American Legion Home For Lamesa Is Rapidly Nearing Completion

Carpentry work on the American Legion Home on the corner of North 5th and Wason Streets is expected to be completed this week according to Mr. J. D. Dyer and the home expects to be officially opened about May 15th, at which time a dedication program will be held. The building is 60x32 feet, with a large plot of ground on the north side of the building. The hall is to be provided with a stage at one end and a kitchen at the other. Small ante rooms will be built around the side of the building. A library is also to be installed. Space is to be reserved for a large glass cabinet in which relics of the war will be placed. The legion boys have many German helmets, bayonets and guns to go in the cabinet, and when completed will be one of the most interesting objects of the city. The building is to be papered throughout. Trees have been planted around the lot; the following men having donated them: S. Richardson, 2, J. D. Dyer, 2, and Phillip Yonge, 2. Any other person may donate a tree if he so wishes. The plot on the north of the building is to be levelled, and a croquet court will be installed. Pans for a miniature golf course are also under consideration. Ashley Electric Co. is doing the electric wiring, and Bockman Plumbing Co. have the plumbing contract.

The above men will participate in the track and field events at the State meet in Austin May 7, 8, and 9, together with between 700 and 800 other district winners.

A total count of 340 votes were cast at the polls which closed at 7:00 o'clock. Officers were sworn in to their respective offices Saturday morning, and assumed full charge of the city affairs.

Results of the election were as follows: Johnnie Marr, Mayor, Nelson Williams, Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Troy Ross, City Attorney, Allen Salser, chief of police, Cecil Key, city secretary, Richard Crawley, band master. Commissioners elected were Robert Koger and Robert Ross; Lamar Cole was elected as fire chief.

The various officers appointed their assistants shortly after their installation. City Marshall, Allen Salser appointed the following traffic cops: Earl Alsbrook, Dorman Scott, Cecil Medlin, Pat Ridgway, Travis Simpson, Buck Salser and Herman Heffernan will report for night work. Fire Chief Lamar Cole appointed the following assistants: Delmer Sears, Wayne Ross, Edmond Speck, Allen McClain, Johnny Smith, Everett Allison, Martin Cooper, Johnnie Kline, Braswell Gilbert and Thomas Cole.

The fire boys were called to duty early in the morning when a fire broke out back of the school house. The fire was only an oil shack which had been set on fire purposely.

Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce Nelson Williams had a busy day. The telephone kept him busy. Williams had "thirteen calls within an hour."

A call meeting of the Chamber of Commerce directors was called Saturday morning. A feature of the meeting was to elect a young lady to represent Lamesa in the Spirit of West Texas Pageant to be held in Lubbock, May 14, 15 and 16th. On account of the drouth of 1929 and 1930 seriously affecting portions of Dawson county, this county was certified for Federal Loans for seed, feed and rehabilitation, March 9th, 1931, and application were received up to April 30th 1931.

In many cases the land lord made the application for himself and one or more tenants and altogether 514 families are served by the 343 loans in Dawson county.

The number of livestock and poultry shown are not an indication of the average resources of the county in this respect, as many farmers on account of drouth and other conditions were forced to reduce their cows and poultry, hogs and even work stock to the minimum number they were able to keep.

HAM RECIPES

Corn on Casserole

One can corn, one cup left over ham, chopped fine, 1/4 teaspoon mustard, one tablespoon butter, two eggs, 1/2 cup milk, two table spoons minced green peppers; mix corn, ham, green pepper and add beaten eggs and milk. Pour into baking dish, add butter, then sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake it in moderate oven about 45 minutes garnish with paprika.

Broiled Ham

Caramelize one table spoon sugar in frying pan, add a slice of ham about 1/2 inch and brown it on both sides; cover with milk or water and cook slowly about ten minutes then lift ham out; thicken with gravy and serv with mashed potatoes, or fried sweet potatoes. This gravy has a delicious flavor.
