FARMERS SEEK LARGER GRANT

CONFERENCE AT SPEARMAN IN-
DICATES THAT TEN CENTS
AN ACRE IS NOT SUFFI-
CIENT TO LIST

Declaring it is impossible to list
their lands on the 10-cent-per-acre
basis allowed under the government's
soil erosion program, farmers from
nine North Panhandle counties in
meeting at Spearman Wednesday
appealed to Congressman Marvin
Jones for a larger grant.

R. V. Converse, member of the
Hansford County allotment board,
presided at the meeting which was
attended by approximately 40 farm-
ers, county judges and others.

Committees were named in each
county to obtain farmers' signatures
to petitions which will be sent to
Washington asking for 50 cents per
acre in place of the 10 cents allowed
under the present program.

The farmers generally admitted
that the 10 cents would buy fuel for
farming but in most instances, it
was declared, tractors and other ma-
chinery must be repaired before
plowing can be done, and the grant
of 10 cents will not allow for any
such preparations.

Counties represented were Hart-
ley, Dallam, Oldham, Sherman,
Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb,
Hutchinson and Moore.

Ochiltree county was represented
by Calvin Flowers, A. C. Witt, L. R.
Conner, L. L. Lance, J. H. Neufeld
and Vance Apple.

Pioneer Spirit Lives On In "No Man's Land"

It was a new generation of "pioneers" from "no man's land" that visited Perryton late Tuesday evening, depicting the early day life and dress of the picturesque settlers who were the first residents of the Oklahoma Panhandle, before the days when the strip was attached to Oklahoma territory in 1890.

Pioneers? Yes—every one of them. It is true that they traveled in fine motor cars, a train of them thirty-three in number carrying 179 Guyton residents. During the day they covered some four hundred miles of the Texas Panhandle—a trip that would have taken weeks in the olden days.

Obviously the trip was for the purpose of advertising the Guyton Pioneer's Day celebration on May 2. Headed by their fine cowboy band of 23-pieces with Judge Wallace Hughes acting as master of ceremonies, with a fine quartet, singers, dancers, and rope throwing acts, they gave a splendid entertainment on the streets of each of the Panhandle towns they visited, extending the invitation to each community to return the visit on May 2.

But the visitors accomplished something more than merely announcing their celebration. They demonstrated to the citizens of this blighted, drought-swept area that all hope is not gone. By showing their undaunted courage and their display of optimism they bolstered up shrinking spirits and radiated new life and new hope. By recalling to mind the hardships of those earlier day pioneers they seemed to minimize our seemingly heavy burdens of depression, drought and dirt storms.

Yes, they are truly pioneers! Just as hardy as their forefathers! They can "take it" with a grin and come back for more! They're not "crying" or talking about deserting their farms and homes because they have met with adverse conditions and obstacles! That's the kind of stuff "pioneers" are made of!

Guyton has issued a challenge to the Panhandle! And our answer is, "We're with you Guyton!"

LEGION CONVEN- TION TO BORGER

WELLINGTON WAS HOST ANNU-
AL SPRING CONVENTION
LEGION AND AUXILIARY
APRIL 20-21

A most successful convention of
the American Legion and Auxiliary
of the 18th district was held at
Wellington last Saturday and Sun-
day with over four hundred mem-
bers in attendance.

One of the entertainment features
of the two day meeting was the ex-
cellent music furnished by the Mc-
Lean high school band, the Drum
and Bugle Corps of the Claren-
Squadron, Sons of the Legion.

The ladies of the Auxiliary were
honored at a tea on Saturday after-
noon by the Wellington Unit. On
Saturday evening Legionnaires and
Auxiliaries were guests at a ball in
the beautiful and spacious Legion
home.

Following a breakfast and serv-
ice school on Sunday morning, a
public joint meeting was held at the
Ritz Theatre. The visitors were
welcomed by Deskin Wells, mayor
of Wellington and editor of the
Wellington Leader. Mr. Wells, in
addition to being a gifted speak-
er, is one of the outstanding news-
paper publishers of not only the
Panhandle, but of the entire state.

The main address of the morning
session was made by John Lee
Smith, Throckmorton, Texas. After
a big feed at noon, separate busi-
ness sessions of the Legion and
Auxiliary were held in the
afternoon.

A Garland Adair, assistant de-

a convention of the 5th division in
Amarillo in July. Floyd L. Sloan,
adjutant of the Amarillo Post, was
endorsed by the convention for di-
vision commander.

In the Auxiliary business meet-
ing resolutions endorsing Mrs.
James Trent, Clarendon, for 5th di-
vision president; and Mrs. Tillman
Jones, Post, for department pres-
ident. Principal speakers were
Mrs. Will M. Benton, Amarillo,
state rehabilitation chairman; and
Mrs. Van W. Stewart, Perryton,
state child welfare chairman. Mrs.
Floyd L. Sloan, Amarillo, district
president, presided at the Auxiliary
convention.

Pass Pension Bill

House Passes Bill Granting Dol-
lar for Dollar With States
Up To \$15.00 Limit

The House of Representatives at
Washington last Friday passed by
an overwhelming majority, the so-
cial security bill, better known as the
old age pension legislation. Under
the terms of the bill, which must be
acted upon favorably by the senate
before it goes to the president, the
federal government will match dol-
lar for dollar with states that pay
old age pensions. The federal con-
tribution is limited to \$15.00 per
month and will be paid only to
persons who have reached the age
of 65. Payrolls and incomes will be
taxed to raise funds for the pay-
ment of the old age pensions.

Panhandle Camps to be Located in
Ochiltree, Potter, Hall, Daw-
son and Bailey Counties

Hansford Is Cooperating

Army Engineers to Make Location
Of Camp Site; Probably Be
Adjacent To Perryton

H. H. Fennell, Dalhart, director of
the Federal Wind Erosion Service,
was a visitor in Ochiltree county,
Tuesday, going over plans and sur-
veys for the establishment of a CCC
camp for a wind erosion project. It
is practically assured that Ochiltree
camps to be established in the Pan-
handle will be the site for one of the five
handle.

County Agent Stovall states that
to date, 33,833 acres have been offer-
ed to the soil erosion service in this
county for this work. County Agent
G. L. Boykin of Hansford county
has notified Stovall that his county
is ready to cooperate by putting
25,000 acres into the project to be
worked by the camp in Ochiltree
county.

The location of the camp in the
county will be decided by the U. S.
Army engineers but it is very prob-
able that a site to the east of the
able that a site adjacent to the city
of Perryton will be selected. Avail-
able of gas, electricity, water and
sewer facilities are considered favor-
able in making camp site designa-
tions.

Five CCC camps to control ero-
sion are to be located in Potter,
Lamb, Dawson, Hill and Ochiltree
counties, according to Tuesday's
Dalhart Texan. These counties
represent distinct types of soil and
arming so that demonstrations there
will be of general educational val-
ue. The camps are to be oper-
ating July 1.

Control measures are to include
running lines for terracing and con-
touring, protection of terrace out-
lets, gully control, re-sodding and
re-vegetation of eroded areas, sur-
veys for and preparation of tree-
planting sites and planting of trees
as windbreaks. Actual contouring
and terracing will be done by farm-
ers with whatever help camp work-
ers can give, Mr. Fennell explained.

LAY NEARLY 5 MILES OF TILE

RELIEF GARDEN PROJECT IS
POPULAR IN OCHILTREE
COUNTY; ONE-FOURTH
IS TOLL

Nearly five miles of concrete
garden tile has been made and laid
this spring by relief workers in
Ochiltree county, a total of 25,957
feet according to a report made
Thursday morning by H. Shindler,
relief administrator.

The tile has been furnished in
such cases at actual material costs
plus a one-fourth toll of the garden
crops delivered at the canning
kitchen where it is to be processed.
The material cost has been approxi-
mately one and one-quarter cents
per foot.

Relief labor is employed in making
the tile and laying it in the gardens
and parties contracting the tile to
pay the material bill and then give
the relief organization a toll of one-
fourth of the garden crop produced.

Dust Damages Homes And Business Houses In The Panhandle

Housewives of the Panhandle say that dust causes a great amount of damage in their homes, according to a survey made by Harley A. Daniel, acting director of the experiment station, Goodwell, Okla.
Recently fifty-three homemakers of Goodwell and Guymon, Oklahoma were interviewed to find the estimated cost of damage from dust blowing into their homes. According to these housewives, the average estimated cost of keeping the house free from dust for one month was \$29.28, assuming they were paid 25c an hour for their work.
Another added expense due to dust was that of laundry and cleaning. The average extra cost per month was about 39 per cent. Although dust seems to sift almost directly through the walls, the estimated average damage to food was only 1.25%.
Few people ever think of the damage to their furniture due to dust, but the data secured showed that the dust infiltration damages the furniture in the average home to an extent of \$25.56 annually. This estimate, of course, does not include the damage to floors, walls and fixtures.
The housekeepers presented a wide variation of figures in estimating the total cost per month due to the infiltration of dust. The highest estimated total cost was \$55.00 and the lowest \$3.00, while the average was \$27.03.
A large number of business houses in Goodwell and Guymon were interviewed and the data accumulated indicated that the penetration of dust into these houses was costing the firms on an average of \$53.00 a month.
There seems to be many conflicting opinions as to the effect of dust on the health of the individual, however 47 of the 53 housewives interviewed stated that dust did affect their health, usually causing nose and throat trouble. Physicians of Goodwell, Guymon and Texhoma, Oklahoma, agree that dust has a very bad effect on the health, causing colds, bronchitis and sinus trouble. Dr. Paul Reid from Texhoma, Oklahoma reports three cases of pneumonia which he believes originated from dust. Dr. E. F. Camp of Buffalo, Oklahoma says that approximately two-thirds of the people of Harper county have bronchitis, caused from recent dust storms.
Consolation: In a world as big as this, with as many people, there ought to be somebody, somewhere, to suit everybody.

There are many people in Amarillo who have the correct attitude toward the Panhandle—that this section must grow together if it grows at all; while there are many in Amarillo who cannot see beyond Polk Street, and would kill those institutions which they cannot move to Amarillo."

THE AMERICAN LEGION

Eighteen years ago in a great crisis the youth of America was called to the service of their country. The best material was needed so all young men between the ages of 21 and 26, just having finished their preparation for life were called to go and face, not life, but death.

They did not choose to go, but as their country needed them, they gave up home, business, loved ones, friends and even their native land to go into a foreign field to fight for a cause they did not understand other than that it was to make the home land safe for those remaining behind.

What purpose was in the mind of each soldier? Nothing except that he was going to give his life for his country.

Jesus gave his life that we might have eternal life. It was in his power to give, to those who choose to accept it. But the soldiers of the World War gave no less. They could not give eternal life, but by giving their earthly lives they gave all they had power to give and by this sacrifice hoped to make America safe for those privileged to remain at home.

Who were those called to sacrifice

their all for their fellowman? They were young men from every walk of life, from all kinds of families and from all localities and environments; the only equipment the Government made were mental and physical. As a result every type of man with many different standards of life were massed together to fight for the same great cause. This was the American Army.

Out of this group comes the American Legion and it is no more than a cross section of our present civilization. It cannot be a perfect organization made up of all perfect citizens. When a person makes application to join a lodge the organization sets up for him certain moral standards. When one joins a church, he is to make vows pledging himself to live a clean life, but these things are not true of the American Legion. Its membership is not based on set pledges for conduct, but the one requisite is that the applicant must have served in the World War between the dates of April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918, and have had an honorable discharge from the army.

Even though some citizens criticize the American Legion, and in some instances have cause to do so, this writer feels it a distinct honor and a humble privilege to be a member of the Auxiliary of the American Legion. It is a pleasure to lend a helping hand, feeble though the efforts, to those boys who are now falling out of line at the average of seventy-eight per day from the effects of the terrible World War. It is also a pleasure to work with those ex-service men who live among us. They are truly trying to keep faith with their comrades by striving to promote the most excellent principles of the American Legion.—Wellington Leader.

GUYNON FIRES TEACHERS

Members of the Guymon school board are to be commended for their action in dismissing their school superintendent, his wife, and their athletic coach from the faculty. This "firing" came as a result of the board's decision to curtail the school term by a period of two weeks owing to the fact that the treasury was broke and warrants had to be issued to operate the school. The three faculty members who were discharged demanded that they be paid in full for the nine months term and called a meeting during school hours of all teachers to protest against the action of the board, leaving the pupils in their rooms without any supervision. 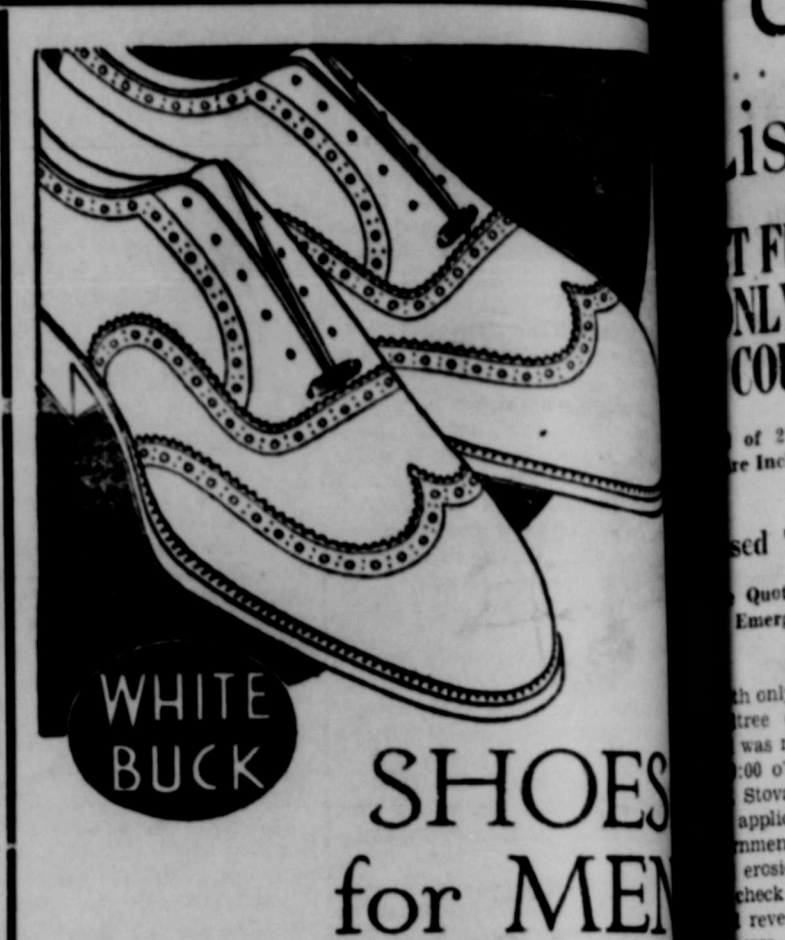
