristic of former Golden Tornado teams to dig in there and play the game hard. So it seems that even in spite of injuries, the boys are in fair shape to give a good account of themselves on next Friday night.

Captain Morgan and White of the Golden Tornadoes, along with Coaches McCollum and Gregg have been pointing to the Slaton game. Their fellow players seem to agree with the co-captains that this is one of the most important games of Lamesa's schedule. They seem to have a recollection of the last meeting of the two teams and have a strong desire that following this game that the records will show (Continued on Back Page)

American Legion Points Out Ways And Methods To Show Respect To American Flag

Correspondence to American Legion officers of Allen-Houston Post, Lamesa, from State and National officials indicate the variety of services being rendered by the organization and duties which members will be called upon to render as soon as the current legislative program of the National Congress is completed. The Legion members are frequently spoken about or referred to as "Ex-Servicemen". That term is applicable only in as it refers to membership in the armed forces of this country during the World War or SERVICE is still being rendered to the Nation and to comrades in arms or members of their families and to society in general. Sam Richardson is service officer of the Lamesa Post and his reports together with reports from members indicate the continuous service being rendered.

of advisory services to local and State agencies.

The work is of so much importance that it is necessary for Legion officials to have as complete a list of those residents of Dawson County who served in the World War as can be obtained. Such Veterans are requested to report their names and addresses to Post Commander W. T. Webb or Adjutant D. O. Blackmon.

A list of Dawson County men who are now in the military service of the United States is desired and relatives or friends of these are asked to report names and places of assignment to Carroll Baldwin who will keep a record of such enlistments for historical and other purposes.

The Allen-Houston Post will undertake some work in the county which will be of patriotic nature. This activity will be under the direction of J. D. Dyer and fellow committee members. Veterans of Dawson County communities who wish to have or to hold such programs in their respective communities may aid in this community service by contacting J. D. Dyer.

FLAGS

It has been noted that some of the flags used for display purposes on special occasions are in poor condition and that many business establishments have no flag at all. To supply those who need replacement emblems and those who desire a National Flag, the Legion Post is sponsoring the sale of flags, standards and etc. in the hope that at least 100 flags may be available for display on national holidays. D. O. Blackmon is in charge of such sales.

In view of the fact that certain rules for care and respect for the Flag have not been carefully observed, "The Flag Code" as prepared by the United States Navy for civilian observation is presented here together with the Pledge to the Flag.

THE FLAG CODE

The National Flag should be raised and lowered by hand. It should be displayed only from sunrise to sunset, or between such hours as may be designated by proper authority.

Do not raise the Flag while it is furled. Unfold, then hoist quickly to the top of the staff. Lower it slowly and with dignity.

When the Flag is hung as a banner across and over the center of a street running east and west, the union should be to the north and to the east in a street running north and south.

Where the National Flag is displayed with State or other flags, it should be given the place of honor on the right. Display the Flag upon a staff when possible.

Place no objects on or over the Flag. Various articles are sometimes placed on a speaker's table covered with the Flag. This practice should be avoided.

Always let the Flag hang straight. Do not festoon over doors or arches or tie it in a bow knot. Use red, white and blue bunting for decorative purposes.

When flags are used in unveiling a statue or monument they should not be allowed to fall to the ground, but should be carried aloft, forming a feature of the ceremony.

Take every precaution to prevent the Flag from becoming soiled. It should not be allowed to touch the ground or floor, nor to brush against objects.

Before being placed at half-mast the Flag should be raised to the top of the staff. Before lowering it should likewise be hoisted to the top. On Memorial Day, display at

half-mast until noon only, then hoist to top of staff. When displayed in the chancel or on a platform in a church, the Flag should be placed on a staff at the clergyman's right; other flags at his left. If displayed in the body of the church, the Flag should be at the congregation's right as they face the clergyman.

Do not use the Flag as a portion of a costume or athletic uniform. Do not embroider upon cushions or handkerchiefs nor print it on paper napkins or boxes.

When carried in a procession, military or otherwise, the Flag should be borne to the right or regimental or other flags.

Pledge to the Flag: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all."

The general rule for saluting the Flag is as follows:

"During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the Flag, or when the Flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the Flag, stand at attention, and salute. Those present in uniform should render the right-hand salute. When not in uniform, men should remove the headdress with the right hand, and hold it at the left shoulder. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the Flag in the moving column is rendered at the moment the Flag passes."

"When the national anthem is played, those present in uniform should salute at the first note of

the anthem, retaining this position until the last note of the anthem. When not in uniform, men should remove the headdress and hold it as in the salute to the Flag. Women should render the salute as to the Flag. When there is no flag displayed, all should face the music. In display of the Flag, the following "cautions" are sixteen things to avoid in connection with the use of the American Flag.

1—Do not permit disrespect to be shown to the Flag of the United States of America.

2—Do not dip the Flag of the United States to any person or any thing. The regimental color, state Flag, organization or institutional flag will render this honor.

3—Do not display the Flag with the union down except as a signal of distress.

4—Do not place any other flag or pennant above or, if on the same level, to the right of the Flag of the United States of America.

5—Do not let the Flag touch the ground, or the floor, or trail in the water.

6—Do not place any object or emblem of any kind on or above the Flag of the United States of America.

7—Do not drape the Flag over in any form whatsoever. Use bunting of red, white and blue.

8—Do not fasten the Flag in any manner as will permit it to be torn.

9—Do not drape the Flag over the hood top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or boat. When the Flag is displayed on a motor car, the staff should be affixed firmly to the chassis or

11—Do not display the Flag as a covering for the ceiling.

12—Do not carry the Flag flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.

13—Do not use the Flag as a portion of a costume or of an athletic uniform. Do not embroider it upon cushions or handkerchiefs nor print it on paper napkins or boxes.

14—Do not use the Flag in any form of advertising nor fasten an advertising sign to a pole from which the Flag is flown.

15—Do not display, use, or store the Flag in such manner as will permit it to be easily soiled or damaged.

Michael's Grass Is Ruled Out By Department

Claims that are being made to further the sale of michels' grass—to the effect that it is a cross between Mosida wheat and giant wild rye grass, and that the so-called cross is a true perennial—are not born out by recent tests.

From the number of letters asking about michels' grass that have been going to R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service, it is apparent that many farmers and ranchers have bought, or are thinking about buying, seed of the variety on basis of these claims.

Lancaster talked with workers of the USDA Bureau of Plant Industry and several agricultural experiment stations during the Grassland Conference held in Amarillo last week under the sponsorship of the Southern Great Plains Agricultural Council, and got the 'lowdown' on the grass.

Here are some of the things the scientists were able to report on the basis of several years' study and tests of michels' grass:

Chromosome counts of the pollen mother cells of the two supposed parents and of the supposed hybrid show that it cannot be of the claimed parentage. Mosida wheat has 21 chromosomes—or hereditary bodies—and giant wild rye has 14. On the other hand, common rye and michels' grass have 7 chromosomes.

These facts, together with the fact that michels' grass has no physical resemblance to either of the supposed parents, make it necessary to consider michels' grass a variety of rye.

Tests on michels' grass under favorable conditions showed that under favorable conditions 20 percent or less of the plant may persist for more than one year—and even those plants are practically all gone at the end of the second year.

Usually most of the plants die after seed is formed, showing a winter annual of growth.

Other grasses, such as Italian rye-grass, an annual, may volunteer year after year from scattered seed. Similar results have been reported with michels' grass. Like any rye, it shatters freely. The impression that it is a perennial may be due in part to volunteer plants.

Tests showed michels' grass inferior in forage or pasture value to winter rye or wheat. It is also more subject to injury by leaf and stem rusts. Generally it is less drought resistant.

MIDLAND, Texas.—When West Texas fans convene on Midland September 21 for the North Texas State Teachers College - Abilene Christian College gridiron battle, they will be looking for Johnie Riola, 155-pound Denton quarterback, who passed the Eagles to a 9 to 0 triumph over A. C. C. last fall at Sweetwater. This was but the start of Riola's passing bombardment which blasted the Eagles to an unblemished record.

Once more Riola will be on hand with his accurate passing and kicking and his swivel-hipped running. And to add further worry to the Wildcats this year will be the fact that the little sniper's two best receivers of last fall's A. C. C. tilt, James McDaniel and Forrest Covin, will also be on the Midland turf. It was a pass from Riola to McDaniel which gave North Texas the only touchdown of last year's skirmish, and it was a 40-yard heave from Riola to Covin which placed the ball in position for Denton's third quarter field goal.

Playing his final season for the Green and White, Riola is expected to experience his most successful campaign yet. Last year the black-haired little Temple youth won all-Lone Star Conference selection in a poll of the circuit's coaches and sports scribes, and was given honorable mention on the Associated Press's Little All-American.

With dove hunting under way, pertinent DONTs which, if followed, will save sportsmen considerable trouble with state and federal game wardens have been formulated by the Texas Game Department's executive secretary. They include:

Don't shoot doves before sunrise nor after official sunset.
Don't shoot from a car or from, or along a public road.
Don't shoot doves with any gun except a shotgun larger than ten gauge.

Don't forget to plug your gun to three-shell capacity.

Don't forget your hunting license if you leave the county of your residence.

Don't kill more than 12 doves per day and do not have more than 12 in your possession, white wings and mourning doves.

Don't forget to clean your gun well before taking that first hunting trip of the season.

Don't shoot when you cannot see; there might be another hunter behind those trees.

Don't leave gates open and always get permission to hunt on private land; the trespass law is rather severe.

Don't forget that quail season does not open until December 1.

Observe Changes In Law Because it is necessary to print the blanks for state hunting licenses weeks before federal regulations, to which Texas law conforms, on migratory waterfowl are announced, hunters are warned that some information on the back of their license is in error. Hunters can now shoot only 12 doves a day and have 12 in possession. The duck limit remains at 10 per day and 20 in possession, but note that a hunter can now legally shoot only 3 geese and have 6 in possession.

Another Fish Catches Bird Persons reading in this column recently of a bass leaping high into the air to snatch a bird just as it left a tree limb over the water may have been convinced it was a rare occurrence. However, Cecil Meador of Blooming Grove, saw practically the same thing. While fishing for bass last spring he watched a flock of starlings skim over the water. Suddenly a large bass leaped from the water, caught one of the birds on the wing and disappeared with it.

Cars Continue To Take Toll Reports of the heavy toll taken by motor cars on Texas highways continue to pour into the executive secretary of the Game Department. The latest is from the game warden of Colorado County, who, in 100 miles of driving recently saw the following dead on the highway: a doe deer, 9 cottontail rabbits, one

swamp rabbit, one skunk, one armadillo, 2 bullfrogs and a doe.

Shooting Doves, Plover Costly W. J. Spear of Kilgore, Texas, recently found it does not pay to kill doves and plovers out of season. He was caught killing birds on his father's place recently and Judge C. C. Van Wagner of Fort Worth fined him \$200 and costs for one plover and the same for one dove. The State Game Warden could have filed sixteen charges, for Spear had that many birds in his possession. There is no open season on plover and the dove season was not open.

"Shooting on your own property is no defense," Judge Van Wagner said in fining Spear a total of \$422.

Creed The creed of real sportsmen is: "Take a boy hunting or fishing."

Cite Need Of Tire And Wheel Balance On Autos Eagle Sniper To Lead Attack

Higher motoring speeds have increased the importance of tire and wheel balance in the safe operation of the present-day automobile, according to Lamesa Tire and Battery, Inc.

"Tire engineers now recognize the proper balance of tires and wheels as vital highway safety," Jack McLaughlin said citing the results of recent exhaustive tests. "Although properly balanced wheel assemblies can be assured with competent inspection, the fact that the average motorist is unaware of this problem increases the hazard," he added.

Directly traceable to improperly balanced wheel assemblies are uneven tread wear, shimmy and play in the steering mechanism, and other conditions which are both costly and hazardous to safe motoring, McLaughlin pointed out. By means of a system of dots placed on both sides of the tires near the rim, tire manufacturers indicate the light spot on the casing. On stand and turn if the valve stem is placed at this spot, the best balance possible without the use of a balancing machine will be obtained.

"Motorists buying a new car may be assured that the wheel assemblies are in perfect balance. But wear and tear tend to throw the tire out of balance, while removing the tube and tire to repair a tire puncture for example, definitely breaks the delicate balance," Mr. McLaughlin said.

"One tire engineer has said that perhaps 90 per cent of wheel shimmy and similar steering ailments can be traced to out-of-balance tire and wheel assembly. No one can estimate the number of accidents resulting from improper balance."

To meet the growing problem of wheel balance, the modern tire dealer has equipment and sensitive balancing machines to test wheel assemblies and adjust them for safe motoring. Equipment of the latest type is now used at Lamesa Tire and Battery, Inc., said Jack McLaughlin.

S. C. S. NOTES-

The United States Department of Agriculture assisted 428 farmers and ranchers of the Southern Great Plains to develop their potential water resources during the past year according to a recent announcement of H. H. Fennell, regional director of the Soil Conservation Service at Amarillo.

The construction and improvement of wells, windmills, ponds and springs for livestock water received most attention. The development of water for domestic use, which in many cases included the piping of water into the farm homes, also was an important part of the program.

Irrigation water was provided for more than 15,000 acres on 99 different farm under the program. Most of the irrigation facilities installed were small and provided only for the irrigation of farm gardens and small field for livestock feed production.

Many shallow water irrigation wells were dug and pumps installed. Ponds and small lakes that provide a limited amount of irrigation water for small plots also were constructed. The capacity of pumps installed under the program was approximately 71,000 gallons per minute. Almost 3,000 acre feet of water storage capacity was created in the ponds built.

"Water is one of the most valuable resources of the Plains," Fennell states. "It is also important

that we use the water resources available. The water facilities program of the Department of Agriculture was started in an effort to assist farmers and ranchers in semi-arid state to develop and get the best use from both under ground and surface water facilities.

In addition to the water facilities installed on the 428 farms and ranches during the past year, Fennell reports that complete soil and water conservation plans were made and put into effect on more than one-half million acres of farm and ranch land affected by the program. Many of the farmers consider their conservation program more valuable even than the water facilities constructed.

Estimates of the farmers who have cooperated in this program show that they consider the increased land values that resulted from irrigation, and conservation practices alone to be worth three times the total cost of installing the program.

Loans were made to most of the farmers installing water facilities under this program by the Farm Security Administration. Engineering services and technical planning were furnished in all cases by the Soil Conservation Service. In many instances the Government agencies assisted in actual construction of the various facilities.

In Texas most of the water development work was done in the Rita Blanca watershed in Dallam, Hartley and Oldham counties; Coldwater-Palo Duro watershed in Dallam, Sherman, Moore, Hutchinson and Hansford counties; the Salt Fork watershed in Armstrong, Carson, Gray, Donley and Collingsworth counties; Gypsum and Lebores creek watershed in Childress county; Pease River watershed in Briscoe, Floyd Hall Motley, Childress and Cottle counties and the Mustang, Monument and Sulphur Draw watershed in Andrews, Gaines, Martin, Lynn, Terry and Yorkum counties.

Keep a supply of different size glass jars with covers to use as containers for left-over food in the refrigerator. These will take up less room than bowls and are easier to cover.

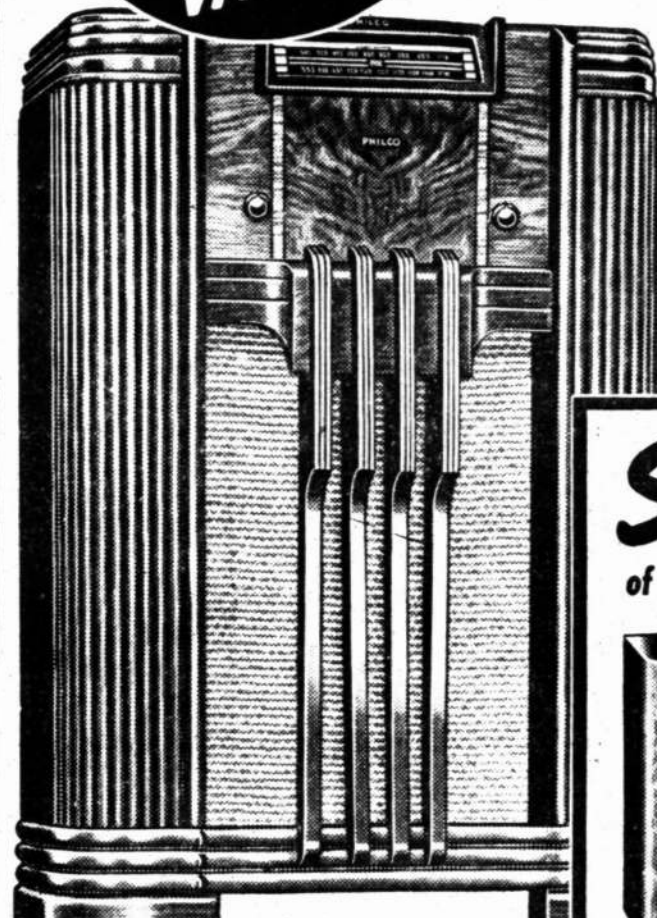

Farmers Of Nineteen West Texas Counties Lose Near Hundred Thousand Dollars

Lost: More than \$90,000.

Farmers in the 19 counties of district 6 North might well insert an ad in their newspaper, for they let \$99,234 slip through their fingers by failing to earn that much of the \$353,423 maximum soil-building allowance set up for them under the 1939 A. A. program. They earned \$254,229 or 71.9% of the maximum available, records at the State AAA headquarters disclose.

Under the AAA program a maximum soil-building allowance is set up for each cooperating farm, based on the non-depleting (government land) cropland acreage and non-crop pastureland (grassland). To receive any of the payments from this allowance, the farms must put into effect on his farm approved AAA soil building practices. The more conservation work the farmer does the more money he earns up to the maximum soil building allowance.

Topping the list of counties in this district in 1939 was Coke, whose farmers did enough soil-building work to earn 90.4%, \$13,952 of the \$15,427 available. Dawson County earned \$36,377 of the \$54,332 available, which was 66.9% of the soil-building allowance for last year. Lowest ranking county was Glasscock where only 42.6%, \$738 of the available \$1,850 was earned.

Drilling Going Ahead On Two County Tests
