Special Attractions Make Rodeo Biggest And Best

The WBAP Stagecoach, the First Cavalry Division Horse Patrol, the Hella Temple Shriners Mustang Patrol and the Red River Valley Wagon Masters are the leading attractions to the Bogata Rodeo and Frontier Days set for June 23, 24, and 25 in Bogata.

The special attractions promise to make this the biggest year yet for the Bogata Rodeo, which has long been famous in Northeast Texas and Southern Oklahoma as the biggest and the best. The Rodeo will begin with the traditional Rodeo Parade at 5:00 p.m. Thursday, June 23, followed by a barbecue supper catered at the Rodeo Ground. Performance time is 8:30 p.m. for each of the three night events. Tickets to the barbecue supper are available from downtown merchants.

The Friday and Saturday night performances will feature drills and horsemanship by the First Cavalry Division Horse Patrol. Clowns will be Bogata's own George Marshall, Jr., and Billy Scoggins, Jr.

The second annual Frontier Day will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, with tobacco spitting, egg throwing,

Stagecoach, will be in Bogata all day Saturday to ride and to be in the Rodeo.

Downtown merchants are planning Bogata's Third Annual Sidewalk Sale Thursday to tie with the occasion, with some of the merchants extending their bargains on into Saturday.

A live country band will play at each performance, and there will be many other special attractions that will require attendance at the rodeo to see.

Perhaps the reason that the Bogata Rodeo is so large is that one of the nation's largest rodeo producers, Wing Ranch Rodeo, is located just east of Bogata, and is owned and operated by Jerald Smith. Smith will furnish part of his large string of stock for the Bogata Rodeo to add to the excitement of the event. Smith has been Producer of the Year in the IRA.

Events will be bareback riding, calf roping, saddlebronc riding, steer wrestling, barrel racing, bull riding, and a calf scramble nightly.

The sponsors of the Rodeo is the Bogata Rodeo Association, an organization with members from many segments of the community.

Townes Dies On Bridge

Robert Townes of Bogata slammed his 1973 Pontiac into the north side of the bridge crossing Depot Creek on Highway 271 and Main street in Deport at 3:15 p.m. Sunday.

Lamar County Justice of the Peace L. Z. Wilkerson ruled the death a suicide.

There were no indications of breaking, and the impact ripped three concrete pillars of the bridge away. The engine was thrown to the bottom of the creek and the transmission landed south of the impact point on the bridge itself. The hot exhaust pipe and muffler continued across the bridge and set a small grass fire on the east side of the creek.

Apparently the car struck the first two concrete pillars shearing them off and turned over in the walkway on the north side of the bridge.

An eight page note on a tablet was found in the wrecked vehicle according to investigating officers.

Band Director Confesses To Murder

Evidence pursued by Red River County Sheriff Avret Vaughan led to the discovery of the whereabouts and the confession of Monty Boyd, Idabel band director, to the murder of his wife, Mrs. Phyllis Holley Boyd, 25, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Holley of Clarksville. The murder occurred on the night of Wednesday, June 1, at the Boyd residence at 1501 Arthur in Idabel. The cause of death was a blow to the head.

Boyd had been assistant band director in Clarksville before moving to Idabel in 1975.

Mrs. Boyd was an employee of the McCurtain County Gazette, and no official action was taken on her disappearance until the evening of Monday, June 6, when Mrs. Marvin McBee, an employee of the Gazette and a good friend of

Mrs. Boyd's, called Mr. and Mrs. Holley in Clarksville and wagon in Houston on Friday, June 3.

When Vaughan got this information, he contacted the Texas Ranger in Houston, Ralph Wadsworth, on Tuesday and brought him into the investigation. Information gathered by relatives of Mrs. Boyd in Clarksville and related to Vaughan indicated that Boyd had placed an order for a garden tractor and attachments from Sears in Clarksville and was to pick the items up at a Houston Sears store.

Ranger Wadsworth got a lead on Boyd when he called the Houston Sears store on Friday, June 10, to check on the order he had placed in Clarksville.

The Sears manager got a phone number where Boyd could be reached, and Wadsworth traced the number to an apartment, but Boyd wasn't home. The apartment manager told the Ranger that Boyd was at a flea market near the complex, and Wadsworth located him there, selling his household goods. Boyd was asked to go with the Ranger to identify a body in the Harris County morgue, but was not placed under arrest at this time. When Boyd viewed the body and identified it as his wife, he confessed to the murder, according to Ranger Wadsworth.

The body had been found in Lake Livingston in Polk County on Friday, June 3, north of Houston, and was identified as that of Mrs. Boyd through

dental records held in Clarksville by Dr. Tom Regan. The identification had been made approximately an hour before Boyd viewed the body of his wife.

Boyd called the McCurtain County Gazette on Thursday, June 2, and told them that his wife had gone to Dallas to look for a job, then apparently drove to Lake Livingston and disposed of the body. Evidence

gathered by Sheriff Vaughan indicated that Boyd then went to Houston and made the purchases of the trailer, recorder and had the work done on his car before he returned to Idabel on Sunday, June 5, and neighbors helped him load furniture and household goods on his station wagon and trailer. Boyd then apparently drove from Idabel to Foreman, Arkansas, selling and leaving household goods along the way.

One of the boxes dropped off and was turned over to McCurtain County officers. Sheriff Vaughan found in that box the receipts which helped locate Boyd.

Boyd apparently had his wife's body in the car when he ordered the garden tractor, and also borrowed money against his wife's car at a bank, then sold it to a used car dealer in Idabel.

Mrs. Boyd was a native of

Clarksville and graduated from high school in 1970. She attended East Texas State University for two years with a major in music and later worked in Clarksville at the hospital and The Baker and Taylor Company. She had worked at the hospital in Idabel before going to the Gazette.

The couple was married in the McKenzie Methodist Church in Clarksville on November 21, 1973.

Funeral services for Mrs. Boyd were Sunday, June 12, at the First Baptist Church in Clarksville, with burial in Fairview Cemetery.

Boyd is now being held in the McCurtain County Jail after waiving extradition from Texas.

City Water Rates Increased

The Bogata City Council, meeting in regular session Tuesday night, voted to increase the city water and sewer rates according to the following schedule.

1. The minimum rate for residential and commercial users shall be \$4 for 2000 gallons.

2. The rate for water used

above 2000 gallons shall be \$1 for 1000 gallons.

3. The rate for water used above 10,000 gallons per month shall be \$0.75 per 1000 gallons.

4. Sewer rates shall be \$2 per service.

5. Water loaded on tanks to be sold at a rate of \$1 per 500 gallons, with a minimum charge of \$1.

6. The charges outlined above shall become effective after July 1, 1977.

Newspapers Forced To Adjust Rates

Four Corners Publishing Co., publishers of The Mt. Vernon Optic-Herald, Deport Times, Blossom Times, Bogata News and Talco Times, is being forced to adjust advertising rates effective July 1. Our last rate adjustment was April 1, 1976.

Million Dollar Rain Falls

A rain of more than three inches that literally means millions of dollars to farmers in the area came Sunday afternoon to Deport, Blossom, Bogata and Talco.

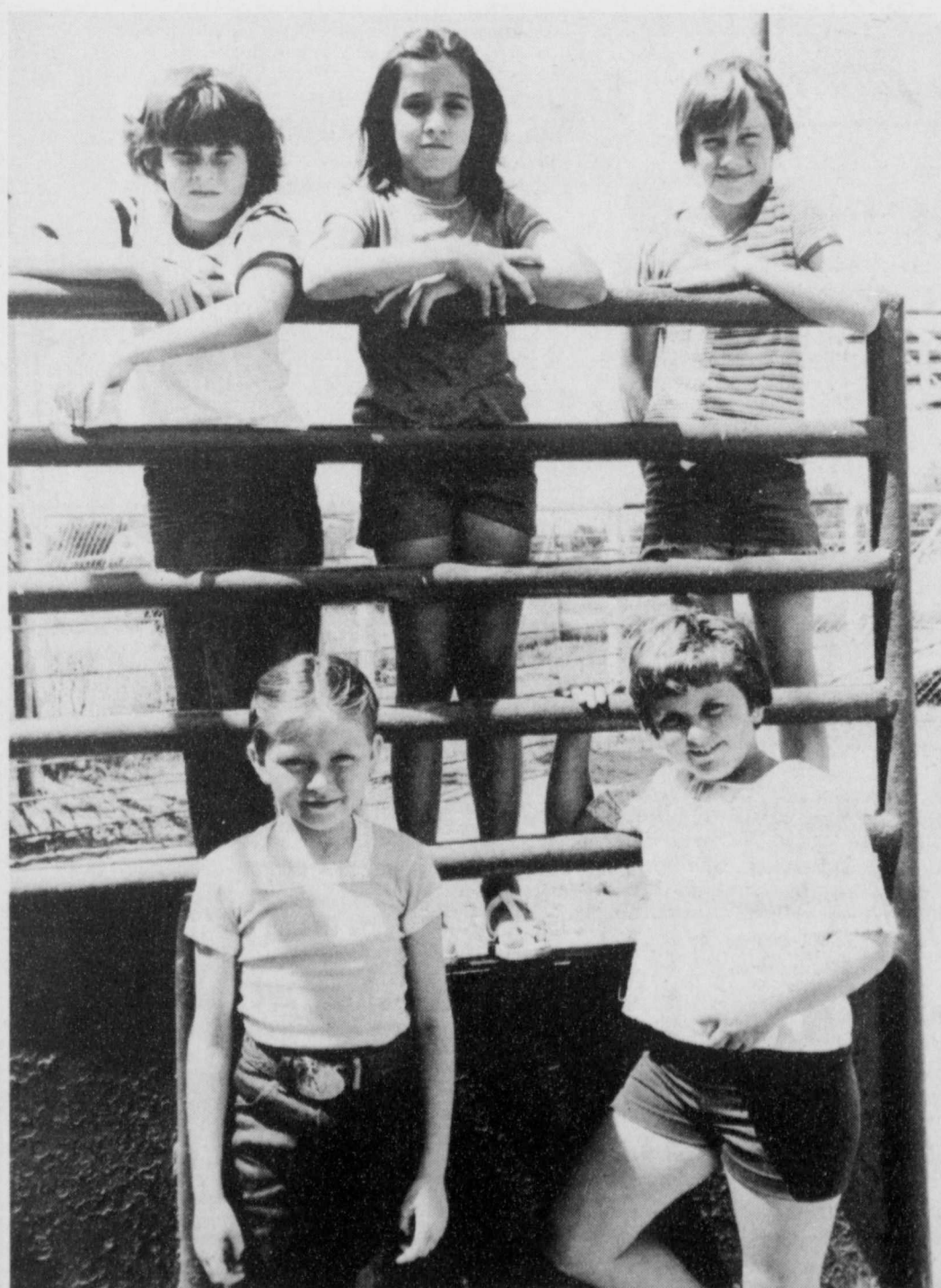
More than two inches fell in less than an hour in Deport. Although it rained hard enough to damage slightly some maize that was headed out, farmers generally agreed that the loss was slight compared to the enormous benefits of the rain.

The last measurable rainfall in Deport was May 21, when six tenths of an inch fell. Rain the day before measured .45. Just a

trace fell May 31 and another trace fell the night of June 23. Heavy clouds remained over the area Monday and Tuesday, with a few sprinkles of rain falling.

Heavy runoff caused the north end of Main Street to stand in water, but Deport Creek did not leave its banks, an indication to old-timers of just how badly the rain was needed.

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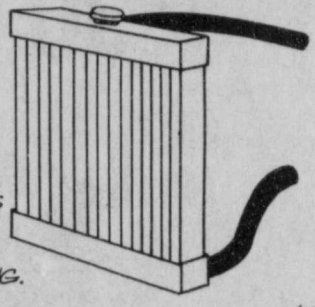
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Stress Can Aggravate Your "Allergy Load"

Allergic To Your Job Or Wife?

Stress from your job or family can aggravate your "allergy load" according to Arthur W. Kratz, D. O. of Dallas. "Say I'm allergic to a specific food or a specific inhalant and I'm on vacation. I may have no problem with my allergy. But put me back on a job I don't like, then my allergies may kick up and drive me crazy," stated Dr. Kratz.

He participated in a series of scientific seminars conducted during the 78th annual Texas Osteopathic Medical Association convention in Corpus Christi, May 5-7. Dr. Kratz is an associate professor at the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine in Fort Worth in allergies and general practice and with the TCOM Clinic in the field of allergy.

In describing the "total allergy load" experienced by patients, he said, "If I'm fighting with my wife, if the kids are cutting up at school, I may have more serious allergy problems. It is really a total load system."

"It is not just a matter of one thing alone. It could be a person will have an inhalant allergy and have no problem until a certain food is introduced. Add a nervous reaction and the person is pushed over the top with an allergic reaction."

Tiredness, Sleeplessness, Hyperactive Children May Be Related To Food Allergies

Dr. Kratz said, "A good deal of our tiredness, sleeplessness and hyperactive children are definitely related to foods and food additives. I think we in this country better wake up to the fact that a lot of our children suffer from problems with such compounds as sodium benzoate additives to foods. It has been well documented you can take certain foods out of a diet or certain food additives out of a diet and change the allergic

pattern."

Whether there are food allergies or not is a controversial topic. There is no doubt in anybody's mind we suffer from inhalant allergies but do we truly suffer from food allergies? "I for one think that it is extremely important," stated Dr. Kratz. "I talk about the relationship of inhalant allergens to food allergens and I find you actually can stay off certain foods during certain inhalant seasons where you're having a lot of trouble and get control of your inhalant allergies."

We Don't Know What We're Eating

"In this country, we really don't know what we're eating," Dr. Kratz said. He urged more consumer labeling acts or major improvements in present laws. He said, "We must try to improve a person's ability to find out what he is eating or what he is putting on his skin. We really don't know. If you buy perfume, you really don't know what is in it. If you go into the grocery store and buy food there, some of the things are listed on the can but not all of the ingredients are listed. So really you can't even distinguish all the time what you're eating."

Sixty Percent Of Practice Allergy Related

It is Dr. Kratz' opinion that sixty percent of the patient problems seen by a doctor are allergy related. For example, "last week many patients were complaining of a sore throat. A good half of the physicians looking at that sore throat would have regarded it as viral or bacterial in origin. I think very few would regard that sore throat could possibly have been caused by the fact that the grass season had just come in."

Dr. Kratz tested each sore throat patient to see what their reaction would be to grass seed and said two-thirds of them gave tremendous reaction. "This suggests to me that there

is a good possibility that the sore throat I was looking at was an allergic reaction and not viral or bacterial," he said.

It has only been in the last few years that doctors have started to concentrate more on inhalant and food allergies. In addition to his teaching at the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Kratz has presented the subject to scientific seminars conducted by the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association at the organization's annual conventions. Other medical topics covered at this year's convention included evaluation and management of hypertension, cancer chemotherapy and exhaustion. Each osteopathic physician and surgeon must participate in a total of 50 hours of continuing medical education each year to maintain membership in the American Osteopathic Association.

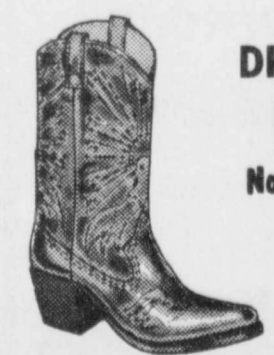
