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Major decisions near on building Post Lake

time is drawing near whether or not to build the proposed 56,000-acre Post Lake, six miles west of here on US-380, about a quarter of a mile from the highway on the south side of the lake. The decisions — and at least one of them remain — will be made here. The lake will come in late May and voters go to the polls to vote yes or no to finance a group of municipal improvements, including \$9,200,000 for the start of a Lubbock water development system which would include purchase of water from the proposed Post lake.

The second will come at the proposed site for a bigger Justiceburg Lake. Engineers have not been able to get an adequate water sample of the runoff water down the watershed to determine the quality of Justiceburg water.

There were two "ifs" at Justiceburg, but now only the water quality and quantity one remains.

The other was whether or not the soil texture at the site was such that the dam could be built without

danger of it breaking away at the points of being tied into the canyon walls due to the nature of the soil.

Al O'Brien, White River water district manager, told The Dispatch Tuesday after checking with the Fort Worth engineering firm of Freese and Nichols who are doing the dam survey work that the engineers have determined that dam construction at the site will be no problem.

Heavy spring rains are needed in the Brazos watershed to provide the Justiceburg water sample needed, but it should become available at least by June.

O'Brien pointed out that there are lots of things which can be done these days to improve water

quality and actually the Justiceburg site is about the only available watershed left for Lubbock.

Readers should remember that the Post Lake, if built, will be built by the White River Water District, financed on revenue bonds with the revenue coming from sale of water to Lubbock.

Lubbock would be required to build a pipeline to Post and a filtration plant on the south side of Lubbock to take the water.

This pipeline then would be extended on to Justiceburg and the same delivery system between Post and Lubbock used to deliver Justiceburg Lake water when it became available, probably around 1990.

Unless the Justiceburg

Lake project is feasible Lubbock does not propose to build a pipeline to the Post Lake, but seek a larger water source elsewhere.

The Lubbock city council was told last Thursday that inflation has upped the cost of the Justiceburg-Post water supply system for Lubbock from \$41.4 million to 1971 to what is estimated (See Post lake, Page 12)

Don't count on it yet

The 'Post lake project' is beginning to move again. But don't get excited, or your hopes too high. It's still got a long way to go.

But it sure is great to hear that the Lubbock city council is preparing to put the matter before the voters as the main ingredient of a \$26.4 million bond issue in late May.

First, of course, that bond issue has to pass before anything gets off the ground.

Lubbock isn't out of water, or anywhere near that predicament right now. They are far from a water crisis so it is hard to tell, especially from this distance, how a costly 'in the future' water bond issue will go.

Very conceivably they may have to make several runs at it.

Another factor is that engineers still don't have a good enough water sample at the proposed Justiceburg site to know whether that site is feasible or not.

If Justiceburg isn't feasible, Lubbock planners already have indicated they won't build a water line to Post just to get water from a much smaller Post lake.

So basically, the Post lake still hinges on a favorable Justiceburg site decision — not yet made — and the decision of Lubbock voters to buy a good water future which is getting more and more expensive by the year.

Our best guess is that in the end the whole thing will work out, though it will take

longer than most people would want.

The White River Water District controls the Post lake site and unless negotiations change would build the lake and operate it and sell the water to Lubbock. With White River control, Post will have a real voice at the control level.

Of course what matters most around here is to have a handy recreational lake.

If you don't remember all the details we've had in The Dispatch before, Post would continue to drink White River water because it will taste considerably better than Post lake water which would be much more gippy.

Funds to build the Post lake would be borrowed from the state — and that could be another problem if funds are short — on a revenue bond basis with no taxes involved to the four member towns.

What has kept the lake from becoming reality in the last several years is the fact that none of the White River towns want any return of water taxes. The four towns have paid their 'dues'. They built early when costs were far lower than today.

It looks like the long wait for Lubbock to come to grips with its water problem is about over. And because of that it may not be too many years before Post can add a recreational lake to the quality of its life.

But don't count on it yet.

Good luck, dramatists!

We think Americans can

President Jimmy Carter is ready to face America's growing energy problem. We hope the nation and its people are ready to face it with him.

For the last couple of years, The Dispatch has raised its very small voice for a national energy policy. We believe almost any positive energy policy is a whole lot better than not having any energy policy.

This newspaper is pleased that President Carter is willing to tackle a problem he knows is going to cause him all kinds of headaches and unpopularity because he realizes that the problem demands attention.

Up to now politicians have shied away from energy stands because solutions — especially conservation of energy — will be unpopular, expensive and probably inflationary.

We believe people generally are more ready to face the energy problem than the politicians.

The most difficult aspect of the complicated energy problem is in trying to be fair to all segments of the economy and not to give one the advantage over another.

Here in Texas we are oil and gas

oriented. We fight against price controls on these fuels because of the economic impact it has in this state, in Garza County, and in Post.

Whatever the total energy program we want to see oil and gas get at least a fair break because it means so much to our pocketbooks and bank accounts. We would prefer to get more than that.

But we must recognize if every segment of our society fights selfishly for its special interest it will be difficult indeed to develop a broad overall policy.

Our energy problem must be faced. The "pols" as politicians are called can expect most difficult days ahead.

We believe it is essential that America agrees through its democratic process on the best energy policy for this nation and then unite behind it.

There are those who have wondered if the American people can accept and live in a democratic society of energy scarcity. We think the big majority can.

The problem up to now has been getting the nation's leaders to face up the energy crisis, not the people.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Debate raged before two legislative committees on familiar issues last week — horse racing and equal rights for women.

Horse race wagering advocates lost another bet in the House Intergovernmental Affairs Committee. Their bill to legalize betting at licensed tracks on a local option basis wound up in an unfriendly subcommittee for an expected minimum delay of about three weeks.

Even sponsors conceded a miracle will be needed to get the bill out of House committee — and it remains nowhere in the Senate, with adjournment deadline (May 30) closing in.

A resolution seeking recall of Texas legislative ratification of the federal Equal Rights Amendment got cold treatment after a warm hearing in the House Constitutional Amendments Committee.

Nearly 1,000 — one of the largest crowds to turn out for a 65th legislature committee hearing — attended the three and a half hour debate between proponents and foes of ERA.

When it was over, the resolution was packed off to subcommittee by a vote of 5-3.

Racing advocates claimed track betting would bring more revenue, more tourists and more jobs.

Opponents argued betting penalizes the poor, encourages off track gambling and leads to more law enforcement problems.

Anti-ERA spokesmen expressed fear of subjecting women to the draft, invalidation of laws protecting the fair sex, unisex restrooms and legalized homosexual marriages if the federal amendment is finally ratified by a sufficient number of states.

Rate Rehearing Asked Insurance companies are seeking a rehearing of a State Insurance Board decision to lower property coverage rates 2.8 per cent effective July 1.

Texas Insurance Advisory Association filed the motion. The association claimed there is no evidence to support rates announced by the board March 25.

The association had recommended a 6.6 per cent increase in property policy rates. The board staff proposed a 1.7 per cent increase, but the board ordered a decrease relying on a rating formula utilizing actual company expenses rather than board estimates of expenses.

Primary Trouble Presidential preference primary legislation ran into trouble in the Senate after a lengthy delay in the House.

Sponsors indicated they were "optimistically pessimistic." The Senate State Affairs Committee detoured the Senate version of the legislation to continue the primary in 1980 and thereafter to subcommittee.

A House subcommittee, meanwhile, came up with a compromise version.

Texas nominated delegates to national presidential nominating conventions by primaries for the first time in 1976 under a 1975 law which expired by its own terms.

Tax Stalled A five cent tax on refinery input got a thorough explanation and plenty of opposition before the House Ways and Means Committee.

Oil industry spokesmen, refiners, chemical companies, chambers of commerce and organized labor united against the proposal.

After a five-hour hearing, the bill ended up in a subcommittee.

Ag Opinions Political subdivisions can enact land use regulations to comply with the Na-

tional Flood Insurance Program, but the rules have no application outside areas designated by the Flood Insurance Administrator, Atty. Gen. John Hill said.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: A private investigator's report on a police chief candidate for the Midland City Council is exempt from the open records act.

A county may provide ambulance service but doesn't have to.

Non-lawyers can represent parties before the State Board of Insurance and the Industrial Accident Board.

A bill authorizing Railroad Commission review of proposed price redetermination for natural gas probably could be constitutionally drawn.

Powers conferred on Texas Employment Commission (such as hiring of administrators) must be exercised as a body by majority vote. Powers conferred on the impartial commissioner as executive director do not affect his authority as a TEC member.

Insurance board examination reports on Blue Cross are public records.

Courts Speak The Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a 5,000 year prison sentence assessed a Waco man for stabbing his great aunt to death four years ago.

The court found sufficient evidence the defendant was sane at the time of the crime. A doctor testified the man was faking mental illness.

A Lubbock man appealing for a lower bond on a burglary charge (a \$100,000 bond had been set) won a dismissal of prosecution, when the Court of Criminal Appeals found the five-year statute of limitations had run out.

Short Snorts Texans subjected to illegal wiretapping and health care personnel fired for refusing to perform abortions could sue for damages under bills passed by the Senate.

Former State Rep. Elmer Tarbox of Lubbock was honored by the legislature in special ceremonies. Tarbox volunteered as a "human guinea pig" to aid Parkinson disease research.

State Sen. Betty Andujar will attract top state Republican figures here May 7 for governor-for-a-day ceremonies.

Texas ranks fourth among the states in prime defense contracts.

\$10,000 grant for area aid in housing

Governor Dolph Briscoe has announced the awarding of a \$10,000 contract to the South Plains Community Action Association to begin housing management and development in seven rural counties. The contract is through the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) and will operate in Cochran, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry, and Yoakum counties.

During an initial six month contract period the South Plains Association will attempt to raise enough money from building and managing multi-family housing projects to no longer need outside funding. Working closely with local governments the Association plans to acquire federal financial assistance to make sure that rents and-or purchase prices of the housing are within reach of moderate and low income families.

In addition to actually constructing and maintaining housing, the Association will also assist in locating possible housing sites and identifying communities appropriate for housing development. It will attempt to tailor existing housing programs to the unique

needs of the seven counties involved.

TDCA will provide funds during this initial stage of the proposed two-stage project. After that the project will continue if strong local support is established and additional TDCA funding is available.

This project is one of several rural housing coordinator programs funded by the Texas Department of Community Affairs' Housing Division. It is this combination of local, regional, and state resources that is typical of local programs they support.

Inside 1-22 Seven Crashes The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Garza County during the month of March, 1977 according to Sergeant Ken Evans, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1977 shows a total of 467 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 293 persons injured, as compared to March, 1976, with 448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed, and 32 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1977 occurred in the following counties: Four each in Jack; three each in Young and Potter; and one each in Clay, Garza, Hockley, Lubbock, Montague, Wise, Carson, Deaf Smith, and Hartley.

This to be bad year to replant cotton

COLLEGE STATION — Texas cotton producers are able to get by with replanting cotton in some years, but this is not the year to give it a try, emphasizes a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Robert B. Metzger says that the consequences of replanting cotton this year are more severe than in the past years due to a shortage of high quality seed. This shortage is being brought about by the

\$73,005 school grant to Garza

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congresswoman Omar Burlison announces the approval of a \$73,005.32 Office of Education grant to Garza County. The allotment of these funds for fiscal year 1978 is under the provisions of Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Public Law 89-10, as amended. These funds will provide services for children residing in low-income areas and State-operated or supported institutions for neglected and delinquent children, who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age. These funds shall become available on July 1, 1977.

The State Department of Education will distribute the county amounts to the school districts in accordance with Federal Regulations. Each school district is guaranteed no less than 85 percent of its fiscal year 1977 allocation.

increased cotton acreage along with the production of low quality seed in some areas last year. Texas cotton acreage is expected to be up about a million acres over 1976.

'Seed supplies of many recently developed varieties have been exhausted for several months,' points out the cotton specialist. 'Unless replanting is kept at a minimum, a critical shortage of good planting seed could develop. Any significant replanting could force producers to use lower quality seed and could limit their choices to less profitable varieties.'

Except for the Rio Grande Valley, Gulf Coast and South Texas areas, most of the state's cotton crop will remain to be planted.

To keep replanting and stand failures at a minimum, Metzger offers these suggestions:

Avoid planting in cold soils below 60 degrees F. Avoid planting in excessively wet soils.

Plant on a well prepared bed.

Use systematic insecticides only with high quality seed. Keep seed out of direct contact with nitrogen, potassium and herbicides.

Avoid planting to deep, especially with low germinating seed.

'Getting a good stand of cotton from the first planting should be an important goal for producers this year,' contends Metzger. 'Due to the high cost of replanting and short supplies of high quality seed. Replanting will also cause producers to miss their optimum planting date and will reduce crop profits.'

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New regulations on all water systems

COLLEGE STATION — Both public and private water systems will soon be

subject to new regulations, says a resource development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Effective June 24, the Texas Department of Health Resources (TDHR) will begin enforcing the National Safe Drinkingwater Act of 1974. The Act provides for the safety of drinking water supplies throughout the United States through establishment and enforcement of national drinking water standards,' points out Jack C. Jones.

Any public water systems, whether privately or publicly owned, that serve 25 or more persons or that have at least 15 service connections and that are used at least 60

days during the year will be subject to new standards, explains the Extension specialist. This will include campgrounds and other public accommodations that serve tourists and special groups for a limited time each year.

What are the major effects of the legislation?

'All water systems will have to submit monthly water samples to the Texas Department of Health Resources for chemical and bacteriological analysis,' points out Jones. 'Each system must also be operated by a state certified water operator. Failure to comply can result in fines and closing of the water supply system.'

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Horses now are big business in U.S.

AMARILLO — A \$15 industry isn't hay, by means. That's how the horse industry is doing, according to the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA), Amarillo, D. C., say "ole horse" is contributing to the nation's economy.

AQHA estimates there are 3.2 million horses in the country and their owners spend a whopping 17 billion dollars this year for horse-related goods on their horses. In addition, AQHA estimates that horse-related goods have a billion dollars tied up in horse-related goods.

In other words, the United States is horse country, and horses are big business. Just how big a business and how many horses are kept in this country is not really known. The horse industry, through AQHA, has asked the federal government for funds to conduct a horse census. One thing is certain. Not since the days when horses pulled the plows of America's farmers has there been such interest in horses.

Few horses are pulling plows any more, so why the horse boom? The reason is recreation. Of the 3.2 million horse owners, over 80 per cent of them list recreation and pleasure as their primary reason for horse ownership.

Futher, the U.S. Extension Service, which keeps tabs on the nation's 4-H program, reports horse projects among 4-H members are more popular than beef cattle and swine combines, with 320,000 4-H members participating. This compares to only 30,000 horse projects in 1960.

The largest horse breed association, in terms of horses registered and active breeders, is the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA), headquartered in Amarillo, Texas. Since its formation in 1940, AQHA has registered 1.25 million Quarter Horses, nearly double the size of the next largest registry. AQHA

registered 100,959 foals in 1976, an all-time high. In addition, 168,000 animals were sold to new owners, also a new record. More than 200 people are employed to handle the daily activities of AQHA.

"Horses are definitely a family recreational activity," notes Ronald Blackwell, Executive Secretary AQHA. A recent study of AQHA's 84,000 members revealed that for each membership, two other members of the family also participated in Quarter Horse activities.

"The most popular family activity among our members is riding for pleasure, with 69 per cent response,"

Blackwell said.

The horse continues to remain on the ranches of the Southwest where the cowboy depends on the horse to accomplish his daily ranch work. However, the Quarter Horse is also moving to the city, as according to AQHA's survey, 34 per cent of those owning Quarter Horses live in a city or suburban area. Many cities are planning trails and recreation facilities. Thus, the trend of increased suburban horse ownership is expected to continue.

American-bred horses are in much demand outside the U.S. as well. Value of exports of horses out-totaled

imports for 1974 and 1975 by \$36 million. Despite the breed's name, a total of 49,999 American Quarter Horses are owned by residents of 57 foreign countries.

England, West Germany, and Italy appear to be the hotbeds of Quarter Horse activity abroad, each having recently formed their own Quarter Horse associations. Recently, 26 Quarter Horses were flown from Houston to new owners in West Germany where they will be used for western riding.

Next to riding for pleasure, showing Quarter Horses is the most popular activity of their owners. During 1976, 1,597 Quarter

Horse shows were held in the U.S. and Canada and over 601,000 entries participated. Twenty events are offered, ranging from the popular Western Pleasure, where the horse is judged on how well it gives a pleasurable ride, to the highly skilled calf roping, the still-practiced art of the ranch cowboy. Amateur-rider events and classes for youngsters 18 and under are also held.

Racing is another fast growing sport for the Quarter Horse owner. The Quarter Horse, whose name is derived from the animal's overwhelming speed up to a quarter of a mile, competes in the world's richest horse race, the \$1 million All American Futurity, held each Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico. The winner of the race receives

\$330,000. Horse racing has been the country's number one spectator sport for 24 consecutive years, and due to pari-mutuel wagering in the 30 states where it is legalized, those states received a record \$580 million for their coffers in 1975 from horse racing.

So, the horse, once cast aside in lieu of machines and technology, has adapted to different roles in today's society. He is now a source of recreation; an escape from that technology that once replaced him. Somewhat ironic, perhaps, but it's a role that's surely here to stay.

Governor Dolph Briscoe in a proclamation issued this week has designated May 15-22 as Soil Stewardship Week in Texas.

In the proclamation, Governor Briscoe points out that "the quality and quantity of food, fiber and other products of the soil depend upon the conservation, wise and proper management of the soil and water resources."

"The 1977 soil and water conservation districts throughout Texas provide a practical and democratic organization through which landowners are taking the initiative to conserve and make proper use of these resources," the proclamation continued.

Governor Briscoe proclaimed the week "in appreciation of the value of the soil to the public welfare and desiring to honor those who protect it."

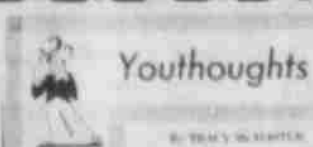

for patient rooms which permitted individual temperature controls in each room and a turn off for rooms in which heating and cooling was not needed the cost would run between \$35,000 to \$40,000.

He pointed out this would eliminate part, but not all, the leakage problems in the ceiling water lines now causing almost constant trouble as the hot water heating system would be completely replaced by such a new combined system.

The cost of replacing

water lines in the hospital will be not nearly as high, Hunsaker said, but he had no estimates to offer, but 'guessed' most of it could be done for about \$2,000.

Directors agreed to work first on correcting the hospital's water situation to patient rooms and see how the hospital makes it through the summer before any major changes in heating and cooling.

Willard advised that if directors did get into such improvements that the costs be kept separate from operating costs with the possibility of obtaining longer term bank credit on the improvements.

Directors asked Hunsaker to prepare budget estimates on income and expense for the final six month of the year for their regular May meeting.

Directors apparently agreed that the first priority is to try to meet operating costs for the last six months of the current fiscal year as well as the next fiscal year on the tax boost to 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

Correcting the water solution then would be the first improvement with the heating and cooling solution to be considered when financially feasible and when the problem had been thoroughly studied.

In another action, directors voted at Dr. Harry Tubbs' request to remove him from the active hospital staff and place him on the honorary staff. This enables Dr. Tubbs to continue to place patients in the hospital.

to be about \$85 million by 1982.

It is yet to be determined when or exactly in what form the big bond issue will be offered Lubbock voters.

They may be tax bonds, or a portion could be revenue bonds to be paid by the sale of water. The method used may determine the reception the "catch all bond issue" will get from Lubbock voters.

It may get a rejection. As for building Post Lake, O'Brien reports the water district's two-year renewal of its site option doesn't expire until July 24, 1978, and then can be renewed for another two years.

"We're ready and willing to work with Lubbock when they are ready to contract for water," O'Brien told The Dispatch.

He said cost of the Post Lake would not be as high nor construction as difficult as the White River Lake which had to go 60 feet below the canyon's bottom to find a shale base. Here at Post, the shale is only 30 feet below the surface.

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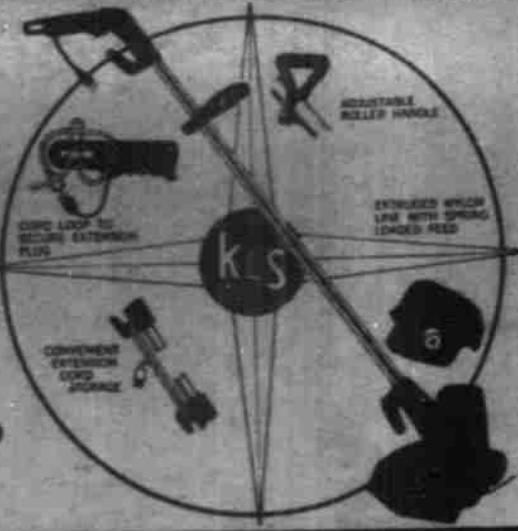
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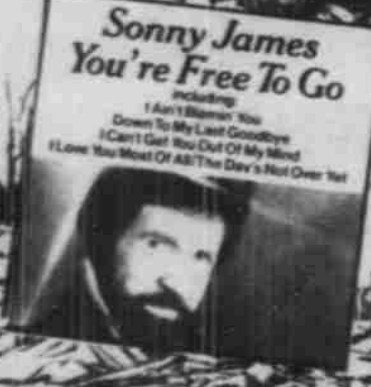
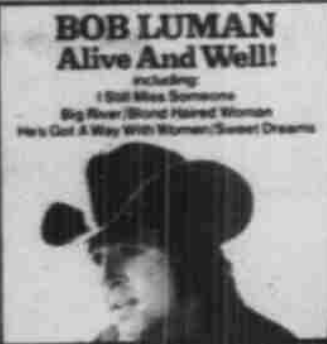


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
