

4-H Mobilization Week Is Observed March 4 To 12

Four-H Mobilization week is being observed throughout the United States. It began Saturday, March 4, and extends to Sunday March 12. County Agent, Lee R. Pool received the following letter from President Franklin D. Roosevelt, which he wishes all 4-H boys and girls and all potential members of the 4-H Clubs to read:

"Today our country relies on the determination and courage of its youth to see us through to victory. In the years to follow we shall look likewise to our youth for leadership in building a world of peace. Through 4-H Club work you have demonstrated that you are a powerful influence in this direction.

In being ever mindful of your responsibilities as each of you pledge your head, heart, hands and health to the service of your club, community and country, you are furthering your own wholesome development and that of your own family and community. Moreover, through assuming such responsibilities you are helping materially in building a world of progress, justice and mutual understanding.

I trust that rural boys and girls everywhere will respond to the roll call of 4-H Mobilization Week, March 4 to 12. For this year more than ever, members of the 4-H Clubs will be among the shock troops on the food production front to give that extra impetus to the war effort so essential to ultimate victory."

On May 1 A New Shoe Stamp Will Become Valid

A new ration stamp will be good for a pair of shoes beginning May 1, but one of the two coupons now in use—No. 18 in ration book 1—will expire April 30.

The Office of Price administration, announcing this today, said that despite a continuing tight supply of leather "it is expected that shoe rationing can be maintained at about the present level" of two pairs a year.

The new valid stamp, which will be good indefinitely will be designated shortly before May 1, OPA said.

Today's action will leave two shoe stamps in use as at present, since airplane stamp No. 1 in ration book 3 is also good indefinitely.

Stamp 18 was validated last June 15, and only 6 per cent of the numbers issued remain in circulation, OPA said. It is the only valid coupon in ration book 1.

Statement Made On Tire Records

Members of the local War Price and Rationing office have issued a statement in connection with tire inspection records. They state that in addition to both copies of receipt Form OPA R-569, the seller or transfer or must also give his current Tire Inspection Record, if any, to the new owners of the vehicle.

The new owner will be required to surrender the tire inspection record and obtain a new one when he applies for a gasoline ration to his Board.

County Continues Its Work On The Red Cross Quota

Pfc. B Hardin Is Training Troops Over In England

HEADQUARTERS, EUROPEAN THEATER OF OPERATIONS — A group of infantry soldiers, all of whom have seen action in the most important battles in North Africa, have arrived in England to help train troops. Included in the group of Africa-trained infantrymen is Pfc. Bethel Q. Hardin, 29, who formerly resided at 212 North Wasson Street in Lamesa.

Many of the men in the group participated in the initial landings in November, 1942, and fought for the beaches, airfields, strategic heights and old forts in Morocco and Algeria. Later, many of the doughboys saw their first action against the Germans in Tunisia.

In the Maknessy campaign the Americans were confronted with superb defensive positions of the enemy installed in heights. Artillery pieces including 88-mm. and 210-mm. pieces, mortars and machine guns covered the wadis and draws in the barren flats occupied by American units.

For two weeks the men attacked repeatedly, repulsed several counterattacks, kept the Germans under constant surveillance and denied them valuable observation points.

These soldiers were among those who forced the enemy to bring up many truck loads of reserves from the Afrika Korps, accomplishing its mission of drawing strength from the Nazis when they could least afford it.

Last April and May, these same American infantrymen ripped through the tortuous matted vegetation of the Sedjenane Valley djebels in Tunisia, killing, capturing and unceasingly pushing the enemy out of the hills guarding Bizerte.

Other of the men were in action at Paid Pass, Kasserine Pass, El Guettar, Ferryville and elsewhere.

At the conclusion of the Tunisian campaign, many of these soldiers paraded before King George VI and Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark.

OPA Frees Lard From Rationing

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—The Office of Price administration today freed lard from rationing in March while the War Food administration allocated 50,000,000 pounds of lard to soap making during the month.

The two actions were taken, the agencies said, because the current rate of hog slaughter is boosting lard production to record breaking levels.

Deliveries of lard to soap manufacturers must be completed by March 31. OPA added that whether lard will continue ration free depends upon civilian allocations in subsequent months.

Lard available to civilians during March has been increased to 206,000,000 pounds. Originally the allocation was 156,000,000 pounds.

Lard is listed on the March ration values table, effective Sunday, at three points a pound. It was explained that the table was printed prior to the decision on today's action.

Shortening made from vegetable oils is not affected by the order and will continue rationed as at present, OPA officials said.

Trainer Position Open to Qualified

Persons with experience involving shop factory foundry practice or management or with TWI training will be considered for position as training specialist, \$3800 to \$4600 a year, plus overtime, for employment in the district office of the War Manpower Commission, Houston, Texas, according to Mrs. Emma Dixon, local civil service secretary.

"The training specialist conducts institutes for the preparation of trainers. Makes inspections of training needs of either private or business establishments engaged in war production and appraises adequacy of training program in relation to the needs," Mrs. Emma Dixon said.

Applicants will be graded on the basis of their experience rather than upon any written examination.

Applications should be filed immediately with the director, 10th U. S. Civil Service Commission, 210 S. Harwood St., Dallas, Texas.

All appointments will be made in conformance with War Manpower Commission regulations.

Boy Eagle Aim To Teach 'Em Young

CAMDEN, S. C. (AP) — The Boy Eagles is the name of an air-minded organization founded here for boys from 7 to 12 years old, with the aim of making it national in scope.

It is sponsored by a group of men identified with aviation. Ike F. Jones, vice president of Southern Airways, Inc., says the idea of such an educational organization for boys had received wide endorsement from the aviation officials.

"Inasmuch as aviation will play a big role in the future of America," he says, "and more and more boys of today are becoming air-minded, the usefulness of the boy eagles can be well understood."

Under the plan, the boys would be divided into squadrons of from 10 to 50, and each squadron would be supported by some civic organization.

They would advance in the organization through various states by completing proficiency requirements, and would wear uniforms similar to a pilot's.

NEWS FROM The Home Demonstration Agent

Are you planting your first Victory garden this year? Or did you try one last year? In either case you probably have a lot of questions to ask. Two of them may be what seeds should be treated for plant diseases and how are they treated? Maybe these suggestions will help:

SEED TREATMENT

To Control Diseases:

This is an easy job. Simply put the seed into a tight container, such as a fruit jar with a screw cap, shake up thoroughly with disinfecting material until all seeds are coated. One-fourth teaspoonful of dust per ounce of seed, shaken thoroughly, does the job, or for a pound of seed, one teaspoonful of dust. Your local seed stores have these seed disinfectants. Copper compounds are effective on spinach, beet, carrot, cucumber, eggplant, endive, lettuce, cantaloupe, pea, pepper, squash, and tomato seed, but are injurious to cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower, and should not be used. The zinc compounds are adapted for use on seeds of the cabbage family, and also for cucumber, eggplant, endive, lettuce, pepper, spinach and tomato, but are injurious to beet, eggplant and pepper seed. Manufacturers' recommendations should be followed in treating seed.

Where dusts are not available, bichloride of mercury may be used at the rate of one-half tablet to a pint of water, or 1 ounce of bichloride of mercury to 8 gallons water for treating a large quantity of seed.

CAUTION: This solution is deadly poisonous and should be handled with care. Make up the solution in stone crocks, glass jars, or wooden containers; it corrodes metal. Seeds of cabbage and related crops should be soaked about 15 minutes; cantaloupe, cucumber, watermelon and squash seed for about 10 minutes; pepper, tomato, eggplant seed for 8 minutes; Irish potato seed for 45 minutes, and sweet potatoes for seed about 10 minutes.

Wet treated seed should be planted as soon as it is dry enough to sift through the fingers. Dust treated seed can be stored in clean containers for several weeks before planting, if necessary.

Car Applications To Be Referred To District Office

With the rapidly declining stock pile of new automobiles yet in dealers hands and the greatly reduced quotas, it is impossible to allocate sufficient quotas to local boards to meet the approved application demands, according to J. Doyle Settle, District OPA Rationing Executive.

In order to relieve the boards of some of their work load and to make further attempts to place the remaining few cars in the hands of essential users, the local boards are now asked to refer applications for new 1942 cars to the District Office for review, Settle said. The board determines the eligibility of the applicant and indicates its approval before sending the application to the District Office for action.

The District Office may issue certificates to the extent of its quota, mailing the certificates directly to the applicant. The district office notifies the board when any certificates are issued or returns the application, where certificates cannot be issued due to insufficient quotas. The board returns such applications for 1942 cars to the applicant and advises that a certificate cannot be issued due to insufficient quotas, but that on application to the board he may purchase a specific used 1942 car on certificate issued by the board.

Certificates for specific used 1942 cars will be issued by Local Boards on a non quota basis. However, the applicant for a used 1942 car must submit a written statement giving the following information of the car he wishes to purchase: make, body type, serial number, engine number, license number and state of registration.

Check On All Gas Coupons By OPA Begins March 6

March 6 OPA Investigators will begin a nation-wide spot check of gasoline coupons, principally in service stations. J. Doyle Settle, District Rationing Executive of the OPA, announced today. The plan is for the investigator to ask to see all coupons in the possession of the gasoline buyer who comes to the service station.

Any person holding coupons not endorsed will be handed a notice explaining the importance of endorsement and directing him to visit the Local Board within ten days to show that all coupons have been endorsed. A copy of the notice will be sent to the ration holder's board and if he fails to appear to show that his coupons have been endorsed, a hearing will be held to revoke his ration.

"The purpose of this program is not to hand out innumerable notices or to bring about a number of revocation hearings, but to achieve as near 100 per cent endorsement as possible," Mr. Settle stated. "If each gasoline ration book holder will cooperate by endorsing each coupon before the investigation period begins there will be no necessity for inconveniencing anyone."

Agricultural Wartime Credit

It is patriotic to use credit where doing so would result in production of additional food without loss to farm families, asserts Tyrus R. Timm, economist in farm management for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. If credit is needed to expand farm yields and to improve the family's health status, its use is as valuable to the war effort as the use of farm machinery and hired labor.

Credit is like other farm production tools. The quality determines the profitability of the investment even more so than the amount applied, he explains. After years of trial and error, quality farm credit can be analyzed as notes and installments arranged to conform to expected income; interest and other costs in line with similar risks in other business endeavors; funds available when need is provided; amount of loan sufficiently large to use best production and marketing practices; definite understanding about additional advances and renewals in case of emergencies not created by poor husbandry; fair amount of collateral provided for lender as insurance for his services and lender who understands and appreciates the hazards of farming and the scope of rural life.

Timm suggests that reorganizing existing short-term indebtedness offers another sound use of wartime

credit. This might effect a reduction in the cost of carrying such debts. But he cautions against using credit in an attempt to make money on livestock and other farm items through future price changes. Such speculative use of credit by many farmers in one community simply builds up the price of goods.

He also discourages incurring long-term indebtedness which cannot be paid within the lifetime of the item for which the money was borrowed. For example, a tractor with a normal life of 10 years should be paid off within that period. Payment in half the time would be better because of latter year breakdowns and obsolescence.

LET'S ALL BACK THE ATTACK!

Dr. Cox Says—

Looking out on the world with clear vision is the birthright of each and every person, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Texas has many hundred persons who are blind or have impaired vision. These figures would be more tragic if given for the period before the law was passed making it mandatory to use prophylactic drops in the eyes of all new-born babies. Since, then blindness caused by birth infections has been greatly reduced.

In the examination of school children, diseases of the eye are encountered quite frequently. Chief among these is trachoma. This disease is contagious and causes a destructive inflammation characterized by formation of trachoma granulations. These gradually form scar tissue. Trachoma, if left untreated, will impair the vision and eventually cause blindness. This happens when the proper treatment is not given or is not begun until the latter stages of the disease.

Trachoma is most prevalent where insanitary conditions are worst. The prevention of this disease consists not only in avoiding the infection but maintaining good personal hygiene. Parents should watch closely for any indication of trachoma or anything wrong with the vision of their children. Many diseases of the eye readily respond to treatment in their early stages, but, if allowed to develop, may seriously affect the vision and in many cases cause blindness.

**Use of Cabbages
In Diet-Canning
Encouraged**

Bumper consumption of the season's bumper cabbage crop is being encouraged on the civilian front, Peter F. Murray, area supervisor, Office of Distribution, said this week.

Designated as a Victory Food Selection from February 24 to March 4, cabbage will be featured nationally as a seasonally abundant crop and all consumer and trade outlets are being enlisted in an intensive campaign to stimulate consumption and movement of this perishable commodity.

Additional uses of cabbage in the daily diet and more home canning and storing are practical ways all civilians have of increasing consumption, Mr. Murray said and added that cooperation by all consumers is necessary if the seasonally abundant crop is to be fully utilized.
