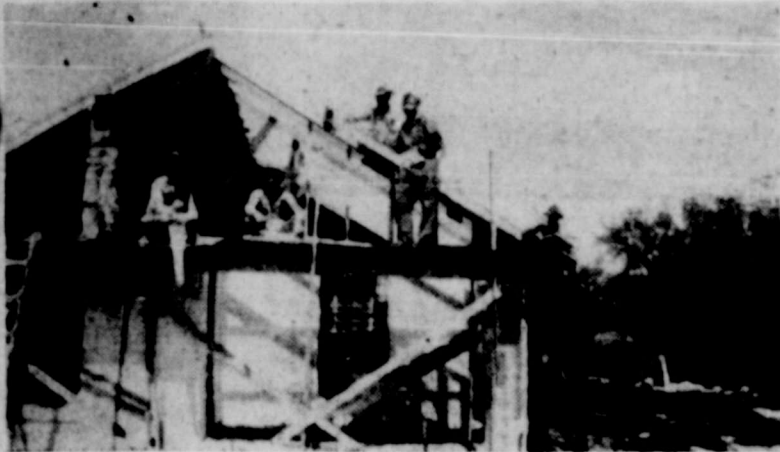

## FELLERS OIL WELL REPORTED DRILLING BELOW 2,000 FEET

American Liberty Oil Company's No. 1 D. A. Fellers Ellenburger test well a mile north of Hico City limits, was reported Thursday to be nearing the half-way mark on the way down to its 4,500-foot contract depth, which officials and crew hoped to reach within 25 days after spudding in Friday, March 25, two weeks ago.

Hole was reported below 2,000 feet, with no other information released except that progress was satisfactory with the rotary rig being used on this location.

## IREDELL WELL READY

Reports from location staked last week 2 miles south of Iredell for American Liberty Oil Company's No. 1 J. W. Clanton indicated that the well was about ready to be spudded in, with Friday set as a tentative date for start of actual operations.

A large rig was moved on the site from near Whitney, after abandonment of a below-7,000-foot well there, and includes three 400-horsepower Diesels and other heavy machinery. Instead of a derrick a 136-foot mast is being used, which is a new type of equipment to this country. The jack-knife mast was raised Tuesday afternoon, and rigging-up was practically completed Thursday.

## THIS RIG WENT ON

Three trucks carrying oil-well machinery lost their way going through Hico Thursday afternoon, and caused some excitement about a new rig being moved in.

Later reports however, were to the effect that the machinery was destined for somewhere below San Antonio.

## CLEAN-UP DRIVE IN CITY ORDERED TO START APRIL 29

The City Council met Monday night, April 4, in regular session, with Dr. H. V. Hedges presiding as mayor, and the following aldermen in attendance: Paul Neel, O. L. Davis, Clyde Ogle, Wallace Ratliff, and Bill Norton.

The following account of the proceedings is taken from the minutes of the city secretary, Mrs. J. R. McMillan.

After reading of minutes, officers' reports, and bills and accounts, same were accepted and ordered filed.

Davis moved and Neel seconded a motion to start the City Clean-Up Campaign April 29, same to run through May 13, two weeks. The motion carried.

Norton moved and Davis seconded a motion, which carried, to appoint L. J. Chaney as fire marshal of Hico.

The council instructed the local officer to enforce an ordinance in regard to turning waste water into the city streets and alleys. A copy of the ordinance appears in an official notice elsewhere in this issue of the paper.

## Demonstration On Frozen Foods At Stephenville April 11

A special meeting on Frozen Foods will be presented in the Recreation Building at the Stephenville City Park on Monday, April 11, from 2 to 3:30 p. m. Varieties of foods for freezing will be discussed.

Several varieties of peaches furnished by West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, (near Stephenville) will be displayed as frozen products.

Demonstrations on preparing foods for freezing, proper packaging and storage, and Frozen Food Cookery will be included.

This will be a joint meeting sponsored by the Erath County Electric Co-op Association under the direction of Miss Hannah Nabors, Electrification Advisor, and the Erath County Extension Service under the direction of the Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Elsie Short.

A major part of the program will be presented by rural persons who have home freezers or a locker in a locker plant.

The meeting is open to all individuals or groups interested in Frozen Foods.

## Funeral Here, Burial At Walnut Springs for Mrs. Leora A. Knight

After a valiant struggle against illness throughout the past six years, the last four of which were spent as an invalid, Mrs. Leora A. Knight departed this life Sunday at the home of her daughter here, Mrs. J. W. Jones.

Funeral services were held at Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Burial was at Walnut Springs.

Mrs. Knight was born March 9, 1859, in Union County, Ill., the daughter of Bird and Ann Keaton. She came to Texas with her mother and brother in 1878 and settled near Glen Rose. In 1879 she was married to D. W. Murphy. To this union were born Mrs. Addie Mae Jones of Hico, Mrs. Lillie B. Mickey of Houston, and Franklin Murphy, deceased. This union was dissolved by death in 1885.

In 1886 she married Ruben M. Knight, to which union was born Mrs. Bird Ann Bohannon of Walnut Springs. Besides the above-named daughters she is survived by 16 grandchildren, 24 great-grandchildren and 3 great-great-grandchildren.

Mr. Murphy preceded her in death 50 years ago. Mrs. Knight was 90 years old and 29 days of age at the time of her death. She had lived all of this long life, except the 19 years at place of birth, near Glen Rose and in Walnut Springs until two and a half years ago when she came to live with Mrs. Jones.

## J. C. WHITESIDE LOSES LIFE TUESDAY IN TRACTOR MISHAP

The body of Clarence Whiteside, 60, was found crushed beneath a tractor just after noon Tuesday on his farm five miles north of Hico. He had been dead several hours when found, according to attendants from Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home who answered an ambulance call and had to return to town for help in removing the body from under the tractor.

Mr. Whiteside, prominent farmer and ranchman who had lived at the place, part of the old Goughly property for a number of years, had left early Tuesday morning to pull up some posts with a power lift attachment to his tractor, and was engaged alone when the accident occurred.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Clairette Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. J. L. Ray of Hico and Rev. Erwin Holt, Methodist pastor at Clairette. Burial was in the Clairette cemetery. Pallbearers were L. J. Chaney, Rudolph Koonsman, W. H. Koonsman, N. N. Akin, Grafton Warren, and Glen Higginbotham.

John Clarence Whiteside was born May 1, 1888 in Polk County, Arkansas, moving to Texas with his family in 1899.

He was married in 1913 to Henrietta Goughly, who survives. To this union three children were born: L. R. (Jack) Whiteside of Odessa, Mrs. H. A. Warren Jr., of Hico, and one son who died in infancy. He is also survived by one brother, Eural Whiteside of Stephenville; three sisters, Mrs. Sallie Stewart of Colorado City, Mrs. J. H. Alexander of Hico and Miss Pearl Whiteside of Stephenville; and four grandchildren, Wayne, Peggy Joyce and Margaret Ann Warren of Hico, and Shearley Lou Whiteside of Odessa.

Mr. Whiteside united with the Baptist church at the age of 19. He had many friends who are grieved at his untimely passing.

The bag wardrobes represent the season's new fashion trends and include styles for both women and children.

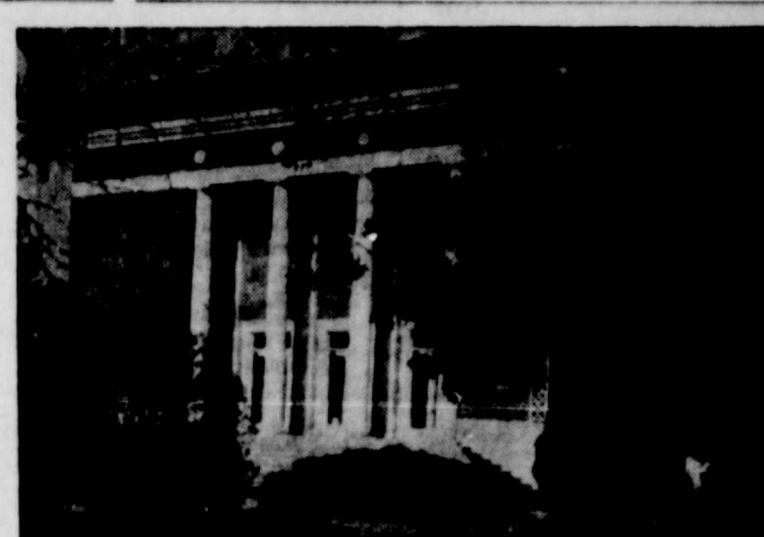

The other show, "Cinderella Sacks," presents 20 cotton bag fashions varying from juniors' and misses' dresses to mature styles.

Thousands of women in every section of the country have seen the amazing results of cotton bags sewing at Cotton Council fashions shows during the past three years.

All the colorful costumes in the shows have been designed from printed and solid cotton material that originally was used to make feed and flour containers.

## Veterans' News

Q—I interrupted my training under the GI Bill and now would like to resume training at once. May I go back to my classes anytime?

A—Before you resume your interrupted training you should get a supplement certificate of eligibility from VA.

Q—Are patients in Veterans Administration hospitals permitted unlimited participation in competitive sports?

A—Patients may participate only with the permission of the doctor in each case. An average of 43,000 veterans per month have been participating in various sports at hospitals and homes.

Q—I wish to take on-the-job training. Where should I apply?

A—Apply at your nearest VA office. Take along a certified or photostatic copy of your discharge papers. If you are married or have one or more dependents and want subsistence allowances, take along your marriage certificate and other documents that will establish your dependency claim.

Q—I have completed my on-the-job training course and have some entitlement left. I would like to take another course. May I enroll at another school?

A—You may use any remaining entitlement either for on-the-job training or for educational training with VA's prior approval.

## Tuberculosis Survey In Hamilton County Expected to Start Soon

Hamilton, April 1.—Bob Miller, business man and veteran of World War II, has been named to head a county-wide tuberculosis survey sponsored by the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce and conducted by a mobile X-ray unit of the State Department of Health.

The survey will be held May 18 to 21 inclusive. An attempt will be made to secure chest X-rays of every person in the county 15 years old or over.

Miller will be assisted by Jack S. Priddy, secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

## Woodard and Wooton Elected Saturday As Hico School Trustees

J. B. Woodard and J. B. Wooton were elected trustees of the Hico County Line Independent School District Saturday, April 2, in an election held at the Hico City Hall, and they will serve for the next three years. Woodard received 96 votes, Wooton 77, and Morgan Moon 39. There were 106 ballots counted. The two new trustees will replace Ellis H. Randalls Jr. and I. J. Teague, whose terms had expired. Hold-over members of the Board are J. D. Jones, Grady Hooper, Hardy Parker, E. C. Allison Jr., president, and W. M. Horsley, secretary.

D. F. McCarty served as presiding officer for the election. His assistants were Miss Louise Blair, Mrs. Clara Duzan and A. A. Brown.

## Two New Aldermen Elected to Serve City In Voting Tuesday

Weldon Pierce and Max Hoffman were elected aldermen in a City election held Tuesday at the Hico City Hall. Pierce led the ticket with 98 votes. Hoffman received 76. Sim W. Everett and Ben Wright received 37 and 28 respectively. A total of 123 votes were cast.

A. A. Brown was presiding officer for the election, and was assisted by Mrs. Marvin Marshall, Joe A. Guyton and Mrs. L. J. Chaney.

Pierce and Hoffman will serve two years. Other members of the City Council who were elected last year for two-year terms are O. L. Davis, M. S. Norton, Wallace Ratliff, and Mayor H. V. Hedges. Retiring members are Paul Neel and Clyde Ogle.

## Driver Education Training Available to Teachers In U-T Course

Austin, Texas, April 4.—The college or high school teacher interested in driver education for young people will find courses designed for him at the University of Texas May 23-27 and May 30 to June 4.

Cooperating with the University's extension division and College of Education in sponsoring the courses are the state department of education, state department of public safety, state highway department, Texas Safety Association, Texas Automotive Dealers Association, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, and American Automobile Association.

Purpose of the course is to train teachers in driver education so schools may offer young people driver training as part of their high school curriculum. The May 23-27 session is for college teachers who, upon completion of the certified course, will be qualified to instruct high school teachers. The May 30 to June 4 course is for high school teachers who will return to their schools to train young people in correct driving methods.

Fee for the course is \$10 and special housing arrangements have been made for students in one of the University dormitories. Application blanks and additional information can be obtained from Dr. D. K. Brice, Department of Physical and Health Education chairman, University of Texas.

### AAA Administrative Officer Gives Some Timely Information

**SUBJECT PRICE SUPPORTS**  
It looks like the Department of Agriculture is going to make every effort possible to support the price on cotton, corn, wheat, barley, rye and grain sorghums and other farm products.

If this is done they must control production. The State Office has asked the Production and Marketing Administration or AAA to get the following information from farm owners or renters. We must have as accurate information as possible on the number of acres each farmer had planted to each crop as of 1945, 46, 47, 48, and 49. If you don't have this information, or you have just purchased the farm try to get the information from the last owner or your neighbors. By all means, be sure you get what information you can. If you have to guess at the acreage your guess will be better than ours. All cropland must be accounted for.

It looks like cotton and wheat will be under allotments in 1950, therefore we must get this information as soon as possible, because wheat allotments should be in the hands of farmers by August 1, 1949, and cotton should be before January 1, 1950. This is going to be a big job and we will need all of the information you can give us. If you know anyone that owns a farm in Hamilton County that does not participate in the farm program, please give us his name and address; or have him get in touch with the AAA office. If you don't understand about the support price program, ask one of the Committeemen in your community. The County Committeemen are: Ernest P. Schwalbe, Jonesboro; Edward Perkins, Evant; and Bailey Sharp, Carlton.

The Community Committeemen are: Virgil C. Battershell, Carlton; Emmett Luker, Hico; Otho Stuckey, Carlton; W. R. Hampton, Hico; Carl B. Blum, Cranfills Gap; Ovie M. Dittich, Jonesboro; Cecil Trigg, Jonesboro; Woodson E. Farmer, Evant; Jack Cates, Evant; Curtis A. Keller, Hamilton; Henry L. Marwitz, Comanche; Albert Jahns, Pottsville; and Rudolph F. Wagner, Hamilton.

Each farmer that we have any record of as to the owner or operator, will be mailed a news letter with a form on the bottom of the letter. Please execute this form and bring it to the county office when we ask for it, on the day that we ask you to bring it, if possible. If not, any time in April, but be sure you bring the form filled out or if you have changed places be sure you have the right place and farm number.

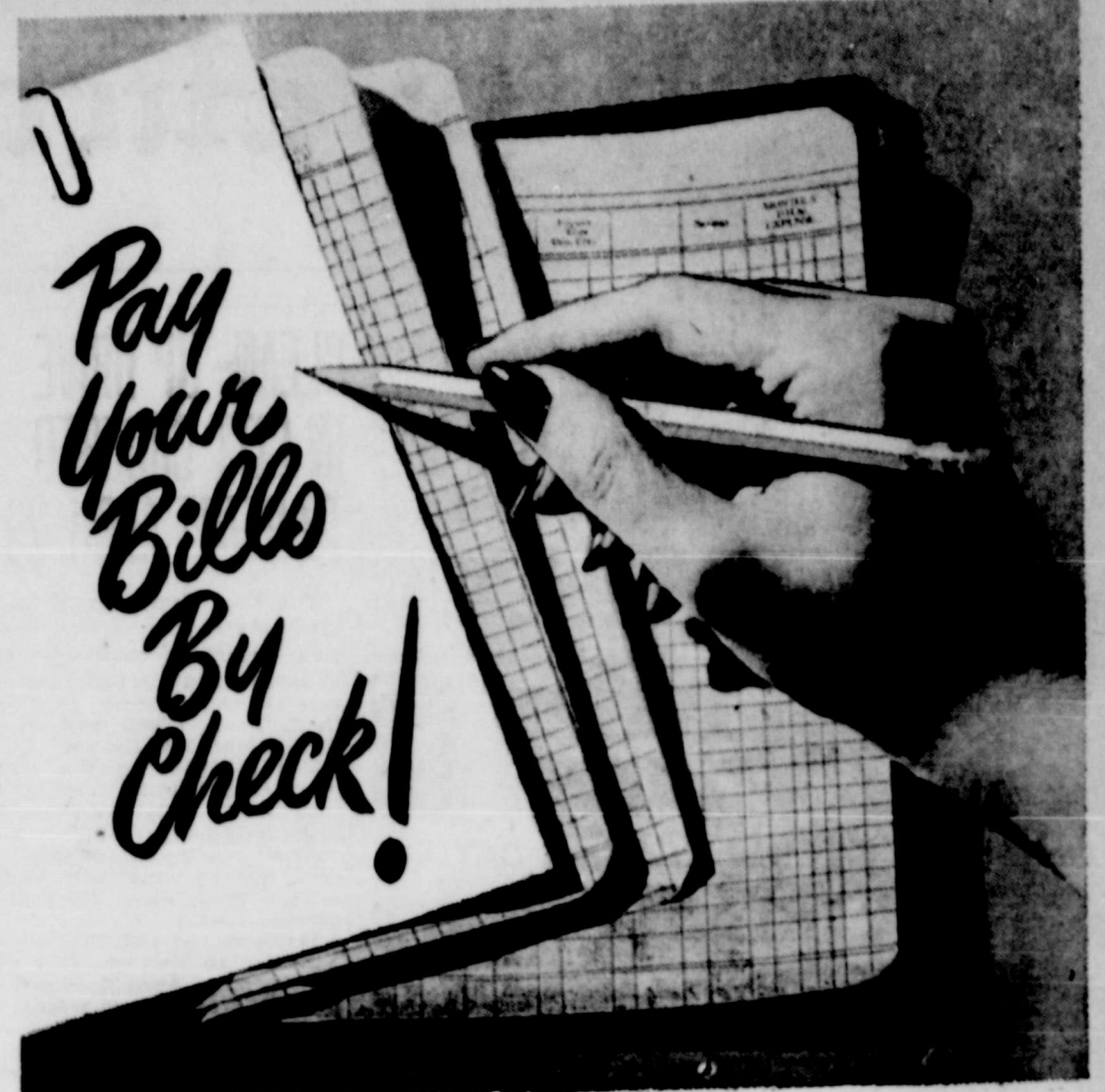

## Successful Parenthood

**NOT LONG AGO** we were discuss-  
ing a motion picture with a  
group of women whose task it was  
to decide whether or not the film  
was suitable for children. One of the  
committee members remarked indig-  
nantly, "But the boy told a bare-  
faced lie—how can you recommend  
the film for children?"

As a matter of record, the film  
was finally considered too ma-  
ture for children under 12, but  
not because of the boy's false-  
hood. That, in fact, was in the  
opinion of most of the commit-  
tee one of those inescapable lies  
that most children succumb to  
now and then. The boy told a lie  
because the truth was too pain-  
ful for him to utter.

The circumstances were these: the  
boy's beloved pony was dying and  
he knew it. But when a bunch of  
neighbor children tramped by to see  
him ride the pony they had heard  
so much about, he couldn't say, "You  
can't see my pony—he's in the barn  
sick—he's going to die." To put that  
terrible truth into words would have  
required age and maturity. So the  
boy said instead, "My father took  
the pony in town to get him shod."

This was not the fabrication  
of what strict disciplinarians  
used to call "a natural born  
liar." It was a defense against  
the hurts of life put up by one  
too young to know better.

The film, incidentally, is John  
Steinbeck's "The Red Pony" and  
this isn't the only example of its  
insight into childhood's problems.  
Indeed, parents could benefit greatly  
in increased understanding by see-  
ing it. An undercurrent to the whole  
story is the unhappiness of the boy's

parents. It isn't anything serious—  
like poverty, or infidelity or drunk-  
enness. It is just the inability of two  
young people to understand what is  
in each other's hearts. The father is  
unconsciously jealous of his son's  
devotion to the hired man, who is a  
hero to the boy because he knows so  
much about horses.

Instead of acknowledging this to  
himself, the husband takes out his  
unhappiness on his wife's father—a  
garrulous old man whose long and  
oft-repeated tales of leading a car-  
avan across the desert—"western" he  
calls it—irritate the younger man.  
This, in turn, puts the wife on the  
defensive out of loyalty to her father.

This familiar situation is  
sketched in the film from the  
point of view of its effect on the  
boy. The youngster doesn't miss  
a bit of the tension between his  
parents. Being a sensitive lad, he  
feels sorry for his grandfather,  
too, and tries in little, ineffectual  
boyish ways to comfort him.

If you suppose for one minute that  
you can bring children up in a tense,  
quarrelsome atmosphere and not  
have them equally tense and on  
their guard against the unpleasant-  
ness they dread, this film should  
help make it clear that children ab-  
sorb as much through their feelings  
as through the words they hear  
spoken.

Another extreme example, that of  
a child's need to strike back at the  
injustices of life, is shown in the  
boy's insane attack on the vultures  
which he finds winging over his  
pony's body. The next time your  
child deliberately kicks a chair or  
mistreats his pet, try to find out  
what it is in his own life he is try-  
ing to get even with.

### Former Rotcies Are Eligible to Enlist In Army Reserve Corps

Austin, Texas, April 5.—Former  
ROTC students who have success-  
fully completed Senior ROTC in-  
struction are eligible to enlist in  
the Enlisted Reserve Corps. Col-  
onel, Oscar B. Abbott, Executive  
for the Texas Military District, an-  
nounced here today.

"These former students may en-  
list in the ERC in a grade com-  
mensurate with the number of  
years of training which they have  
received," said Colonel Abbott.  
"For one year of training a man  
may enlist in Grade VI, Private;  
two years of training, Grade V,  
Private First Class; and for three  
years of training he may enter in  
Grade IV, Corporal."

The Organized Reserve Corps is  
currently conducting a drive to  
bring its strength up to mobiliza-  
tion requirements. As of Decem-  
ber 1, last year, there were 270,000  
male Reserve Officers, 4,500 WAC  
Reserve Officers and 47,000 En-  
listed reservists on the rolls. How-  
ever, many of these thousands are  
inactive and many other thousands  
are coming to the end of their  
first enlistment. The interest of  
the inactive Reservists must be  
revitalized and the service of pre-  
sent Reservists retained if mobiliza-  
tion requirements are to be met.  
Numerous benefits are available  
through an enlistment in the ERC.  
Some of these are:  
Active duty training with full

pay of the grade held in the ERC;  
Eligibility to attend, as a student,  
Army Service Schools on an  
active duty status with full pay  
and allowances;

Eligibility to enroll in an Army  
Extension School at absolutely no  
cost to the Reservist and

A five per cent increase in longe-  
vity pay for every three years of  
service completed in the Enlisted  
Reserve Corps.

"In addition to the above-men-  
tioned benefits which a man may  
obtain, there are also promotions  
to consider," continued Colonel  
Abbott. "Enlisted Reservists as-  
signed to an active Reserve Unit  
may be promoted under the same  
conditions as enlisted men of the  
Regular Army. Promotions are  
made by the Reserve Unit Com-  
mander. Promotions to a higher  
grade in the ERC carries all the  
advantages of increased pay while  
on active duty and also for in-  
active duty training."

Full information of the Enlist-  
ed Reserve Corps may be obtained  
at the Local OR Instructor's office  
or at the nearest Recruiting Sta-  
tion.

Aviation Cadet training by the  
U. S. Air Force includes such ac-  
ademic studies as aircraft engineer-  
ing, weather, navigation, and com-  
munications.

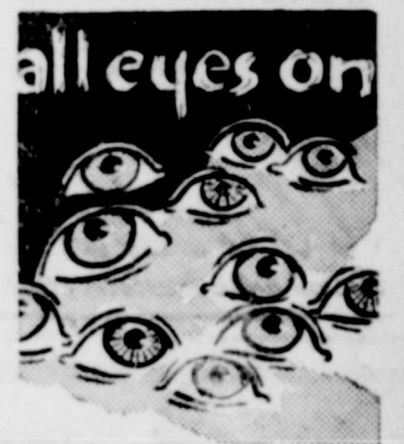

### Qualified Workers In Welfare Commission Still In Demand

The Merit System Council, which serves as a "clearing house" for positions in the State Department of Public Welfare and the Texas Employment Commission, will hold open competitive examinations on May 7, 1949, for a number of positions now open in those agencies, according to Chas. S. Gardiner, Director of the Merit System Council.

There is an increasing need for workers in the State Department of Public Welfare and the Texas Employment Commission. The immediate need for professional workers consists of Field Worker, with the Public Assistance Program; Child Welfare Worker and Senior Child Welfare Worker, with the Child Welfare Program; and Interviewer III with the Texas Employment Commission.

Stenographic and clerical needs consist of Stenographer II, Junior Stenographer, Clerk-Typist, Clerk IV, Apprentice Clerk, and Key Punch Operator.

The Council points out that applications for these examinations must be made out on an official application blank which may be obtained from local agency offices or by writing to the Merit System Council, 808 Tribune Building, Austin, Texas.

The closing date for submission of applications is April 16.

### Veteran Congressman To Head Southwestern Legal Foundation

Dallas, April 4.—Hutton W. Summers, former congressman, will serve as research director of the Southwestern Legal Foundation, according to an announcement by R. G. Storey, Dean of S. M. U. School of Law and president of the legal foundation.

Summers has announced that he will work without pay. A veteran of 34 years in Congress, he also is the donor of \$11,000 to help finance work of the foundation.

A campaign to raise \$1,000,000 to finance construction of two law buildings on the SMU campus is in progress, Storey said. The drive will end May 15. Southwestern lawyers have pledged \$250,000 toward the million-dollar building fund. The remaining \$750,000 is being sought from Dallas business interests.

John W. Carpenter, president of Texas Power and Light Company, is chairman of the fund drive. Buildings to be constructed will house the SMU School of Law, and offices and libraries of the Southwestern Legal Foundation.

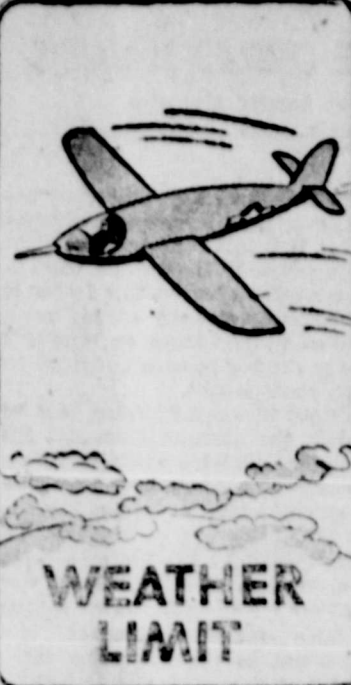

### KNOW YOUR WEATHER

### Downward Trend In Business Indicates Turning Point At Hand

Austin, Texas, April 4.—Continuing the downward trend in February, the index of business activity in Texas dropped 2 per cent from January, after adjustments for seasonal variation, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. With the exception of small increases in November and December, the Bureau's index has been declining since August when it reached a postwar high of 233 per cent of the 1935-39 base period.

Dr. John R. Stockton, statistician for the Bureau, said the widespread nature of the decline throughout the various phases of the economic activity of the State, combined with the fact that business all over the country is showing the same kind of weakness, gives rise to the belief that a major turning point in business activity is at hand.

Whether or not this is the turning point in a major cycle of business, or is a minor cyclical decline such as the last quarter of 1937, cannot be determined this early in the decline, Dr. Stockton stated. The composite index has dropped only two times since 1935, for enough consecutive months to represent more than an erratic fluctuation in business. Since one of these declines, in the last half of 1945, represented the period of reconversion from the expanded war production, there has been only cyclical recession in business activity since 1935. It is generally considered that the upswing in business after the long decline of the early thirties began in March 1933, which means that for 16 years the level of business activity has been expanding almost all of the time.

All but one of the companies of the composite index of Texas business declined in February. Miscellaneous freight carloadings dropped 12 per cent; department and apparel store sales and pay rolls, 4 per cent; crude oil runs to stills, 2 per cent; and employment, a fractional dip. The only component to rise was electric power consumption, which was up 5 per cent.

Dr. Stockton said the decline that has been under way since last August has carried three of the components to levels below that of February 1948. Miscellaneous freight carloadings were down 17 per cent from a year ago, and crude runs to stills and department and apparel store sales were down fractionally from February 1948. Electric power consumption and pay rolls were up 11 per cent from a year earlier; and employment, 5 per cent.

Retail trade in February showed a substantial rise from the January level, with the Bureau's index rising 4 per cent after adjustment for seasonal variation. It is significant that all of the increase in the index of retail sales was in the sales of durable goods stores. The sales of nondurable goods stores declined less than 1 per cent from January, while sales of durable goods stores increased 12 per cent.

Building activity as measured by permits issued in February registered a substantial rise to carry the Bureau's seasonally adjusted index up 12 per cent from January. However, this level is still considerably below the rate of building during 1948, and it was down 21 per cent from February 1948. Except for erratic month-to-month fluctuations that characterize all building permit series, the course of the Bureau's index has been consistently downward since the beginning of 1948. However, the level of building is still extremely high in comparison with pre-war standards, and at no time during the past year has the value of permits issued during a month been less than four times the value of permits issued in the pre-war years.

### State Fair Midway Resumes Business At Same Old Stand

The 1949 version of the State Fair's Million Dollar Midway is ready to take up where it left off last October after entertaining nearly four million fun-loving Texans.

The colorful Midway, facelifted with thousands of gallons of exciting paint mixed with imagination, will reopen for its fourth post-war summer season at 6 p. m. Saturday, April 16, R. L. Thornton, president of the State Fair, has announced.

The Midway will open daily, through mid-September, from 6 p. m. until midnight on weekdays, and from 2 p. m. until midnight on Sundays.

Fair officials, hoping for the largest and most gala opening night in the history of the summer operation, are angling for what they believe is the country's most daring outdoor free attraction, an act which has caused a sensation wherever shown.

Latest type floodlights, mounted on spectacular new towers and providing three times as much light as formerly, will greet summer visitors this year. Also new to summer guests will be the imposing new entrance arch of flashing neon which was seen for the first time at the Fair last year.

The Midway's \$75,000 Kiddie Town, introduced last summer, has been augmented with two new attractions, weaving dragon and fish rides right out of the world of fantasy.

Other changes include the addition of glistening new food stands, the redecoration of the picnic shelter, and lengthening of the grandstand race track to a quarter mile for midget car and motorcycle racing.

### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Attention is called to the following ordinance which the City Officer has been ordered to enforce:
