P. T. A. ENDS SUCCESSFUL YEAR'S WORK

Dodsonville Organization Was Formed In Year Of 1930

406 MEMBERS

Work Of Mrs. Hill Outstanding In Progress During Year

The Dodsonville Parent-Teachers Association was organized in the year 1930, under the supervision of Superintendent Vance Swinburn, Mrs. Dewey Malone as president, Mrs. F. L. White vice president and Mrs. W. F. Roberts as secretary and treasurer. This organization had its beginning with eight members (who have worked these several years with this organization to build the fine cooperation now existing between the community and the school.

In 1931 a meeting was called by Supet. Swinburn and new officers elected, including: Mrs. W. F. Roberts as president, Mrs. Dewey Malone, vice president, Mrs. Hugh Painter as secretary and Mrs. Marvin Wynn as treasurer. The membership in 1931 increased from the eight to 53. Much good was done during the year under the leadership of these very efficient officers. Books were added to the library, room mothers added pictures and several improvements to each room.

At the last meeting, closing the years work in 1931 with a program and election of officers at which time Mrs. O. D. Hill was elected president, Mrs. W. F. Roberts, vice president, Miss Ruth Boarman as secretary and Mrs. Marvin Wynn as treasurer again.

Early in the 1933 school term, a campaign was started to make that the very best year in the largest membership since the organization had its start. Much work was done improving the school both in the individual rooms and in the library. At the close of this year the membership had increased to 144. Officers were elected for the 1934 school year, re-electing (Continued on Page Four)

Honor Students Began Schooling At Dodsonville

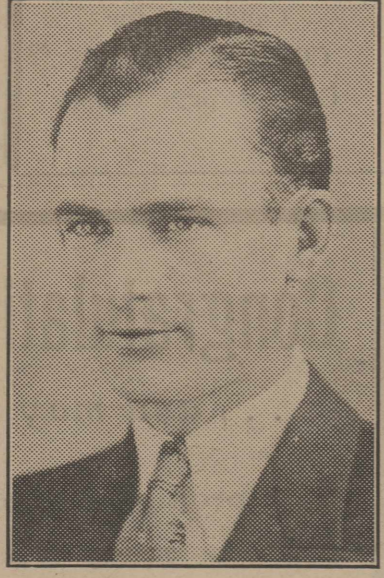

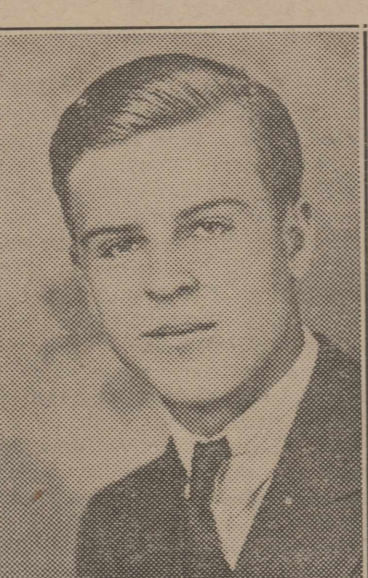
County's First School Bus Runs To Dodsonville

On September 25, 1933, Mr. W. A. Orbison left Dodsonville on the first trip over the first school bus route established in Collingsworth County. This was indeed a day of new adventure for the pupils as well as the driver, the adventure being especially momentous in the lives of the boys and girls in the Pleasant Point district because they had such a difficult time trying to get a way to school.

This route was materialized in August under the direction and supervision of Superintendent Vance Swinburn who has spent a great deal of time as well as expense getting things in order for this bus to be possible. Going from home to home with a petition for the parents of this district to sign to justify the bus schedule. Finishing this work most successfully, Mr. Swinburn made it possible for a great number of boys and girls from this district to secure a high school education and also remain at home. And these boys and girls have a great appreciation and words cannot express their thanks to Mr. Swinburn, whom they feel is directly responsible for this possibility.

Many amusing and funny things have happened on that old bus this past year, the first day being one of outstanding high spots in the lives of these boys and girls who were aboard this bus. Arriving at school that first morning, we found there were no steps on the bus and the old fashioned "stile step" in the form of a gallon bucket was used in stepping out of the bus. This day will long be remembered and many others were days of amusing events.

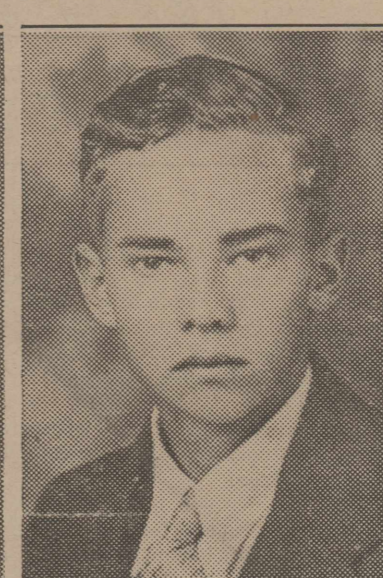

The concerts put on by the Vawter Party are unique in musical nature, members of the party playing many different musical instruments. It is expected also that Reverend Vawter will tell of some experiences during his tours of the world.

Plans are being made to make this one of the most eventful and community-wide days ever staged in Dodsonville, and the entire public is cordially invited to attend.

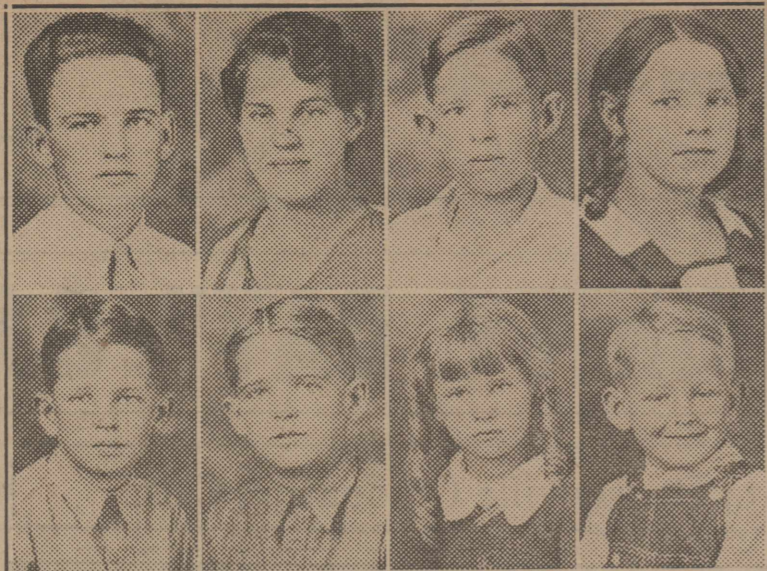

He won the agriculture declamation in Dodsonville and took first honors at the district meet held in Shamrock and was sent to Huntsville, where he attended the state meet, being placed there. This year he won pole vault at 10 feet, 4 inches and high jump at 5 feet, 10 inches in the county and placed in both events at the district meet in Childress. He was captain of the basket ball team this year and is president of the senior class.

Walter Fred will enter Oklahoma University at Norman, Oklahoma, and hopes to climb high in the future in whatever he may plan to do. He will be missed greatly in the Dodsonville school as it will hardly seem like Dodsonville with Walter Fred missing from its class rooms and study hall.

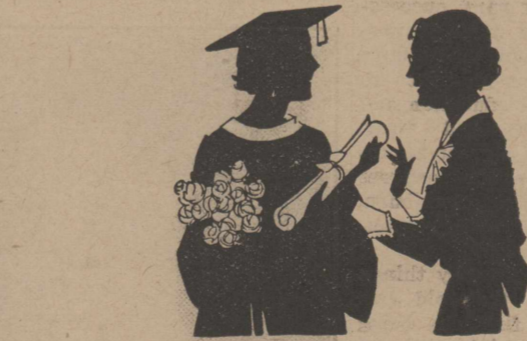

Vocational Agricultural Department Firmly Established In Dodsonville

Frank Dupree is director of the Department of Vocational Agriculture in our school. He is well-qualified for the place, having completed the requirements for Smith-Hughes teachers of Vocational Agriculture. He received the B. S. degree from the Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, Texas. He has had special training in Agriculture in the Texas A. & M. College, and will complete special courses at Texas Tech this summer.

Mr. Dupree was successful in affiliating first year vocational agriculture for our school last year. An additional one and one-half units will be secured on the completion of this year's work.

Some outstanding achievements of this year's work are: terracing land, culling poultry, won first place in the Northwest Texas District Public Speaking Contest and third place in the State contest, constructed farm lighting plant, made tile for garden sub-irrigation, sponsored agricultural debates and programs, had 3 delegates represent the Chapter at the State Convention held during the Dallas Fair last October and many other services to the community.

We feel that Vocational Agricultural training will better prepare the students of High School for useful and efficient adult citizenship.

Knowledge is power and nowhere more powerful than on the farm, and at no time more essential than in periods of difficulty.

The following statements concerning vocational education was made by President Roosevelt: "We must increase vocational education for those who otherwise would not receive adequate training. My own observation leads me to believe that in many parts of our country we have tended to an educational system devised too greatly for academic training and professional careers. We know that already many of the professions are over-supplied and it is a fair guess that during the coming generations we shall devote

more attention to educating our boys and girls for vocational pursuits, which are just as honorable, just as respectable and in many instances, just as remunerative as the professions themselves."

Mr. Dupree is more than just a mere teacher of vocational agriculture. He has put himself into the community and worked for everything that is for the best of Dodsonville and the school. His very agreeable disposition has won him friendship and admiration for all school pupils and the community as a whole. He has made the people realize what is meant by agricultural training and what it will mean to the boy of tomorrow. He is a community worker.

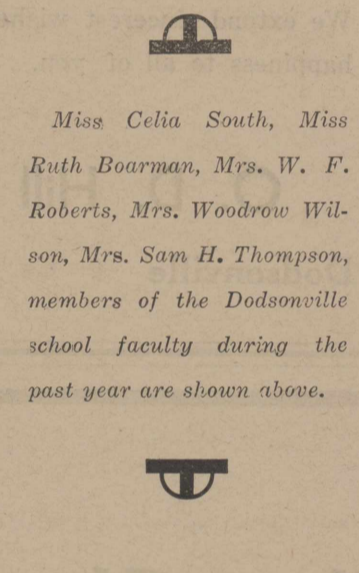

Dennis: "Yes, Miss Boarman, but there were only three or four then."

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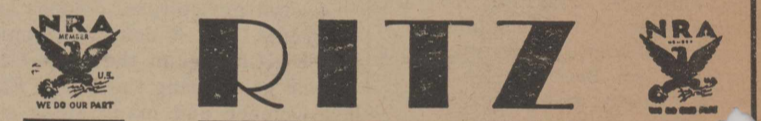
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
