Sugar — Stamp No. 12 in Book 1 good for 5 lbs. from March 16 until midnight May 31, 1943.

Coffee — Stamp No. 23 in Book 1 good for 1 lb. coffee from April 26 through May 30.

Red Stamps — "E" became valid April 25, "F" valid May 2, "G" valid May 9, "H" valid May 16, "J" valid May 23; all good until May 31. Unused A, B, C or D stamps good thru April 30.

Processed foods — Blue D, E & F stamps (48 points) in War Ration Book 2 good for purchase of rationed processed foods until midnight April 30 (Friday). G, H, J became valid April 24 and are good until May 31.

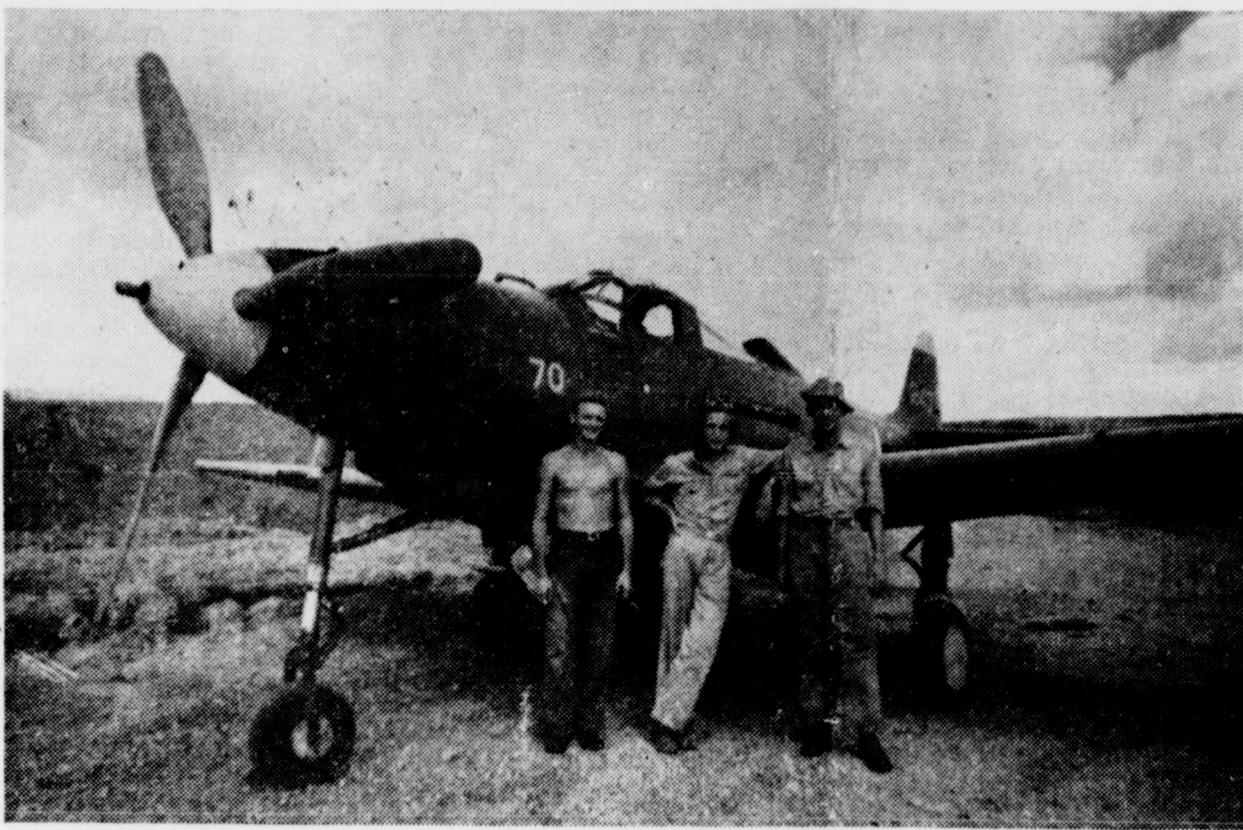

A chance meeting in Africa recently reunited two Abernathy brothers, sons of Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Webb. Cpl. Jno. W. Webb, pictured above, has been in the African campaign 8 or 9 months, and his brother, S/Sgt. J. H. Webb, arrived at that front last month.

Here is a paragraph from J. H.'s letter telling his parents about the meeting:

"I saw Johnny yesterday. He was sort of surprised to see me, but he recognized me right off. I spent about half a day with him and it did him a lot of good. He is the same old guy he used to be, same as the rest of the boys."

Cpl. Jno. W. enlisted in the army Jan. 23, 1941, and served nearly 10 months in the Cavalry at Ft. Bliss, Ft. Brown and Ft. Ringgold before receiving a discharge Nov. 17 under the age regulation.

He re-enlisted Dec. 27, 1941, in the army air corps and received training at Sheppard Field, Tex., and Brookley Field, Ala., and in New York City. He is an aviation mechanic.

Point values of all canned and bottled soups have been reduced by the OPA from 8 to 6 points, with a cut of 4 points for tomato soup. WAR BOND QUIZ

Q. What kind of Bonds are War Savings Bonds?

A. They are appreciation Bonds, that is, they are sold on a discount basis. After issue, they increase in value, reaching their full value in 10 years. The increase in value, which you receive when you redeem the Bonds, is the interest on your investment.

Q. How long will War Savings Bonds and Stamps be on sale?

A. No time limit has been set. The sale will continue until it is stopped at the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury.

Q. Can children purchase War Savings Stamps and Bonds?

A. Yes. Millions of children are buying them regularly as their share in the national savings program.

Q. Will the Government accept a personal check in payment for a Bond?

A. Yes; subject to collection.

Q. If both owners of a War Savings Bond die before the Bond is presented for redemption, who gets the money?

A. The estate of the co-owner whose death took place last.

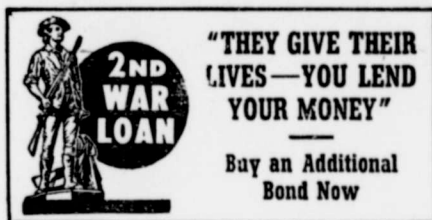

S.P.A.F.S. NEWS

Lieut. Col. Frederick W. Franke, quartermaster officer at South Plains Army Flying school, has been named coordinator of salvage for a 15-county West Texas area, it was announced last week.

Tentative plans will include a mobile unit of several trucks and accompanying personnel to make a complete coverage of the area, gathering all metal which can be donated. The trucks will canvass the area thoroughly with each farm and home being visited, Lieut. Col. Franke said.

After scrap is collected it will be shipped to central points from the nearest railroad station, according to present plans.

Officers and enlisted men of S.P.A.F.S. are welding sticks and clubs in weekly rabbit drives to save crops from damage by the hungry bunnies. The first drive yielded only one rabbit, but in the next hunt, 19 were killed. To make it more interesting for the men, the army officials have offered three-day passes to all men getting rabbits if the passes do not interfere with training or flying routine.

NO LIMIT ON RECAPING

After May 1, there will be no restrictions on the number of certificates that may be issued for recapping truck tires. Because recapping takes only one-sixth as much crude rubber as a new tire, the OPA has removed quota restrictions so that the tires will not be driven beyond the recapping point.
