Old Settlers Make Plans for Reunion

WITH the start less than a month away, officers and directors of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association have made plans for the 45th annual reunion of the organization.

Dates for the three-day celebration are Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 22, 23 and 24. Corby Lee Marshall of Roaring Springs, manager and secretary said last week that a meeting of the directors would be held in the immediate future to make final decisions on this year's reunion plans.

While the ranks of early-day pioneers of the area have been depleted, first and second gener-

ation descendants continue the observance which has attracted crowds in the past estimated as high as 10,000.

Sam Ross of Flomot is President of Old Settlers and John Stotts of Matador is manager of the rodeo division.

A parade of horseback riders through the business section of Roaring Springs Thursday morning, Aug. 22, will start the reunion. Official starting time is 10:30.

The parade terminates at the Pioneer Pavilion and is followed by the memorial service where tribute is paid to deceased pioneers of the two counties for the past year. A program usually follows in the afternoon, and a business session precedes a period of informal dancing to western music. Two dances, western and modern, are held each evening.

Rodeo Big Attraction

A growing feature of the reunion is the three evenings of rodeo performances, which attracts some of the best rope and saddle talent in the Panhandle. Manager Stotts said that interest continues to increase in the shows. Excellent facilities owned by the Old Settlers in Pioneer Park provide the public with good seats and adequate lighting for night performances.

A children's carnival of rides and games usually arrives on Monday preceding the annual reunion.

SPORTSMEN are willing to pay good hard cash for hunting privileges on Motley acreage, as was done last season when 120,000 acres were listed. County Judge Forrest Campbell said this week that approximately 50,000 acres have been offered for lease this season, but that more will be needed. Size of areas range from 100 acres to 10,000.

Local Students Attend Seminar

Miss Wanda Matney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claudie Matney, and Steve Bostick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bostick, will attend the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar July 30—August 3 on the Campus of Baylor University in Waco, according to an announcement by Vann Francis, president of Motley County Farm Bureau.

The annual training school for high school junior and senior students is an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage and the proper role of government, President Francis stated.

"It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make their roles as citizens more meaningful," the local farm leader said.

A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar. Travel will be by chartered bus.

Four nationally-known lecturers will address the school. They are: Dr. Clifton L. Ganus, president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Kay, president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Skousen, author, lawyer and former FBI agent.

Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral and social aspects of American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films and panel discussions.

Started last year by the Soil Conservation Office here and sponsored by the Matador Lions Club, the plan of bringing landowners and sportsmen together attracted state-wide attention.

The amount of revenue produced is not known, but it was apparently well-accepted by both the hunters and the landowners. Brochures are prepared listing the available acreage and mailed to sportsmen who make inquiries for available hunting leases.

All contracts are between landowners and hunters. Earlier this year questionnaires were mailed to landowners who might be interested in leasing property for hunting. Additional questionnaires may be obtained from Erwin Willard of the Soil Conservation office or from Judge Campbell. With inquiries being received from hunters, landowners are urged to list property as soon as possible so that the brochures may be prepared and mailed. No charge is made for the service of bringing landowners and sportsmen together.

A meeting is announced for Monday night (July 29) at 8:30 in the courthouse for the purpose of discussing the leasing plan and hunting program. All landowners are urged to attend and others interested are invited to attend.

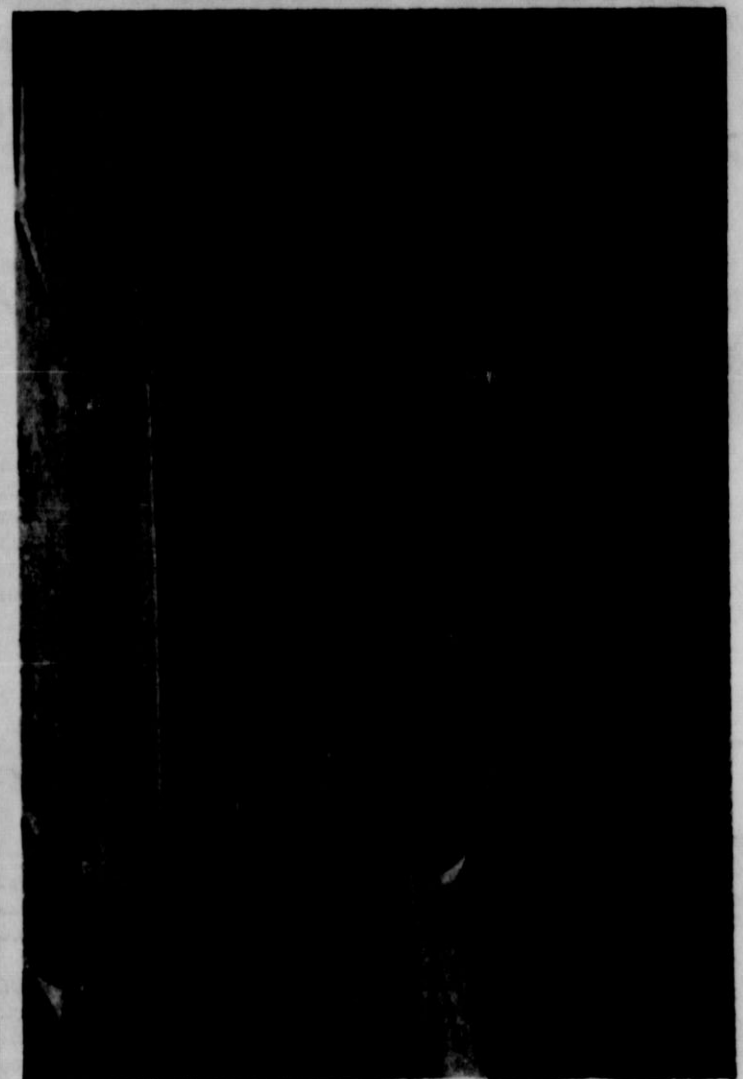
Also to be discussed will be the possibilities of organizing a wildlife association. A speaker will be present to explain various phases and advantages that might be obtained.

WMU Presidents Are Recognized

Guest speakers in the pulpit of First Baptist Church Saturday evening and Sunday, in observance of the church's 75th anniversary, brought inspirational messages at all services. These included two former pastors of the church, Rev. Clifford Potts, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church near Brownfield, and Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Seminole.

Speaker for the Saturday evening service, Rev. C. H. Murphy, pastor of First Baptist Church of Silverton, surrendered to preach while a member of the local congregation, and during the ministry of Rev. Hawkins, and was licensed to preach by this church.

Dr. F. E. Swanner of Plainview, Area Missionary, presented the message Saturday night.

A playlet, "He Meant Me," was presented by members of the Vada Young Women's Auxiliary for the Sunday evening services. The cast included Elaine Dixon, Virginia Green, Carol Martin, Bonita Hand, Debra Garrison, Brigid Barton, Cindy Marshall, Patsy Green and Patty Edwards. Mrs. Larry Heard, YWA sponsor, directed the drama.

Heritage Is Stressed

The heritage of the local church and its influence on the community was stressed throughout the anniversary celebration.

Rev. Murphy emphasized the power of prayer in his message of "Reproducing Witnesses." He cited the little band of 120 Christians who worked together and prayed together following the death and resurrection of the Saviour, and the wondrous works which resulted from their consecration.

"As we reproduce our witnessing, we must have belief in the power of God's Holy Spirit, and have harmony and togetherness," Rev. Murphy admonished. "There must be a consecrated heart in every Christian and his church to produce 'reproducing witnesses,'" he declared.

A parallel was noted in the early band of Christians and the small group of pioneers comprising the first Matador Baptist Church.

In reminiscence, Dr. Swanner recalled that the rapid growth of the Matador Church soon resulted in its being listed among the top five Baptist churches in the Staked Plains Association, which included the Lubbock and Plainview churches. Matador Hall at Wayland College was named for the local church because of its liberal support in building the dormitory for girls.

Dr. Swanner recalled that he preached the first sermon in the present Baptist church building here when the interior was completed in June, 1938. (Dedication of the new building was at the completion of the entire plant in 1942.)

Bringing his message from the book of Nehemiah, Dr. Swanner described the building of the wall at Jerusalem and explained its significance.

"Some use the church as a smoke screen to hide their doubt," he declared. "I believe the church is still secure . . . that it will stand the test both past and present and that the future is as bright as the promise of God. Just as the Walls of Jerusalem gave security to its people, the church holds the community together . . ."

In his message, Rev. Potts quoted from Revelations and used as a text, "The Divine Alphabet."

He, also, declared "There is a future . . . God is still on his throne, and this church can mean more to the community than ever before . . . it can be a light-house in the community because of the faithfulness of its members, and the power of God . . . Security has evaded this generation," he continued, "but God's purpose will never fail. He will accomplish every purpose he started with."

HERITAGE of the Past, Debt to Faith and Debt to Dedication were thoughts presented by Rev. Hawkins in services Sunday afternoon.

"We're living in a day when Christianity is on the testing block in a world of technology," Rev. Hawkins declared.

Reading from the third chapter of Joshua, he stressed the passage, "You have not passed this way heretofore."

"We stand on fresh, unplowed ground . . . the threshold of a new day," he declared. "Great things are ready for those who are ready for them . . . God gives us a new life that demands consecration . . . a new path and a way of testing . . . a new inheritance and a way of certainty; a time and day of opportunity."

Rev. Hawkins paid homage to the late Dr. M. B. Carroll, a former pastor here, who rose to leadership in the Southern Baptist Convention. "Life does have its certainties if we but place our lives in the hand of God," he declared.

The anniversary observance began at 6:00 p.m. Saturday with the ringing of the old church bell by Littleton Rattan, a son of the late Rev. W. H. Rattan who served as second pastor of the Matador church.

The service with Rev. Murphy as speaker, was followed by a covered dish supper and a later service with Dr. Swanner as speaker. The host pastor, Rev. Larry Heard presided at all of the services commemorating the diamond anniversary.

Corsages Presented

Women who have served as Woman's Missionary Union president during the years were recognized in a special service during the morning worship hour.

The W.M.U. (first called Ladies Aid Society) was organized about 1902 with Mrs. A. D. (Mother) Burleson as the first president. Others who have served as president include Mesdames J. H. Criswell, W. C. Garrett, W. D. Herring, G. S. Craven, J. A. Groves, Elmer Stearns, H. M. Weldon, R. E. Campbell, Clarence Kifer, Forrest Campbell, and Colquet Warren.

Church Organized With Six Members

The Matador Baptist Church, later to become the First Baptist Church of Matador, was organized in 1893 with only six charter members. These were Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Burleson, her sister, Mrs. Lee Anderson, Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Cammack and Miss Rosa Cammack, all of whom have been deceased a number of years.

First generation descendants of two of these families still live, one of whom, Mrs. Margaret (Burleson) Newman, first joined this church in 1895. She is presently residing in Hamilton. The others are Cammack sons and daughters, including Web Cammack of Lubbock, Dr. Bragg C. Cammack of Agoura, Calif., Mrs. Vashti Teal of Denton, Mrs. J. W. (Esther) Kleinschmidt of Canyon,

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

TOPIC: Gift Tax

As a part of the Federal estate and gift tax law, Congress has provided a system for giving your money away without paying tax, or by paying less tax than the estate tax would be later. Briefly, the rules are: You can give each of your children, grandchildren, etc., \$3000 each year without paying gift tax or being liable for estate tax later (unless you die within three years after the gift). Out of community property, you and your spouse can give \$3000 each or \$6000 to each child, grandchild, or other beneficiary. By filing a gift tax return, Form 709, with the Internal Revenue Service you can give \$30,000 tax free out of your estate. Of course, in community property this would be doubled to \$60,000 tax free from both spouses. This must also be more than three years before date of death. So, if you and your wife have three children who are all married, and you have nine grandchildren, you can give your 15 heirs \$6,000 each, tax free, or \$90,000 a year. By filing a form 709 with Internal Revenue you can use your \$60,000 exemption (two 30,000 life time exemptions), you can pass \$150,000 out of your estate the first year and \$90,000 a year thereafter, tax free, provided you live for three years after the gift. If you are making an estate plan, it is probably advisable to consult an experienced Federal estate and gift tax consultant.

AUSTIN—Texas Liquor Control Board is studying new regulations for private clubs where "spirits" are sold.

Members won't reveal the recommendations that were submitted to them by Acting Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr., until after careful study.

Last set of regulations banning cash sales in the clubs and curbing the issuance of guest cards by manager-members was knocked out by a district court order in May.

Humphreys termed the new rules "workable" but "not rigid."

Meanwhile, he submitted a long report on the steps taken to restore public confidence in the LCB which has been hard hit on investigation of irregularities.

Humphreys detailed steps taken to upgrade personnel and improve administration, case handling and record keeping.

TAX BILL LAW—Now there's no way out of paying those new taxes approved by the Legislature in special session. Gov. John Connally has signed into law the bill which is designed to raise \$160.2 million for 1969 state operations. It's effective October 1, and here's what it does:

Raises the general sales and auto sales tax rates from two to three per cent statewide. In cities which levy 1% local option sales taxes the rate will be four per cent. (No change was made in exemptions.)

Increases the corporation franchise tax rate (collectible May 1) from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of taxable capital, surplus and undivided profits. Portion of the franchise tax on corporate debt will be reduced from \$2.25 to \$2.00 in 1969 and phased out by 1973.

TOURIST RECORD IN MAKING—Tourist travel is expected to far surpass all previous records this year, according to State Highway Department's travel and information division soundings.

One Highway Department travel bureau on Interstate Highway 10 near Orange reported "customers" for first half of 1968 more than doubled total for January-June 1967. Ninety per cent of the visitors were on their way to the HemisFair in San Antonio.

All eight established bureaus run by the Highway Department reported big increases. Total services went up 14.2 per cent for the first half of this year compared with the same period in 1967. Travel and information division said its mail inquiries are up 27 per cent.

Last year Texas was visited by 20.6 million persons who spent \$1.2 billion. This was an eight per cent increase in visitors over 1966, and an 11 per cent jump in spending.

COURTS SPEAK—Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has urged the U. S. Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Texas tidelands boundaries must be measured from 10.3 miles of shoreline as it existed in 1845,

without regard to recessions.

State Supreme Court reversed an \$862,000 verdict favoring foreign car dealers. They had sued the city of Houston for flood damage to autos, claiming inadequate drainage.

High court set October 16 for review of the lower court orders directing a charter be granted to Mission Savings and Loan Association, San Antonio.

Court said National Surety Corporation has a valid judgment of \$18,237 against the Friendswood Independent School District, Galveston County, but cannot collect.

It ordered a new trial in a Hansford County landowner's suit against a professional wheat-cutter whose truck started a fire in his field.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held that the State Board of Education could order a hearing on the appeal of a Lumberton school superintendent who was fired by a local board.

Third Court directed a new trial in a case involving disannexation of 550 acres of land from Temple.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES—City cannot force on a landowner higher air control standards than those set by State Air Control Board, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

A Texan is qualified to vote in a local liquor election if he resides in the state a year, the county six months before election and is a resident of the city where the election is held.

Dallas County Hospital District has no authority to build and operate a crime laboratory.

State Insurance Commissioner has authority to release a surety bond on an insurance company that is in receivership when all claims are satisfied and when the one-year statutory time limit is satisfied.

Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners cannot vary fees set by state law.

Plaintiff could not recover for faulty workmanship, labor and materials and/or negligence under surety bond required by the Water Well Drillers Act.

OPERATION YOUTHLIFT—August has been declared by Governor John Connally as Youth Month at HemisFair.

Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, heads a statewide committee to organize special youth excursions to the Fair. He is meeting with youth leaders in key cities of Texas to plan the August trips.

Special, low-cost, package-plan excursions, including overnight accommodations in San Antonio, have been developed by HemisFair to tie in with the program.

Any youth group in Texas desiring to participate in "Operation Youthlift" should contact HemisFair Headquarters or the Speaker's office at the State Capitol.

Short Shorts

New \$7 million bond issue has been sold to aid Texas college students needing tuition loans.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports that 2,262 active contracts have been received from purchasers under the revitalized Veterans Land Program.

It is sometimes weird the way the government goes about seeking authority for a course of action, usually in the area of raising taxes.

Early this year the Vice President of the United States made a swing around the black nations of Africa.

Out of this junket came the press report that the Vice President found these nations very concerned that the United States will not enact an income surtax to stabilize the world economy.

Now while perhaps such a comment generated by a swing around such places as Zurich, Bonn, Amsterdam, London, Paris, and Rome might have some weight if it is overlooked that foreigners really have no right to comment on the domestic affairs of the United States, it is passing strange that the opinions of such nations as Chad, the Congo, et al, should be considered as having much weight.

For after all these are nations composed largely of people living in round huts without plumbing, with cow manure floors, and still controlled by tribal chiefs and witch doctors as they were in the Stone Age.

It is most difficult to understand how out of the kraals in

the bush could emanate so much wisdom on what is best for the balance of trade, or how the world monetary system should be adjusted.

In fact, to most of the people in this area traditional polygamy, where cattle are traded for wives, the term inflation, if they even use the word, has a very simple meaning.

If at any time the current going price of five cattle for a wife is not enough to get another average grade bride into a family kraal, then there is inflation. Of course, the daughter of a ranking chief will bring as much as 100 head of cattle on the marriage market, but the ordinary trade is confined to the average grade female at the going rate of five head of cattle each. And to the credit of the Africans it should be stated that they have pretty carefully maintained this rate of exchange for several years.

This may be due to the fact that the witch doctors, or whatever functionaries govern in these matters, have not been exposed to the "New Economics," which is perhaps a fact that Harvard has overlooked.

But to translate this understanding of economics to serious advice on what should be done about the American tax rate is really quoting a basic authority. Or perhaps, in view of the traditional dress, or rather undress, of these people, such a viewpoint was perhaps offered to the Congress and the American people as the naked truth.

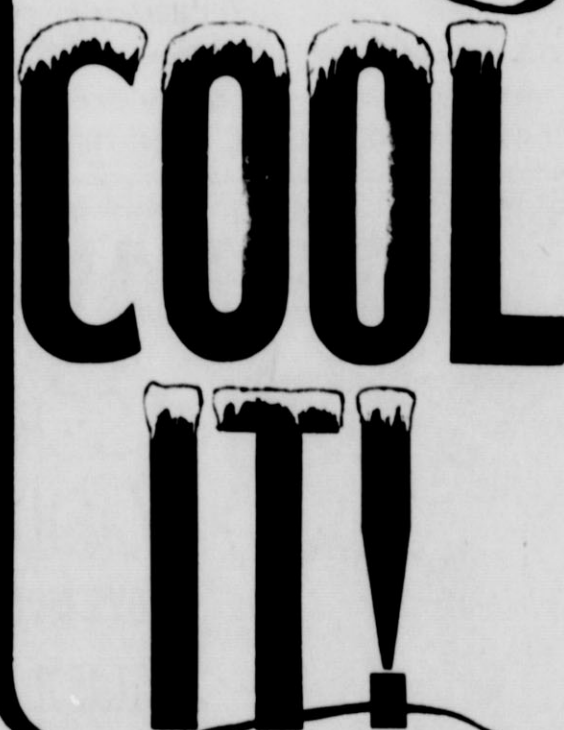

Make Home Safe For Grandchildren

In these days when there are nearly 20,000,000 persons 65 years of age and over in the United States, and about 80 percent of them live in their own homes, a lot of grandchildren will be paying visits to their grandparents. And this, says the Council on Family Health, means that grandma has the special responsibility of making her home safe for grandchildren to visit.

The Council, a non-profit organization established as a public service by members of the drug industry, suggests safety factors to be considered before the grandchildren arrive.

Make a tour of your home. Watch especially for medicines you may have left on a kitchen counter, a living room table, a bedside table, or on a surface in the bathroom which children might reach. All medicines should be stored in the medicine cabinet out of the reach of children.

Whatever bleaches, cleaners, polishes, waxes and other household chemicals grandma uses, should be placed in cabinets high enough to be out of reach of little grandchildren. This also applies to storing pesticides.

If there are extra electric or gas heaters in the home, keep them away from areas where small children may brush against them. Do not place them near walls or curtains as this constitutes a fire hazard. And keep a fire screen at the fire place if in use.

If there are doors leading to the street or cellar, it is a good precaution to keep them locked.

If there are no window guards, or if windows open onto fire escapes, they should never be open.

Despite the fact that grandchildren usually arrive with toys and games to keep them busy, it's a good idea for grandma to keep a stock of playthings and educational toys on hand. Children tire easily of playthings, and a good collection is handy for visiting little ones.

COUNTY AGENT
PALLMEYER SAYS:

The replacement or repair of tires on farm tractors involves a lot of money. A few simple precautions will reduce these costs and pay an added dividend in longer tire life.

Proper inflation is the most important part of tire care. Under-inflated tires may not look low, but the sidewalls will buckle when the tractor is pulling a load and will eventually break. You should check the tires for the right amount of air pressure every two weeks. Continued use at low pressure will reduce tire life by a fourth.

Tire slippage causes excessive wear as well as wasting tractor fuel and time. Using tractor wheel weights, as recommended by the manufacturer, or filling the tires with calcium chloride-treated water can prevent slipping by giving additional traction.

Careful driving and stopping can prevent still more tire wear and injury. Smooth stops and slow driving to avoid stumps, stones, and other obstacles saves a lot of punctures and tire bruises.

Sunshine and grease are harmful to natural rubber, and tires shouldn't be allowed to stand on an oil soaked floor. Nor should they be left in the sunshine when they're not being used. A lot of tire life can be saved by storing rubber-tired implements on jacks so the tires don't bear the weight of the equipment.

Poisoning from agricultural chemicals rarely takes place, but if it occurs, speed is important in administering aid.

The most urgent need in poisoning cases is to reduce or minimize the absorption of poison into the body. Swallowing is by far the most common form of entry of the poisonous substances into the body. However, many liquids and vapors can be absorbed through the unbroken skin and many in the form of vapors dust or sprays can be absorbed through the lungs. Some chemicals can cause serious burns upon contact with the skin. Corrosive or caustic materials may cause serious injury, particularly to the eyes.

In all cases call a physician immediately if poisoning is suspected. If a poison is swallowed and the individual is conscious and not convulsing, give milk and induce vomiting. Do not induce vomiting if the victim has swallowed a petroleum product (gasoline, kerosene, charcoal starter or lighter fluid) or has swallowed a corrosive, caustic poison, such as lye or acid.

If the poison has been inhaled, fresh air is essential. Do not allow the victim to walk, but move the victim to fresh air. Loosen all tight clothing and apply artificial respiration if breathing has stopped or is irregular. Keep the victim as quiet as possible and do not give alcohol in any form.

For skin contamination and chemical burns, flush the skin immediately with large quantities of water (do not use water on phosphorus burns), remove clothing from affected area and following through washing cover the burn loosely with a clean cloth.

If the eyes are affected, hold eyelids open and wash eyes with a gentle stream of water for at least five (5) minutes or preferably until a physician is available.

Be alert for the symptoms of shock-cold, pale, sweaty skin, chilling and fainting or collapse. Persons in shock should be kept lying down, chilling should be prevented by wrapping in blankets. If breathing has stopped or is irregular, give artificial respiration. Do not give the victim alcohol in any form.

A leaflet, "Poisoning First Aid Guide" (L-696) is available at my office.

Most importantly, poison prevention is the most effective first aid measure. Store labeled (pesticides, drugs, cleaning agents and other chemicals) out of reach of children preferably under lock and key. Always destroy empty and unlabeled pesticide and other chemical containers.

Years ago hogs went to market weighing over 400 pounds. Emphasis was then on fat because lard was in demand for high-energy diets.

Today's ideal hog is marketed at 200 pounds, and is mostly lean

pork. Research has helped farmers make the change by developing lean-type strains of hogs and feed rations which allow producers to grow the types demanded by the modern market.

Too, the tough, stringy range steers our grandfathers knew and the overly conditioned beef animal of the fat stock shows of the past have both given way to a faster gaining, moderately-finished meat animal.

In the early years of this century, a milk cow did well to produce 4,000 pounds of milk per year. The national average for all cows today is more than twice as high.

Production per cow in the Texas Dairy Herd Improvement Association herds is over 11,000 pounds per cow and climbing. Better care and disease control account for part of this gain. But feeding and breeding knowledge pioneered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Land-Grant Institutions, such as Texas A&M University, account for much of the increase.

Despite the progress made to date, important work still remains to be done in areas such as feed efficiency; prevention and control diseases and pests; marketing efficiency; and price determination. Thus, the need for continued research is evident.

In these days of high living costs, the phrase "farmers are the consumer's best friend" isn't likely to be greeted with a great deal of enthusiasm.

Yet, it's true, according to Dr. W. E. Black, Extension marketing and policy economist in the Texas A&M University Agricultural Economics and Sociology Department.

Black says a major reason food expenses have gone up is because consumers are demanding and getting a greater variety of higher quality groceries. This in turn has brought on more marketing activity and more processing, packaging and hauling.

Farmers, he added, have responded with more production efficiency and increased interest in product promotion, but have not been rewarded financially in proportion. The fact is that overall farm income is down and has been trending in that direction for some time.

The farmer is indeed the consumer's best friend because he has helped keep food prices from rising higher than they are.

Black said the national marketing food bill has more than doubled in the last 20 years. Here are some reasons:

The volume of food marketing increased by more than one-third because of rising population.

Marketing services have risen by one-half because consumers want more sorting, grading, trimming, packaging, processing and storage, more built-in conveniences, and they are eating more away from home.

Labor costs, which account for about half the total marketing bill, have doubled.

New plant and equipment costs have gone up along with transportation, packaging materials, interest payments, rent and taxes. Corporate profits make up about 6 percent of the marketing bill.

Consumer incomes have increased.

Despite marketing cost increases consumers spend less of their incomes for food than they did years ago, Black emphasized. In fact, disposable income has gone up faster than the price of food. Food costs have risen less in the last 20 years than most other consumer items.

For all items other than food, the cost has gone up 42 percent, transportation up 60 percent, housing 42 percent, rent 52 percent and medical care 86 percent. In comparison, all food (including that served in restaurants) is up about 37 percent.

"All in all, it's a pretty efficient system that gives us better, safer, more attractive food in more ways and seasons for a smaller portion of our income. Just think, many people of the world spend up to half their disposable income for food," Black said.
