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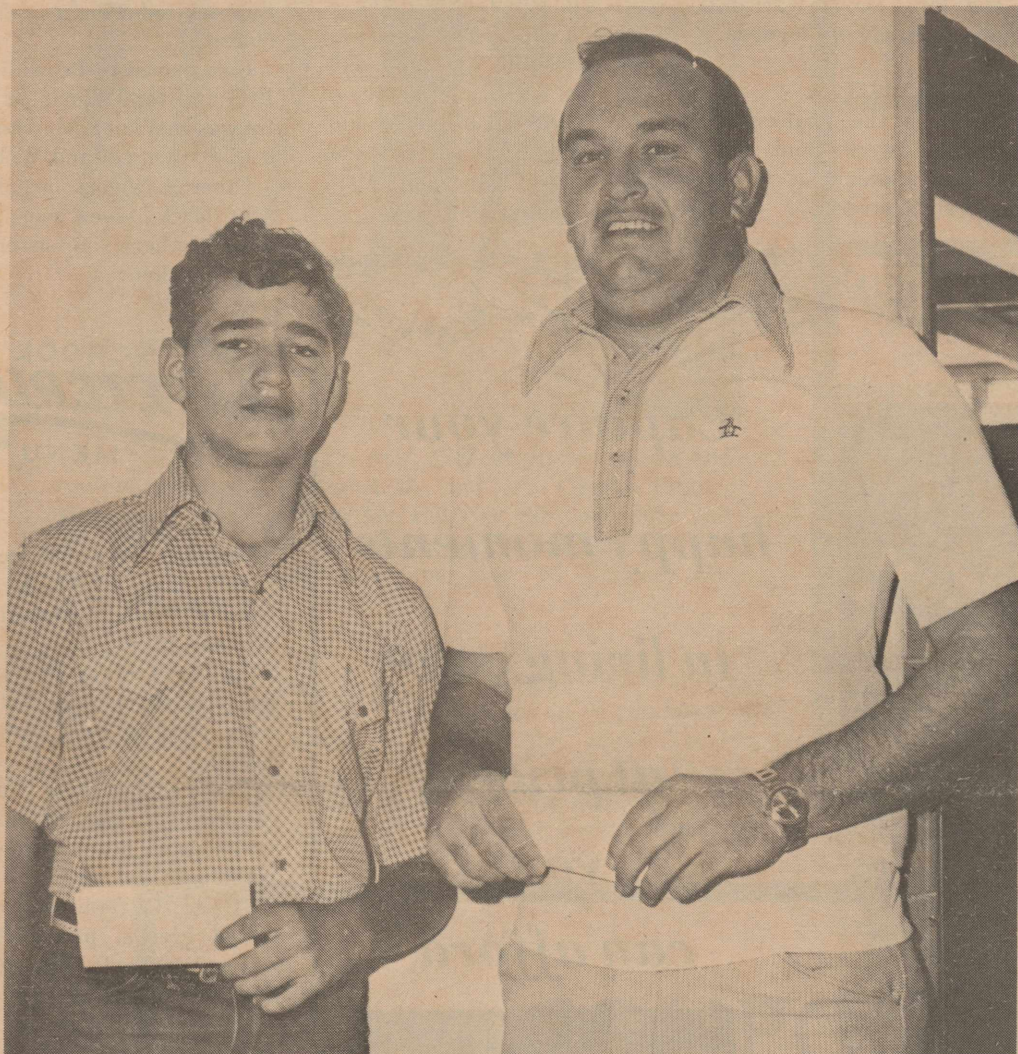

Reed, McLain Are Winners

Season winner of the Hart Beat's first football contest was not determined until the counting was completed on the twelfth and final contest.

Coach Hub Reed trailed Cary McLain one point going into the final week. Reed missed just four games for the week while McLain guessed incorrectly on six to reverse the standings of the two and give Reed the grand prize-two tickets to the Cotton Bowl classic and \$40. McLain will receive two tickets to the Sun Bowl game and \$20.

The season finish was nip and tuck between some nine contestants. Just two points back of McLain, Danny George amassed 121 correct guesses for the season. Wanda Marble finished with 120; Glen Gleghorn, 119; Betty Heller, 116; Clinton Holiman, 115; and Ricky Allensworth and Eleanor Sudduth of Olton, 114 each.

The tiny word "if" enters the picture strongly in this the first football contest for Hart Best readers. Holiman, one of

the top finishers, would most likely have been the season winner had he entered each of the contests. He got off to a

Miller Rites Held Tuesday

'Longhorn' Barber Recalls Memories Through The Years

"This shop could tell lots of stories if it could talk," said James Kennedy this week of the small shop just south of the Post Office which was built for a barber shop in 1929 and is still today, a tonsorial parlor.

Kennedy came to Hart in 1955 and leased Longhorn Barber shop from Charlie "Pat" Patterson who had barbered in two other locations in town before building the shop in 1929.

Leasing the shop for the first five years, Kennedy recalls there were few shops in Hart when he came. "On the east side of the street there was the lumber yard and north of me there were two grocery stores and the Post Office to the south."

Patterson continued to cut hair with Kennedy for a time on "busy day"-Fridays and Saturdays. Saturday business

required grueling hours with the barbers seldom finishing before midnight.

Kennedy remembers some of Hart's old timers, no longer living, who came in each Saturday for their weekly

shaves.

Remembering those old-timers brings a re-awareness of the emptiness brought with their passing. "I really miss them," he says, as he recalls familiar

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Basketballers Victorious In Season Openers Here

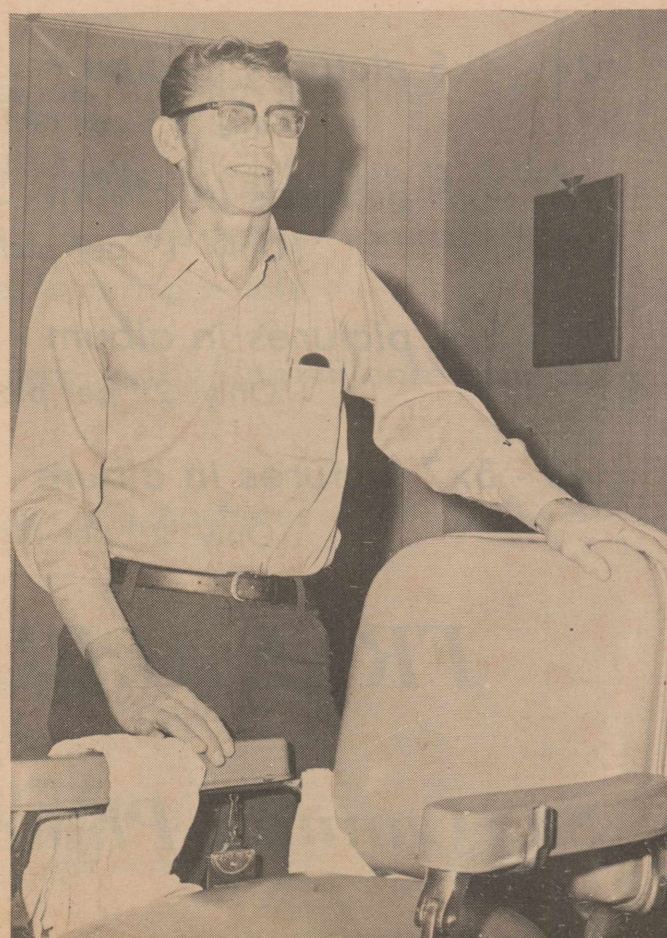
Longhorn roundballers launched the 1973-74 season in high style with homestand victories in six of seven outings Monday and Tuesday.

Doyle Keley, minister, officiated. Burial was in Terry County Memorial Cemetery under the direction of Brownfield funeral Home.

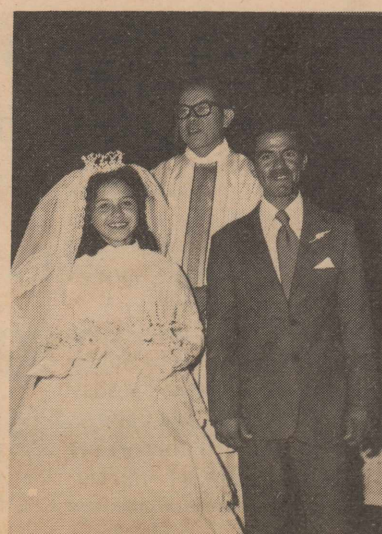
A native of Wapanucka, Okla., Cole died Monday in West Texas Hospital in Lubbock following a prolonged illness.

PINEAPPLE DELIGHT

Crust
large sack of vanillia waffers
1 stick oleo

Crush wafers and oleo together and put into a long cake pan.

Mix:
1 large pkg. cream cheese
1 egg
1 stick oleo
1 t. vanilla
1 box powdered sugar
2 c. crushed pineapple, drained
Pour over crust and slice 2 bananas and top with 1 large box of Cool Whip. Refrigerate.

PEANUT BRITTLE

1 c. sugar
1/2 c. white Karo syrup
1/4 c. water

Cook until thread. Add 2 cups raw peanuts and cook until golden brown. Remove from heat and add 1 t. vanilla and 1/2 t. soda. Pour into a well buttered pan.

SAND TARTS

1/2 c. margarine
2 T. sugar
1 c. flour
1 c. chopped pecans
1 t. vanilla
1 box powdered sugar

Mix oleo and sugar; add flour vanilla and nuts. Form into small balls and bake for 15 minutes at 350. Cool, roll in powdered sugar and when cool, dunk into sugar again.

names and faces.

Kennedy was born in East Texas and moved with his family to Olton when he was 10. He went into the Army from high school during World War II and then to barber school after his military service was ended. He barbered in Olton six years with the late A. A. "Smitty" Smith before moving to Hart.

He and his wife, the former Jean Hall of Olton, are parents of a daughter and son. Kathy, 19, is a student at Lubbock Christian College. Jimmy, 17, is a student at Hart High School with dreams of a future career in commercial art. He draws cartoons for the Hart Beat teen column.

Kennedy had struggled through an onslaught of complaints when Olton barbers announced set business hours and had it to do again when he came to Hart.

Custom had prevailed in the agricultural area for farmers to go into town for hair cuts after dark had stopped their own work. (Generally on Saturdays) Soon after leasing the shop, Kennedy remembers he had painted on his windows the hours he would be working.

He recalls one instance, "It must have been after 10 one night," when he was cleaning up in readiness for the next day. "A fellow knocked on my door till I opened it and he asked, 'Do those hours mean anything?' " Kennedy says with a grin and the admission that he went ahead with the man's haircut.

When Kennedy began barbering, hair cuts were 75 cents; today's cuts are \$2.

Changing styles with longer hair becoming an accepted thing, have necessitated the increased cost in hair cuts. Longer hair requires fewer trips to the barber "and the fellow who does get his hair cut has to pay the price," says Kennedy.

Kennedy admitted he could not say if really short hair cut would ever come back but indicated that a shorter trend is already underway.

"Actually, long hair is just now reaching its peak around here," he believes.

Confessing he never believed that men's hair styling would be accepted so completely, Kennedy says he's seriously considering a course in styling, pointing out that "styling" is more than a hair cut.

"I laughed about it at first," he says. "I just never dreamed there'd be as many do it."

"Any one can have their hair styled and unless they can care for it, it's just a hair cut. It'll be the same cut but it won't have that look of care," he says.

Kennedy remembers he did not get his first barber shop hair cut until he was 12. Today, very few parents cut their children's hair. Traditionally with many barbers, as it is with Kennedy, first hair cuts are complimentary. "You don't cut off enough to charge them for it anyway," he says.

Asked if he'd ever "really goofed" he quickly says, "You bet," and relates how he was almost through giving a flat top to a customer when he realized the man had never worn one.

Happily visiting with his customer as he worked, sudden realization dawned. "I just told him, 'You can do anything you want to me and I won't blame you but I've just set you up for a flat top!'"

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Smiling, he says the customer matter-of-factly answered, "Well, that's okay, I've always wondered what I'd look like with one anyway." That man was a flat top customer for a long while after that.

Along with change in styles, one of the most notable differences in the barbering business through the years is the vacuum that works to keep hair from falling as it's cut.

"Let his vacuum go out and a barber is lost," Kennedy says and then adds, "and it's so simple. Any one who sat down and thought for 30 minutes could have thought of it."

Kennedy and his family are active members of the Church of Christ and Kennedy has authored a gospel tract that has been published and distributed.

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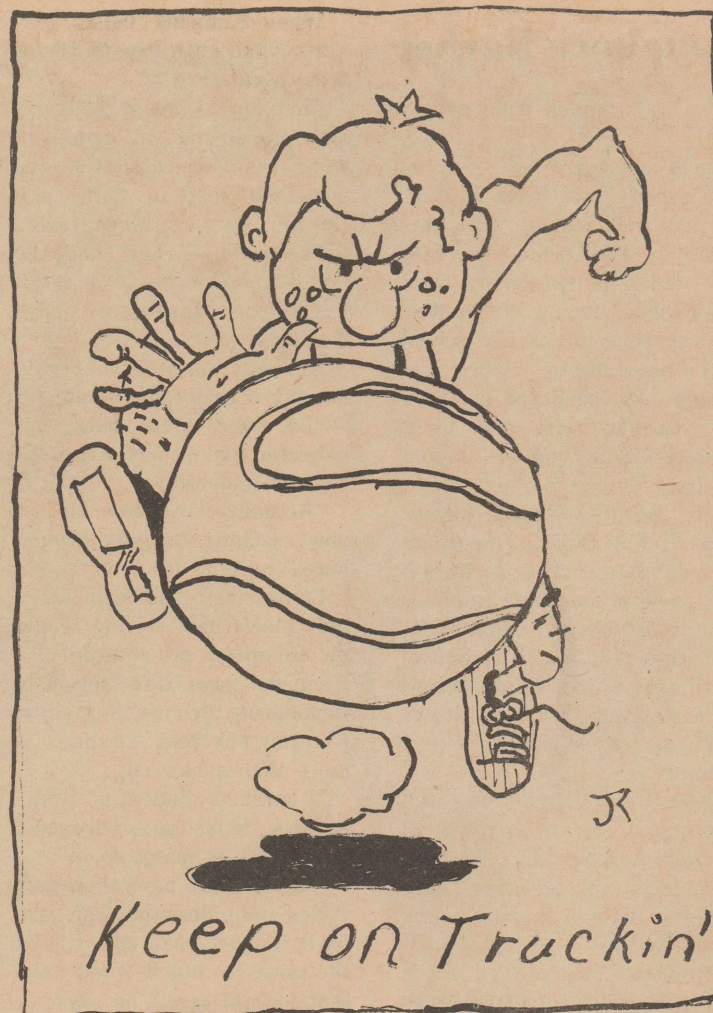
