TOTAL OF 10,435 IS SHOWN; GAINES HAS 1,018 PEOPLE

Crosby county has a population of 10,435, as compared to 6,084 in 1920, and Gaines county has a population of 2,800, compared to 1,018 residents in 1920. I. E. Barr, of Lubbock, census supervisor, announced last night.

There were 1,141 farms enumerated in Crosby county, and 408 in Gaines.

A number of men were engaged in recovering automobiles from the burning building, and several of this group were reported to have been trapped. Two men escaped after trying to push cars out reported that five were caught with one car and three with another.

OIL FUMES MENACE OKLAHOMA CITY

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 27. (AP)—An amazing pool of black gold was brought today to Oklahoma City's very edge by fumes from a large well in the South City field.

While a sizeable crowd with burning cigars and cigarettes and running automobile motors created a fire hazard, the Hall and Briscoe company extended the pool more than one-half mile northwest at its number 1 Holmes, just south of the city limits of Capitol Hill, south residential district.

The well was estimated good for 19,000 barrels of oil daily. As its product poured into slush ponds oil and gas fumes were carried deep into the city by a brisk wind.

A program was started Monday to sign up at least 25 business men of Lubbock to attend the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Abilene Thursday, Friday and Saturday when efforts will be made to bring the 1931 meeting to this city.

This city seeks to abolish all of the hip-hip-boorah methods of celebration which heretofore has characterized all conventions of the regional body. A sane convention will be upheld by the local group, with business of West Texas and a discussion of its problems as the sole aim.

LUBBOCK'S FIRE LOSS DECREASED

Lubbock's fire loss per capita for the past year was \$3.08, as compared with \$3.17, the average in 21 cities of Texas having 20,000 or more population each, a comparison of figures reveals.

The lowest figure of any city reporting was 42 cents at Brownsville, this fact being due to the majority type of construction of buildings and houses in that border city. The highest per capita figure was turned in by Fort Worth, showing \$2.22. Total fire loss in Lubbock for the past year was \$67,720, with insurance to the amount of \$58,250.

OTHER TOWNS MAY ASK FOR CO-OP UNITS

EATON SAYS LAMESA AND BROWNFIELD LIKELY AREAS

With Littlefield definitely in the campaign to secure a concentration point of the Texas Cotton Co-operative association to handle the 1930 cotton crop, other towns are expected to get into the game. D. P. Eaton, county agent, says, "I am looking for Lamesa, Brownfield, Levelland and Crosbyton to try and get concentration locations." He said, "It required the signing up of 10,000 to 15,000 bales of cotton (Lubbock and other towns may get in too).

Handled 50,000 Bales
"Most of these towns can easily come under those classifications. I understand at Littlefield that they handled 50,000 bales through their compress last year."

"Any town that can sign up 15,000 bales will be given consideration by the committee in charge of the location of the concentration points."

Mr. Eaton added that it probably would be some time the latter part of the summer before anything definite in the way of branches would be made known.

Be Here in August
At the present time workers of the co-operatives are engaged in the south part of the state. They are coming up north a little ahead of the crop maturing and it "will be the latter part of July and more likely August before they get up around Lubbock," the county agent said.

This section of the state is expected to receive considerable attention from officials of the co-operative group in the matter of concentration points. The expected change here from short staple to a longer staple is to have an effect on the marketing of the crop, cotton men believe.

WANT FIREPROOF SECTION
NEW HOBBS, N. M., May 27.—(Special)—Citizens of New Hobbs are reported planning a fire proof business section.

A section of Main street, connecting New Hobbs with Old Hobbs has been set aside and only brick buildings are to be erected on it.

Fort Worth Man Praises Lubbock
