Hoover Signs Harbor Bill

Measure Authorizes Project Larger Than Panama Canal, According To President As Signature Is Attached

WASHINGTON, July 4. (AP)—President Hoover signed a bill today which, in his own words, authorizes a larger project than the Panama Canal.

In a statement issued after he had signed the bill, the president said that the project was one of the most important in the history of the United States.

Provides Employment
"It will provide employment for thousands of men. It should be fruitful of decreased transportation charges on bulk goods, should bring great benefits to the country and to our industries. It should result in a better distribution of population away from the congested centers."

The measure more than doubled the amount of authorization given in the last Rivers and Harbors bill signed on January 21, 1926, by President Coolidge. The one authorized \$71,000,000 of work, some of which is still going forward.

Billings And Mooney Lose Court Battle

Supreme Court Upholds Sentences Imposed In 1916 San Francisco Preparedness Day Bombings

(By Associated Press)
SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 4.—Independence Day brought another defeat to Warren K. Billings and Thomas J. Mooney in their long fight for freedom from life sentences imposed for the 1916 San Francisco preparedness day bombing which killed 10 persons and injured 40.

The state Supreme Court in a report made public today, decided six to one against recommending to Governor C. C. Young that Billings be pardoned. The government repeatedly has said its action on Mooney's pardon plea would be guided by the recommendation in Billings' case.

To Make Decisions
Governor Young is expected to make his decision on both the Billings and Mooney pleas next week. The adverse report brought a smile from Mooney at San Quentin prison.

"The fight is not yet over," the former labor leader commented. "It has been a long battle and I am never going to give up the attempt to prove my innocence."

Billings, at Folsom prison, had nothing to say, but Warden Court Smith remarked, "Naturally he was very disappointed."

Mooney and Billings long have contended they were convicted on "perjured testimony," but the Supreme court said there was no evidence supporting these charges. The majority believed Billings had received a "fair and impartial trial."

Gigantic Face of George Washington Unveiled in July Fourth Ceremonies

RAPID CITY, S. D., July 4.—Gutzon Borglum's gigantic face of George Washington, carved on Mount Rushmore's granite cliff, today revealed a reminder through the centuries of the historical foundation of United States.

At simple, impressive Independence day ceremonies in the heart of South Dakota's black hills, 2,500 people witnessed the unveiling of the sixty foot head of the first president of the United States, the initial unit of Mount Rushmore national memorial.

Victims Are Brought Here After South Plains Wrecks

THREE young women were seriously injured in two automobile accidents on the South Plains yesterday and brought to Lubbock for treatment, according to reports from local hospitals.

Miss Beatrice Lott, of Sweetwater and formerly of Lubbock, was seriously hurt when the automobile in which she was riding overturned Friday morning about 10 o'clock on the highway between this city and Post. She was brought to the Lubbock sanitarium where physicians stated that while her condition is regarded as serious it is not considered grave. She suffered a fractured right tibia and injuries to her back. One of her eyes also was slightly hurt.

Miss Lott is connected with the Nolan county health department and was, up until a few months ago, day supervisor at the Lubbock sanitarium.

Miss Billie Pirtle, of Anton, and Miss Vesta Weldon, of Sudan, were painfully hurt when the car in which they were riding capsized on the highway between Littlefield and Sudan about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Driver of the car, Zenn Brown, formerly of this city but now of Littlefield, was only slightly hurt and was not brought here for treatment.

Miss Weldon sustained a fractured right clavical and severe bruises about the face and body. Miss Pirtle was badly bruised and physicians stated that she might possibly have internal injuries. Both were unconscious shortly after the accident but were resting well last night.

PARACHUTE JUMPER HURT

BELLEAIR SPEEDWAY, HOUSTON, July 4. (AP)—Harold Mattison, a civilian parachute jumper, suffered slight injuries to both arms in a jump at the national balloon race grounds at 5:45 p. m. today. After treatment at a first aid station he was able to walk about.

Officers Seek Young Bandit

Territory Scoured For Lone Unmasked Youth Who Held Up Littlefield Man, Escaped With \$1264 In Cash

Though officers of the South Plains were scouring the territory yesterday and last night for an unmasked youth who held up Tom Warren at Littlefield Thursday night and escaped with \$1264, no trace had been found, according to reports last night.

Mr. Warren, one of the owners of the Littlefield tourist camp, was alone in the office of the camp when the hijacker entered.

"The man, who appeared to be about twenty-five years old, wore a light colored hat, white shirt and khaki trousers," said Mr. Warren. "Another man was standing outside, near the door. I didn't see them leave and don't know whether they were in a car."

Officers are of the opinion that the robbery was committed by one of three men who stole a Buick Sedan, 1928 model, at Clovis, N. M. late Thursday.

SUTTON APPOINTED

AUSTIN, July 4. (AP)—Governor Dan Moody today announced the appointment of John F. Sutton of San Angelo as judge of the 1st district court to succeed J. F. Hill, resigned.

"America's shrine for political democracy," it was termed by Joseph S. Cullinan of Houston, Texas, chairman of the federal commission in charge of Borglum's massive project.

Flaming Body Of Man Found In N. Y. City

Henry Brinkman, Ex-Convict, Dumped By Underworld Enemies After Being Shot To Death; No Clues Found

Movements Traced

Body Soaked In Oil Before Thrown From Car; Victim Thought By Police To Have Been Killed Elsewhere

NEW YORK, July 4.—The flaming body of Henry Brinkman, ex-convict, was found on the sidewalk of a quiet Bronx street today, dumped there, police say, by unidentified underworld enemies who had shot him through the head.

A taxi driver saw what looked like a bundle of rags burning on the sidewalk in front of a house. He found that the bundle was in fact an oil-soaked body.

Occupants of houses in the block said they had not noticed any car drive into the dead end street, but police were convinced that Brinkman was killed elsewhere, his body covered with gasoline and then driven to the place where it was found.

Two Convicted of Extortion Charge

LOS ANGELES, July 4. (AP)—Morris Levine, former newspaper man and Miss Leonine Johnson, formerly an employee of the Julian Petroleum corporation, were found guilty of attempting to extort \$75,000 from Charles Crawford, politician, by a superior court jury tonight.

The jury returned the verdict after 25 hours deliberation. Levine and Johnson obtained the money under threat of revealing in a series of articles they were preparing for Levine's newspaper Crawford's alleged connection with the Julian company collapse in 1927 because of a \$100,000 stock overissue.

FIRE SWEEPS WHARFS

Lumber Yards And Warehouses In Boston Are Razed

BOSTON, July 4. (AP)—Wharves, coal and lumber yards and warehouses along Mystic creek in the Charlestown district were burning early tonight. The fire spread along a wharf of a mile from the city.

The Burton-Purser Coal company yards, the old Metropolitan Coal wharf, the Pacific Lumber company yards, and two other lumber yards were virtually destroyed by the flames. The flames then attacked the City of Boston street department yards, containing much equipment, and also a dwelling house. All the wharves on the properties of the lumber and coal companies were burning.

RECOVER THREE BODIES

United States Residents Are Taken From Lake Erie

ST. THOMAS, Ont., July 4. (AP)—The bodies of three residents of the United States, drowned in Lake Erie when their sailboat collapsed some time today, were recovered today. The victims were identified as Stanley Winters, 30, of Kensington Avenue, Cleveland, a salesman; Morris Ray Carroll, 30, of Detroit, salesman; and Oscar Layne, 21, of Fairview, Kentucky, a laborer.

JURY STILL OUT

No Verdict Returned In Bank Holdup Case Friday Night

GALVESTON, July 4. (AP)—The jury in the case of W. S. "Shiloh" Scribner charged with robbery by assault in connection with a bank holdup in Texas City was still out at 9 o'clock tonight. The case went to the jury at 12:45 o'clock this morning. The state asked for life imprisonment. Scribner previously had been given a 99-year sentence but the case was reversed by the appeals court. The bank holdup took place in 1927.

Senator Small Speaks Friday For Candidacy

Texas Should Declare Independence From Old-Line Politicians, Candidate For Governor Tells Audience

BERTRAM, July 4. (AP)—Asserting that Texas should follow in the footsteps of the nation's forefathers who 154 years ago demanded their independence from Great Britain, Senator Small declared the majority of the old-line politicians with their staid and warfare, Senator Clint G. Small of Wellington, candidate for governor, today addressed a Fourth of July crowd here.

Although his talk dealt mainly with the problems that are confronting the state government, Small declared the majority of the candidates had erected a smoke screen about the main issues involved and were seeking election to the governorship on issues which were of little concern or benefit to the state.

Small declared the voters to "take the bull by the horns" and vote for the man who would take the state out of the mire of the old-line politicians and the political strife and warfare that has characterized the administration of the past 20 years.

"Perpetual Office Seekers"
"Most of those seeking the nomination are perpetual office seekers. One of them has been going over the state asking for support because he was the leader of the Anti-Smith forces in 1928 and saved Texas from the rule of Raskob and Smith, another would have his wife elected so that he could gather up the chips for her, while still another asks the support of the electorate because he was the champion of the democratic party in the 1928 election," Senator Small said.

Balloon Race Underway At Houston Port

Fifteen Bags Start Floating Away In Twentieth Annual National Elimination Race; Three Balloons Sighted

BELLEAIR SPEEDWAY, HOUSTON, July 4.—Lieut. T. G. W. Settle and his aide, Lieut. R. O. Meyer, took off at 6:08 p. m. today, the first to leave in the 20th Annual National Elimination balloon race.

The great silvery bag started floating slowly away in a northwesterly direction.

Pilot George Hipman and aide Milford Vank followed Settle at 6:11 in the United Van Service of Cleveland.

Lieuts. W. D. Eule and J. P. Kidwell of the army were next at 6:15 p. m.

Then came the entry of the Aero Digest, New York, whose pilot was S. T. Moore and whose aide was Lieut. W. O. Eareckson. They cleared at 6:20 p. m.

Fifth to Leave
The fifth to leave was the Detroit Times bag, piloted by E. J. Hill who had A. C. Schlosier for an aide. It got away at 6:27 p. m. The balloon dropped a shower of dirt on the spectators as it went away.

Captain K. S. Axtell's army entrant swept away behind Hill at 6:37 p. m. Lieut. R. Holmes was the aide.

Settle, the first to leave, is a navy pilot. Lieuts. W. R. Turnbull and C. M. Brown took their army bag off next, getting away at 6:40 p. m. The eighth was the Goodyear-Zeppelin of Akron, Ohio, which left at 6:44 p. m. R. J. Blair and F. A. Trotter formed the team.

The next two went in this order: No. 9, navy, Lieuts. W. Bushnell and J. A. Greenwald, 6:47 p. m.; No. 10, navy, Lieuts. R. R. Dennett and C. F. Miller, 6:53 p. m.

Faulty Oiling System Causes Record-Breaking Ship To End Endurance Refueling Flying

John And Kenneth Hunter Surpass "St. Louis Robin" Mark By 133 Hours And Fifteen Minutes; Test Brought To Unexpected And Thrilling Close Late Friday

(By Associated Press)
SKY HARBOR AIRPORT, CHICAGO, July 4.—John and Kenneth S. Hunter ended their world's record refueling endurance flight at 5:25 p. m. Central Standard Time today after 23 days, one hour and 45 minutes of sustained flying above Sky Harbor airport.

A faulty oiling system caused the unexpected, but thrilling finish to the endurance test, which exceeded the old record made by Dale Jackson and Forrest O'Brien in the "St. Louis Robin," by 133 hours and 15 minutes.

The landing was made after the fliers had dropped a note with an urgent request for oil. The plane was within 100 feet of the ground before anyone noticed it was landing.

Chorus from Crowd
There was a chorus from the huge holiday crowd:
"It's coming down."
The ship was brought into the hangar, which the crowd stormed and ganged in closely around.

Kenneth Hunter, sitting in the cockpit smiling broadly became stupefied when the mad crowd ganged around. He was covered with oil and dirt.

John remained in the ship after Kenneth was rushed to the hangar offices.

Started June 11
Virtually unnoticed and unheralded, the record breaking endurance flight began on June 11, at 3:40 p. m. Central Standard Time. The fliers and their second hand monoplane wiped out the old record of 420 hours and 21 1/2 minutes at 5:01:30 Sunday morning, June 29.

Not satisfied with that accomplishment, the Hunter boys soared on, piling hour after hour on their new record until their landing today. The old record had been set last July by Dale Jackson and Forrest O'Brien in their "St. Louis Robin" over Lambert-St. Louis field at St. Louis.

The plane fell a mile opposite the Alameda airport. Pilot, James Hennessey and Roy Varney, at the controls of a San Francisco air ferry plane, said they saw it go into a power dive 800 to 1000 feet above the water. They circled about the scene but could see no bodies.

Crash Heard
Ernest Smith, famous San Francisco to Hawaii flyer, was one of others at the airport who heard the crash when the plane struck the water. He joined the searching planes.

A check up at the Alameda airport showed the plane was a bi-plane belonging to the Alameda Flying club and had been taken from the airport without permission. The number or names of the occupants were undetermined.

TO ERECT MONUMENT
First Supreme Court Of Texas Will Receive Honor
SAN ANTONIO, July 4. (AP)—A monument to the first Supreme Court of Texas to be erected on the campus of the state capitol will be undertaken by the Texas Bar association under a resolution adopted here today at the annual convention of the association. A committee of seven will be appointed by the president to handle details of the matter.

How the fund will be raised and what procedure will be adopted was not decided, that being left in the hands of the committee.

SEARCH FOR YOUTH

Aid Asked In Hunt For Boy, Missing Since Wednesday

AUSTIN, July 4. (AP)—After a long and fruitless search today over the rough hill country near Spicewood Springs by Sheriff Coley White and 2 men, Sheriff White today asked the help of Austin and Travis county people in the search for Harvey Simons, 12-year-old youth who has been missing since Wednesday morning.

The boy left home on horseback Wednesday to drive up his father's mules from the hills. The horse was found grazing in a field that afternoon.

Sheriff White feared the boy had been thrown and injured, and that he was somewhere in the hills, parts of which are so rough and broken that search has been slow and difficult.

Police Believe Detroit Slayer Is Fred Burke

Description Of Man Who Shot
Two Chicago Hoodlums To
Death In Detroit Similar To
Valentines Day Slayer

DETROIT, Mich., July 4. (AP)—Police today said the description of the man who shot and killed two Chicago hoodlums in downtown Detroit last night, while hundreds of persons ran for cover, tallied with that of Fred Burke, long sought throughout the country for the slaying of seven Chicago gangsters on St. Valentine's day, 1929, the killing of a St. Joseph, Mich., policeman last winter and numerous other crimes.

Whether it was Burke who stepped over to a parked automobile beside the La Salle hotel, emptied his pistol and then sauntered into the hotel to disappear during the excitement was a matter of almost pure speculation, but officers said the slaying had several angles to recommend it as a Burke execution.

Racketeers Slain
Those slain last night were William Cannon and George Collins, Chicago beer racketeers. Mike Stitzel, who was with them in the car, was shot three times and wounded critically. All three victims had police records. Stitzel said he had known Cannon and Collins only a short time, but police doubted this.

Officers said they believed the victims had been drawn to the scene of the shooting through a telephone call, and that the manner in which the executions were carried out indicated the shooting had been planned. Stitzel said he believed it was a chance meeting. The three men had just come from a "pool" game, Stitzel said, and entered the car which was parked by the side entrance of the hotel when the assassin stepped to the side of the car and fired six shots through the open windows. All of the shots took effect.

Woman Is Witness
A woman on her way to prayer meeting was within a few feet of the slayer and was able to describe him for police. She said he was more than six feet tall and weighed about 200 pounds. He wore a blue suit and a Panama hat, she said. The car in which the men were slain bore Illinois license plates issued to Julia Kuffel, widow of Henry Connors, who was shot to death eight months ago in the C.

Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. HUNN

General Topic:
Abraham, A Pioneer of Faith.Scripture Lesson:
Gen. 12:1-3, 13:7-12; Heb. 11:8-10.

1. Now Jehovah said unto Abram, Get thee out of thy country and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto the land that I will show thee:

2. And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing:

3. And I will bless them that curse thee, and him that curseth thee will I curse, and in thee shall all the families of the earth be blessed.

4. Gen. 13:7. And there was a strife between the herdsmen of Abram's cattle and the herdsmen of Lot's cattle, and the Canaanite and the Gerizite dwelt there in the land.

5. And Abram said unto Lot, Let there be no strife, I pray thee, between me and thee, and between my herdsmen and thy herdsmen; for we are brethren.

6. Is not the whole land before thee? separate thyself, I pray thee, from me: if thou wilt take the left hand, then I will go to the right; or if thou take the right hand, then I will go to the left.

7. And Lot lifted up his eyes, and beheld all the plain of the Jordan, that it was well watered every where, before Jehovah destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah, like the garden of Jehovah, like the land of Egypt, as thou goest unto Zoar.

8. And Lot chose him all the plain of the Jordan, and Lot journeyed east, and they separated themselves the one from the other.

9. Abram dwelt in the land of

Canaan, and Lot dwelt in the cities of the plain, and moved his tent as far as Sodom.

10. Heb. 11:8. By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed to go out, unto a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing whither he went.

11. 9. By faith he became a sojourner in the land of promise, as in a land not his own dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise:

12. 10. For he looked for the city which hath the foundations, whose builder and maker is God.

13. Golden Text: By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed to go out unto a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing whither he went.—Heb. 11:8.

14. Time.—Abraham born, B. C. 2003. Abraham goes to Canaan, B. C. 1928. Separation from Lot, B. C. 1924. Rescue of Lot, B. C. 1921. Destruction of Sodom, B. C. 1904. Isaac born, B. C. 1903. The Isaac sacrifice, B. C. 1873. Death of Sarah, B. C. 1869. Birth of Jacob and Esau, B. C. 1844.

15. Death of Abraham, B. C. 1828.—W. J. Beecher.

16. Place.—Ur of the Chaldees, Haran in Mesopotamia, Bethel, north of Jerusalem.

17. Introduction
The race seemed verging again on the brink of those heathen and unnatural crimes which had already devastated its almost total destruction, and it was evident that some expedient must be speedily adopted to arrest the progress of moral declension, and to save man-

kind. This enterprise was undertaken by him whose delights have been with the sons of men, and who in after days could say, with majestic emphasis, "Before Abraham was, I AM." And he accomplished his purpose then, as so often since, by separating to himself one man, that through him and his descendants, when they had been thoroughly purified and prepared, he might operate upon the fallen race of man, recalling it to himself and elevating it by a moral lever, working on a pivot outside itself.—F. B. Meyer.

18. Abraham
Abraham's birthplace was "Ur of the Chaldees," now identified by most scholars with the modern Jughair, in Southern Babylonia, bordering on the district called Chaddes. This region had been settled, for the most part, by descendants of Ham, who were grossly idolatrous.

19. Abraham's father was Terah, who was an idolater (Josh. 24:2). At Ur of the Chaldees Abraham married the beautiful Sarah, and after this marriage, for some reason not stated, Terah set out for the land of Canaan, a journey of about nine hundred miles making the usual detour to the north. After traveling about two hundred and forty miles to the northwest the little party reached Haran, a city of Mesopotamia, where Terah settled down, abandoning his purpose to go to Canaan. There he remained probably for sixty years, dying at the age of 205.

20. The Call of Abraham, v. 1
"Now Jehovah said unto Abram," "Abram" means "exalted father." The Lord afterwards changed his name to Abraham (Gen. 17:8), which has the same meaning, emphasizing the idea of exaltation.

21. "Get thee out of thy country," Probably Ur at first, and now Haran where he had been long enough to

make it his familiar and dear home. "And from thy kindred, and from thy father's house," Abram left most of his kindred in Mesopotamia, and sent thither, years after this, for a wife for his son Isaac. Thither too, his grandson Jacob went in his turn, to find a wife among his kindred.

22. "Be Thou A Blessing," v. 2
"And I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and be thou a blessing." Here is a great Christian principle thus early in the Bible. Those whom God has blessed are in their turn to bless others. "We thank thee for the pleasures we have enjoyed and for those we have been able to confer." So runs a prayer of a favorite writer. Our own blessing is likely to wither unless we try to extend it to others. Christians wonder often that they have so little joy in their own hearts. Frequently the reason lies in the fact that they have not made themselves a blessing to others.

23. "And I will bless them that bless thee." God is on the side of his saints. God, we may say, is grateful for any kindness shown to them. Christ said that the least service done to his poor, his sick, his prisoners, his strangers, is a service done to him, and will be richly rewarded. So it was with Abram and his friends all through the life of this Friend of God.

24. Abraham Goes To Canaan, vs. 4-9
"So Abram went, as Jehovah had spoken unto him," one of the most glorious examples of obedience in all history. PAY DIRT

A BIT of yellow ore or a spurt of black liquid from the bowels of the earth will attract thousands eager to invest their capital and labor in the hope of reaping fortunes. A rumor and the rush is on. What is true of the gold rush and the oil boom is true of communities. Let the outside world know that in Lubbock it will find unusual business opportunities and industrial advantages and it will buy its own ticket.

Why do not more communities take this lesson from the gold rush? Many can trace their growth in population and prosperity to the day they decided to broadcast the news that they had something the world wanted. Notable examples have been Los Angeles, the Florida resorts, Detroit, all of which sprang into prominence almost overnight.

Every city and town has its "vein of gold" or its "oil gusher" and Lubbock is no exception. Too frequently, communities wait to be discovered from the outside. They do not even know themselves.

There is no more propitious time than the present for Lubbock to discover itself and then to tell the world about what it discovers. There is not a citizen who does not believe that this is the very community for which many are even now searching. Even those who have not yet discovered its natural resources do not doubt their existence. Community prospecting always produces "paying dirt."

THE SEARCH FOR OIL

With oil, the world's present problem is not finding ways and means to get along with an inadequate supply. That is a problem for the distant future. The task at hand is one having to do with elimination of waste, prevention of overproduction, and conservation of the untapped reservoirs.

For many years men have tumbled over one another in their haste to discover, and to drain, the world's oil reservoirs. It mattered not whether there was immediate demand for the output. When production exceeded consumption huge tanks were built in which superfluous petroleum could be stored and the cost of building and maintaining these artificial reservoirs was added to the cost of oil. Lately a new policy has been gaining ground. Why not permit the oil to remain underground secure in its natural reservoirs until such time as demand makes necessary its removal?

Though drilling and pumping should not be extended until consumption catches up with production, the world-wide search for new oil-bearing lands should not stop. That the search will go on is evidenced by the application of oil operators for the assignment of five short-wave channels to them so they can use the radio in their research and exploration.

Despite the fact that the supply of oil seems to be inexhaustible, there is constant need for the discovery of new sources of supply, and if the radio is essential to the work of locating and charting these sources the request of the operators should be granted at least in part.

EVOLUTION OF FOOD PRODUCTION

The mechanization of agriculture goes on apace, complicating the problem of the bothersome surplus of agricultural products. The farm population decreases, but machines multiply the productive capacity of those remaining.

This process has advanced tremendously through three factors of comparatively recent origin: The introduction to general use of the tractor, the motor truck and electric power. These have extended vastly the amount of acreage possible to be cultivated by one man. The subject is discussed at length in the latest issue of the year book of the department of agriculture which appeared recently.

Without tractors, says the year book, under old conditions one man could cultivate from 30 to 50 acres of corn. With a tractor and a power cultivator, equipped for four-row cultivation, one man can cultivate from 160 to 200 acres.

"New types of implements for cultivating summer fallow," continues the year book, "have helped to increase the size of farms. One of these is called the 'duckfoot.' Some wheat growers substitute this for the plow. One farmer, using 16-horse teams on 12-foot duckfoot cultivators, is able to farm 1,000 acres."

No wonder such a revolution in methods involves need of readjustments. Mass consumption would appear to be required to meet the efficiency of such mass production. The problem seems to be up to the economists to make available to all the hungry the superabundance of food it is possible to produce.

WAR REPARATIONS BONDS CONTINUE AS SUBJECT OF DEBATE BY OPPOSITION WHO FEAR ENTANGLEMENTS ABROAD

WASHINGTON, July 4. — Uncle Sam repeatedly has refused to take any hand in collecting the allies' war claims from Germany. The Germans have begun issuing bonds to settle these claims, and it is true that approximately \$100,000,000 of them are being sold to Americans. The U. S. government, however, is not guaranteeing the bonds. They are being sold here with the state department's permission; nothing more. A mere permission does not sound very binding, does it?

"Not very," agrees Senator Henrik Shipstead of Minnesota. "but our state department's utterances hardly ever sound more than 10 per cent as strong in the original as they do later, interpreted."

The European allies' first idea of a satisfactory post-war financial adjustment was to have America attend to collecting German reparations for all of them; meantime advancing to them (the allies) their money. Alternatively they suggested that Uncle Sam cancel their indebtedness to himself and keep the reparations, as collected from Germany, in lieu of them.

History records that the U. S. balked on this scheme. Since something had to be done immediately, the Dawes plan was fixed up. Under it the Germans began making reparations payments, but no total was agreed on; it was only a temporary expedient. Later it was supplanted by the Young plan (devised by Owen D. Young) which put matters on a permanent basis. Permanent, that is to say, until German reparations were paid in full (if ever) a couple of generations hence.

The allied governments want to realize cash much sooner than that.

The only way they can do it is to have Germany sell bonds to private capitalists—big and little. English, French and every other nationality of capitalists, perhaps including some individual Germans, and especially including American capitalists, must turn over the proceeds to them (the allied governments).

To float these bonds, pay the allies, make subsequent collections from Germany and see the bondholders get their interest and principal, the Young plan created a world bank called the Bank of International Settlements.

The Bank for International Settlements now has a batch of approximately \$300,000,000 of German reparations bonds to market shortly. It sought buyers for a third of them in America. It hoped, too, that the U. S. federal reserve system would act as its representative in placing them here.

This would have given the transaction a modicum of the American official flavor which the allies so long have desired, but for the doleful time Uncle Sam sidestepped.

With a financial sigh the international bank management thereupon arranged with Morgan & Co. to find customers here for its securities.

Now it has become quite the custom in the last few years for American financiers, wherever they have desired to interest their countrymen in some important foreign venture, to ask the state department whether it had any objection to the enterprise's flotation.

Patriotically thoughtful as this policy may be, there has been considerable complaint concerning it, on the ground.

1. That folk are likely to mistake an expression of mere official acquiescence for an actual endorsement; indeed, that financiers frequently have tried to create that impression.

2. That folk who place money abroad, under what they consider their government's guaranty, will be apt to demand its help if their investments turn out badly.

At all events, Morgan & Co. applied for the state department's permission to sell German bonds here, obtained it, offered them and in one forenoon had the allotment over-subscribed on a when-issued basis.

Your Health

SLEEP IN ANY POSITION YOU FEEL BEST, SAY MEDICAL EXPERTS

There are all sort of opinions as to the way in which people want to sleep.

Even the United States army urges soldiers to lie flat, all straight, stretched tall, and during sleep not to pull up in the middle. Various medical authorities recommend that one avoid sleeping on the back because this has been associated with bad dreams.

It has been argued that one should not sleep on the left side because this interferes with free action of the heart and requires the stomach to pump its contents against the force of gravity. The vast majority of medical authorities tell people to sleep in any position in which one can sleep most comfortably and sleep best.

In order to determine just how people sleep and in what positions, investigators in the Mellon Institute developed a device for photographing a normal man while asleep. Beside his bed a clock was placed and the motion picture camera used in the investigation revealed the position of the patient and the time at which he happened to be in that position; at the same time an automatic device recorded the change in position and the time at which it took place.

Not only were records made of the normal man, but also of patients in a tuberculosis sanatorium, and of young children, so that in all 150 people were studied. The most typical of the healthy sleepers changed from one position to another between 30 and 45 times in any night of eight hours sleep. The shortest period between changes of position was two and a half minutes. Practically half of the postures that the sleeper assumed were held for less than five minutes; about one-fifth, from five to 10 minutes; about one-tenth, from 10 to 15 minutes. Less often than once a night did a healthy sleeper lie in one position for an hour. Only when a person was given a heavy dosage of sleeping medicine did he lie in one position very long. A healthy sleeper never lay in one position for two hours.

In concluding their consideration, the workers in the Mellon Institute point out that apparently the most restful, quiet sleep is characterized by the use of a considerable variety of bodily positions, all of which are conformed; none of which indicate anything like complete relaxation of the muscles, such as one may observe in a fainting person. The change of position seems to be well adapted to the relief of irritation of some portion of the body set by the last position, or perhaps by the day's activities. In order to get a healthy person to spend a night in any position it would seem to be necessary to strap him on a frame or else to put him in a cast and then prop up the cast.

Epbanks, of Tahoka gave the invocation.

Final report of the credentials committee showed 238 votes in the convention. Membership was announced at 1,741.

One of the interesting reports, although it was a lengthy one, was that of W. L. Suddarth of Tahoka, member of a national commission to draft legislation.

Reports On Work
Mr. Suddarth reported on the work of his committee and the draft of a national rural service reorganization measure before congress, which includes the extended duty bill and the increase of equipment and maintenance bill. These bills are being consolidated into one measure.

During the debate on the resolution, Mr. Suddarth was called upon to defend his proposed legislation several times. He outlined the plan for consolidation of rural routes only when a vacancy exists. Plans for an 8 hour day for rural carriers and included in the work, as well as to fill the vacancies on rural routes by transfer from rural carriers and by a seniority rotation for the local office, then the county and then the state.

O. D. Aston, Dallas, state organizer for the clerks, spoke and urged district meetings of clerks and closer working with the rural carriers and clerks.

Miss Ryars, of Plainville, daughter of a rural carrier, sang "Out Where the West Begins."

Road Problem Talked
W. C. Foote, Petersburg, secretary of the roads committee reported at length on his committee work. We must go after roads with the idea of rendering services to the community," he said. The greatest problem of Texas is that of better roads.

He said there were 5,300,000 farmers, 74 per cent of whom live on dirt roads. He proposed \$75,000,000 a year appropriation for federal rural free delivery roads was explained.

Resolutions Passed

A resolution thanking the Lubbock postmaster and his employees, the chamber of commerce, citizens, Texas Technological college and city officials, the First Baptist church and others, was adopted. Another resolution was an expression of sympathy for the serious losses to members at Frost in the recent cyclone.

The rural service reorganization measure came in for considerable discussion and attempt to amend the committee's report. Finally it was adopted and a resolution recommending a state research committee also adopted.

Minimum Salary Set
After some discussion a resolution calling for a minimum salary of \$2,100 for an 8 hour day was adopted.

A plan favoring a reclassification of first class roads for rural routes and the expenditure of ten per cent of the gasoline tax was adopted.

A resolution opposing a refund of the four cent gasoline tax to rural carriers provided 10 per cent was used to maintain rural roads was tabled.

A clinical and hospitalization service was recommended.

Alvis Williams of the clerks' organization reported his group would go to Waco next year.

Two Seek Meet
Invitations were read from Waco and also Austin.

A lengthy discussion followed on the limiting of the amount to be spent on expenses of delegates to the national convention. After numerous resolutions were offered and discussed at length, it was decided to be governed by the constitution in the matter of the number of delegates and the amount to be spent for their expenses.

The convention adjourned to attend the chicken barbecue in the County Park east of the city. A dance at the Hotel Lubbock closed the night's program.

The crew piloted the ship across the northern Atlantic from Ireland to Newfoundland, where they arrived July 26, and then hopped to New York after refueling.

GIVEN 45-YEAR TERM

Sam Reed Is Found Guilty Of Robbery With Firearms

DENTON, July 4. (AP)—A jury late today assessed a 45-year sentence in convicting Sam Reed on a charge of robbery with firearms. In the holdup June 9 of Frank Evans, 66, storekeeper at Ritter's lake.

REBELLION CRUSHED

Twenty Thousand Are Reported Dead In Chinese War

SHANGHAI, July 4. (AP)—Government armies, advancing from north and south, trapped Kwangsi rebels and bandit hordes in a stubborn three-day battle and crushed the rebellion in southern China, government dispatches said today.

The victory freed 50,000 nationalist troops for use in battle-torn northern China where northern alliance insurgents and government armies are in a vital conflict of China's civil war.

Fifteen thousand rebels and 5,000 nationalists were killed before the Kwangsi rebels and bandits were defeated near Hengchow, Hunan province.

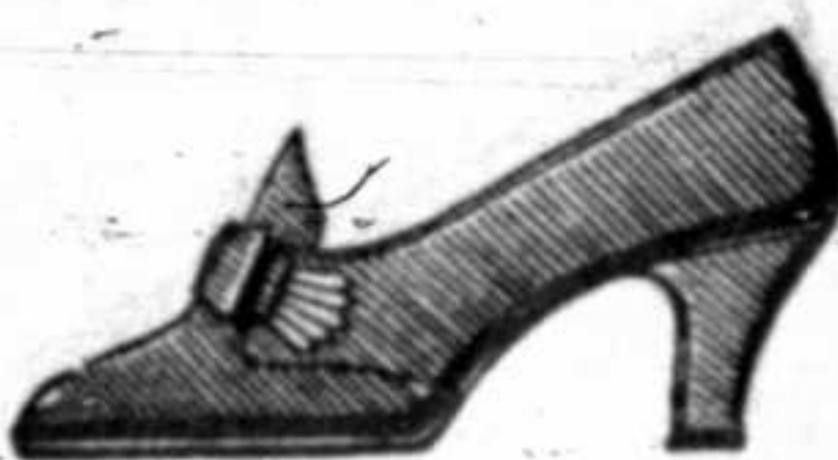
