

Four Arrested In Lynching Probe At Houston Subways Practically Assured, City Committee Says

Bond Issue Seen As One Remaining Barrier To Plan

Project Given Boost As Report of Abuttal Damages Committee Is Very Favorable.

ONLY MINOR DETAILS LEFT TO BE SETTLED

Mayor Woods Optimistic Over Prospect for Completion of Plan At An Early Time.

Calling of a bond election by the city commission, the final step in the proposed subway for Lubbock last night seemed as the only barrier in attainment of the project.

The project was virtually secured last night with the meeting of the abuttal damages committee at the city hall. With only a few large firms yet to be heard from the report of the committee was presented to Mayor Woods.

"The report of the abuttal committee was highly favorable," Mayor Woods stated last night following the meeting. "Only minor matters such as the collaboration of damages will have to be taken care of before a bond election will be called."

The proposed subways will be under the Santa Fe tracks at Broadway and at Avenue H. Report of the committee has been under preparation for more than two weeks. It was not presented to the whole city commission last night but to the Mayor and other city officials. It is expected to be considered by the commission in the near future.

City officials last night spoke optimistically concerning the project and predicted that it was practically assured at the present time.

Mexican Charged Following Affray

Deputy Says He Was Forced to Shoot When Arrested Man Drew Gun; Was Carrying Case, Alleged.

Charges of aggravated assault yesterday were filed against E. Bustillo, Mexican, who was wounded in the shoulder by a bullet in an early morning altercation yesterday in "Little Juarez," Mexican settlement of the city.

Gervino Solis, deputy of the Mexican settlement, declared yesterday that he shot Bustillo when the latter attempted to draw a gun on him. No bond was set for the injured man yesterday, pending the outcome of the bullet wound. He was carried to a local hospital yesterday morning and placed under medical care.

He was released yesterday afternoon. Hospital attendants said that the injury was no more than a flesh wound and it was not thought serious.

The shooting occurred about 4 o'clock yesterday morning. According to the story Deputy Solis related, Bustillo and several companions were causing a disturbance when he, Solis, went to arrest them. All of them fled with the exception of Bustillo who, Solis said, was carrying a case filled with bottles resembling the well known "home brew" article.

According to Solis, Bustillo dropped the case and drew a gun, causing him to shoot.

Two other Mexicans are being held but no charges had been filed against them last night.

Republican Drive Is Started Under Hoover Guidance

Hubert Work, Secretary of Interior, Is Named General Chairman of Campaign; Plan 3 Offices.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The republican national campaign was launched today in Washington under the personal supervision of Secretary Herbert Hoover and Senator Charles Curtis, its presidential and vice presidential nominees.

A group of 24 members of the party's national committee met the candidates at the new Willard hotel, and in an enthusiastic session ratified the slate of committee officers presented to them and authorized the first campaign steps.

Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, was elected national chairman, and announced that his resignation from the cabinet would be presented to President Coolidge before the end of the month.

To aid him the committee approved the selection, as vice-chairman, of Ralph E. Williams of Oregon. Mrs. Alvin T. Hart of Kentucky, and Daniel E. Pomeroy of New Jersey.

Representative Franklin W. Fort of New Jersey, was elected secretary and Joseph R. Nutt, of Ohio, treasurer.

Three Campaign Offices Chairman Work announced that the central campaign headquarters would be opened in Washington.

CAROL LOSES WIFE

OSLO, Norway, June 21 (AP)—Two Norwegian government vessels have been dispatched to search for Roald Amundsen, Lieutenant Dietrichsen and their French comrades. The steamer Michael Sars was ordered out of Bear Island today and was directed to sail at once from Horten, the Norwegian naval base.

Governor Smith Declares He Has Not Changed Mind On Topic of Prohibition

NEW YORK, June 21.—Gov. Alfred E. Smith declared tonight he had not altered his previously stated belief that "there should be amendment of the present prohibition provisions."

The governor's statement was in reply to a written question presented him by a reporter, as follows: "In view of the questions raised about Norman Mack's statement, the world wishes to know: have you changed your belief that there should be amendment of the present prohibition provisions?"

"I have not," the governor replied verbally, with emphasis on the negative.

In a statement at Houston today, Norman E. Mack, national committee from New York, had said Governor Smith "believes if any state desires a certain alcoholic content of beverage that state has the right to determine that content." He added that if a state wished to be wet, it should say so. Subsequently, Mr. Mack explained the views were his own and he did not speak for the New York governor.

Governor Smith was informed there is a report current that, in the event of his nomination as presidential candidate, he would resign as governor of the state of New York. The governor replied: "There is nothing to that."

Houston Already Stirs With Early Convention Talk

Final Drive To Line Up Delegates for or Against Smith Is Held In Abeyance Yesterday.

SMITH WILL NOT BE PRESENT AT MEETING

However, New Yorker Has Array of Political Talent Organized To Conduct His Affairs.

HOUSTON, June 21.—With many big guns of the party yet to arrive the last minute drive to line up delegates for and against Smith in next week's democratic convention was held in abeyance today, with activity confined mostly to informal conferences and no end of circulating around hotel lobbies.

The two week's vacation taken by sons and daughters of this commercial age cause no little surprise within the bosom of many a family. The casual bell seems to go like this:

After all, the majority of parents of today's young men and women spent their own youth during the rural era.

Vacations were no more thought of then than silk stockings and lingerie, lobster salad and metheens, bath salts or corsages.

There was little money. Any and all available cash went for such drab necessities as seed potatoes, taxes, insurance, lightning rods, wool socks, mowing machines, or chicken feed.

Vacations were never thought of because they had not yet become commercialized. People did not have enough money to create a demand for travel bureaus flinging their alluring mountain and lake and sea ads into every little hamlet.

Besides, in an era of hayrack rides, picnics, fishing and swimming for recreation—an era which took the outdoor world of sunset and sunrise, evening and morning star, meadows and creek and lane for granted—the only vacation lure would have been a trip to a big city and that meant money. In short, the vacation habit was not yet born.

But in this era of wage-earners in big noisy bustling cities, vacations have become as taken-for-granted and as essential as rent and food and clothing. The "two weeks off" are the poor's rainbow end for every six-week and up wage-earning boy or girl, man or woman.

Pine for them, but combined with the fact that vacations are more or less of a new idea for their parents, plus the fact that there seems no residue from the income of their children to provide vacations for parents, one can hardly blame the latter for feeling a bit bitter about the blithe assumption that everyone gets a vacation but Pa and Ma.

While the stay-at-home son or daughter grandly hands over his or her 30-a-week board money which he has taken care to see covers the mere actual cost of his keep and no more, chattering of his 600 vacation, the mother of the household sees nothing ahead but a hot round of more housework.

Yet no one in the world need a vacation so badly as the average housekeeper for a family of wage-earners.

I have known sons and daughters who saw the justice of this try to arrange vacations for their parents only to be met with rebuffs and a decided preference on the part of some parents to stay in their own homes.

I know a girl whose own vacation spoiled because her mother simply will not go away from home her self, though the daughter has begged her to do so, and who takes at the joy out of the girl's own vacation as making a selfish remark about how nice some people have it.

So many sides to the vacation controversy, as it rages in family life!

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST: Fresh apricots, cereal cream, scrambled eggs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON: Tongue and celery salad, whole wheat bread and butter sandwiches, fresh fruits, vanilla wafers, milk, tea.

DINNER: Hot meat loaf with tomato sauce, grilled sweet potatoes, steamed Swiss chard, fresh cherry pie, milk, coffee.

The luncheon suggested could be used for a porch or garden meal without change. Or, if a picnic by the roadside is wanted, pack the salad in a strong pasteboard container, wash the lettuce and carry it in an airtight pail, wrap the sandwiches in heavy waxed paper and carry the milk and tea in thermos bottles. Don't neglect the lettuce even on a picnic.

Tongue and Celery Salad

One-fourth pound smoked beef tongue, 1 cup shredded celery, 1 hard cooked egg, 1 sweet green pepper, 1 small head lettuce, 3-4 cup French dressing.

Cut tongue in match-like pieces. Wash and crisp celery and cut the same way. Cut egg white in narrow strips. Mince pepper after discarding seeds and white pith. Mash yolk of egg and add with 1 tablespoon minced parsley to French dressing. Mix thoroughly and add enough paprika to make the dressing pink. Combine prepared ingredients with French dressing and serve with carefully washed and crisped lettuce.

BRIDGE MADE EASY

By W. W. Wentworth

(Abbreviations: A—ace; K—king; Q—queen; J—jack; X—any card lower than J.)

4—OPENING BIDS

To encourage bidding on the part of your partner is the primary purpose of the opening bid. Your opening bid conveys a partial description of your hand that partner can use to excellent advantage.

Suits in the order of their encouragement are as follows:

1—A minor suit. It encourages a no trump or another suit bid that may eventually lead to a game-going declaration. It denies a sound

major or sound no-trumper.

2—A no trump. It encourages a major suit declaration.

3—A major suit. Offers least encouragement for a better declaration.

From the foregoing and the previous articles we now may make the following observations:

1—Never bid a suit of less than four cards (a short suit).

2—Never make an initial bid on less than two quick tricks.

3—To make an opening bid, third hand requires at least 1-2 quick trick more than first or second hand

requires for an initial bid.

4—To make an opening bid, fourth hand requires at least one quick trick more than first or second hand requires for an initial bid.

5—In a no-trumper three suits must be stopped in any position, except when holding four quick tricks concentrated in two short suits.

6—In a no-trumper a singleton less than the A is dangerous.

7—In an initial no-trumper a worthless doubleton is a weak spot, unless the hand is otherwise very strong.

8—In third and fourth positions the danger of a worthless double-

ton decreases.

9—Fourth hand should not open the bidding unless he can prevent opponents from making game should they capture the bid later.

10—The opening bid should be informative and encouraging. (Copyright, 1928, by the Ready Reference Publishing Co.)

League Chiefs Adjourn Without Action On Stephenson

Aver Sentiment Of Directors Is Opposing Chief

Snapp Says Leader Needed Who Will Try To Build Up, Not Tear Down, New Baseball Circuit.

(Special To The Avalanche) ABILENE, June 21.—(AP)—Without making definite action on the proposed request for the resignation of J. McAllister Stephenson, as West Texas league president, a meeting of the league directors was adjourned at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Another meeting was set for Monday. In the meantime, the team will play their schedule as drafted disregarding the order of Stephenson for Abilene's team to report to Sweetwater. The directors voted to allow the Abilene team to play a three game series with Hamilton in Wichita Falls beginning Friday.

Red Snapp, who arrived back from San Antonio, was talking the lead against Stephenson. Snapp admitted that he and other members of the league had made mistakes, but that with the circuit in its early stages, a man is needed who will try to build up the league rather than tear it down.

Snapp declared that Stephenson had forfeited the San Angelo franchise for failure to post its \$1,200 guarantee fund without consulting him. He called my bank Wednesday morning to see if the money was there. When it wasn't, he declared the franchise forfeited.

Snapp said that Stephenson was in Hamilton and could do nothing about it. This morning, though I had to borrow the money, I have it ready.

A statement to the league directors in writing from Stephenson shows that part of his side of the controversy has come from the deal in which Wichita Falls got in behind the league.

Wichita Falls, as owner of the Abilene club took over with their consent of the Abilene management. Snapp said in his written statement that Wichita Falls should have paid the regular draft price of \$500 for the club and that the check in payment for him should have passed through the league offices.

Snapp stated this morning that the season for drafting players was not on, and that the checks for drafted players are required to pass through the offices of the secretary of the National Baseball association and not through that of league presidents.

Bill Jones in W. H. Hill, Hamilton president, Thursday morning sent manager Army Magness to Abilene with instructions to suggest Stephenson, but at noon Hill showed up and it was thought that he would join the movement to oust Stephenson.

Representatives of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce met with the baseball men at lunch. Charles W. Barnes, president of the Civic organization, denied any connection with an attempt to drive the Wichita Falls baseball management from Abilene. T. N. Carswell, chamber of commerce secretary, also spoke, declaring that the chamber of commerce was solidly behind the Wichita Falls management of baseball as a new civic enterprise in Abilene.

Guy Airey, Wichita Falls baseball club secretary, told the meeting that he had asked Stephenson if he wanted the \$140—the amount of an unpaid draft for which Stephenson declared the Abilene franchise forfeited. "Stephenson told me," Airey said, "that he didn't want the \$140 that he wanted the ball club."

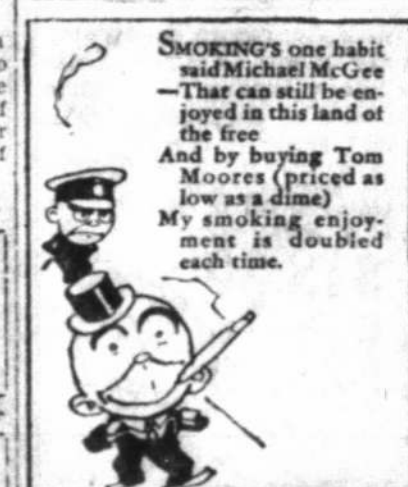

Senator Reed of Missouri, outstanding challenger of Smith as the presidential nominee, and Senator Robinson of Arkansas, slated to be permanent chairman. The keynote will be Claude G. Bowers, New York newspaper editor and a writer who will come to the convention as a delegate from the Empire state. Of the half dozen men whose names have been proposed for the nomination, only one, Cordell Hull of Tennessee, is now here. He explained that he came not as a candidate, although he has the solid endorsement of the democracy of his state, but as a member of the national committee to assist in arrangements for the convention.

Smith Not to Come Governor Smith, whose political foes concede that he will have more than a majority of the delegates on the first ballot, and whose friends claim he will have the necessary two thirds early in the voting, will not come to Houston. His campaign will be in the hands of George R. Van Namee, pre-convention manager; Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, who will make the nominating speech; Mayor James J. Walker of New York City, who will be the floor manager; George W. Olvany, Tammany leader; Norman E. Mack, New York national committeeman, and a number of others from different states, east and west.

Van Namee and Mack already are on the scene and were kept busy today denying reports that there had been any rift between them over a statement touching on prohibition which Mack issued here last night. In it the national committeeman said Governor Smith was against prohibition and stood for temperance and states rights on the liquor question. The statement caused somewhat of a stir among some of the Smith lieutenants as well as in the camps of other candidates. Mack hastened to announce that the expression was his own, and that he was in no wise speaking for the governor. Van Namee supplemented that by saying that no one in Houston was authorized to speak for Smith on the prohibition or any other question.

The Smith manager and Mack were together most of the day, inspecting the convention hall and making arrangements to open headquarters for the Governor in the Rice hotel Saturday. Headquarters have been opened at the same hotel for Reed, who will arrive here tomorrow night from his home in Kansas City, in company with Sam Fordyce, his manager, and Charles Howell, of Kansas City, who will place the senator's name before the convention.

Besides Reed and Hull, two others who have support for the presidential nomination—George of Georgia and Hitchcock of Nebraska, will come to Houston.

DAILY MARKETS

KANSAS CITY, June 21 (AP).—(U. S. D. A.)—Part of the recent loss in fat lamb prices was regained today when values were strong to 25c higher; choice Idaho range lambs brought 17.15 in Chicago, while comparable grades of the same origin sold at 15.75-16.00 at the river markets. Yearlings and matured classes sold steady. Receipts at 11 markets totalled 36,400, against 40,794 last Thursday and 32,692 a year ago.

Demand for the more desirable grades of hogs of all weights was broad and strong to 10c higher. Choice medium weight butchers reached 10.85 at Chicago for the day's top. Offerings totalled 101,950 today.

A limited supply of fed steers and yearlings enabled salesmen to enforce strong to 25c higher rates, while butcher classes were steady to strong. Choice 900 lb. mixed yearlings brought 14.90 at Kansas City and best long yearling steers of medium weight at Chicago went at 14.75. Kansas grassers sold from 11.25-11.50 at St. Joseph while others at Kansas City ranged up to 11.85. Vealers were uneven, all strong to \$1.90 higher prices. Total receipts were 25,350, against 25,527 a week ago, and 29,018 a year ago.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, June 21 (AP).—After advancing to levels nearly \$2 a bale above the previous close, the cotton market weakened in late trading today under rather extensive realizing by satisfied longs. October contracts eased off from 20.95 to 20.76 where it closed net 17 points higher for the day. The general market closed barely steady at a net advance of 16 to 20 points. At Liverpool cables were 1 to 3 penny points better than due, and first trades here showed gains of 6 to 8 points. Despite a dry weather map, the market continued to advance after the start under the stimulus of short covering and on unfavorable advice of rain in Oklahoma and north Texas. Before this initial demand was supplied July traded to 21.07, October 20.90 and December 20.75, 20 to 21 points above yesterday's close.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 21 (AP).—Continuation of yesterday's buying which found additional inspiration in today's weather and crop news, seemed responsible for further advances in the cotton market. October contracts sold up to 21.50 or 37 points net higher, and 137 points above the recent low level, but lost part of the gain under realizing and closed at 21.29. The final tone of the market was barely steady at net advances of 12 to 17 points. The market opened steady at an advance of 6 to 8 points and very soon showed net gains of 20 to 26 points on overnight buying orders and fresh buying brought in by relatively firm cables and reports of showers in the south. Realizing was heavy, but it was absorbed on reactions of 10 to 15 points and the market soon firmed up again.

Buying became more active after publication of the detailed weather reports for the day, showing general rain in Oklahoma and Arkansas. The outlook for further showers in the south, no doubt promoted demand.

AMERICAN COTTON

The area available for cotton production in the United States is so large that American farmers will be able to satisfy the increasing world demand for cotton for many years to come, in the opinion of Dr. W. J. Spillman, economic analyst of the bureau of agricultural economics, United States department of agriculture.

"There is a possible extension of cotton area amounting to 10 million acres in Texas alone," he says, "and there are other large areas that may yet be devoted to cotton in New Mexico, Arizona and California, to say nothing of possible extension of cotton northward. The extension northward now includes about three-fifths of the state of Tennessee, a considerable area in western Kentucky, four counties in southern Illinois, and there are possibilities of material expansion in southern Missouri and Virginia, possibly also in southern Kansas."

The question of competition in cotton production, according to Dr. Spillman, "is not as between American cotton growers and possible foreign producers, but as among American growers. The developments of foreign producing areas, apart from local cotton growing and marketing limitations, will be confronted with violently fluctuating cotton prices. An increasingly large proportion of the American cotton area lies in a territory subject either to occasional prolonged droughts or to early fall frosts or both, with consequent years of low and high prices. The drop in prices in 1920 and 1921 did much to lessen the feverish activities for the extension of cotton acreage in Japan, China, Argentina, Brazil and a dozen places in Africa, to say nothing of the wild speculations about the possibilities of a 30,000,000 or 40,000,000-acre crop of cotton in Australia."

Discussing the vast shift in American cotton production westward and northward since 1909, Dr. Spillman points out that in 1909 cotton did not extend to the western border of Texas, though there was one county in southeastern New Mexico which had one per cent of its area in cotton. At that time there were three great centers of cotton production in which the cotton crop occupied more than half of the crop area.

West of Louisiana and Arkansas there was a 62 per cent increase in the area of cotton between 1919 and 1924. Most of this occurred in Oklahoma and Texas, but there were notable increases in New Mexico, Arizona and California. Along the northern border to the cotton belt from Arkansas to Virginia, including Tennessee, North Carolina and states to the north, there was a 30 per cent increase in cotton area, these increases being due to the high prices for cotton that prevailed at times during this period.

In Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama the cotton area remained fairly steady, though there was some shifting about within these each of these states. On the average, however, they increased their cotton acreage 7 per cent between 1919 and 1924. In South Carolina, Georgia and Florida there was a large decrease in acreage, amounting for the three states taken together to 32 per cent.

FARM RELIEF TO HOUSTON

Will farm relief overshadow prohibition at Houston?

Farmers of the Northwest, defeated at Kansas City, have announced they will appeal to the democratic national convention to pledge the party to the equalization fee program of the McNary-Haugen bill.

Frank W. Murphy of Wheaton, Minn., a delegate in the republican convention, informed that body that the farmers of the Middle West will carry their fight to Houston in an effort to obtain the brand of relief denied them at Kansas City.

"I am speaking for the farmers," he said, "when I say they must accept the vote on the farm relief plank as notice to them that the republican party is not big enough to take them into the protective system and that their vote is not regarded as necessary to party success."

There are rumors that a coalition with

the dry leaders of the Southern states will be sought in the event the Eastern supporters of Smith indicate that the equalization fee program will meet the same fate as at Kansas City, but the Southern leaders, though unquestionably anxious to secure allies in their effort to inject the prohibition question into the campaign, will probably evince considerable hesitancy, before accepting the farm relief program of the Northwest as a party policy.

While some of the democratic senators and congressmen from the South supported the McNary-Haugen bill, they were not particularly enthusiastic over the equalization fee clause, and they realize that for the party to accept the agricultural program, sponsored by republicans who have failed to incorporate it into the platform of their own party, would be the height of folly. They still retain a vivid recollection of "free silver," forced upon the party in 1886 by a similar coalition.

The democratic national platform will offer farm relief in the form of tariff adjustment. The party will not go on record this year as opposed to the protective principle, but will demand equalization of tariff benefits, revision of the tariff schedules to place agriculture upon the same plane as industry. The convention will probably recommend a national co-operative plan whereby farmers, through organization can solve their own problems, and in achieving this solution tariff equalization will prove a very important factor.

Southern democracy has always opposed subsidies in any form, and the equalization fee can be construed as nothing more than a subsidy. Agriculture would oppose subsidies to industry, commerce or transportation, but the Northwestern farmers have meekly accepted the present protective tariff which virtually extends to all phases of industry a subsidy, leaving agriculture to solve its problems as best it may.

If the democratic party goes on record favoring protection for agriculture upon the same basis as industry now enjoys, and further pledges the party to a national agricultural co-operative program, it will provide for the agricultural interests the basis for the solution of their problems. But the details of this solution must be worked out by the farmers themselves, and that can be accomplished only through organization.

The equalization fee plan of the McNary-Haugen bill is designed for one purpose—to compel the nation to pay for the failure of the farmers to organize. It is true that under the present tariff the farmers would be seriously handicapped, but with adjustment of the tariff schedules upon a basis equitable as between agriculture and industry, that obstacle would be eliminated and through co-operation and organization agriculture could be established upon the same profitable basis as industry is today.

BEING USEFUL

Society, which has always found it a problem to absorb its demi-gods has begun fairly well with the heroes of aviation. Recently Col. Lindbergh affiliated himself with the technical committee of Transcontinental Air Transport, Inc., and is now on the Pacific Coast attending to his duties. Clarence Chamberlin, another conqueror of the Atlantic, went to the city as construction consultant in connection with the building of the municipal airport on Borren Island.

Both men, Colonel Lindbergh especially, hesitated long before deciding what business to enter, and both felt the need of becoming something different from public exhibits, beset by photographers, souvenir hunters, tuft hunters and the idly curious. Now each is usefully engaged in dignified employment, related to the occupation through which each won fame. And as each becomes more identified with normal business, crowds will gradually begin to treat them as men on a job. Probably there is nothing conspicuous public figures more desire, particularly when they have no box-office necessities to think of. Actors and pugilists must encourage crowd gathering for the sake of receipts, but fortunately no such consideration confronts men like Lindbergh and Chamberlin.

Their fellow ocean spanner, Commander Byrd, is busy, too, organizing a scientific expedition to the South Pole. Sir George Wilks, the Australian conqueror of the Pacific and a few others must yet undergo their travail of adulation, and then they also will probably settle down to useful toil.

Tom Blanton complains that the newspapers are not supporting him—they are all against him—possibly they have had take a lot of stuff off the wire about him complaining about not getting to speak on the floor of congress so often when they craved real interesting news, that they have become disgusted with the congressman.

The campaign managers of Mr. Wardlow claim that he has the race already won for Governor of Texas. Dan Moody has not counted his votes, and will likely leave it up to the election clerks, but he is not suffering any uneasiness. Dan is the man.

YOUR HEALTH

Fear often constitutes a vicious circle in the mind. In matters of health people are frequently inclined to magnify the significance of comparatively unimportant symptoms, construing some mild muscular condition of the back for example, as kidney trouble. Some say, "Well, which would you prefer, as heart trouble or some ordinary functional digestive disturbance as cancer."

Perhaps the same person will refrain from having a thorough medical examination because he fears that the message will be a depressing one, or that some one of these maladies may be revealed by such examination.

Recently in discussing the matter of periodic health examinations with one of his associates, the chief executive of a large commercial institution said, "I don't believe in such things because if any one should examine me and tell me that I had tuberculosis, for example, it would scare me to death." His reply was, "Well, which would you prefer, to die if tuberculosis or of fright?"

Such people have never really tried to think out this problem or they would recognize the absurdity of this attitude. The failure to take an examination does not, of course, have any favorable effect on any underlying condition of ill health. If any trouble is present it will go on as if the individual is ignoring it. The one best hope in such a case for the person involved is to discover the trouble in its earliest stages when something can be done about it.

The best antidote for such fear states is to face the facts about human conditions. When people realize that the conditions of life are frequently in the course of health examinations are simply the mark of ordinary civilized states and do not mean any classification as an invalid, there will be less phobia regarding disease. It should be remembered that there is no such thing as human perfection—either moral, intellectual, or physical. Every human being has his weak points.

Those engaged in life extension work, however, are not satisfied with the condition of the average individual. They believe that the general level of vitality and living capacity can be definitely raised. They also believe that the periodic health examination when properly made, the results correctly interpreted, and subsequent medical supervision conducted along reasonable and scientific lines, will accomplish these ends. Studies made on large groups in the population give unmistakable evidence of the value of such procedure in extending life and safeguarding health—both physical and mental.

These examinations should be sought not in fear, but in hope. More frequently they are agencies for the discovery of good health rather than the discovery of any important disease.

The real purpose of the whole modern campaign for health improvement is not to develop fear of disease, but rather a love of health—a sense of responsibility for the care of our bodies, a desire for bodily endurance and efficiency and full achievement. If the mind is fixed on these ideals, and the already known means of approaching them are utilized, heart disease, kidney trouble, and the needless worries that smother the lives of so many may be left to take care of themselves. It is not so much necessary to fight disease as to cultivate health for the happiness, contentment and moral gain that it brings.

London's Crowds Fight for Sight Of Girl Aviator

Miss Earhart, With Thousand Dollars Worth of New Clothing Already, Hunts Shops for More.

LONDON, June 21.—Miss Earhart went shopping again today in company with Mrs. Frederick Quest, sponsor of the trans-Atlantic flight of the "Friendship," while a crowd stood vainly in front of her hotel in a drizzling rain hoping to catch a glimpse of the young woman who flew the Atlantic.

Miss Earhart already has bought a thousand dollars worth of clothes, but needs more. She has been proceeding with her shopping scientifically, buying necessary frocks first and then doing miscellaneous purchasing.

While Miss Earhart shopped, Wilmer Stultz, pilot of the "Friendship" and Louis Gordon, mechanic, spent several hours at Croydon air-drome where they inspected the British airplanes used in the London-Paris service. Gordon, who had never seen a British airplane engine previously, was particularly interested and asked the airway officials and mechanics many questions.

Many Poetic Praises.
Following on the heels of hundreds of letters, poems have now begun to flock in upon Miss Earhart. One begins: "Good Eve of the air, glorious woman fair" and then goes on in praise of the flier. The American woman has now recovered from the first strain of the flight and the tumultuous welcomes which the crew of the "Friendship" received in Southampton and London and said that she felt much better.

Scotland Yard took Miss Earhart under its protection today to guard her from too ardent admirers and cranks.

She has been nearly rushed off her feet by admiring crowds, mostly women and girls.

The number of crank letters alarmed her friends. Therefore, unknown to her, an agent of Scotland Yard was assigned to watch over her.

Miss Earhart asked Mrs. Quest to make it plain to the public that she is distressed at the attention she has attracted. She declared that she did not want hero worship and that Stultz should have the full burden of his fame instead of unloading it on a girl who has done nothing to deserve it.

ROTARY NOMINEES

Tampico, Mexico, Man Is New President

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 21.—After finding itself of one mind to such an extent that two principal offices were filled by acclamation, Rotary International today nominated directors for the United States, Canada and the British Isles.

I. B. Sutton, Tampico, Mexico, a native of Saginaw, Mich., was elected president without opposition. Rufus F. Chapin, Chicago, treasurer 22 years, was re-elected.

Irate Yugoslav Solon Fires Into Assembly Group

Whole Nation Tossed Into Ferment of Excitement, With Two Dead, Another Seriously Hurt.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, June 21.—Inflamed by frequent interruption and refusal of the opposition to withdraw insulting words, Punic Ratchitch, radical deputy, drew a revolver during a session of the national assembly today and fired all six rounds into the group of opposition members. Paul Raditch, nephew of Stefan Raditch, the peasant leader, was killed and Stefan Raditch himself was seriously wounded. The Croat Deputy Dr. Basaritchek, who was severely wounded he is reported to have died on his way to the hospital. Dr. Pernar, and two other deputies, Grandja and Jelasitch also received wounds of a dangerous nature.

This was the culmination of fierce controversies and hand to hand fights which recently have taken place in the Yugoslav parliament. The crime is considered the most terrible since the memorable assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga just 25 years ago this month. It has thrown the whole of Yugoslavia into a ferment of excitement.

Parliament had scarcely opened this morning when the opposition, led by Stefan Raditch, began its obstructionist tactics against the government's legislation, in the forefront of which is ratification of the Nettuno convention with Italy.

DEDICATE BUILDING

Education Structure At W. T. S. T. C. To Be Named

CANYON, June 21.—The formal dedication of the new \$275,000 education building for the West Texas State Teachers college will be October 19-20, at which time the college will have her annual homecoming for students. All presidents of the Teachers colleges of Texas are expected here on this occasion. The building, which will be completed by September 1st, consists of three stories and a part-basement will be arranged especially for laboratory work in teacher's training.
