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Jeff Merket's Steer Wins

Grand Champion At El Paso Show

Jeff Merket, 15-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Merket of Loraine and Lone Wolf 4-H Club member, showed his Maine Anjou-Hereford crossbred to the Grand Champion Steer position in the El Paso Stock Show in judging Monday afternoon.

The 1,293-pound steer had first won champion of the crossbred class in the show.

Bred by John Clarke of Ferguson, Mont., the steer had won in top places in five other shows before reaching the ultimate Grand Champion honor at El

Paso. He won second place in Dallas, second in the Mitchell County show, second at Sweetwater, third at Abilene and second behind the champion crossbred at Fort Worth.

Jeff and little brother Adam were the only Mitchell County

4-H club members to enter the El Paso show, said county extension agent Bob Benson. However, Adam was sick and did not show his steer himself. Adam's steer placed 15th in the crossbred competition.

Over 500 entries were made in the steer division, Benson said, and both he and Jeff's father accompanied him to the El Paso show.

Last year's Grand Champion brought \$5,500 in the auction, Benson noted, and Jeff's steer will be in the premium spot on the auction block this year. The auction is set for Friday, Benson said.

Deputy Hired, Newby Promoted

The vacancy in the Mitchell County Sheriff's department, created by the resignation last week of Chief Deputy Troy Walls, was filled Tuesday.

Sheriff McGuire promoted Deputy L. M. Newby to the Chief Deputy post and hired Jim Reynaud, a park ranger at Lake Colorado City State Park for nearly five years, as the new deputy.

As an outgrowth of McGuire's continuing efforts to have deputies living in both Loraine and Westbrook, Reynaud, who lives on the west side of Lake Colorado City, will be the Precinct Two resident deputy. Walls was the Sheriff's Deputy living in Westbrook at the time of his resignation.

Mike Stutts was recently hired, increasing the number of deputies to five, to live in the Loraine Precinct Four area. Since Stutts' hiring, approved by Mitchell County com-

missioners, McGuire emphasized the point that the Sheriff's department has made seven marijuana possession cases and cleared a large burglary in the Buford community, "so the additional coverage is really paying off," he said.

Seven arrests were made for misdemeanor possession of marijuana, less than four ounces, including the following: --A Loraine juvenile. --Joe Barrera, 19, of Loraine. --John Martinez, 19, of Colorado City. --Roy Santana, 20, of Loraine. --Kelly Henexson, 17, of Pecos.

--Larry Dwight Kelley, 18, of Westbrook. --An illegal alien was turned over to the Border Patrol and not charged with marijuana possession.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of a person in connection with the burglary of the Dolis Powell home north of Buford.

"The Mitchell County Sheriff's department office stays open 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. five days a week," McGuire said. "After 5 p.m. and on weekends, we can be reached at home or by dialing 728-2311. We work out of our cars after 5 and on weekends, so the best way to get in touch with the sheriff or deputies is to call 728-2311. We have a night deputy on duty from 8 p.m. until 5 a.m. seven days a week."

Credit Money Getting Cheaper, Says Mitchell

Qualified farmers and ranchers should be able to borrow the production money they need for 1975 and at gradually declining interest costs, says Eddie Mitchell, Sweetwater Production Credit Association manager.

Mitchell said projections are that the gradual decline in money costs will continue. "By June PCA farmers and ranchers should be paying from 1 to 1 1/2 percent less for their borrowed money."

The PCA officer said that his organization's method of obtaining money ensures an ade-

quate supply for his stockholders for 1975. Funds for the Association are obtained through the public sale of bonds.

"Our main concern," Mitchell stated, "is that our members will not be able to tighten their belts enough to meet the increased production costs that we know are here to stay--at least for awhile. Necessities are about all our members

can afford now. 'Needs' and 'wants' are going to have to wait for better times."

Sweetwater PCA loaned \$35 million in 1974. This figure represents an average loan size of \$65,500 to 537 members.

Sweetwater PCA provides loan funds for farmers and ranchers in Borden, Dawson, Fisher, Mitchell, Nolan and Scurry counties.

14 Cars Derailed

A Texas and Pacific train, numbering about 40 cars, derailed just west of Colorado City Wednesday morning but no one was injured.

The derailment occurred shortly before 8 a.m. and blocked traffic using the crossing at Hwy. 1983 just west of the old refinery.

No estimate of the damage was available, nor speculation as to the cause of the derailment. Some 14 cars were derailed, ten empty and four loaded.

About 200 yards of track were destroyed.

Cause of the derailment is being investigated, a railroad official said.

Mills Warns Of Poisonous Weed

The local Soil Conservation Service office is issuing a warning to Mitchell County farm and range managers concerning poisonous weeds such as tansy mustard and threadleaf groundsel.

Van Mills, district conservationist, advises that cattle losses could occur from cattle eating large quantities of tansy mustard, a plant belonging to the mustard family. There is an abundance of tansy mustard in small grain fields and disturbed areas in pastures.

He described tansy mustard as a tall, slender plant with minute yellowish flowers that produce a long slender pod about an inch long with small waxy seeds.

"Growth is erratic from year to year but is most abundant in the spring during wet years," Mills explained.

"It really comes up when we have wet falls like the one we had last year," Mills continued. "This mustard plant is now making seed where it has not been grazed off."

A small amount of the plant will not affect the animal, he

explained, but in large quantities it is toxic. It usually is not eaten if there is other available forage.

"Characteristic symptoms are similar to 'blind staggers,' produced by selenium bearing plants," Mills explained. "Poisoned animals first become unable to see and may walk around in circles, lean against fences or other objects." Later the animal loses the ability to eat or drink which is referred to as "paralyzed tongue." If special care is taken or if detected in time, the animal may not die.

The district conservationist advised that proper grass management is the best means to avoid poisoning on rangeland.

"Reduction of stocking rates and deferring the affected area during the regular growing season will cause the more desirable grasses to increase.

"Prevention of poisoning is accomplished in areas where poisonous plants are common by removing animals from the area until growing season for that plant is over," Mills concluded.



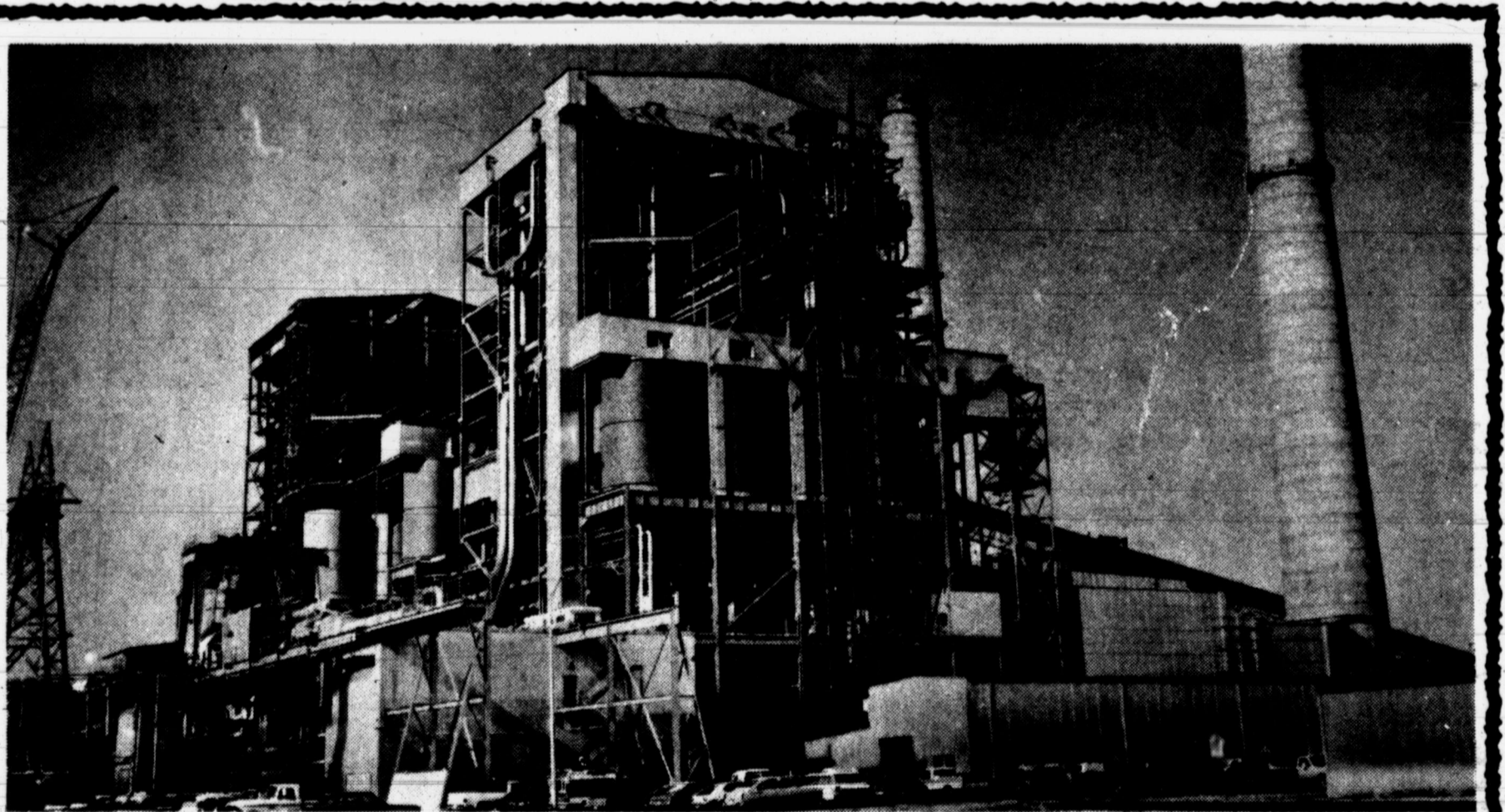

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In 1975, about 20% of our total generation will be fueled by lignite coal. By 1980, we'll add two other units at Monticello and four at a new site near Martin Lake. Lignite will then account for

Its use will help us keep the price of electricity from increasing as much as it would if we tried to depend on expensive new supplies of natural gas and oil.
