Cocaine Discovered In School Restroom

On Tuesday, Sept. 14, Tahoka Police Sgt. Elton Childress was dispatched to Tahoka High School with a drug-finding dog contracted by the school, and the dog located a pair of black panty hose that contained approximately 200 milligrams of cocaine in a pill box in the second floor junior high girls restroom.

A field test run by the Scott Regent System for the presumptive identification of cocaine proved positive and DPS trooper Larry Duncan weighed the substance to be approximately 200 milligrams. Juvenile probation officer Jerri Akard and Sgt. Childress are investigating this case and police noted that they have leads on possible suspects in the case. Sgt. Childress also said Juvenile Officer Akard should be commended for her cooperation and assistance in this case.

A Tahoka man reported that he was assaulted on Saturday night while he was walking down Lockwood and reported that three unidentified males got out of a vehicle and began beating him up. The victim was taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of injuries and released.

In jail during the week were three persons for application to revoke probation and one each for criminal mischief, theft by check and public intoxication.

Wilson Beats Dogs 9-7

A Wilson High School exchange student from Germany who played his first game of American football just three weeks ago kicked a last-quarter field goal to give the Mustangs a 9-7 win over Tahoka Friday night.

Tahoka had led the tight game since just before halftime, but a fumble which set up Steffan Such's 31-yard field goal resulted in the third straight loss of the season for Tahoka and the first win in three tries for the Mustangs.

This week the Bulldogs go to Seagraves for their third game in a row away from home. The district opener will start at 7:30 p.m. The Bulldogs, who have played good football but can't seem to get over the hump, may be playing without the services of top lineman Gary Daniell, who has a knee injury.

Top runners in the contest were Ruben Garcia of Wilson, with 90 yards in 21 carries, and John

Aldous of Tahoka, with 63 yards in 15 efforts. Fullback Rusty Jennings of Tahoka gained 49 yards in just 10 carries, and Johnny Guzman of Wilson gained 28 yards in only 6 trips.

Wilson's Greg Spears intercepted a Tahoka pass in the first period to set up the Mustang touchdown drive starting at the Bulldog 31. Spears passed to Guzman 11 yards and Garcia topped the drive off with a 6-yard scoring run off the left side. Such's extra point try was blocked, and Wilson led 6-0 with 6:02 left in the first quarter.

Tahoka kept Wilson bottled up in Mustang territory for most of the second quarter, and just before the half, the Dogs scored. QB Ramiro Rodriguez pitched the ball out to Jim Patterson, who stopped and threw 29 yards to the end zone, where Aldous won a fight for the ball and came down with it for the touchdown. Tackle George Morin kicked the point and Tahoka was up 7-6 at halftime.

Wilson dominated the third

quarter, holding Tahoka on downs once in Mustang turf and threatening to score after a 24-yard run by Spears and a 24-yard pass-and-lateral play which carried to the Tahoka 25, but couldn't score. In the fourth, Wilson drove to the Tahoka 17, but on fourth down the Bulldog defense led by Morin and defensive end Ricky Saldana stopped Garcia short of the first.

After Tahoka took over, though, a fumbled snap was recovered by Rudy Rios of Wilson at the Tahoka 28. The Mustangs drove to a first at the 18, but after that the drive stalled in the face of a strong defense led by Bulldog linebacker Bobby Gonzales, who just joined the team after moving from Post, and by Patterson in the secondary. On fourth and 7 at the 13, Such was called in, and with the ball placed down at the 21, kicked it through for the winning field goal, with just 4:33 left in the game.

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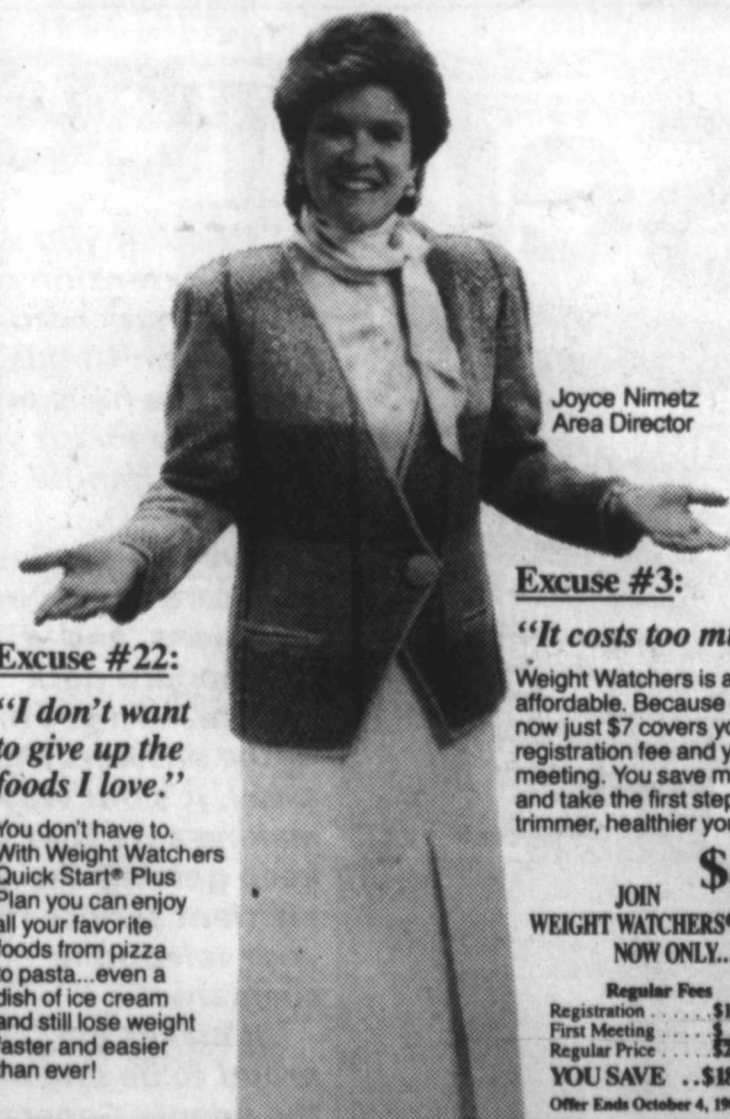

Dear John:

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes



Tough Turf

Dear John: Can you recommend a turf variety that will hold up to a lot of kid traffic?

Dear Run Roughshod: Lawn-tenders of the parental variety used to have to compromise. They had either a nice lawn where kids neared not, or a neighborhood playlot that looked shot! In recent years, lawn experts have developed grass types that are easy to maintain and wear well under the stress of football, baseball, tag and whatnot. Tall fescue is particularly kid-proof for northern dwellers. It grows well in shade, has good wear, heat and drought tolerance and is resistant to many diseases. For southern dwellers, bermudagrass or zoysia are good choices for heat, drought and wear tolerance. Ask a county extension agent for recommendations.

Dear John: The sun pours into my yard all day, without a break. Do certain types of flowers fare better under these conditions than others?

Dear Sunshine: Many perennials and most annuals grow quite well in full sun. But some don't, especially fuchsias, impatiens and dailies. The best way to determine which flowers will do best in full sunlight is to refer to a flower catalog.

Dear John: Before I hit the pavement in search of a walk-behind mower, I'd like to know what to look for.

Dear Smart Shopper: Here's a whole list of things to look for:

- Self-propelled mowers pull their own weight and lessen the workload for you.
- Mowers are available with a manual start where you pull a rope, or an electric start where you turn a key.
- A two-cycle engine uses a gas-and-oil mix as fuel which lubricates the engine as it operates, even on slopes. With a four-cycle engine, there's no need to pre-mix fuel. But crankcase oil should be changed every 25 hours of use.
- A rear guard helps protect the operator against flying debris and helps keep toes from being run over when the mower is pulled backward. A downward-curving discharge chute deflects most objects into the ground.
- On some mowers, a lever must be held against the handlebar to engage the blade. When released, the blade stops within three seconds. A flywheel brake stops the engine too. With a blade brake clutch (BBC), the blade stops while the engine continues to run.
