TEXAN SAYS LEON HAS TOO MUCH POWER

WASHINGTON, July 23. — Chairman Andrew May of the house military affairs committee said today that after hearing secret testimony furnished by Chief of Staff Marshall, he was convinced that the international situation is "more serious than the general public understands and is rapidly getting worse."

With this information before them, Chairman May said the committee had quickly approved the request to keep selectees in the army for more than one year.

Navy Secretary Frank Knox said: "There is little doubt but what Japan will move immediately into the Far East."

Senator Tom Connally charged that Price Control Administrator Leon Henderson is a "dangerous figure" because of his power to fix prices.

NAZIS ADMIT BETTY SLICKER. SLOWDOWN OF ROSE ANN WOOD MOSCOW DRIVE GIVE PROGRAM

BERLIN, July 23. — Nazi sources tonight said that German advances toward Lenin and Moscow have "somewhat slowed down," due to the terrific battles around Novograd and Smolensk.

"When our forces swept beyond Smolensk," the Nazi spokesman said, "very large Russian forces were left in the rear. These are now harassing our further advance."

The same news source also stated that Russia is throwing enormous reserves into the battle.

The German high command last week claimed the Soviet had already thrown "its last reserves" into battle.

ORANGE BOOMS AS SHIPYARD GET CONTRACT

ORANGE, July 23. — The mass laying of keels for 10 wooden motor minesweepers for the navy yesterday started national defense production at the Weaver shipyards.

Amid steam and air whistles, a ceremony inaugurated this new phase of the shipbuilding program which has made Orange a teeming defense construction center twice its normal population.

The minesweeper contract of \$3,340,000 was awarded in March when clearing of a site for the ways began. The contract calls for the minesweepers to be completed in a year.

HOW MUCH IS FRANCHISE OF \$52,000,000? WTU EXTENDED ASK OFFICIALS FOR 39 YEARS

AUSTIN, July 23. — It's strictly unofficial, but the comptroller's office today saw the possibility of a \$52,000,000 deficit in the state's general fund at the end of the next biennium.

Figures based on a preliminary study of the legislature's appropriations for the next two years and on estimated revenue indicated the fund out of which much of the state's general operations is financed would be \$22,000,000 deeper in the red than it now is.

Revised figures will be prepared for the automatic tax board which will meet soon to determine the state property tax for this year.

The general fund is now unbalanced by more than \$30,000,000 on the debit side.

Penalizing Marriage

(New York Times)

Though congressional leaders admit that there has been much opposition to the proposal to require joint returns of married persons "living together," it is by no means certain that this provision will be removed from the final bill. The more the proposal is examined, however, the more unjust and antisocial its effects are seen to be.

As has been repeatedly pointed out, the provision penalizes marriage and penalizes married couples for "living together." Even a husband with a \$2,500 and a wife with a \$2,000 income pay more heavily under the compulsory joint return. To determine how much of the added tax is chargeable to each income must be a matter of more or less arbitrary adjustment and compromise between husband and wife. There is no one precise and indisputable method of prorating the added burden. There is no precise way of determining, either, which of the joint taxpayers is responsible for frauds or errors or how to prorate penalties for these.

If the government's excuse for the joint tax return is merely that "we need the money," then the same principle could just as well be applied to whole families, by forcing grown sons and daughters with jobs to add their incomes to the family total so as to force that total into the higher-rate income tax brackets. If the argument is that living together and wife cut expenses by living together, then on the same principle any two or more people sharing the same room or apartment, related or not, could be forced to add their incomes together when paying income tax.

It has been said that the motivating force behind the joint tax proposal is to get around the community property laws in some of the states. But as these exist in only eight states, there should certainly be a less sweeping way of dealing with the matter than by punishing the married couples of the forty other states. It is clearly unfair to add to the husband's taxable income that which does not belong to him.

Congressional leaders ask, if we drop this joint tax device, what shall we put in its place? There are various possible substitutes, including a higher scale of income tax rates, or a broadening of the base. It must always be kept in mind that the income tax depends for its success as a revenue-raising measure upon the active co-operation of the taxpayer. That active co-operation is imperiled if the taxpayer is made to feel that the government has knowingly or cynically resorted to devices that are unfair.

Wool Production

(San Antonio Express)

For many years past, Texas has led the states in wool production, as to both quantity and quality of fleeces. For example, in 1940 this state's 10,000,000 sheep yielded some 80,000,000 pounds of wool, that brought the growers \$23,500,000. That mark—an all-time high record—doubtless will be greatly surpassed in 1941. Encouraged by the increasing wartime demand and raising prices, and also responding to pleas by the Office of Production Management, Texas sheepmen have augmented their wool-bearing flocks. They have improved the ranges and given the sheep—mostly the finer breeds—scientific care, so as to increase wool production as much as practicable.

Chile's First Paper Founded by Henriques

FOUNDER of Chile's first newspaper in 1813 was Camilo Henriques. He called it "La Aurora," which means "The Sunrise," and from his pen poured writings which helped fanned the forces of rebellion, gain Chilean freedom.

The 40th anniversary of the founding of Santiago, Chile, was commemorated in 1941 by a series of stamps including the issue above showing Henriques seated with a newspaper in hand.

Spain invaded Chile in 1535. The Spanish found the Araucanians, chief Indian tribe, harder to subdue than the Incas. Spain did not gain control of the entire country until 1773.

Napoleon's invasion of Spain gave Chile its chance for independence. The Spanish governor was forced to resign in 1810. After eight years of struggle, in which Argentina aided the patriots, independence was proclaimed in 1818.

Henriques, who was priest and author as well as journalist, was forced to flee to Argentina during the revolt. He lived there eight years, returned to Chile in 1822 to found another paper. He died May 16, 1824, at the age of 54.

Story of War Department Moving Day Is Indeed a Moving Account of Capital Life

WASHINGTON—Your government is now moving into another new white limestone palace building in Washington—a little \$10 million job that is naturally the last word in office buildings. When functioning normally and without benefit of war hysteria, your Uncle Sam doesn't build things on any other basis than the last word and it is the aggregate of all these last word buildings which makes Washington the city it is and gives you the pride you have in your nation's capital whenever you visit it.

This new building has "War Department" over the door but don't let that deceive you. It won't even begin to house the Army's office here and it is really only a third of a building. The War Department originally asked for \$26 million to complete the job, but having filed the request in one of those psychological moments when congressmen were feeling a little economical, the good solons said, no, they couldn't have the whole \$26 millions, but here were \$10 millions to build one wing, and we'll see about the rest later.

Consequently, it's this one wing—this mere shack, this lean-to, this dinky little H-shaped seven-story, air-conditioned quarter-million square foot addition, capable of holding only 2500 employees—that is nearing completion. The government has title to two city blocks back of this wing where the other two-thirds of the building will go eventually.

This new wing will be the roof over the heads of only two or three departments of the War Department, and maybe they won't be able to get all of them into it. Tentatively, Assistant Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson and his staff will occupy two floors, and the chief of engineers, Major-General Schley, and his staff will occupy three, leaving two floors unassigned.

RIGHT now the building is in that mad state of confusion that characterizes moving day wherever you find it. The building isn't completed, but such is the demand for office space in Washington that they're moving in anyhow. That happens regularly in Washington. Offices for top men have what looks like beautifully grained wood panel walls and oak floors which will probably be covered with executive green carpets of the kind that should be walked on reverently, and only in the bare feet if you're not ticklish. Offices for the help have rubber-like floors. Much of the furniture is of the new metal design, but some of the old wood desks look like something the engineers threw together in a hurry for a crossing of the Rappahannock. The splinters probably snag the red tape pretty badly.

This new War Department wing is just around the corner from the old Munitions building where Secretary Stimson will continue to hang his hat, and is right next door to the apartment house which was taken over as headquarters for Selective Service.

The new building has, incidentally, enough bronze window frames and enough bronze stair rails and elevator trim to make all the installations on a flock of battlewagons, but this building, you must remember, was designed well along before the word "priorities" came to mean what it does today.

W. Mancill, A. A. Michaelson, Jesse R. Stephenson and Leon Cagle. For Mayor—J. M. Williamson, 446. For Commissioner—two vacancies to be filled—L. H. McCrea, 290; Criegler Paschall, 343; F. J. Huey, 286.

Only 540 votes were cast in Saturday's election for the naming of four school trustees. J. T. Berry received the highest vote, with Dr. C. C. Jones as second high man. J. T. Berry, C. C. Jones, William Reagan and Dr. E. L. Graham were elected. The vote was as follows: J. T. Berry, 484; C. C. Jones, 439; William Reagan, 382; E. L. Graham, 325; R. A. Richardson, 183; E. J. 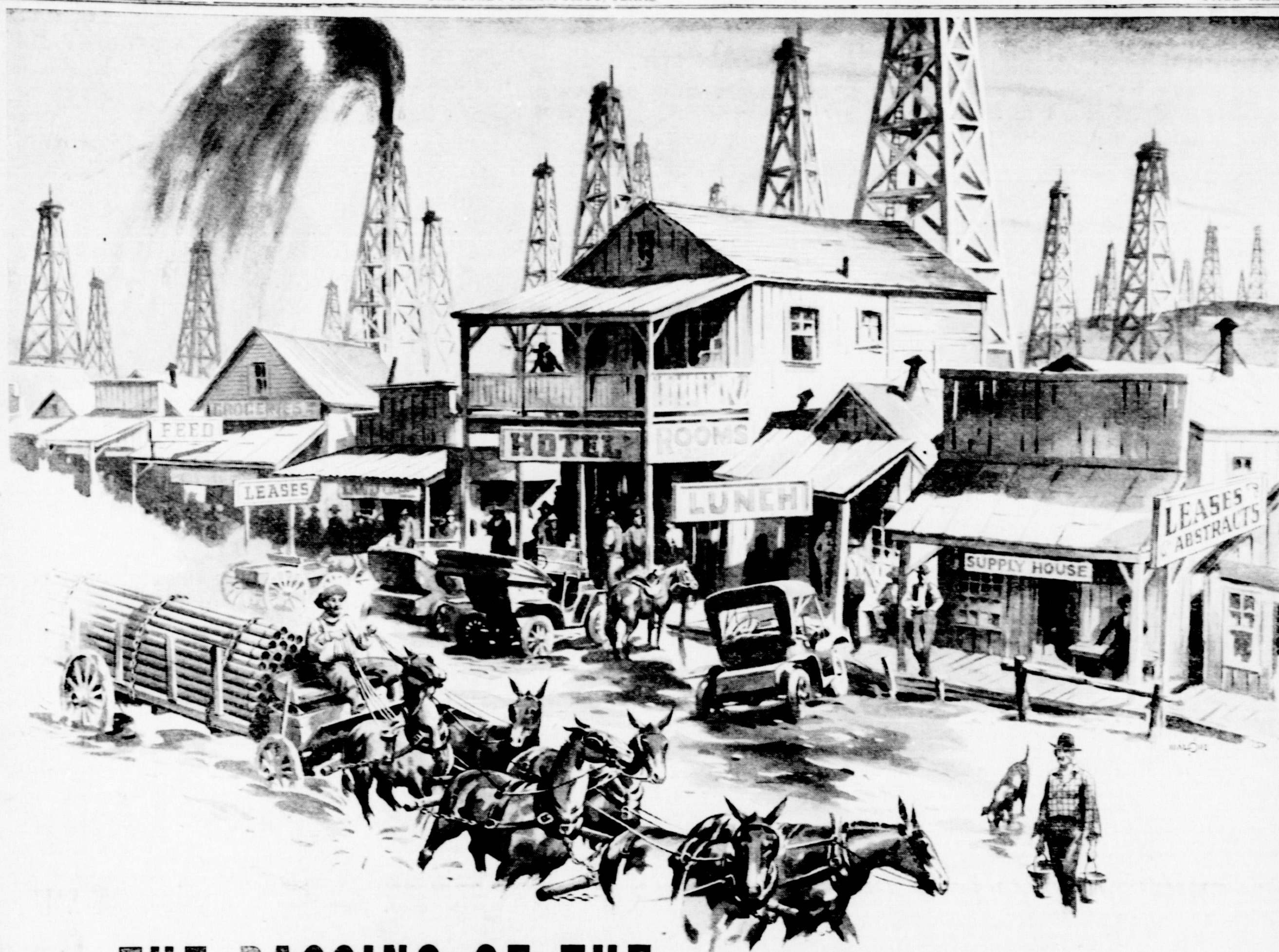

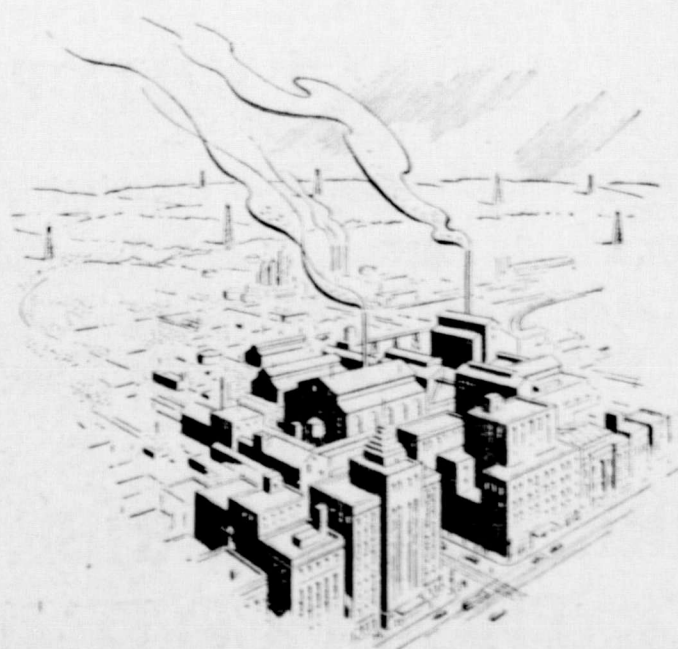

BOYS ROB O'DANIEL STOREHOUSE OF ARTICLES VALUED ONLY FROM SENTIMENTAL ANGLE; 6 JAILED

FORT WORTH, July 23.—Gov. and Mrs. W. Lee O'Daniel, in Fort Worth Tuesday, made a 23-year "sentimental journey" that reached far beyond the walls of their old brick storehouse at 305 East Broadway.

Strewn over the floor of the building, looted last week by youthful vandals, were precious reminders of incidents that occurred during their 21 years of married life, before they moved into the governor's mansion.

There was a 1917 model "Edison" phonograph, O'Daniel's first Christmas present to his wife, Bubbles and Rosemary, Molly's two favorite dolls; a sled, which belonged to Pat, Mike and Molly when they were children, and countless other keepsakes.

Comfortably Attired

In shirt sleeves, his collar unbuttoned, the governor and senator-elect assisted Mrs. O'Daniel as she made up a list of articles remaining in the storehouse. The list will be used in an effort to determine how many things stolen have not been recovered by police.

"It isn't so much the monetary value of the things," Governor O'Daniel said, "but their sentimental value."

Molly, who was visiting Tuesday morning at the home of Miss Mary Katherine Elliott, 2124 Pembroke drive, made a hurried trip to the storehouse to see if her dolls were damaged.

When she discovered that Rosemary had been in a picture, she gasped. "Poor Rosemary, she didn't even have on a dress. She looks simply awful."

Eyes On Aluminum

Molly explained that she kept the two dolls when she gave about 20 others to an orphan home before moving to Austin.

"I wouldn't take anything in the world for them," she said.

As he and Mrs. O'Daniel rummaged through the contents of the storehouse, O'Daniel was keeping in mind the aluminum collection drive for national defense. He said that anything that would be of any use would be contributed.

In commenting on the articles listed as recovered from the youths, O'Daniel explained that the article listed as a "cocktail spoon" was a salad spoon. And the "six decks of playing cards" must have "belonged to" the boys.

Two vacuum sweepers, missing from the storehouse, have not been

recovered, O'Daniel said. He doesn't know as yet how many things will fall into this classification.

Hasn't Decided On Band

The governor, too occupied with his own thoughts as he collected the keepsakes to discuss his plans for the future at any great length, did say, however, that he probably will go to Washington during the early part of next month.

He hasn't yet decided, he said, whether he will take his band and make a "musical" entrance.

He and Mrs. O'Daniel expect to return to Austin Tuesday night and Molly will go to Mineral Wells to visit Pat, who is in Camp Wolters.

Judge Power of 96th district court, meanwhile, announced trial of six boys, charged with delinquency in connection with the burglary, will be held at 9 a. m. Thursday.

The boys under arrest range in age from 13 to 16. They are Jimmy Corbin, John Edward Eaves, Sammy Fields, Eugene Riley, Ross Riley and Glenn Jones. The last named was released on bond.

Crawled Up Pipe

Eaves and Corbin told how they crawled up a drain pipe and went into a window over the storeroom. They took the goods and sold most of it and wouldn't have been caught, they said, "if that guy's dad hadn't squealed." The "guy" is a 19-year-old accomplice, a former inmate of an asylum, who, the district attorney's office said, probably will be tried on a lunacy count.

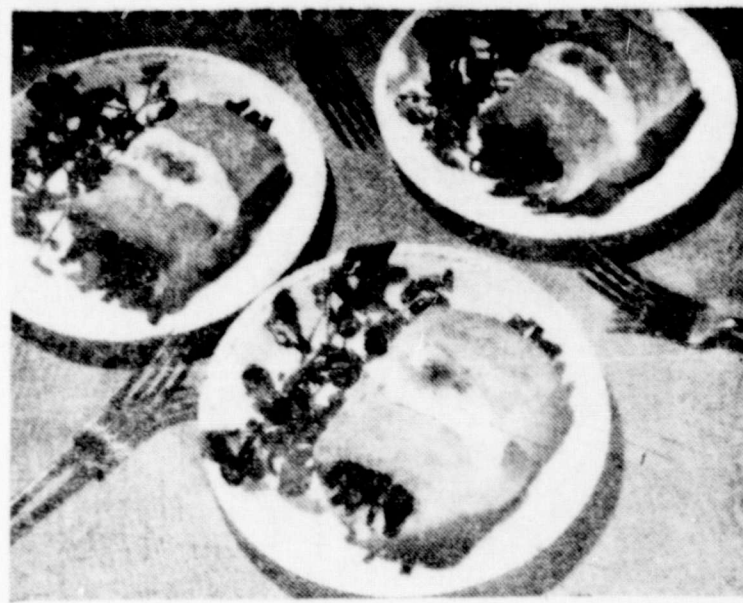
Detectives had said they learned of the burglary and theft when the father of one of the boys found a pillow case at his home with the name "W. Lee O'Daniel" on it.

It was in this warehouse that O'Daniel published his own newspaper during his campaigns for governor and United States senator. Mrs. O'Daniel Monday sold much of the furniture on hand there, which she had planned to do for some time.

The burglary was discovered Saturday afternoon and the suspects were arrested Sunday. County juvenile officers took charge of them Monday.

Meanwhile Tuesday, as the boys awaited trial, a second-hand dealer who had purchased some of the loot also waited to be tried in cooperation court on a charge of violating a city ordinance requiring

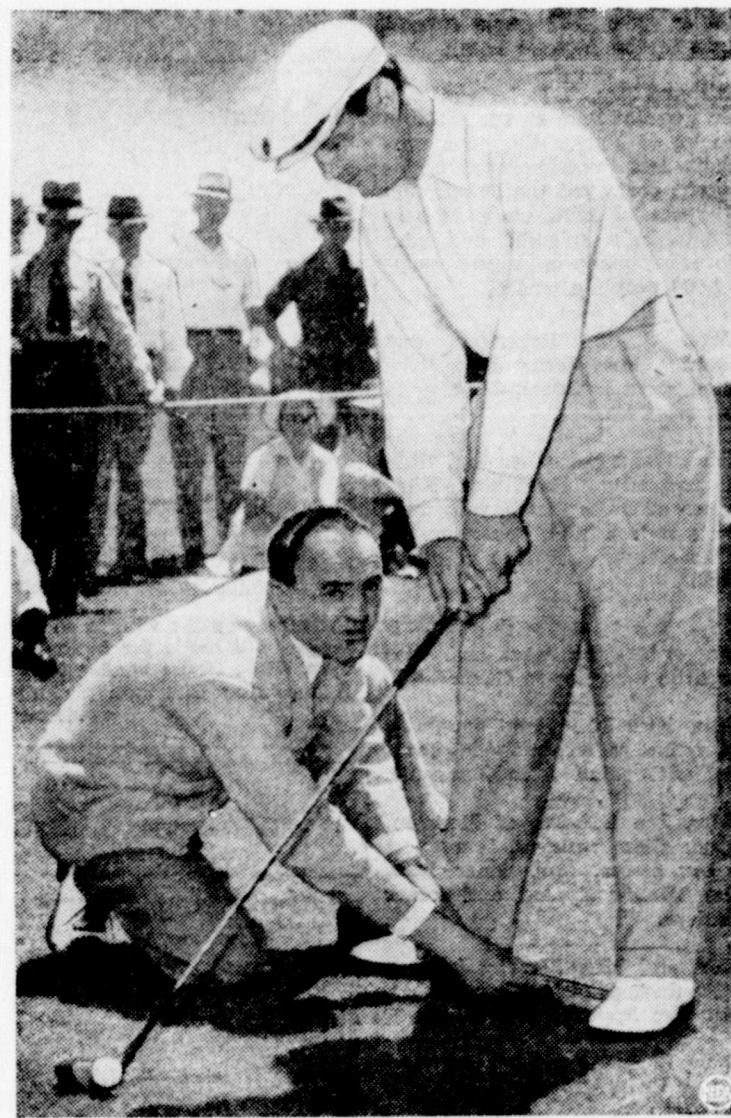

WILLKIE CRITICISM OF PROPOSED HOUSE BILL HAS BEEN TAKEN UP BY WOMEN LEADERS OF NATION

WASHINGTON, July 23. —
Quite a hubbub has been de-
veloped here and in other parts
of the country since Wendell Wil-
kie made the statement that the
house proposal to require hus-
bands and wives to file joint in-
come tax returns would set wom-
en back 500 years in their prog-
ress toward freedom.

Mr. Willkie's summing up may
be debatable, but at least it has
certainly focused attention on one
of the most controversial sections
of the new tax bill congress is to
consider this summer and fall.

The provision that married
couples must hereafter file joint
returns was inserted in the bill by
the tax subcommittee of the House
Ways and Means committee to
bring in \$323,000,000 more in
taxes than will be paid if joint
returns are not required.

Latest internal revenue reports
show that approximately 150,000
husbands and wives or about 2½
per cent of those filing returns,
choose to make them separately
rather than jointly.

Economic and Ethical
With most the reason is eco-
nomic; with a few, ethical.
If both husband and wife earn
money and pool it for tax pur-
poses, the tax sometimes runs in-
to higher brackets and bigger
sums than if they make separate
returns.

Suppose a man makes \$10,000
a year. His wife, through her
own effort, makes another \$10-
000. On a separate return basis,
they would pay \$1,540 on their
1941 earnings. With the propo-
sed joint return, they would pay

\$4,356 on their 1942 salaries; \$3-
190 if Congress allows them to
file separately.

Protests on the proposed joint
return provision have come from
many sources. Clergymen are
writing in to predict it will break
up or delay marriages. Femin-
ists say it is no more fair to re-
quire joint returns from husband
and wife than from brother and
sister.

Economic and moral factors in
the case are being confused in
many of the protests. In some,
opposition to paying heavier taxes
is being cloaked under feigned
solicitude for the rights of mar-
ried women workers. Yet the
feminist has a point.

Mrs. Harvey W. Wiley, Chair-
man of the National Woman's
Party, has written a letter to the
Chairman of the Ways and Means
Committee describing the pro-
vision as "accentuating the common
law concept of the wife as her
husband's chattels," and jeopar-
dizing women's independent and
equal status as American citizens.
Since the World War Congress
has advanced the position of
American women, through the
Suffrage Law granting them the
right to vote, the Nationality Law
allowing them to retain their citi-
zenship though married to a for-
eigner and the Wages and Hours
Law assuring them equal wages
and conditions of law in inter-
state commerce. To curb her
freedom as independent agent re-
quired to pool her resources with
her husband, in the name of de-
fense, would be a "retrogressive

and reactionary step," Mrs. Wiley
told the committee.

Community Property
Especially aroused over the joint
tax return plan are couples in
"community property" States,
45,000 of whom now file separate
returns even though all the in-
come is earned by the husband.

Community property laws,
handed down from the old Span-
ish or Mexican law, still stand on
the statute books of Arizona, Cal-
ifornia, Idaho, Louisiana, Nevada,
New Mexico, Texas and Wash-
ington.

Instead of giving a married wo-
man outright control of all her
earnings, the community prop-
erty system automatically desig-
nates property acquired after
marriage as community property.
The wife is automatically given
title to one-half, but the hus-
band has sole management and
control rights.

Filing half their income under
their name and half under their
wives has enabled thousands of
taxpayers in community property
states to avoid high surtaxes. Use
of the two-income system has
been especially popular in Holly-
wood. Nearly half of the com-
munity property returns are now
filed in the State of California.

If the compulsory joint return
clause stands, the community
property law will become practi-
cally a dead letter on State statute
books, since its actual operation
within States is now carefully
safeguarded in behalf of the wife
and the once overbearing husband
now has little authority not shared
in by his wife.

Ironically enough, the Nation's
feminists have always fought
community property laws as un-
American and old-fashioned. Now
they are lined up together to fight
the "tax on marriage and equal-
ity."

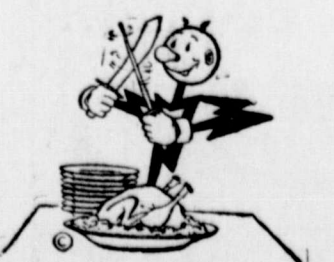

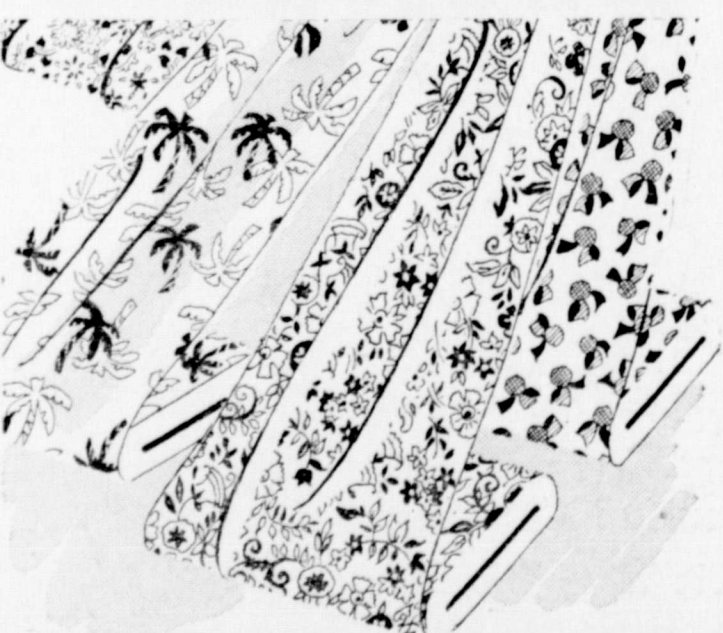
