Four Indictments Election Judges By Grand Jury

Titus County grand jury made its third report to District Judge Sam Williams and was given permission to adjourn until Oct. 20. The third report included five indictments charging felonies.

Four of the indictments were in connection with the second Democratic primary held on August 26, and alleged mishandling of ballots and election returns.

Two of the indictments were against an election official at Hickory Hill, and one of which included charges of three counts. The other two were against an election official at Cookville.

One indictment against the Hickory Hill official was on charges of unfolding and examining ballots cast in an election in a manner not prescribed by law. The other indictment bore three counts: altering election returns; altering tally lists of an election, and making a false statement of the results of an election.

The two indictments against the Cookville election official were for the same alleged offense, making a false statement of the results of a canvass of an election.

The one indictment that had nothing to do with the election charged fraud with useless check and theft.

The jury's action resulted from testimony given in a contest suit for commissioner of Precinct 4, in which Jim Ponder was first declared elected. Later, John B. Kirby was named the winner.

The chairman, E. C. Sims of Hickory Hill and Fred Witt of Cookville, were ordered arrested on charges of unfolding and examining ballots, and of altering returns and tally lists and making false statements on the results.

An agreement was reached last week between Kirby and Ponder to have a new election in Precinct 4 this coming Saturday, to determine the nominee for Commissioner. Despite action by the grand jury, this election will be conducted according to schedule, with new election judges appointed at each of the three voting boxes.

Quarantine Lifted Titus, Franklin Counties Monday

Anthrax quarantine in the northern part of Titus County and the northeastern part of Franklin County has been lifted by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission, effective Monday, Sept. 25, and cattle and horses may now be moved in any part of the two effected counties without restraint.

The quarantine had also covered the north portion of Hopkins County, but this and the northwestern portion of Hopkins County was lifted last week.

The quarantine had been placed in effect in these counties on Sept. 11 after more than 100 head of cattle had died of the disease. A similar outbreak of the disease occurred four years ago. There were also several cases in the Bogata area in southwest Red River County and one in southeast Lamar, but the quarantine did not affect these counties.

In the official release special mention was made of the fact that individual premises in the county subject to special quarantine for anthrax were not released from supervision.

Talco Trojans Ride Winnsboro Raiders 25-0

Talco Trojans, behind the spirited playing of Jimmy "Willie" Williams, rode the Winnsboro Red Raiders to a 26-0 victory at Winnsboro Friday night.

The Trojans played completely over the heads of the Raiders as Jimmy Williams intercepted two beautiful passes, the first interception he ran for an 80 yard touchdown; the second he paced a neat 83 yards down to the 6 yard line.

Dewey "Dizzy" Howard, Thomas "Stump" Jones, Shelby Barger, Robbie McCuller and Willie Williams stood in the limelight all through the game. Howard, Barger and Jones were playing in the Raider backfield all the game, holding them to 7 completed passes out of 22 attempts.

Williams is one of the best backs in the country; he gained 186 of the Trojan yardage.

To begin the attempt, the Trojans kicked to the Raiders who immediately punted out; after a strong drive they reached the 8 yard line where McCuller drove over for the tally. The conversion was kicked by Paul Miller.

In the second stanza, when the Trojans were down in their own territory defending bravely, Willie Williams took a Raider pass out of the air and raced 80 yards for the tally.

In the third period Winnsboro drove to the Trojans 5 yard line, but was held four times in their attempt to reach pay dirt.

In the fourth frame, the Trojans broke loose on a scoring spree. Early in the frame, the Trojans drove 76 yards to the 2 where Robbie McCuller reached paydirt on an off tackle jaunt. The Raiders completed a series of passes, and moved down to the 17. The passer faded, shot, and Williams took the ball and raced 80 yards before being brought down on the 6 yard line. McCuller again drove over for the tally.

The Trojan line played a great game. It completely broke the Winnsboro backfield and beat their line to pieces, opening holes big enough to run a truck thru.

Schedule More Wells Pewitt Area Talco Field

Humble Oil is to drill three more tests in the Pewitt Ranch area of the Talco field. The No. 2 Lizzie Scott is 330 feet from the south and east lines of a 172.59-acre tract in the Allen Samuel survey. The No. 7 Pewitt is 330 feet from the south and 1,123 feet from the west lines of an 184.5-acre lease in the Banks survey, and the No. 6 Pewitt is 330 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west lines of the same lease.

Listed as a Titus County wildcat is Phillips & Stephens No. 1 F. M. Anshults, ten miles east of Talco. Location for the 5,000-foot Paluxy venture is 330 feet from the north and 467 from the west lines of a 50-acre lease in the M. Cartwright survey.

Pewitt Ranch area of the Talco field now has 31 producing wells, with a dozen more slated to be drilled that is now known.

Three Plead Guilty District Court

During the latter part of last week Judge Sam Williams heard three pleas of guilt. Horace Hood, charged with burglary, received a sentence of two to ten years in the penitentiary, his sentence to run concurrently with another given him in Camp County. Milton Rhodes, also charged with burglary, received a five-year suspended sentence.

In the case of Arthur Smith, charged with cattle theft, Judge Williams, after hearing a plea of guilt, withheld sentence until the defendant had an opportunity of making restitution to the injured party.

SOME COTTON FARMERS WILL GET GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE

Funds for crop production purposes are to be made available to farmers in a 13-county area in Northeast Texas where cotton insects and excessive rains have caused a virtual crop failure, Lamar County Supervisor N. A. Cleveland of the Farmers Home Administration, has announced.

His agency is to provide funds to farmers in counties, who have suffered production losses, for seed, phosphate, legume seeds, fertilizer and materials for insect control, gas and oil for tractors, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other items incident to production of a crop.

Counties included in the area are Lamar, Red River, Delta, Fannin, Denton, Collin, Hunt, Rains, Rockwall, Kaufman, Grayson, Cook and Bowie.

Before a loan may be made the applicant must have suffered damage as a result of ravages of cotton insects and excessive rains and he cannot obtain the credit applied for from banks or other responsible local sources.

Following a survey of the affected counties, L. J. Cappleman,

State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, issued a statement in Dallas concerning the purpose of the loan program. Federal credit of this type will be available to farmers who have sustained losses and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds required to carry on their farming operations and put in a crop in 1951.

Cappleman said reports he had received indicated that the affected area would produce slightly more than 100,000 bales of cotton from the current crop. The same counties in 1949 produced more than 400,000 bales. Bankers and other crop observers say the cotton failure is the most serious in history.

It is expected that loan applications will be available within the week at county offices of the Farmers Home Administration to assist farmers for credit to enable them to practice early stalk destruction, planting winter legumes, and make early arrangements regarding next year's plans with landlords," Mr. Cappleman added.

No Draft in Sight For Men Over 25

WASHINGTON. — Men twenty-six to thirty-five years old will not be drafted in the "foreseeable future" and men over thirty-five probably will not be called at all, Col. Daniel O. Omer, general counsel of the Selective Service System, said Tuesday.

He told a farm labor committee meeting on manpower problems that men in the 19-through-25 age group, including World War II veterans, should be called in the draft before any older or younger men are summoned.

He also urged stricter occupational deferments for men in the 19-through-25 group, and said the Army may lower its physical, mental and moral standards for them.

While draft calls are subject to change, in accordance with the military situation, Omer's statement was the clearest picture yet on what men of draft age—and possible draft age—can expect in this edition.

Alcorn Wants to Farm Same Hours N. Y. Cotton Ex. is Open, 4 Hours a Day

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, apparently doesn't recognize the vast difference between producing and marketing, his letter this week shows.

Dear Editor: I read in a copy of a newspaper I picked up out here the other day because it was hung on a bobwire fence and I could reach it without stooping over where the New York Cotton Exchange voted to change its closing time on Saturday from 12 noon to 12:30, because otherwise it would be open only one and a half hours on Saturday, since it

don't open till 10 o'clock in the morning, and even I can see a hour and a half ain't exactly no full day's work. Also, I notice the Cotton Exchange on the rest of the week opens at 10:30 and closes at 3, which is 4 and a half hours a day, with I suppose a hour off for lunch.

As I see it, ain't no chance of them New York fellers havin a nervous breakdown from workin long hours, and what I want to know is why cotton farmers don't get up on the same level with the Cotton Exchange? If we could raise cotton on the same hours it's sold, you'd see me plantin more of the stuff.

As it is, here a regular cotton farmer works from ten to twelve hours a day, but I have figured if the men who sell the stuff ain't gonna work but three or four hours a day, ain't no sense in me stretchin out my hours, don't want to glut the New York market and force them birds into longer hours.

I used to work long hours, years ago, but I got to noticin I wasn't no further ahead after a year of hard work than I was after a year of takin it easy, noticed my wife nagged about the same, year in and year out, and it wasn't no effort at all for me to figure out which course to follow. Of course I ain't recommendin this policy to everybody, and will compromise if the hard-workin folks won't recommend their policy to me.

I been toyin with the idea of rotatin the whole system of farmin and sellin in this country, let the farmers farm one year then swap places with the sellers and let them farm, but so far I ain't gotten no where with it. Ain't found a single seller willin to swap. Yours faithfully, A. A.
