THE COUNTRY EDITOR

When Alexander the Great called Diogenes, he found the old Cynic sitting sunning himself. We came near saying, "and smoking his pipe." Too bad that Diogenes didn't know the joys of a good pipe. But with the story, "I'm Alexander the Great," said the man of the hour, "I'll have all the pomposity at my command." "I'm Diogenes the Cynic," replied the man with the lantern, lazily batting his eyes. "What can I do for you?" asked Alexander, with less pomposity. "Get from between me and the sun," replied the Cynic, batting his eyes more lazily than before. And Alexander went away and told his friends, "If I were not Alexander the Great, I would like to be Diogenes the Cynic."

Ask ten successful men what they would like to be if they were not at they are, and the chances are at least five of them will reply: "I like to be the editor of a good country newspaper."

There is much common sense mixed with that answer. Perhaps it is a dog baying for the moon. He didn't know what to do with it if he got it, but that doesn't keep him from wanting it. It takes a peculiar kind of genius to be the editor of a good country newspaper. First, he must be a philosopher and, second, must be as fearless as Richard Roe of Lyon. The country editor asks no quarter. He gives none when it comes to fighting for the right, for common decency and community progress. He is a sensible cuss, too. He knows all about fishing, corn licker, chewing tobacco, the better babies movement, pure law, farming, sociology, political economy, weather, crops, electricity, machinery, science, astronomy, geology, birds, animals, religion, doctrines, etc., etc.

He is the poorest paid, the worst treated and the best loved man in the country. He may not have much in collecting from his subscribers or getting his townsmen to come with a little advertising; but he takes his pay in wading boots, in tobacco and sweet potatoes, in the company of his years and that is more than so many more affluent editors would like to have his place in.

DISCOVERED A NEW SPRING WHEAT

Alonzo J. Trent of Range, Oklahoma, has discovered a new spring wheat that has the promise of becoming generally grown over the entire Panhandle district. Four years ago, Mr. Trent discovered growing in his wheat field, about a dozen stalks of wheat that was very different from anything that he had ever seen. The straw was much heavier, stronger, with heavier foliage, much greener and thrifter. So he watched the growth and development until maturity, then gathered carefully and threshed it out by hand, this seed, was then planted to itself, on well prepared land. This Mr. Trent has continued to do for four years, and this year, he threshed about eight hundred bushels which he is keeping to be used for seed by the farmers of Texas County. There is much interest in the possibilities of this new wheat, and arrangements are being made to start an experiment, covering a period of at least five years, by the P. A. M. C. at Goodwell.—Guyton Herald.

SHORTEST MONTH BRINGS NEW FORD SALES RECORD

With 116,080 Ford Cars sold at retail in February a new record for the shortest month in the year has been established. February sales exceeded those of January by more than 15,000, and marked the eleventh month in which Ford sales have topped the 100,000 line.

This sales record bears out predictions made at the opening of the year that an acute shortage in Ford cars is certain and this shortage is expected to be felt within the next two months with the increased volume of car buying which is always attendant upon the spring months.

Even the high production schedule set at the Ford Motor Company's factory here, which will reach 6,000 cars and trucks a day about April 1, will be unable to meet the apparent demand for Ford products.

Anticipating a great increase in the demand for Ford cars during the present year the factory here laid plans for increased production to the 6,000 car a day schedule and since January first had been constantly speeding up manufacture to reach this figure. Demand so far has been of such great proportions as to absorb nearly all production, and stocks in hand of dealers are at present the lowest they have been in months.

February sales of 116,080 cars were made in the face of unfavorable weather conditions in many sections of the country which tied up freight traffic and prevented many deliveries. This was particularly true throughout the Northwest, the northern tier of states and in New England. In California, too, cold weather during a part of the month had its effect upon car sales. Yet with even these unfavorable conditions, the February sales topped those of January by fifteen per cent and set a new high record for mid-winter selling.

With February the eleventh month in which Ford car sales have gone over the 100,000, the total for this period is close to 1,250,000 cars.

Peak car sales usually are reached during the summer months with drops in the fall and winter. This feature of the automobile absorption by the buying public has been completely changed during the last few months through the activities of the Ford dealer organization which has raised the "peak" line to include every month in the year.

BIG VOTE CAST IN CITY ELECTION

One of the biggest votes ever cast in an election in this city was turned in on Tuesday of this week when Perryton elected new officers to serve for the ensuing two years. Much interest was shown in the contest for Mayor which was won by our present Mayor, C. E. Forbes, who received 146 votes, a majority of 45 over W. B. Lilly. This was a good clean race between two awfully good men, either of whom would have made an excellent Mayor. The Marshall's race was a four cornered affair with Sam Castleberry coming out ahead with a vote of 109. J. B. Nash ran him a close second with 93 votes. John N. Stump led the field of six candidates for Alderman, three to elect. He received the high vote of the election, 198, votes. J. L. Dodson and M. R. Coffee were second and third, respectively, so these three men will with the holdovers, L. S. Hobbs and J. H. Neufeld, compose our next council. A number of votes were cast for City Clerk, the office and the man being written on the ballot. Abe Green received 88 votes for this office and R. D. Dockerty got several votes. This office is filled by appointment and as the election order did not call for a vote on this office, this vote can be considered as nothing more than an expression. A LETTER FROM RALPH APPLE

Bob Cat Creek,
Six miles from La Veta,
Colo.

To the Ochiltree County Herald and Friends:

As we have not had time to write before, we thought we would write a few lines to let everybody know how we were getting along.

We started from Pruner Apple's place on Friday, March 16th, camped first night at the old Hart Store 23 miles southeast of Guyton. Next night we arrived in Guyton just five minutes before the sand storm. Left the next day and camped 24 miles northwest of Elkhart, Kansas, on the Cimmaron River. Next night 36 miles west but still on the flats, just a little sandy land. Next night just at the foot of the Massies Mountains on Carrizo Creek and had bad roads, rough and muddy. On the next night we were back on the flats at Kim. The next day back to the Massy Mountains and camped on Alceek. Next night, camped 6 miles west of Thinchar. Next day we were on good roads and made 31 miles but were caught in a snowstorm and could not get shelter or water. Our next camp was in Ulansburg and the next, tonight, on a little creek called Bob Cat. We have a sick horse, but think we will be able to travel a few miles tomorrow before the roads thaw out. If we have good luck we will spend the night on the top of La Veta Pass. J. H. Norwood gained a pound the first two days and I think that I have done as well each day since. Have nothing to worry about, only getting short on "Old Hillside." Will drop you a few lines again when we reach the San Louis Valley.

COW-SOW-HEN TRAIN HAD LARGE CROWD

The Santa Fe-Texas A. & M. College Demonstration train which was here on Monday evening of this week was greeted by a very large crowd, over 2,000 people passing through the train while it was here. The men in charge of the train pronounced that the meeting here was the best attended and most successful of any night meeting of the entire run.

The train carries a strong staff of lecturers from the A. & M. College and a very compact well selected exhibit of dairy cattle, hogs, and poultry. The exhibit includes a big Holstein bull of national fame, weighing 2,700 pounds, a Holstein Cow with a record of 26,000 pounds of milk and a net income of \$1,000 in one year, a Jersey cow with a record of 10,000 pounds of milk and six hundred pounds of butter in one year, splendid Guernseys and Ayrshire, big hogs and fine chickens and turkeys.

J. D. Tinsley, agricultural agent of the Santa Fe Railway in charge of the program, opened the meeting and called attention to the efficient work the Texas A. & M. College is doing to help the farmers in increasing production.

"The Santa Fe Railway," said Mr. Tinsley, "is glad to be able to bring the College to the farmers' doors by this train. The College brings you a vital message about the cow, the sow and the hen and their place in a well planned farm program. We find that the farmer who milked a few cows, had some hogs, and kept a bunch of chickens came through the depression in much better shape than the farmer who depended for his income from wheat alone."

"We are not asking the farmer to give up any crop which is now growing, but we do ask that he milk cows, grow hogs, and keep chickens at least to the extent of paying the family living expenses."

Geo. P. Grout, head of the Dairy Department of the College urged the importance of improving the farm herd by the use of good dairy sires. The production of milk and butter increased by breeding up the herd may be accomplished quickly. "Raise better cows and your herd will become an important source of income," said Mr. Grout.

D. W. Williams, professor of Animal Husbandry in charge of swine, said the hog is rightly called the "farmer's mortgage lifter," when given half a chance. He furnishes a most satisfactory package in which to market feed, especially grain feed. Ten cars of grain can go to market as hog meat in one car, saving much time and a big freight bill.

E. O. Edson, poultry husbandman of the Extension Service, said that good birds, given proper feed and care will all the farmers egg basket and return a handsome income. The farm flock may be readily improved by the use of good male birds and by culling out the poor layers.

The A. & M. College staff with the train were highly pleased with the warm and interested reception they have had from the people. A number of them are making their first trip over the plains of northwest Texas, and are impressed with the wonderful natural resources. They predict a great future for this part of the state because of the progressive people and signs of progress in evidence on all sides.

When the Demonstration Train reached the Panhandle, a new subject was added to the program—"Safe Wheat Farming in the Southwest" by H. M. Bainer, director of the Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association. Mr. Bainer was formerly agricultural agent of the Santa Fe in this section and is well known all over northwest Texas.

"Profitable wheat growing, the same as any other kind of crop production," said Mr. Bainer, "depends largely on two things—the season and the system. So far as the season is concerned the farmer is helpless, but the system is of his own choosing. What every farmer of the Southwest is interested in, is a system that will insure crops. He wants to be sure of a cash crop like wheat every year, and have feed crops. Both are essential. Any system that will properly combine wheat, feed crops, and livestock will insure success."

"Past experience has proved that a one crop system of farming can not long be continued with profitable results. The wheat farmer who diversifies and produces feed crops on

HOW ABOUT THAT BROOM CORN WAREHOUSE

Well, the time is at hand when we should commence to give serious thought to the matter of the erection of a broom corn warehouse here in Perryton. Without a doubt we will have one of the biggest acreages planted to broom corn this year, that has ever been planted in this section. Suitable means must be provided for taking care of this crop. Many buyers who were here last year said that they would not buy brush subject to delivery at Perryton again until we had a warehouse. They do not like the method of piling it on the ground like was done last year. Broom corn brings many a dollar into our little town and many a dollar in deposits to our banks. Cannot we get together and devise some method of financing the building of such a structure? Let's quit talking about it and roll up our sleeves and get it done.

"FLASHES OF ACTION" WILL BE SEEN HERE

"Flashes of Action" the official moving picture of the World War, will be exhibited for the first time in Perryton at the American Theatre on Monday and Tuesday nights, April 16th and 17th, under the Auspices of Pierce Johnson Post of the American Legion.

The scenes in "Flashes of Action" were taken under fire by photographers of the United States Signal Corps, who were with the troops from the training camps to the trenches. The film is five reels in length and includes the best of the millions of feet of film ground out by the army camera men during the war. Nearly every Division is shown.

"Flashes of Action" has attracted capacity crowds in all the large cities. Following a record-breaking attendance in New York, the owner of a syndicate of theatres said, "the popularity of this film convinces me that we are now far enough away from the World War to sit down and coolly see what modern warfare is."

Legionaires who have seen the picture say: "Don't miss 'Flashes of Action'—you will see yourself, perhaps, or your son, your brother or your neighbor's son go over the top."

In addition to the feature picture two reels of Charlie Chaplin's comedies will be shown at each show. 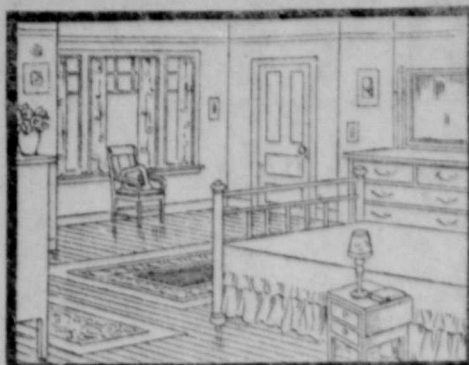

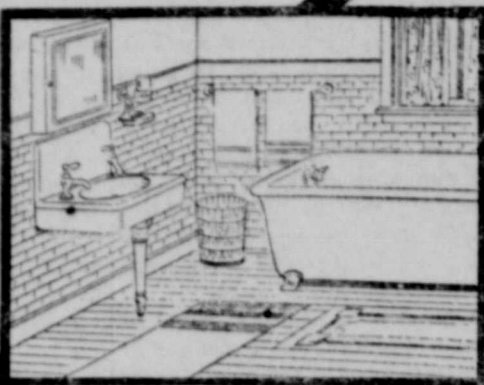

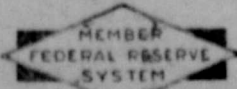

A LETTER

As a continuous resident of the States of Texas and Oklahoma for the past twenty years, as a farmer, stockman and veterinarian, I am much interested in the several articles that have appeared on subjects that are vital to the well being of our rural population and the country at large. That is, making a success of our business as farmers and stock raisers. There is where we all get our money, as we have no other industries at all; therefore it is most important to think and act for the welfare of the people who produce the crops that so many share and have to depend on.

In my estimation, our county is the best place for a man, who will take advantage of the undeveloped or idle land to accumulate property. That is why I am here.

I heartily endorse Mr. Rogers article. If our county farmers will follow out his idea for five years he will have to go east to loan money instead of borrow it for people here.

However, I can't agree with those who brought up the need of a County Agent, as the several I have known were an injury to the county and an unnecessary expense. A farmer can get any information on any subject he wants by asking for government bulletins at Washington, where he gets it correct free promptly and not influenced by vaccine peddlers and farm loan companies, as most county agents are. The spread of cheap farm journals has had a bad effect in the last few years and very little benefit to us, appears among the many advertisements and selling and political propaganda. Too much salesmanship.

The farmer is the only business man that doesn't set his selling price on his products and the six million farmers in the United States raise the food for themselves and the other 120 million people. Ours is the only nation on the globe that could live independently of other nations without seriously altering her way of living. Ochiltree County has and can raise her own food and feed and there are some old timers left who can get along without the packing house products and cook and keep warm without the high priced fuel.

What we need is the realization of the fact that we have farming conditions to meet here as they are for we can't change them or the climate. Remember we are not bothered with disease among our farm animals, and our losses are due to improper feeding and neglect. Also that we have many good crops to choose from and that we can lose one crop and then have time for another. We shouldn't expect a big paying wheat, maize, kaffir, barley, broom corn, calf, chicken, pig, lamb or colt crop every year. No country has that. Just keep plenty when you once get a surplus, so as to be sure you can take care of your stock if a short crop should follow.

I also think we should organize a county fair association and celebrate the birth of our county seat town with a county show.

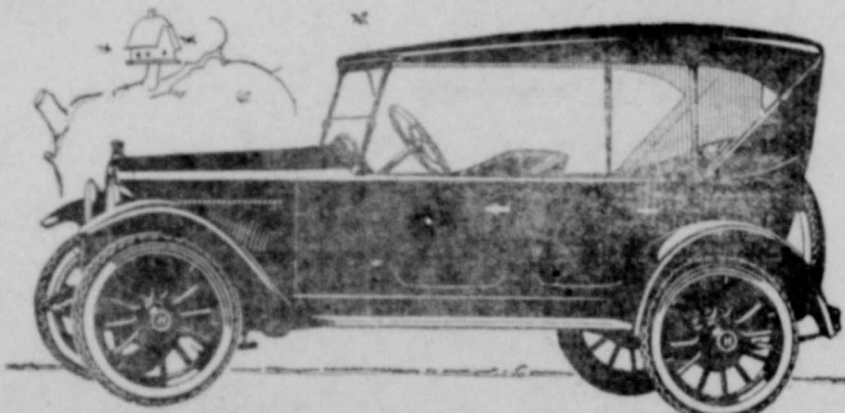
