

Yannigans Prove Stiff Competition, Lose 13 to

SCORE TWICE ON VISITORS

RANGERS UNABLE TO GET IN OLD STRIDE WITH MAR-ION OUT OF GAME, ON INJURIES

The Perryton Rangers were unable to get into their old stride in the grid contest with the Amarillo Yannigans, Friday afternoon but retained enough of their flash to push across the Yannigans goal for two touchdowns, adding one point by kick, holding the visitors scoreless. Marion Tucker, star halfback and passer for the Rangers who was out of the game because of injuries, was badly missed.

The Yannigans got practically all of the lucky breaks of the game yet they did not seem to be satisfied for there was more rangling out on the field than there has been in all the other games the Rangers have played this season.

Bruner kicks off to the Yans 5 yard line the ball being returned to the 22 yard mark. The Yannigans make a yard through the line, 4 yards around right end, a loss of 2 yards around right end and finally punt to Shearer on his 45 yard mark, who gets a yard return. Shearer gains 5 yards around left end Witt 4 off right tackle. Witt takes ball off a pass formation and tears around right end for a 35 yard run to the Yans 10 yard tape.

Touchdown In 4 Minutes. Schollenbarger races around right end for 8 yards. The Yans call time out. Witt pounds through the line for the remaining 2 yards and a Ranger touchdown in the first four minutes of play. Lee Tucker fails to kick goal.

Bruner kicks off again to the 10 yard line the Yans getting a 17 yard return. They gain a yard each on three successive plays and punt to the 28 yard mark where Shearer receives the oval and returns to the 32 yard stripe.

Yans Threaten To Score. Lee fights his way through left tackle for 5 yards, followed by Witt who makes a nother yard. A Ranger pass is intercepted the receiver runs to the 12 yard stripe where he is downed. A play through right tackle and two around right end net 2 yds. each and with the ball on the Ranger 6 yard line the Yans pass but it is incomplete.

Shearer punts to the 35 yard line and it is returned 2 yards. The Yans lose a yard and run out of bounds. A play around right end fails to gain. The Yans are thrown for a 5 yard loss around left end. They punt to the Rangers 14 yard line where the oval is downed by he Yannigans. The quarter ends with the count 6 to 0.

Yannigans Get Fumble. Witt races around right end for 14 yards and a first down. Shearer fumbles and the Yannigans recover on their 23 yard line. The yellow and black team make 4 yards, 2 yards and 5 yards on three plays through right tackle, giving them a first down. A play through right tackle and another around right end net a yard each. The red and white team call time out for Witt who is injured. Another play around right end gains 2 yards. On the last down the Yans pass over the goal line but it is incomplete and the pigskin goes to the Rangers on the 20 yard stripe.

Rangers Show Offensive. Witt smashes his way around right end for 5 yards. Lee ducks through water for nearly 5 more. The Yans substitute Grant for Hardy. Witt hits right tackle for a yard and a first down. Shearer races around left end for 8 yards and Lee get away through left tackle for a long run being downed on their 33 yard line for another first down.

Witt hammers through left tackle for 3 yards. Schollenbarger makes a couple more around right end. Lee gains a yard through right tackle and Shearer punts to the 10 yard mark, the oval being returned to the 27 yard stripe.

The Yans cannot gain through the line. They lose a yard around right end. They put Hancock in for Taylor. They punt to Shearer on the 25 yard mark who gets a 7 yard return.

Witt smashes around left end for 5 yards and a first down. Schollenbarger carries the oval around right end for 2 yards. Witt nets 3 more through right tackle as the half ends.

Christopher Gets Fumble. Play is started when Bruner kicks off to the 23 yard mark, the

Yans returning to the 37. Witt smashes through and throws the Yans for a big loss, the half back fumbles and Christopher recovers. Witt trails around right end for 4 yards. Lee hits left tackle and right tackle for 3 yards each. Shearer ducks through center for a yard and a first down. Witt gains a yard through right tackle. Lee recovers Shearer's fumble for a 7 yard loss. A pass is intercepted by the Yans on the 9 yard tape.

Rangers Lack Punch. The Yans punt to Shearer who fumbles but recovers on the 41 yard stripe. Witt pounds around right end for 5 yards. Lee makes nearly 5 more through left tackle and Witt makes it a first down with a yard gain through left tackle. Lee fails to gain through left tackle. Witt tries the same position and gains 3 yards. The Yans call time out for injury. Lee races around right end for a 5 yard gain. Shearer punts to the 6 yard mark and the ball is returned 12 yards.

The Yans try a long pass but it is incomplete. They punt to Shearer on the 30 yard line who returns to the 45 yard stripe. Schollenbarger shows a loss around end but the play is called back when both lines are off side. Lee loses a yard around right end and on the next down fails to gain through center. The quarter ends.

As play is started in the final period Hamker is substituted for Schollenbarger. Witt's long pass is incomplete. The Rangers call time out. Shearer punts out side on the Yans' 21 yard tape.

The yellow and black team lose a yard through right tackle but gain 4 through left tackle. They punt to the 48 yard mark where the ball is downed by the Yannigans. On the first play Witt's long pass is intercepted and the runner returns to the 36 yard mark.

The Yans complete a pass for 4 yards. Christopher intercepts the next pass and runs to the 37 yard line. Shearer's pass is incomplete. Witt makes a long run around right end advancing to the 22 yard stripe for a first down. Lee hits the line for 2 yards. He goes outside on the next attempt. The Yannigans are penalized 5 yards for being offside and they call time out. Shearer loses 3 yards around left end. Witt gets away around right end and runs to the 3 yard mark where he is downed.

Shearer Gets Touchdown. Shearer hits center for 2 yards. On the next down he makes the other yard through center for the red and white team's second touchdown. Lee adds a point by kicking goal.

Bruner kicks off to the 10 yard tape. The Yans returning to the 27. They lose 5 yards around left end. A short pass is completed for 3 yards. The Yans punt to the 46 yard mark where the ball is downed. Witt's pass is incomplete as is

Shearer's pass on the next down. The Rangers get a 5 yard penalty. The red and white backfield misunderstand the signals and loss 5 yards and time out is called when Lee is injured. Shearer punts outside on the Yans 9 yard line.

Try Hard To Score. The Yans return the punt to Hamker who is downed on the 32 yard line after a nice return. The Yannigans try to steal the ball from Hamker and are penalized 15 yards for the foul. After much rangling play is resumed and Williams substituted for Brewer in the Ranger line.

The Rangers try hard to push across for another touchdown in the remaining 2 minutes of play. Witt smashes around right end for 4 yards. A pass to Lee is completed for 8 yards and a first down. Shearer hits right tackle but fails to gain. Witt cannot gain around right end and the game ends with the score 13 to 0 in favor of the Rangers.

THE GAME FROM THE SIDELINES

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made 13 first downs and a net gain of 221 yards in scrimmage. The breaks seemed to go against them when they got within sticking distance of the Yannigans goal.

The Yannigans on the other hand made only one first down and but 25 yards in net gain yet they threatened the Rangers goal line twice.

The Yannigans sure could boot that ball when it came to kicking. That one advantage made it mighty hard for the Rangers.

It is rumored that several of the Sandies reserves were included in the lineup.

The Yannigans outweighed the Rangers by at least ten pounds, but at that they couldn't make much of a dent in the Ranger line.

That steady passing hand of Marion Tucker was badly missed as the Rangers were able to complete only one pass although they attempted 8, three of them falling into Yannigans' hands.

The Amarillo News-Globe seemed to forget all about the game. They knew the Yannigans were going to play here but they failed to have any account of the game. In an obscure corner the score was published, but that was the only mention.

The Ranger band and the pep squad, looked and sounded mighty good out there in their new uniforms.

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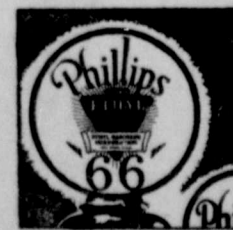

Congress May Abolish Public Nuisance.

A Bill scheduled to come up for discussion before Congress this session which is of unusual interest locally is the Bill Against Unsolicited Merchandise which would make it unlawful to send unsolicited merchandise through the mails.

For several years local residents have been bothered by the nuisance of receiving boxes of socks, neckties, gloves, Christmas cards, and other merchandise through the mail which they haven't ordered.

Along with the merchandise comes a bill for \$1 or perhaps \$2. At this time of the year the favorite article for firms which practice this method of selling is Christmas Cards. Thousands of boxes of Christmas Cards are sent out unordered to people all over the country every year.

Persons who have received such boxes of Christmas cards will be interested in a statement from the office of the Postmaster General to the effect that it is neither necessary to return such unordered merchandise nor to pay for it if it is not used.

According to The Better Business Bureau, investigation has proved that in many cases the values offered by these unordered card assortments do not equal the values which may be obtained in reputable local stores.

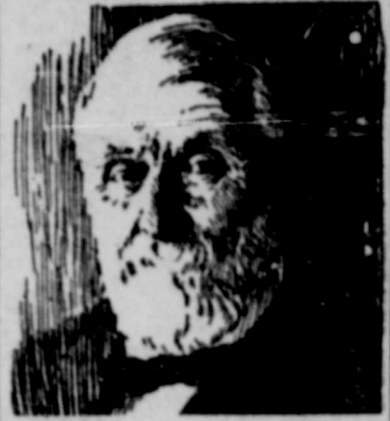

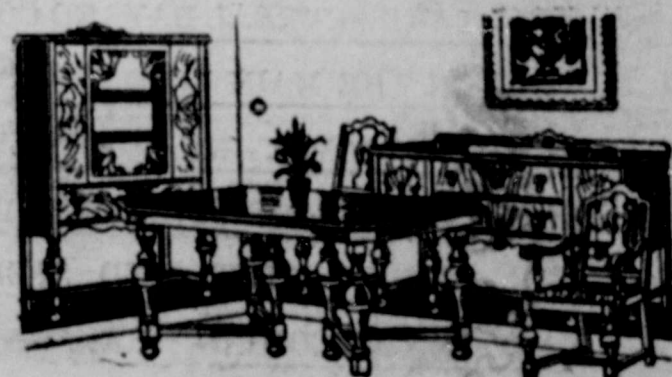
