Will The People Learn

In an article in the Reader's Digest for September, 1943, Hatton W. Summers, congressman from Texas, asks: "Why is it . . . that . . . representative government is withering before our eyes?"

He shows that while our whole political system is based on the principle of local self government, the people themselves are destroying that system by their continual demands for Federal intervention in the problems of every community and class, and by the ever-growing practices of passing these problems to Washington. Congress, not being able to handle such an impossible burden, creates bureaus and bureaucrats.

The bureaucrats "issue what are called 'directives,' which actually have the force of law. One bureaucrat in the Securities & Exchange Commission said recently: "We do make the law. This order supersedes any laws opposed to it."

"By making the units of state government financially dependent on the Federal government, that government is acquiring the power to control the units of state government."

When this is fully consummated, the sovereignty of state governments will be liquidated.

"The men who are trying to drive us toward government by bureaucracy understand this. The chief adviser of the National Resources Planning Board, recently abolished by Congress prophesied crisply:

"Congress will surrender to the Administration the power to tax . . . Congress will appropriate huge sums of money, will surrender its power of directing when and how the money will be spent. Other extraordinary powers, such as to effect great social reforms, will be delegated to the Administration, which will retain most, if not all, of its wartime powers."

"The remedy—and only remedy—is to send all these non Federal functions back where they belong: to the state and local communities, where they can be handled upon a scale within the comprehension of the limited mind of man."

"National socialism may be described as government by bureaucracy. If we think Hitler's system is better than ours, we should have the honesty to say so instead of copying while we denounce it."

Homemade Bombs

How many persons think of home fruit and vegetable canning as being dangerous?

A timely bulletin by the National Board of Fire Underwriters on hazards involved in oven pack methods of preserving fruits and vegetables has just been issued.

The oven pack method is the most dangerous means of preserving because it is not possible to regulate oven heat so that conditions do not introduce a hazard from a pressure explosion in a jar or can if the top has been tightly sealed.

In one recent case, a Pennsylvania woman placed nine pint jars of snap beans in her gas range oven and set the heat regulator at 275 degrees. A short time later a violent explosion blew the range apart, broke the gas pipe connection and seriously scalded and cut the woman's son who was sitting in the kitchen.

"It was very evident that the tops had been tightened," says the bulletin, "and when this has been done a temperature of 275 degrees will produce a steam pressure of 29 pounds, which is far in excess of the safe limits of a sealed glass jar, or even a tin can. Oven regulators are seldom kept in such condition as to insure their accuracy from within 10 to 20 degrees."

Several precautions were offered to those who used pressure cookers for home canning. It is necessary to be sure that the safety valve operates at a low pressure, and that the steam pressure gauge reads accurately. The lugs holding the cover in place must be in good condition and properly tightened, and it is of the greatest importance to release the steam before loosening any of the cover lugs. Never try to improvise a pressure cooker.

The Proof of The Pudding

General Norman T. Kirk, head of the Army's huge (90,000 officers, 450,000 enlisted men) Medical Corps, in a recent statement said that the United States Army is haler and healthier than any Army has ever been in any war. And that is something for every mother's son of us to remember in this country.

How can it be that a nation has built one of the world's largest armies in a scant two years, can have such a record? The answer is self-evident. First, under a form of government that has encouraged individual initiative and unlimited opportunity, American medicine has been leading the world in preventing and curing disease. Second, under such a system, citizens of the United States, including the boys who went into the Army, have an outstanding health record. Third, a large percentage of the practicing phy-

sicians who helped bring the health record of the United States to its present high standard, were absorbed into the Medical Corps.

For your own sake, remember this when you hear political proposal to socialize the American medical system in line with European countries which have no record to compare with private medicine in the United States and its armed forces.

Interest In Our Modern World

BOULDER DAM

One of the outstanding engineering feats of modern times was the five years work of building Boulder Dam on the Colorado river in the Southwestern part of the United States.

Just west of Yuma, Arizona, the Colorado river forms the border between Arizona and California. Most of the year this was a very quiet river, but during the spring thaws the river was swollen into a raging torrent that frequently did much damage to the countryside. This river empties into the gulf of California, and hence into the Pacific ocean. This highest dam in the world was completed in March 1936, and forms Lake Mead which is 115 miles long and provides water for the irrigation

of a million acres of formerly non-productive rich soil. This dam is 727 feet high, 1180 feet across, 45 feet thick at the top and 650 feet thick at the bottom. It contains enough concrete to lay a standard width two lane highway from the Northern tip of Washington to the Southern tip of Florida. The dam cost \$70,600,000, and was built during depression days. It has the installation capacity of 1,835,000 horsepower of electric current.

One can reach the dam from this side by driving 86 miles up-grade, through mountainous country from Kingston, Arizona. The highway crosses on top of the dam, and the terrible roar of the turbines is a deafening sound. Just as the sun goes down the beauty of the rays across the calm lake is indescribable. As darkness comes on the dam is brilliantly lighted and really shows up the architectural structures of the dam.

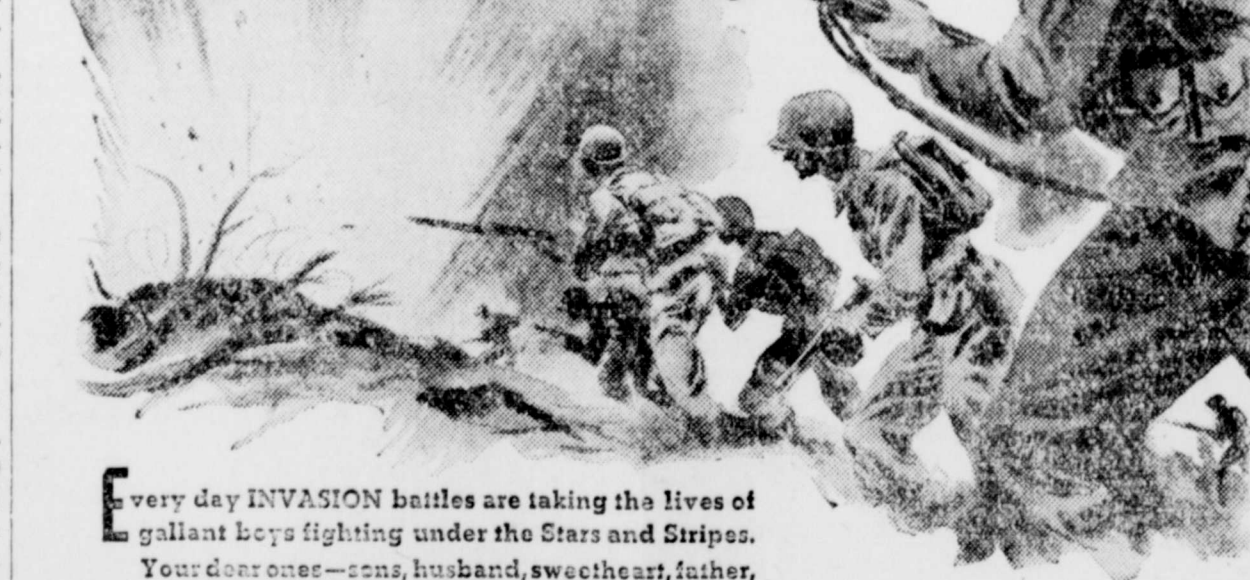
The country surrounding the

dam is very mountainous and is also very rough.

The dam is located in what is known as black canyon which seems to have been prepared by nature for just the gigantic job it is doing.

The public may purchase copper wire without restriction from retailers, electricians, radio repair men and others who sell it. Old Buffet Easily Remodeled to Make Handy Chest for Under a Window



MANY young homemakers are gaily setting forth to buy junk furniture for remodeling. The first thing they learn is to consider each piece not for what it is but for what it may be. The 40-year-old buffet shown here was never beautiful in its youth and took itself too seriously in a heavy sort of way. It seemed to be waiting there in the junk yard for some young modern to make cheerful use of its sturdy materials.

The sketch shows how the main part of the buffet was remodeled to make a chest under a window in a combination sewing and guest room. A wood chisel is useful for removing carving that is glued on and either putty or plastic wood may be used for filling old screw

holes and even places where locks have been in drawers and doors that are to be painted. If the piece is varnished, it is best to rub it down with sandpaper to remove the high gloss before painting. What became of the mirror and legs of this buffet is another story to appear soon.

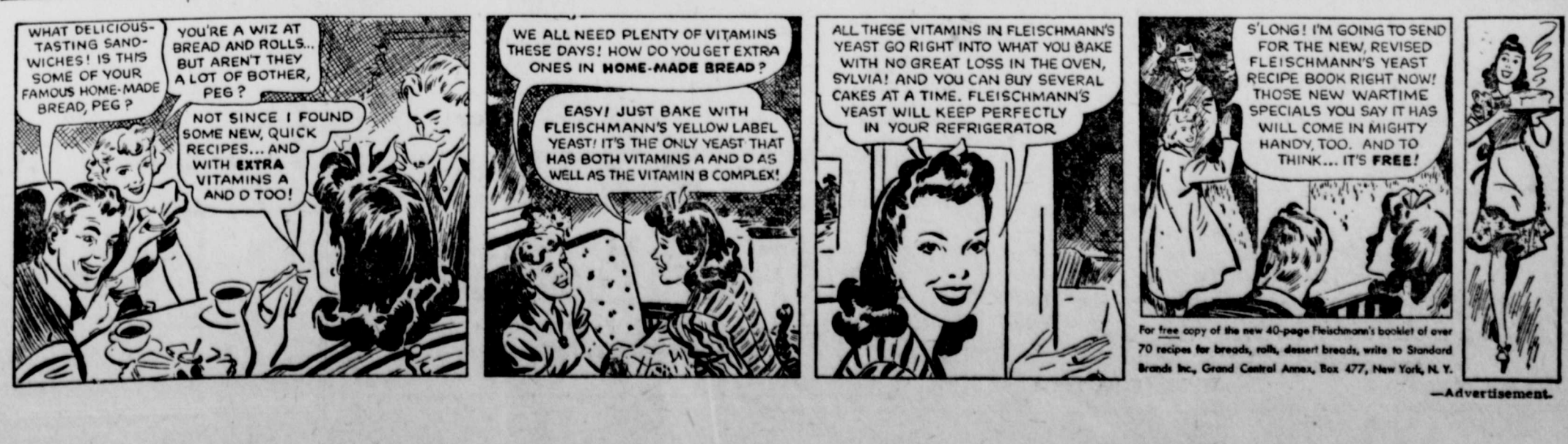

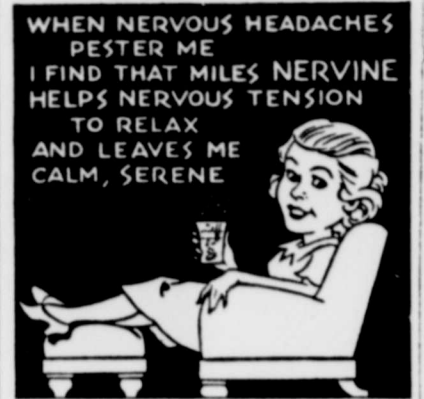

GUN COVERS PROTECT BIBLES

Bibles which are placed on every life raft and life boat on army transport vessels are being protected from the effects of salt water by the same type of cover that protects pistols, rifles, and machine guns in landing operations. Curiously enough, the covers used for pistols are of exactly the right size for copies of the bible, and have been adapted by the Chaplains Corps as a standard protective covering for them. The covers were developed by the Quartermaster Corps from a pliable, transparent, waterproof film known as vinyl. They are buoyant enough to float the bibles if they are accidentally dropped over board or washed out of the rafts in heavy seas.

DRUGGISTS DONATE QUININE

With the compliments of the nation's druggists, more than 11 million five-gran doses of quinine are now on their way to join the war against malaria. Because seizure of the Netherlands East Indies cut off 90 per cent of the source of quinine supply, the army called upon the nation's druggists to make contributions. An appreciable quantity of the quinine donated was produced by Germany and Japan, and it now will assist in the war to defeat these nations.

ARMY REBUILDS SHOES

Approximately six and a half million pairs of army shoes will be rebuilt during the present fiscal year at plants under supervision of the Quartermaster Corps, Army Service Forces, in Buford, Ga., and Hannibal, Mo. The rebuilding operation in one year will save the government approximately seven million dollars, and will conserve nearly 20 million square feet of leather. Army shoes usually are resoled twice, then sent to Buford or Hannibal for rebuilding. The rebuilt shoes look and wear like the original article and usually are more comfortable because they have been broken in.

viewpoint may either make or break a picture. It helped in "making" this one.

AMATEUR photographers and features do not appear the same. The point of view has a great deal to do with the background we get in our picture. Suppose, for example, we are taking a picture of someone on a golf course. If the camera viewpoint is high, that is, if we are shooting down from a ridge, the smooth grass of the course will form the picture background. If, on the other hand, we are down near the player and at the same level, the background will be divided between the golf links and sky. We will have a general landscape scene for a background. Then, if we crouch low and tilt the camera upward toward the subject, we will have a background of plain sky. Here again we obtain three entirely different pictures.

The distance between the camera and the subject is also an important consideration in our choice of viewpoint. Much can be done to change the picture by changing the distance between the camera and the subject. As we approach a subject, it becomes much larger in proportion to objects in the background. At the same time, by bringing the camera nearer the subject we can often suppress or eliminate details that are not really part of the picture and do not improve the picture effect.

Choice of viewpoint, in fact, gives us a remarkable degree of control over the arrangement of our picture. Be sure you're getting the best viewpoint before you shoot.

Suppose we are taking a picture of a person. Here again our viewpoint is important because from viewpoints—high or low—

us young people to our studies.

CHAPTER I

If I were giving advice to the boys
who have already been called into
the Army and will go away in a few
days, I'd sum it all up in this:
"Paint the town red for the rest of
your civilian week. Pay no attention
to the advice that is being
poured into your defenseless ears for
twenty-four hours a day. Form an
idea of what Army life is going to
be like. Leave your mind open."Two weeks from now, you will be
thoroughly disgusted with your new
job. You will have been herded
from place to place, you will have
wandered in nakedness and bewil-
derment through miles of physical
examination, you will look upon pri-
vacy and individuality as things you
left behind you in a golden civilian
society.Probably you will have developed
a murderous hatred for at least one
sergeant and two corporals. You
will writhe and fume under what you
consider brutality and sadism, and
you will wonder how an enlightened
nation can permit such atrocity in
its army. Take it easy, brother;
take it easy.Keep this one beam of radiant
hope constantly before you: The first
three weeks are the hardest.For those first three—or possibly
four—weeks, you will bear the great-
est part of the painful process of
adjusting yourself to an altogether
new routine. In those first three
weeks you will get almost the full
required dose of confusion and mis-
ery. You will be afraid to leave
your barracks lest the full wrath of
the war department fall upon you."You don't get anywhere by buy-
ing soda pop or beer for your ser-
geant."You will find yourself unbelievably
awkward and clumsy when you try
to learn the drills and the knowledge
of this awkwardness will make you
even more awkward. Unless you
relax you can be very unhappy dur-
ing those first three weeks.When you are assigned to your
basic training center you'll really
get into it. You'll drill and drill, a
little more each day, and when the
sergeant tries to correct or advise
you, you'll want to tear his throat
out with your bare hands. You'll
be sick of the sound of his voice
before an hour has passed. The
only comfort I can give you is the
knowledge that the poor sergeant is
having a helluva time too. He knows
what you're thinking and he can't
do anything about it.You'll be inoculated against small-
pox, typhoid, tetanus, yellow fever,
pneumonia, and practically all the
other ills that flesh is heir to. You'll
be taught foot drill, the handling of
a rifle, the use of the gas mask, the
peculiarities of military vehicles,
and the intricacies of military cour-
tesy.Most of what you are taught will
impress you as utterly useless non-
sense, but you'll learn it.You'll be initiated into the mys-
teries of the kitchen police, proba-
bly before you've been in the Army
for a week. Possibly two days lat-
er, you'll be sent on a ration detail
to handle huge bundles of groceries.
You'll haul coal and trash andashes. You'll unpack rifles that are
buried in heavy grease and you'll
clean that grease off them. You'll
stoke fires, you'll mop floors, and
you'll put a high polish on the win-
dows. You'll wonder if you've been
yanked out of civil life for this.All your persecution is deliberate,
calculated, systematic. It is col-
legiate practice of hazing, applied to
the grim and highly important task
of transforming a civilian into a
soldier, a boy into a man. It is the
Hardening Process.You won't get depressed; you
won't feel sorry for yourself. You'll
just get mad as hell. You'll be
breathing fire before it's over.Believe me or not, at the end of
that minor ordeal, you'll be feeling
good. You'll be full of spirit and
energy and you will have found
yourself.You'll look at the new men com-
ing in to go through the same hard-
ening period, and you'll look at them
with a fatherly and sympathetic eye.
They will be "rookies" to you, a
veteran of almost a month.For practical advice, there is none
better than the golden rule of the
Army: "Keep your eyes open and
your mouth shut."At first, probably, you'll be in-
clined to tremble at the sight of
every corporal who passes you on
the street. You might even salute
the first-class privates. Then, when
the top sergeant neglects to beat
you with a knout they rub GI (These
two letters are the cornerstone of
your future Army vocabulary. They
stand for the words "Government
Issue" and just about everything
you get in the Army will be GI.)

into wounds, you might want to go
to the other extreme. This way
madness lies.When corporals and sergeants are

civilian job, the impression is made
in the first few weeks. You make
that impression, starting from the
very first day, by learning as quick-
ly as you can, by applying yourself
with energy to each task, no matter
how small or how unpleasant it is.

permission.ABIDING VALUES FROM
ISRAEL'S HISTORYLESSON TEXT—Deuteronomy 11:13-25.
GOLDEN TEXT—Righteousness exalteth
a nation; but sin is a reproach to
any people.—Proverbs 14:34.What makes a nation great? God's
dealings with Israel answer that
question. The history which we
have briefly touched upon in our
study of the first four books of the
Bible is reviewed in Deuteronomy.Moses, realizing that the end was
at hand for him and that a new
generation was about to go into the
promised land, reviewed the history
of the people, restated their laws,
and renewed the appeal of God for
their loyal obedience. This re-
cord is found in the Book of Deuteronomy,
from which our lesson is taken.We find here that the nation which
is truly great—I. Worships the True God (vv.
13-15).There is a fundamental factor
which must underlie all real national
greatness—love of God. This has
an inseparable corollary—serving
Him "with all your heart, and all
your soul."(14:34), "Righteousness exalteth
a nation; but sin is a reproach to any
people." We have well-nigh forgot-
ten that fact. We need to be remind-
ed of it again in God's word to Israel.What is the result? The blessing
of God upon the land, the giving of
abundant harvest, in fact, the open-
handed generosity of God.II. Heeds God's Warning (vv. 16,
17).This is the negative side. God
dealt with Israel through promises
if they were faithful, and the threat
of judgment if they forgot Him.One is as important as the other
in the leading of a nation—and in
the rearing of children. We, like
our heavenly Father, should faith-
fully keep every promise; but we
should just as surely fulfill every
warning of coming judgment.America has seen the handwriting
of God in warning concerning its
waywardness and sin. Will it heed
and avoid further judgment?III. Honors God's Word (vv. 18,
19).Loving God and His Word is not
a matter for theological speculation
or for sanctimonious discussion in
some dark cloister. Thank God the
Christian faith is at its best in the
ordinary affairs of life. It finds its
proper place in the tender relation-
ship of parent and child. Its teach-
ings are pure, delightful, simple,
and entirely appropriate to any oc-
casion, whether one sits or rises,
walks or lies down. God's words
are the words to be laid up in the
heart and in the soul, to be taught
to our children, to be the constant
and normal subject of conversation.

IV. Testifies for God (vv. 20, 21).

Here again we have the home be-
fore us. And it is, of course, the
home which makes the nation. If the
home speaks for God, the nation will
do so, inevitably and effectively.We may not, as did the pious
Jew, fasten a little container bear-
ing God's Word on our doorstep, but
we may make the home itself and
the life of its inhabitants an effec-
tive testimony for God before our
neighbors.It is obvious that the home either
speaks for or against God. A pro-
fession of faith in Him, an outward
reputation for adherence to religious
principles which does not vitally
touch our dealings with one another
and with the community in which
we live—these clearly testify not for
God but against Him. On the other
hand, who can estimate the value
of a sweet and orderly Christian
home? Whether it be on a dusty
city street, or on a quiet country
lane, it is a light that cannot be hid.V. Counts on God for Victory (vv.
22-25).God promised that if Israel dili-
gently kept His commandments,
loved Him and walked in His ways,
they would be a nation that would
overcome and dispossess their ene-
mies, and prosper in every good
purpose.God desires the nation which hon-
ors His name to stand before the
other nations of the earth victorious
and prosperous.The purpose of the Lord for Is-
rael was a far greater one than
they ever achieved, because they
fell into sin and drew back in un-
belief. The limits of the land which
He proposed to give them, as stated
in verse 24, far exceed that which
they did possess in Palestine.God's plans are large plans. His
promises to us, like those to Israel,
are stupendous. We need to learn
to take Him at His word."No man shall be able to stand
before you" (v. 25) was the promise
to Israel. "Ask what ye will"
(John 15:7) is the promise to us.
They failed because they did not be-
lieve God. Will we fail for the same
reason?

Army Calls For 70,000 New WACS

DALLAS, Sept. 22.—The army wants 7,224 WACS, one for every battle casualty from the area, from the five southwestern states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma between next Monday and the second anniversary of Pearl Harbor.

The national quota is for 70,000 WAC recruits in the 70-day period.

Maj. Gen. Richard Donovan, commanding general of the 8th service command, appealed today for WAC recruits thus:

"These WACS are needed, not today or tomorrow—they were needed yesterday."

Each of the five state governors has been asked to sponsor the recruiting program in his state.

How And What To Write To Prisoners of War

1. Communication—Welfare Reports by Cable:

Section (a) Paragraph 10 A & S 148 has been notified through a decision reached by an exchange of cables with the International Red Cross Committee, Geneva, Switzerland. Request for welfare reports by cable in cases of prisoners of war and civilian internees held by Germany or Italy may be accepted in the following instances:

(a) When family has been unsuccessful in communicating with the prisoner.

(2) When the prisoner is known to have been wounded.

When this same service can be extended to Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees held by Japan, chapters will be notified.

2. Communications—Cabled Messages to Prisoners in the Far East:

Cabled messages to prisoners of war in the Far East are forwarded by the International Red Cross to the official Information Bureau

in Tokyo. To date no replies to cabled messages addressed to American prisoners have been received. The Japanese authorities agreed to transmit these messages but did not state that the prisoners would be authorized to reply telegraphically. The International Red Cross is continuing negotiations in order to obtain further information on this subject and chapters will be notified if further details are furnished.

3. Communications.—Letters Enclosures of Snapshots:

The Office of Censorship states that snapshots of members of families of prisoners of war can be included as enclosures in letters. The snapshot must be one without a distinguished background. It may carry no markings on the front or back of the picture nor may anything be written on the picture.

4. Communication—Japanese Controlled Territory:

Important: New regulations by the Japanese Government affect the length of letters to prisoners of war and civilian internees held by Japan:

(a) Letters must not be more than 25 words in length.

(b) Letters must be typewritten, or printed in capital letters, clearly legible.

(c) Letters must contain only personal or family news and must not contain military or political information or opinions.

Letters which do not comply with these regulations, or which are not correctly addressed will not be forwarded by the Japanese authorities. An effort will be made through the International Red Cross Committee for a liberalization of these regulations. Strict observance of the ruling in the meantime will be necessary.

Chapters are urged to suggest also that such letters should not include remarks which may be construed as discourteous to the Japanese. It is best for senders to avoid making such remarks which could prevent the letter reaching the prisoner.

5. PERSONAL EFFECTS:

Personal effects of prisoners of war will be returned to the United States when transportation is available. A & S 148, paragraph 26 contains the address to which inquiries should write on army cases. The following are the offices to which inquiries should be directed for other branches of the service:

6. PARCELS—BOOKS:

It is desirable that books sent to prisoners of war in Germany and Italy be bound in paper or cardboard as the censorship requirements of Italy require the removal of the cover in certain instances.

D. 1943, in this cause, numbered 38451-B on the docket of said court and styled Laura Thorn, Plaintiff, vs. Sam K. Thorn, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

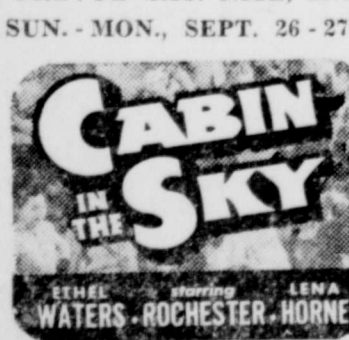
