New Residents Are Reminded To Apply For Ballot

The County Clerk has issued a reminder that new residents of Texas who wish to vote in the presidential election this year must apply for a ballot at the county clerk's office by 5 o'clock next Friday, Sept. 20.

The reminder is for voters who will have lived in Texas more than 60 days but less than a year on next November 5, general election day. This is the first time that residents of less than a year will be able to vote in a Texas presidential election. A law passed in 1967 allows a new resident to vote if he will have lived in Texas for at least 60 days on election day, possesses all qualifications required for voting in Texas elections except the normal residence requirements, and was either a qualified voter in another state immediately prior to his removal to Texas or would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state of his former residence if he had remained there and complied with the state's legal requirement for voting.

If the voter was registered in the state of his former residence and has a voter registration certificate or other document to prove his registration he should have the document with him when he applies at the clerk's office. Otherwise, it will be necessary for the clerk to contact the appropriate election official in the state of the voter's former residence to verify whether he would have been eligible to vote in that state if he had not changed his residence.

New residents whose applications are accepted will be notified of that fact and will return to the clerk's office between October 21 and November 1 to cast their ballots. They will not be permitted to vote on anything except President and Vice President. Persons voting under this law are not required to register with the county tax assessor-collector.

Voters who will have lived in Texas more than a year on election day must be registered with the tax assessor-collector in order to vote. Persons who became residents of Texas on or before October 1, 1967, had to register by last January 31, the regular registration deadline, but those who became residents after October 1, 1967, may register at any time up to 31 days before the election. The deadline to register for the general election will be next October 5.

If a registered voter will have lived in the state more than a year and in the county more than 6 months on election day, he will vote a full ballot in the ordinary manner on election day at the polling place for the voting precinct in which he lives. If he will have lived in the county less than 6 months, he will be able to vote on state-wide office and issues, including President and Vice President, but not on local offices and issues, by applying to the county clerk for a ballot during the period from October 16 thru November 1.

Fall Officially Begins Sept. 22

Fall officially begins on Sunday, Sept. 22, but warm weather usually remains thru September.

Red River County Fair Sept. 25-28

Plans are being completed for what promises to be the largest event in the history of the Red River County Fair and Livestock Exposition, scheduled for Sept. 25-28 at the Legion Park in Clarksville.

A number of new crowd-pleasing activities have been added this year for the entertainment of the several thousand visitors expected to attend. The Clarksville Jaycees will sponsor a contest each night, including: hog calling, pancake eating, distance spitting, arm wrestling, women's cow milking, and beard growing. Contestants may enter during the Fair.

A highlight of the displays will be the wildlife exhibit. Co-chairmen Billy Ray Hines and Bill Hill hope to have a bobcat, alligator, buffalo, skunks and raccoons, snakes, wild birds, peafowls, and other animals. Those having anything suitable for show are urged to contact one of the chairmen.

The Citizens State Shows of Oklahoma will provide the carnival attractions again, with several additional rides planned. The carnival will probably set up on Monday and Tuesday and be in full stride Wednesday night.

The traditional parade kicking off the Fair will run through the business district late Wednesday afternoon. James Paul Harvey, chairman, will schedule the time and route later.

A full slate of agricultural activities is planned, to include the women's division with food entries, textiles, crafts, and other exhibits. Farm products will again have a full division of 22 classes, including corn, cotton, grain, peanuts, peppers, beans, hay, melons, and many others. Entry catalogues on each division are available at the office of the Extension Agents at the Courthouse.

A large number of entries is expected in the livestock division, always one of the best-attended activities. Divisions include cattle, swine, sheep, and poultry, with judging slated for Friday. Competition in the 4-H poultry division promises to be intense, as the Farm Bureau provided 2,000 broilers to 4-H youth earlier this year in anticipation of Fair entries. Those young persons desiring to enter are to bring a pullet and a rooster for exhibit and, in addition, two dressed chickens.

The dressed chickens will be barbecued by halves and boxed with bread, pickles, and chips for sale on the grounds on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights. All proceeds will go to the Poultry Division of the Fair.

Nolen Meredith, horse show chairman, is now scheduling activities and accepting entries for those events.

Free entertainment will again be provided each Fair night, with Paul Hamilton and Amos Green as co-chairmen. A country music jamboree is planned for Wednesday, an amateur contest in the country and western music category will be Thursday, the Thomas Family Gospel Singers will appear on Friday night, and the Canaan Valley Boys, Gospel in Bluegrass, will perform at intervals through the day on Saturday, with the Fiddlers' Contest concluding the activities that evening.

Entries in the Women's Division should be brought to the Exhibit Building on Tuesday, Sept. 24, with closed judging Wednesday morning at 9 a. m. All agricultural and livestock entries must be in place no later than 8 p. m. on Wednesday.

Grounds admission and parking at the Fair are free.

Austin. — A new Texas land war is raging. Land developers and Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler are in disagreement over the recently-revived \$400 million state Veterans Land Program.

Mindful of the VLP scandals of the mid 50's, Sadler is adopting cautious, conservative policies to guide future state policies. Program permits qualified veterans to buy land on the low interest, long-term-pay plan.

Developers claim Sadler is tight-fisted and is jeopardizing the program by low-ceiling land value appraisals and limiting sales to 10 per cent of large subdivisions.

Under Sadler's limits, developers with tracts of 1,000 acres can sell only 100 acres through the state bond-financed program. The Commissioner argues that the state should not spend all its constitutionally authorized bond funds in a few areas.

Central Texas developers counter that land values already are soaring and that veterans held out of the market now eventually will pay higher rates.

Sadler says land already is selling at prices beyond reason in Travis, Kerr, Bastrop and Hidalgo Counties. Realtors say Sadler's 25 appraisers are putting price tags on property \$40 to \$100 an acre too low right now. They claim qualified veterans are lining up to buy land at prevailing prices and the program is a "flop."

"Trying to make a fast buck at state expense," reprimands Sadler, who staunchly maintains he is having none of that kind of business. One realtor is seeking a legislative investigation.

WATER PLAN — Texas' monumental water program — to move surplus water from the Mississippi River and Northeast Texas to the drier areas of South and West Texas — is not to be released until late October or early November.

But the Texas Water Development Board, which is working up the plan, let some details slip out when it approved its budget request to be submitted to the Legislature for the two-year period beginning Sept. 1, 1969.

Board's budget requests a more than 50 per cent increase in appropriations for the agency so

it can get the plan into operation before Texas faces economic disaster form a lack of water.

A time schedule for the project — estimated to cost around \$10 billion — will be presented to the Legislature, outlining what needs to be done in the next six years.

First step is gathering the surplus Northeast Texas water for the Trans-Texas Canal, which will move water west to supply Dallas - Fort Worth, then on thru the concrete - lined canal to the South Plains and other areas of West Texas and the Trans - Pecos, all the way to El Paso.

Then by the end of 1971, negotiations must be completed to bring surplus water from the lower Mississippi, below New Orleans, across Southern Louisiana, then into either the Sabine River or up the Red River to the Sulphur and Cypress Rivers.

By the middle of 1974, federal, state and private sources need to agree on the construction of nuclear - energy power - generating plants to produce the electricity necessary to run the hundreds of pumps which will actually move the water.

South Texas will be served by a South Texas Canal, which will run from the lower Sabine River near Orange down the coast to the Lower Rio Grande Valley. This project will need to be approved by Congress by mid-1972.

State will probably have to pay 25 - 30 per cent of the cost of the project. This means that the \$400 million borrowing power the board now has will have to be expanded to at least \$2.5 billion. Legislature would have to approve this in January, with the people voting on it in 1970.

LOUDER SENATE — Newsmen and spectators in the Texas Senate have been complaining for years that they can't hear what the Senators are saying to each other on the floor, making it rather difficult to follow debate.

A San Antonio firm is solving that problem, at the request of a special Senate committee created by the June special session.

Company plans to install a powerful amplifier and 55 speakers around the chamber — specially attuned so that deep-throated Senators and high-pitched ones, too, will be heard by all in the chamber.

Each senator will have an individual desk microphone, and a central panel at the president's

desk will allow the Senators to be turned off and on by the Senate secretary.

Cost of the system will be from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

ATTORNEY GEN. SPEAKS — A write-in vote for President and Vice President is valid and must be counted, regardless of whether the political party of the candidates "written in" has qualified to have names printed on the ballot. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held. Martin said if the Secretary of State has not been notified as to identity of the slate of presidential electors for write-in candidates, inquiry may be made by him as to the electors' names.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY — Rep. Vernon Stewart of Wichita Falls, chairman of the House Committee on Juvenile Crime, offers a new approach to juvenile-crime problems.

Stewart wants to pay Texas' 254 counties to "keep their young people out of trouble." This would involve a state program of paying the counties \$2,000 a year for each juvenile they keep out of the state reformatories.

Proposal is based on the fact that not only is the state planning to spend \$10 million in the next three or four years on building new Texas Youth Council facilities, but will also spend \$2,000 per year per "student" to keep them in the "schools."

Stewart said his plan "would save the state taxpayers the cost of the buildings to house them and the county taxpayers the cost of the losses they create by delinquency."

MILK FREIGHT RATES — For the first time, Texas Railroad Commission has established rates, rules and regulations on the shipping of milk in relatively small quantities from dairy farms to milk producers.

Previously, rates were simply agreed on by the dairyman and the transporter.

New rates will be based on a mileage scale from 10 to 200 miles and are different for Grade A and ungraded milk and according to the size of the shipments, in four brackets from fewer than 5,000 pounds up to 10,000 pounds and more.

Rate charts — Motor Freight Commodity Tariff No. 30 — are available free from the Railroad Commission, Transportation Rate Section, Austin.
