Gen. Dix Accused of Murder.

We take the following from the
Alabama Argus, copied into its col-
umns from the Chicago Times:"A RECOLLECTION OF DIX."
"In 1865 an Aid-de-Camp of Dix,
by the name of Barstow, came to
me (I was then resident in New
York) to say that Gen. Dix wanted
to see some newspaper-writer on
public and military business. Greatly
exercised in my case of hearts,
and wondering if I was to be shot
immediately on the seven-spot, I
took my way to an office in Black-
er-street, before which paced a senti-
nel and several army warrant
agents, the latter of whom shaved
officers' salaries, and are now mem-
bers in good standing of the Repub-
lican Party.Within, screened away like a
pawbroke, was the General, who
commanded in Accusation.The nature of his communication
was startling, and fully in accord
with his private character. He
wanted me to hang a man, and re-
lieve him from the responsibility.Start not until the above sentence
be explained.There was a poor devil named
Beall, who had captured a steam-
boat called the *Ohio* Parsons, run-
ning between Detroit and Sandusky.
Anxious to shoot him on the spot,
over somebody's shoulder, Gen. Dix,
to whom he was transferred, had
designed to have certain newspaper
articles written, clamoring for the
man's blood, and, under cover of
said articles and the popular effect
they might produce, issue some
celebrated Order No. 2 like the fol-
lowing:John Beall will be shot on receipt
of this order on the fire-spot. Pi-
racy must be killed dead, though I
should have to be Governor.And this old moral-coward Ma-
jor-General of poppy-cock phrases
had supposed that I was official
journalist enough to be apprentice
to his hanging propensities. I al-
lowed him to hang the man him-
self, and the said hanging, under
the circumstances, I have always
looked upon as the sacrifice of a
young man's life to feed an old pit-
iless politician's desire to do a pop-
ular and dramatic thing. Beall was
also convicted of other offences on
American soil, but the proof was of
the flimsiest character. I saw the
man die, and he died with silent
gallantry, saying: "This is murder."And, whenever I recall it all, I
think of old Dix setting up public
opinion to shed blood, and I say:
That man is a fraud!The vulgar abuse contained in
the foregoing needs no com-
ment.The whole story of the interview
with Gen. Dix is unquestionably a
fabrication. Like Dana, who ap-
peals to the dead Stanton, this writ-
er appeals to the dead Barstow.Four of Gen. Dix's staff are living—
three of them in this State—and
they could have been easily cited as
witnesses.The facts of the case in regard to
Beall's execution are these:1. He was tried and executed as a
spy. He was a Confederate officer,
and not only disguised, but ar-
med, within our lines. He was also
convicted of attempting to
throw a railroad train, filled with
women and children, off the track,
near Buffalo, for the purpose, as
is supposed, of getting possession
of the mails and express property.His journal, which was found on
him, showed him to be not "a poor
devil," as alleged, but a man of edu-
cation and gentlemanly instincts,
sadly perverted by the cause he
served. This journal, calculated as
it was to make an impression in his
favor, was sent by Gen. Dix to the
Court by which he was tried, in or-
der that he might have the full
benefit of all that could be said in
his defense.Although Gen. Dix had the pow-
er, as commander of a department,
to direct the execution of the sen-
tence, he considered it due to the
importance and delicacy of the case
to send the record to Judge Advoca-
te-General Holt, to be laid before
Mr. Lincoln, with the order approv-
ing the sentence. Mr. Lincoln re-
turned it with the single suggestion
that the execution should be delay-
ed a week—a suggestion which was
promptly adopted.Every indulgence was extended
to Beall while preparing to meet his
fate. A friend was allowed the
unusual privilege of staying in his
room, night and day, before his exe-
cution.One of Beall's last acts was to
write a letter to Gen. Dix, (now in
his possession,) thanking him for
his "unexpected kindness."And yet the Chicago Tribune and
the Alabama Argus, its copyist, re-
presented Beall's execution as "the
sacrifice of a young man's life to
feed an old and pitiless politician's
desire to do a popular and dramatic
act." These are the means by which
Mr. Greeley expects to win his elec-
tion.—N. Y. Tribune.
