HOW MANY PEOPLE COME TO JUNCTION?

Recently a visiting lady said to the editor of this Kimble County sheet that we ought to have a pike road from here to Menard, one to Brady and another to the Seven Hundred Springs on the South Llano. She ventured the assertion that if such roads were built that Kimble County would likely, in a year or two, have fifteen or twenty thousand guests during the summer.

This caused a little investigation and figuring.

F. H. Dunk, our progressive ranchman friend on the Kerrville road took occasion last Friday and Saturday, to count the cars that passed his house on the Highway. Friday's count was 93, while Saturday's was 104.

It might be contended that both these days were "off" days for the weather was threatening and rains fell these days and had fallen the day before. But for this article, let's assume that these two days were normal ones. A fair estimate of this number would place the cars belonging to local people at about 25 per cent, and the travelers passing through over the O. S. T., those not stopping here, at another 25 per cent. This would leave 50 cars per day passing to and from Junction over the Junction-Kerrville road. Allowing the travel over the Menard and Sonora roads to balance that of the Kerrville road, we would have 50 cars a day each way entering Junction, which anyone who takes occasion to observe, will readily agree is very conservative. Those who come by way of Rock Springs and Brady will easily amount to 25 per cent of those coming the other routes mentioned, so it would be seen that an average of 63 cars enter Junction each day. A check of the cars coming in shows that an average of four people travel in each car; this means that 252 new people arrive in the town each day, which during the four months tourists season amounts to more than 30,000 visitors during the summer season, not counting those who are here in considerable numbers during the other eight months.

These figures, of course, are not absolutely accurate, but if an actual count were made, it is believed that the number will greatly exceed the figures here set out.

Next season will see two or three times as many people camped along the beautiful retreats of the Llanos, and it is evident that there is a big problem ahead for Junction and Kimble County, but these people are going to be taken care of in a satisfactory manner as they have been taken care of this season.

SAN ANTONIO PARTY AT TOURISTS' PARK.

A party of San Antonio business men with their families, have been camping the past week at the Tourists' Park. They have a well arranged camp colored cooks, and have been visiting many places of interest over the county and fishing along the rivers.

It is hoped that the Lure of the Llanos will continue to hold them and that next summer they will again spend their vacation here.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM FISH SPECIALIST

The Eagle had another letter from Mr. Mark Riley of the U. S. Fish Hatchery, at San Marcos, this week in which he states that he has been delayed in his contemplated trip here, but still expects to make it. In his business, as in most all government connections, there is a considerable amount of red tape that renders efficiency impractical.

Mr. Riley states, however, that he is very much interested in our proposition here and that he will render us any assistance and it is hoped that he will be able to make the trip next week.

TWO-INCH RAINFALL IN JUNCTION VICINITY.

Showers have been falling over parts of the county for several days, but the drouth of several weeks was broken last Thursday night when more than 1 1/2 inches fell at Junction late in the afternoon. In some parts of the county more than this amount fell, but most of the county only about an inch was reported. In a few localities, very light showers only were reported. A strip of country a few miles west of London, and part of the Divide country south of Junction did not have enough rain to benefit crops. At Roosevelt a good rain fell Sunday and extended into Sutton Co.

Friday afternoon another rain of about half an inch fell in the vicinity of Junction and another on Saturday evening, bringing the total over 2 inches for the week. The rain extended north and east, but south and southeast, towards Kerrville it grew lighter.

JUNCTION TO HAVE ICE FACTORY NEXT YEAR.

A deal was made last week, whereby John Braley became owner of the two lots just east of the Filling Station, formerly belonging to Dug Jobs, and Mr. Braley has already arranged plans for installing a six to eight ton ice plant in time for next summer. This plant will be new and standard in every way and will probably have a cold storage plant in connection.

This is one of the enterprises that Junction has long been in need of and next summer, the money that is now going away for several hundred pounds of ice each day, will be kept at home, and the high price that now necessarily prevails, will not have to be charged.

The location is ideal for the making and selling of ice. It is on the main street of the town, where tourists can reach it easily, and is near enough town to accommodate local people.

Mr. Braley has recently completed about \$50,000 in concrete work contracts on the roads of Edwards County and will shortly take over the remaining concrete work on the construction now going on from the six mile crossing on North Llano to a point about ten miles towards Roosevelt. The principal work will be the construction of a low water bridge across the North Llano, six miles from town, one across the same stream ten miles out and a bridge across Calf Creek. The total will amount to about \$12,000.

TWO PROMINENT SAN ANTONIO MEN HERE.

Percy Tyrrell, manager of the Gunter Hotel and also head of the firm, Tyrrell, Inc., that recently built the Robert E. Lee in that city, and H. B. Ayers, managing director of the Old Spanish Trail, were week-end visitors in Junction. These gentlemen spend most every week-end visiting some section of the country contiguous to the city.

This was Mr. Tyrrell's first trip here, while Mr. Ayers has been here before in the interest of the O. S. T.

They met a number of the local business men and Mr. Ayers discussed the problems that the O. S. T. Association has had in developing this great highway across the country. He stated that this highway was now officially recognized by all states through which it passes and by the War Department. Much dissatisfaction has come to the attention of those in charge of the affairs of the O. S. T., but Mr. Ayers stated that these troubles were gradually being adjusted and worked out, and that in the near future conditions would be such as to warrant the continued support of the towns and counties along this long route.

They were securing some photographs to be used in National Magazine stories that will tell of the scenic country thru which the O. S. T. passes. Data for the O. S. T. service maps was also being collected.

New maps of the Orange to San Antonio section, and the San Antonio to El Paso section, and the San Antonio to Del Rio loop, have recently been printed and distributed and are very creditable pieces of work. A new map of the entire route from Florida to California will soon be available that will show the main or trunk line, as well as the several tourists loops.

CAMP COMPLETED

A nice little camp ground has just been opened by R. S. Price just above town on the river. Mr. Price has a camp house, tents, camping space, etc., for rent, and the improvements he has made give the place a very attractive appearance.

Mrs. Ellen Alsop returned Saturday from a visit of more than a month at San Antonio, Smithville and Bastrop. Bastrop is her former home. Her mother spent the time with Mr. and Mrs. Roy Kemp near Eura.

COMMITTEES MEET TO DISCUSS JOINT PICNIC.

A committee composed of John M. Hankins, C. T. Holkamp, F. E. Knetesch, C. F. Hammer, and H. G. Perry, went to Kerrville Wednesday to meet again with the Kerrville committee, and together worked out tentative plans for the big Basket Picnic to be held August 28th, on the Moos and Rembold pastures near Segovia.

The Junction delegation were guests of the Kerrville Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon at the St. Charles Hotel and were royally entertained during the day. Besides the Kerrville committee, Mayor Wheeler and Mrs. Wallace, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and W. A. Fawcett were at the luncheon.

Shortly after noon the two committees met in the directors' room of the Chas. Schreiner Bank, where E. H. Prescott, president of the Kerrville Chamber of Commerce and cashier of the Schreiner Bank, presided.

It was decided that plenty of ice water and coffee would be furnished free, and that in the evening a big dance would be given that would also be free to the public. Music for the day will probably be furnished by a thirty piece Military Band from Kelly Field. The committee has not had definite information about the band, but feels sure that it will be secured.

One large concession stand, will sell iced drinks, ice cream, lunches, etc., and to prevent the customary high prices being charged, it was decided that a good man would be employed to take charge of the stand and operate it for the committee. Mr. A. F. McClellan, owner of the Lake Side at Kerrville was secured for this work. Mr. R. L. Mangum, Deleo Light dealer, agreed to furnish the lighting free.

In order to provide the public with a free celebration it was decided that the necessary fund would be raised by private subscription. The amount of \$500 is to be raised; \$350 at Kerrville and \$150 at Junction. As soon as the plans became known, Messrs. A. C. and L. A. Schreiner donated \$100 each.

A baseball game between players from Junction and Kerrville and the Fredericksburg team has been arranged for, and this big event will also be free.

The local committee are enthusiastic in the appreciation of the cordial reception given them by the people of Kerrville, and if this committee could pass on the enthusiasm that they have for the present close relationship of Junction and Kerrville, and the development of an even closer connection for the mutual advantage of the two towns, a great deal would be accomplished by the co-operation that would result.

The completion of the splendid highway between Junction and Kerrville has brought the two towns within two hours of each other. The tourist travel along this highway is enormous and is growing by leaps and bounds. A close co-operation of these towns is essential for their mutual interests and the spirit manifested Wednesday is evidence of this co-operation.

More about this celebration will be given in these columns next week.

AMASA CLARK MAY GO TO THE REUNION.

Banderas New Era:

The suggestion of William F. Buckner of Paris, Mo., that the 52 surviving veterans of the Mexican War assemble in reunion, has caused San Antonio friends of Amasa Clark of Banderas County, to start a movement to send Mr. Clark to the convention if it is held, says the San Antonio Light in its Sunday issue, which contained the old veteran's picture along with a two column write-up. Mr. Buckner's proposal was made July 7, when press dispatches said that he wanted to assemble the men who risked their lives in '46 for one last meeting. Whether this will be done is a question. Most of them are around ninety-five years of age, and they would find it difficult to travel. Friends of Mr. Clark claim that he is physically able to make the trip, although he looks back upon almost 100 years of life. They also say they will raise a fund to send him in the best style if he will go. Mr. Clark was born on Socharrie Creek, in New York, September 3, 1828.

MASON STORES WERE ENTERED BY BURGLARS.

Mason County News:
Last Saturday night parties entered three local stores, effecting entrance through the rear.

The business houses entered were the Sunshine Confectionery, the Mason Drug Company and the Owl Drug Store. Just what the intruders were after is not definitely known, but it seems the Mason Drug Company was the heaviest losar, as a large quantity of morphine was taken. Otherwise nothing has been missed in any of the three stores except some cigarettes and tobacco, which were taken from the Sunshine. Mr. Hoerster of the Mason Drug Company states the amount of morphine taken represents a loss of about \$50 to his firm, and the report given out at the Owl Drug Store is to the effect that nothing has yet been missed, although indications are the same party or parties entering the other stores were also in their place of business.

ENCAMPMENT OPENED TUESDAY AT KERRVILLE

Mountain Sun:

With the main program opening Tuesday evening, approximately 250 people arrived at the Westminster Encampment grounds the first two days of this week. Up until late Tuesday evening over 1,000 persons had registered at the camp of office for the season.

Of this number, about 700 were on the grounds, the remainder having registered earlier in the season for short stays. These figures are said to be more than 200 ahead of the registrations at the camp at the corresponding period last year.

Accommodations were practically all filled at a late hour Tuesday, according to camp authorities, and requests for reservations were still being received. The housing facilities were considerably increased in anticipation of a record crowd this season, but the number has exceeded by far what was expected.

SUTTON SHEEP SELL.

San Angelo Standard:

A few muttons in Sutton County are selling at \$5 to \$5.50 per head and are being shipped to market, W. L. Aldwell, president of the First National Bank of Sonora, reported Wednesday. He came in Tuesday night and met his daughter, Mrs. John Lee Nisbet of Plainview, who will visit her parents at Sonora.

Answering an inquiry about progress being made in completing the pike through Tom Green, Schleicher and Sutton Counties from San Angelo, Mr. Aldwell said that this highway will be a big aid to the country that is without rail transportation, but asserted that a railroad is what is needed and that the demand for one is becoming stronger all the time.

"The government should take over the Orient and finish it," said Mr. Aldwell. "Lynch Davidson had the right idea, I think, and he very nearly succeeded in putting it over. Moved men are against the Orient and I see no hope of early extensions by the line."

"The new highway will enable us to travel and haul our freight quicker and cheaper and in all kinds of weather, but it can't equal a railroad. We need one to ship out our livestock on and to develop the country to the full possibilities that we all know exist."

MILLS ARE SOUGHT.

Dallas, July 24.—Thirty-one Texas cities and towns have organized textile committees which are compiling data and information relative to the textile industry looking toward organization of textile mill companies and eventually building mills, according to Burt C. Blanton, industrial engineer of the Texas Chamber of Commerce. The State chamber is sponsoring a campaign for the establishment of such mills.

Cities where capital has been raised, in whole or in part, and where new cotton mills are practically assured, according to Mr. Blanton, are: Breckenridge, Mexico, Fort Worth, Waco, Houston, and Dallas. The plans do not necessarily mean that construction of such mills will begin immediately, Mr. Blanton said, but that various communities are looking for ward to such in the next year or two.

Campaigns for mill establishment was started in May when the Texas Chamber supervised the textile special tour throughout the State. Textile mill owners, engineers and financiers from Eastern States were included in the tour. A textile conference of Texas business men was held here recently also.

Mr. Wrigley, always anxious to learn anything about his business, asked in return, "How?"

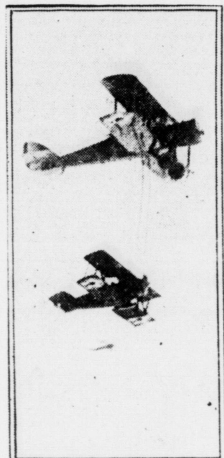
"Why, in advertising!" the man replied. "Your product is

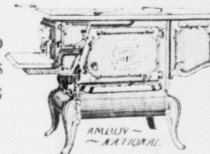

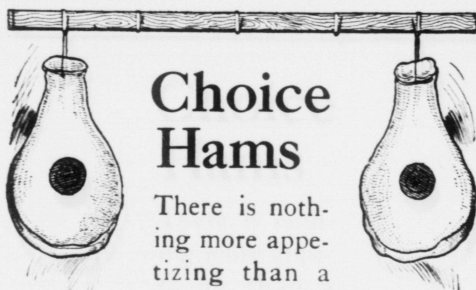

NORMAN HAPGOOD.**

Dallas Times-Herald:—

Who runs Texas? asks Nor-
man Hapgood, in Hearst's Inter-
national magazine.

Texas is run by Texans. Tex-
as is run by honest, law abiding
citizens who express their con-
victions at the ballot box.

Mr. Hapgood affects an uneas-
iness about our recent senatorial
election. There was nothing
dark or dubious about that. The
people understood the issues.
Convinced that he would con-
tinue to serve the people well,
the Times-Herald was for Chas.
A. Culberson in that race. He
failed to reach the runoff. In
that runoff Earl B. Mayfield was
decisively the victor. Came the
general election and Earl B.
Mayfield was overwhelmingly
chosen by the voters of Texas to
take a seat in the United States
Senate.

So much that the editor of
Hearst's International may, if
by any chance he so chooses, get
and keep the record straight.

We would like to inform Hap-
good that Texas is not and never
will be run by muckrakers. We
should like to inform Hapgood
that Texans are fully capable of
running their own affairs with-
out impudent interference from
ignorant outsiders.

We should like to inform Hap-
good that Texas is not worrying
over the growth of the Ku Klux
Klan.

Since this sage from the east
is so free with his advice to
Texans, perhaps he will listen to
advice from a Texan:

We advise him to direct his
attention to his own city of New
York. There the bootleggers
abound. There gang men turn
business streets into carnival
sites of shocking crime.

Perhaps if Hapgood turned
his eye on the place where he
lives, he might make it better—
or worse.

CHOOSING THE WORSE.

Have you ever noticed the
tendency that many people have
of putting the worst possible
explanation on another man's
actions? For instance, suppose
a man presents his city with a
small park in the business sec-
tion. If he has other property
near there, will not be persons
wanting who will say, "Oh, he
did it to increase the value of
his other property." Others
who know this explanation is
absurd, figure it out that he has
political reasons, or else that he
has an intense love of praise
from his fellowmen. It is possi-
ble—is it not?—that he may
have given the park because he
loved his town.

Many a man who has risen
above himself and done some
act from a high and patriotic
feeling has known the revulsion
of feeling that comes when his
critics tell the public why he
did it; and many a one who
would otherwise have been pub-
lic spirited has been permanen-
ly soured because what he did
attempt to do was belittled. The
plain truth is, that to assign a
low motive for another's action
when there is a higher one only
indicates our own meanness of
soul. It is a fair assumption
that we judge what others
would do by what we ourselves
would do.

In the fierce competition of
modern life we cannot neglect
the meaner motives from which
men act. We are like the play-
ers of a chess game, who must
not overlook any possibility.
But that is quite different from
picking out the meaner motives
and attributing them to men.

Give your neighbor the ben-
efit of the doubt. Most human
beings act from a mixture of
motives, something of the low,
much of the ordinary, but not
uncommonly a flash of some-
thing high. Attribute that last
to any one when you can, and it
will grow in him and in your-
self. Do the opposite and you
will discourage noble deeds, kill
public spirit, and open the way
for all sorts of bitter feelings
and mistrust.—Ex.

A CORRECTION.

ciations. The Mason Mutual Life Insurance Association will pay all just claims due under either of them immediately upon proof of death.

Who are the ten richest men in the world? The query is answered by giving a list at the head of which is Henry Ford, whose fortune is estimated at \$500,000,000. John D. Rockefeller comes next with \$450,000,000; Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, is third with \$150,000,000; and then follow the Duke of Westminster, Sir Basil Zaharoff, Hugo Steinhilber, Percy Rockefeller, Baron H. Mitsui, Baron H. Iwasaki and the Gaekwar of Baroda, each with \$100,000,000.

James B. Duke, the tobacco king; George F. Baker, of the First National Bank of New York, and T. B. Walker, of the Minneapolis timber landowner, the Express says, might be added to the list, since they all have fortunes estimated at \$100,000,000, while there are at least three Indian rulers whose fortunes probably exceed this amount.

The Rothschilds, Guggenheims, Vanderbilts, Weyerhaeusers, and the Astors, says the writer, do not appear because theirs are family fortunes. The Rothchild wealth has been estimated at from \$250,000,000 to \$500,000,000, and that of the Astors at from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000.

Henry Ford is possibly the richest man in all history, the

paper declares. He has a net business income of more than \$100,000,000 a year. He earns \$250 every minute. Croesus may have been richer, since his famous gift to Delphi cost \$10,000,000, and that, reduced to today's terms, might mean at least \$200,000,000.

John D. Rockefeller gave away \$500,000,000 to charity and to foundations before 1921. He is the head, however, of the biggest group of wealthy men ever produced by a single industry, and his private fortune must still rank him second.

Sir Basil Zaharoff is Europe's mystery man, but it is no mystery that he is one of Europe's wealthiest men. He owns more than half of Monte Carlo, and his holdings in armament firms are even larger. He is in oil, finance, shipping; in fact, it is difficult to say what he is not interested in.

The Mitsuis and the Iwasakis are financiers, traders and shippers. The Gaekwar of Baroda's wealth is almost impossible to estimate, but his diamonds alone are valued at \$1,250,000, and he has a jeweled tapestry worth \$1,500,000. Guns of gold weighing 400 pounds stand at his palace gate.
