BIG RODEO IS FEATURE FOR THE AFTERNOON

Another big crowd was in Ranger early Monday afternoon for the second of the semi-monthly trades days, with indications that by mid-afternoon it would equal, if not surpass, the crowd of Tuesday, March 10, when the first trades day was held.

The regular trades day features were conducted early in the afternoon, after which a parade formed to go to the rodeo grounds, at Lillard field. The rodeo was in progress at press time Tuesday afternoon.

Plans had been made for a good rodeo, in spite of the fact that so little time was available for working out the details. By mid-morning a number of bucking steers, eight calves for roping and six goats for the goat roping contests were in the pens at the field and others were being brought in rapidly, so that a good bunch of stock was expected before the rodeo started.

An added feature of the rodeo was a famous rodeo clown, with his trick mule, who arrived early in the morning and aided in making preparations for the show.

Many riders and ropers had arrived before noon, and after seeing the layout the conversation drifted to plans for a big, three-day event, to be staged sometime in the summer.

Examination For Postmaster Has Been Called Here

Announcement was made today that civil service examinations will be held here for the position of postmaster of Ranger.

The examination has been called under the order of President Roosevelt, issued on July 12, 1933, and not under civil service rules. Regulations, the order for the examination stated.

Applications for the position will close on April 14. Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated upon their education and training, business experience and fitness.

Application blanks can be obtained at the post office from either Alvin E. Crawley or Max Ohr.

Fewer Applications For Naturalization Are Being Received

EL PASO.—Applications for naturalization papers from aliens in the El Paso district showed a sharp decrease in 1935 over 1934, according to Grover C. Wilmoth, district director of Immigration and Naturalization.

Wilmoth said that in 1935, 590 declarations of intention, or first papers, were taken out and 475 petitions for final papers were filed.

In 1934 the number of declarations taken out totaled 1086 and petitions for final papers were 366.

Wilmoth said that during December, 1935, a rumor was circulated throughout the Southwest that aliens could not obtain relief unless they were in possession of a declaration. Filing fees for declarations were reduced 50 per cent in 1934.

Ninety-six declarations of intention were filed in the U. S. District Court last year and 88 petitions were filed. In 1934 the numbers were 207 and 66, respectively.

Fischer Has High, Roberts Lowest County Tax Rates

AUSTIN.—Fischer county has the highest Texas tax rate and Roberts county the lowest, John T. Smith, Austin tax authority shows in a comparative presentation of 1935 county tax rates in the Texas Tax Journal for March.

The county tax rate in Roberts county is 25 cents on \$100 valuation. In Fischer county the rate is \$2.32.

The other lowest four county tax rates are: Caldwell with 49 cents; Austin and Kendall with 42 cents each, and Fayette with 43 cents.

The highest four after Fischer county are Cottle with \$1.93; Liberty with \$1.92; Duval with \$1.90, and Trinity and Delta with \$1.80 each.

Average for the 254 counties of the state was not computed.

CIA Purchases More Land For Campus

DENTON.—The Texas State College for Women has completed negotiations for the purchase of fifty-two acres of land, giving the campus of the school a total of 159 acres, it has been announced.

The addition, formerly the McCullar estate, is more than half as large as the original campus, which contained only 73 acres. The new tract joins the athletic field on the east.

NEW AAA TO BE EXPLAINED AT MEETINGS

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Discarding earlier intentions of holding regional and state meetings during the next 10 days, AAA officials today planned local meetings in almost all counties during the first week of April to present fully to farmers the new \$440,000,000 soil conservation program.

Members of the AAA Washington staff are enroute to points throughout the country to explain the regulations.

One general regional meeting will be held, however, at Salt Lake City in a few days. Officials were said to have decided it would be simpler, less costly and more effective to explain the program to as many field workers as possible here and send staff members in the field to explain the program to those field agents who are unable to visit Washington. In the cases of the far western regions it was felt the regional meetings would be more effective.

WHETHER VOTE MAY BE CALLED REMAINS QUERY

Whether commissioners court can legally authorize an election to determine whether malt or vinous liquors up to 14 per cent alcohol may be sold in the county remained in question Tuesday as officials awaited advice from the Attorney General.

The query was sent last week after a petition for the call of the election was presented to commissioners court.

It was contended by those who filed the petition that the election might legally be called, although in January citizens voted against the legalization of 3.2.

The election was necessitated by the supreme court's ruling last year that a wet area can not exist in a county dry prior to prohibition.

Efforts of two Cisco beer retailers in courts to mandamus County Judge Clyde L. Garrett to hear their application for a permit to sell beer resulted in adverse action for W. H. and C. E. Mayhew.

Welsh Society Is Older Than Nation

PHILADELPHIA.—The Welsh Society of Philadelphia is the oldest society of its kind in the United States—it dates back before the country was founded.

Originally the society was called "The Society of Sons of Ancient Britons," and was designed to aid emigrants entering the Port of Philadelphia in Colonial days. First mention of the group was made in the Pennsylvania Gazette.

"We are informed that several gentlemen and other persons of reputation of the honorable stock of ancient Britons design to erect themselves into a society to meet together annually on the first day of March, or St. David's Day."

Included in the list of Welsh Society members are such great names as Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, and Charles Evans Hughes.

Counsel Complete For McBee Trials

Line-up of counsel for the "hanging skeleton" slaying trials March 30 in 88th district court in the H. L. McBee death was completed Tuesday with announcement of appointment of R. E. Grantham of Cisco and L. H. Flewellen of Ranger to represent Raymond Henry, one of three defendants.

J. Frank Sparks of Eastland is attorney for Mrs. Della Henry, former wife of the man for whose death she is charged.

Frank Judkins of Eastland has been named to represent Lynn Smith, 29, brother of Luther Jackson Smith, 40, also defendant in the case, who killed himself in the county jail Friday night.

The prosecution will be headed by Criminal District Attorney Grady Owen, assisted by Special Prosecutor Allen D. Dabney.

The State contends McBee died of ice pick wounds May 1, 1935, was buried the next day, several weeks later exhumed and the skeleton hanged.

CC DIRECTORS DISCUSS MANY NEW MATTERS

At the regular meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, held in the office of the secretary Monday night, several matters were taken up for discussion and action.

B. H. Peacock and Dean Hiatt, safety directors of the Lone Star Gasoline Company and the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company, were present and outlined tentative plans for the annual Oil Belt Safety Conference, to be held in Ranger early in May.

The directors voted to back the movement in every way possible and to aid in making it even more of a success than it was in 1935, the first year it was conducted. The Chamber of Commerce is to help, among other things, to make the parade, a new feature, one of the outstanding features of the conference.

A. L. Williams and Roy Jacobie, who were visitors, brought up the question of a lighted soft ball field and a committee composed of J. J. Kelly, F. D. Hicks, F. P. Brasher and C. H. Davis was appointed to help work out the details. The directors voted to donate \$10 toward the project.

J. E. Matthews, S. P. Boon and F. D. Hicks were appointed on a committee to go into negotiations for a new office for the Chamber of Commerce and to report to the directors at the next meeting. Directors present at the meeting were Hal Hunter, F. P. Brasher, A. J. Ratliff, Coke Martin, Clyde H. Davis, F. D. Hicks, J. J. Kelly and R. V. Galloway.

New Outbreak In Student 'War' Seen At Abilene Today

ABILENE, March 24.—Another outbreak in the "war" involving students of three colleges, caused presidents of Hardin-Simmons, Texas Tech and McMurray colleges to go into a hurried conference today.

Disciplinary measures thus far have failed to halt the three-cornered "grudge" incidents.

A totem pole on the campus of McMurray was set afire shortly after midnight last night. It had been covered with kerosene. Dormitory students extinguished the fire.

The grudge was traced to the theft, last fall, of a cannon from the Hardin-Simmons campus after a football game. The cannon was found later on the McMurray campus across town. Hardin-Simmons undergraduates blamed Texas Tech students. Last Friday night a concert by the Texas Tech band in the high school auditorium here was interrupted by the throwing of eggs at the stage. A mob fight later took place. Forty Hardin-Simmons students were given 45 demerits each last night, only one short of expulsion.

YOUTH ADMITS HE MURDERED SALESMAN

HOUSTON, March 24.—Vince Ross, nonchalant, curly-haired, confessed slayer of R. W. Albert, 32, Brenham cheese salesman, led officers today to recover a knife with which the killing was committed.

Grinning and waving a cheery good-bye to reporters as he rode away, Ross said, "You'll get a big story when I get back. There is someone else in this. I'm not going to take the rap for them."

Ross was held without bond on a murder charge, following his confession yesterday that he hit Albert on the head several times and then cut his throat.

"I used a knife about the size of my pocket comb to cut him with and hit him with a spring leaf he carried for protection," officers quoted the youth. "I'll be glad to show you where I threw them away."

Motive for the slaying was said to be Ross' lust for money and fashionable clothes. Purchase of a hat and shirt led to the confession. Officers recovered \$122 of the \$129 taken from Albert.

Speech Found To Show Progress of Civilization's March

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal.—Figures of speech, developed during each era of civilization, are, and will be, of the utmost use of etymologists in determining the characteristics of the age that produced them, according to Prof. W. H. Davis, etymologist of Stanford University.

Generations from now, he explains, the fact that the crooner insists his sweetheart is his "Vittorio A. B. and C," or even merely that she is his "sugar plum, and ice cream cone," will indicate to future etymologists that the present era was one of highly developed medical progress and of the art of eating.

Davis insists figures of speech are not slang and do not have the same value in the language. The figures of speech, he points out, specifically name the thing that is being talked about, while slang is usually mere metaphor and hence useless for future etymologists unless they find a modern Rosetta stone that tells them what it is all about.

Modern language is rich with figures of speech that indicate the characteristics of past ages, Davis says. He thinks that traces of the cave age can be found in such figures as "cut-throat tactics" or "wielding the big stick."

"Eavesdropping," he thinks, comes from an English era when someone from an English era when someone substituted it for "Peeping Tom" because the results of the former might be likened to what the raindrops saw as they fell from the eaves.

Dr. Harry A. Merfield of Fort Worth will be the principal speaker. Ranger's portion of the program will be dances by Misses Margaret Watt and Dorothy Henry. A quartet composed of Dace Myers, C. M. Allen, John D. Harvey and B. M. Collie will be Eastland's contribution. Julian Ely will be presented in xylophone numbers by Cisco Rotarians as their part in the banquet program.

Rev. Thurman Morgan of Breckenridge, the host club, is program chairman. An attendance of over 150 is expected.

Eastland Man Is Held In Liquor Case for 'G-Men'

Sheriff Virge Foster stated Tuesday that Paul Tomlin, charged Monday in Justice of the Peace Milton Newman's court at Eastland with transporting liquor, was being held for federal officers. Sheriff Foster said two gallons and one pint of "bootleg" liquor were found in Tomlin's automobile while he was in the north part of Eastland.

Deputy Ray Harwick filed the charges.

EXCISE TAXES ARE APPROVED BY COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The House ways and means subcommittee drafting a tax bill, agreed today to recommend to the full committee a series of excise taxes on agricultural commodities designed to raise \$221,000,000 in additional revenue.

With this agreement the committee, which has been considering the new \$1,137,000,000 revenue program since March 1, adjourned, subject to the call of the chair.

Chairman Samuel Hill, Democrat, Washington, said the group's report for the full committee would be completed in a day or two.

Hill said his committee also had agreed to refund \$35,000,000 in taxes on flour stocks paid by intermediate processors, wholesalers and retailers, under the invalidated AAA.

The treasury did not suggest this refund, Hill added, but did not oppose it.

FREAKS OF THE WEATHER DO MUCH DAMAGE

Hail, rain, dust and high winds traveled erratically across Texas Tuesday in a freakish exhibition of March weather.

Thick dust clouds driven south from the Panhandle by a north wind, sifted over North and East Texas before day and early today had extended almost to the gulf. The most severe portion swept northeast across Kansas and Illinois.

At Tyler a tornado early today, sweeping across East Texas from Chandler, 12 miles west of Tyler, to Longview and Kilgore, caused damage estimated at nearly \$1,000,000.

High winds uprooted trees, toppled oil derricks near Kilgore, unroofed the airport hangar at Tyler, wrecked a hangar and damaged three planes at the Longview airport and damaged crops.

A severe hailstorm shattered plate glass windows in thousands of Tyler homes and business buildings, smashed automobile tops and ruined building roofs. The damage at Tyler was in excess of \$500,000. No one was injured in the storm.

A similar thunderstorm and wind crippled power lines at Texarkana.

The wind shift from the west to northwest brought abatement of the dust which had stifled vast areas of the Panhandle and far West Texas since Sunday. Skies began clearing at Amarillo, Abilene, Big Spring, Midland and El Paso.

Visibility at Fort Worth and Dallas was one mile, at Wichita Falls four miles, Waco three miles, San Antonio four miles, Houston six miles. The weather bureau predicted that even Galveston would have dust by afternoon.

Believes Majority Drivers Obtained Their Licenses

Three-fourths of Eastland county drivers—estimated at 13,000—have obtained their operator's licenses, Chief Deputy Clyde S. Karkalis reported at the tax collector-assessor office Tuesday.

The office again issued an appeal for automobile owners to obtain their car and drivers' licenses.

Deputies have been placed in cities of the county for the convenience of motorists and it was believed with cooperation of the public that majority of the plates and drivers licenses can be issued this week.

The county office is remaining open evenings.

County Is Asked To Help Raise Flood Aid Fund

J. E. Spencer, chairman of the Eastland County Red Cross Chapter, has received a wire from William M. Baxter Jr., manager of the midwestern branch of the National Red Cross, at St. Louis, asking that Eastland county contribute \$185 to the flood relief fund now being raised.

The money thus raised will go to furnishing food, shelter, clothing and medical care for some 280,000 families in 14 states.

President Roosevelt has issued a proclamation calling for prompt and generous contributions to this most worthy cause.

A canvass will not be made in Ranger but it is expected that those who are able to give any amount will do so and all donations will be received and receipted for at the Chamber of Commerce office.

Imagine A Costly War Over a Dismal Land!

Just as if trouble already did not have enough spots to light on, Josef Stalin tells Roy Howard that Soviet Russia will most assuredly go to war if the Japanese make a pass at the far-off and little-known republic of outer Mongolia.

Those intermittent cracklings and sputterings along a hazy boundary line in remote Asia, then, may be the first warnings of a new war; and if war starts there, it would jump all the way to Europe inside of a week.

So we have one more place to watch, and Unga, the windswept capital of a windswept land, adds its name to the world's second Serajevo.

The odd part about this is that neither Russia nor Japan has any direct, all-compelling interest in the Mongolian border or in the land of outer Mongolia itself.

Experts of the Alexander Hamilton Institute surveyed the Mongolian question recently and concluded that for Russia and Japan to fight over Mongolia would be the essence of triple-distilled foolishness.

First, for Russia. It has virtually no trade with Mongolia. And although Mongolia has rich natural resources and offers much room for colonists, Russia—lord of the world's acres—has more than enough of that sort of thing to keep her busy at home.

She is devoting every effort to development and colonization of land she already owns. She simply has not the money, the energy, nor the people to spare for development of Mongolia, and won't have them for years to come. And all that goes double for the Japanese.

The latter have bitten off a huge chunk in Manchukuo. Even now, Tokio financiers are beginning to wonder if they can find the money necessary to finance Manchukuo's continued development. If Mongolia fell right in Japan's lap, it would be many years before the Japanese could do anything with it.

Furthermore, Mongolia is not suitable for Japanese colonization, and its population is so scanty and poor that it offers no market whatever for Japanese manufactured goods.

What this all boils down to is that Mongolia is not worth, to either Russia or Japan, a fiftieth part of what it would cost to fight for it. And yet both nations are ready to fight, their border patrols are tossing stray bricks at each other, and the smallest accident may set off a war.

Surely, if there is any glimmering of ordinary sanity in either Moscow or Tokio, this far eastern war can be averted. If a situation like this can set the world ablaze, then the world has hardly enough good sense to be worth saving.

WASHINGTON
WITH RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON.—Barring a reversal of present trend, Gov. Alfred M. Landon of Kansas will be the Republican nominee to oppose Roosevelt.

Reports and portents from over a wide area indicate strongly that the uninstructed delegations and favorite son delegations which presumably will decide the result at the Cleveland convention will be all set to vote for him—unless something unfortunate happens to him in the meantime.

Evidence that the eastern Republican leaders and the conservative interests they represent are receptive to the Landon candidacy and that important members of the Hoover group are edging toward the governor's handwagon tend to complete the picture, in combination with the popularity of Landon in Chicago and points west, plus straw votes which indicate he has made a hit with the rank and file.

No other candidate shows up in this picture except Senator Borah, whose chances of nomination are considered by political authorities to carry heavy handicaps, such as Borah's age.

THE only fly in the Landon soup—and even this one may soon take wing—seems to be the disposition of many Republican big shots until they are sure that Landon can be held at his present level of prestige.

Even Landon's friends, although believing that he can make a strong appeal to the electorate if Roosevelt proves sufficiently unpopular next fall, do not consider him a ball of fire.

LANDON's western friends, meanwhile, are a bit jittery lest their relatively liberal candidate appear to be too readily acceptable to eastern industrialists and financiers. They insist he isn't the kind of a man who will make deals with reactionary special interests and they don't want anyone to get the idea that he has.

They're worried over reports that Borah will attack Landon as the alleged candidate of "vested interests" and would be just as glad to see Senator Edge of New Jersey, who is so close to Standard Oil, that he doesn't dare light a match, hadn't indicated a preference for the governor.

Dominant Republican figures, including Landontes, profess not to take the Borah candidacy seriously. They admit he will have 150 or 200 delegates and can insist on some voice in the party platform, but think he will be content with that—and re-election as senator from Idaho if he can get it. No one now expects a Borah bolt.

Much can happen in 90 days, Napoleon himself once learned. Meanwhile, there's much to support the theory of Landon that "it's in the bag."

Valley Farmers Get \$1,059,900 Benefit Payments In '35-'36

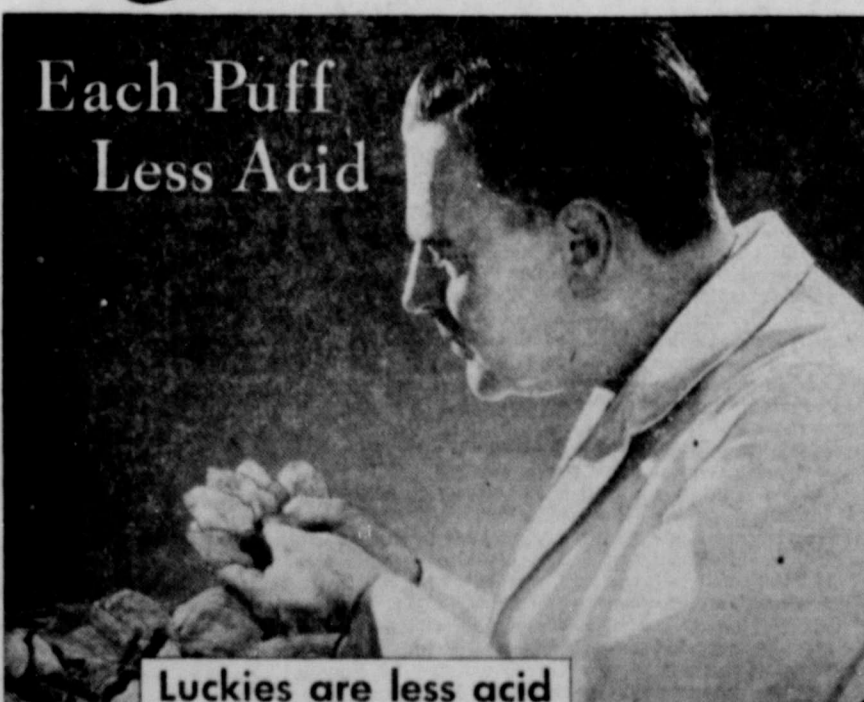
M'ALLEN, Texas.—Lower Grande Valley cotton and hog farmers participating in federal government's agricultural control program from 1935-1936 received a total of \$1,059,900 in benefit payments, according to information received here from the United States Department of Agriculture in Washington.

This sum was divided into \$601,426.51 paid to cotton farmers and \$458,473.35 paid to hog farmers in the corn-hog program. Hidalgo county received a total of \$496,599.88 in benefit payments, of which \$460,181.48 were for cotton payments and \$36,418.40 were for corn-hog payments. Cameron county was second with a total of \$259,611.60.

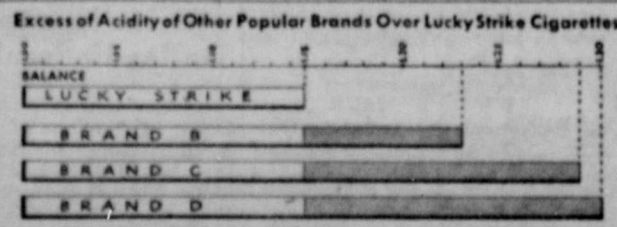
Hidalgo county also led in 1935 totals, released by the department, when its growers received a total of \$258,071.30, which cotton payments amounted to \$236,040.54 and corn-hog payments amounted to \$22,030.76.

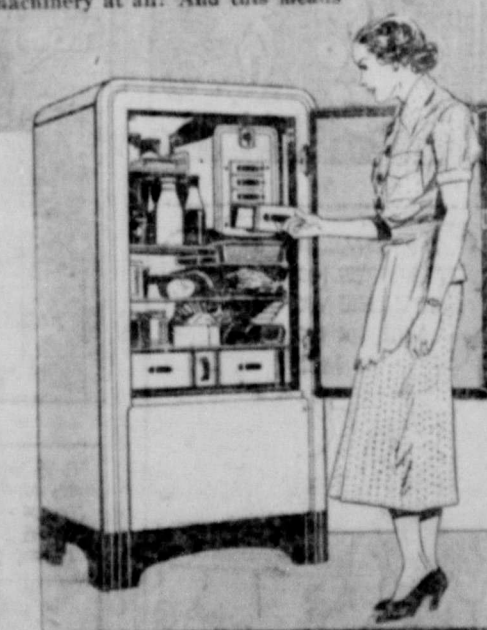

DEPUTY SELLS 78 LICENSES ON FIRST DAY

J. T. Cooper, a deputy from the office of the tax assessor and collector, arrived in Ranger Monday to sell the 1936 automobile licenses. Cooper is to be stationed at the city hall, where licenses can be obtained for the remainder of the month. A total of 78 licenses were sold in Ranger Monday, Monday, Cooper said Tuesday morning.

Those applying for licenses have been requested to bring in their 1935 receipts in order to facilitate issuing the new licenses.

Drivers licenses can be obtained at either Anderson-Pruett or the Leveille Motor Company. Both drivers' licenses and the car licenses must be obtained by March 31 and all cars on the streets or highways on April 1 must have the 1936 plates attached and every operator of an automobile must have his driver's license with him at all times while driving after the last of this month.

No charge is made for the drivers' license, which are issued for a three-year period, and the cost of the 1936 automobile licenses is the same as in 1935.

Those who can do so have been urged to get both the drivers' and automobile licenses as early as possible in order to avoid any congestion at the registration desks the last day of the month.

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
